



Streetlight retrofit program

More than 2,000 streetlights in King Township will be converted from standard high-pressure sodium (HPS) types to light emitting diode (LED) ones starting this month.

Upgrading from HPS to LED streetlights will improve visibility, safety and reduce light pollution. LED lights also use significantly less power than HPS ones and align with King's Sustainability Plan.

At current hydro rates, it's estimated the cost will be paid back from reduced maintenance and power consumption in around nine years.

King's new recreation complex will be envy of York Region

King's planned multi-faceted recreation complex will be a model, and the envy of all other York municipalities.

This model of cooperation resulted in an innovative agreement between King Township and Seneca College. The deal sees Seneca providing a 25acre parcel on its lands at the northwest corner of Dufferin and the 15th Sideroad, on a 60-year ground lease. King will build and operate the facility.

It's called a Township-wide recreation centre and it promises to be a state-of-the-art facility.

King's Parks, Recreation & Culture department is in the initial stages of planning and designing the complex and it's looking for public feedback into what residents would like to see.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini, who worked hard to broker the deal with Seneca, said the complex will be a "foundational piece," and the partnerships and cost-sharing are simply remarkable.

"It's awesome to know we're going to get it right," he said.

It's a clear expression of what the PCs plan to do if elected. 
Brown said they are also very committed to small business in Ontario. They've heard from business leaders and he vows to cut red tape and implement tax breaks to help them succeed.

an innovative design.

Online and hard copy surveys were distributed throughout King user groups, committees and even schools. So far, staff have 750 pieces of input.

Current feedback from the public revealed that a swimming pool, fitness area, skating/hockey rink and fitness area are priorities.

"Not surprisingly, swimming, fitness and ice usages were at the top of the list," Fasciano said in his report. "We also asked respondents to then prioritize these items. We also asked for innovative, out of the box ideas and received some creative suggestions. These included rock climbing, obstacle

courses, juice bars, indoor parks and places for students to study.'

Fasciano said in moving forward, they have to establish a wish list, a needs' list and then decide what's feasible in terms of the physical building and cost.

Staff will take all the feedback and create an RFP for Prime Consulting Services. Staff will present the facilities component of the master plan update in the spring of 2018.

It was previously reported that the estimated cost of the facility is in the neighbourhood of \$30 million. However, roughly 80% of this will be covered by developer contributions.

Don't open unassumed roads!

The opening of roads across the East Humber River Valley must not be considered.

The environmentally sensitive Conservation Authority and Greenbelt lands would be destroyed to accommodate commuters and opening these roads, or any of the unassumed road allowances, would mean the loss of the very reason many of us have chosen to live in rural King Township.

I moved to live on Mill Road to enjoy walks in the surrounding, protected river valley made possible by the dead-ending of the 7th and the 8th Concessions. As Tony Komljanec pointed out in his letter to the editor of December 14, Mill Road has become the only north/south shortcut. I agree that since the expansion of Nobleton and Schomberg, this winding, river valley gravel road has become a nightmare morning and evening for residents. An alternative must be found that does not mean the further destruction of the Humber River Valley lands and the natural wildlife corridor that it provides.

It's easy to find efficient solutions by completing a grid on a map that, when drawn, had no consideration for the environment.

What is the point of living here if the rural character of King is destroyed? People seeking more efficient commuting should perhaps consider moving closer to the city or to existing public transit. Indeed, it will be a much more efficient public transit system that will solve all our commuting problems.

Some local parks have been showcased, too. Both the Great Blue Heron Park in King City and Tasca Park in Nobleton were completed. Rafferty's Corners Park is being expanded. We're heading into the consultation

A complete overhaul of King's Official Plan - "One King" has been done and is scheduled to be finished in early


Zoning bylaws for the urban areas of King City, Schomberg and Nobleton have also been completed.



Proposal Details:

The proposed new community is located in King City south of 15th Sideroad and north of the railway line between Keele and Dufferin Streets and has a combined area of approximately 205 hectares (506.5 acres).

