## Five figures raised in day-long bike ride

Twenty-four hours, 630 kilometres, and 6,162 metres of elevation later. Vito Barbera has brought in over \$10,000 for the Terry Fox Foundation.

Dubbed the "24-4-Terry Fox," Barbera was joined by his fellow cycling enthusiasts in a 24-hour marathon bike ride to raise funds for the organization, a success for the second straight year.

"The event went extremely well," said Barbera, President of the B1 Cycling Club. "It was great!"

With donations so far reaching \$10,598, and still climbing, Barbera's ride covered a 42-kilometre route around the King City area: the same distance per day of Fox's Marathon of Hope.

Riders donated for the chance to take between one and five laps with Barbera, starting and ending at the King's Ridge Montessori School in King City, with roughly 80-90 joining him on the course.

"Eric Kan did the most, not sure exactly how many but he raised the most in donations and was with me on the course the most," said Barbera.

A grueling challenge for any man, Barbera was able to use his cycling experience and expertise to complete the marathon, having set the North American record last year in the inaugural event for one person riding for 24






#### Advanced Metering Infrastructure program

Contractors are making the rounds of King City and Nobleton, finishing installation of a new feature on water meters.

This Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) is being implemented to enable the township to better manage and monitor metered water consumption. It will also help King proactively troubleshoot metering problems instead of waiting for the quarterly billing submissions.

For example, before AMI installation, an underground leak in a pipe might not be discovered until a scheduled meter reading shows a huge spike in consumption. Under the AMI system, a dramatic increase in water consumption would be flagged almost immediately.

Installations are on the outside of buildings. The contractor or township staff may have to arrange for entry to some sites.



## MPAC provides assessment details

A video, "How Property Taxes are Calculated," which is posted on aboutmyproperty.ca, explains the relationship between an Assessment Update and property taxes, which will help answer questions as to why some homeowners are experiencing a tax increase.


Every four years MPAC conducts a province-wide Assessment Update and mails Property Assessment Notices to every property owner in Ontario. If property value has increased, it will be phased in over four years (2017 to 2020) while any decreases are applied imme-

Last year MPAC updated the assessed diately. Property Assessment Notices for York Region were mailed in June 2016. The press release for King Township can be accessed on mpac.ca.

> Residential property values in King Township increased, on average, 7.5 per cent per year since 2012. Residential property values in all of York Region have increased, on average, 10 per cent per year since 2012.

> When assessing residential properties, MPAC looks at sales and compares properties to similar properties that have sold in a particular area.

> In King, the typical residential property is assessed at approximately \$929,000 with an average assessment change of \$209,000 from the previous assessment year in 2012. In York Region, the typical residential property is assessed at approximately \$890,000 with an average assessment change of \$258,000 from 2012 to 2016.

## Questions for Township on taxes

We own a fairly modest home (by King standards) in Lloydtown. Our property taxes will increase by 11% this year; by at least 10% in 2018, 9% in 2019 and 8% in 2020.

I have three questions for those who govern our Township:

1) Given the punishing increases in property taxes attributed to MPAC assessments and the resulting Township revenues, why did the Township not take advantage of the savings from the Region and Education to mitigate the impact on citizens?

2) How is that: In the Jan. 5, 2017 issue of The King Weekly Sentinel, a letter was published stating that the estimated cost of the new municipal offices would "be financed using infrastructure and development reserves; the proceeds of the current property at 2075 King Road and debenture," while our 2017 Final Property Tax Notice implies that, in fact, tax revenues will help foot the bill for this extravagant monument?

3) Why are we paying for a new space for King seniors when a perfectly adequate facility exists for what may well be a diminishing population (of seniors)? Clearly many of us will be leaving King to downsize in the absence of fordable and appropriate housing options; sadly this will not be by choice.

It would appear that in order to fund non-essential infrastructure, the Township is expecting its established citizens to bear an unreasonable financial burden.



## King Township Women of Influence select first project

eneca's first giving circle, the King Township Women of Influence, works to make a great impact on Seneca's King Campus and its students. Initially brought together through a mutual affinity for King Township, the group of civic-minded women recently announced its very first gift in support of simulated veterinary animal models for students in Seneca's Veterinarian Technician diploma program.

Thanks to this contribution, students will have the opportunity to practice on the models during clinical laboratory exercises. To ensure the highest level of animal welfare, students will be provided ample time to master their techniques using the models before they begin performing procedures on live animals.

The opportunity to fund these models was presented to the giving circle for consideration by Emma Brown, the program co-ordinator for the Veterinary Technician program.

Access to the models will produce highly skilled graduates, who will eventually work in a veterinary setting, taking blood and administering injections.

"Going to a veterinary clinic can be distressing for the animal, and the additional training will teach students how to mitigate these situations and establish more positive bonds with animals," says Tony Mallette, Chair of Seneca's School of Health Sciences.

