

Speed limits are lowered on parts of King Road

Motorists take heed. York Region has approved lowering speed limits on several roads, including King Road.

"As our communities continue to grow, the way we are using the road-

ways is also changing," said York Region Chairman and CEO Wayne visions reflect the increase in vehicle, for those using our roads."

Local changes are on King Road, Road from east of 8th Concession to west of 8th Concession. The speed drops to 50 km/h from the current 60.

King Road, from west of 8th Concession to east of Weston Road, also drops by 10 km/h to 70 km/h.

Other changes occur on Teston Road, from Pine Valley Drive to Jane Street, and Pine Valley, from Teston to Major Mackenzie.

"Studies show by lowering speed limits in appropriate areas, the amount and severity of collisions are reduced," said Richmond Hill Regional Councillor Vito Spatafora, chair of the Region's Transportation Services. "Monitoring and adjusting speed limits is one of many measures we have in place to increase the safety for all travellers, including red-light cameras and roundabouts."

Speed limits are monitored and reviewed regularly to ensure the designated speed is appropriate for road users. Some of the factors considered in the speed limit policy include visibility, traffic volume, pedestrian and cyclist exposure and the number of driveways.

Reasons for revising speed limits include changing land use, such as new developments and traffic patterns, limiting the number of speed changes within a short distance and improving traffic operations by increasing the amount of time drivers have to react to potential hazards.

To notify travellers of the speed limit changes, "new" signs will be posted above speed limit signs at the beginning of each changed speed zone.


Schomberg in the spotlight on popular TV drama Designated Survivor



IF A PERSON OR PUBLIC BODY does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the proposed official plan (or official plan amendment) is adopted, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

ANY PERSON may attend the public meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed Official Plan Amendment.

ith aging demographics and a steady increase in York Region population, the demand for healthcare professionals is on the rise. Seneca is preparing to meet the future needs of Ontarians with three new Honours Bachelor degrees in the healthcare field, beginning this fall.



Harbridge explained it's a historic partnership, a journey that began more than a year ago. The negotiations made for an "exciting journey."


The combined group includes between 600-700 players plus 300 coaches and volunteers, making it the largest community service organizations in King Township.

TD Friends of the Environment Foundation has generously donated \$24,867 for the Forest School and revitalization of the children's playgrounds at the King Observation Lab Teaching School (KOLTS) at King Campus.

The funding will be used to upgrade the playgrounds into natural, sustainable "playscapes" that will provide the children with places to climb, run, bike and explore nature. The community garden beds will be designed to accommodate children of all ages and will be planted with fruits and vegetables. They will teach children where food comes from and encourage healthy eating.

Both the playground and community gardens projects will be constructed by Seneca students from the Environment Landscape Management program as part of their experiential learning opportunities.

Funding will also support Forest School programming, where children spend part of their days in the forest where they play, explore and learn about the natural environment. In this natural space, children learn to maneuver through the forest terrain, they climb trees and balance on logs, while observing and learning about animals in their natural habitats.

King Campus provides the ideal setting for children to learn about land stewardship and nature appreciation. For the children, there is quick and easy access to water, trees, local fauna and creatures. They are encouraged to use what they find in nature as tools for learning and for their activities.

The movement for smart growth marks anniversary

This April 22 marked the 15th anniversary of a bold move that signaled a sea change in the public perception of the countryside - from an area of development-in-waiting to one where rural communities and natural functions were valued and protected. The Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan, released on Earth Day 2002 was the cornerstone piece in an emerging "smart growth" movement. It is hard to believe, but just two decades ago ideas like stopping urban sprawl and protecting water supplies were considered radical. Those of us campaigning to protect the Oak Ridges Moraine were often viewed as whackos.

While building for more than a decade, our movement solidified in February 2000 as greedy developers and the Town of Richmond Hill were set to pave over the last remaining moraine lands along Yonge Street. This sprawling development would have totally cut off the natural east-west connectivity and compromised the moraine's ecological integrity. The proposal proved to be the spark that ignited protests downstream, through communities across the GTA.

By December 2001, the Oak Ridges Moraine Act was passed through an all-party, unanimous vote in Ontario's Legislature. This was the watershed moment for the movement to protect the water, nature and communities of

the entire region.

Decades earlier, the movement to protect the Niagara Escarpment demonstrated the need for provincial oversight of regional planning. The iconic cliff faces and 725-kilometre continuous natural corridor of the escarpment were vulnerable to development from gravel companies. Community leaders like Lyn MacMillan and thought leaders like Len Gertler fought for escarpment protection across municipal jurisdictions. This campaign's watershed moment came as a hole was blasted through the escarpment, dubbed the "Dufferin Gap," which is still visible from Highway 401 when driving west through Halton. The Niagara Escarpment Plan that followed established a planning framework informed by landscape ecology - an unheard of approach in Ontario at that point.

Building off of regional approaches to planning pioneered on the Niagara Escarpment and Oak Ridges Moraine, came the much larger Greenbelt in 2005. The Greenbelt knit together the ecological jewels of the Escarpment and the Moraine, adding protection to agricultural land and a natural system of wetlands, forest and valley lands surrounding the GTA. The Greenbelt, currently spans nearly 2 million acres, is a inspired vision for the region. These plans were intended to protect the region's most valuable natural and agricultural resources, and stop ever expanding urban sprawl across the

vision for the region is a testament to the bold thinking of three different provincial governments and dedicated activists spanning decades.

