## **Consultants hired to begin King's CIP**

King Township wants its villages to be a source of pride. To that tend, King council recently launched the process of creating a Community Improvement Plan (CIP) by hiring consultants.

MMM Group Limited will begin the project, which is estimated to cost \$35,410, \$25,000 of which will come from the general operations budget of the economic development department.

The CIP is intended to "nurture" village revitalization and improving village vitality and properity, according to a staff report by Jamie Smyth, King's economic development officer. The CIP will help boost the physical landscapes of King's communities - primarily King City, Nobleton and Schomberg.

"Public benefits can be achieved in the medium and longterm that results in more socially cohesive, environmentally friendly and economically sound communities," Smyth pointed out. "In short, municipalities are finding ways to become more sustainable through the use of community improvement plans."

CIPs are deemed as useful land use planning tools and economic development tools.

A CIP project team will be created in King, from planning and finance departments, with Smyth overseeing the project.

Proposal bids were accepted in February and six were received. MMM Group was deemed to have the highest score.

The work on a CIP works well with both the Economic Development Strategy and Integrated Community Sustainability Plan.

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## Street sweeping contract awarded; bidder upset

Con-Ker Construction has been feel it's not fair to combine the two." awarded a contract for street sweeping and cleaning services in the Township of King, but A&G The Road Cleaners, the Township's current service provider, is not happy with the decision.

A report from the engineering and public works department presented at the committee of the whole meeting on March 17 outlined the results of the tendering process for the Township's street sweeping and cleaning services.

Construction be awarded the five-year contract for the spring and fall sweeping based on the fact that the company was the lowest bidder, with a total bid in the amount of \$349,500.52 (including HST), plus \$27.50 per tonne (plus HST) for disposal of materials based on an estimated quantity of 1,500 tonnes per year. That translates to \$62,947 for 2014 and \$62,383.90 per year from 2015 to 2018 which includes the cost of disposal.

The Township is planning to close the Miller Road Landfill in 2015, therefore alternate disposal arrangements are needed from 2015 to 2018 and beyond, Flindall explained. The Town asked that the disposal cost be incorporated into the bid for 2015 to 2018.

For the sweeping component for 2014 Staff recommended that Con-Ker (without disposal), A&G put in a bid of \$62,153, lower than the Con-Ker bid of \$62,947.21.

For the cost of street cleaning with disposal (from 2015 to 2018), A&G came in higher with a bid of \$105,373.34 compared to the Con-Ker bid of \$62,383.90.



## They're up there, watching us every day!

"When you have eliminated the impossible, whatever remains, however improbable, must be the truth."

Every day in this great country of ours, high above our heads something strange is going on. According to the 2013 UFO Survey, published by Ufology Research, almost three unusual objects per day are reported by average citizens.

The survey has some really interesting stats. Compiled by Geoff Dittman and Chris A. Rutkowski, the report is really the only document available on the subject, since the government gave up chasing UFOs some years back.

Since 1989, Ufology Research (formerly Ufology Research of Manitoba) has secured UFO case data from known and active Canadian investigators and researchers. The goal has been to provide data for use by researchers trying to understand this controversial phenomenon. No comparable studies are currently produced by any other research group in North America.

Last year marked the 25th year of collecting and analysing Canadian UFO report data by Ufology Research.

There were 1,180 UFO sightings reported in Canada in 2013, or about three each day.

The number of cases in 2013 is the second-highest number of UFO sightings recorded in Canada during the last 25 years.

The 1,180 UFO cases is much less than the peak year of 2012, when almost 2,000 reports were recorded. In 2013, Ontario had more than 40 per cent of all Canadian UFO reports. About 14 per cent of all UFO reports were classified as unexplained. The typical UFO sighting lasted approximately 13 minutes in 2013.

The study found that more than half of all UFO sightings were of simple lights in the sky. Witnesses also reported point sources of light, spheres and boomerangs.

Results of this study show that many people continue to report unusual objects in the sky, and some of these objects do not have obvious explanations. Many witnesses are pilots, police and other in-

capabilities and good judgement.

