Cell tower proposed for Trisan Centre

The Trisan Centre property in Schomberg is being considered as a potential site to house a cell tower.

Rogers Communications approached the Township earlier this year about hosting a cell tower on the property, located at 25 Dillane Drive in Schomberg. The Trisan property is just one of the potential sites in Schomberg that is currently being considered by cellular service providers.

A report by the Township's parks, recreation and culture department was discussed at the committee meeting on Aug. 26. Staff was looking to get feedback on the location of the proposed tower.

According to the staff report, the proposed tower would stand 60 metres high, the same height as the tower recently put up on Bathurst Street north of the 16th Sideroad. The tower, which would be located on the northeast corner of the property, would require an enclosed area on site measuring about 10 metres by 10 metres. It would require a portion of the parking lot to be re-aligned, resulting in the loss of a few parking spaces which should not impact operations of the facility.

The tower would also benefit local residents in that it would increase cellular coverage in the area.

"Current cellular service levels are sporadic but the placement of this tower at the Trisan Centre would greatly increase both the level and reach of services significantly," states the staff report.

The addition of a cellular tower to the Trisan Centre would also generate revenue for the municipality. While the terms of an agreement have not been negotiated, informal discussions between Rogers Communications and township staff has indicated an estimate of \$18,000 to \$20,000 annually for a 20-year period as potential compensation.

Most councillors were open to the idea of having a cell tower on the Trisan Centre property. But Councillor Peter Grandilli was not sure a cell tower should be constructed in that area.

"Can we find another location to put it?" asked Grandilli. "I think they should look at a different site."

Local Councillor Bill Cober pointed out that locating a cell tower in an industrial area in the municipality will avoid having to locate it in a residential area.

"It happens to fit on municipal property which happens to provide revenue," Cober explained, adding he gets complaints from residents regarding cell reception all the time. "It's a very common concern. I get it a lot."

Mayor Steve Pellegrini said he also supports the proposed location for the cell tower.

"I absolutely support it - this is an ideal location," said Pellegrini adding he doesn't want to have cell towers in farm fields in King. He asked that as part of the agreement, if any other service provider is looking for access in King, they be required to co-locate if there's space.

Cober asked if as part of the deal, Rogers Communications could provide wireless service for residents using the Trisan Centre.

A motion was made to consider the site as a potential location for a cell tower. The motion carried. Rogers will now conduct soil and fill testing in the northeast portion of the parking lot. Should the matter proceed to the next step, Rogers will then be required to follow the Township's Telecommunications Protocol.

Police urge motorists to watch for children

York Regional Police reminds motorists to pay extra attention when driving through school zones as children return to school next week.

Leading up to the start of school, officers will be increasing enforcement near schools and in school zones as part of Operation ABC – Always Be Careful. Operation ABC is a traffic initiative that was launched in September 2006, in partnership with the York Catholic and York Region District School Boards to educate motorists, students, parents and teachers of the importance of pedestrian safety in school zones, especially during school hours

The focus of this year's campaign is to target distracted drivers and drivers who disobey the flashing lights of school buses. Officers will monitor buses on their routes and will be ready to act when a violation occurs. The charge of Failing to Stop for a School Bus carries a penalty of six demerit points and a fine of up to \$2,000 for a first-time offender. For a second offence, a fine of up to \$4,000 or six months in jail may be imposed.

Distracted driving continues to be a leading cause of collisions. Officers will be watching for drivers that are using their phones and texting while driving around schools. It only takes a moment of distraction to miss see ing a child walk out onto the roadway, with potentially tragic results.



The proposed Zoning By-law Amendment by the Owner, Aziz Georges, submitted by the agent, MHBC Planning, under Planning File #Z-2013-09 concerns four parcels of land assembled at the northeast corner of King Road and Keele Street in the Village of King City, as shown on the location map below. 





