



PROPOSED CHANGES

The application proposes to rezone the lands from "Shopping Centre Commercial (C4)" to a site specific "Core Area [King City] (CA-KC)" zone to permit a variety of commercial uses within a commercial or mixed multi-unit residential and commercial development on the lands. The amendment also proposes many site specific definitions and development provisions related to lot and building requirements, parking, loading, bicycle parking, patios, planting strips, amenity areas, and waste storage. Holding provisions are proposed for specific uses. The amendment is intended to facilitate the future redevelopment of the lands in accordance with the policies of the King City Community Plan.

APPEAL PROCEDURE


If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the by-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of the Township of King Council to the Ontario Municipal Board.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting, or make written submissions to the Township of King before the by-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to do so.

Any person may attend the public meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed Zoning By-law Amendment.

NOTICE OF SERVICE DISRUPTION Highway 27 watermain replacement in Nobleton

What: Watermain replacement

Where: Hwy. 27 in Nobleton from Parkview Avenue to Wilsen Road When: Ongoing. Construction is expected to last up to three months

Why: Replacement of watermain to improve service to the area

Project impacts:

- During construction, full-time access to all residences and businesses on Hwy. 27 within the work zone will be maintained. Pedestrian access will also be maintained.
- Through traffic on Hwy. 27 will be maintained, however there will be lane reductions as required. Motorists should expect delays for the entire duration of the project.
- Periodic closures of local road connections to Hwy. 27 in the project area will be necessary. Additional notices will be distributed to property owners with specific dates of the closures as well as any alternative traffic arrangements.
- To facilitate the installation of the new watermain, the water supply to properties on Hwy. 27 in the project area will need to be temporarily shut off for short periods of time. Property owners will be given advanced notice prior to any water disruption.

Emerald Ash Borer Tree Removal

What: King Township is in the process of cutting down several hundred trees killed by the emerald ash borer, an invasive species that has killed tens of millions of ash trees in North America. Staff estimate up to 300 or more trees need to be removed on township-owned boulevards.

Why: The trees are completely dead and many are on township-owned boulevards next to sidewalks. Removing them is a matter of public safety.

Where: The tree removal started July 25. Arbor-tech, the company that will be doing the removal, started in Nobleton to be followed by King City and Schomberg.

Next steps: King is committed to planting new trees in the future. This year will see the start of Phase 1 of the program, which will include the removal of the dead trees but not the stumps. It is more efficient to remove the

stump and plant a new tree at the same time due to the hole created during the stumping process.

Phase 2 will include the removal of the stumps and the planting of new trees. Phase 2 is expected to be a multi-year initiative.





New Nobleton Zoning Bylaw now in effect

According to the staff report by Stephen Kitchen, planning director, the bylaw review process benefitted from "an engaged community that has participated throughout the process ... input

been valuable in providing local context to help shape the new NZBL."

Kitchen said there have been several requests from the public to expand the core area of Nobleton. The NZBL follows the core designation within the Nobleton Community Plan. The NZBL review, he pointed out, is not the appropriate process to extend or include additional properties in the core area, since the NZBL can only be implemented as directed by the community plan. Changing the core designation could be part of the official plan review process.

Zoning bylaws, prepared in accordance with the Planning Act, must conform to relevant policies and official plans.

Kitchen stressed that all input they received was taken into consideration. Some resulted in modifications to the final bylaw. They include redefining "farmers' market;" reference to home occupation provisions; parking requirements in the core.



draft was prepared earlier this year was welcomed and received ... and has Plan, but considers the ongoing official plan review; recognizes the character of mature residential neighbourhoods; updates zoning issues; improves clarity for administration and serves as a template bylaw for King City and Schomberg, whose plans are currently under review.

The NZBL also manages "spaciousness" through the introduction of minimum surface requirements, which will result in portions of lots being maintained as landscaped open spaces. The bylaw also ensures conservation of natural heritage and identifies hazard and conservation lands.

