at the Township of King Council Chambers at 2075 King Road, King City to consider a proposed Zoning By-law Amendment under Section 34 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter P.13.

The above noted planning application has been submitted to the Township of King under Section 34(15) of the Planning Act. The application concerns the King Campus of Seneca College, being a 281 hectare parcel of land north of the 15th Sideroad stretching from Keele Street to Dufferin Street. The subject lands support several institutional buildings, parking areas, recreational facilities and accessory buildings associated with the academic programing of the college.

The subject property is zoned Institutional (I) by Zoning By-law 74-53, as amended. The zoning by-law amendment application proposes to increase the maximum building height in the Institutional zone from 11 metres to 30 metres to provide for the development of two new multi-storey buildings consisting of an academic building and a student federation and athletic building planned for the King Campus of Seneca College.


IF A PERSON OR PUBLIC BODY does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the by-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of the Township of King Council to the Ontario Municipal Board.

IF A PERSON OR PUBLIC BODY does not make oral submissions at a public meeting, or make written submissions to the Township of King before the by-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to do so.

ANY PERSON may attend the public meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed Zoning Bylaw Amendment.

#### **ENGINEERING AND PUBLIC WORKS WATER METER** REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

Over the next few years King Township will be replacing our old water meters. Notices will be going to affected residents for the work this year. The initial focus will be Nobleton and Schomberg. #### UPDATE TO BRIDGE / STREET CLOSURE IN ANSNORVELDT

This update is to advise local residents and businesses of updates to the sequence of construction. As a result of the Contractor's schedule, King Street in Ansnorveldt, in its current configuration will remain open for local traffic for approximately the next 6-8 weeks. After this time, a temporary road will be constructed between King St. and Dufferin St. while the intersection and permanent realignment is being constructed. Residents must exercise caution throughout the construction area.

Access between King and Dufferin Streets in Ansnorveldt, will be maintained at all times throughout the construction; however the quality of the access cannot be guaranteed for all vehicles. Cars, trucks and buses are strongly encouraged to use the marked detour routes.

The Dufferin St. bridge will be closed after 9:00 am on Thursday, March 20, 2014 until the Fall of 2014 to complete the bridge replacement. There will be no access for vehicles, bicycles or pedestrians during the bridge replacement.



- ☐ A valid burn permit must be on-site at all times
- □ The property owner or agent acting on behalf of the property must be on-site at all times ☐ The property must be at least 1 acre in size and cannot be located
- within the restricted boundaries as per By-law 2004-76
- ☐ Only clean, unpainted, untreated wood may be burned ☐ Only 1 single fire at a time
- ☐ This fire cannot be any larger than 2 metres in height and 2 metres
- in diameter (6 feet in diameter and 6 feet in height)
- $\hfill\square$  An approved means of extinguishment must be available at all

# **DON'T LIGHT** THAT FIRE!

Township of King Recreational Fire Guidelines By-law 2004-76 requires the following:

- $\hfill\square$  Only clean, unpainted, untreated wood may be burned ☐ Fire must not exceed .75 metres in height and .75 metres in
- diameter (approximately 2 feet in diameter and 2 feet in height) ☐ A means to extinguish the fire must be in close proximity – i.e. garden hose, pail(s) of water, etc.
- ☐ Recreational fires must be supervised by a competent person at all times. Leaving the fire unattended is not permitted
- ☐ A minimum distance of 3 metres (10 feet) to combustible materials must be maintained at all times
- $\hfill\square$  Outdoor fireplaces must be equipped with a screen on the flue and fuel loading area
- $\hfill\square$  The use of an outdoor fireplace must comply with manufacturers guidelines/ instructions ☐ Outdoor fireplace must be installed on a non-combustible surface

The stakeholders also discussed Nobleton's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats (SWOT). Nobleton is a small, bedroom community with heritage buildings, which give it character. However, there are a lack of sidewalks and a lack of designation of Highway 27 parking. Overall, stakeholders concluded there is a lack of identity for the core.

