King firefighters dumped buckets of ice cold water on themselves to raise money and awareness for ALS.

About 40 King Fire and Emergency (KFES) staff took part in the Ice Bucket Challenge Saturday at the King City fire station. The event was organized in support of firefighter Dan Malone, whose father Jim Malone has ALS. It was also to honour fire captain Craig Eveson's aunt Colleen, who lost her battle with the disease two years ago.

"We felt it was important to show that as a group we are there to support one another when the road gets rough,"

Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease, is a progressive neurodegenerative disease that affects nerve cells in the brain and the spinal cord. Motor neurons reach from the brain to the spinal cord and from the spinal cord to the muscles throughout the body. The progressive degeneration of the motor neurons in

ALS eventually leads to their death.

When the motor neurons die, the ability of the brain to initiate and control muscle movement is lost. Patients in the later stages of the disease may be-

come totally paralyzed. The ALS Association is a national non-profit organization fighting Lou Gehrig's Disease. The association's mission includes providing care services to assist people with ALS and their families through a network of chapters working in communities across the nation and a global research program focused on the discovery of treatments and eventually a cure for the disease.

As of Aug. 25, The ALS Association received \$79.7 million in donations.

DON'T LIGHT THAT FIRE!

Township of King Recreational Fire Guidelines
By-law 2004-76 requires the following:

- ☐ Only clean, unpainted, untreated wood may be burned ☐ Fire must not exceed .75 metres in height and .75 metres in
- diameter (approximately 2 feet in diameter and 2 feet in height)

 ☐ A means to extinguish the fire must be in close proximity i.e.
 garden hose, pail(s) of water, etc.
- □ Recreational fires must be supervised by a competent person at all
- times. Leaving the fire unattended is not permitted
 ☐ A minimum distance of 3 metres (10 feet) to combustible materials
- must be maintained at all times

 ☐ Outdoor fireplaces must be equipped with a screen on the flue and
- ☐ The use of an outdoor fireplace must comply with manufacturers
- guidelines/ instructions

 ☐ Outdoor fireplace must be installed on a non-combustible surface
- Failure to comply with Municipal By-law 2004-76 could result in

DON'T LIGHT THAT FIRE!

Township of King OPEN AIR BURNING By-law 2004-76 requires the following:

- ☐ A valid burn permit must be on-site at all times
- ☐ The property owner or agent acting on behalf of the property owner must be on-site at all times
- ☐ The property must be at least 1 acre in size and cannot be located within the restricted boundaries as per By-law 2004-76
- within the restricted boundaries as per By-law 2004-76

 Only clean, unpainted, untreated wood may be burned
- ☐ Only 1 single fire at a time☐ This fire cannot be any large
- ☐ This fire cannot be any larger than 2 metres in height and 2 metres in diameter (6 feet in diameter and 6 feet in height)
- ☐ An approved means of extinguishment must be available at all times

Protest candidates make fun of the process

As the municipal election campaign gears up in earnest, perhaps it's time to take a light-hearted approach to our political system.

We are quite lucky here in Canada, where our rules, party structure and tiered system is fairly easy to understand. It's open and accessible and pretty much anyone can take an active role in helping to shape our community, province and nation.

Our regional and municipal representatives are in the thick of an election, some trying to retain their seats; others trying to enter the political

I ran for regional councillor in Bolton in the 2010 election and finished second in a four-person race, garnering just over 1,500 votes. It was quite an experience and I enjoyed every minute of it. It was exciting, invigorating and a heck of a learning experience.

been quiet interesting. I've witnessed the first full term of the current council, under Mayor Steve Pellegrini. Not being around prior to the 2010 election, I can only comment on what I've seen since. I'm quite impressed with the current batch of representatives and I've gotten to know most of them on a personal level, as well as a professional one. All good people.

But being a decent person with good intentions isn't always enough. There are always others waiting in the wings to toss their hat in the ring and make a race of it. And why not?

Our system not only allows for public engagement, it encourages it. The more the marrier.

I believe people of all ages need to take a more active interest in what's happening in their own backyards. And seeking municipal office is, in my opinion, the epitome of local involvement. It's often a thankless task and some believe it's a position that comes with power, prestige and perks. Well, as far as smaller municipalities like King are concerned, the rewards are in the service itself.