"Overall, the NZBL review has provided the opportunity to implement existing direction from the Nobleton Community Plan, and modernize the zoning, with the benefit of simplifying and streamlining future zoning conformity exercises," the report stated.

Further, the review strengthens and helps implement action items contained in the Integrated Community Sustainability Plan.

Editorial misses the mark

Three things amaze me about the editorial appearing July 7 - "When is a severance not a severance?"

First, you have wildly missed the mark regarding the very real SLAPP suit levelled against a Kingscross Ratepayers Association director. Our Senior Associate, Ms. Anne Sabourin, did in fact label this a SLAPP suit, and enumerated steps King Township council should take to prevent it from succeeding in "chilling"

This statement from the editorial in particular is dead wrong: "Even the KRA legal representative, after espousing the evils of putting a "chill" on public participation, admitted this doesn't fall neatly into the definition of a typical SLAPP suit."

Why wouldn't you endeavour to get this right by contacting us before publishing, as most editors do?

Second, your editorial seems to endorse the applicant's SLAPP suit. Are you aware the substance of the allegations? Why leave the reader with the impression vou support the lawsuit?

Finally, in my 28 years of experience as an environmentalist, I have never encountered a newspaper taking a developer's side in a single severance application, unless a farm dwelling was involved.

As you say yourself, this matter is only one lot and engages no public interest issues in favour of development, only private profit.

Is there a personal relationship between you and the developer of which your readers should be aware? If not, why lend the paper's good name to such a small commercial interest, over the voice of the community?

CCKT provides input into Greenbelt review

Representatives from Concerned GTHA to provide a truly viable tran-Citizens of King Township (CCKT) attended an all-day meeting of the Ontario Greenbelt Alliance (OGA) June 14 at the The Old Mill in Toronto to discuss strategic steps to both strengthen and expand the Greenbelt.

Various environmental and community groups from across southern Ontario were in attendance and during a number of breakout sessions throughout the day, many individual local issues were identified and summarized. This allowed the OGA to coordinate a united front to the Provincial Government regarding its recommendations concerning the future viability of the Greenbelt.

While the original reason for the creation of the Greenbelt was to protect and maintain farmland in and around the Greater Toronto-Hamilton Area, the concept has since developed many facets: Protecting existing green spaces like urban river valleys, watersheds and natural heritage sites; implementing plans to mitigate the effects of climate change.

The freezing of urban boundaries is crucial if we are to end urban sprawl and it is imperative that new infrastructure that promotes sprawl like new highways is eliminated. In that fight to protect our farmland care must be taken that we do not transfer the sprawl from these "greenfields" to our rural communities, thus creating unsustainable "dormitories" for nearby cities.

Traffic mayhem is a reality in the present GTHA. If we simply transfer sprawl from one area to another we will have gained nothing and traffic gridlock will persist, costing us billions of dollars in lost productivity, deterioration of air quality and a general decline in our standard of living.

In the larger urban centres, such as Barrie, Newmarket, Guelph, etc. we need to plan for more complete communities in terms of jobs, local amenities, recreational and cultural opportunities, viable local transit, in an effort to reduce the commuter traffic.

In addition, improved, efficient regional transit systems need to be improved and expanded throughout the sit option for the many commuters traveling to the major urban centres.

During the meeting many points were made concerning how the Greenbelt could be improved and grown. However, the predominant theme that came across in the discussions was the need for the provincial government to take full ownership of the Greenbelt and not to allow it to be diluted by delegating enforcement and governance to the regional and municipal levels of government.

Expanding the Greenbelt to include urban river valleys and other natural heritage features in urban areas is clearly a positive addition. However, the need to expand the Greenbelt to include additional regions closely connected to Toronto and Hamilton (e.g. Simcoe, Wellington, Kitchener-Waterloo, Niagara) is essential in protecting prime agricultural land and natural heritage systems. Provincial planning policies within the Greenbelt Plan bring consistency in the approach to preserving farmland, wetlands, forest and water corridors in areas with urban growth pressures.

