Public Open Houses #3 and #4

King Township has initiated a review of the Zoning By-law as it applies to the King City & Schomberg urban areas. The outcome of this project will be new Zoning By-law(s) for King City & Schomberg. All interested persons are invited to attend an open house to learn about the Draft Zoning By-law for King City and Schomberg. This project follows the new Zoning By-law for Nobleton, which was adopted by Council on July 11, 2016.

What is a Zoning By-law?

A Zoning By-law is prepared under the requirements of Section 34 of the Planning Act. The Zoning By-law regulates the types of land uses and the character, height, location, size and massing of buildings for all lands in the community. Currently, the Township administers Zoning By-law 74-53, as amended, which applies to most of the Township. The Township has initiated a review of the Zoning By-law with the intent to develop new Zoning Bylaw(s) for King City and Schomberg.

Why prepare a new Zoning By-law for King City & Schomberg?

The current Zoning By-law was enacted in 1974. There is a need to ensure the Zoning By-law conforms to Provincial, Regional and local planning policy. A Discussion Paper has been prepared to provide additional information about the types of planning issues that will be addressed. The Discussion Paper is available on the Township's website (see the link at the bottom of this notice).


What is being presented at the Public Open Houses? Should I attend both meetings?

Map of Road Closure Area:





This time I will walk the walk on mission trip

Writers write. We tell stories. Sometimes we witness events first-hand.

Often, we help others re-tell their tales of adventure, both tragic and happy. We get a story, or message across to others. In a way, we help readers live vicariously through others. If done well, that can be a really powerful thing.

I have encountered hundreds, perhaps thousands, of kind, compassionate, and generous souls over my career. I still do, on a regular basis. I've written about incredible acts of courage, charity and volunteerism. To me, these stories never get old.

As a parent, and a journalist, I've helped my kids' high school with annual volunteer mission trips to the Dominican Republic, where students help locals and the poorest of the poor - Haitian sugar cane workers.

Each vear, about a dozen students from St. Michael Catholic Secondary School in Bolton participate in the annual mission trip to El Seibo, Dominican Republic. The group assists native Dominicans as well as the Haitian community there, staying at a missionary centre run by the Daughters of Mary (les Filles de Marie).

We've encouraged my oldest daughter Lexie every year, and helped round up donations for her. I commented more than once how I would love to join them.

Well, that wish has come true. The trip was in jeopardy of being cancelled this year due to a lack of students to make it viable. I added my name to the list, together with my son Liam. In effect, we managed to ensure the trip was a go. It will be the last for the compassionate school chaplain, Urszula Cythe beginning.

I was a little apprehensive at first. worrying about work, taking time off and coming up with the money for the trip. It's unfortunate that volunteer trips are not subsidized and limited to those who can afford it. I'm not looking forward to going into debt by volunteering abroad. We will be doing some fundraising over the coming weeks and food, such as rice, flour and cornmeal. I will be calling on my friends, support-Every dollar raised means more in the for me. hands of those who desperately need it.

Lexie told me I may never get another chance to cross such an adventure off my bucket list. In this case, the student has become the teacher.

Lexie has recounted dozens of stories

of handing out household necessities to the families who welcome foreign aid. There's nothing like looking someone in the eves to get an idea where they're coming from.

There's one photo from Lexie's 2014 trip that always strikes a cord with me. It's the photo at the top of this page. At first glance, it looks like an impoverished, senior Haitian is crying about his plight. Not so. He was expressing his heart-felt joy that Lexie gave him a crucifix. The relatively inexpensive token meant the world to this man.

"God will save me," he told her.

Lexie met him again, for the last time, in 2015. He was still wearing the crucifix, even though it was badly tarnished.

"All I could think of was how such a bulko, who spearheaded this cause from small gift became so symbolic and made a huge difference in his life," she said.

As I look at this photo, I really do hope God saved this man. He obviously lived a hard life and deserved much better.

