### **Dew Street** development in King City moves ahead

A development proposal on Dew Street in King City has undergone significant changes since it was first introduced last year, but some residents are still concerned about how it will affect the established surrounding community.

Council approved the draft plan of subdivision for the development at the council meeting Monday. The new homes will be located at the northwest corner of Dew Street and King Boulevard in an existing low density residential area in King City.

The applications were originally submitted in February 2013 and proposed 39 residential units of which 27 units were townhomes and 12 units were semi-detached. A statutory public meeting was held in June 2013 where the public expressed significant opposition to the plan, especially with respect to the proposed density. As a result, the owner undertook discussions with various stakeholders resulting in a significant change to the applications. The owner revised the plan and submitted new applications in February proposing 28 residential units composed of a mix of semi-detached and single detached units. The initial proposal also included a thru street connection from Dew Street to King Boulevard but the applicant changed the thru-road to a cul-desac with access to King Boulevard only. Murray Evans, a planning consultant and agent for the landowner, explained the plan has been revised to address the concerns of the existing community.

#### UPDATE TO BRIDGE / STREET CLOSURE IN ANSNORVELDT



#### Township of King Transportation Master Plan Study

#### NOTICE OF PUBLIC INFORMATION CENTRE #2

The Township of King has retained WSP Canada Inc. to undertake the development of a Transportation Master Plan (TMP) Study. The TMP Study will guide the development of the Township's long-term transportation vision for the next twenty years and will be undertaken in accordance with the applicable planning policy framework at the provincial, regional, and local levels, including the Provincial Policy Statement. It reflects the Township's desire to develop a sustainable transportation system with a strong focus on efficient use of existing infrastructure, transit, active transportation and Transportation Demand Management.

Public Information Centre (PIC) #1 took place between January 28 and 30, 2014 in King City, Nobleton, and Schomberg. In PIC #1, existing and forecasted transportation needs, and current road network issues were reviewed, Also, existing and proposed active transportation and transit services were reviewed. It provided information and opportunities for discussion on the transportation challenges, priorities, and choices facing the Township of King.

Since then, technical studies along with policy directions have also been prepared in support of the Transportation Master Plan, for example, future proposed road improvements, roadway hierarchy, active transportation, traffic calming, streetscaping, and complete streets.

PIC #2 will be held in a "drop-in format". This PIC will present the list of policies and transportation infrastructure projects being recommended as part of the Transportation Master Plan to achieve a sustainable transportation system for the Township of King.

Representatives from the Township of King Engineering Services Department and the Consultant will be present to receive input and comments from interested people. The PIC will be held as follows:




King is not likely to create any more community parks for a long time.

### **Practise water safety**

Drowning is the second leading cause of death from unintentional injuries for people ages 5 to 24, according to the National Safety Council's Accident Facts Report.

Drownings may occur during swimming, boating, hunting, fishing, and even taking a bath. Small children can even drown in a bucket of water.

The thing people can do to stay safe in and around water is learn how to swim and learn how to perform CPR in case an emergency occurs. Some more tips for the little ones include:

• Always swim with a grown up. Play it safe in the water. This means staying out of any body of water – the ocean, lakes, ponds, rivers, pools, hot tubs, spas, or whirlpools - if there is no grown up or lifeguard present.

• Wear a personal floatation device (PFD) when in the boat. When you go boating with your family and friends, practicing good safety habits is just as important as when you go swimming. When on a boat, everyone needs a seat. If there is not a seat for you, don't go. In addition, everyone on the boat needs their own PFD. Air-filled swimming aids are not acceptable substitutes. Wear your PFD the entire time you are in the boat.

• Personal floatation devices are designed to add buoyancy to your body, hold your head and body higher in the water for better visibility, and to help keep your body warm.

Learn and practice the water safety rules. Here are some helpful hints for keeping safe in the water:

• Swimming is a lot of fun, and great exercise. If you plan to go swimming, you should take swimming lessons.

• Whether you are at a pool, beach, pond, lake, or other swimming areas, always check for a lifeguard. Lifeguards watch out for your safety and your family's safety. They are trained to help in case there is any trouble in or around the water. Swim only where there is a lifeguard or a grown-up who can give you permission to swim.

• Follow the posted rules. Rules are usually posted as signs where you can easily see them. Signs to look for are ones that say: "Danger, Do not swim here, No diving" and "No running or jumping."

