## Second phase of Nobleton sewer work

As King Township moves forward with phase two of the Nobleton sanitary sewer works, councillors are pleased the costs to homeowners have been kept down.

Ainley and Associates will conduct the design, contract administration and inspection aspects of the two contracts associated with the project. Homeowners will get a breakdown of the proposed capital charge amount of \$21,870 per household. The Township will also apply for grant funding through the Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund.

There were no public delegations at council. Councillor David Boyd noted this is a substantial amount of money for homeowners and he praised the collaborative effort between council and staff to bring the costs down.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini said he's proud of staff and he's pleased he can look residents in the eve and sav "we got the price."

"It's the most responsible and respectable thing we've done," he added.

The Township requires an easement for the sewer outlet to King Road, and plans are under way to acquire the needed land. This summer, King got word tha tit will receive funding from the Clean Water and wastewater Fund.

Initially, phase two involved 63 properties but the Township plans to add 11 more properties on Russell Snider, with an option to extend even farther north. Staff will host a public meeting soon to introduce the project team, and provide schedules and costs to residents.

The estimated cost of the building the sewer, watermain and road work for phase two (areas 1 & 2) is pegged at between \$5.1 and \$5.9 million. The net cost is estimated at between \$2.8 and \$3.6 million.

Costs have risen substantially since then, and if council delayed phase two any longer, it would only add to the costs down the road.

#### What are the Proposed Changes

The subject property is designated 'Low Density Residential' and 'Environmental Constraint Area' by the Schomberg Community Plan (OPA #47) and is zoned Urban Residential (R1) by Zoning By-law #74-53, as amended. The new zoning by-law for the Schomberg Community Area (2017-66) has zoned the property as Residential -Single Detached "D" (R1D). The purpose of the Official Plan Amendment application is to provide a medium density designation to permit a 32 unit townhome development, representing a density of 26.25 units per hectare. The purpose of the Zoning By-law Amendment application is to establish a medium density zone which provides for the proposed housing type and establishes site specific provisions to implement the development. The owner intends to remove the existing dwelling and shed and construct a single full access entrance from Main Street.

#### **Appeal Procedure**

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the proposed Official Plan Amendment is adopted, and the By-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of Council of The Corporation of the Township of King

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to The Corporation of the Township of King before the proposed Official Plan Amendment is adopted and the By-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

Any person may attend the public meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed Official Plan or Zoning By-law Amendments. Written comments will become part of the public record.

## Little support at council for municipal election rebate

Political contributions are a recognized way for residents and businesses to get involved in the democratic pro-

Taxpayers can write off provincial and federal political donations on their income tax, but there's no provision for municipal contributions. The idea of giving taxpayers a rebate on their municipal donations garnered little support around the King council table

Municipalities can enact a policy to provide such rebates to residents, through the Municipal Contribution Rebate Program (MCRP), funded by the local tax base. It's at the sole discretion of the municipality. The MCRP would require candidates to issue receipts to donors, who would then apply to the township for a rebate.

Bill 181, the Municipal Elections Modernization Act, 2016, prohibited corporate and trade union donations to municipal election candidates. So, local campaigns may only be funded by donations from individuals, fundraising events and self-financing. The subsequent Bill 68 increases the maximum individual contribution from \$750 to \$1,200 to lessen the impact.

The idea is the rebate policy would encourage greater public participation in local politics, and reduce the financial burdens placed on candidates and donors.

municipalities, including Markham and Vaughan, have implemented MCRPs. The cost to Vaughan in 2014 was \$48,615.

Markham, which has paid out a whopping \$1.5 million to date, admitted there was no conclusive data to support the fact the program was meeting its intended objectives.

The cost of the program to King depends on many variables, including the number of candidates who register, amount of contributions, eligibility criteria and percentage of rebate.

Based on certain parameters, King staff estimated the total cost would be between \$8,000 and \$11,000 for the 2018

As it stands, the municipal election process is funded by annual contributions of \$30,000 to the election reserve, from the tax pool. If King implemented an MCRP, the annual contributions

would have to rise to offset the costs. funding for this rebate program is mu-There would also be administrative costs associated with the program.

