Sun shines on King staff

While frugal by comparison to other municipalities, King Township had 11 staff members who made the civil servant "Sunshine List" in 2016. That's three more than 2015.

The salaries and taxable benefits of employees in the Ontario Public Service and the broader public sector who were paid \$100,000 or more in 2016 were released last week. The Public Sector Salary Disclosure Act requires public sector organizations to disclose, by March 31, the name, position, salary and taxable benefits of their employees paid \$100,000 or more in the previous calendar year.

CAO Susan Plamondon the highest-paid staffer, earning \$192,173.75. This was slightly above the \$184,000 she earned in 2015.

Director of Finance Allan Evelyn received \$145,120.51 in 2016, up from the \$125,000 he earned in 2015.

Andrzej Drzewiecki, director of engineering and public works, earned \$139,534.01 last year.

Stephen Kitchen, planning director, and Clerk Kathryn Smyth earned \$131,431.

Steve Gillies, operations manager, and Nick Vertelman, urban services manager, both pulled in \$127,021.

Fire Chief Jim Wall earned \$126,372.68 last year, up from the \$113,000 he was paid in 2015.

Chris Fasciano, director parks, recreation and culture, made \$121,513.63, up from the \$107,744.36 he was paid in 2015.

Mike Cole, deputy director of engineering and development, earned \$113,420.68.

Scott Donald, manager of parks, recreation and culture, pulled in \$109,889.


King Mayor Steve Pellegrini earned \$122,520. He works as the City of Brampton's supervisor of business services.





York employees swell the ranks on the 'Sunshine List'

As one of the largest, fastest-growing regions in Canada, York Region had a long list of staffers who made the "Sunshine List" in 2016.

Last year, York boasted roughly 1,880 well paid employees. The combined salaries is estimated at \$245 million (based on an average of \$135,000).

A substantial number of high-paid employees are members of York Regional Police. Most constables with the force make over \$100,000. YRP has a complement of 1,529 officers and 605 civilians, serving York's population of 1.13 million people.

The Region had 13 employees who earned more than \$200,000 last year. Top of the list was CAO Bruce Macgregor, who made a whopping \$298,125.

Eric Jolliffe, York Regional Police Chief, earned \$272,696.

Karim Kurji, medical officer of health, earned \$274,811.

John Richard Gould, associated medical officer of health, earned \$248,133. Adelina Urbanski was next with a salary of \$242,254. She's York's commissioner of community and health services.

Lilian Yuan, associate medical officer of health, earned \$238,012. Thomas Carrique, deputy chief of York Regional Police, earned \$230,974. Erin Mahoney, commissioner of environmental services, earned \$219,994.

Mary-Frances Turner, president of York Region Rapid Transit Corporation, earned \$219,994.

William Hughes, commissioner of finance, pulled in \$218,959.

Dino Basso, commissioner of corporate services, earned \$218,441.

York Chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson was the highest-paid politician, earning \$211,968.

Deputy Police Chief Rudolph Crawford pulled in \$201,381.

By comparison, Premier Kathleen Wynne earned \$208,974 and Toronto Mayor John Tory earned \$184,666 in 2016. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau earns \$340,000.



The environment is everything that surrounds us

Several years ago I was asked to define the term "environment" for a new geography textbook titled: Geonexus. So I kept it as simple as possible and wrote: "The environment is everything that surrounds us, everything with which we interact, everything that we are. In short, everything."

The textbook, published by Thompson/Nelson in 2003 was intended for high school Canadian and World Issues classes. One major section of that textbook dealt with "manufacturing consent" and "the role of the media" in presenting diverse perspectives dealing with the realities of our geopolitical landscape. Another dealt with political and corporate forces controlling the media for purposes of propaganda and suppressing dissent.

If, at any time in our history, we need to go back to school and thoroughly read and discuss the many critical questions posed in that textbook, it is now.