WNV activity varies from year to year, however high temperatures and steady rainfall can lead to increased activity. Last year was a peak season for WNV activity in York Region, with 17 human cases and 43 positive mosquito pools. So far this season, 11 mosquito pools have tested positive for the virus.

To protect yourself and family from WNV, follow these simple steps:

* Get rid of mosquitofriendly areas at home.

* Clean up standing water where mosquitoes are likely to breed, including bird baths, flower pots, on WNV or any or public swimming pool covers, health-related issue, conclogged gutters and eavestroughs.

your home are tight-fitting and in good repair.

* Wear protective cloth-* Wear lighter colours if possible as mosquitoes are attracted to darker colours.

* Minimize outdoor activities when mosquitoes dusk and dawn.

As part of the York Region 2013 West Nile virus (WNV) Control Plan, York Region Public Health larvicides catch basins to interrupt mosquito breeding, educates residents on self-protection, investigates human cases and conducts surveillance.

Symptoms of WNV illness may include fever, muscle weakness, stiff neck, confusion, severe headache and a sudden sensitivity to light. In rare cases, the virus can cause serious neurological illness, including encephalitis (inflammation of the brain). Those experiencing symptoms should seek medical attention.



Longboards are typically used for commuting and are commonplace around university campuses. But the boards' use is limited only by the riders' skills.

McArthur's custom swirl marblelike graphics are outstanding. The process is finicky and timeconsuming but the end result is amazing, and no two patterns turn out the same. A high gloss clear coat keeps the graphics intact. Customers choose their colours and each board becomes "as unique

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

Jacobson completes grueling ocean swim race

The ocean can be a foreboding place from a challenge. and many veteran swimmers are challenged by open-water races.

On June 22, Jacobson completed the FKCC Swim Around Key West 20-kilo-George Jacobson never shies away metre Ocean Swim Race. This annual







Community College in Key West.

Jacobson, who has just turned 61, has been a competitive swimmer his entire life. Although he has swam in open water events prior to this one, he has never tackled a swim race of this magnitude.

"The ocean is much more vicious than open water lake swimming," said the aquatic journeyman. "Swells, currents, sharks, and the sun all played a big factor in completing a race of this nature. The swimming was about all that I was prepared for."

Jacobson trained for six months for this race, averaging roughly 100 kilometres per month. The preparation was the key to completing this challenge. Most swim competitions set their water temperature between 79-82 degrees Fahrenheit, but the Florida Keys generally reach a temperature around 88 degrees. Avoiding heat exhaustion and sun stroke played a role in successfully completing this endeavor.

Jacobson had to cover his entire body with a specialized sun screen which contained a large proportion of zinc oxide. This compound creates a barrier against the treacherous ultra violet sun rays.

To prevent dehydration it was necessary to drink constantly with a combination of water and fluids containing electrolytes. The race is "Coast Guard approved" and each swimmer is required to have a kayaker alongside for

event is hosted by the Florida Keys the full duration of the swim. Swimmers may not touch or hold onto the kayak at any point.

Jacobson had a very successful swim finishing in 6 hours, 36 minutes and 31 seconds.

"Other than a shark swimming past with a couple kilometers to go and a few bouts of sea sickness the race went according to plan," he said.

Jacobson's main goal in swimming is to have as much fun with the sport as he can.


"I want to push myself, stay fit, and have fun doing it."

Jacobson also added that it is very rewarding to see our youth using swimming as an outlet to staying fit. He passes on this philosophy at George Jacobson Swim School and the Vaughan Aquatic Club.

"It is amazing being able to teach young beginner level swimmers during the day and switch over to the high level competitive athletes at night."

Starting with only a few swimmers when emigrating from South Africa to Canada in 1988, Jacobson's passion has rubbed off on thousands of young individuals. Children are learning how to swim, compete, as well as, learn how to live a healthy active lifestyle.

Jacobson has operated the George Jacobson Swim School on the 11th Concession in King for the past 24 years. The Richmond Hill resident is president and head coach of the Vaughan Aquatic Club.