An update to the original 2007 Functional Servicing / Development Area Study has been submitted to the Township of King, it includes a comprehensive set of studies supporting and informing the proposed development Concept Plan, which provides a guide for future development within its boundaries.

Prior to the development of the land an amendment to the Township of King Zoning By-law and the approval of Draft Plans of Subdivision shall also be required. These will be dealt with in a separate public process.

Business engagement leads to revamped sign bylaw for Township

A revamped sign bylaw will be presented to council for its approval Jan. 8.

Since its implementation in 2013, concerns were raised by the business community and the King Chamber of Commerce. A Chamber survey and forum gathered input, and revealed most felt the bylaw was too restrictive regarding certain types of signage and methods of advertising.

Staff has been working closely with the Chamber and a working group was formed to find reasonable solutions. One of the main issues raised by the working group was that more common and emerging signage and marketing trends were being permitted in other communities.

"Overall, the Sign Bylaw has generally been successful in regulating signs within the Township," staff noted. "Staff has been working with the bylaw since 2013 and recognizes that

some house-keeping amendments are warranted, as interpretation and clarifications have been required since the bylaw was adopted. Any proposed house-keeping modifications are to ensure that the bylaw is clear, concise and adequately regulates signage within King Township the way it was always intended to."

Areas of improvement include relaxed restrictions to colour and periods of time for mobile signs; expanding on various types of signs, and permitted special promotion signage.

Staff agreed that additional types of signage can be allowed. All temporary signs do require a permit to comply with the bylaw.

There are challenges in dealing with strip malls with numerous tenants. Staff did conceded they would allow more signs per frontage and applying a break period for the same tenant.

The updated bylaw includes a lot of attention to election signs and provisions governing their installation.

Staff also fine-tuned signs for realtors and contractors.

"This new Sign Bylaw will provide for new signage opportunities," staff noted. "Further, this bylaw will ensure signage in the Township is enforceable and in alignment with provincial legislation ... The draft Sign Bylaw ... is a bylaw that fairly reflects revised permissions as identified through engagement with the Sign Working Group."

Tom Allen, president of the King Chamber of Commerce, said these changes have been years in the making. While marketing now involves technology based tools, sometimes old methods are best. "A sign is still a sign," he said.

"While our local businesses use Facebook, websites and other technology based tools, an old fashioned sign is still a significant tool in marketing a business."

Allen talked about the business forums held in the three urban centres, which included plenty of feedback from

"We heard many ideas to help businesses thrive in King. One theme that was common to all three discussions was some frustration around the sign by-law, particularly in multi-tenant properties. It is one thing to express frustration, but it is more valuable to focus those thoughts into tangible ideas. With the forum comments we had a Chamber Committee work on formulating ideas that would help."

Allen said the Chamber conducted surveys and through dialogue with Township staff, including Economic Development officer Jamie Smyth, the draft bylaw was formulated.

The key change sought by business was to make some signs that were formerly prohibited to be permitted, Allen said.

"Signs remain an important part of marketing a local business," he concluded.


Councillor Cleve Mortelliti said he's happy to see some of these changes.

Councillor Dave Boyd said the Township has to support the Chamber and its businesses.

Councillor Bill Cober said the intent of the original bylaw was to prevent "sign pollution," and he's happy the bylaw has been revamped. He also praised the Chamber's advocacy in this issue.


The approved net operating budget for 2018 is \$323.5 million. The capital budget is \$22.6 million. This represents a 4.1 per cent increase over 2017.



The BMW i8 offers far more than aesthetics and performance. The powerful plug-in hybrid system, combined with the BMW eDrive technology and a BMW TwinPower Turbo 1.5-litre, 3-cylinder gasoline engine, brings together the benefits of an electric motor and a gasoline engine to produce an outstanding driving experience.

Charlotte and her husband George have been fans of green cars for some time. They owned the first diesel Smart car and George was one of the first to drive the Toyota Prius. He currently drives a Smart fortwo Electric Drive.

