Man arrested in shooting incident in King



Police have charged a 20-year-old man with attempted murder, following a shooting on King Road last week.

York Regional Police report that on Thursday, Feb. 16, shortly before 8 a.m., they received a 9-1-1 call from a victim whose car had been shot at. The occupants of the vehicle, a man and two children, were not injured and advised the suspect fled on foot.

Police closed King Road from Highway 27 through to 7th Concession, while officers with the Emergency Response Unit and Canine Unit tracked the armed suspect south of King Road through a wooded area. A short time later, the suspect was located and taken into custody without incident.

Charged is Thulani Moncrieffe, of no fixed address. Among the charges he faces are 3 counts of attempted

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murder; 3 counts of dischare firearm with intent; careless use of a firearm; possession of a restricted firearm; possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose.

"This quick arrest demonstrates how well our frontline officers work together with officers in our specialty units as a highly-trained and highly-effective team," said Chief Eric Jolliffe. "I am proud of the work our dedicated officers do each and every dav."

Anyone who may have witnessed this incident who has not spoken with investigators is asked to come forward. As well, investigators are seeking anyone that may have captured video of this incident on dashcam or video footage from residential or commercial surveillance systems in the area at the time.

PROPOSED CHANGES

The owner has submitted applications for Official Plan Amendment and Zoning By-law Amendment to facilitate the redevelopment of the subject lands for twenty-seven (27), four-storey townhouse dwellings serviced by municipal sanitary and water services. Twenty-one of the units are proposed to be freehold units accessed by Station Road and West Street and six of the units are proposed to be accessed by a condominium road. Specifically, the site specific Official Plan Amendment application proposes to:

- increase the maximum permitted gross residential density on the lands from 20 units per acre to 69 units per hectare;
- increase the maximum building height from three to four storeys; and
- decrease the Minimum Vegetative Protective Zone (MVPZ), also referred to as the buffer from 30 metres to 10 metres.

The Zoning By-law Amendment application proposes to rezone the property to Environmental Protection (EP) and a site specific Residential Urban (R1) zone to provide for the proposed townhouses and establish site specific provisions related to setbacks, height, and coverage.

APPEAL PROCEDURE

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the proposed Official Plan Amendment is adopted, and the By-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of Council of The Corporation of the Township of King to the Ontario Municipal Board.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to The Corporation of the Township of King before the proposed Official Plan Amendment is adopted and the By-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

Any person may attend the public meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed Official Plan or Zoning By-law Amendments.



King mansion is part of lottery's huge grand prize

A King City mansion is up for grabs in the newest fundraising lottery for Princess Margaret Cancer Centre in Toronto.

The grand prize in this year's lottery is the \$4.3 million King home, a cottage and \$500,000 in cash, with a total value of \$5.5 million.

The home was opened up for the launch and viewing last week. It's located at 97 Carmichael Crescent in King City. It boasts 8,915 square feet in a country setting. It features a stunning living room with coffered ceilings, a two-storey dining room, a chef-inspired kitchen, fully-enclosed outdoor lanai, a cocktail lounge, five en-suite bedrooms, an elevator and a skating rink on the lower level. This home is given away fully furnished, professionally decorated and landscaped.

You can visit the home Monday to Friday, 2-8 p.m. and weekends noon to 5 p.m.

The grand prize also features a \$700,000 Muskoka lake-front cottage by Linwood Custom Homes. It's a 1,588-square-foot cottage, with a wraparound deck and dock. It's also awarded fully furnished and decorated.

To top it all off, the winner will receive \$500,000 in cash.

Proceeds from the lottery will support the work done at Princess Margaret Cancer Centre, one of the top five cancer research centres in the world.

The final deadline for ticket sales is May 18.

King reserves servicing capacity for King City

In order to accommodate planned growth in King City, councillors recently reserved capacity limits handed down by York Region.

The servicing capacity allocated and assigned to individual projects will be granted for three years. As well, King set aside 25% of the 2016 servicing capacity for residential and infill projects in King City.

The capacity alloted to the projects pegs the population in King City to reach in the area of 14,000 to 15,000. This will mean an increase of almost 6,000 people.

To accommodate residential growth through 2021, York Region assigned limits (capacity) to its municipalities who use the York Durham Sewage System (YDSS) back in September 2016. In turn, the Township then allocates the capaci-

ty to individual projects, on a case-by-case basis. King decided to set aside 25% of the capacity to infilling and intensification

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projects, as called for in the provincial Places to Grow plan. This, according to staff, translates to roughly 1,481 people, or 477 residential units.

