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

Man killed in single-vehicle collision in King

Investigators with the York **Regional Police Major Collision** Investigation Unit are seeking witnesses following a fatal, single-vehicle collision in King Township.

On Monday, Sept. 19, shortly before 7 a.m., York Regional Police received a call from workers in the area of 16th Sideroad and Jane Street that they had found a vehicle off the roadway. When officers arrived they located the vehicle and found that there was a man inside without vital signs.

The driver, a 22-year-old man from King, was pronounced deceased at the scene.

At this time, investigators believe that the vehicle had been travelling eastbound, when for unknown reasons, the vehicle went off the roadway.

Investigators with the York



Regional Police Major Collision Investigation Unit are seeking witnesses to the collision and any information on what may have happened leading up to the collision.

The roads in the area of 16th Sideroad and Jane Street were closed for most of the day for the investigation.

Any witnesses who have not yet spoken with police are being asked to please come forward.

King putting more teeth into response to Province

The updating of important provincial legislation is causing a lot of frustration among municipal politicians and planning staff alike.

In preparing its response to Queen's Park on the review of the provincial Growth Plan, Greenbelt Plan and Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan, King councillors wanted the staff recommendations to carry a bigger bite.

The Coordinated Provincial Plan Review is asking municipalities and regions to submit their responses by Oct. 31 to the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing.

Councillors and planning staffers tossed around the contents of the staff report, but wanted to ensure the Province knows exactly the level of concern that King has. There's no reason to use kit gloves, so councillors asked staff to be more forceful in their recommendations, when the report comes back to council for final approval.

Councillors, staff and members of the public raised concerns regarding some of the proposed amendments to three pieces of legislation governing lands in King. The draft updated plans for the Growth Plan, Oak Ridges Moraine Plan and Greenbelt Plan were released in May and ever since, municipal staff have been going through them.

The amendments, according to planning director Stephen Kitchen, are "considerable," and include everything from infrastructure and supporting agriculture, to building and planning for complete communities.

Density and intensification – terms that have caused some consternation among municipal leaders – continue to add pressure. The new intensification target under the Growth Plan is 60% of all new residential development, up from the current 40%. It's also proposed to increase goals to 80 residents and jobs per hectare, to be achieved across the region. In urban areas, these minimums may be easily achieved, but in rural areas they simply aren't feasible (and likely not desired).

Growth targets include "major transit station areas," such as King City's GO station. As it stands, the provincial legislation would require 150 jobs and residents per hectare in King City by 2041.

Township staff noted it's been difficult for King to achieve current targets and the new figures will only compound the challenges. Adding this amount of people and employment to the village would place a huge strain on transportation and servicing infrastructure.

"A target of this magnitude would create compatibility challenges with the existing King City community fabric and built form which generally consists of relatively small parcels support one- and two-storey core area buildings, and low density single detached residential neighbourhoods," Kitchen's report noted. "... the proposed target of 150 residents and jobs per hectare seems beyond what would be appropriate in the context of the King City community."

Susan Lloyd Swail, former councillor and member of Environmental Defence, noted King City's GO station is not identified as a "mobility hub," but the Township has to think about how to respond to the provincial plans and manage growth.

The plans also ensure that employment lands are protected. King has identified such lands, but they are limited. Lands along Highway 400 and at the King Road intersection have been earmarked. The municipality needs clarification from the Province how these lands can be protected and developed in the long-term.

Another sensitive matter is proposed changes to settlement area boundaries. King's major centres - Nobleton. Schomberg and King City – are limited in terms of expansion and service capacity. Current development plans will bring all three to their limit within the next few years. Expanding it even further would be difficult.

A representative of five Nobleton landowners said her clients would like a clearer definition of "settlement area," since all have considerable investments in the hamlet. There's a need for a long-term vision for Nobleton, she said, adding the Growth Plan contains conflicting standpoints that could impact Nobleton's future.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini stressed "it's all about growth," and while he can appreciate developers' interests, services in Nobleton are limited.

The revamped plans also include policies on agricultural uses. King has traditionally supported providing a greater range of permitted uses in support of agriculture.

The plans also call for modifications in terms of rural lands and recreational uses.

Councillor Cleve Mortelliti pointed out we simply don't have the infrastructure to support more people in King. He also has a problem with the Province forcing such things on municipalities.

"I don't know how we're going to ac-

commodate this," Mortelliti said. "A lot with stronger positions on some imof the provincial policies don't make sense and seem contradictory."

Kitchen agreed, noting while there are merits to intensification, King cannot support the levels being proposed.

Pellegrini added the Province is trying to create a one-size-fits-all strategy, but that simply won't work. Each community has to be looked at individually.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer is also apprehensive. She suggested King takes a more assertive stance and is very direct in its responses to the Province.

