

The proposed Official Plan Amendment and Zoning By-law Amendment applications submitted by Evans Planning on behalf of the owner, 2472498 Ontario Limited, under Planning Files OP-2016-05 and Z-2016-18 concern a site located on the east side of Keele Street, at the north east corner of Clearview Crescent and consisting of two vacant residential lots and one commercial lot operating as a gas station. Together the site measures approximately 0.44 hectares (1.08 acres) with approximately 97 metres of frontage on Keele Street.

The subject lots are designated 'Core Area' and 'Existing Commercial Area' by the King City Community Plan (OPA #540) and are zoned Urban Residential (R1) by Zoning By-law #74-53, as amended. The purpose of the Official Plan Amendment application is to provide site specific policies to provide for a residential density of 109 units per hectare and permit a building height of four (4) stories to provide for a development consisting of forty-eight (48) stacked townhomes. The purpose of the Zoning By-law Amendment application is to establish a medium density zone which provides for the proposed housing types and establishes site specific provisions to implement the development. An application for Site Plan Control has also been submitted which details the proposed layout and design for the site. The owner intends to remove the existing commercial gas station and garage and construct a single full access entrance from Clearview Crescent.

APPEAL PROCEDURE

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the proposed Official Plan Amendment is adopted, and the By-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of Council of The Corporation of the Township of King to the Ontario Municipal Board.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to The Corporation of the Township of King before the proposed Official Plan Amendment is adopted and the By-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public



York board takes action in response to ministry report

Trustees with the York Region District School Board (YRDSB) responded quickly to a much-anticipated, and somewhat harsh Ministry of Education report on the YRDSB conduct.

The report is the culmination of several months of interviews with board staff, trustees, parents, and students, and was initiated at the direction of Ontario's Minister of Education, Mitzie Hunter.

"Message received, loud and clear," said YRDSB board chair Loralea Carruthers, speaking on behalf of all YRDSB trustees. "We are grateful the Ministry's report has been released, and would like to thank the Ministry of Education staff for their dedication and professionalism.

"... as a board, we have immediately begun discussions on how to implement some of the report's key recommendations. We have seen within the report some significant errors of fact that we have raised directly with the Minister. In addition, we are seeking clarification on a number of points," Carruthers added. "That said, we want parents and students to be assured this report will not be ignored in any way, shape or form. Our primary mission has been, and continues to be, the education and well-being of our students.

On behalf of the board of trustees, I apologize. As the elected chair of the board, I take responsibility for what happened, and for what will happen

"I can say that all of the trustees - every one of us – are on the same page. We are united, working together on a clear path, and will begin taking action immediately.

"It won't be action behind closed doors. There have been too many closed doors. We are committed to moving forward in an open and transparent manner to restore public confidence in our Board and ensure we are providing our students with a safe, inclusive and welcoming learning environment."

The board has established committees to immediately deal with racism, anti-Semitism, homophobia and Islamophobia.

They are ceasing international and "jurisdictional travel" immediately for senior staff and trustees.

"We have met with respected equity

experts to commence action to develop comply with the directions, I may exerand implement a full equity plan.

"We have taken action on a comprehensive equity audit.

"We are hiring an integrity commis-

"We have agreed to a tough arm'slength trustee assessment process.

"We have committed to a comprehensive equity training strategy.'

The recommendations in the Ministry's report cover a range of issues such as racism, equity, transparency, accountability, as well as the work of senior board staff and trustees.

Ontario Minister of Education Mitzie Hunter said she is "very pleased" with efforts the trustees made in dealing with complaints related to bias and misspending at the school board.

"I am very pleased to see that (trustees) are moving forward and want to take action in a positive direction," she said. "They understand the need to restore confidence in the York Region School Board."

In January, Minister Hunter appointed Patrick Case and Suzanne Herbert to conduct an urgent review of the York Region District School Board (YRDSB) and asked them to provide observations and recommendations regarding concerns around governance and equity, which have impacted public confidence in the board.

The results "deeply concerned" the education minister. "In particular, the report describes feelings of alienation, marginalization and discrimination expressed by many of the board's students, parents, staff and members of the community. The board's leadership - including the trustees and the director – must take the actions necessary to address these concerns.

"Let me be clear: racism in our schools and school boards is not acceptable. Ontario's students and parents must have assurances that their schools are safe and welcoming places to learn, and that they are environments of inclusivity and respect."