It is important to recognize the Greenbelt concept has many opponents. The residential construction industry and many farmers are opposed to it in principle because the guidelines have set down parameters that restrict what land can be developed and what land cannot. Both groups view it as limiting control and are looking at the Greenbelt skeptically.

While many municipalities in the GTHA support many aspects of the Greenbelt Plan, they will often allow the expansion of urban boundaries for municipal benefits, which weakens the whole Greenbelt concept. Consequently, there needs to be tight control on what is allowed and what is not, through consistent provincial government legislation across the whole Greenbelt.

It is with this in mind that the government has invited all members of the public to participate in the process by requesting they submit their







She has purchased some ultra-light camping gear, noting there is some "really neat stuff out there these days!"

Matthews will be updating everyone each day/night from the trail over the seven days with Twitter and Instagram and potentially "Snap Chat," assuming she can get a signal. She will also be filming with a Go-Pro and taking photographs to share along the way.

YRP stepping up their game to combat driving infractions

York Regional Police are stepping up their enforcement efforts to trim preventable traffic occurrences across the region.

While officers are making a dent in certain areas, the leading causes of automobile collisions – distracted and impaired driving – continues to plague them.

King council was given an overview of law enforcement initiatives by York Regional Police's top officers recently.

Superintendent Mark Brown noted traffic safety has always been a priority over his career on the force.

Inspector Paulo DaSilva pointed out that traffic collisions are more costly to society than all other crimes and occurrences combined. "Road safety is in our hands," he said, adding there is one collision every 63 minutes somewhere in York region. On average, one person is injured every four hours and a pedestrian is struck by a vehicle every two days. There is one fatality on average in York every 17 days.

Focusing on driver behaviour, Inspector DaSilva said distractions, aggressive driving, impaired and use of seat belts are the main areas they enforce.

Impaired driving remains as the number one criminal offence and despite all efforts, impaired driving charges continue to climb. Over 2014-2015, they were up 12.3%. They are the highest in the 25-29 and 20-24 age groups.

All of these are preventable and YRP is focused on proactive enforcement. They now have a year-long RIDE program and they're also looking at drivers impaired by drug use.

"Road safety is everyone's responsibility," he said. "We all need to obey the rules of hte road."

Distracted driving, he stressed, it the leading cause of collisions.

Currently, distracted driving carries a \$490 fine plus demerit points. "Put your device down," the inspector urged.

YRP has created "Pledge to Ignore," a campaign designed to help save lives. It means making a commitment to yourself or a loved one not to use your

cell phone while driving or walking near traffic. Their goal is to obtain as many pledges as possible from residents across York Region. Each pledge represents one less distracted driver.

Residents have a role to play in curbing incidents. You can get involved by reporting impaired drivers. You can also visit YRP.ca and file traffic complaints, or fill out Road Watch forms.

Superintendent Brown noted they monitor each municipality and work closely with municipal staff and politicians.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer was pleased to hear that YRP staff will now follow up more frequently with residents' complaints and report back to them

Councillors also offered up ample servings of trouble intersections in King, all of which are on YRP's radar.

Officers are responding, Brown said, adding all data they collect is sent to York Region to use in their traffic analysis and planning. If King wants more traffic calming measures, red light cameras, etc., they can ask the Region.


DaSilva added local politicians can also bring those trouble spots to their attention.

Mosquito traps test positive for West Nile Virus in York Region

Two mosquito traps have tested positive for West Nile Virus (WNV) in the City of Markham; one at the intersection of 14th Avenue and Kennedy Road and the other at the intersection of Highway 7 and Warden Avenue.

"Residents can take simple steps to reduce the risk of West Nile virus and exposure to mosquitos," said Dr. Karim Kurji, York Region's medical officer of health. "Cover up when heading outside, especially during dusk and dawn and eliminate standing water around your property to reduce mosquito breeding."

King council gave its stamp of approval recently to its revamped Emergency Response Plan.