As for Schomberg's SWOT, it has a great through traffic, heritage, history, greenspace and a unique, quaint vibe. There are also issues with Main Street - it's narrow, there is a lack of parking and there are chicanes. Some of the buildings are old and in need of improvement. The vision is for Schomberg to be a thriving, mixeduse main street, a daytripper destination offering a historic experience. Stakeholders also suggested burying wires, making Main Street more walkable and creating an overall cohesive design

Financial incentives programs were also discussed at the workshops. Incentive programs such as façade improvements, signage and landscaping will help establish consistent themes in the township's villages that will reflect and were given a variety of options and asked Township implement.

"There is a limited amount of funding grams," Bobby Gauthier of MMM Group to what you think the priorities are."

One program which received the most support from stakeholders is the façade and signage improvement grant which assists property owners and tenants with improvements to buildings or signage up to \$2,500 for signage and \$10,000 for façade improvements (increased to \$15,000 for corner lots) or 50 per cent of costs. Another program stakeholders would like to see implemented is the property conversion, reuse or repurposing grant which assists property owners and tenants with conversion of existing residential or vacant space into commercial uses, or addito \$10,000 or 50 per cent of the cost.

The policy also seems to split up kids in the same household. For these three moms, they have children who are both eligible and ineligible to ride the bus. Some parents opt to drive their kids to school, while others have older siblings take responsibility.

"We're asking the board works with us to get kids to school safely," Brodie stressed. Until a permanent solution is found, why not just keep the kids on the

No one is complaining about walking – it all comes down to safety. "As a parent, I owe it to my children to protect them," Venuti said.

She has asked York Regional Police for statistics on traffic tickets given out on Western, rumoured to be as high as one per day. This will indicate driver behaviour on this road.

Older subdivisions in Schomberg are not affected, so it only involves roughly 60 children in the newer section. For those currently being picked up, they would suggest a couple of extra stops to avoid congestion at the two current locales. The parents also contend that since the buses are not full, there is room to handle the

A tangible, long-term solution is the installation of sidewalks on Western, something that has caused mixed reaction among existing homeowners.

As well, building sidewalks is not a priority for King Township.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini noted that they may consider sidewalks in the vicinity of Osin-Lions Park, but that will be a 2015 budget item.

The mayor pointed out the Township and Transitional Care Communities Corporation have a memorandum of understanding (MOU) that will see a new care facility on the old Schomberg arena property. The new facility, King Institute of Home and Community Care Complex, is transitional housing and will consist of a main building surrounded by some 32 small units or "cabins" that range between 700 and 800 square feet.

When this development takes place, the Township will make sidewalks along Western part of the package.

While that comes as good news, that will take some time and parents are even more concerned about the impacts of construction on traffic on Western.

Councillor Bill Cober noted the school board determines the criteria for students who are eligible for transportation. The Township has added an additional crossing guard at Main Street and Western Avenue to support student safety.

The board has offered a "test crossing guard" during the first couple of weeks in September, but the parents want something more permanent.

Board chair Elizabeth Crowe said originally the older children were bused while the subdivision was under construction and then they were notified that they no longer qualified. But that was three years ago. When the policy change came down, parents still put their kids on the buses.

But parents stress their situation is different than other communities and subdivisions need to be looked at individually. All encompassing policies don't al-

An audit was undertaken and included all the routes, and for September several stops are being removed to streamline service and some routes are totally changing to reduce ride times for students.

"Since the community was notified in the spring, I have not received a phone call," she said.

"To be honest, I do not have the power to change the situation. Student Transportation Services, work on behalf of both boards to do routing and bus stops and to ensure a consistent application of board policy. I cannot judge whether or not this situation deserves an exception more than another situation in another part of the region.