Numbers of reported UFO sightings remain high. Several theories for this can be suggested: more UFOs are present and physically observable by witnesses; more secret or classified military exercises and overflights are occurring over populated areas; more people are unaware of the nature of conventional or natural objects in the sky; more people are taking the time to observe their surroundings; more people are able to report their sightings with easier access to the Internet and portable technology; or even that the downturn in the economy is leading to an increased desire by some people to look skyward for assistance.

There is no incontrovertible evidence that some UFO cases involve extraterrestrial contact. The continued reporting of UFOs by the public and the yearly increase in numbers of UFO reports suggests a need for further examination of the phenomenon by social, medical and/ or physical scientists.

Here are a couple of the more interesting ones.

On Sept. 27, 2013 at 8:51 p.m. at Winnipeg, an air traffic controller saw four lights in a V-shaped formation moving dividuals with reasonably good observing together silently overhead. The witness said the lights were at an altitude of about 1,000 or 2,000 feet and were heading slowly northwest. Because there was no visible aircraft beacon, the witness did not believe the lights were on an ordinary aircraft.

On Sept. 28, 2013 at 8:13 p.m. at Portage la Prairie, Manitoba, a former helicopter pilot and two other people watched as many as 50 orange lights moving in the southwest sky in pairs following the same trajectory south to north. They watched the procession for at least five minutes.

Just under two per cent of all reported UFO cases in 2013 were Close Encounters, emphasizing the reality that very few UFO cases involve anything other than distant objects seen in the sky. This is an important statistic, because the current popular interest in abductions and sensational UFO encounters is based not on the vast majority of UFO cases but on the very tiny fraction of cases which fall into the category of close encounters. Speculation on what aliens may or may not be doing in our airspace seems almost completely unconnected to what are actually being reported as UFOs.

Statistics indicate that the typical UFO experience has more than one witness, and supports the contention that UFO sightings represent observations of real, physical phenomena, since there is usually at least one corroborator present to support the sighting.

As a sci-fi fan, I've always been a "believer" in life on other worlds. From the sheer volume of stars and planets in the

cosmos (there are an estimated 170 billion galaxies in the universe), I find it very unlikely that we are the only intelligent beings. The odds are there are millions of earth-like planets capable of supporting life. After all, we don't need all this room!

For those who follow strict interpretation of religious doctrine, Genesis clearly indicates that God created the "heavens and the earth." Since "heavens" is plural, that means God created the universe. It does not say he didn't place "man" on other worlds.

Further, in all "close encounters" aliens are described as humanoid - eyes, two arms, two legs and hands. Since these are similar to our own image, perhaps the All Mighty created them, too.

The naysayers always ask why aliens don't make themselves known to us. Would you? If we had the capability of visiting other worlds and dropped in on the natives who were picking up after their dogs; polluting the oceans; watching late-night talk shows and infomercials and otherwise simply creating a lot of noise, you'd likely turn your ship around and leave as fast as you can!

Humankind's fascination with the universe will never end. That's human curiosity and it's an amazing quality.

Perhaps one day, my kids or even my grandkids will make "first contact."

But it doesn't matter. We'll go on believing, scanning and sending out messages from earth.

Hopefully we'll get a helping hand along the way. We're simply not ready for it.


Local politicians are giving residents and taxpayers an informal, upclose opportunity to get involved and voice their concerns.

Canadian writer Heather Robertson passed away last week on her 72nd birthday.

The news came as a shock to her family, friends and former neighbors in King who knew her and worked with her on various local projects.

Robertson, a native of Winnipeg, had more than a dozen books and hundreds of articles to her name.

Robertson was also a strong supporter of the King Township Historical Society.

## **Ontario wants to freeze** MPP salaries until 2019

Queen's Parks wants to freeze MPP salaries until 2019.

The Liberals introduced legislation that would extend the current freeze to April 1, 2019, after a balanced provincial budget is confirmed.

Dr. Helen Jaczek, MPP for Oak-Ridges Markham, admitted it's "not much in terms of dollars and cents," but it's the intention that matters. It's leading by example and hopefully it will be a "significant moral suasion for others."

