

Mayor Pellegrini joins trade mission to China

The far east will learn about sustainability in King Township, if Mayor Steve Pellegrini has anything to say about it.

Pellegrini is part of the Mayor Delegation to China Trade Mission, put on by the Canada China Investment Association.

It's an important gathering of Ontario mayors, government officials and key business Professionals in China. The 10-day mission runs May 15-25 and the mayors will gain an understanding of the economy of China by attending business meetings, conferences and meetings with selected government officials in China. The mayors will attend tours of major Chinese cities to experience first-hand, the

Pellegrini is representing not only King, but York Region. It's his first time visiting China and he stressed he will make sure it's worth it, adding he doesn't want to spoil his near-perfect attendance record unless it's worthwhile.

Pellegrini noted China has a growing middle class with money to spend and invest abroad. China has an interest in agricultural operations. He's looking forward to the mission and sharing some interesting ideas and potential business partner-

Joining Pellegrini will be Mayor Dave Eke, from Niagara-On-The-Lake; Mayor Lou Maieron, from Erin; Mayor Larry Kraemer, from Kincardine; Mayor John Mc-Charles, from Petrolia; Mayor Neil Ellis, from Belleville; Mayor Brenda Halloran, from Waterloo; Mayor Brian McMullan, from St. Catharines.

The trade mission provides a platform for mayors to identify market trends in China in addition to understanding the large-scale urbanization and growth in the Chinese economy. The unlimited growth of the Chinese economy will become evident as mayors progress through the tours and meetings.

Hopes are the mayors will build strong relationships with Chinese executives and develop an understanding on developing and growing businesses in China with consideration into corporate structure, regulations and laws, quality management and best practices. Two major cities, Shanghai and Beijing, will be the focus of the Trade Mission, in addition to their surrounding cities. Shanghai and Beijing were chosen for being key economic players in China.

The Canada China Investment Association (CCIA) is a Canada-China investment and bilateral trade facilitator founded in 2010 as a not-for-profit business association. CCIA is an advocate for friendship and culture exchanges between China and Canada and a catalyst for economic trade and Sino-Canadian investment.

Council should have fought harder for LCBO design

When I was on King council it was not often that Councillor Linda Pabst and I agreed, or at least not publicly. However, in the case of the Nobleton LCBO, Councillor Pabst has my full support for the statements attributed to her in the King Weekly Sentinel:

"Pabst pointed out that making allowances for the LCBO could open a can of worms. "We have to be aware that if we back down on this one we should be prepared to back down on any others," she said."

I recognize that there's always a balance to be achieved. In this case between what we believe King's villages should look like, and economic growth. But after spending years and hundreds of thousands of dollars creating plans and village design guidelines to ensure that our villages will have the character we want, it seems a shame to so quickly acquiesce to the developer

Do we need new business in King Township? Yes. This would definitely be a good thing. Do we need it at any cost? I don't believe so.

It's not as if there isn't already an LCBO location in King, and it's not as if our residents aren't accustomed to having to drive to shop. Asa a matter of fact, most of the residents of King drive significant distances to get what they want or need.

Personally, even taking the balance question in to account, I think council made the wrong decision on this one. As much as the residents may want an LCBO (which I'm not sure is 100% true), I think council should have held out to get compliance to the Village Design Guidelines. If this made the LCBO walk, so be it. As the village grows, other potential tenants will come along.

I cannot speak for each member of council as to their rationale for accepting the

First, the reality of the LCBO's monopolistic position cannot be ignored; their product line is only available from them. In contrast most, if not all other merchants, are not the "only source," so one can choose to refuse their design choices and pursue an alternate.

Second, the LCBO is a destination shop and when shoppers go to a destination shop they frequently visit other businesses in the area and spend money there. I learned this economic lesson years ago from friends in a small town who were thrilled that they had been able to position their book store across from the LCBO.

Third, this building is located at the back of the lot under development. There will be at least one other building and parking spaces between the LCBO and the sidewalk. In other words, it is not in a prime spot in terms of visibility.

Fourth, LCBO has agreed to additional landscaping in front of the store. The additional greenery will be wonderful for a shopper crossing the parking lot.

I have no trouble believing that we have gained more than we conceded. And, I don't believe that we have set the stage for serious compromises with other applicants.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of King passed By-law Number 2013-45 on the 6th day of May, 2013 under Section 34 of the Planning Act, R.S.O, 1990, Chapter P.13. By-law number 2013-45 amends Zoning By-law 74-53, as amended, by rezoning the property from Residential Urban (R1) to General Commercial (C1) - Exception Section 11.34 to permit a variety of commercial uses including business and professional offices, restaurants and take-out restaurants, retail stores, service shops (light), service shops (personal) and artist studios, and a dwelling unit in accordance with the provisions of the By-law. If you wish to appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board, a copy of an appeal form is available from the Ontario Municipal Board website at www.omb.gov.on.ca or from the Clerk of the Township of King. Please note the Board will only accept filing fee payments by certified cheque or money

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a bylaw to the Ontario Municipal Board. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.
