First human case of West Nile virus

An individual in the City of Markham has tested positive for West Nile virus, marking York Region's first human case of 2016.

"Education and awareness are key to avoiding West Nile virus infection," said Dr. Karim Kurji, York Region's Medical Officer of Health. "Remember to cover up or stay inside during dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active."

York Region encourages residents to follow these simple Fight the Bite tips to reduce their chance of being bitten by mosquitos:

- · Limit outdoor activities in the early morning and early evening, when mosquitos are most active.
 - Cover exposed skin by wearing long sleeves, pants and socks.
 - Use insect repellent containing DEET when outdoors.
- · Clean or remove standing water sources, including bird baths, empty containers, outdoor toys and flower pots.

Mosquito activity varies from year to year. While it is important to know not all mosquitos are West Nile virus carriers, two mosquito traps have tested positive for the virus this year.

York Region's annual West Nile virus control plan includes:

Mosquito control - Mosquito populations are reduced through a process called

larviciding, using provincially and federally approved pesticides. Mosquito surveillance – Each week between June and October up to 40 mos-

quito traps are set up across the Region, capturing and testing mosquitos for the

Symptoms of West Nile virus may include fever, muscle weakness, stiff neck, confusion, severe headaches and a sudden sensitivity to light. In rare cases, the virus can cause serious neurological illness including encephalitis, or inflammation of the brain.



The great severance debate

I would like to congratulate the King Weekly Sentinel on their recent editorial on the severance topic in Kingscross Estates. I am compelled to write after reading the letter to the editor by Donnelly Law. I am quite surprised that an environmental law firm would wade so aggressively into the internal politics of a neighbourhood rate payers association instead of advocating on the points of environmental law that apply to a severance application.

Donnelly's letter alleges that there may be an inappropriate personal relationship between the editor and the developer. It reminds me of the George Bush speech right after 9/11: "Either you are with us or against us." It seems like there is no middle ground allowed on the severance issue in Kingscross just as Bush tried to force other countries to take sides.

We have seen the bullying tactic routinely in Kingscross when it comes to the severance issue. If you are not anti-severance, you must be in bed with the developer. As the original editorial reported, disappointingly these were some of the allegations levelled at residents by their fellow neighbours during the recent council meeting on the issue.

Since Donnelly Law has called into question the integrity of the paper, I would call on Donnelly Law, in the interest of full disclosure, to encourage their client, the board of KRA, to disclose who is actually funding the Donnelly bills. It's been made public - the funds to hire Donnelly Law were raised through anonymous donations. The names of the donors were kept so secret, only a few select directors on the KRA board know where the funds came from despite repeated request to disclose the source of funding. Who is/are the benefactor(s) paying for Donnelly Law? Is it an individual or is it a group? Are the donors even member of Kingscross? Do the donors have a personal vendetta against the applicant or is there another agenda at play? Or perhaps the donors are members of the ratepayers' association who are concerned about the severance application. The fact is nobody knows but a select few directors.

I congratulate the King Weekly Sentinel for playing its role as the Fifth Estate and reporting on issues such as this one. It seems the paper may have struck a nerve, and perhaps through the paper's continued reporting, we may have a more transparent and open process on this severance issue and actually get some answers on what is truly going on.

Thus far we have only seen secrecy, anonymous donations and bullying. We are all better than this.

Impacts of weather felt in Holland Marsh

When your livelihood is derived from agriculture, there is no such thing as a "normal" or "average" year. From one year to the next, you will have to deal with varying challenges and food and farming certainly isn't the "same old, same old" from one year to the next. We use best farm, and best management practices, as much as you are able to when your business partner is Mother Nature!

Our spring started out cooler than we would have liked, given that we had transplant onions to plant. Then, as is usually the case, around May/June, the Holland Marsh experienced wind storms (think of a blizzard in the winter, except with dirt). The ground is light, having been "worked" in order to plant our seasonal crops. Some farmers will plant cover crop "windrows" to protect their crops until the roots are established in these crops, but there is still that small window when the wind can blow through, picking up the dirt, seeds etc., requiring re-seeding.

Our farmers dealt with damaging winds from the northwest for 2.5 days, which dried out small seedlings (dependant on the size), and various other crops died as a result of wind damage. A lack of precipitation compounded matters.

Some farmers irrigate their fields prior to seeding, if the field is really, really dry. Some will wait to irrigate until after they have seeded in order for the worked up soil holding the seeds to form a "crust," which mitigates wind damage by holding the soil together, essentially packing it. Either way, choosing to irrigate pre- or post- seeding, adds to input costs. Irrigation systems require the use of pumps to pump the water from the river or canal to our headers, pipes or reels. Pumps require fuel and tractors, and lots of man hours for optimum results.