The intensification target for King City is expected to be 600 units, which means 347 additional units will be needed to meet the target.

Currently, the Township has applications on the books for 160 townhouse units.

"Over the past two years, Township planning staff has seen a significant increase in redevelopment opportunities within the core of King City for residential intensification purposes," according to the staff report.

"Intensification will play an important role in the future of King City and has a number of important virtues." These include providing a range of more affordable, quality housing choices; providing a vibrant walkable village core; preserving green spaces and providing housing close to public transit.



Houses made of sticks could be brought down with a few simple huffs and puffs.

Housing affordability deteriorated further across all markets in Canada in the third quarter of 2016, according to the Housing Trends and Affordability Report issued by RBC Economics Research.

Owning a home at market price in Canada in the third quarter was the least affordable in nearly eight years. RBC's aggregate measure for housing affordability in Canada rose for the sixth consecutive quarter by 1.3 percentage points to 44.3 per cent. Single-detached homes once again led the climb (up 1.3 percentage points to 49.4 per cent), followed by condo apartments (up 0.8 percentage points the Harry Potter reference). to 35.6 per cent).


Let's build a better Canada!

Fake news and so-called climate change

It seems like at least once a year my editor asks for an update on the accelerating climate change file. So once more we present the latest in scientific consensus from NASA, NOAA, the Hadley Centre for Climate Science and (the now un-muzzled) Environment Canada. This is NOT fake news.

2016 was the warmest year on record, month for month, of any year in the history of weather record keeping. Period. This is often hard to fathom if you are now digging out in the Maritimes from the Atlantic coast to the B.C. coast. Keep in mind, however, that we are but a tiny corner of this vast planet.

In Australia they are suffering through record heat waves. In India the temperatures are nudging 40°C. The Arctic sea ice enters 2017 at a record low extant. This is a time when the 97% of practicing, published and peer reviewed climate change scientists who agree that accelerating climate change is real news, need to be embraced by political and business leaders. This is when we need to come together as a planet to find ways to mitigate the impacts of this very real accelerating climate change.

to the news that the so-called President should be." of the "Disunited" States of America had just confirmed the appointment of Scott Pruit as the new Director of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

Remember that name and hope it doesn't go down in infamy. Scott Pruit was the former Attorney General of the fossil fuel energy rich state of Oklahoma. As such, he sued the EPA 13 times by the last count for trying to regulate his energy lobbyists. The far right fundamentalist conservatives love him because he supports religious freedom (as long as you are white and Christian), is against gay marriage, women's rights to choose, mortgage settlements, the Affordable Care Act, and environmental regulations.

One of his most memorable moves was to vote against the Clean Power and Water Act. And now, as Director of the EPA, he has vowed to gut the Environmental Regulations that it took thirty years and a lot of hard science to develop.

Keep in mind, Scott comes by these opinions easily. His campaigns are funded after all, by the oil, gas, and coal industries based in Oklahoma. These include the big players like Kinder Morgan, the Koch brothers, Devon, and XTO (Exxon Mobil). When I used to do my conference presentations on environmental issues and resolutions, I took quotes from the Index to warm up the audience. The index is full of those marvelous trivia facts with which you can razzle and dazzle your friends at parties.

Here are a few that should be repeated:

• By how much has the global wildlife population declined since 1970: 58%

• Number of floors by which the Trump World Tower's advertised height exceeds its actual height: 19.

• Rank of corrupt government officials among American's greatest fears: 1.

· Rank of climate change among American's greatest fears: 17

And to conclude, a sobering quote from the past to the present:

"If you tell a big lie and you tell it frequently enough, it will be believed." - Adolfus Hitler


The proposed amendment to the Zoning By-law submitted by Mattamy (Monarch) Limited under Planning File Z-2017-01 concerns lands located west of Keele Street, south of 15th Side Road, known as Part of Lot 10, Concession 4, King City, as shown on the map below.

The subject lands are currently zoned R1 -1(H) - RESIDENTIAL URBAN 1 - HOLDING ZONE R1 -1A(H) – RESIDENTIAL UŔBAN 1A – HOLDING ZONE, R1 -1B(H) – RESIDENTIAL URBAN 1B – HOLDING ZONE, R1-2 (H) – RESIDENTIAL URBAN 2 – HOLDING ZONE, R1-2A (H) – RES-IDENTIAL URBAN 2A – HOLDIŃG ZONE, R1-3 (H) – RESIDENTIAL URBAN 3 – HOLDIŃG ZONE, R1-4 (H) – RESIDENTIAL URBAN 4 – HOLDING ZONE by By-law 2013-33. These lands are within the approved plan of subdivision 19T-10K01. The Holding (H) provisions were primarily established to ensure, amongst other matters, adequate municipal services and infrastructure are available to accommodate the residential development. 


forward to getting to know congregants and people from the wider community. I will be available at the Nobleton church most Tuesday and Wednesday mornings and invite you to stop by and say hello."

munity.


