

More Ontarians living pay cheque to pay cheque

Living pay cheque to pay cheque is a phrase that's been tossed around for decades.

Most of us hear it, and are thankful it doesn't pertain to us. Unless of course, it does.

According to the Canadian Payroll Association's ninth annual survey released last week, 47% of working Canadians report it would be difficult to meet their financial obligations if their pay cheque was delayed by even a single week.

The numbers are even higher for millennials in their 30s (55% would have difficulty) and Gen Xs in their 40s (51%). In Ontario, 49% live pay cheque to pay cheque.

In the U.S., the stats are roughly the same, but given the size of the country, there are more than 25 million middle class Americans living pay to pay. That's almost the entire population of Canada!

The survey also shows that 42% of workers in Ontario spend all of or more than their net pay. The number-one reason given for increased spending is higher living costs.

Forty-three per cent of survey respondents in Ontario said they save 5% or less of their earnings, below the 10% savings level generally recommended by financial planning experts.

Illustrating just how strapped some employees are, almost 25% of Ontarians say they could not come up with just \$2,000 within a month for an emergency expense.

High debt seems to be the culprit, and most say they're overwhelmed by their level of debt.

Nearly one-third (32%) of respondents in this province say their debt load increased over the year. More than 12% believe they will never be debt-free.

Count me in that 12%.

Despite their precarious financial situation, 26% of working Canadians feel that earning more is their best way to financial well-being, versus just 19% who think spending less is the ticket to financial security.



Ontario flood management plans are progressive, proactive

As our American neighbours recover from the worst hurricanes on record, agencies and governments here are looking at their own flood management policies.

Many provincial standards are set at what's called a 100-year event, or the equivalent of rainfall created by Hurricane Hazel back in 1954. That historic event dropped 200mm of rain over 12 hours in the GTA.

The U.S. occurrence is bring referred to as a "1,000-year flood" – the worst natural disaster in American history.

Estimates put Harvey's total downpour at 50 inches (4 feet) or 27 trillion gallons of water. By comparison, Hurricane Katrina dumped 6.5 trillion gallons of water on New Orleans in August of 2005.

Harvey is predicted to be the most costly natural disaster in U.S. history, and the recent Hurricane Irma will go down in the history books as the largest hurricane in history.

"This will be the worst natural disaster in American history. The economy's impact, by the time its total destruction is completed, will approach \$160 billion, which is similar to the combined effect of Hurricanes Katrina and Sandy. Parts of Houston will be uninhabitable for weeks and possibly months due to water damage, mold, disease-ridden water and all that will follow this 1,000-year flood."

The Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority watershed is protected to the level of the Hurricane Hazel event. Hazel was the deadliest and costliest hurricane of the 1954 Atlantic hurricane season. The storm killed at least 400 people in Haiti before striking the United States near the border between North and South Carolina, as a Category 4 hurricane.

After weeks of unusually high rainfall saturated the GTA, Hazel dropped additional rainfall, peaking at 8.4 inches (214 mm) in Snelgrove, in nearby Caledon. In three hours,

the city received 3.5 inches (90 mm) of precipitation. Most of these rains ran off into rivers and creeks of Toronto, which raised water levels by as much as 20-26 feet (6-8 metres).

Floodwaters slowly rose in Holland Marsh and Highway 400, which passes through the marsh, was under as much as 10 feet of water in some places. Much of the crops in the area were either swept away or ruined.

Statistically, these levels have never been surpassed in Ontario since, according to Tom Hogenbirk, LSR-CA's manager of engineering.

We are prepared, but there's always a question as to whether current methods are stringent enough.

The 100-year storm mark, he pointed out, changes every year and those statistics are being reviewed.

Conservation authorities LSRCA have a "very aggressive system" of managing flood plains, green areas and stormwater.

Keeping people and development out of existing flood plains in the first place is the best defence.


"We have to be progressive," he said, especially in light of some major local events this past May and

"We have to be vigilant and keep doing the right thing."

King Township has started the process of creating a comprehensive stormwater management plan for the municipality.

As well, there will be a flood study component. Recent storms and flooding in Schomberg and Nobleton, as well as impacts of commercial development in King City, all point to the need for an up to date stormwater management plan.

"... stormwater infrastructure is being challenged by events of significant rainwater duration and/or intensity. As a result, municipalities are identifying deficiencies within the support infrastructure and determining there are potentially significant budget impacts to respond to these identified deficiencies," staff


Also moving to the plot will be the Schomberg Farmer's Market, which until recently was held at the Trisan Centre. The market held its first day at the farm on Saturday.