However, it is becoming painfully obvious that the bold vision of the last decades will not be enough for the decades ahead. Urban sprawl has leapt over the Greenbelt, threatening farmland and natural lands in areas including Brant, Simcoe, Waterloo and Wellington counties. Currently, hundreds of thousands of acres of agricultural land that provide essential ecological services are slated to be developed over the next 20 years. Sprawl marches on.

In the same spirit and tradition that brought forward protection for the Oak Ridges Moraine, Niagara Escarpment and Greenbelt, a new wave of activists are calling for provincial intervention to protect other moraine systems across the Greater Golden Horseshoe. These lands are critical but becoming increasingly vulnerable due to urban sprawl. Bold leadership is again needed to stop

Greater Golden Horseshoe. This bold the city from gobbling up the countryside and our vital water supplies. We need a bigger and better Greenbelt.

> This movement that started with the first clarion call to protect the Niagara Escarpment in the 1970s, inspired the Oak Ridges Moraine warriors of the 1990s and laid the foundation for the creation of the Greenbelt in the early

> As we celebrate the legacy of 15 years of Oak Ridges Moraine protection we are urging the government to pick up the baton to plan for the future. In the coming weeks we will see whether the government will grow the Greenbelt to protect vulnerable water supplies or slow the momentum for strong landscape protection that has been building for decades.



Horticulture By John Arnott

It was the bright red flower that first caught my eye and that made me inquisitive enough to find out more about this intriguing plant. I discovered it was tropical, a house plant and expensive [anything over 20 bucks in the plant line is expensive to me! But then I struck it lucky when I found a handsome one and on sale sitting just inside the door at Woodbridge No Frills on Hwy. 27 for only \$6.99. You guessed it I bought it. Since then anthuriums have become my favourite house plant. Their splashes of bright red brighten even the dullest of winter days.

There are some 1,000 species of anthuriums all native to the Americas from northern Mexico to northern Argentina where they are often found growing in partially shaded outdoor gardens and in a variety of soils. In our region all are house plants. Most every anthuriums has a prominent finger shaped spike called spadix covered in very tiny flowers. But it is the spathe or a bract an adapted leaf at the base of each spike that gives the plant its colour. Some anthuriums are epiphytes meaning plants that grow other plants but are not parasites as they take the moisture and nutrients they need from the air, rain and debris that collects in crevices where they grow not from the plant they grow on. Some tropical orchids and ferns are epiphytes. The botanical name, anthurium, comes from the Greek for tail flower referring to the spadix. Other popular names for this tropical include flamingo flower, tail flower and jokingly "boy flower." Most often these plants are sold under their botanical name

Only 2 anthuriums have the vivid red spathes I so like, those being A. andraeanum named for Edouard Andre a 19th century French horticulturist and A.schezerianum named for Karl Von Schezer 19th century Austrian natural scientist and explorer in Central America. These 2 species are the ones most commonly found for sale in supermarkets and year round garden centres in our area.

Hybrids developed from them have dust or insects.

spathes ranging in colour from white through coral to burgundy. But for me it's the red that is the winner! It's the red heart shaped spathes against the rich green heart shaped leaves never fail to give me a lift especially dull cloudy mornings.

Anthurium is generally speaking an easy care plant. Indoors they are low light tolerant but prefer good light just not direct light. As houseplants they like a soil rich in organic matter and need to be watered once every two weeks to keep this soil moist. However, one source I researched recommends their soil dry out slightly between waterings. Once established with good root systems, and this is usually the case with potted plants for sale, anthuriums benefit from a weak solution of fertilizer every 2 to 3 weeks. The large green heart shaped leaves benefit from being wiped with a clean cloth dampened in luke warm water to clean off

Ford continues to knock its competition out by focusing on the key traits their F-250's have been known for: brutish power and their payload capacity. But this year, the 2017 Ford Super Duty will have an aluminum construction bringing it into the modern era of trucks.

This redesign is the first one in quite a long time, and it has a lot of impressive changes, especially with it's up to 440 horsepower and 925 lb-ft of torque, and can carry up to 7630 pounds in the bed or 32,500 pounds on a trailer depending on the model.

The Super Duty comes standard with a 6.2-litre V-8 engine, and with an optional 6.7-litre turbo-diesel V-8 engine (the one capable of towing up to 32,500 l bs).

Despite its size, the truck has an incredibly quiet ride and offers the options of a regular, SuperCab or Crew Cab. The truck bed comes in two sizes as well—6.75-ft and 8.0-ft bed.

Drivers will have the ability to keep tabs on their surroundings with the up to seven cameras available on the Super Duty. Of those cameras, there is a 360-degree bird's-eye view provided by four HD cameras.

Keepingupwiththecurrentsafetytrends, the 2017 Super Duty employs blind-spot warning, modified with the trailer tow in order to account for the length of the trailer. Other options include adaptive cruise control with automatic breaking, in-cap tire-pressure monitoring, and a lane-departure warning. The latter three are making their appearance in the Super Duty for the first time.

Ford is calling their 2017 model the toughest and smartest Super Duty yet. Its military-grade aluminum alloy helped slash the weight of the body, allowing Ford to reinvest in a frame built of a high-strength steel that they boast is 24 times stiffer than the previous frame. The intelligence comes into play with the seven cameras, Cross-Traffic Alert, Lane-Keeping and Collision Warning with brake support.

Otherchangesincludestrongeraxles, an upgrade to the suspension and steering, and larger breaks.

Prices will start at \$39,099 for the base model of the 2017 Ford Super Duty.
