RAINFALL AND SAFE DISPOSAL OF **GRASS CLIPPINGS**

The Township and surrounding areas have experienced an abnormal amount of rain this season. In order to effectively manage rainfall, it is important that catchbasins and ditches are kept clear of debris. Some residential streets in King have experienced flooding during rainy periods this season due to clogged catchbasins, the cause of which has been identified as the improper disposal of grass clippings.

The Township asks for your assistance in preventing our streets from flooding by safely and properly disposing of grass clippings. Please do not discard grass clippings onto the road as the rain will carry them into the catchbasins where they accumulate. Some alternatives include:

- · Store your grass clippings in a compost bin to decompose. Compost bins can be purchased at the Nobleton Arena and Trisan Centre for \$30 each.
- Use grass clippings as a natural mulch for your lawn, rather than removing them.
- · Grass clippings can be disposed of at the Yard Waste Drop-off facility at 1351 Bloomington Road in Richmond Hill. Please note that grass clippings are not accepted in regularly scheduled yard waste pickups.



Climate Summit of the Americas was inspiring

Last week, I had the privilege and honour of being a witness to a historic event. For three days in July, over 500 international government and business leaders gathered at the Fairmont Royal York Hotel to take part in The Climate Summit of the Americas concurrently with the International Economic Forum

The Mississaugas of the New Credit welcomed the international community to their lands, now known as Toronto. They reminded all of the delegates that their lands are not a commodity, but a gift from God. Pope Francis would agree.

Thanks to the far-sightedness of our Editor, Mark Pavilons, I was one of the accredited media reporters at the event, standing shoulder to shoulder with CBC, CTV, and Al Jazeera International through media scrums and presentations, including the historic signing of The Climate Action Statement by 21 provinces, states, cities and regions across the Americas.

Sadly, "Our Government™" was missing in action. Environment Minister Leona Aglukkaq was too busy partying in Nunavut, and Prime Minister Stephen Harper was doing campaign photo-ops with Earth Rangers-shirted child props in Rouge Park.

This federal impotence prompted California Governor Jerry Brown's thundering demand to both the American and Canadian governments to "Get with it!" Brown has taken the unprecedented steps of demanding a 2050 target of zero emissions for California and an reduce greenhouse gas emissions and entire clean economy by 2100.

Federal inaction is also the reason why, as Governor Jay Inslee from Washington State reminded the delegates, that they were the leadership of the future: "This is no sub-national group; this is the Uber-National team." With no leadership coming from a deadlocked American Congress, and no leadership coming from a denier Canadian government, the path forward was left to the states, provinces, regions and cities to legislate change.

California was the prime example of a jurisdiction that went from major deficit to major economic surplus as

efficient, more elegant, in the way we use and dispose of the limited resources on Spaceship Earth."

Governor Peter Shumlin of Vermont enthusiastically echoed the same support for State initiatives in renewables investment: "We are all on the Titanic, we have seen the iceberg, and we have turned the ship.'

Those states that have turned their ships all endorsed the initiative by Ontario and Quebec to join with California in establishing their carbon pricing strategy. Along with British Columbia, that means that over 70% of Canada's citizens are already living with a carbon tax. BC's economy, contrary to federal doomsday predictions, is thriving quite nicely with its carbon tax.

However, the most enthusiastic team there consisted of our Premier Kathleen Wynne, Minister of Environment and Climate Change Glen Murray, former president of Mexico Felipe Calederon, and every climate change denier's nemesis, former Vice-President of the United States. Al Gore.

Those four, along with three accomplished and outspoken American Governors, Jerry Brown from California, Peter Shumlin from Vermont, and Jay Inslee from Washington State, all emphasized key points in the transition to a renewable energy economy:

1. We have to put a substantial price on carbon.

2. We have to set ambitious targets to increase renewable energy production.

3. We have to have a "Smart Plan" for achieving those targets.

4. We have to invest in Research & Development for renewable energy creation/storage, innovation, and entrepreneurism.

5. We have to elect a federal government that will deliver science-based climate change policy, set long term achievable goals, and invest in both social justice programs and renewable energy production.