Hunter called the issues within the YRDSB as "severe." The eight immediate remedial actions were ministry directives.

Hunter vows to closely monitor the progress and compliance on each direction carefully.

"And if I have concerns that the board is not complying, or may not

cise my authority to take further action against the board.:

The board worked with ministry staff throughout the review.

"We saw this report as an opportunity to develop a more welcoming and inclusive environment for our students, while maintaining the high academic standards our students are well known for," Carruthers said.

While the review was still being conducted YRDSB took several steps to show a greater dedication to diversity and respect for the diverse community the board serves. A monthly public forum for community feedback was reinstated; community working groups have been established to report to Trustees on addressing classism, anti-black racism, Islamophobia, and anti-Semitism; and board meetings now begin with an acknowledgement of traditional Indigenous lands.

"There is no more time to waste," concluded Carruthers. "Our kids need an education that is the best we can give - and an environment free of bias.

We pledge today, unequivocally, to give them that."

Parenting requires tilting your head a bit

"Be happy. Stop being who you are!" These words came not from a parent or counsellor.

These were uttered by my 11-year-old daughter, who tried to get me out of a funk recently. She's quite astute, even though she's still struggling with preteen emotions and doesn't really have a handle on grown-up issues.

A lack of self-confidence, dented by a childhood filled with awkwardness and acne, still lingers in this older soul.

I'd call myself a classic under-achiever, despite my intelligence. I had book smarts, and many years in the journalism business gave me a certain amount of "wisdom." I compensated for any self-perceived shortcomings with a rapier-sharp wit and sense of humour. No, humility has never been a problem!

We have a great education and support system in this province of ours. We have some great mentors, if we know where to look and how to appreciate them. We have many resources to draw upon for information, social etiquette and interaction. Our kids today have access to many tools to help them succeed and be decent social creatures.

And yet, stress among our teens is at an all-time high. Depression is rampant. Bullying, despite all efforts to stamp out this evil, still exists.

Our children are taught many things, but nowhere in any curriculum is there a course on self-esteem.

This fragile ingredient is perhaps one of the most important human qualities. Self-esteem, which translates into passion, confidence, assertiveness and drive, serves a person so well in life. And yet there is nowhere a person can go to get their fill, or even a top-up of this vital fuel for the soul.

equipped to feed our children their daily requirements of such things. We spoon-feed them a diet of encouragement, ego-inflating words of praise and we temper our harshness, all in the name of protecting their fragile egos. We dance around, worrying about damaging them for life.

I'm often criticized by my better half for not being supportive enough, or saying the wrong thing. I believe that kids need an equal amount of support and honest criticism. I don't believe that holding their hands all the time will sufficiently motivate them to take risks, study hard or climb the ladder. They need a reality check from time to time, and I believe it's my job to give it to them. Province on track to balance the budget as economy continues to grow

Charles Sousa, Minister of Finance, announced today that he will deliver the 2017 Ontario Budget on April 27. The Budget will outline the government's plan to create a stronger, healthier Ontario through investments in key services that help people and their families.

Minister Sousa made the announcement during a speech to the Empire Club of Canada in Toronto, and provided an update on Ontario's economic growth. According to the Fourth Quarter Ontario Economic Accounts, the province's real GDP increased by 2.7 per cent in 2016, outpacing Canada's increase of 1.4 per cent, higher than all the G7 countries and beating private-sector forecasters' projections.


Ontario has been one of the fastest-growing provinces over the past three years, and private-sector economists expect that will continue for at least another two years. Since the recessionary low in June 2009, Ontario has added nearly 700,000 jobs, the majority of which are in full-time positions and in the private sector.

Balancing the budget in 2017-18 is part of Ontario's plan to continue to create jobs, grow the economy and help people in their everyday lives.

With a balanced budget the government will continue to do more to help with everyday costs, including a proposed new refundable public transit tax credit for seniors.

Ontario's real gross domestic product (GDP) increased 0.5 per cent in the fourth quarter, after rising 0.7 per cent in the third.

The Ontario Economic Accounts provide a quarterly assessment of the state of Ontario's economy. The fourth quarter spans October to December.