We will all get a chance to roll up our sleeves, hand out hundreds of bags stuffed with donations to make the lives of others a bit easier. The bags are used to hold roughly one week's worth of

I have long espoused the virtues of giving back, volunteering and helping our fellow men, women and children unconditionally. Now I will have the chance to prove it.

Our mission team members will col-

lect items – clothes, toiletries and other necessities - and fill two suitcases each with donations. All of this, including our own personal luggage, is left behind for the betterment of those in need. The suitcases become valuable pieces for families to use for storage, cupboards,

Yes, other than a small carry-on, Liam and I will return with just the clothes on our backs! And we will be better people

Our team's efforts will be concentrated on helping the Haitian community near Consuelo, the majority of whom are sugar cane workers living in bateys. A batey is a company town consisting of makeshift barracks, located close to cane fields so that groups of workers can live near the site of their labor. Conditions are what we consider deplorable.

The situation on the island nation of Hispaniola is unique. It's a case of the poor (Dominicans) oppressing an even poorer neighbour (Haitians). While the Dominican Republic enjoys certain economic and tourism income, Haiti remains impoverished (rated as the poorest country in the Americas). Conditions there were exacerbated by the massive 7.0 magnitude earthquake in 2010 that left more than 300,000 dead and 1.6 million homeless. The country has yet to recover from this disaster.

Many Haitians have moved to the Dominican in search of a better life, yet there are limitations on Haitian immi-

"Public Consultation Meeting of King's Draft 2017 Budgets & Business Plan"

A November 12 discussion meeting was held in a small seniors' room at the Nobleton Arena. Four Town staff, Councillor Schaefer and two residents were present, no doughnuts.

Twenty-six large print pages and graphs that seemed a prelude to a power point presentation included a two year Capital Budget of \$64.5 million to end by the 2018 election, a 2017 Operating Budget of \$34.860 million, with \$8.6 million proposed from taxation. Major capital projects were: The Township Administration and Community Use Centre, King City Library and Seniors' Centre and the (Seneca) Township Wide Recreation Complex.

The sale of Town lands was to help pay for capital projects. No list, prices or how they were to be sold was available, nor specific costs of projects, or what contribution other parties, as the police sub-station would contribute.

Reserve Funds which look like millions in the bank are Development Charges designated for infrastructure as: water/wastewater, roads, fire protection and 90% eligible for recreation, library, and parking services and administration studies.

Accountants we are not. Debt wasn't discussed except for two debentures combined at ten and a half million dollars. No mention was made of the \$6,000,000 debenture issued November 2015, Bylaw No. 2015-61? No specific costs were available. There was no repayment or amount indicated for the maximum debenture request of \$22,500,000 for Nobleton sewers? What actual debt has King incurred? Is King's debt "off balance sheet" financing?

86.8% of King's tax base is residential. Commercial and industrial sources of tax revenue are limited. The Town's Economic Development Strategy states, "It will be a challenge for King to keep its debt ratio under the 25% capacity level of the province's debt servicing ceiling."

What is "Budget Discussion", a vague statement of intentions? Detail was insufficient for meaningful comment. A responsible government ensures residents are aware and informed about where every nickel is going and why. I admit however, after days viewing documents, with some links sent to me by Councillor Schaefer I was able to glean some specifics.

Yet, a dual responsibility is at play. Where were King residents demanding transparency, irate about the 9% annual increase, for the next five years in their water/wastewater rates and a proposed tax increase of 3.22%? Did Trump-mania have us transfixed in front of our big screens? Then let's borrow from Nancy Pelosi, "We have to pass the bill [budget] to find what is in it away from the fog of the controversy."



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

Back to the drawing board for King City proposal

King councillors and members of the public have sent a strong message to proponents of a townhouse development in King City. They want the proposal sent back to the drawing board, to make it more in keeping with the com-

Council hosted a public information meeting Nov. 14. Hujade Group Corp. has applied for an Official Plan amendment and zoning bylaw amendment, to allow an 18-unit townhouse development off of Keele Street, north of Dennison Street.

