## King pushes for lights at Greenside and King Road

By Mark Pavilons

King councillors voted to install traffic lights at a Nobleton intersection, despite a lack of support from York Region.

Council voted to approve the signals at Greenside Drive and King Road and the Township has offered to pick up the tab. York Region must give their permission before the project can proceed. York, on several occasions, indicated this particular intersection doesn't meet the minimum warrants set up by Regional staff.

A regional policy change roughly 18 months ago indicates York won't consider these projects if they're not warranted. Word from the Region indicates they may entertain the idea if King is adamant.

King wants to move ahead immediately and they're asking York for its approval. The Township will fund the costs through its capital budget. The work is estimated to cost \$250,000.

Councillor David Boyd said he's pleased with the move, noting it will be a big plus in assisting pedestrian safety. It will be a big step forward if York gives its blessing.

"We're optimistic," Boyd said. "We're doing what we can to get the lights in."

Residents and politicians have pushed hard for traffic lights at this intersection, which would offer some traffic relief for the nearby subdivision. It's been an issue for years and given the increased volume of traffic, it's become a safety

York Region conducted a study for the lights in 2016, but the numbers failed to generate a need or meet their criteria.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of King passed By-law Number #2017-51 on the 29th day of May, 2017 under Section 34 of the Planning Act, R.S.O, 1990, Chapter P.13. Zoning By-law Amendment #2017-51 amends the Township's Zoning By-law for the Nobleton Urban Area (By-law 2016-71, as amended).

By-law 2017-51 concerns a parcel of land located on the east side of Highway 27, south of King Road. The subject lands are identified as 12959 Highway 27 and measure 0.197 acres (0.8 hectares). The property currently features a detached dwelling and garage. The intent of the zoning by-law amendment is to amend the Township's Zoning By-law for the Nobleton Urban Area (By-law 2016-71, as amended) to rezone the property from 'Core Area - Exception CA-6' to 'Core Area - Exception CA-6' to expand the permitted uses on the property from exclusively business/professional offices to include the full complement of Core Area permitted uses, while recognizing the existing sideyard encroachments of 1.73 metres on the north side of the property and 0.6 metres on the south side of the property.

AND TAKE NOTICE that any person or agency may appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board in respect of the by-law by filing with the Clerk of the Corporation of the Township of King not later than the 19th day of June, 2017 a notice of appeal setting out the objection to the by-law and the reasons in support of the objections, together with 1 cheque in the amount of \$300.00 (certified cheque or money order only) payable to the Minister of Finance to cover the Ontario Municipal Board fee, and a cheque for \$210.00 representing the Clerk's Department administrative fee, payable to the Township of King. If you wish to appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board, a copy of an appeal form is available from the Ontario Municipal Board website at www.omb.gov.on.ca or from the Clerk of the Township of King. Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a by-law to the Ontario Municipal Board. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

No person or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Municipal Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

Comments received and considered in the preparation of By-law 2017-51 from the public were summarized and included in the Planning Department Recommendation Report (P-2017-21). The report is available on the Township's website www.king.ca. Comments received were in relation to potential concerns with respect to access, parking and overall congestion within the Nobleton village core area. If the property is redeveloped in the future it will be subject to Site Plan Development Control through which staff can require additional information from the applicant including, but not limited to, grading and drainage plans, tree inventory and preservation plans, and planting plans as well as ensure that additional items such as adequate parking are addressed prior to the site's redevelopment.

#### Advanced Metering Infrastructure program

Contractors will be making the rounds of King Township over the next 6 to 8 weeks, installing a new feature on water meters.

This Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) is being implemented to enable the township to better manage and monitor metered water consumption. It will also help King proactively troubleshoot metering problems instead of waiting for the quarterly billing submissions.

For example, before AMI installation, an underground leak in a pipe might not be discovered until a scheduled meter reading shows a huge spike in consumption. Under the AMI system, a dramatic increase in water consumption would be flagged almost immediately.

Installations are on the outside of buildings. The contractor or township staff may have to arrange for entry to some sites.

## C150 Global Odyssey will be a technological marvel

The crunch is on with only one month remaining before the historic 150 Global Odyssey lifts off.

This adventure will set new records in many respects, not the least of which involve technological navigation and communications systems.

Kingscross resident Steven Dengler and his father Bob have created the C150 Global Odyssey (C150GO). It will be the world's first Canadian aroundthe-world helicopter flight, and the first-ever father-son global circumnavigation by any light aircraft.

In celebration of Canada's 150th anniversary, the Canadian crew - comprised of Bob, Steven, and helicopter ace Rob "Dugal" MacDuff - will fly a Canadian-made Bell 429 helicopter over 38,000 kilometres in just over one month. Starting in Ottawa on July 1 and zigzagging the globe, the crew will visit more than 100 airports in 14 countries. Along the way, they will be joined by notable Canadians such as astronaut Dave Williams and hockey legend Guy Lafleur.