King Township sustains its CIP grant program

The importance of boosting small business in King hasn't escaped the notice of local councillors.

Council approved a staff report, calling on sustained efforts to promote grants in the Community Improvement Plan, and cementing the CIP as essen-

tial to the overall visions and goals of at businesses and property owners for of created commercial space. all three major communities in the municipality.

According to Economic Development Officer Jamie Smyth, the CIP was adopted back in the fall of 2014, with council approving ongoing funding. This financial incentive program has been actively promoted and directed

more than two years.

"Getting Down to Business – Guide to Starting or Expanding your Business" was launched on www.economicking.ca this past February. The video provides local testimony of the program's success and is seen as an effective marketing tool.

Smyth noted some 180 properties in village cores could be eligible for this program. Direct mail packages were sent out to all property owners within the villages in 2015 and again in 2016

During his presentation to council, Smyth pointed out that with recent applications, 5 out of 9 properties were new businesses to King. Three out of 9 were converted from residential to commercial assessments.

For every \$1 the Township pitched in, applicants contribute another \$18.50, making this a win-win for everyone.

The application process is designed to be simple, "nimble and responsive" Smyth noted. A new CIP Review Committee Checklist has been created to aid the program administrator and committee during the review and approval process.

and value of the program. Certain measures are used, including total dollar value of investment, number of successful applications and square footage changes over time."

Smyth explained the primary purpose of the CIP is to "enable financial incentives to assist in the revitalization of private property and encourage improvements in accordance with the design guidelines of the plan."

Smyth did stress the municipality needs to take a leadership role in helping in the revitalization of King City, Nobleton and Schomberg. Strategies and action plans, in the areas of design guidelines, banner policies, sidewalk repairs, street furniture, etc., can all help in this regard.

Staff created a worksheet to assist other staffers and councillors to align. prioritize and monitor all relevant strategy programs.

A total of \$45,161.77 was distributed to seven recipients in 2015 and 2016. There is still some \$30,000 in grant reserves. A total of almost \$70,000 was available in 2017 and so far, \$36,821.53 has been distributed. There are currently two applications pending.

Smyth said staff expect the full \$70,000 to be allocated by the end of the year. Any remaining balance will go back into the CIP reserve.

"The CIP takes a long-term approach It's a bit difficult to peg the impact to revitalization," Smyth said. "This change will take time, and is best accomplished through incremental, small improvements that will add up to big

Re-examining the 'water control' business

I was interested in the King Weekly Sentinel's Aug. 31 front page story, "King hopes to create stormwater management plan."

It's time to review the original purpose for conservation authorities established in the wake of Hurricane Hazel in 1954. At that time, Ontario recognized the need to protect floodplains along creeks and rivers from development. Despite that, the pace of development has accelerated since the 1980s, encroaching on and into floodplains.

Each conservation authority has its own Technical Guidelines for Stormwater Management, but monitoring and enforcement present costly challenges. According to the LSRCA's Stormwater Guidelines (effective Sept. 1, 2016), there are also problems with consistency "when a water balance assessment may be required to meet Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan (ORMCP), Lake Simcoe Protection Plan (LSPP), the South Georgian Bay Lake Simcoe Source Protection Plan (SGBLS SPP) and the Provincial Policy Statement (PPS). Each one of these may have different requirements pertaining to water balance."

Too often, the end result is the removal of more trees and marshlands to make way for more development that increases flooding risks. Isn't it time to recognize the essential natural services of forests and marshes instead of bargaining them away?

All conservation authorities depend upon guidance from Ontario Conservation Act Regulation 168/06. Hurricane Hazel became the "event standard" against which to measure all floods. The Hurricane Hazel Event Standard means a "storm that produces over 48 hours" as it relates to varying sizes of drainage area. It also represents the 100-year Flood Standard.

What if storms of the future surpass the Hazel Event Standard set in 1954? Perhaps, we should draw some lessons from the recent unanticipated flooding in Houston, Texas, where stormwater management failed spectacularly. Hurricane Harvey dropped more than six times the total rainfall of Hurricane Hazel.

We know that natural floodplains allow fast water to spread out over a wider area, thereby slowing it down to mitigate against damage. The natural vegetation along those waterways also slows and captures water, collecting and recycling nutrients at the same time to feed various aquatic species. Those marshes also provide habitat for a variety of indigenous species.