In one of my last columns, I highlighted the concern we should all have about the appointment of Scott Pruit to the role of the U.S.A.'s Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) while Donald was trumpeting the glory of "clean

If we are truly the environment, then everything that we breathe, eat, and drink, produced from that environment that surrounds us and with which we interact, becomes us. When we breathe in polluted air, when we eat foods with little nutritional value, when we drink contaminated groundwater, it becomes us. And we become sick.

However, beyond the natural environment in which we live, there is the social environment which we create. If we live with passion and compassion, if

resources, if we respect our home planet, then we live in a place of balance. If we recognize that all of our economy is based on our ecology, then we become wise stewards. The environment in which we live becomes a peaceful and loving place.

On the other hand, if we allow bigotry and prejudice to permeate our perceptions of anything that is different from us, we open up a door to hate and create an environment that is toxic. If we rape and pillage our planet, and rape and pillage our peoples, the social environment becomes a terror-filled and sorrowful place.

So, as much as I am deeply concerned about the impacts of accelerating climate change and the lack of political and corporate will to do anything significant about it, I am just as concerned at this point in history about the health of the social environment. The connection? When you have the "so-called" president of the United States of America refer to clean coal, vou need to know that he is a liar.

There is no such thing as "clean coal" and never has been. We have hard coal and soft coal and coal in between, none of which is clean. What is scientific fact, something which seems to escape our Republican politicians to the south. It is true that hard coal burns with less effluent than soft coal that contains more sulphur. We have technology that allows hard coal to be burned in power generation plants that are equipped with sophisticated scrubbers that remove the sulphuric acid ... which then goes ... where?

The whole reason that China is so on board with climate change protocols right now is that they are dealing with the health issues of having burned

we care for others, if we share our vast soft, high-sulphur coal in their power plants for years. When I worked with Dr. William Fyfe, then Dean of Science at Western University, and Chair of the international Geosphere/Biosphere program, he told me about a trip he had recently made to China.

"Skid," he said, "at every doorway in my hotel corridor, there was a spittoon. Everyone had to spit up all the time because every time we took a breath, we were breathing in sulphuric acid."

My older son recently worked as a teacher in Taiwan, and he said there were days that he couldn't go outside, when his students were confined indoors, when you wanted a can of clean bottled air to breathe because the air pollution blowing in from China was so thick you could taste it. This is life on Earth now.

The connections are very clear. If we have politicians who are environmentally illiterate, who ignore mainstream science, and who base their decisions on corporate power and profits, we can expect our natural environment to continue to deteriorate to a point of overshoot. It is a simple biological principal.

When the consumers consume and degrade more than the natural systems of the planet can replenish, we overshoot our limits and suffer a catastrophic population collapse. Understand that the reason for the war in Svria was accelerating climate change. Shifting rainfall and temperature patterns altered the growing seasons and resulted in drought and crop failures. Starving peoples moved from the rural areas into the cities on mass. When you put enough disenfranchised, hungry people into an overcrowded social environment, chaos and rebellion ensue.

It happened in the Fertile Crescent when Mesopotamia's irrigated fields turned to salt and the crops failed. It happened in France during the French Revolution. It happened in Egypt during the Arab Spring. And it is going to happen again. If you put enough hungry, angry, disenfranchised people together in a crowded space, you are going to have a revolution and it won't be pretty.

The only way a society can prevent this is to ensure that their population is treated with equity and justice. If vou work hard, vou get to keep a bigger piece of the pie. But everyone gets a place at the table, everyone gets adequate shelter, everyone gets a chance at a good education, and everyone gets appropriate medical care.

If we treat the natural environment with care and work towards a respectful social environment, we may just pass on a healthy home planet for generations to come. If not, well, as we sow, so shall we reap.







Kings' Beharriell invited to mark Vimy's anniversary

King's LCol (ret'd) Susan Beharriell will be traveling to Ottawa to attend ceremonies commemorating the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge as part of an official Government of Canada delegation. The delegates will participate in many events and ceremonies culminating in the signature commemorative event at the National War Memorial the morning of Sunday, April 9. The delegation includes veterans and special guests who have direct family ties to soldiers who fought in the First World War.