The amendment seeks to provide the property with zoning standards consistent with the 'Core Area (CA)' zone in addition to expanding the permitted uses on the property from exclusively business/professional offices to also include, but not limited to, retail, institutional, and mixed uses, in accordance with By-law 2016-71, while recognizing the existing sideyard encroachments of 1.73 metres on the north side of the property and 0.6 metres on the south side of the property.

APPEAL PROCEDURE

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the by-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of the Township of King Council to the Ontario Municipal Board.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting, or make written submissions to the Township of King before the proposed zoning by-law amendment is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to do so.


Any person may attend the public meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed Zoning By-law Amendment.

Private sponsorship of refugees and its success

The hope of a fleeing refugee is eventually to find a friendly, welcoming face in a new country. Canadians are those friendly faces for many. But how did Canada's private refugee program begin? Why is it so successful today?

The Canadian people have not always been welcoming. In 1939, the government of the time had said "none is too many" when turning away 907 Jewish refugees aboard the M.S. St. Louis outside Halifax.

When the Vietnamese crisis was horrifying Canadians in 1979, Ambassador Mike Malloy and other senior immigration officials met in his Ottawa living room to consider their response. They were determined not to repeat the tragedy of 1939.

At first they thought to write a letter asking the government to meet the refugee need. But they soon decided to just step up and sponsor 50 refugees themselves. They used a new government provision allowing groups of five

Canadians to personally sponsor refugees. Instead of asking for change, they became the change.

Their example struck a chord with the government which then offered to match Canadians' private sponsorships. Mayor Marion Dewar and the city of Ottawa raised the bar higher by sponsoring 4,000 boat people. By 1985, 110,000 Indochinese had found safety in Canada, and Canada's private sponsorship model was born.

Canadians are proud of our humanitarian example. After the Vietnamese boat people crisis, the Canadian people were honoured with the UNHCR Nansen Refugee Award. Canada is the only country ever to earn this distinction. A special team from the UN is now studying our unique private sponsorship model in order to share our successes with other nations. Ambassador Malloy, who stick-handled Canada's boat people re-settlement efforts, simply says "There is nothing magic about our system. The magic is in our people."

The current Syrian crisis is challenging Canadians today. Of the 25,000 refugees that the government has pledged newcomers are successfully employed to settle, almost 40% will be privately sponsored. In private sponsorship, newcomer families are matched with Canadian citizens who commit to meeting their financial needs for their first year, as well as helping them adapt to life in Canada. All newcomers, publicly and privately sponsored, become permanent residents upon arrival and are eligible for health care, education, language classes and access to Canada's social safety net.

Participating in private sponsorship benefits both the newcomers and their Canadian community. While finding the newcomers a house and furniture, teaching them about taking transit and about Canadian culture, working on language skills, going shopping, enrolling in school and many other activities - friendships grow. Privately sponsored newcomers integrate into Canadian life more quickly than publicly sponsored newcomers. Community members become personally involved and more tolerant.

after one year, compared to only 20% of government sponsored newcomers. This is partly due to the extra support they receive from their new Canadian friends.

"We appreciate every single help and assistance given to us from every individual in the group," wrote the first sponsored family, thanking King for Refugees. During their initial year they found employment and were welcomed by several local communities.

Now, King for Refugees is starting the welcome cycle again with a new family of 10 from Syria. For all refugees of any nationality who meet Canada's security, medical and refugee criteria, King Township is a more practical match for bigger families than cities because available housing is often larger outside urban centres.





Metrolinx is making a huge investment in transit

Increased GO service to King is part of the grand scheme by Metrolinx to up the ante in terms of transit options in the GTHA.

King councillors and staff received an update by Metrolinx staff recently, and there are some big plans for the King City GO station.

Nick Spensieri, Metrolinx's director of corridor infrastructure, said now is the time to make investments in York and the GTHA. Their ultimate goal is to have residents live within 2 kilometres

of rapid transit. Metrolinx's plans will new kiss & ride drop-off, new platform, not only substantially increase service, but provide jobs and an infusion into the local economies.

It's all part of the ambitious plan to create more than 1,200 kilometres of rapid transit. There are more than 400 rapid transit projects currently under way. The largest local component is a double track, providing 15-minute, twoway, all-day service between Union Station and Aurora.