I salute everyone who is running, and considering it, for putting themselves on the line for their fellow men and women, in the hopes of making their community a better place.

In some places, "protest votes" come in many wild ways. While Canadian examples are rare, many countries around the world allow non-human candidates, write-in votes and the like, just so people can have their say. Hey, democracy is fair, but no one said voters have to be playing with a full deck!

Electoral regulations may require candidates to be human (or equivalent wording), or may require candidates to do things which animals cannot reasonably do (such as sign their name on a legal form). On some occasions, however, animals have been accepted as candidates, and have even won office.

Tuxedo Stan, a cat from Halifax, Nova Scotia, was a mayoral candidate in the 2012 municipal election, representing the Tuxedo Party, a political movement aimed to improve the welfare of felines in Halifax Regional Municipality.

Does anyone remember the latenight talk show hosted by a sock? Ed the Sock, a crude, cigar-smoking gym sock puppet, attempted to run for the

"Fed-Up Party" during the Canadian federal election, 2011. You may remember this 1990s cult star for his Ed's Night Party talk show. Apparently you can still catch him on podcasts or YouTube and he still makes public appearances. Ed's creator and voice talent Steven Kerzner did have a successful stint at school board trustee and provincial candidate.

A dog beat out a store owner to be elected the mayor of Cormorant, Minestora recently.

In 2001, a Dachshund called "Sausage" was a candidate in the Marseille (France) municipal elections. He won 4% of the votes.

Molly the Dog, a dachshund from Oklahoma, was named as a candidate in the 2008 U.S. presidential election.

Hank the Cat, a Maine Coon from Northern Virginia, ran against Tim Kaine and George Allen for Virginia's senate seat in 2012. He earned third place in the state, with nearly 7,000 votes!

Several animals in the US have been elected mayors of small towns such as Rabbit Hash, Kentucky, whose mayor is a black lab named Junior Cochran, and Lajitas, Texas, whose mayor is a beer-drinking goat named Clay Henry III. Both Rabbit Hash and Lajitas are unincorporated towns where the mayoralty is purely a ceremonial position, not an actual leader of government.

I have two very nice yellow labs – Marley and Lola – who would make fine additions to any township. They are great with people, always listen, enjoy public events, fundraising dinners and support the environment. They may have an odd way of greeting people and other four-legged constituents, but they are honest and loyal.

What more could you ask for? Good luck at the polls this fall!





Growing up in Mexico, Rafael Minassian and Lisette Palacios grew up with an abundance of fresh, organic produce.

Avocados were a great favourite, but so were apples and oranges - pretty standard fare for most North American tables. Having this produce readily available to them instilled in them what Rafael describes as a "love of everything that is fresh," and the couple, now Aurora residents, are hoping to share this love with the residents of Aurora, King and Oak Ridges.

Minassian and Palacios came to Canada looking for a better quality of life. Mexico City was plagued with traffic, safety issues, water problems and pollution, he said, and they wanted to find further opportunities for themselves and their kids. Nine years later, when they were looking for their latest business venture, they found themselves sticking to this same principle of looking for a better life.

They are now the local franchise owners of Organics Live, a branch of the Toronto-based company founded in 2012 to bring together a collective of farmers in southern Ontario to provide less-expensive fresh, organic produce to residents through home delivery.

"It's all about the clean food movement," Rafael explains. "With organic food, you are not getting into pesticides or any of those chemicals into the body, and we think that is one of the many factors contributing to so many illnesses. Township enjoys \$1 million surplus

King Township is sitting pretty, enjoying an almost \$1 million budget surplus form 2013.

Council approved a report from director of finance Allan Evelyn that allocates the surplus to needed services, as well as maintains the municipality's financial sustainability.

In his report, Evelyn noted the surplus totals \$925,706. Of that, \$25,000 will be allocated to the tax rate stabilization reserve, and another \$75,000 to the infrastructure reserve. The remainder will be going to unfinanced capital reserve (\$500,000) and road equipment replacement reserve (\$325,706).

This is in keeping with King's sustainability plan, which sets out an ongoing commitment to be fiscally responsible in meeting long-term goals.