The Smart Fortwo coupe, at just 2.69 metres long, basically launched the energy-efficient market. The electric model, which is the epitome of cute, retails for roughly \$28,000 and is the perfect urban driver.

His and Hers

Local entrepreneur Angelo Santorelli of Trisan Construction sees his family's pair of Teslas as good business

They are definitely the way of the future, and are so economical to operate. Santorelli says it costs him \$12 a week. They cost literally "nothing to run" and insurance is cheaper, too.

They have owned the S sedan and X SUV for roughly two years now. He admitted it took him a while to get used to the car's range, and all of its features. But he says you just have to be organized. More and more charging stations are popping up across the GTA so there are no worries.

He frequently uses the auto pilot feature and said it's very useful, but you still have to be in control of the vehicle. You have to be patient while driving in this mode because the vehicle tends to be cautious.

He will definitely upgrade to new models when they arrive on the market. He'd love to get his hands on the first Tesla pickup truck.

EV Society

Former King resident Wilf Steimle founded a high-tech company in 1983 and served as its president until 2014 when he sold his shares to pursue his passion for sustainable energy and electric vehicles. In 2015 he completed Al Gore's climate reality training and lives off-grid as a demonstration of his commitment to a zero-carbon footprint.

Steimle said the advantages are huge over conventional vehicles. He lauds Tesla, noting without their efforts, "we wouldn't be as far ahead."

While Tesla offers premium models, Steimle pointed out there are five curthe near future.

rent models that come in under \$20,000 with the rebate.

Many European countries are ahead of the curve. Countries like England, Germany, Holland and Denmark have announced they plan to ban the sale of gas-power cars starting in 2025.

"The writing is on the wall," he said. "We're moving from a fossil-fuel, carbon-based economy to an electric economy."

He also pointed out that North American manufacturers will convert to electric drivetrains within the next three to eight years.

The infrastructure network of chargers is huge and growing. Battery life is also being extended. While still in its infancy, it's predicted the lifespan of an electric vehicle will be well beyond 20

His five-year-old Tesla S is approaching 200,000 kilometres without a single problem.

Wilf embarked on a 14,000-kilometre coast-coast trip in 2016 to meet and help unite leaders of electric vehicle groups throughout the country.

It's a family affair for the Steimles. His father drives a Chev Bolt and his wife loves her Chevy Volt.

Prices will come down, and in the end, electric vehicles will benefit those in lower income groups, who spend a disproportionate amount of money on gas and maintenance.

"We need to do this (convert to EVs) for so many reasons," he said.

In 2016 he joined the board of directors of Electric Mobility Canada and serves on several committees. In the same year he accepted the role of President of the Electric Vehicle Society.

The EV Society is a leading non-governmental group that delivers province-wide owner to potential-owner engagement based on experience, knowledge, and boundless enthusiasm.

Good-bye to gas

Passionate EV owner Keith Beckley of King is another cheerleader.

Consumers are looking for something different, he noted, and he puts EV adopters into four categories.

There are "performance junkies (this is a large percentage of Tesla drivers)." The performance of these cars is remarkable.

Green lovers and anti-oil motorists. And the "tech adopters" who love the newest technology.

"The other big force has been Tesla itself," he said. "They have created a very desirable brand. Every guy in the room at my men's hockey now wants to own one."

The trend will continue and these EVs will overtake conventional cars in

ity (a few years out) the ongoing costs are going to be fractional compared to an ICE. An electric drive train (including battery) should last 1.6 million kilometres. That is game changing."

Will they change the landscape en-

"Think about your ICE vehicle having negative equity once EVs are widely adopted. No one will want one."

Tesla, he said "is exceptional – a clear leader who is absolutely killing the high end sedan market." The German automakers, Beckley pointed out, are the biggest electric car developers.

"Tesla is on a mission to get us off carbon. That helps command tremendous customer loyalty. It's not just another car company."

The future will only get brighter for EVs. They'll become cheaper and consumers will have many more choices.

There are only two minor issues regarding EVs, Beckley said.

The initial purchase price tends to run higher at the moment, but this will change dramatically in the next few years.