The plan is to change the density on the property, allowing for three blocks of 5, 6 and 7 units. They would be three storeys high with tandem garages and range from 3,200 to 3,500 square feet. The private road into the development would include a turning circle and a limited amount of visitor parking.

Staff noted some 108 trees would have to be removed to accommodate the construction. The two residential lots total some 1.73 acres and have 245 feet of frontage on Keele.

The property is surrounded by existing detached residences.

This development seems to be key in the area. Township staff have been approached by others with respect to developing two more lots just north of these lands. These properties total 2.2 acres. Staff do believe that both sites would benefit from a "comprehensive plan to integrate developments to coordinate streetscapes, site layouts, servicing an access."

Yin, Xiao, a representative of Sparcs Acquisitions Inc., owners of the abutting northern properties, said they

support the applicant's build form and about the density and building height ing will come to King, but he'd like to housing type. She said they did approach Hujade Group, noting they're willing to work together to create an integrated plan over the four parcels.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini told the capacity crowd that it's not uncommon for developers to work together and staff have tried to connect them when it's deemed appropriate.

Planning staff did stress there are shortcomings to the proposal, which include a lack of parking and the size of the proposed homes. York Region has indicated road improvements would be required and the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority said this application is premature.

The staff report did concede that this proposal would go towards meeting provincial intensification targets, "while broadening the range of housing stock in the community."

Matt Alexander, with Weston Consulting, admits that changes will be needed to this proposal. He attended the meeting, anxious to get input from the public.

A local resident urged the Township to maintain the existing buffer zones and take Oak Ridges Moraine guidelines into consideration.

A 35-year Keele Street resident said this plan is simply not in sync with the character of the surrounding community. It will compound traffic congestion and set a dangerous precedent, "handing developers a free pass." A solution to current traffic woes needs to be in place before a development like this takes place.

A Dennison Street homeowner said while it's important to consider the housing needs for King, he's concerned

this project brings. He also noted, at over 3,000 square feet, these units would not be considered affordable.

Another Dennis Street resident called the project a "monstrosity," stressing "it just doesn't fit." He'd prefer to see detached homes in the area, noting this project will only add to traffic dangers.

Councillor Cleve Mortelliti called this proposal "ridiculous," adding the only path forward is for the proponent to team up with the property owner to the north.

There are pressures on municipalities to increase intensity and he urged residents to get a sense of what's happening by reading government documents, such as the provincial growth plan. Medium and high-density houssee a compromise.

"The applicant has a lot of work to do," he said. "It comes down to working together to get the best balance." There's more in store for King City, he warned.

Councillor Bill Cober pointed out the tandem garages is no solution to parking issues. And Councillor Linda Pabst said residents, especially seniors, need smaller, more affordable units.

Despite the opposition, staff did note the project has some merit and benefits, which include proximity to the core and public transit, and it's not within an existing neighbourhood.

Staff will review all comments received and return to council at a later date with a set of recommendations.










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CDS debating team places second at internationals

Veteran debating coach Kerstin Wyndham-West raised the bar once again earning a 2nd place finish overall for the three-person Country Day School team at the International Independent Schools' Public Speaking Competition in Vancouver.

Grade 12 student and 2nd at Worlds last year, Olivia Railton, placed 1st overall and won top speaker for the second year running. In Vancouver, she qualified for finals in all three of her categories, finishing 1st in Persuasive and 3rd in Dramatic and Debating.



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A SCHOOL for BOYS

Gender identity is constructed from societal perceptions of what it means to be a boy or girl, and these stereotypes manifest themselves in the daily behaviour of children. To best serve boys, educators must understand their common behaviour as a reflection of the backdrop of societal perceptions of masculinity. It also works to combat these stereotypes so that boys can be the full expression of themselves.