Lieutenant-Colonel (ret.) Susan Beharriell joined the Canadian Armed Forces in 1973, becoming one of the first women to complete the same Basic Officer's Training as the men. She was also the first woman to be accepted into first the Security Branch and later the Intelligence Branch of the Canadian Armed Forces. A trailblazer for women in the military, she has accumulated a wide variety of service experience including writing intelligence analyses for the Prime Minister, Cabinet, and Allied Nations, working in the North American Aerospace Defence Command HQ (NORAD) in Colorado on 9/11, serving in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) in Germany during the First Gulf War and being responsible for the Intelligence function across the entire Canadian Air Force. She earned an Honours Degree from Queen's University and completed numerous mili-

tary and intelligence courses. Her connection to the First World War is her grandfather, Thomas Oscar Robinson. 2nd Lieutenant Thomas



Oscar Robinson, or "T.O." as he was called, earned his wings and was a Flight Instructor in Canada with the Royal Flying Corps during the First World War. His training included aerial photography, gunnery, formation and night flying, bomb dropping and other air tactics. His position as an instructor was a fortunate one, as the average life-span of a pilot who flew at the front lines was approximately two months. After the war, Robinson bought one of the JN-4s training aircraft and became a barnstormer, or stunt-pilot. One day when he was performing with a wing walker, her equipment failed and she fell to her death.

Robinson never flew again.

Beharriell will represent her grandfather as an official member of the Ca-

nadian Delegation. The delegates will also meet with a group of high school students from across the country as part of their "Encounters with Canada" week in Ottawa,

run by Historica Canada. "It is a great honour to be invited to the ceremonies in Ottawa," Beharriell

King maintains safe drinking water for its residents

King Township maintains a solid record of providing safe drinking water to its residents.

Any occurrences of Adverse Water Quality Instances (AWQIs) were few and far between in 2016, according to findings in the Annual Water Quality Report, presented recently to King councillors.

Municipalities are bound by provincial legislation to ensure standards of water quality are met and any problems are dealt with.

King City experienced six AWQIs in 2016 and all "were resolved quickly and in compliance with MOECC requirements," according to staff. All of the incidents, which involved coliform levels, took place in current development areas. The Township monitors the qua-

ter quality in development sites during building to ensure the unoccupied sites don't negatively impact the rest of the water distribution system.

King City's distribution system services a population of roughly 6,630 people and consists of 37 kilometres of watermains and 2,072 connections.

York's master plan shows a need for new watermains, storage and pumping station(s) to meet the growing needs of King City. A second feed into King City has been identified by the Region.

Schomberg also had six instances, the bulk of which involved nitrates. King is working closely with York Region to monitor and manage the nitrification challenges within the Schomberg system. The Region is reviewing the treatment technologies in place for this system and examining alternative technologies to better manage nitrification.

The 14 kilometres of watermains

and 840 connections serve Schomberg's 2,688 people.

Six connections serve residents of New Tecumseth on the north side of

York's master plan doesn't indicate a need for any upgrades to the Schomberg system.

Nobleton only had two instances in 2016 involving coliforms and sodium. The sodium was found at the North Elevated Tower.

Nobleton's system serves 5,466 people through 1,708 connections along 29 kilometres of watermains.

There were no AWQIs in the Ansnorveldt system last year.

That village's system serves roughly 176 people and includes 1.5 kilometres of watermains and 55 connections.

King receives all of its drinking water from York Region.

Drinking water report summarizes how York Region's systems are managed

Ontario's Chief Drinking Water Inspector's Report confirms The Regional Municipality of York's commitment to delivering high quality drinking water.

"York Region's water operations staff work 24/7 to keep our drinking water systems operating safely and in compliance with Ontario's strict drinking water regulations," said York Region Chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. "The high scores achieved are a direct result of ongoing training, monitoring and testing and demonstrates our commitment to continually improve drinking water operations."