Councillors supported the staff report and recommendations in principle, asking they come back to council portant issues.

comfortable retirement is becoming longer and more difficult. A large portion of the working population is living pay cheque to pay cheque, unable to save, and worried about their local economy, according to the Canadian Payroll Association's 8th annual Research Survey of Employed Canadians.

The survey, of more than 5,600 employees across the country, reveals that only 36% expect the economy in their city or town to improve, down from an average of 39% over the past three years and off significantly from 66% in 2009.

Many working Canadians are barely making ends meet. Almost half (48%) report it would be difficult to meet their financial obligations if their pay cheque was delayed by even a single week (consistent with the three-year average of 47%). Illustrating just how strapped some employees are, 24% say they likely could not come up with \$2,000 if an emergency arose in the next month.

Re-interment is a first

I have been in ministry with the United Church of Canada for almost 30 years, years and this was the first time I have been asked to preside at a re-interment of remains that were found to be over 150 years old.

It's a long story but basically human bones were found this spring in King.

Archeologists determined the bones were the remains of six adults and four infants and a tombstone that was in quite good shape.

Research showed that Isaac Morris and his wife Elizabeth (Crosslev) Morris had been Wesleyan Methodist. In 1925 when the United Church of Canada was formed, the Methodists were one of the denominations to join together. As there was no relatives who came forward, the Funeral, Burial and Cremations Services Act (2002) allows the Registrar to name the Minister of the Church with religious affiliation to the persons whose remains have been discovered to act as the representative. That fell to me. The Registrar wanted to ensure that through my participation, the remains would be treated in a manner consistent with the religious practices and traditions of these persons.

On Thursday, Sept. 15, 12 individuals gathered for a re-interment service for the 10 individuals. The archaeologists had put the remains carefully into 10 new coffins and these were placed into

a family plot at King Cemetery. As part of this service. I talked about how the remains were found and looked after as well as scripture sentences, a prayer, Amazing Grace was sung by Sandra Kirby and we heard the probable same words of committal that might have been used when each of these individuals were buried. I used a prayer that was said at the re-interment of King Richard III in 2015 in Leicester, England.

Joe Karabin dug the grave by hand as that would have been how the first graves would have been prepared. A tombstone was found, covered by earth for many decades and so is in amazingly good shape. The words on it are: "In Memory/Isaac Morris/Who Died/Sept. 29, 1956/Aged 71 years/I know that my Redeemer liveth." This tombstone will be placed at this new grave.

I was honoured to be the church's representative for such a holy and spiritual act.

I hope you will find your way to the King Cemetery and see the tombstone for yourself, and then remember those who were lost and are now found. For me and all those who have been associated with this process, it speaks of how important it is that we maintain good burial records. We may believe that we are not important and that it doesn't matter where we are buried or have our ashes spread, but this experience has taught all of us just how important it truly is.

Driver clocked at 56 kmh over the limit

A Kleinburg woman was charged by York Regional Police when she was caught speeding through Nobleton.

An officer spotted the vehicle travelling at 56 kilometres per hour over the posted speed limit in Nobleton.

Officers with the #1 District and #4 District Community Oriented Response (COR) Units have been conducting a commuter and commercial vehicle initiative on Highway 27 between Highway 9 and Highway 7.

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





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Jazz performer Mele has many irons in the fire

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It may not be apparent, but the universe is buzzing with the sweet echoes of creation. If you listen closely enough, you can almost hear the silky smoothness of the cosmos.

That idea hasn't escaped a very talented King performer and composer.

Michele Mele's creativity has no bounds. Primarily known as a jazz singer and songwriter, Mele has set her sights on the stars, literally.

Her newest project is "Universe in a Kiss," 75 minutes of original songs, performed live on stage. Accompanied by an orchestral soundtrack, enhanced with aerial works by circus performers, Universe in a Kiss is magical production. It offers an almost inexplicable connection of human hearts, one that arose billions of years ago out of cosmic dust. The universe has been expanding ever since, and Mele has tapped into that.

The founder of a house concert series. Mele is almost as exuberant as our explosive beginnings. And yet, her music is the epitome of sounds that charm the savage breast. Mele, a King native, grew up in a family of professional musicians. Piano was Michele's first instrument, and she holds degrees from the University of Toronto, Faculty of Music and Faculty of Education (she often works as a music educator). Mele's ability as a composer, songwriter and arranger became evident early in her career. In 1989 her composition "That's All I Know" became a Gold Certified hit in Canada for singer Neil Donnell. In 1991, she composed for and arranged a series of choral concerts for the Toronto Philharmonic Orchestra, and became active leading a band on the club circuit as well as writing and arranging for other artists.

Mele has honed those creative juices and expressed herself through cooking, and her YouTube video series, Michele in the Kitchen."