Dengler's mind is racing as fast as those chopper blades, in anticipation of the launch one month today.

This ultimate father-and-son road trip will also boast several technological firsts in modern aviation.

Major sponsor Honeywell has supplied an innovative Aspire 200 unit that will be tested and evaluated on a Bell 429 for the first time. It is the first broadband Internet communication system for a helicopter. This system has virtually eliminated the minute signal delay caused by the rotating blades, resulting in near-perfect, real time communications.

The Bell 429 Global Ranger is a military grade helicopter, used by many search and rescue organizations. Such a fool-proof communications system would be extremely valuable. "Imagine the possibilities," Dengler said. The system will be tested during the journey.

As well, providing unlimited satellite service is Inmarsat, the industry leader and pioneer of mobile satellite communications.

The amount of interest and support in this landmark adventure is simply "amazing."

Dengler is quite excited about the trip, adding it's been a ton of work. There have been mountains of paperwork, including permits, documents and obtaining permission from several foreign countries and governments.

One of the most interesting parts of the journey will be the long trek through Russia. They've spent more than a year working with Russian officials and will have a Russian navigator with them during this leg of the trip. Their contact in Russia did say this is a "dream trip through the most beautiful part of Russia."

Dengler is looking forward to a stop at the Maple Leaf, a popular pub in London, England that's a home base for Canadian ex-patriots.

He's also looking forward to hope-

fully stopping at two French war memorials - Vimy Ridge and the Beaumont-Hamel Newfoundland Memorial.

There are a ton of interesting landmarks along the way, including many in Canada such as the Confederation Bridge, Alexander Graham Bell National Historic Site in Baddeck, Nova Scotia, and Signal Hill National Historic Site in St. John's, Newfoundland.

As a Canadian, Dengler can't wait to see all of these wonderful parts of our beautiful nation's history, and document them for all to see. All Canadians can join them by following C150GO on social media staring July 1.

The entire trip will be documented via video and still photography, as well as social media. Also travelling with the crew will be renowned Canadian photographer Peter Bregg, who has captured life over his 50-year career. Bregg received the Order of Canada in 2016 and during his career has travelled to more than 70 countries as a photojournalist. He's covered eight Olympic Games, the Iran hostage crisis, the Vietnam War, and the 9/11 attacks. He has photographed monarchs, celebrities, presidents, and prime ministers, including serving as official photographer to Brian Mulronev in 1984-85.

Dengler envisions the result will be a coffee table book, if not other forms of imagery. Steven has already been booked for speaking engagements after the trek.

The team's inaugural stop (and official sendoff) will be the Canadian Aviation and Space Museum in Ottawa.

Crew flight suits, documents and memorabilia will all be donated for a special display at the museum.

The team lifts off from Bolton's National Helicopters on July 1, heading to Ottawa for Canada Day celebrations

From there, they head up the coast to Baffin Island, then off to Greenland and Iceland. The route goes from west to east to take advantage of the prevailing winds and Dengler pointed out a tail wind is always an advantage. The Bell 429 can comfortably travel 400 nautical miles at a time, and two legs of the journey push the envelope.

Two of the longest stretches run from Baffin Island to Greenland (392 NM) and Greenland to Iceland (400

Dengler stressed flying is not "simply sitting on your butt." You have to constantly be aware of the airspace, monitor communications, watch the instruments and track everything from temperature to wind speed. Weather is a major factor. But the in-cockpit technology will be a major



## Big Data' looks into managing wireless spectrum

I've heard of Big Brother, Big Mac, Big Daddy, and locally, the Big Pipe.

Enter Big Data.

I guess that no one ever imagined the explosive growth of the Internet and the information highway when it first appeared in the early 1990s. No one likely envisioned the birth of a wireless flow of massive amounts of data, whizzing through the air at break-neck speeds.

Internet use has grown more than 100 times since its inception, to reach more than 1/3rd of our planet.

Most of us average citizens really don't understand the technical intricacies of either and so we go about our day, punching keys and tapping smart phones, having full confidence that the Internet fairies keep everything running smoothly and efficiently.

It's hard to believe that one of the most powerful creations of humankind has no physical borders and no governing body. Like Forrest Gump put it maybe everything is just "floating around incidental-like on a breeze ..."

The Internet has no centralized governance in either technological implementation or policies for access and usage; each constituent network sets its own policies. Only the overreaching definitions of the two principal name spaces in the Internet – the Internet Protocol address space and the Domain Name System (DNS) – are directed by a maintainer organization, the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN).