Also, look for warning flags. Flags of different colours can mean different things. Ask the lifeguard on duty for help.

• Swim only when you are rested.

• Never jump or dive into the water unless the lifeguard or a grown-up says it's alright

• Refrain from swimming at night

• At home, parents, older children, and babysitters should lock gates, fences and doors surrounding pools and spas to prevent younger children from entering the area.

• Stop, look, and test before entering lakes and pools. When you go swimming in a new place, always check with the lifeguard or a grownup first. Wade into the water, never jump or dive. Make sure you dive only in areas that have been approved for diving - do not dive off piers or rocks.

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





"I was probably feeling symptoms of Michelle Vandal topped the list last the actual heart issue for many years and didn't even know it, but just put it down to fatigue from working too hard or overexertion. In some regards I feel better than new; I feel tremendous," said Badcock.

Badcock impressed on his mount Corrido. They took both the \$5,000 Open Jumper Welcome and the \$10,000 Caledon Premiere Phase One 2014 Grand Prix.

"Today's ride was really a gift from the horse to me. (Corrido) is a wonderful horse," said Badcock of his ride on the previous Sunday. "Whenever you have good competitors in the field it always makes you rise to the occasion, and there's always a little luck involved, too. It was a good field to jump off against."

"He's a seven-year-old Holsteiner. I've only had him for about a year, and he's stepped up a lot this year from the metre-twenty-fives to the metre-forties. He's probably one of the more special ones I've ever had," said Badcock of Corrido.

### Township, Villanova explore field partnership arrangement

King Township and Villanova College are joining forces to investigate a mutually beneficial deal.

King council received a report from Chris Fasciano, director of Parks, Recreation and Culture, that outlines the proposal, subject to further discussion and funding approvals in 2015.

Council okayed that King and Villanova enter into a "sports field agreement" to make improvements to their turf facilities, a deal that will benefit both the school and local user groups.

For several years, King has worked with local sports organizations to get a handle on the need for fields, as further growth takes place. Last year, King created its Parks, Recreation & Culture Master Plan, which recommends that field development takes place, through strategic partnerships.

And that's where Villanova came in. Staff and college management began discussions on putting an artificial turf field in place of the current football field at the 15 Sideroad campus.

The scope of the project includes a larger footprint, removing the current running tack. The Township is responsible for the funding and construction and the school may look at an enclosed dome down the road.

This development would allow the expansion of programming time for King's groups. They can play longer (April to October) and later into the evening with added lighting. This turf would also allow for a higher caliber of play.

"This additional usage in conjunction with the higher quality of play avaliable will be a huge benefit to our soccer clubs in King and represents a creative, strategic partnership to enhance the amenities to our user groups and residents," Fasciano wrote.

He admitted that the field development does require a large upfront financial commitment, an estimated \$1.6 million. But, the ongoing maintenance is less than that of a standard field.

"This allows the municipality to explore new ways to manage the higher requirements of parks services as they grow and thus allow staff to increase the quality of life for our residents while being financially aware."

Fasciano pointed out the current deal with Villanova doesn't commit King to the project just yet. Its funding, and potential sources of funding, will be brought to council as part of the 2015 budget discussions. Money has already been put aside for the design and tender portion of the project.



Liberals following through with vision in Throne Speech

The newly elected Liberal government is staying the course with its vision. That vision, a precursor to the next provincial budget, was delivered in the Speech from the Throne at Queen's Park last week.

The overall message is one of building up Ontario, according to Minister of Community and Social Services, Oak Ridges-Markham MPP Dr. Helena Jaczek.

"In my ministry, it's about building people up," she said. It's about ensuring those who are the most vulnerable in society have the services they need.

Infrastructure is also a main focus for the province. Transit infrastructure, as well as plans for a new hospital, are important in a rapidly growing York Region, the minister observed.

Another message in the speech was the fact the Liberal government values the efforts of its public sector, an issue during the recent election campaign.

In her ministry, so many services are delivered by front-line workers, it's important to validate their efforts, Jaczek added.

Once debate and discussion at Queen's Park over the speech wraps up this week, the next provincial budget will arrive.

Jaczek said it will be the same budget that was delivered, and defeated, back on May 1.

The budget calls on additional funding for social services, particularly in programs that provide transition from childhood to adulthood for those with special needs.

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
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