Running now for the past three years, her show brings jazz into the kitchen. It's just another way to sooth people's souls and combine two of her passions - music and food.

Her original family recipes come alive in her home – everything from her grandma's pasta sauce to a near-perfect biscotti and stuffed eggplant. She's an avid cook, preparing three meals a day, and setting the table for 20 family members on Sundays.

She prepares the meals in real time,

"My strategy from day one was university and college towns, markets," said Smolkin. "The college front is what we're all about."



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
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



May leads Junior C Cougars past Golden Hawks

Rookie Connor May notched his first two goals in a Schomberg Cougars uniform Sunday night to earn the Junior C club its first win of the season.

Playing the spoilers to the Caledon Golden Hawks' home-opening night, the first period saw Caledon goalkeeper Jason Cumbo standing on his head. Connor Whiteside had a glorious opportunity on an early power play, stopped on a rebound by a diving Cumbo, drawing cheers from the home crowd.

Late in the first, team vet Ryley Egerton was sprung on a semi-breakaway while on the penalty kill, but was unable to beat Cumbo.

It was on the penalty kill, however, that May finally found the back of the net early in the second. Caledon's Nicholas McNutt countered to tie it just minutes later, though May regained the lead with another shorthanded goal just before the ten-minute mark of the period.

Putting up a strong defensive approach for the final twenty minutes, Egerton added a late empty-netter for a 3-1 win.

Schomberg exacted revenge on Caledon following a home opener loss to the Hawks on Thursday at Trisan Centre, where Caledon threw 41 shots at Michelizzi for a 5-2 win. Brennan Young and Egerton were the lone Schomberg scorers.

The opening weekend of play brought about some massive changes to a league left mostly untouched for the past two decades.

The Georgian Mid-Ontario Hockey League, of which Schomberg has been a member since its beginnings in 1994, has become the Carruthers Division of the newly-formed Provincial Junior Hockey League (PJHL), a massive 65-team league.

Nearly 1,500 players will drop the puck on the inaugural PJHL season this September, though the ex-GMOHL division remains largely untouched. The division remains occupied by the Golden Hawks, Cougars, Stayner Siskins, Penetang Kings, Alliston Hornets, Midland Flyers, Huntsville Otters, and Orillia Terriers.

Ontario Hockey Association President Karen Phibbs said the new league is part of a rebranding initiative for Junior C hockey.

"Our goal is to ensure all players benefit from experiencing high-end hockey as close to home as possible," said Phibbs. "We want to bring players, coaches, scouts, fans, families the opportunity to follow, and develop from, the rich history of Junior C hockey."

Though now under the PJHL umbrella, the Cougars' regular season schedule remains rooted in the ex-GMOHL. All regular season games are within the Carruthers Division, with inter-divisional play coming to fruition in the post-season race for the Clarence Schmalz Cup.

Schomberg will continue the tradition this season of hosting Thursday night games at the Trisan Centre, this week taking on the Huntsville Otters (1-1-0) at 8:30 p.m. They pay a visit to Huntsville the following night.

The Cougars will not have to face the defending league champion Alliston Hornets until mid-October. Alliston swept Schomberg out of the 2015-16 first round of playoffs in four games.



With the help of the elders and the Pikangikum working group we now have 16 homes with clean drinking water in their homes and an effective waste management system. This makes a big difference to the health and well being of the community.

Horticulture **By John Arnott**

That precious metal wasn't the only gold the conquistadors sent back to Spain from the New World, marigolds were another. And I've certainly noticed the gorgeous display of colour and size these treasures are putting on in gardens of our area in spite of this summer's hot, dry weather.

Bill Casselman in his book "Canadian Garden Words," writes how seeds of these plants, native to the tropical Americas, were sent by Hernando Cortez after his invasion of Mexico to Charles V Holy Roman Emperor. Specimens of these plants were obtained by horticulturists in France and from there both seeds and plants were introduced into Britain where they became known as French marigolds.

Some years later a taller species, a close cousin of these Americans but native to Nepal in the Himalayas, were introduced into Britain from India but misnamed African marigolds. Both original species had single or semi double flowers in orange or yellow. Hybridizing, however, has given us full doubles and shades of deep orange or rich yellow mixed with mahogany, copper brown or bronze.

Their common name comes from "Virgin Mary's gold," but as Casselman tells their botanical tagetes derives from Tages an Etruscan (a the brilliant civilization in Italy before the Romans) god who sprang from the earth like a plant. They probably had a perfectly suitable American name that was totally ignored! Tagetes patula - Latin for spreading - is the French marigold while the African species is tagetes erecta – Latin for straight. Signet marigold (tagetes tenuifolia - Latin for slender leaves), with its masses of tiny yellow flowers and closest is to the wild marigold is well worth growing but not always easy to find in our local garden centres.

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