Opinions on the idea varied among

Mayor Steve Pellegrini opposes the scheme, noting small municipalities like King shouldn't subsidize political campaigns. Through recent changes, the province is making it tougher for new candidates to enter the political arena. Elections are costly affairs and the mayor pointed out the election of a regional chair in York next year will be the fourth largest election in the prov-

Councillor Debbie Schaefer was the lone supporter, noting funding the rebate is not inconsistent with the Township's mandate of making elections as "good as we can." Citizens are better served, she said, if there's a good slate of candidates. Allowing more revenue sources levels the playing field and encourages more people to get involved.

"There is value in that," she said.

She called the idea progressive and noted the cost would be minimal.

The ever-frugal Councillor Bill Cober noted any rebate or income tax break should be in the hands of the feds and province, not municipalities.

"We don't have the budget for this," he said. He's adamant that he wouldn't support spending anything on a rebate program, until every pothole is filled and every fire truck is repaired.

Councillor Cleve Mortelliti agreed, noting the Township shouldn't designate more tax dollars in this area.

Following the meeting, Schaefer said she was "disappointed" that there was no support from rest of council to introduce a rebate program.

Schaefer said the move to eliminate corporate and union donations was done to reduce outside influence that is often centered on private interest and not on public interest; it is not perfect by any means but to my mind it is a valuable change. Campaigns may only be financed by donations individuals, fundraising events and self-financed

The province did not implement tax credits same for municipal elections when they introduced the ban on corporate and union donations in 2016.

"I believe the municipality needs to step in and address this gap. As indicated in the report the only source of nicipal taxes.

"A rebate reduces an individual's donation. (They donate \$100 and receive back \$50, for example). Very importantly it is an acknowledgment to a donor that the taxpayers in the municipality appreciate that an individual has made a personal donation."

Schaefer added the health and quality of a municipal council is affected by those who seek to be elected. A municipality and its citizens will benefit with broad engagement by the public as to who runs in the election.

"I don't believe it is in the municipality's best interest to be one where it is perceived that candidates need to be self-funded or where a couple big donors essentially fund a candidate or where there is significant advantage to incumbents."

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


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

## Questionable studies, spending raise my eyebrows

We often hear about a "new study" that reveals some weird fact about our current lifestyle. They make the headlines and are repeated on the

Some have made me smile and laugh, while others left me with a look of consternation.

The latest left me shaking my head. Apparently, a new study revealed that moderate alcohol consumption helps

you to learn a new language.

British and Dutch researchers conducted an experiment, published in the Journal of Psychopharmacology. They found people in the study really did speak more fluently after a low dose of alcohol – even when they didn't think so themselves.

The study included 50 native German speakers who were studying at Maastricht University, located in the Netherlands near the border with Germany. Each person was asked to have a casual, two-minute conversation with an interviewer in Dutch. Before that chat, half were given water to drink, while the other half were given an alcoholic beverage. The amount of booze varied based on the person's weight, but for a 150-pound man, it was equivalent to just under a pint of beer.

The authors say it's possible that a low-to-moderate dose of alcohol "reduces language anxiety" and therefore increases proficiency. "This might enable foreign language speakers to speak more fluently in the foreign language after drinking a small amount of alcohol," they conclude.

This is not new. A study conducted in the 1970s saw English-speaking college students complete a pronunciation pro- in 1812 indicated that those speaking in ficiency test in Thai after a few snorts. foreign tongues were actually "pissed as Results showed "those who drank 1.5 a newt."

ounces of alcohol performed better on the pronunciation test than those who had drunk an alcohol-free placebo."

Add this to the study results. In my expert opinion, using first-hand data that I collected over the past three decades, alcohol does expand one's vocabulary of other languages. The top languages spoken after a few drinks include Gibberish, Balderdash, Gobbledygook and Babble. There are likely others.

I hope that no taxpayers' money was used to fund this study.

Further, relying on common vernacular from the early 1700s, slurred-speech language skills can be attributed to a person being "stewed, corned, salted or pickled." Further, data from England

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## Megatrends: Sustainability Summit 2017

"Science is just science until it's applied to something" – Mojdeh Poul, President of 3M Canada

"Any sufficiently advanced technology is indistinguishable from magic" – Clarke's Third Law

"Never attribute to malice that which is adequately explained by stupidity" - Hanlon's Razor

Put those three quotes together and you have a basic idea of what the 3M Corporation was trying to accomplish in one day at their Sustainability Summit 2017 on Global Megatrends. It took place near King City at the magnificent Kingbridge Conference and Retreat Centre, and it was my honour to interview the opening keynote speaker, Richard A. Matthew (BA McGill; PhD Princeton), Associate Dean for International Programs and Professor of Urban Planning and Public Policy at the University of California at Irvine.