"If I receive a concern regarding a bus stop location or any other transportation concern I forward it on to our senior manager responsible for transportation and he reviews the matter with STS to see whether or not the concern is valid. This matter has been reviewed and it was determined that their are no exceptional circumstances."

As to the question of room on the buses, the cost to the board for transporting students is a complicated formula based on ridership, the ability to do multiple runs with the same bus, and the proportion of public vs. Catholic students.


Crowe said in essence the board pays per pupil, therefore every additional child who rides the bus costs the board money.

"It does not seem logical and is hard to explain to parents when there are empty seats on a bus, but that is why the board discontinued its Empty Seat Policy years ago," she said.

"Are kids part of the board's business plan?" Brodie asked.

# Where's the outrage over civilian casualties?

Men, woman and children are dying every day around the globe.

That's not news.

But what is news is the current conflicts in Israel/Gaza and the Ukraine.

Israel has been stepping up its offensive in Gaza, killing Palestinian civilians, in their conflict with the Hamas.

Hamas, a pseudo-military organization branded terrorists by the West, run the Gaza Strip, after earning enough seats in the Palestinian parliament. Hamas was founded in 1987 as an offshoot of the Muslim Brotherhood and its sole purpose has always been to free Palestine from Israeli occupation.

This has been a long and bloody conflict, one which few us here in the West fully understand or appreciate.

Israel took control of Gaza following the 1967 war with Egypt and for many vears tolerated and even encouraged Islamic activism.

When Hamas arrived on the scene, tensions and attacks increased, throughout the 1990s and to this very

Hamas, according to the experts, receives its funding from Saudi Arabia and Iran. The U.S. also sends aid to the Gaza Strip. Iran, Russia and China do not consider Hamas as terrorists, and therefore likely supply them with weapons and supplies.

Hamas will say their dispute has little to do with antisemitism and more to do with the State of Israel and its draconian actions.

However, Hamas has launched literally hundreds of rocket attacks against Israel over the past 14 years, killing hundreds and wounding thousands of

Israel is such a unique country and its history has been plagued by vio-

lence, slavery and genocide. It's really difficult to explain that country's history in this space.

In a nutshell, the Jewish state of Israel was created in 1948 following the Second World War and almost from day one, has fought wars with neighbouring Arab states. The West Bank and Gaza Strip have been areas of contention for decades.

The U.S. has been Israel's biggest backer, supplying them with weapons, fighter jets, etc. The Israelis have modern tanks, planes and weapons, but their foes do not.

This region is likely very beautiful geographically and it's also historically significant. Unfortunately, the years of conflict are reducing once great cities

There are only 8 million Israelis (less than the population of Ontario) population of the GTA). So much destruction and so much

One would think in this day and age,

there would be ways to eliminate such conflict and carnage altogether. But again, millennia of cultural attitudes are not easily changed.

And this is evidenced by the protests in Toronto, by young Canadians with ties to their homelands. I find it a little odd and disheartening when I see teenagers supporting brutal attacks on their country's enemies.

Maybe I'm naive, but the bottom line is how can anyone, any country, any government, condone murder?

This conflict in particular seems to have political overtones. The American superpower keeps a close eye on the region through its Israeli allies. They are undoubtedly watching the Russians and those in Iran. Iraq and neighbouring countries. It's likely a complicated political chess game among the big

As is always the case in any conflict, average citizens pay the highest price.

If we turn our attention to the Ukraine, and the destruction of Flight M-17, I'm confused by the lack of global

While we may not know exactly who pushed the button or gave the order to fire the missile, someone has to be responsible for the deaths of almost 300 innocent people. No one can wash their hands of this one.

Given the tensions in this region for months, I'll bet dozens of military satellites have their eyes on this part of the globe. I'll also wager that the Russians, Americans, Chinese and perhaps even Canada and EU nations, knew exactly the moment this missile

and roughly 4 million Palestinians (the was launched. There likely wasn't enough time to warn or tell the airliner to change course, or shoot the missile

> And I find the aftermath similarly disturbing. Most of world simply implements "sanctions" and leaders make emotional statements.