According to Evelyn, the surplus resulted in higher revenues and lower expenditures. Specifically, King enjoyed additional supplementary tax revenue to the tune of \$931,064. Corporate initiatives and department savings combined for another \$492,000.

These were, however, offset by OMB costs (\$298,217), oil spill remediation (\$142,596), retro insurance premium assessments (\$156,106) and winter maintenance costs (\$148,869).

While ice storm clean costs have dented the pubic coffers, the Township hopes to recover most of these from the province.

The surplus is a real bonus, considering the Township accomplished a fair amount of capital work in 2013. Projects included the purchase of Holy Name School, Nobleton arena floor replacement and sewer connection, King City Library parking lot paving, the purchase of an aerial fire truck, Pottageville Park play structure, the purchase of an ice resurfacer, purchase of equipment and the reconstruction of the 11th Concession.

Seneca seeks bylaw change to expand King Campus

Seneca is expanding its King campus but in order to facilitate the development of two multi-storey buildings, the college is requesting an increase to the Township's building height provisions for the institutional zone.

Seneca College has submitted an application to the Township to amend the zoning bylaw for the King campus property, located Dufferin Street and the 15th Sideroad. A public meeting was held on the matter Monday. The Township's current bylaw limits the height of buildings in institutional zones to 11 metres. Seneca's application proposes to increase the maximum building height to 30 metres, which means the building could be up to six storeys high.

The Seneca property currently houses several institutional buildings, parking areas, recreational facilities and accessory buildings associated with the academic programming of the college. The two new proposed buildings will include an academic building and a student federation and athletic building, explained Stephen Kitchen, director of planning for the Township of King. The site for the buildings is currently occupied by parking lots situated between the building known as Garriock Hall and an athletic track.

"The expansion of the King Campus was identified in the Master Plan for Seneca College that began in 2010 which also includes the Newham and Markham campuses," said Kitchen. "The college is currently working with Infrastructure Ontario and their consultants to move ahead with the expansion project."





Injuries can cause fibrous tissue, muscle, tendon and ligaments to become permanently frozen. Extra bone growth occurs frequently and surgery can cause more bone growth as the body attempts to repair itself.

The top trampolinists from across North and South America converged on the Hershey Centre in Mississauga last weekend looking for a spot at the 2015 Pan Am Games.

Among them was Rosie MacLennan, King City's Olympic gold medallist, competing in the team, synchro, and individual categories.

A three-time Canadian National women's champion, MacLennan swept the board finishing first in all three events.

Kicking off the weekend, MacLennan helped Team Canada to a first-place finish in the team event along with Samantha Smith, former synchro partner Karen Cockburn, and current synchro partner and Aurora-born Sam Sendel.

MacLennan and Sendel then went on to gold in the synchro event, mirroring their gold medal performance at the Canada Cup in July. In the individual category, MacLennan finished first ahead of her synchro teammate with a 53.9, a score

in which she says she "could do better." "It was obviously a good placing, but for a world cup event I would definitely need better scores going for-

ward. I'll have to do a little better." Both MacLennan and Sendel are fresh out of a training session in China in preparation for the road ahead.

"It was great," said MacLennan. "We got to train with some of their senior athletes, and watch some of their development athletes and what they do. For me it was really motivating to break out of the norm and work on some different things, and come back and try to implement those technical changes. It definitely got us in gear for the rest of the season."

Dozens of gymnast competed for only eight spots at the 2015 Games, while only two countries were allowed two entrants. The Canadian team was able to qualify two spots for both the men's and women's categories.

MacLennan entered the limelight in 2012, winning Canada's only gold medal of the London Olympics in the individual trampoline event. She and Sendel both train at Skyrider's Trampoline Place in Richmond Hill.



> God Cannot Lie: "Ahh," you say, "yes, I believe that God cannot lie." You may question the truthfulness of whatever you hear from men - including myself – but what we find in God's own Word (the Bible) is absolutely true. In Titus 1:2 God describes Himself as "God, who cannot lie." God, and God alone, can make that claim.

> God Cannot Change: "Oh, sure," you say. "I believe that God cannot change." This is also a rather obvious. God tells us in His Word, in Malachi 3:6, "I am the Lord, I do not change." In Psalm 119:89 we also learn that God's Word is absolutely true for ever. This is another characteristic which is unique to God alone.