The 2016 report summarizes how York systems are managed to keep drinking water safe, along with water quantity and quality results. In 2016, more than 18,000 laboratory drinking water tests were performed and over 31 million online analyzer readings were recorded to confirm the quality of Regional tap water.

"York Region continues to work with our nine local cities and towns to distribute high quality drinking water," said Vaughan Regional Councillor Mario Ferri, chair of Environmental Services. "Protecting our water from source to tap and back to the source again allows residents to drink a glass of tap water with confidence."

In 2015 and 2016 York Region ranked first in the GTA in the Ontario Chief Drinking Water Inspector's Annual Report. In fact, York Region has not issued a boil water advisory in more than a decade due to excellent water quality and diligent operational management.

Under the Safe Drinking Water Act, 2002, York Region reports annually on the quality and quantity of drinking water produced. It is one component of a multi-barrier approach which also includes source water protection, operator training, water treatment, extensive monitoring and testing, as well as emergency preparedness.





King man among those arrested in home invasion

Four men, including one from King as well as our dispatchers," said Chief Township, have been arrested and charged following a home invasion in the City of Vaughan.

On Tuesday, March 28, 2017, shortly after 8 p.m., police responded to a report of a home invasion on Lavender Place, which is the area of Ansley Grove Road and Blue Willow Drive. The victims sustained minor physical injuries. Investigators believe that the homeowners were targeted by the suspects.

Eric Jolliffe. "Their efforts have removed four dangerous people from our community and taken a loaded firearm off of our streets. I thank them for their efforts."

Peter Van Loan's Bill C-323 is off to Committee

York-Simcoe MP Van Loan's Bill C-323 would create a tax credit for the rehabilitation of historic properties. Based on a successful pilot project in the early 2000s, the bill would create a program that balances cost with efficiency. With 2017 being the 150th anniversary of Confederation, there was no more appropriate time to introduce this program.

"This Bill represents a historic opportunity to invest in our cultural heritage" said Van Loan. "It is very exciting that the House of Commons supports our initiative. We're looking forward to debate in committee."

Bill C-323 aims to reduce the demolition of Canada's heritage infrastructure, and instead encourage the rehabilitation of these culturally significant buildings. C-323 would create a 20 % tax credit for rehabilitation of recognized historic places. The tax credit would be available to properties that appear on the National Register of Historic Places.

"It is my view that Bill C-323 would reconnect Canadians to their cultural heritage, as citizens would have been more likely to seek out heritage designations for their historic properties" said Van Loan.


The bill passed by a vote of 150 to 139. All Conservatives, New Democrats and 22 Liberals voted for the Bill.

Four King City students lauded by school board

Four King City Secondary students have been recognized as leaders in their community and in their craft.

Makayla Goodman, Jacqueline Iantorno, and Eleanor Kenyon brought a trio of awards to their school through York Region's "Celebrating Student Success" program, selected for their "combination of character, leadership, academic achievement and service to the school and/or community."

"We've had numerous double awards, but never three winners," said Sheila Cholyk, Family Studies and Social Sciences department head at KCSS. "There are 24 nominated throughout the entire school board, so getting three at our school is pretty awesome."

King City has had at least two winners of the prestigious award since 2013.

All three students serve as mentors and leaders for Grade 9s just entering high school, whether it be academically or socially.

"They help them find their classes, learn the ins and outs of the school ... it's really important work that they do," said Julie Morris, head of the program.

"It's a really fun experience," said Goodman, who is now in Grade 10. "We've all experienced being Grade 9s and know how difficult it can be, so we're happy to help them transition to high school, because it's such a big step."

Iantorno said her intention is to make the first step in high school an exciting one, rather than an intimidating one "The first few days or weeks of high school, you just expect to be lost, and that you have to force yourself to adjust. The mentor program really makes it fun to be here, and you want to come to school, because you know that you have a bonding experience that no other school really gives."