> But no one has done anything. Canada strengthened its sanctions July 24 on arms manufacturers and energy and financial entities with significant links to the Russian government.

"In the wake of continued aggression by Russia, which includes the ongoing supply of logistical support and weapons systems to agents of the Putin regime in eastern Ukraine, Canada is announcing its intent to once again increase economic and political pressure ... by imposing additional sanctions on the regime and those closest to it.

"President Putin's failure to end his support to armed rebel groups constitutes a very real threat to international peace and security. His actions represent an overt, direct threat to the Ukrainian people and its rightfully elected government.

"Canada remains committed to working with our allies and partners in the international community to preserve and promote a free, democratic and peaceful world. We are ready to impose further sanctions if the Putin regime's military aggression contin-

And so the sabre-rattling continues. But still no justice and no punishment.

What will it take before every politician around the globe rises from his/ her chair and demands action?

What will it take to end the conflict in Gaza?

Can my children, or their children, ever expect peace?

# Letter to the Editor Where's pedestrian accessibility?

As a parent I regularly walk my daughter Brianna to and from Schomberg Public School and to our library along Main Street, safely using sidewalks on both sides.

Safely AND pleasurably.

She and I talk about all sorts of things on our daily journey: we observe the flowers and birds, we say hello to walkers, joggers and cyclists passing us by, and we get our blood pumping with fresh air in our lungs.

I wish I could say the same for many St. Patrick's students. Western Avenue has never had sidewalks on its length from Main to the school, and it should. And it isn't the only destination on this street justifying sidewalks. The Schomberg Osin Lions Park is a substantial community asset containing a soccer field, baseball diamond and an "accessible" playground structure. Yet the only safe way to get there is by car. We can neither walk nor bike to this park without using the road, and this is dangerous.

Western has a large turn in it by the park and an inattentive driver could cause a serious accident.

We must invest in pedestrian accessibility in this circumstance. This is the only viable solution in my opinion (not more buses!)

King has a Sustainability Plan and it speaks to this situation. It encourages accessibility to our community assets in the pursuit of complete, sustainable healthy communities. Right now the only safe way to get to the park or the school from the north is by car. And with limited parking availability!

Children, their parents and caregivers should have sidewalks to safely, and with great pleasure, access the things we enjoy so dearly in our villages. Keep the car at home whenever possible!

#### Horticulture By John Arnott

My English grandmother called them love apples and loved to grow them but would never eat them because as a girl she was aware of tales of still lingering from earlier times telling that they were

As an adult of course she'd learned there was no truth at all to this once widely held belief but still she never used them herself preferring to give her crop of tomatoes from the few plants she grew to relatives and neighbours.

Like potato cousins, tomatoes are native to the Andean region of South America but unlike their cousins they were not cultivated there, only gathered wild to be eaten. It wasn't until centuries later when wild tomatoes spread to Central America and then into Mexico that ancient agriculturists, possibly Mayan, began to cultivate them. Records show that by 500 BC tomatoes were being grown as a crop in southern Mexico. These ancient tomatoes were quite small just a little larger than cherry tomatoes and yellow in colour not

The powerful Aztecs of central Mexico were particularly fond of tomatotl as they called them in the Nahuatl language they spoke and had them widely grown throughout their empire. It was after the Spanish conquest of this empire that tomatotl seeds were sent to Spain. Here botanists who successfully grew them noted similarities in foliage and flowers to nightshade. The tomato flower like that of the potato closely re-

Thus these botanists suspected the attractive bright yellow fruit was poisonous It was felt then that tomatoes failed to give him the results he wanted should only be grown as ornamentals not as a food source.

Today of course we know these cautious botanists were partially right as tomatoes, like their distant cousins potatoes, indeed belong to the deadly nightshade family but it's their leaves, stems and flowers that are poisonous not their fruit.