To make this happen, Metrolinx is planning upgrades to the King City station, including 500 new parking spots, a

two new pedestrian bridges and bicycle facilities. Preliminary design work is under way with construction slated to start in 2019, an completion pegged for

This massive construction will result in disruption in the community, but it's hard to say just what that will be at this point. Metrolinx is committed to working with King Township officials to minimize impacts and inconvenience during the next few years.

"We're working closely with local municipalities to understand the impact of construction-related disruption as part of our project planning and are committed to minimizing the impact by providing alternative solutions wherever possible."

Councillor Cleve Mortelliti said he's very excited about this and what it means to King residents. Noise and impacts to local residents do concern him, however. He wanted to know about measures to reduce whistle and train noise. as well as vibrations.

Erin Moroz, communications and public affairs with Metrolinx. said more trains will result in more noise, but they're willing to work with King related to whistle noise mitigation.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer wanted to see some vibration and noise mitigation data. The use of train whistles is governed by Transport Canada rules and regulations and King will have to work with the federal government on this.

Moroz said Metrolinx will have some studies available to council within a month or so.

Spensieri added that with the work comes new technology and this will go a long way to reducing squealing, vibration and track noise.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini said it will be nice to see so many new parking spots in King City. He mentioned to Metrolinx staff that King will need their help in installing Internet fibre, through rail crossings, as York continues to improve its broadband service. Spensieri said they can work with King to help expedite the process when the time comes.

"It will be fabulous when it all comes together," the mayor said.

Neighbourhood Network works with the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority and municipalities to determine the planting locations and fundraise for the trees.



Kelly Mathews is Manager of Community Recreation, Camps and Outdoor Centre for Seneca. She is also one of the first members of the circle.



King roads to get upgrades

King roads will be getting a new top coat, thanks to decisions by King council recently.

Councillors approved the work for top coat asphalt on Collard Drive, Scott Crescent and Winter Road. C. Valley Paving Ltd., as the lowest bidder, will do the work for an estimated \$179,800.

A total of 14 bids were submitted and ranged from C. Valley Paving's winning bid, to one that topped \$316,000.

King's 2017 capital budget allocated \$210,000 for the work.

The three roads are all connected and run east of Jane Street, south of King near the King Vaughan Townline.

King Township will resurface four roads this year.

Councillors approved a staff recommendation to award a \$660,000 contract to Forest Contractors Ltd. for resurfacing "various roads" in King.

Forest was the lowest of 11 bidders for the work. Some \$700,000 was earmarked in the 2017 budget for the work. Some surplus funds – roughly \$65,000 – was generated through HST rebates and staff will use this money for extra needed road work.

The areas picked by staff include Kettleby Road, east of Jane; Woodchoppers Lane between Jane and Keele; the 19th Sideroad between the 11th Concession and 10th Concession, and Keele Street, from Highway 9 to just north of Woodchoppers Lane.



Jazz artist Saunders and friends will really get your toes tapping

"Life is a lot like jazz ... it's best when you improvise." – George Gershwin

Music is immersing yourself in the moment. Jazz is bringing a smile to your soul.

Saunders, a self-taught musical virtuoso, has been hooked on jazz since he was 15. The traditional Dixieland jazz is "happy stuff" to Saunders, who just can't get enough of this intoxicating blend. Saunders never learned how to read music and he even admits he uses "all the wrong fingers." But the result is almost magical, the moment he sits in front of his Steinway.

chart," he said with a smile.

He learned how to play the piano simply by watching others at his boarding school. He picked it up like a prodigy. To this day, he improvises. He understands the cord progression and template, which he sees as a "trellis on which to hang the melody."

Saunders put together his first band in 1959 and kept "very busy having fun" at private functions, weddings and corporate events. By day, Saunders was the consummate professional – a commercial insurance expert. By night, he was footloose and fancy free, doing what came naturally. Saunders's music has been an important part of him all of his life.

As a purist, Saunders travelled around the world, playing with some of the industry's greats.

He visited the shrine of North American jazz - Preservation Hall in the

French Quarter of New Orleans. His hosts coerced him to play for some time that night.

"I loved it," he said, recalling the night's impromptu performance.

Preservation Hall continues the mission today as a cornerstone of New Orleans music and culture. It draws visitors from all over to their nightly concerts.

Saunders also mentioned he spent 20 minutes speaking with jazz great Eddie Condon at his club in New York. Condon is credited with creating a sophisticated variation on Dixieland music.

"It was like conversing with God," Saunders admitted.