I first became aware of the 3M company when I was doing coast to coast leadership seminars in the early 1990s. I was trying to break educational administrators out of their straightjackets, so I used the story of the Post-it® sticky notes developed by a 3M "skunkworks" team. A skunkworks is a project developed by a small and loosely structured group of people who research and develop a project primarily for the sake of radical innovation.

In other words, free the creative thinkers from bureaucratic procedures and they just may come up with something new and functional. In my old North York Board of Education, it was the IDEA (Inter-Disciplinary Educators Association) group of creative wing-nut program leaders who kept the board innovative, and was the first group to get surgically neutered when the TDSB amalgamation took place. Can't have too many creative thinkers around when you're changing regimes.

That was the warning and the message brought by Dr. Matthews. He started off by asking the audience to "perhaps move the conversation away from Trump's tweets." Stop worrying about the inane distractions, and start forward thinking! Or, as 3M likes to say, "If you want to innovate for sustainability,

start caring for tomorrow by spending time today."

As Dr. Matthews outlined his Nine Megatrends, he also cautioned us that the pace of change makes studying complex systems very difficult. We can identify a trend today with all the best knowledge at hand, and it could all change overnight with the current speed of high tech data gathering. The new normal is change and uncertainty, so don't shoot the messenger.

The first Megatrend that caught my attention immediately: dealing with an aging population that could easily live on to 100. As a 70-year-old, brought back to life through medical science advancements, I fully intend to make it to the century mark. But the society in which we live has us taking early retirement at Freedom 55, or more likely 66 for full Canada Pension Plan (CPP) and Old Age Security (OAS). That gives a healthy aging population another 30 years to go before we start recycling.

How will our aging urban infrastructure deal with the needs of this community for safe transportation, medical centres, wellness facilities, and accessible housing? There are now more people over 65 than under 20. There are now workplaces where the needs of four generations need to be considered. We have a 65-year-old that needs face to face communication and human empathy working beside a 16-year old who needs Facebook and constant electronic affirmation via "likes."

Add into this mix an increasing diversity in the workplace as global demographics shift. In a world where our young are unable to read human facial expressions and our seniors are coping with understanding the cultural nuance of "the others," it creates a challenge to human communication perhaps not seen since the Tower of Babel came down.

Megatrend Two dealt with the speed of technological change bringing artificial intelligence, nanotech development, cyberlife, and even meddling with evolution as we genetically modify our customized children. As if this weren't enough, consider the raw speed at which we now process data – what took us a 1,000 years to gather and process we can now do in one day.

Matthews spoke here of the need for "disrupting the world through positive innovation" in contrast to the "negative disruption" being caused by President Trump. Too much negative stress leads to depression, withdrawal, and cardiac arrest. His solution: put the phone down, turn off the black mirror, and take a walk in the woods with a friend.

Megatrend Three dealt with the realities of the rich getting richer and the poor falling further and further behind. He presented the sobering fact that 3 million people in our society are worse off than serfs in the Middle Ages, that the 8 richest people in the world make as much as that earned by 3.7 billion people. That trying to live on \$2 day was a recipe for grinding, consuming poverty leaving the most vulnerable the most easily displaced in times of crisis.

Number Four dealt with severe planetary degradation: the load of toxins, food scarcity, water depletion, deforestation, topsoil loss, and the titanic volumes of plastic waste that are choking our oceans. And what will we do when 65 million environmental refugees fleeing flood, drought, and war come seeking shelter and safety and nourishment and a little human empathy on our high dry lands?

Megatrend Five examined another form of degradation, this on our aging infrastructures in everything from roads and bridges, to sewer and water lines, to energy production to flood and fire disaster management. We have for decades chronically underfunded infrastructure maintenance and improvement and the current model is now unsustainable.

Six looked at the crisis in public health care, the increase in mental health issues, and the role that extreme poverty plays in sickness and depression for the most vulnerable. We should all be painfully aware of what happens when stress causes our immune systems to collapse into dis-ease and we retreat into our reptilian brain stems. As a species we tend not to paint the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel when our bodies and minds are in survival mode.