In Seneca's Veterinarian Technician program, students prepare for the broad applications in the field of animal care through studies in animal behaviour, pharmacology, laboratory animal nursing, clinical pathology, radiography, nutrition and anesthesiology. The new animal models will complement the existing state-ofthe-art equipment and facilities already offered to Seneca's Veterinary Technician students. Upon completion of the program, students pursue careers in wildlife services, veterinary practices, hospitals, zoological parks, research institutes and more.



## Examining local tax rates

Kudos to Messrs. Martin (June 27), Rentsch (July 6 and July 20) and Taylor (July 20) for raising the issue of this year's very high property tax increase.

There is an important point made by Mr. Taylor that deserves further emphasis.

Our property tax actually consists of three separate taxes; the York Region tax rate which is set by York Regional Council, the Educational tax rate which is set by the province, and the Municipal tax rate which is set by Township Council. Combining these three establishes the rate that is applied to your property's assessed value to determine the property tax that you pay each year.

What becomes apparent is that, when faced with the windfall increase provided by the MPAC property value reassessment this year, both the Province and York Region did the responsible thing and reduced their tax rates to partially offset the effect of this increase.

In very stark contrast, the Township of King did the opposite. It increased the municipal tax rate (the only rate that it controls) by 10%! This offset the combined provincial and regional tax

reductions, resulting in a zero increase in the overall rate, so someone taking only a casual look at their tax notice might just blame the reassessment. The reality is quite different.

It gets even more interesting when you look at the combined effect of this 10% municipal rate increase compounded by the market value assessment increase. Various writers have mentioned average assessment increases of 5.1% for King City, 7.5% for the Township of King, and of having personally experienced increases in excess of 10%, so let's look at the effect these increases have on the actual municipal taxes paid:

Property owners in the Township will, on average, pay 15% to 18% more tax dollars to the Township than they did last year, and in some cases will pay +21% or more!

I join the other writers in calling on council to review their decision on this increase which, I suggest, any objective observer might view as unreasonable.

From humble beginnings as a small machine shop in Bruno Conzelmann's garage in 1971, BC Industries has grown to a highly technical operation with six buildings and over 68,000 square feet of space that employs over 140 people.

Barrie Rail Corridor Expansion Transit Project Assessment Process

Metrolinx, an agency of the Province of Ontario, is working to transform the way the region moves by building a fast, convenient and integrated transit network across the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area (GTHA) and Simcoe County. Over the next ten years, Metrolinx is transforming the existing GO rail system to deliver a whole new rapid transit experience to your community. Part of this plan is to bring frequent and reliable service to communities along the Barrie rail corridor. With more frequent train service you'll have more options to get you where you need to go.

Current plans include electrified, all-day, two-way service every 15 minutes to Aurora as well as peak, midday, evening and weekend GO Train service to Allandale Waterfront GO Station. The service increase will be phased in over 10 years while Metrolinx builds additional infrastructure. To support this service increase, Metrolinx is proposing the following:

- Provision of a second track between Lansdowne Avenue in the City of Toronto to Allandale Waterfront GO Station in the City of Barrie;
- · Upgrades to existing GO Stations along the corridor: Rutherford, Maple, King City, Aurora, Newmarket, East Gwillimbury, Bradford, Barrie South and Allandale Waterfront;
- Upgrades to existing structures within the corridor including bridges and culverts; and A new train layover facility within the Town of Bradford West Gwillimbury for overnight
- storage of trains.

## **The Process**

Metrolinx is assessing the environmental impacts of the Barrie Rail Corridor Expansion (BRCE) Project in accordance with the Transit Project Assessment Process (TPAP) as prescribed in Ontario Regulation 231/08, Transit Projects and Metrolinx Undertakings (made under the Environmental Assessment Act).

As part of the TPAP, an Environmental Project Report (EPR) is being prepared and will be filed documenting any potential environmental effects and mitigation requirements of the Project. Viewing locations for the agency and public review of the EPR will be published in the Notice of Completion.



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

## Electrofishing demo awes attendees

Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority (LSRCA) welcomed more than 80 families to Sheppard's Bush Conservation Area in Aurora recently as it hosted its third annual BioBlitz.

A BioBlitz is an intense period of biological surveying in an attempt to record all the living species within a designated area. Knowing what species exist helps us track ecological changes.

In an effort to engage and encourage budding nature enthusiasts, LSRCA also hosted children's activities, guided hikes and demonstrations.

LSRCA's electrofishing demonstration drew a crowd of around 50 onlookers, in awe as they watched LSRCA staff don their electrofishing gear to capture fish species in the East Holland River. The East Holland River, which runs through Sheppard's Bush, eventually makes its way to Lake Simcoe.