The program also includes a camp at the beginning of the year, an experience that Kenyon finds value in.

"It gives the Grade 9s a chance to know each other better, and know the mentors better," she said. "So when they come back to school, they know the older grades better, and can look up to you for any advice or help."

Brianna Wilkins, a Grade 11 student at KCSS, was also celebrated recently for her eye for fashion, winning the York Region Skills Challenge for fashion design.

"It's the biggest competition of its kind in Canada," said Cholyk. "It's huge. They rent out Seneca in York Region, and hundreds of kids come in to compete. If you win that, you go on to provincials, and then nationals."

To enter, Wilkins had to send a pattern in to judges, eventually judged on their drawing, their sewing skills, and the embellishment of their garment as a whole.

Her passion for fashion began at her oma's house in Ottawa.

"Just to give me something to do, she taught me how to knit and sew," said Wilkins. "It just kind of became a hobby. Right now it's just more of a fun thing to do, to get away from homework and everything."

York Region establishes new business to improve broadband connectivity

York Regional council has authorized the creation of the York Telecom Network as a separate business to develop, build and operate the Region's fibre network assets.

"Improving broadband connectivity to York Region's communities is a key priority of this term of council. It is necessary to help businesses remain competitive and gives families much needed access to high speed Internet," said York Region chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. "By transitioning the York Telecom Network into a business, York Region will be in a stronger position to expand our service."

The York Telecom Network was established in 2002 as a means of efficiently connecting two Regional facilities. To date, York Region has invested \$16 million in the network of nearly 200 kilometres of fibre highway linking Regional buildings, traffic cameras, traffic control systems

and water and wastewater monitoring systems. The network is also used by municipalities, universities, schools and hospitals.

Creating the York Telecom Network as a separate business will allow Internet service providers to also access the fibre network and help extend high-speed connectivity in hard-to-service rural areas.

"For the past 10 years, funding has been directed to private networks," said Vaughan Regional Councillor Michael Di Biase, chair of Planning and Economic Development. "Taking the York Telecom Network in this direction aligns with the Regional Broadband Strategy, will help increase economic development and open up additional funding opportunities."

Developing the York Telecom Network could also be a factor in helping the Region achieve Intelligent Community Status and recognition as a global leader in fostering innovation.

This was a first-ever retrospective, in partnership with the Clara Thomas Archives and Special Collections at York University, and explored Lucas's work, from the 1960s through the present.

With "brutal honesty," the show was an intimate diary of her life. It showcased some 1,000 pieces by Lucas, many of which have never been seen before.

Some of the "diary" pieces were from the nine years Lucas taught art at Sheridan College. She explained that during the week, upon returning home from the college, she'd whip off sketches, often without thinking. On the weekends, she'd pick one and do a large, 20-inch-by-24-inch finished drawing.

In 2007, Lucas began painting single white doves, as a symbol of the Holy Spirit. Each of these was for her daughter Andrea, who was ill at the time and has since passed away.

Lucas said she'd like to see these distributed in some form, perhaps in posters or postcards. She would like others to draw inspiration from

Lucas lived through some interesting times in the 1960s and '70s, and the self-proclaimed feminist decided to "go big or go home." Lucas wanted her large pieces to stand as a testament to female artists, who can be free to express themselves.

Like her massive canvasses, Lucas herself is rather unassuming, but her passion is larger than life.





At the beginning of the services there will be a time of Remembrance as we observe the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge a defining point in Canadian history when, no longer followers, we took our hard won place as leaders on the world stage.

Native to Mesopotamia (modern Iraq), the date palm has, since prehistoric times, provided a staple highly nutritious food for people of the Middle East, especially the poor.

Dates picked and dried hold their nutrition for a very long time. So they were the perfect food to carry on long journeys particularly across deserts. In fact without dates desert travel and exploration long ago would have been impossible.

As well, rough shelter could be made quickly with palm branches (fronds).

In the ancient Middle East people often broke off palm fronds to wave at and welcome heroes, victorious kings, generals and troops much the way it is done with flags today (to the relief of environmentalists).