The deep and massive root sy of trees and forests perform an essential function when it comes to flood control. This is an area where King Township really needs to pay attention. For example, one mature eastern white pine will absorb about 100 gallons/day. A fully mature Oak may absorb twice that amount. On average, a mature tree can

Schomberg, Ontario Providing quality security and home which it has contact. The more trees, the more contact. Through the normal water cycle, almost half of drinking water could be filtered through natural forests where they have been retained.

The trees in forests transpire moisture (and oxygen) back into the atmosphere, providing cooling shade as an added benefit.

I must digress here to note that, at the LaTornell Symposium in November 2014, York Region Forestry estimated that Aurora, Richmond Hill, Vaughan, and Markham had retained enough urban forest to produce oxygen for 203,000 people, or 26% of their combined population of 775.551 at the time. Municipal councils tend to calculate tax base from development with little consideration for the intrinsic value of nature's services, so it is time to consider oxygen and flood control as two items within a new budgetary process, called "natural capital valuation."

Is it any wonder that we see more flooding as clearing of forested and natural areas continues in southern Ontario? The thin shallow root systems

absorb about 36% of the rainfall with of vast acres of new turf grass cannot ponds of the Oak Ridges Moraine deaccomplish this feat of capturing floodwater. Nor can pavement. New "greenfield" developments require removal of natural vegetation and large amounts of topsoil before a few inches are added back where grass will be planted, but a layer of impermeable clay underlies that thin soil. There may be enough topsoil for the shallow roots of grass, but that impermeable clay layer increases the potential for flooding.


Each year, hundreds of acres of new paved parking lots, roadways and driveways are added, so it seems each new development has the potential to lead to an increased risk of flooding. Even though every new subdivision tract is dotted with its own urban catchment basin, those basins cannot replace the stormwater retention capabilities and natural services of a real forest or natural marsh.

The Oak Ridges Moraine is considered to be southern Ontario's "rain barrel" because its forested lands capture and filter the drinking water used by 200,000 people, as long as those forests stand. The forests, wetlands and pend upon the filtering capabilities of the sand, silt and gravel underlying the thick layers of rich soil which shape this landform where water is stored in aguifers. This is a feat of Nature that cannot be matched by increasingly expensive engineered storm water management techniques.

The Dutch have been in the "water control" business for centuries. Much of this nation sits below sea level and is gradually "sinking" relative to rising tides and fiercer storms. On June 15 this year, the New York Times reported on how the Netherlands has decided that it must "let the water in" after centuries of building dykes or dams to keep the water out. The Netherlands is now planning and adding lakes, parks and plazas that double as enormous reservoirs, but it is also restoring former fields and canals to their natural state so they can be used for parks as well as storm mitigation.

I suspect many planning departments in the GTA need to rethink their old ideas about spatial planning and development, too.

Canadian guitar builders strike a chord in Kleinburg

Picking Kleinburg for a day-long road trip is always a good choice. This autumn it is a great one.

The town can always boast of good restaurants, shopping, hiking, the September Binder Twine Festival, fall colours and of course the renowned McMichael Canadian Art Collection. But right now the McMichael offers an historic chance to see an exhibit, custom-built to resonate internationally.

Seven top Canadian guitar builders have celebrated the Group of Seven painters - and Tom Thomson - with a lineup of masterwork guitars. From the fantastic to the natural-and-naked, these guitars would tempt any musician to get them out of the case for a try. For everyone else, the first temptation is to pick a favourite. And yet, there is one more masterpiece in the room, one that cannot be seen or heard. It is the Canadian art form of artistic camara-

"We've always egged each other on and helped each other," said Linda ing craftsmanship. The A.Y. Jackson Manzer, the show's visionary.

A celebrated guitar builder herself, Manzer began her career in the 1970s with a group of about seven pioneering guitar makers under the tutelage of Jean Larrivée, creating a guitar structure and sound unique to Canada.

Four years ago Manzer was at a Group of Seven show in Ottawa.

"This little link went off in my head and I started thinking about all the things we had in common with the group," said Manzer.

She thought "wouldn't it be cool if we did, as a group of seven guitar makers, an homage to the Group of Seven painters and that way people around the world could know more about these painters that are much loved in Canada?" The idea had resonance. Not only did Manzer convince her now-accomplished guitar colleagues to jump into the project, she found the perfect venue and partner in the McMichael gallery.

off the craftsmanship on all sides. Surrounding these, are working drawings, and paintings that inspired the builders. A documentary video by Riddle Films shows the making and playing of each guitar. Bruce Cockburn, Jesse Cook, and Don Ross are some of the talent featured.