## Natural light show

On the night of May 27, sky watchers across Canada and as far south as Pennsylvania were treated to a beautiful light show - the aurora borealis. Garlic mustard is an invasive herb native to Europe. It was brought to North America in the early 1800s for use as an edible herb. Available in the early spring and high in vitamins A and C, it has a strong, distinctive smell similar to garlic. Since its arrival in North America it has escaped into the wild and is now one of Ontario's most aggressive forest invaders.

In the first year, it grows only a cluster of leaves shaped like a rosette, while a strong root system develops. Plants that survive the winter produce flowers and hundreds of seeds in their second year. Dense stands produce more than 60,000 seeds per square metre. Stands of garlic mustard can double in size every four

Garlic mustard seeds are easily spread by people and animals. They can remain in the soil for up to 30 years and still be able to sprout. The plant can grow in a wide range of sunny and fully shaded habitats, including undisturbed forest, forest edges, riverbanks and roadsides. Garlic mustard does not provide a valuable food source for native wildlife.

Garlic mustard can invade relatively undisturbed forests. Once established, it can displace native wildflowers like trilliums (Trillium sp) and trout lily (Erythronium americanum). It hinders other plants by interfering with the growth of fungi that bring nutrients to the roots of the plants.

The plant threatens several of Ontario's species at risk, including American ginseng (Panax quinquefolius), drooping trillium (Trillium flexipes), false rue-anemone (Enemion biternatum), hoary mountain mint (Pycnanthemum incanum), white wood aster (Eurybia divaricata), wild hyacinth (Camassia scilloides) and wood poppy (Stylophorum diphyllum).

Garlic mustard resembles several native Ontario plants. The leaves at the base of the plant look like those of several plants in the carrot family (Thaspium and Zizia), the daisy family (Senecio) and the violet family (Viola). The seed pods look like those of several other mustard (Brassicaceae) species. The easiest way to distinguish garlic mustard from these plant families is to crush the leaves. If they emit a strong garlic smell, then the plant is most likely garlic mustard.

Dan Stone, of Thorstone Consulting Services, appeared before council, noting it's a straightforward request. Gunn has owned the home for 45 years and is considering selling the property. ## Impaired driving is still problematic in York Region

York Regional Police are pulling out all the stops to combat impaired driving. And yet, some drivers don't seem to get the message.

The majority of cases that YPR encounters are alcohol-related but they are seeing an increase in the number of drivers impaired by various drugs such as marijuana, opioids, as well as prescription medications. Such cases pose new challenges to YPR patrol efforts.

While it's known where alcohol can be bought and consumed, the same cannot be said about illegal drugs such as marijuana and opioids. In an effort to combat these increasing cases, along with being Qualified Breath Technicians YRP officers are now also Drug Recognition Experts, which enables them to conduct a series of tests that help them identify level of impairment and type of substance an individual is impaired by.

In a typical week, almost two dozen people are arrested for drug and alcohol related driving offences in York Region.

YRP's principle impaired driving prevention methods are ordinary patrols and RIDE spot checks. RIDE spot checks are increased in anticipation of events where alcohol is a factor such as St. Patrick's Day and the Super Bowl, as well as during the holiday season from mid-November right through Jan. 1.

In addition to on the road patrol efforts YRP does make a large effort to raise public awareness about the dangers of impaired driving. This is done through individual media releases and social media posts as well as larger campaigns such as the Safe Roads Your Call program, which encourages people to call 911 if they spot a suspected impaired driver, and the #ImThatPerson campaign which encourages friends and family members to step up and stop someone who is impaired from driving.

According to Andy Pattenden of the YRP, the effort to raise public awareness is at the heart of the force's philosophy of combatting impaired driving. Patrols and RIDE spot checks are effective because they deter people from driving impaired due to penalty, and catch people who are driving under the influence, but these deterrents are not what YRP would prefer.

Rather than fear of punishment or actually being caught after breaking the law, YRP would prefer that people exercise reason and factor responsibility into their decision making. It is YRP's stance that if you are capable of getting a driver's licence and operating a vehicle, you are capable to not drive impaired.

Because of this stance, YPR does not see it to be necessary that any responsibility is taken off the driver and placed elsewhere such as the institutions that serve alcohol. YPR does not think that any more prevention devices such as breathaly-sers, cab kiosks, or warning posters need to be placed in this institutions to discourage impaired driving. Highly publicized tragedies, such as the one that occurred in King Township that killed three children and their grandfather, should be enough to inform the public.

In most instances, people act responsibly, but others are still willing to take their chances, and set the stage for tragedy.







## Coyle dominates \$86,600 CSI2\* Jumper Classic

Daniel Coyle of Ireland dominated the \$86,000 CSI2\* Jumper Classic, presented by Case IH, on Saturday, May 27, during the CSI2\* Classic at Palgrave Phase II at the Caledon Equestrian Park in Caledon.