Electrofishing is a harmless method of capturing fish using an electrical current that temporarily stuns the fish in the water, enabling them to be caught with nets, identified, and returned to the stream. Among the species found was the mottled sculpin, a small fish that only lives where the water is clean.

Tallies of the variety of species recorded on the day-long event will be made available on LSRCA's website within the next few weeks.

LSRCA's mission is to work with the community to protect and restore the Lake Simcoe watershed by leading research, policy and action.



This month, as banks and Home Capital Group turn down Canadian borrowers seeking a mortgage, an opportunity is created for local investors.

"Private lenders are now over whelmed. They are taking many deals turned away by Home Trust," said Victor Camba, mortgage agent who matching specillizes inwith borrowers individual

Home Trust, Canada's biggest non-bank lender, was a conduit for many Canadians to have home ownership. During its struggles in recent weeks, it has scaled back on lending, leaving many borrowers in the lurch.

investors.

This has created an opportunity for local residents to invest like a bank and become lenders using cash, an RRSP, or equity in their home. As a result, they obtain similar benefits that banks enjoy, such as predictable and stable monthly cash flow, and "bricks and mortar" security.

For example, a home owner can borrow from their equity in the form of a Home Equity Line of Credit (HELOC), and use the proceeds to fund a mortgage. In addition, because funds are borrowed for the purpose of earning investment income, the interest paid on such funds could be tax deductible.

In today's low interest environment this makes sense. Bank posted rates for HELOCs average 3.2%. Private mortgages can earn investors up to 12% on a 1 year term. The lender's cash flow would net up to 8.8%.

A misconception is that these are bad-quality borrowers. "Bad credit? No Credit? No Problem," are advertisements sometimes seen. This is far from the truth.

In 2016, 2.7 million Canadians were self-employed (Statistics Canada). These people are generally in the sales and services industry, such as Realtors and Contractors. There were also 1.2 million small businesses. These borrowers do not meet the bank's lending criteria, and are

therefore turned down. Their tax return may show a significantly lower figure than what they actually take home as income.

"We take into consideration all sources of the client's income, including stated business income, something the banks don't do," Victor said. "But we are not going to take undue risk. We will take a calculated risk."

He prefers to offer loans below 80% of the value of the property to limit losses in case of a housing price downturn. Unlike mutual funds or stocks, a mortgage investment is collateralized with existing residential properties within the

Greater Toronto Area,

including Aurora and Newmarket. If the borrower defaults, their lender has the legal power to sell the property to recover their funds.

"It used to be investors went to their lawyer or accountant and said, 'I have a few million dollars and I want to lend this out and make a good return," Victor said. "They are still around, but now there are opportunities for the average investor with cash, a home equity line of credit or an RRSP."



## Eric Lamaze and Fine Lady 5 defend title in Aachen

Canadian Olympic gold, silver and bronze medalist Eric Lamaze successfully defended his title with Fine Lady 5 to win the €100,000 Turkish Airlines Prize of Europe for the second year in a row on July 19, at CHIO Aachen, Germany.

Lamaze and his 2016 Rio Olympic bronze medal partner, Fine Lady 5, were one of 20 combinations from the original 60-horse starting field to qualify for the jump-off. It was a star-studded jump-off featuring numerous Olympic medalists but, when it comes to speed, few are faster than Lamaze and Fine Lady 5.

The pair raced around the expansive grass arena, posting the winning time of 42.97 seconds to hold off four-time Olympic gold medalist Ludger Beerbaum of Germany, who stopped the timers in 43.05 seconds riding Chiara 22. Young Irish phenom Bertram Allen finished in 43.06 seconds for third

place aboard Molly Malone V.

"She jumped amazing!" said Lamaze of the 14-year-old bay Hanoverian mare (Forsyth x Drosselklang II) owned by Andy and Carlene Ziegler of Artisan Farms in partnership with Lamaze's Torrey Pines Stable. "To win here in Aachen is very prestigious, especially for a Canadian, and it's very special to win two years in a row. You don't ever forget competing at Aachen with all of its history, and you certainly don't ever forget winning."

Of the track set by course designer Frank Rothenberger of Germany, Lamaze commented: "The course was big, and included a pair of double liverpools that caused a lot of problems. When we first walked it, a lot of riders thought it was too big for the first day, but you have the best in the world competing here and ended up with 20 in the jump-off."

Lamaze arrived in Germany follow-

#### Horticulture By John Arnott

I found it a couple of years ago just off the one of the trails I follow when I go up through conservation bush that borders Tecumseth Pines (Tottenham) where I live with my little Boston terrier Victory. And although I've looked I haven't seen it since.