The aim of the plan, according to Fire Chief Jim Wall, is to make provisions for the "extraordinary arrangements and measures that may have to be taken in order to protect the health, safety and welfare of the local residents ..." It provides for a coordinated response to emergencies throughout King and meets provincial legislation.

"The Emergency Response Plan not only reflects and enhances the Township of King's approach to emergency management, as defined by the Office of the Fire Marshal and Emergency Management Ontario, it also incorporates subordinate plans such as Annexes, which provide detailed response procedures for the most likely hazards that the Township of King may be confronted with," Wall wrote in his report to council.

Plans such as the long-range master fire plan, need to be continually evaluated for their relevancy.

Not only does it meet provincial legislation, it updates practices regarding public safety, public health, the environment, mitigation and prevention.

"Having an up-to-date Emergency Response Plan not only promotes economic stability and a disaster-resilient community, it also provides for good governance during an emergency situation."

King City's Hunt suits up for U20 national team

While continuing to dominate the competition in her home country, McKinley Hunt has been granted the opportunity to put her talents to the test across the pond.

The Country Day School graduate has been selected to represent Canada at the under-20 level against England's under-20 squad next week, marking her first time representing her Canada in rugby.

"This has been a dream of mine," said McKinley, who learned she had been long listed for the team back in February. "It has been a long time coming, lots of early mornings and late nights."

Her passion has landed Hunt a long list of accomplishments. Aside from her four trophies with CDS, she also cap-

tained the under-20 Provincial Ontario Storm team to gold at the 2016 Canadian Rugby Championships in early July.

She hopes this experience at the provincial level can translate to the national stage.

"This is my first time competing for Canada. I am so excited to wear the red and white. This has been something that I have been dreaming of for a long time. Not many people can say they have represented their country and I'm lucky enough to have that honour."

Upon arrival in England on Aug. 13, the 26-member team will practice for five days before their first game on Aug. 18. Two more games are to follow over the next week, all played at Trent College in Nottingham.

Hunt said she expects the competition to be "exceptional."

MacLennan leads Canada into Games

The pride of York Region was front and centre when Team Canada entered Maracana Stadium in Rio last Friday.

Rosie MacLennan, in her second Olympic Games, led the team as the Canadian flag bearer for the 2016 Olympics, an honour bestowed upon just one athlete each Games.

"It was unbelievable," MacLennan told CBC's Scott Russell. "Far beyond what I ever could have imagined. It was so exciting and the energy in the room was just spectacular. It's just beyond words."

MacLennan said it was an Olympic opening ceremonies she saw as a child that played a role in her inspiration to strive to one day be an Olympian, as well as her grandfather, who was selected as an artistic gymnast for the 1940 Games in Tokyo but was unable to compete due to World War II.

"The Olympics are an incredible celebration of humanity," MacLennan told Russell. "What we saw just highlights that. What you're going to see out of the next 16 days, those 300-plus athletes are going to bring Canadians through every single possible human emotion."

After the ceremonies, MacLennan also announced an exciting philanthropic gesture that was a long time in the making. When plagued by injury last year and unsure if she would be making the trip to Rio, she made the decision that if she did make it to the Games, she would donate the money she put aside from her win in London to JumpStart, an important charity to help parents fund minor sports.

"When I was faced with a lot of uncertainty last year, my sports psychologist encouraged me to keep trying to find that deeper meaning of sport, and really connecting with that, because that was what really fueled my passion and fueled my drive."

"(JumpStart) is an organization really close to my heart, I had the opportunity to get involved with sport, and my life's changed because of it. If any kid is inspired over these next 16 days I want them to have that chance, too."

MacLennan was the only Canadian to win a gold medal in London in 2012, doing so in individual trampoline, the only time Canada has claimed gold in the sport.

She will be looking to retain her title when she enters competition as a favourite beginning Friday with medal rounds coming on Saturday.

Also competing in individual trampoline is Nobleton's Jason Burnett on the same days, who is taking part in his third Olympics.