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



Bat tests positive for rabies virus in York Region

The Regional Municipality of York is advising residents to take precautions and stay away from bats after receiving confirmation a bat in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville has tested positive for the rabies virus. This is the first reported case of rabies in a bat in York Region since 2013.

The rabies virus affects the central nervous system of warm-blooded mammals, including humans, and is transmitted through a bite, lick or scratch from an infected animal. While most reported cases involve wild animals such as bats, foxes, raccoons and skunks, dogs and cats are also at risk. Infection with the rabies virus can be fatal. A post-exposure vaccine is available for people who come into contact with a rabid animal.

While the percentage of rabies-infected bats in Ontario is considered low, people should avoid approaching or coming into contact with bats - they are wild animals and should not be kept as pets in or near your home.



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GO parking lot deal finalized

A new parking lot in King City will provide much-needed space for commuters. And the municipality is getting a sweetheart of a deal.

Metrolinx (operators of GO Transit) will create a parking lot at 20 Station Road. The land is owned by King Township and negotiations have been going on for two years to come up with this needed extra parking.

Metrolinx is now approaching the construction stage of the parking lot enhancement. They covering all costs. The design will see 71 permanent parking spaces, as well as walkways, lighting, landscaping, etc.

The agreement between the two partners grants Metrolinx a licence to build, maintain and manage the parking facility until May 30, 2030. King Township staff will continue to maintain and repair the portion of West Street for residents who rely on it for access to their properties.

King staff will monitor the progress and ensure this construction presents minimal impacts and disruption to residents and GO users.

It's expected work will begin this month and it's anticipated to be finished by October.

Clerk Kathryn Smyth did note in her report that "there will be considerable concessions that will have to be made to accommodate flexibility and latitude for GO users to park on the street during the construction phase."

Both King and Metrolinx have agreed to let all users know about the disruption, and bylaw enforcement staff will exercise some leeway when issuing warnings or tickets. Efforts will be made to use and promote parking at nearby public facilities.

Metrolinx has also said they plan further parking expansion projects in the coming years.

"Staff acknowledges the efforts by Metrolinx staff to explore partnership opportunities with King, recognizing the inadequate parking and related pressures the Township and area residents experience due to the overuse of the station," Smyth said. "The agreement ... demonstrates the partnership commitment between King and Metrolinx to work collaboratively to resolve local impact pressures arising from public transit, creatively."



World record holder takes up residence in King

King City is hosting a 12-year old skating sensation this summer as she takes up training in nearby Richmond Hill.

Olvia Rybicka-Oliver began making headlines in January when she set the record for the world's fastest spin on ice skates while performing at a children's charity event in Warsaw, Poland. The Nova Scotia skater achieved 342 r.p.m., smashing the previous record of 308 r.p.m. set by a skater more than twice her age in 2006.

"We had to send reports, videos, media footage and witness statements to Guinness World Records in London, England, and then the waiting period was quite long, but I was happy when it finally came through," said Olivia.

In doing so, she raised \$20,000 to make wishes come true for children suffering from life-threatening illnesses through a charity in Poland. In Canada, she skates for Leave Out Violence (LOVE), a program benefiting youth that have been subjected to a violent upbringing. Funds are collected by Coalition For Kids International.

Arriving in Ontario at the end of June, Olivia is in an intensive training program at the York Region Skating Association under the eye of Gregor Filipowski, a former Polish champion and three-time Olympian and world medallist. Seneca College's King Campus has put her up for the duration of her training.

"Olivia has already demonstrated that she is a wonderful role model and media draw," said her father, Garry. She is fresh off winning the Nova Scotia and Atlantic Provinces Juvenile Championships, and has what Garry calls a "bright competitive skating and humanitarian" future ahead of her.