Coyle, 22, qualified three horses for the jump-off, winning the event riding Tienna and taking second place with the ten-year-old grey Belgian Warmblood gelding, Dillinger. With his third entry, Grafton, Coyle finished in fifth position after having the final fence down for a total of four faults in a time of 37.60. All three of Coyle's horses are owned by Susan and Ariel Grange of Lothlorien Farm, located in Cheltenham.

The 22-year-old's winning streak began earlier in the day when Coyle rode to victory in the \$20,000 Under 25 class, presented by BDF Equestrian, aboard Somerset and placed third with Fortis Fortuna, also owned by Susan Grange and her daughter, Ariel. Muhammad Itani of Essex, ON, broke up the Irish party by finishing second riding Tax Free.

Course designer Manuel Esparza of Mexico set a testing track for the 34 entries in the \$86,000 CSI2\* Jumper Classic, including a tight time allowed of 78 seconds that prevented three riders – Ian Millar, Hyde Moffatt and Nicole Walker – from advancing to the jump-off after leaving all the rails in place.

With eight horse-rider combinations returning for the tie-breaker, Coyle

was poised for the win with all three of his entries qualified. However, as the first to return for the jump-off with Tienna, Coyle got the job done by coming home clear in a time of 36.85 seconds, a performance no one could improve on, not even himself.

American challenger Andy Kocher was the only rider to catch Coyle's time, stopping the clock in 36.45 riding Navalo de Poheton, but a rail at the 'a' element of the double combination left the pair in fourth place.

Coyle's final entry, Dillinger, left all the rails in place in a time of 40.23 for second place while Jonathon Millar of Perth, was the only other rider to jump double-clear, taking third with Daveau in a time of 40.81 seconds.

"Any one of my horses could have won today but Tienna is the fastest, and she won in the end," said Coyle of the nine-year Canadian Sport Horse mare (For Pleasure x Polydox) that was bred by owner Susan Grange. "It's really hard to expect that when you're first back for the jump-off. If she was last to go, it might have made it a little easier; it's always hard to go first.

"I haven't had that much jump-off experience with Grafton, and it took me a while to get the feel for Dillinger," continued Coyle of his three jump-off mounts. "He's a great horse, but he is not the easiest to ride. I was most impressed with him today."

Coyle is particularly fond of Tienna, noting, "When I first started riding her, I told Sue 'this is a star, she re-

ally is something special.' I have been bragging about her and I think she's a real grand prix horse. She's fast, she's scopey, she ticks all the boxes. It might take her another year to get there, but I believe she will be really special."

Coyle, who took over the top string of Lothlorien horses from fellow Irishman Conor Swail last fall, may be from Ireland, but his training base is only 15 minutes from the Caledon Equestrian Park, host of equestrian events for the 2015 Pan American Games.

"It's a great show with great prize money and world ranking classes, and it's great for Sue to be able to jump her horses as local as this is," said Coyle. "I think it's extra-special for Sue, as this is like her home crowd. Without Sue and Ariel Grange, I would not be where I am today, and I can never thank them enough for that."

Coyle's next stop is Thunderbird Show Park in Langley, BC, where he will ride Cita as a member of the Irish team in Nations' Cup competition on Friday, June 2. Then it's on to Spruce Meadows in Calgary, AB, for its fourweek 'Summer Series', where Coyle



One woman said something to her partner and I heard the word "Guilt" and I could tell by the look on her face she was offended. I looked at the sign and wondered how this could have possibly offended her. What could possibly be offensive about such a message? Then a little while later I noticed a group pointing to the sign and once again I could see that the message of acceptance that I hoped to put forward wasn't being received. I looked at the sign again trying to figure out what they saw that I didn't, and then it occurred to me. I had written Guilt FREE. Were people thinking I was offering FREE Guilt? I was mortified. What I had hoped would be a message of inclusion suddenly became exactly what I was trying to remove. Perhaps if I hadn't written the words FREE in capitals or if I'd contracted the word with a hyphen the message would have been clearer. It has occurred to me how easy it is for a message to be misinterpreted. In a culture where brief messages through texts and tweets is the way we share our thoughts, I should know how easy it is for a message to be misunderstood.

"At the bottom of the sandwich board were the words 'ALL Welcome' and I meant ALL. If you are looking for a church that accepts you exactly as you are...no conditions, no guilt, then Nobleton United might be a place you'd like to try. If you want a place where you are welcomed wherever you are on your spiritual journey, then check us out. My underlying message is always one of unconditional love and acceptance. My hope is to be part of a church community that extends the love of God out into the world. Perhaps I should have used fewer words on the sign, maybe just one – LOVE - because in essence, that says it all."