"There is no greater test for an athlete's skills, conditioning and mental fortitude than playing an international competition against the best rugby players in the world," said Jen Boyd, U20 Women's head coach. "These tours are pivotal for the next group of athletes interested in playing at the senior level."

First taking the field for the CDS Cyclones in Grade 9, Hunt became a leader for the perennially-successful team both on and off the field. Four years later, she captained the CDS Senior Girls'

team to its 11th consecutive CISAA championship.

"My four years playing for CDS greatly contributed to my success as a rugby player," said Hunt. "As a lifer, I grew up watching the team win title after title. When I joined in grade nine I knew nothing about the sport but I quickly fell in love with the teamwork and sisterhood that the sport develops. My CDS coaches and teammates have always supported me in my pursuit of rugby at the elite level."

Hunt also plays for the senior Aurora Barbarians, fresh off an Ontario Women's League provincial championship last weekend, and will suit up for Queen's University in the fall for a second season.

The Backyard Astronomer

By Gary Boyle

One of the best meteor showers of the year will peak on the night of August 11/12. The Perseid meteor shower is the result of Earth ploughing through a cosmic cloud of debris from the passing of Comet Swift-Tuttle that last rounded the Sun in 1992. In past showers we have seen 60 to 100 meteors per hour vaporizing high above us at 58 km/sec. But this year has a twist.

Every 12 years the planet Jupiter in its 11.86 year orbit affects the cloud of debris making it a bit denser. This last occurred in 2004 and this shower is the 12th year. Observers might see higher numbers of 100-200 meteors per hour or more. Best time to set out a lawn chair in the countryside or campground with a good horizon is after midnight local time on Friday morning Aug. 12 when the pesky moon sets. The entire shower lasts through August 20 with the peak on Aug. 11/12.



Anglican Parish By John Arnott

Jesus's beautiful face and outstretched arms show his compassion for all the world in this simple but magnificent statue, Christ the Redeemer, atop Mt. Corconvado overlooking Rio de Janeiro and is the first thing most

travellers including our Canadian athletes with their Olympic dreams see as they arrive in this historic city.

The St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes that the idea of a religious monument on this rocky 2,300-foot-high mount within Rio's city limits was originated in the 1850s by Roman Catholic priest Pedro Maria Boss, who wanted to honour Princess Isabel, Brazil's regent and daughter of Pedro 11 the country's last monarch. Changing times and politics squelched the plan.

But in 1920, the idea of a religious statue on the mount was resurrected by a group calling themselves the (Roman) Catholic Circle of Rio to bring attention to what they saw as the godlessness of the time. They mounted a campaign to collect signatures and donations for this project and Brazil's ordinary Christians gave generously.

Designs considered came down to a huge cross, a statue of Jesus holding a globe and standing on a pedestal representing the world and a statue of Jesus with arms outstretched symbolizing the compassion of Christ the Redeemer. The latter was chosen.

It was truly international venture designed by French sculptor of Polish heritage Paul Landowski and built by Brazilian engineer Heitor da Silva Costa in collaboration with French engineer Albert Coquaot from soapstone imported from Sweden and reinforced concrete. Christ's face was created by Romanian sculptor Gheorghe Leonida. The 98 ft. /30 m statue stands on a 26 ft./8m base and Christ's outstretched arms measure 92 ft./28 m in length The building program took 9 years 1922-1931 and cost \$250,000 (equivalent of \$2.3 million U.S. today). It was dedicated in 1931 with some members of Brazil's former royal family in attendance and was consecrated 75 years later in 2006 by Rio's archbishop Cardinal Eusibio Oscar Schneid upon the completion of a chapel at the base of this 635 metric tonne monument. It has been damaged by erosion, lightning and more recently by vandals with spray paint who were caught and made a public apology.

Now fully restored complete with lightning rods and water proofing and declared one of the New Seven Wonders of the World, this iconic Christ the Redeemer symbolizes Brazil to that world.