"We all know, and are proud and pleased, at the effort the Chamber puts in," he said.



In fact, one mature tree can have the same impact as ten room-sized air conditioners." he adds.

Sound too good to be true? Well there is one slight catch. LSRCA's tree sale requires a minimum purchase of 100 seedlings. But with seedlings priced as low as 59 cents each, it's still a very affordable option. If 100 trees is more than you need, consider asking neighbours or friends if they want to go in on an order with you. There are seven species available to buy including white pine, white spruce, and red oak.

For homeowners that have larger properties (more than two acres) and don't want to plant their own trees, LSRCA offers a full-service planting program which includes a customized planting plan and specialized equipment to undertake the planting. Landowners may also qualify for a funding grant to cover up to 90 per cent of the costs.

In the Orthodox Church this Sunday is called Forgiveness Sunday when at vespers (the evening service) known as the Forgiveness Vespers worshippers ask each other for forgiveness so they can approach Easter with good feelings.

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
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




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Local speed skater at Canadian championships

St. Alban's Anglican Parish **By John Arnott**

As, after a strenuous day, he sat there on a bitterly cold February night warming himself beside the smoky fire

and chewing on a tough piece of under cooked deer meat in the gloom of the smoky lodge of his hosts did wish he was back enjoying the comforts he'd known in the royal palace in Paris where he'd been chaplain and tutor of two future French kings?

In 1611, not only did he leave the royal service but willingly gave up the good chance he had for advancement in the church by joining a religious order called the Recollets who followed a strict life of poverty. Then in 1615 this young priest Fr. Joseph Le Caron found himself aboard a ship under the command of Samuel de Champlain with 3 others of his order headed for New France (Canada) with the purpose of bringing Christianity to the First Nations there.

Once in Quebec City he prepared for the nearly 700 mile/1100 km journey mostly by river (St. Lawrence, Ottawa, French) with a group of Wendat/ Wyandot (Huron) fur traders headed back to Wendake (Huronia) their home country around the shores of southern Georgian Bay. Arriving here Le Caron became the first European to see this bay and thus Lake Huron. When Champlain and his followers met up with him in this same area a few days later the priest celebrated an outdoor mass for all but especially the Roman Catholic members of this expedition using a Communion kit and a small portable altar he'd brought from Quebec.

This, notes the St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton, would be the first Christian service held in what is now Ontario.

Le Caron stayed in the area for about a year living with the Attignaouantans, a branch of the Wendat/ Wyandot people, belonging to the Bear Clan. He would go back Quebec and on to France

with Champlain to plead their case for the Wendats/Wyandots who they knew were being cheated by French fur traders most of whom held licences, especially a group called la Companie de Montmorency who opposed his mission work, from the French Crown Their case presented he and Champlain came back to Quebec with new authority and eventually the priest returned to Wendake where established his headquarters at Carhagouha, a village near the site of that first mass. Here he continued his mission work and in his free time compiled a dictionary of Wendat/Wyandot words. At one point he was physically threatened by an angry group of villagers. But for the timely intervention a powerful clan chief he would have been killed.

the village he had a smaller variation of a longhouse built to serve as a church and include his living quarters. This would have been Ontario's first church rite near Gisors in Normandy.

predating the one built later (1637-39) by the Jesuits at St Marie Among the Hurons a few miles away near Midland.

Le Caron kept a detailed record of his life in Canada but unfortunately the part his writings telling of his stay at Carhagouha have been lost. Today nothing remains of this once substantial village and even its location is a matter of dispute—the most likely place being just east of the hamlet of Lafontaine northwest of the Midland-Penetanguishene region where a large stone cross now marks the supposed spot.

In 1629 he was in Quebec City when it was captured and briefly held by the English he with Champlain were then sent back to France.

After braving and surviving the many hazards of living in the wilds of It is entirely possible while living in 17th century Ontario Joseph Le Caron returned to France only to die from plague, in 1632, at the young age of 46 years at the monastery of St. Margue-