Our Holland Marsh farmers have important partners, without which, would make what we do much more difficult. We have our Muck Crops Research Station, University of Guelph, who work with our farmers from the science end of things providing us with important information about soil, bugs, crop protection, integrated pest management, field scouting, disease, which varieties

of seeds grow best in our organic based soil, etc. Another very important partner is the Holland Marsh Drainage System Joint Municipal Services Board, folks comprised of the mayor and a councillor from each of King Township and Town of Bradford West Gwillimbury, two farmer representatives from each municipality, and a member at large who provide direction to the drainage superintendent. It should be noted that the drainage system in the Holland Marsh is unique in all of Ontario, and contributes to the importance of this Specialty Crop Area, and our ability to provide locally grown produce, which is world renown. There are a number of pump houses within the polders that control the flow of water in and out of the Holland Marsh from Lake Simcoe.

During the lengthy drought, the likes of which we have not seen in a couple of decades, the pump houses are checked twice daily controlling the flow based on the needs of our farmers.

The drought conditions this year have been incredibly hard on crops, and our farmers, who have been spending 19 hours a day trying to keep the crops alive. The extreme heat, and lack of rain have contributed to seedlings burning off. Some of our farmers have had to re-seed part fields due to burn off. The weather has also reduced the effectiveness of crop protection which directly relates to an increase in weeds (they seem to be flourishing this year). Under normal weather conditions, fields are hand-weeded at least 4-5 times throughout the growing season. No, we are not organic farmers, but spraying less is less stressful for the plants, and reduces our crop protection costs. Weeds must be removed from fields, as they compete with our field crops for nutrients, and provide a haven for pests (which leads to the need for crop protection. Fields are scouted regularly, and are only sprayed when thresholds are reached). As well, when weeds are present, it increases the chance of disease. This year, to date, we have, on our farm alone, increased our labour costs for additional handweeding by \$14,000

ence a size reduction. The chain stores have a "standard" that they prefer for consumers. Based on the conversations I've had with folks, most conshy about sharing your preference for smaller produce with your local grocer! Other crops, like carrots, may experience length differences. This is good, as there's a standard for length too. Those that have survived the heat, as a result of irrigation. You see, in a dry year the tap root of the carrot will seek water. growing downward, creating a longer carrot. We'll find out at harvest this fall!

It's really difficult to say what, if any, food price increases will occur. While we all talk about buying local, shopping local, and supporting local agriculture, the reality is most of our Holland Marsh Farmers (except for some of the farmers' market growers) are commer-

sumers prefer smaller onions. Don't be cial growers, and the prices we get paid depend on the global market pricing, not what it actually costs us to grow the food, but what the prices are based on our international trading partners. So, back to the question will food prices go up? That depends on whether there is ample supply of produce, including that provided by our trading partners.


> What are farms' losses? I would be able to sit down and figure out the increases of labour, fuel, transplants, seed, crop insurance, crop protection etc., to date based on actual numbers, but it isn't really until next April when we will be able to figure what the actual losses are based on market value.



Schomberg's Lamaze returns to Olympic podium

After eight years, and with a different horse, Eric Lamaze has recaptured the connection he shared with Hickstead in earning Olympic bronze with Fine Lady 5.

One of the most accomplished rider/ horse connections in Canadian equestrian history, Lamaze rode Hickstead to a gold in individual jumping and a silver in team jumping in Beijing in 2008, and earned a World Equestrian Games bronze in 2010.

Hickstead collapsed in competition the following November in Italy, and Lamaze opted to ride the nine-year old Derly Chin De Muze in London in 2012.

"I never thought this would happen again," Lamaze told the Canadian Press after his third place finish in the individual jumping event in Rio. "There were times when I was not sure if I wanted to keep going. But this makes



it all worth it."

It wasn't until Rio in 2016 that he recaptured the magic he had with Hickstead with Fine Lady 5.

The pair was not docked a penalty through the three qualifying rounds and two final rounds, with Fine Lady 5 the only horse not to knock a rail to the ground in all five rounds.