Megatrend Seven looked at the total collapse of trust (or a "blind trust" in Canada) in governance – how we have declined in confidence in our political

democratic system as we moved into the influence of the military/industrial/ pharmaceutical complex and became a corpocracy. So much so that citizens are simply not voting in elections they feel the outcomes have already been hijacked by the 1%.

In this atmosphere of mistrust, Matthew stressed the need for positive partnerships with clear conditions for success negotiated between the public and private sectors.

Number Eight dealt with Global Security Threats. Matthew smiled at the audience and said, "I think we've all heard enough about this for now."

Number Nine, Education. We have an industrial model school system with a largely irrelevant curriculum that is boring students to death. They often get more relevant information about the world around them from a YouTube seminar or a TED talks podcast on their cell phones.

The lyrics Gord Downie first sang in 1992, about another travesty of justice in Canada, could easily be applied to high school students enduring their final four years of yesterday's curricu-


prime ministers."

I was reminded of Jared Diamond's novel "Collapse: why societies choose to succeed or fail." If we have learned the lessons of Mesopotamia, and the Roman Empire, and Easter Island, perhaps we can avoid the next collapse. If not, we can at least plan to rebuild from a post-apocalyptic world. But we will never be able to change our direction or mitigate our disasters driving at high speed looking in the rear view mirror.

As Richard Matthew challenged us at the beginning of his talk, the time is right now to move the conversation towards innovative disruption and a sustainable future.

Megatrend Nine: Education, Irrelevant to Relevant: "Most of us no longer have any idea where to find the line between fact and fantasy, between what is scientifically plausible and what is scientific nonsense.

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
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#### Weekly Recipe Spinach & Apricot **Stuffed Pork Tenderloin**

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil 1 tsp. extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 tbsp. chopped dried apricots
- 3/4 tsp. pumpkin pie spice 1 bag baby spinach
- 1 clove garlic
- 1/4 c. chopped walnuts 1/2 c. apricot preserves
- 1/4 c. chicken stock • 1 tbsp. Chopped flat-leaf parsley • 1 1/4 lb. pork tenderloin
- kosher salt ground black pepper

DIRECTIONS 1. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. In a large ovenproof skillet, heat 1 teaspoon of oil over medium-high heat. Add the onion, apricots, and pumpkin pie spice and cook, stirring, until softened, about 5 minutes. Add the spinach and cook, stirring, until liquid evaporates, about 5 minutes. Add garlic and cook 1 minute more. Stir in walnuts and season with salt and pepper. Scrape the filling into a bowl and set aside

2. Meanwhile, in a small saucepan, combine preserves with stock and a pinch each of salt and pepper. Simmer over medium heat until slightly thickened, about 5 minutes. Remove glaze from heat and

stir in parsley. 3. Butterfly pork: Place tenderloin on a cutting board. Using a sharp knife, run blade along length of tenderloin parallel to board. As you cut, open meat until you have a flat piece. Using a meat pounder, pound tenderloin to 1/2-inch thickness. Season with 1/8 teaspoon each salt and pepper and spread filling over meat. Roll tenderloin into original shape. Using kitchen twine, tie pork at 2-inch intervals. Season pork with 1/4 teaspoon each salt and pepper. 4. Using the same ovenproof skillet, heat remaining 2 tablespoons oil until shimmering. Add rolled pork and cook over medium-high heat, turning, until browned all over, about 8 minutes. Transfer pan to oven and roast until an instant-read thermometer registers 145 degrees F in the thickest section, about 15 minutes. Loosely cover pork with foil and let rest 10 minutes. Remove strings and cut pork into 1-inch-thick slices. Transfer to a platter and drizzle with glaze. Recipe by Sunny Anderson

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
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## Mayor touts economic development strategy

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
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## Sip & Savour reaches its goal



## Schomberg Cougars fall twice to Golden Hawks

All is not well in the Cougar den. Four regulation losses in a row have the Schomberg Cougars falling behind in the Provincial Junior Hockey League's Carruthers division, after a

strong start had the Jr. C club near the top of the eight-team pack.

Looking to recoup from a 7-4 loss to the Midland Flyers the week prior, the Cougars hosted the rival Caledon Golden Hawks at Trisan Centre for their weekly home game on Thursday, the first meeting of the season between the clubs.