At their home in rural King, Saunders and his wife Valerie have hosted many high-profile visitors and musicians from across the globe. Valerie joined Adam in his love of jazz and she was one of the founders of the Classical Jazz Society of Toronto.

He has combined his love of flying with music and just might be seen landing his float plane in the Muskokas, Georgian Bay or Temagami for a gig.

The Adam Saunders' Jazz Band includes some of Adam's most respected colleagues and friends. Distinguished performers in their own right, they are a dynamic team always promising a "I play from the heart, not from the lively event. 

Learn-to-play lacrosse program coming to Nobleton

The first steps are under way to implement lacrosse into the Township of King.

A 10-week learn-to-play and development program will begin in late April for ages 4-14 of all skill levels, run out of Nobleton Arena.

"I am thrilled to see Lacrosse added to King Township's roster of recreational programs," said Councillor David Boyd. "This is a fantastic opportunity for our young residents to learn to play Canada's national summer sport and participate locally. It's a great sport for both girls and boys to enjoy. I hope the community embraces and supports this program."

"We're excited," said Adam Viola, recreation coordinator for the Township of King. "It's something new. It's something the area has needed for a long time."

According to Viola, as it currently stands, most minor lacrosse players travel to either Caledon for the Bandits program or Newmarket for the Redbirds program to play.

"A lot of people, especially the beginners, are often thinking 'well, I don't know yet if I want to do it or not.' So we're giving them that opportunity to make that decision."

Word of mouth was the driving force to get the project off the ground, with local residents expressing their desire for a more local program. Viola reached out to a number of lacrosse organizations in the area to get an idea of how to get started.

"I contacted the Redbirds in Newmarket, and they set me up with Next Level Lacrosse. They do learn to play programs and videos. We've partnered with them, and they have the instructors, and we're going to take care of the registration part of it."

Next Level brings with it a staff of experienced ex and current professional lacrosse players, as well as coaches with decades of experience behind the bench. A simple search for Next Level Lacrosse in Youtube will bring up videos of drills and plays taught to the program's students.

You can also learn more about the program at www.nextlevellacrosse.ca.

Sessions will run for one hour each week, the first 30 minutes consisting of skill development while scrimmages will round out the remaining floor time.

"No matter if you're new, or experienced, there's always drills that they can teach you," said Viola. "It's for anybody."

Even for those on the fence about taking up lacrosse, past history proves that the hand-eye coordination learned in lacrosse can be transferred to other sports, like hockey.

"So many great NHL players played lacrosse," said Viola, referencing NHLers like Wayne Gretzky and John Tavares. "It just teaches you proper hand-eye and motor skills."

Registration is already open for the program, and can be done online on the Township of King website. Alternately, registration can be done in person at either Trisan Centre in Schomberg or at Nobleton Arena.

Fees are \$190 including a lacrosse stick, or \$160 if providing your own. Sessions run every Monday night beginning April 24.



The butter, sugar and cinnamon represents the spices used to prepare the body for burial. The marshmallow represents Jesus's body. Combining the butter, brown sugar and cinnamon into a paste, you paint the crescent roll on the inside, then insert the marshmallow and wrap the crescent dough tightly around the marshmallow. After the roll is cooked for 15 minutes in the tomb or oven, you cut open the roll and the marshmallow is gone, just like Jesus's body in the tomb on Easter morning!

The church was filled on Wednesday to honour the life of Allan Crossley who died unexpectedly at home on Saturday, April 8 at the age of 93. Rev. Evelyn McLachlan delivered the homily and chronicled the many achievements of this remarkable man including raising a family of six, operating a large dairy

farm, flying his own airplane and still finding time to be a Big Brother! Amazing for such a quiet busy man. One of Allan's little brothers attended the funeral and said: "I can't say enough good things about Allan. I didn't appreciate what he did when I was 6 but now 40 vears later I realize what a sacrifice he made for me."

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


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

Anglican Parish By John Arnott

Dawn on a soft April morning that promises to be mild and sunny there in the green rolling countryside of northeastern France where a rise of land some 7 km. long with a height of some 500 ft./145 m at its highest point stands silent as the first rays of sun tint gold the white limestone of a magnificent monument it clasps. This rise, which looks out over miles of country, has seen prehistoric Celts, Romans and Franks come and go with the flow of history but perhaps nothing so brave and tragic as the band of men to be remembered, thanked and honoured this spring day. For this rise of land is blood soaked Vimy Ridge.