In 1548, the first tomatoes in Italy were grown in the gardens of Grand Duke of Tuscany but only as ornamentals and for some years following the fruit was used as a not to be eaten tabletop decoration, in the homes of wealthy Florentines.

In the early 17th century the Spanish found that tomatoes were edible and orange, some yellow but most red and this probably by accident. Now this fruit became an important crop in Spain, its Caribbean colonies and its Asian colony, the Philippines, from where cultivation spread to China and India (which today produce over 1/2 the world's tomatoes). About this time tomatoes red in colour were being grown and soon became preferred over yellow.

Tomatoes were being grown in Britain in the early 1600s with barber sur-ribbed, a throw back to ancient tomageon, herbalist and botanist John Gerard being one of the earliest growers. Although Gerard knew that tomatoes were then being used as food on the Continent he still considered them poisonous. So influential were his views that for many years in Britain and her North American colonies tomatoes were seen apple" come from? Well no doubt to the as unfit for eating even if not poisonous.

But by the 1800s they were being eaten in Britain mainly by the upper classes for they were expensive having to be grown in greenhouses as in most of the British Isles there aren't enough sunny warm summer days for tomatoes to ripin Lincolnshire grow their tomatoes in a greenhouse).

In the United States tomatoes were Caribbean as ornamentals but when by

lutionized the growing of them by degreen grocers and supermarkets.

When his attempts at hybridization he began closely observing the tomatoes he grew on his own farm noting the strong growers which had distinct characteristics and good foliage. From these he took seeds carefully storing them over winter and planting them the following spring in the family's kitchen garden using the plants that grew as a source of new seeds. He continued this process over a five year period and each year plants produced good results with large flavourful smooth skinned fruit equal to or excelling that of the parent

By 1870 a variety he named Paragon was ready for market. In his lifetime he developed 17 new varieties some these spread worldwide becoming forerunners of the tomatoes we now have.

Today there are some 7,500 tomato varieties including globe or slicing tomatoes popular for sandwiches and topping burgers, and used commercially for juice and canning, beefsteak popular for sandwiches and burgers too but because of their thin skins they don't keep long (some beefsteak skins can be toes that were all ribbed), sweet cherry tomatoes used whole in salads, plum or pear tomatoes used for tomato paste and sauce – the pear type producing a richer paste and compari tomatoes noted for their low acidity.

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





She's host of Food Network's Bake with Anna Olson. She has also hosted Sugar and Fresh with Anna Olson; written seven bestselling cookbooks, including




two with the help of her husband Michael, a well-noted chef and culinary instructor; and together they have launched the Olson Recipe Maker app for iOS, Android and Blackberry.



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# Moraine Land Trust celebrates donation, issues challenge

is creating a brighter future and they hope to mark Canada's 150th birthday in a big way.

"There will be 150 candles of a different kind on the cake we'll use to celebrate Canada's 150th birthday in 2017," said Chris Norris, chair of the Oak Ridges Moraine Land Trust. "The Trust's work has always been about a brighter future. With the announcement of our 'Leave the World a Better Place' bequest target, we remind people that a gift to the Trust in a will is a great way to do that.'

The Leave the World a Better Place launch coincided with the Trust's recent celebration of reaching a fundraising milestone, at an event hosted by the Hon. Hal Jackman recently.

"Three years ago on the Trust's 10th anniversary we set a goal of reaching \$1 million to support the work of the Trust," said Jackman, who chaired the campaign. "Individual citizens, corporate and family foundations responded and proved we care about protecting our environment. We need to do it not just with our hearts but with our pocket books, too."

One-tenth of Canada's population lives in the Greater Golden Horseshoe. The importance of nearby natural space is a critical contribution to our health and well-being now, and for generations

In 2013 the Trust conserved 191 more acres. That means a total of 3,518 acres protected in a natural state, through conservation easements or donations of land. Depending on the number of properties protected, complexities of con-

servation agreements, type of land or easement donation, or available funds, The Oak Ridges Moraine Land Trust the Trust's annual budget can fluctuate ownership. from \$300,000 to \$500,000.