It was another high-scoring contest, one of many for the Cougars so far in the early season, with Caledon coming out on top 6-4.

As is often the case in rival contests, the play on the ice often took a back-seat to the rough stuff, with the teams combined for 127 minutes in penalties.

It was actually Schomberg who entered the third period with a 2-1 lead, thanks to goals from Brandon Scholten and Connor Kearney, making it a 3-1 game just seconds into the third off the stick of Mitchell Robinson.

Scrums broke out shortly after Caledon stormed back to tie the game at three, however, and a carousel to the penalty box led to two power play goals for the Hawks to take the lead.

Owen Heilemann brought the Cougars back to within one with just under four minutes left in the game, though

captain Matt Magliozzi shut the door with Caledon's sixth of the game just 29 seconds later.

Schomberg goaltender Albert Parente was peppered with shots throughout the contest, making 38 saves on 44 shots

A rematch the following day in Caledon looked promising to continue the tussle, though remained mostly tame in a game that saw Caledon lead the entire way.

Matthew Lolli was strong between the pipes for Schomberg in the opening frame, only beaten with thirty seconds to go and allow Caledon a 1-0 lead at intermission.

## Dedication of 'Hughie's Cathedral'

Not so hidden, at the end of Roselena Drive in Schomberg, is a lovely park for children to play. Behind that is "Hughie's Cathedral," a magical little place.

Recently, the McGuire family and neighbours gathered to witness the dedication of signs acknowledging the natural and cultural significance of the forest that will be enjoyed by current and future generations of people living in and

These lands were purchased from the Phillips family by Hugh Frank McGuire and his wife Roselena. They had a small dairy herd, and bred and trained horses. The dairy was located approximately where the library stands today. Hugh and Roselena had 10 children and had made the move to Schomberg in order to be close to the new continuation school, which was just being constructed (Schomberg

Life was difficult for the McGuires through the Depression in the 1930s but as they became more successful and the children were grown, Roselena began painting and became an accomplished artist. After the death of both Hugh and Roselena in 1965, the land was divided between the children. Many McGuires still live in the Schomberg area today.

This woodlot was especially loved by Hugh and he protected it from logging, even when money was tight. The family named it "Hughie's Cathedral."

The forest is an example of a Beech-Maple forest which dominated the landscape between the Great Lakes and the Boreal forest up to a few hundred years ago. American Beech and Sugar Maple are the dominant tree species and are found together because they nurture the growth of each other's seedlings. Other tree species found here in smaller numbers are Ironwood, American Elm, and Black Cherry. A grove of Eastern Hemlock is located at the northern corner of the forest. Similar to Sugar Maple and American Beech, Eastern Hemlock is very shade tolerant and can wait for years under the canopy of the forest for a little sunlight to start growing.

The diversity of age and species composition in this forest is suggestive of an old growth forest. Of particular note is the beautiful display of spring woodland flowers, including Trout Lilies, May Apple, Blood Root and Trillium. Because of the shady forest conditions after the leaves emerge on the trees, woodland flowers only have a few short weeks in the spring to store up all their energy from the sun. As a result it may take several years for a plant to mature and flower.

This forest is an extremely high quality ecosystem but because of its limited size is sensitive to disturbance.

The preservation and celebration of Hughie's Cathedral is a result of the efforts of the Dufferin Marsh Nature Connection (DMNC), in partnership with the King Historical Society and the Township of King.

revised "stress test" guidelines aimed at qualifying requirements for home owners who have uninsured mortgages.

Borrowers with a down payment or equity in their home of under 20% of its value must purchase mortgage insurance, such as CMHC insurance. This insurance protects the lender, not the homeowners.

Uninsured mortgages, where the homeowner has equity in the home of more than 20% of its value, are not required to have this insurance.

The new stress test for uninsured mortgages is meant to ensure that the borrower would be able to service the loan if interest rates become higher than they are

The borrower has to qualify for the loan using the greater of:

- the 5 year Bank of Canada benchmark rate (currently 4.89%)
- the rate in the mortgage contract plus 2%

The higher the rate, the more income required or higher equity to be injected.

Here is a case study of the potential impact to a typical borrower: A couple in the Greater Toronto Area wish to purchase a home for \$1,000,000 and use a \$200,000 down payment. They need an \$800,000 first mortgage (uninsured) and are quoted a rate of 3.39%. They currently make \$150,000 combined annual income and qualify for this loan.