"We're very proud of Olivia," said Garry after her world record-setting spin. "She's passionate about figure skating. She's passionate about helping others."

Olivia now has a new fundraising campaign. Together with her parents, she is raising money to bring two terminally ill eight-year old children from Poland to Canada on their "wish trip" to visit Toronto and Niagara Falls through the Coalition For Kids program. Olivia will be one of the chaperones on the journey.



Rosie MacLennan ready for Pan Am Games action

A dazzling Cirque du Soleil performance was the shining moment of the Pan Am Games opening ceremonies on Friday, a ceremony that followed through on a promise by games organizers to put on a more "youthful" show for a younger generation of athletes.

Among the crowd was some of the region's finest – King City's Rosie Maclennan, back to defend her Pan Am gold medal from the Games in Mexico four years ago, was among the favourites in the days leading up to the ceremonies to carry the Canadian flag. Although that honour went to canoer Mark Oldershaw, MacLennan was still ecstatic about the first-hand view of the ceremonies.

"They were unreal," she said. "The show they put on was incredible."

MacLennan said the ceremony took an "edgier" approach than the traditional International Olympic Committee show, and perhaps even topped the show she first witnessed in the 2012 Olympics in London.

Maclennan will be hitting the floor for competition on Saturday, with the medal rounds for trampoline coming on Sunday.

Shaman Ghost gives Stronach family Queen's Plate victory

Frank Stronach waited 18 years for a repeat performance at Woodbine Racetrack's Queen's Plate, and the owner-breeder took back the \$1-million title in style recently.

Stronach Stables' Shaman Ghost rallied for a come-from-behind victory. finishing one-and-a-quarter lengths ahead of favourite Danish Dynaformer.

In his own traditional fashion, the founder of Magna International scoured the race paddock for signs of a four-leaf clover before Canada's oldest thoroughbred horse race, finding one just minutes before the race. York Catholic District School Board is named the top energy performer

The York Catholic District School Board is proud to be named the Top Energy Performing Board in Ontario by the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) in its first-ever list rating Ontario school boards' energy efficiency.

"We are thrilled to receive this designation," said Patricia Preston, director of education. "Our schools and board office staff have spent years improving our ecological footprint and working with students to find meaningful ways to cut electricity and gas usage, not for the resulting cost savings, but because we appreciate the importance of living an environmentally-conscious lifestyle.

"The honour of being Ontario's Top Energy Performing School Board belongs to our 57 EcoSchools student teams, their staff facilitators, and our environmental and office services team for their keen insights and proactive approaches to energy conservation. Practicing energy efficiency is truly a team effort at York Catholic."

The board credits its management of real time data, retro-commissioning, and implementation of building analytics as key factors that impact its energy performance. For example, the board's Lunch Time Electricity Reduction Challenge is a friendly competition that compares each school's electricity demand for the hours of 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. with the demand during lunch, between 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. The results for each school are shared every day at 1 p.m., while also benchmarking each school against the 20 best performing schools.

The York Catholic board has also leveraged many new technologies such as LED lighting, Building Automation System software, and sensors to help make its facilities more energy efficient.

In the TRCA listing, the York Catholic District School Board's 104 school buildings had an electricity potential savings of 6,187,183t kWh/year or 11.3

per cent; a gas potential savings of 938,085 m3/year or 18.9 per cent and a total energy savings potential of 14.9 per cent, which translates to a cost savings of \$805,026 per year.

The Toronto and Region Conservation Authority's list of the Top Energy Performing Boards analyzes school boards' data collected as a requirement of Ontario's Green Energy Act. It then assesses the data, and makes the necessary adjustments to account for weather and school specific variables. This establishes each school's energy saving potential relative to good performance standards from the Sustainable Schools' national database. The lower the savings potential, the better the school is performing. The savings potential for all individual schools is then combined to arrive at the TRCA ranking of the top ten school boards. 