To that end, we are able to tap into a rich, longstanding culture in which boys are able to explore, in safety, the breadth of the human condition, and their unique place within it. In this school culture, artistry and creativity are not labelled as 'feminine;' but rather as human.

Eloquence, both written and spoken, is expected. Self-reflection and the quest for meaning is built into the fabric of the daily routine, whether through Chapel or our Advisory program.

But there is more to it than that. Boys carry a natural wariness for things that are not genuine, and become bored easily when the activity at hand does little to forward their own sense of meaning. To that end, our teachers create an authentic curriculum; help boys find purpose in life; train them to care for themselves and others; and endow them with a sense of personal commitment and integrity. These goals become more realizable in a culture that presupposes one can be much more than what can be offered by the limiting stereotypes of masculinity. <

dian manner, Munro would then say very apologetically "sorry." Today, Munro has mastered his delivery and can throw perfect guard weight for his sweepers to manage and control.

The Muller team resonates as a close knit unit that strives to better themselves each time they step into the hack and tweak their techniques to perfection. Last week's contest was against Team Lee who kept it close throughout the game, but Muller applied the pressure mid-way through earning his team a solid game ending win. There is no doubt that these boys who all drive black cars, are making a statement that team unity is where it's at and are headed onwards and upwards to the next division.

"The Sweep Dogs," also known as Team MacDonald, consists of Skip Fraser MacDonald, Vice Michael Lepp, 2nd Sean Bush and rookie Jordan Dunlop at Lead. 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
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Royals launch winter season





Anglican Parish By John Arnott

In the very early Christian times the word "church" referred to a group of Christian people rather than a building. Back then because it was dangerous to be identified as Christ follower, these early Christians often met secretly in small groups in each others homes while larger groups met in abandoned buildings, catacombs, open places in woods, caves or even large sewers such as those in Rome.

Since Roman rule became somewhat more tolerant of different religions in the eastern part of the Empire, Christians here felt safe to build small rectangular one room buildings to meet in and these were soon called "churches" after the people who met in them.

The St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes that hard as it is to believe in today's world much of this region now the Muslim Middle East as well as North Africa, was in the first 5 centuries AD very Christian and the ruins of the earliest church buildings are found here. The oldest standing Christian house church (a private dwelling with a room or addition set aside for Christian services) is in war-torn Syria, while the oldest Christian church yet discovered is in Jordan's only port city of Aqaba where a Christian community of some 5,000 families still live and no doubt many of their ancestors once worshiped in it.

Some 10 million Christians live in Egypt and the ruins St. Anthony's Monastery in that country date to 356 AD. Still in use this monastery has suffered serious damage several times over the centuries but it has always been restored preserving its ancient ruins. About 8 years ago I had the opportunity to visit this ancient place.

In Syria, Mar Sarkis, Arabic for Monastery of St. Sergius, built on the site of a pre-Christian temple, predates the 325 AD Council of Nicea set up by Constantine, the first Christian Roman emperor. It has a round altar and round altars were prohibited after this date. It has been damaged and desecrated during the ongoing civil war in that unhappy land but still survives.

In northern Iraq about 20 km from Mosul where fighting between ISIS and American supported Iraqi troops is heavy and bloody stands Monastery of St. Matthew, Mar Mattai in Arabic, founded in 363. It's famous for its magnificent library plus its collection of early Syrian Christian manuscripts. Standing near an area of Christian villages it has welcomed and cared for both Christian and Muslim refugees during continuing bitter struggle.

A ruin, dating from the 4th century known as the Jubail church, is found in northern Saudi Arabia near the town of Al Jubail. The Saudi government has stopped locals from further vandalizing it but won't allow foreigners, even archaeologists to visit it openly.

Knisset Mar Semaan Kefa Aramaic - the dialect of ancient Hebrew Jesus spoke - for the Church of St. Peter was built into a cave by 4th or 5th century AD Christians near Antioch (modern Antakya) in Turkey. Though reconstructed several times it still contains parts originally built by its founders.



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


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