This return of soldiers usually signified the end of hostilities and the return of peace thus the palm branch would become the symbol of peace.

Many Israelites welcomed Jesus with palm branches that day so long ago, the only time he permitted himself to be treated like a victorious king. They expected him to raise an army and drive out the hated Romans. That wasn't to be and bitterly disappointed many turned against him.

This coming Sunday, Palm Sunday, The Anglican Parish of Lloydtown with Christians worldwide will remember

this event in spectacle, story and song.







Anglican Parish By John Arnott

The year is 1650, the place a courtroom in Derby England where 26-yearold George Fox, stands before Judge Gervase Bennet accused religious blasphemy. When asked to answer to the charge young Fox exclaimed "Tremble at the word of the Lord." To which Bennet shot back "The only quaker in this room is you."

Soon after the members of the religious group that Fox had founded, began to be called Quakers, a name that was meant to be derogatory but was soon adopted by members of this group although their correct name is the Religious Society of Friends, often referred to simply as Friends. Like early Christians, Friends call their members the church and the building where they gather the meeting house.

The St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes that in the early 1800s Timothy Rogers a Quaker brought his family and other Friends from Vermont to Upper Canada where they would receive land in return for work building roads and be exempt from military service. They settled near today's Newmarket and were followed there by several other Quaker families from Pennsylvania. Religious services were held in a small log cabin but the community grew and a permanent larger facility was needed. Thus in 1808 plans were

made to build a meeting house but tragedy struck when many in the community died from plague. Now plans for the meeting house drastically changed resulting in a much smaller building just 30 ft./9.2 m wide by 60 ft./18.4 m long.

Work be began in 1810 with Amos Armitage, Reuben Burr, John Doan, Thomas Linville and Isaac Phillips, master craftsmen, given charge of the project with the responsibility of getting the supplies and furnishing the labour with help from others in the community. So on a base of local field stone using local pine as the main wood the Friends' Newmarket Meeting House began to rise, a labour of love. It stands today much as it was when completed in 1812 making it York Region's oldest surviving church and it is still in use.

Over its 207-year history the building has undergone repairs and renovations. The worn batten and board outside walls have been covered with new wood in the same style and painted the same warm beige. The plain wooden former main door facing Yonge Street is original as are those along the building's south side where stands an long porch that runs the length of the building supported by 7 elegant white wooden pillars each with a plain classical carved base and capital.

Flooding the room with light, an important element to Quakers, the rectangular windows with their pleasing clear rippled glass around the meeting house and their working 2 paneled shutters are also original as is much of the door and window hardware. Wooden shakes covering the original roof have been replaced by thicker ones. In 1975 under the direction of architect Napier Simpson the entire building including its original pine floor was raised, with modern equipment, to accommodate a

lower level for a kitchen, 2 washrooms, 1 fully accessible, a meeting room used for the children's Sunday school and other activities like "potluck" dinners and space for the modern gas furnace. An elevator has recently been installed inside the back of the building where the new main entrance leads into a tiled foyer.

The Newmarket Meeting House, following the distinct architectural design of Friends meeting houses in Pennsylvania and New England, has no steeple and one main room divided by a movable screen into 2 sections, one for the men and one for the women. In the Newmarket building rows of the original pew like wooden benches for the congregation, face east and what was the main door while a single row for elders faces them In beautiful condition a black original wood burning stove now sealed stands in the space between the 2 sets of benches. Two tiered seating along the north men's area wall results in windows there being set higher than those along the south wall. The meeting room has neither a cross, other ornamentation nor pulpit.

The service begins when someone takes a seat and others follow. For about an hour all sit in silent meditation. There are no hymns or sermon but a member feeling the Spirit may speak – this requires no response. The service ends when a designated elder rises and shakes hands with his neighbour. Services to which all are welcome happen Sunday mornings from 10:30 to 11:30 with a coffee/tea hour following.