Some builders pulled off astonishtribute guitar by Jean Larrivée and his team features a 2,000-piece inlay honouring Jackson's works, on the guitar's interior. The J.E.H. MacDonald tribute guitar, by Sergei de Jonge, uses birch bark for a world-first in materials. The Varley guitar, by Grit Laskin, boasts a gorgeous group of portraits along the fretboard.

The parlour-sized guitar, made by luthier Tony Duggan-Smith in homage to Arthur Lismer, incorporates a second group of strings and sculptural body making it look the most alluring to hold.

Manzer's own guitar celebrating Lawren Harris steals the show visually with a second neck bringing in harp strings for both a spiritual and abstract





'Hope' springs at King-Aurora-Richmond Hill Hospice

Hospice King-Aurora-Richmond Hill turned a hopeful page towards its future this week, unveiling its new name: Hope House Hospice.

For over 35 years, the name Hospice King-Aurora – and, following a recent expansion, known as Hospice King-Aurora-Richmond Hill – has become synonymous with end of life care for individuals across all three communities. Over those decades, however, the concept of hospice care has evolved along with our communities and, for Executive Director Heidi Bonner, the time to turn that page came on Monday at the organization's AGM in Aurora.

"The idea for 'Hope House' came at our 2015 AGM," she explains. "We had Debbie Homewood, who is one of the facilitators in our group, who came and spoke about spirituality and hope in hospice care and the idea of hope seemed really weird [in this context]. But the idea that hope keeps getting redefined along your journey really struck a chord with everyone present.

"You're not necessarily hoping you'll live forever, but hoping you'll live long enough to see your granddaughter born, live long enough to have a Dairy Queen sundae. You always have hope, but it changes, even if you are hoping for a pain free death."

Indeed, hope has always been an undercurrent at Hospice, regardless of its moniker. Illustrating her point, Ms. Bonner points to a plaque hanging well above normal sightlines, an otherwise unnoticed decorative accent, emblazoned with that evocative four-letter word.

It was there when they were operating on King Road, it is currently there in their Industrial Parkway South headquarters, and it is there to stay, presiding over the organization's latest chapter.

It's a chapter that begins as hospice care experiences considerable growth in all quarters.

Over the last few years, there has been an increased value placed by the Province of Ontario on Hospice Care, Ms. Bonner says. Funding for com-



munity and residential hospices has increased, recognizing that as the population ages the need is only going to grow and hospice care, in general, is an "economical" way of tackling a growing concern.

"Hospices in general are a very economical way of supporting people," she says. "Whether that hospice care is in the home, which is what community hospices like us do, or in the residential setting, from a purely numbers perspective it is significantly less to care for somebody in their home or residential hospice than in a hospital."

Another factor in the mix is the increased prevalence of medical assistance in dying within our national conversation has brought the very concept of "dying" out of dark corners and hushed tones and into a regular part of our dialogue.

"(This conversation) helps us think about what we would like in our last days," said Ms. Bonner. "Hospice palliative care has been there all along, but I think it is really coming into the forefront and people are demanding quality hospice and palliative care. We have been here for almost 35 years doing what we do, we have seen lots of changes and I think recently a lot of changes for good.

"Community hospices like us care for people: we provide service for people right from the time of diagnosis, so the people we care for are not necessarily palliative or end of life. We really get in there to support them and their family members early on to help them through their journey. It could be through treatment and remission and off they go."

Now, however, there is also increased recognition towards the needs of the

caregiver. The importance of providing important supports to caregivers is also a trend being recognized by the Province, who have put more money towards caregiver support.

"It is about getting in there early to help caregivers cope with a loved one who is ill and providing different supports," added Ms. Bonner, noting the increasing participation in their bereavement support programs as well.

As much as awareness grows on the services places like the newly-minted Hope House Hospice provide, there are still nagging misconceptions out there.

Staff, volunteers and clients actively put out a "constant education stream" that helps knock these misconceptions down, primarily when it comes to the "Big D" word.

"Hospices are perceived as dying, end of life care and a place where there's beds, but there is a lot more to it and everybody who learns about us and connects with us gets that message," says Ms. Bonner. "It really is care from the time of diagnosis and it doesn't mean end of life for us. For our residential hospices, it definitely is that end-of-life piece. We are sort of that front end of care. It is one of the reasons too why we're looking at the name change.


"Our care for non-palliative care clients is growing and that name 'hospice' scared people. Their first reaction would be, 'I'm not dying, why do we need hospice?' We want to highlight that we are about living and about living life to the fullest."

Hope House Hospice is one of six organizations who are joining forces this year under the Better Living Health & Community Services banner, which is a community partner in this week's Wild, Wild West Hoedown, hosted by Magna International.