York-Simcoe MPP Julia Munro sees the move as merely a "political gesture." This is a "drop in the bucket" in the big picture she observed, noting it's being presented as part of the overall solution. The PCs and the government-commissioned Drummond Report, called on a widespread public sector wage freeze, but that's still not the case. Munro said she supports a broad freeze so it's fair and there are no winners or losers.

This recent move on the government's part is merely to show they're appearing pro-active on cost-cutting measures. Munro would like to see "more meaningful efforts" at deficit reduction.

Compensation costs account for over half of all Ontario government spending, either paid directly through the Ontario Public Service or as part of the government's transfer payments to universities, hospitals and other public sector partners.

The government has identified the management of public sector compensation as an important part of its plan to control costs while also maintaining public services that families rely on like health care and education.

In 2004, a salary freeze for MPPs was implemented from October 2003 until April 1, 2005. The 2009 budget announced MPP salaries would be frozen for one year beginning on April 1, 2009. That salary freeze was extended in the 2010 budget for two years and in the 2012 budget for an additional two years, bringing the total length of the current pay freeze to five years. Since 2009, Ontario has initiated compensation restraint measures for members of the Ontario public sector and broader public sector, and has indicated that compensation costs must be managed within Ontario's existing fiscal framework. Ontario public sector wage settlements continue to be below the average of private sector, municipal sector and federal public sector settlements.

At its meeting of February 24th, Council of the Township of King considered and heard options on how to best introduce a future preservation by-law in King - at tree this meeting, no by-law was presented or adopted. Such a by-law is intended to preserve the tree population of King by egulating the removal and replacement of rees on private property. Since the by-law was first presented on December 16th, 2013, members of the community have provided a wide range of comments, quesions and suggestions - and as a result of

his input, alternative by-law structure and application is being considered.

During the next several months, Staff will be engaging the community and local agencies/groups to obtain more input and suggestions. A report is planned to be presented again to Council in May of 2014, reflecting anticipated results/ideas arising from this engagement. All





Spring is a great opportunity to check in on the quality of your well water. The Region of York encourages residents with private wells to make sure their well water is safe.


It's easy to do. Residents with private wells can pick up well water sample bottles and drop samples off Monday to Wednesday between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., and Thursday between 8:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. at the following York Region Community and Health Services locations:

Township of King Offices, 2075 King Road; Dr. W. Laceby Nobleton Arena and Community Centre, 15 Old King Road and the Trisan Centre, 25 Dillame Drive.

Collected water samples are submitted to Public Health Ontario to measure for bacterial contamination. Bacterial contamination can make well water unsafe to use and drink, causing stomach cramping, diarrhea and other problems.

Private well owners should also inspect their wells annually to ensure they are damage-free and in good working condition. Information on the Well Aware Program for private well assessment is available at www.wellaware.ca.

## Mortelliti cares about King; seeks re-election

#### **By Mark Pavilons**

Cleve Mortelliti genuinely cares about his community.

It's this fundamental fact, and simply that he finds his council job interesting and challenging, that has led him to seek re-election in this fall's municipal election.

King City is the only home he's known and he's proud to have been councillors for the past seven and a half years.

His main accomplishment in the last term is the stake park at the King City arena.

"I know not everyone likes it, but after almost 8 years I know that you can't please everyone. But I was a kid in this town once, and we never had a place quite like that to play in. When I see so many kids each day at that facility, to see my childhood friends' kids play there, to see my kids play there – I really feel like I accomplished something good for the all the young families with kids in King City."

Mortelliti is also pleased about the success and growth of the King City Festival.

"King City has never had anything like this sustained for more than two years and we're going into our fourth year. This year the theme is a craft beer and gourmet food truck festival with live music. Check it out at kingcityfestival.com."

Mortelliti noted that in his 2006 campaign, he said he wanted to help get more seniors' housing. King City now has a 4-storey condo on King Road that many of our long-time residents have moved into. He's also been a strong supporter of the beautification of the downtown core and the Township is now in the process of completing a major streetscaping project at the King and Keele intersection, which was the focal point of Christmas in King City. That event as well is another one that brings King City and its merchants into the spotlight during the holidays.

Mortelliti also vowed to bring his land development expertise to bear and protect King City.