Two other pairs had penalty-free final rounds, sending the riders into a jump-off. Great Britain's Nick Skelton led off with another perfect round, posting a quick time of 42.82 seconds

Swiss rider Steve Guardat followed. hitting one rail in a time of 43.08. Two other riders followed suit, both with

"I knew what I had to do and even if I was unlucky and we had a fence down, I knew there was still a spot open if we were fast with a fault for a medal," said

The pair sped through the course, clocking a time of 42.09 with just one miss, earning the third place on the po-

"I think the Olympics is one of the most difficult things that we come across in our sport and I think we all tried our hardest to do the best that we can," said Lamaze. "We really appreciate what the horses do for us, and for me, this little mare was jumping her heart out all week long and she continued until the end."

"So many things have to go right to be here with a medal around my neck. We saw a lot of great horses and great riders have some misfortune," he later said. "I think you really need good luck all the way. You need your horse to stay healthy and it's never a predictable thing."

The 48-year old Lamaze is now Canada's most decorated Olympic equestrian with three medals.

"I think in our sport, mostly all of us go to a show every week. There's always a major Grand Prix. But in my experience, people quickly forget what you've won when it comes down to Grand Prix. But an Olympic medalist stays with you forever."

Three members of an elite soccer development camp in King City played their way to a chance to train across the pond this summer.

Julian Graca, Miguel Barbosa, and Callum Young, all trainees with ANB Futbol, received invitations to play in Europe over the months of July and August.

Graca spent six months with Portugal's C.D. Nacional of Madeira before returning recently to play permanently with the under-19 Academy team. "Playing on the U19 team in Portugal at C.D. Nacional has been an amazing

experience," said Graca. "And a dream come true to be playing pro in Europe and competing against big teams. It has been my dream from a young age. I'm proud of my accomplishments."

Growing up playing soccer in Brampton, Graca spent close to two years with the ANB Futbol organization, honing his skills and calling it a "learning experience" while calling ANB "a family."

Miguel Barbosa, meanwhile, returned from Portugal in mid-August, following a stint of training with pro club Clube Desportivo das Aves.

Having worked with Sporting Academy in Portugal three years ago, the opportunity was the next step in Barbosa's entrance into European soccer. With a mother from Lisbon and a father from Porto, the move from ANB to Portugal was a smooth one.

"Miguel really enjoyed training with ANB," said his mother Racquel. "Because the level of soccer and the program in general helped him be well prepared to go back to Portugal this year again."

Young, the youngest of the three born in 2003 and a member of ANB since the age of six, travelled through Scotland in August. While there he had the opportunity to train with the academies of Falkirk Football Club (Scottish Championship) and Hibernian Football Club (Scottish Championship).

Each player has a European background.

"We have worked with the players' families who have personal connections, and most importantly, European documentation, to facilitate these opportunities

for these talented players," said Bassam Naim, Academy Director at ANB. Based out of King City's Country



Royals U13 team back in action

After a few weeks off from competition in the York Region Soccer Association's first division, the U13 King City Royals boys' soccer team got back to action playing a pair of games against teams out East.

On August 9, the Royals tied Whitby Iroquois 1-1 in a battle between two evenly matched teams. The first half was a back and forth affair as both teams had their fair chances to score but could not find the back of the net. The second half was a different story. Three minutes into the half, Kahyl Jadavji's long diagonal pass to Mason Dalakis into the corner led to the Royals taking a 1-0 lead. Mason took a shot from an almost impossible angle that squeezed through the Whitby goalkeeper's hands for his sixth goal of the season. This opened the game up as Whitby were pressing for an equalizer that actually led to three golden opportunities inside the 18 yard box for the Royals over the next 10 minutes but they missed the net on all three occasions to keep the score at 1-0. That would be costly as Whitby scored off a turnover on a beautiful cross into the box minutes later to tie the game up for good.

Two nights later, the Royals travelled to Darlington to face the Darlington Energy and won convincingly 8-1. Zack Donsky led the way with four goals, bringing his season total to 14. Zack scored two of his goals in the first half as the Royals took a 5-1 lead into the break. Marco LaVerde, with his team leading 21st goal, and Mario Fratto, who scored two goals in the half to bring his season total to four, were the other first half goal scorers. Mario's second goal was on a penalty kick late in the half. The Royals started the second half quickly again but could not find the back of the net until 16 minutes in when Mason Dalakis won the ball off a turnover and fed Zack Donsky for his hat trick goal to make it 6-1. Darlington found some life over the next few minutes as goalkeeper Anthony Bruno had to make a few saves to preserve the lead before the Royals came back at the 25 minute mark to make it 7-1 on Zack Donsky's fourth goal of the game. Defender Giovanni Sciulli added another, his second goal of the year, to make the final 8-1.

With six games remaining, the Royals are in fourth place out of 21 teams with an 11-2-1 record (34 points).