Better Living's network of hospices work together to provide hospice palliative care and support clients, families and caregivers throughout York Region.

Their share of the Hoedown proceeds will go towards expansion at Hope House; programming, caregiver and bereavement support at Doane House Hospice; the new residential hospice at Hospice Vaughan; as well as the Margaret Bahen Hospice for York Region located at Southlake Regional Health Centre.

Canadian Show Jumping Team takes 4th in BMO Nations' Cup

The Canadian Show Jumping Team, comprised of Ben Asselin, Mario Deslauriers, Eric Lamaze, and Ian Millar placed fourth in the \$400,000 BMO Nations' Cup held Saturday, Sept. 9, as part of the Spruce Meadows 'Masters' tournament in Calgary.

A total of eight countries battled for supremacy in the 41st annual BMO Nations' Cup over a testing track set by two-time Olympic course designer Leopoldo Palacios of Venezuela.

As Canada's lead-off rider, 1984 World Cup Champion Deslauriers, 52, was making his return to the Canadian Show Jumping Team following a nineyear absence representing the United States. Based in New York, Deslauriers was riding Westbrook, a nine-yearold grey Swedish Warmblood gelding (Jaguar Mail x Cardento) that was purchased in March by owners Luja LLC and Wishing Well Farm LLC. With a single mistake at fence number four, a skinny vertical that came down throughout the competition, Deslauriers posted an opening round score of four faults.

Local favourite Asselin, 23, of Calgary, was called up to the Canadian Team on Thursday following the withdrawal of Keean White of Rockwood, and For Freedom Z. With only two days' notice, combined with riding a new mount, Asselin ran into trouble down a line that snaked through the center of the International Ring, having fence four, the open water, and the Canada planks at fence six before also knocking down the "b" element of the triple combination at fence eight for a first-round total of 16 faults.

2008 Olympic Champion Lamaze, 49, who is based in Wellington, FL, brought it back for Team Canada by delivering a clear round with Coco Bongo, a 12-year-old bay Rheinlander gelding (Caretino x Calido) owned by Andy and Carlene Ziegler's Artisan Farms LLC and Lamaze's Torrey Pines Stable.

Ten-time Canadian Olympian Ian Millar of Perth, rode Dixson in the anchor position. With only one rail down at the "b" element of the triple combination, Millar's four faults allowed Canada to drop Asselin's score, as only

the best three scores are counted to-Grange, to a clear round.

Counting only four faults in the second round, Canada had a two-round total of 12 faults to finish in fourth place. A jump-off was necessary to determine a winner between the United States and Brazil, who were tied on eight faults apiece.

Germany took third with a total of nine faults, while Canada finished just off the podium in fourth. Belgium took fifth with a total of 18 faults while France finished sixth with 30 faults.

"We were so close today, but that's the way it is sometimes with show jumping; the result can hinge on a rail that stays in the cups here, or a foot in the water there," said Canadian Show Jumping Team chef d'equipe Mark Laskin of Langley, BC. "If Mario, Eric, or Ian had had four faults less, we would have been jumping off for the

The Canadian Show Jumping Team will make its final Nations' Cup appearance of the year in the FEI Nations' Cup Final in Barcelona, Spain, from Sept. 29 to Oct. 1. Canada was one of two countries from the North American, Central American and Caribbean League to qualify for the Final, alongside the United States.







If you have love and love your neighbour as yourself, wrote St. Paul, you are following all the commandments. Love next to hate is the greatest and most powerful of all human emotions.

And Yeshua, the Jesus man of the Bible, had this primary emotion in abundance. But Yeshua also hated! He hated evil in all its forms. But he didn't hate those who did evil, instead felt great sorrow, another powerful emotion, for them hating only what they were doing.

We know he was pissed off big time by the money changer dudes in the Temple courtyard who were robbing the faithful poor blind and he showed this great anger when he overturned

In his commandments to Moses, God warns the Israelites, saying "Have no other gods than me For I, the Lord, your God, am a jealous God..."

Perhaps Yeshua inherited something of that emotion we call envy and felt at least a little jealousy at the beginning of his teaching mission when his cousin John the Baptist was attracting such a large following and then again when other itinerant preachers were enjoying the attention of large crowds and he wasn't. If indeed this was the case Yeshua kept it well in hand.

But most important of all Yeshua, the Jesus man, seems to epitomize much of St. Paul's description of love in his epistle (teaching letter) to the Christians in the ancient Greek city of Corinth.