When an application for a 49-townhouse intensification project threatened the character of an estate lot subdivision at Keele & McClure, "I was integral in assisting the local rate payers association in getting the unit count dropped to less than 20 with single family homes instead of towns, so it would be more in character of the existing community. In fact, I drew the plan in AutoCad. Same on Dew Street. I drew that plan also. These are only a couple examples of using my land development skills in defence of our community."

Growth continues to put pressure on his community.

The growth of King City from a population of 5,000 to 12,000 has only just begun. King City will be literally under construction for the next decade.

Mortelliti said King City already has lack of indoor recreational opportunities for its growing population. "That's a big nut that needs to be cracked and we have been working over the past four years to

crack it, but this one is going to take time, and its going to require a private/public partnership, hopefully with Seneca."

He stressed the Township has to continue improving its customer service. "We've come a long way in four years I think, but we still have a ways to go. I mean, primarily what is the Township other than a service provider? People have expectations for higher quality service and I'd like us to win an award for it. There are in fact municipal awards for customer service. I want us to reach for one"

Mortelliti said he really enjoys helping people.

"Whether it's with their water bill, or cutting the grass to clear a sidewalk, or helping with getting dangerous trees cut after an unprecedented ice storm, or assisting with a pool permit application, or deck application. Sometimes these things get bunged up in the system. I like to reach in and pull them out. It makes me feel good to know I was able to help."

Conversely, he admitted he feels badly when he can't help.

There have been other changes in the community, too.

Mortelliti said his electorate has changed. King City saw little to know growth in the 40-plus years he's lived here. In the past four years we have seen a significant influx of brand new residents who call King City their home.

"They have a different perspective than residents who've lived here for 10, 20, 30, 40 or 50 years. That's a challenge for any councillor. It takes a balance, understanding and open mindedness. The new residents need to know that their councillor supports them as much as the long-time residents. And some long-time residents are having a real problem with all this change and growth, and I understand why.

"But King City is changing, and our heads can't stay stuck in the past. I think the councillor needs to envision and embrace a positive future for King City and work hard to achieve that vision." Mortelliti said residents should want a councillor who understands and appreciates King City's past and why its residents have traditionally fought so fiercely protect it. "I have many friends who've grown up here, like I did, and we chose to stay here or move back here and raise our families here because King City instilled that strong home town feeling in us. It's a place where great memories live and where that feeling of pride that people like Rosie MacLennan and Alex Pietrangelo feel when they represent us at the Olympics, and make us all so proud to not only be Canadian but to be from King City. "To me, that's the kind of pride a councillor needs to feel for their home town. It can't all be rational and logical; it has also had to be about that feeling in your gut and in your heart. King City may be growing, but what residents can expect from me is an undying and perhaps sometimes irrational affection for my home town." The practical part, he pointed out, is that development and growth are the biggest issues facing King City. But Mortelliti knows the "game" inside and out.

Mortelliti considers being an elected official as one of the highest honours and positions a person in our society can hold. He grew up believing that.


He credits his parents and their determination for giving him the solid work ethic and drive. His father was a successful entrepreneur and his mother earned her PhD in philosophy in her 60s.

"The conversations that my parents engaged me in, conversations about human rights, about constitutional rights, about law, rights and freedoms, about human nature and about art, literature and music, religion – all of this instilled in me a level of excitement every time an election rolled around whether it be federal, provincial or municipal. I can remember being so proud and so excited to cast my first ballot. I know in my heart that this a is an honourable position to hold, to be entrusted by the public to act as their representative and their voice."

While he loves politics, it has its obvious shortcomings.

He said politics can reveal the darker side of human nature, in both politicians and voters.

"There are lots of things beyond a single councillors' control. Decisions are made by committee, and in this term of council we've had a very strong, very good, very conscientious committee of councillors. All I can truly promise is that I'll bring my heart to the job and continue to do my best for King."



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## York creates partnership programs

The December 2013 ice storm in southern Ontario and eastern Canada resulted in \$200 million in insured losses and pushed the year-end severe weather insured loss total to \$3.2 billion, which is the highest in Canadian history, reports Insurance Bureau of Canada (IBC)

The losses of 2013 came after four years in a row of natural disaster losses for the insurance industry that hit the \$1 billion mark.