Dawn on a cold grey April morning, 100 years ago. that promises sleet and snow 98,000 Canadian soldiers with their British back-up await the order

to begin the assault on this rise of land strongly fortified by the enemy entrenched on its heights. The command to advance rings out and out of muddy, squalid trenches the Canadians scramble. The bloody battle for Vimy Ridge begins. This was the first time during World War 1 that all four divisions of the Canadian army – men, many still in their teens, from across the country including King Township, came together and fought together.

Wicked machine gun fire and artillery blasts from both sides cut through cold air as the Canadians inched their way up the forbidding ridge. The wintry like weather condition actually helped them as the sleet turning to snow blew into enemy faces who now threw all their available resources, including poisonous gas which cruelly decimated the horses being used, into the battle but by evening April 9 (Easter Monday) much of the ridge was in Canadian hands. In spite of fierce enemy resistance on the second day Canadians captured the the ridge crest as well as strategic town of Thelus. On day three a heavily defended knoll near the village of Givenchyen-Gohelle fell to Canadians as did the vllage. Only the high point on the ridge nicknamed "the Pimple" remained in enemy hands but by the end of the fourth day the Canadians had taken it. Now the enemy retreated. Vimy Ridge, that had held out against both French and British attempts to take it, had fallen to the Canadians.

But at what cost, the St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes with sorrow, some 3,500 Canadians were killed and over 7.000 wounded. And on the other side German casualties were were 20,000 dead or wounded.

For their gallantry at Vimy Ridge Canadians, Captain Thain Macdowell, Private William Milne, Private John Pat- Peru. As well it is now believed to be tison and Lance Sergeant Ellis Sifton were each awarded the highest military honour possible. the Victoria Cross.

Only Macdowell survived the war. Milne's remains were never recovered.

General Georg Wichura and Obersteutnant (Lieutenant Colonel) Wilhelm von Goerne were awarded Prussia's (Germany) highest award the Pour le Merite.

The Canadian victory at Vimy Ridge helped turn the tide of the war in favour of the allies. And in November the following year, 1918, the Great War ended bringing a bitterly won brief peace that would dissolve just 21 years later when an even more horrific war would scourge and scar the world.

But the victory at Vimy Ridge was Canada's coming of age. As Prime Minister of the day, Sir Robert Borden, put it to the British and other allies – "if you want our help call us to your councils." His persistence persuaded the British in spite of American reluctance to give Canada a seat, a voice and a signature at the peace talks that resulted in the signing of the Treaty of Versailles officially ending World War 1. Canada had taken its rightful place on the world stage.

Horticulture By John Arnott

Royal Canadian Navy's HMCS Saskatoon made headlines when it took part in a drug bust off the coast of South America that resulted in the seizure of cocaine worth over \$500 million on the illicit open market.

Coca, the source cocaine, is a shrub native to the Andean region of South America growing principally in Colombia, Argentina, Bolivia, Ecuador and grown in southern Mexico.

Long before the arrival of Europeans, First Nations people in South America cultivated the 4 species of coca we know today and of those 4 only one is still found growing wild. Coca leaves were used for medical and religious purposes usually chewed or in a tea like drink both having a mildly hallucinatory affect that took the edge off hunger, relieved pain and gave workers more stamina. This use is thought to have a history going back some 8,000 years. Traces of coca have been found in 3,000-year-old Andean mummies. But to produce the horrific drug used today the coca leaves need to be treated with several solvents and chemical processes not available to the pre-Columbian indigenous people.

The original Coca Cola formula used coca leaves still containing minute amounts of the drug, but since 1929 any cocaine in leaves is extracted.

The coca shrub can grow 7 to 10 ft./2 to 3 m high. Its small dark green oval shaped leaves are much like those of the European buckthorn tree that grows wild here in King. The plant carries clusters of small flowers each having 5 yellowish white petals that eventually produce small bright red seed holding berries.

Coca grow best in hot damp, humid areas. But the leaves producing the highest grade cocaine come from shrubs grown on slopes where condition are somewhat drier.

Well hidden coca plantations often only accessible by air are sprayed with herbicide designed to kill the plants but highly qualified horticulturists and chemists working for drug cartels have developed herbicide resistant cultivars.







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


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