"We don't typically purchase lands to protect them," explained Norris. "That would be too expensive. Instead, land owners voluntarily commit to restriction of some uses on their lands to protect natural processes. Crafting these agreements requires funding, but not nearly as much as it would for purchase."

With each agreement, the Trust grows beyond what started as a small group of concerned citizens. The circle of land protectors is continually widen-

Linking the successful \$1 million campaign and looking ahead, Jackman pointed out: "Canada will soon be 150 years old. What are we leaving to our grandchildren and their offspring for the next 150?"

The target to secure 150 bequest intentions before July 1, 2017 will ensure that the Trust operations and commitment to stewarding lands already secured continues well into the future.

"Nine individuals have advised that the Trust is named as a beneficiary in their will," Norris revealed. "That leaves us 141 more to go. You don't have to be wealthy to contribute. It's very simple to name the Trust in your will, with an amount or with a percentage of your estate."

Among the cross-section of 60 donors, land owners, partners and supporters who celebrated the success of the fundraising campaign were Dr. Thomas Symons, chairman of the Ontario Heritage Trust and Township of King Mayor Steve Pelligrini.

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
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# Kelly Soleau wins Grand Prix event in Palgrave

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# Minister Leal charged with fixing horse racing industry

After dealing with the contentious issue of horse racing in Ontario herself for over a year, Premier Kathleen Wynne has given the new Minister of Agriculture and Food, Jeff Leal, the task of re-establishing horse racing.

Members of the Ontario Horse Racing Industry Association (OHRIA) recently said in a statement that they see Leal's appointment as a positive step.

"The past two years have seen tremendous changes for our industry, with significant issues that need to be addressed and Minister Leal has already demonstrated through word and action a genuine concern for the horse racing and breeding industry," said Sue Leslie, president and chair of OHRIA. "We expect the government will be a strong partner in tackling these concerns in the

The OHRIA release went on to explain that the industry is still not out of the woods, as jobs are still hanging in the balance if the industry does not get back on track.

Former MPP John Snobelen, acting director of Ontario Horse Racing, has been involved in the restructuring of horse racing in Ontario and was also encouraged by Leal's appointment to the agriculture portfolio.

"Nobody likes to see the Premier move away from the file, but we're glad that Minister Leal is there," he said. "He has had a lot to do with his local track in Peterborough, so he's well connected to the file, he's obviously in favour of horse racing and has been since the beginning. We're looking forward to working with him."

As acting director of OHR, Snobelen was appointed to work on the government's transition panel to figure out the best way to stabilize the horse racing industry.

After nearly two years of work, Snobelen said there is still a lot to be done, but he is encouraged about where things are headed.

One of the biggest positives is an alliance of race tracks that has developed over the past year.

"We're really excited that the alliance of tracks, or the core alliance of tracks, has formed and seems to be working really well," he said. "I think a lot of people thought it would be a challenge and it seems to be working extraordinarily well."

Snobelen said eight tracks have agreed to work together in the alliance, including four tracks that offer A and B level standard-

"When they all operated as independent race tracks, that didn't work very well, now they are operating together, thinking together and putting their product together, they can meet the needs of horsemen together, but also more importantly horse players," he

"When they work together they can lower their costs and more importantly they can tie their signal into the market, so it is better received by horse players."

Snobelen added that continued growth of self-governance within the industry and integrating horse racing with the gaming strategy are the two most important factors looking ahead and hopes the good momentum will continue.

"I am encouraged by the leadership that the industry has shown," he said. "If you compare the mood among people today to the mood of people a year ago, it's a dramatic change and I think people are looking forward to the future and they're optimistic and so am I. We've got some challenges ahead, but I think we can meet all of them."