"In 2013, the terrible effects of the new weather extremes hit Canadians hard. From the Alberta floods last summer to the ice storms in Ontario and Atlantic Canada over the holidays, frankly, bad weather hit insurers hard, too," says Don Forgeron, president and CEO, IBC.

"I'm very proud of how the home, car and business insurance industry performed during these difficult times. We responded quickly to disasters when Canadians needed us most. Despite unprecedented losses, we were there for Canadians through each and every high-cost disaster. And we are contributing new ideas and leadership for adapting to severe weather in the future," Forgeron added.



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

And the worst may not be over. If we have a quick thaw, there's a dan-

The frost is deep, Foley pointed out, But for many, the cleanup and repairs noting parking lots and pot holes are likely the worst he's seen in a decade.

In many cases, the damage has been done, and yet repairs can't progress until the spring has begun in earnest and temperatures are consistently above zero.

Another problem from this year's ice received in early 2014 was the "worst com- storm was that a lot happens in a short period of time and everyone - homeowners and business owners – want it fixed as

Foley did say that people have been quite patient this year, but he appreciates the problems, and the need for businesses to be up and running.

This winter has created another problem – there have been several days where it was simply too cold to work outside.

All of this has put doubt in insurance companies' minds and we'll likely see changes in coverage in the coming months.

Foley Restoration has been operating since 1991 and the company's expertise lies in response and cleanup services.

The number one cause for insurance claims in Canada is water damage. From floods, sewer backups to internal leaks, water-soaked basements keep crews busy.

Foley mentioned he was called home from summer holidays last July in response to the massive flooding in the GTA. His company and crews work through November to get caught up from that mess.

Foley Restoration addresses consequences from a wide range of scenarios, from the smoke-damaged bunker gear of fire departments to water damage in a privately-owned business to the destruction of a home caused by a fallen tree. A clean-up can take a day to several months to complete.

Their main role is stabilizing a structure and eliminating potential problems. It's largely labour related and Foley has access to staff and sub-trades. They're on call 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

All staff is trained on an on-going basis, through the Institute of Inspection, Cleaning and Restoration Certification (IICRC).

Collaboration and cooperation are key elements in working effectively with the various people and organizations involved in the clean-up, including the client, insurance agents, contractors, and local municipal staff.



This is a cost-effective way for the Township to provide the services it does. Such strategic partnerships benefit the community at large, one of the principles contained in the Sustainability Plan.




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## Davis repeats as champs in men's league curling

#### BORN MARCH 19TH, 1942, DIED MARCH 19TH, 2014 Beloved wife of writer/broadcaster, Andrew Marshall; mother of film editor Aaron Marshall; stepmother of art archivist, Amy Marshall Furness,

and much-loved mentor to numerous budding writers in Canada, Heather will be terribly missed by family and the many friends and colleagues she made during her very productive writer's life.

Heather will be best remembered for her magazine journalism and her many books, including best-sellers, Reservations Are for Indians, Grass Roots, and her award-winning first novel, Willie, A Romance, as well as the other novels and non-fiction works which followed over a more-than-40-year writing career. These include, Salt of the Earth, The Flying Bandit, More Than a Rose, Writing From Life, Measuring Mother Earth, and her most recent book, Walking Into Wilderness, which won the inaugural Ontario Speaker of the Legislature Award in 2013.

She gave to her profession through more than her work, being a founding member of both The Writers Union of Canada, and The Periodical Writers Association of Canada. She also carried the quill for just remuneration of electronic versions of freelance writers' works in the definitive class action lawsuits, Robertson v Thomson 1, and Robertson 2 which followed. Robertson 1 went to the Supreme Court of Canada and successfully enshrined freelance writers' copyrights in electronic publications of their works for the future. The resulting settlements remunerated writers for works previously published without their agreement in databases and in electronic versions of newspapers and magazines.

She was also president of the King Township Historical Society, a member of the York Pioneer & Historical Society, and gave her time to many other worthwhile pursuits over the years. She died in her sleep after successive breast, colon, and brain cancers, in the early hours of her 72nd birthday.