Under the new rules effective January 1, 2018, the couple would not qualify for this loan. In fact, they would need to prove an extra \$25,000 in combined annual income for the same loan. Alternatively, they would have to provide additional equity of \$125,000 (total equity of \$325,000). They could be required to seek a private mortgage to cover the shortfall.


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

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

#### Horticulture By John Arnott

That pumpkin you're about to crave into a Halloween jack-o'-lantern has a history dating back to prehistoric times. Seeds from pumpkin-like squash dating from between 5,000 to 7,000 years ago have been found in Mexico where it is believed most squash and pumpkin, a naturally hybridized variety of squash, originated.

Usually deep yellow to orange with a smooth but more often lightly ribbed shells pumpkins have the botanical name cucurbita – Latin for gourd, pepo from the Greek pepon meaning large melon. Our name comes from pepon to pompon in France through pumpion in England finally becoming pumpkin in English speaking colonial North Amer-

In the last few years, white or ghost pumpkins have become popular. There are green coloured pumpkins as well.

All pumpkins are classed as winter

squash and now go by that name in Britain and Australia-New Zealand

This North American native is today grown worldwide with Canada, United States, China and India being the largest producers.

Pumpkins here in our area are a warm weather crop with seeds being planted from mid June to early July when the top 3in./8 cm of soil is at least 15.5 C/60 F. Pumpkins need a good amount of moisture to grow well thus the growing soil must retain water but not be soggy. Plants do poorly in sandy soil or soil that's badly drained. They also need to grow full sun.

Pumpkin plants are ground lying bristly stemmed vines that produce both male and female flowers and large edible gently lobed leaves The large hibiscus like male yellow flowers also edible attract pollinators especially the squash bees [peponapis pruinosa] but due to wide use of pesticides these bees have dramatically declined and honey bees have taken their place but with honey bees becoming scarce hand pollination in some areas is now necessary.

For thousands of years First Nations people grew the squash we call pumpkin as food, even roasting and eating the seeds. Medicinally it was to treat intestinal worms and urinary problems. All this they shared with the incoming European colonists.

Modern veterinarians use pumpkin extract to treat cats for hairballs and both dogs and cats for constipation and diarrhoea.

Today pumpkins are grown commercially as animal feed and for ornamental use such as those often intricately carved jack-o'-lanterns (in the British Isles where jack-o'-lanterns originated they were usually carved from turnips, swedes/rutabagas). The seeds of the green pumpkin are used to produce an unsaturated oil for cooking, healthy salad dressings and for herbal medicines.

The extremely large pumpkins that can weigh hundreds of pounds/kilograms and are best known in pumpkin growing contests originated from the cucurbita maxima-Latin for large, species horticulturists found growing in South America. It is related to the pepo which is probably its main ancestor.

The idea of using pumpkin as a pie filling came from pioneer times when once the seeds had been removed the pumpkin "meat" was mashed inside the shell and mixed with cream, honey and all spice or cinnamon/cassia, then baked.

In early Christian times the new day began at dawn rather than midnight. This ancient tradition is still kept in many Christian monastic establishments and the dawn religious service that begins the day is called Lauds. This from the Latin laudare meaning to praise or honour as the service began with Psalm 148 Laudate Dominum – Praise the Lord through Psalm 149 Cantate Domino – Sing to the Lord and ending with Psalm 150 Laudate Dominum –Praise God (the Lord). Lauds greets the dawn which each day symbolizes the Resurrection of Christ and consecrates to him the new day. The Office (Service) of Lauds is meant to show Christians that first thing every morning they should turn their thoughts to God giving praise and thanks for the new day and asking his blessing before facing the challenges of that day.

Every Tuesday morning now in keeping with this tradition the Anglican Parish of Lloydtown (Christ Church, Kettleby; St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton, and St. Mary Magdalene's Church in Schomberg) is holding a morning prayer dawn service from 6:30 a.m. till 7 a.m. at the Schomberg church to parallel Lauds. Irreverents may see it as the Yawn Service!

What a great way to start the day seeking God's guidance for what lies ahead! All are more than welcome to attend this relaxed candlelight service. Bring your morning coffee from home or Tim's if you wish. And a discreet yawn is permitted!

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


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