Then one morning as I walked up the green on the Tec Pines side of the bush passed gigantic blooms on tall Queen Anne's lace thanks to all the rain and a stand of flowering milkweed pleasantly scenting the damp air with its heavy heady hoya like perfume (hoya a popular house plant of some 35 years ago is a tropical cousin of milkweed) I decided to have real good look. And low and behold there it was this patch of pyrola blooming in the under brush behind taller plants along the edge of the trail about 40 ft./14 m from here I thought I'd seen it originally!

There are some 30 species of this tiny broadleaf evergreen all belonging to the heather/heath family and all found in the temperate regions of the Northern Hemisphere right up to the sub Arctic. The species I came across is pyrola americana native to North America.

Pyrola, from pyrus Latin for pear as naming botanists thought its leaves resembled those of this fruit, prefers to grow in a shady location. Some species like dryish shaded places while others, like the americanas, favour damp shaded areas. Thanks to Bill Casselman's book Canadian Garden Words for this

Each pyrola plant sends up a single

short stem from a rosette of ground level small broad oval evergreen leaves. Buds appearing up this stem open into tiny bell shaped flowers much like lily of the valley. Stems of the americana species seldom grow higher than 4 in./10 cm. Flowers of this species are white with a slight pinkish tinge.

Other species have white flowers or noticeably pink flowers or white flowers with a greenish tinge. The tiny stamens in flower centres are orange and protruding out of each flower is a tiny stiff thread like greenish white style or stigma that catches pollen from nectar seeking insect visitors. Tiny ball shaped seed capsules will replace the flowers. These plants, often called wintergreen, have been used in traditional folk medicine for centuries. This info comes from the Richard Dickinson-France Royer book "Plants of Southern Ontario."

Pyrolas do produce seed but generally spread by underground runners. The patch I rediscovered was roughly 6 by 3ft./1by 2 m half again as big as when I first saw it. And it had established a small clone patch a few feet away. But the plant although it does spread can't be considered in any way invasive.



Were they really just a bunch of teen-

shook things up in ancient times and changed the world forever?

How old then, were Jesus's first followers we know as the 12 apostles? The New Testament, the Christian writings in the Bible, doesn't mention any ages but does offer clues. But keep in mind its books including the Gospels were written some 40 to 100 years after the events they describe by persons who weren't necessarily themselves eye-witnesses and were severely edited in the early years of Christianity. Originally from oral Aramaic, the back country dialect of Hebrew the apostles and Jesus spoke, this New Testament has been translated from classical Hebrew into Greek, from Greek into Latin, from Latin into old French and finally from this French into English. Omissions, changes and slips of the pen are bound to have occurred,

Some authors like Rob J. Hyndman and Christian historians including David Paul Kirkpatrick and Ray Vander Laan, have been reading between the biblical lines and saying these early followers of Christ were just that, a group of exuberant adolescents ready to buck the system and turn the world on its ear. And along came this rabbi guy, Jesus, definitely anti-establishment, the answer to their dreams.

A batch of bachelors as Kirkpatrick calls them, were, with the exception of Peter, all under the age of 20.

Now what evidence is there to support such an age theory? Well part this "evidence" lies in the Jewish education system of the day. Most Jewish boys received basic education in village synagogues.

Once out of school boys either were apprenticed into the family business,or joined the general labour force. Possibly as many 7 of the apostles were apprenticing as fishermen so would have been around 17 or 18 when they chose to follow Jesus. John, the youngest, is thought to have been only 14 or 15.

Another age clue is uncovered from away back in the time of Moses (Exodus 30: 14-15) when any man 20 or older was required to pay 1/2 a shekel (roughly \$6 Canadian) annually towards the upkeep God's House, the "Tent of Meeting" in Moses's day and the Temple in Jerusalem in Jesus's time. When the temple tax collectors approached Jesus and his followers in Capernaum only Jesus and Peter were required to pay.

That James and John's mother confronts Jesus (Matt.: 20-24) and almost demands her sons be given places of honour at Jesus side in heaven, strongly suggests her sons were young as had they been grown men it would have been unthinkable for her to have

done such a thing. As well, Jesus jokingly nicknamed the pair "sons of thunder" perhaps in reference to their sometimes loud youthful exuberance.

And still another clue comes to light when Jesus refers to these 12 special followers as his children or little ones (Matt.:11,25-Luke 10,21-John 13,33) terms that would have been highly insulting to say the least if they had been adult men.

Now favouring the belief not all the apostles were callow youths is the fact Peter was married, owned his own home and was possibly a widower. And Matthew was a tax collector for the occupying Romans. Would they have entrusted a teenager with such a job? Maybe if he was exceptionally clever! Matthew seems to have had a home where he entertained Jesus. However, it could easily have been his parents' house.

No doubt, the St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes, Jesus needed these, his first followers, to be young enough to mould into his mind frame getting them to accept new, even radical ideas, then take on the difficult task of carrying these unconventional ideas at the heart of his teaching out into a dangerous world.



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
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