The charging infrastructure is another minor issue, but huge changes are on the horizon.

"When I got my Tesla Model S five years ago (one of the first 10 in Canada) there were only a few chargers around anywhere. Long distance travel was an adventure. Now I don't even think about it. I drove from King City to Sarnia in my wife's Model X. My wife, daughter and I are going to drive to Florida in March for free!"

The Beckleys do not own an internal combustion engine of any type. The Teslas are "technological marvels that







His first assist came in the first period of Canada's first game, a win over Team Finland. A tic-tac-toe play along with Jonah Gadjovich and Drake Batherson made the score 3-1 at the time, a game that ended 4-2.

"We had a pretty strong game," said Mete. "We took it to them in the first period, set the tone, and came out with the win. We have a lot of great skaters on this team, so if we can use our speed to our advantage, we will."

"It could have been a lot more than a 4-2 game, I think."

He continued his point streak into the game the next day, a 6-0 win over Team Slovakia, setting up Jordan Kyrou in the second period.

Held off the scoresheet in a 4-3 shootout loss to Team USA on Dec. 30, a game held in front of close to 45,000 fans at New Era Field in Buffalo, Mete started the final round robin game against Denmark before being pulled for precautionary reasons.

Coach Ducharme said the injury actually occurred in the outdoor game against the United States, and pulled Mete to give him extra time to recover before the playoff rounds.

"We want him to be 100-percent, and felt he needed an extra day," said Ducharme. "That's it."

The tournament wraps up on Friday with the medal rounds.



Anglican Parish By John Arnott

St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes that prehistoric humans, especially in the Northern Hemisphere, were very much aware of the constant changing cycles of time and calculated the time when they believed returning strength of the sun aided by their huge bonfires and primitive ceremonies would usher in another cycle of new life.

Ancient records near to 5,000 years old tell us humans have marked New Year's with joyous though often riotous even lavisicious celebrations but not always on Jan. 1.

The people of ancient Mesopotamia (now Iraq), especially the Babylonians, held their New Year's on the day following the first new moon after the Spring Equinox (March 20 or 21), which is close to the way the date for Easter is determined. This holiday called Akitu lasted several days starting with the parading of statues of their chief god Marduk through the streets followed by religious services in the main temples. It symbolized a time, thousands of

years before, when the god, victorious over chaos, cleansed and recreated the world in time for the return of spring and new life. Once the religious ceremonies were over it was time merry making and feasting.

The date of the ancient Persian celebration of New Year's - Nowruz or "new day" - influenced no doubt by the Mesopotamians, began about the same time, but the customs involved, such as the wearing of bright colours, dyeing eggs, exchanging gifts, feasting and general merry making, date to much earlier time making it according to many historians the oldest observance of New Year's yet found recorded.

Wepet Renpet or "opening of the year" is what the ancient Egyptians called New Year's. And lasting for almost a month it coincided with the annual flooding caused the Nile River in mid-July when the river blessedly spread a new layer of fertile silt brought from its upper reaches in east central Africa over the farm lands bordering its banks. This was seen by the Egyptians as a godsend as the land seemed to be reborn for the new growing season. First religious rite were held honouring and thanking the gods especially Ra the sun god. Then feasting and merry making could begin in which drinking date wine often led to mass drunkenness – so much so that during the reign of Queen Hatshepsut the only woman to become a pharaoh in the country's long history the holiday was nicknamed "the Month of Drunkenness."

For the ancient Greeks New Year's fell at the time of the summer solstice around June 21 later called midsummer (which it wasn't but rather the first day of that season) and it wasn't marked by any special celebration. In Athens city officials made sacrifices to Zeus and Athena the god and goddess they believed protected the city state. And it was the practice to have business deals concluded as they could not be carried unresolved into the new year nor could unresolved criminal trials.



New Year's customs introduced 3,000 years ago during the Shang Dynasty in ancient China are still very much a part of today's Chinese New Year's festivities including special holiday family feasts. Originally in rural China the red decorations, bright lights, dragon dances, burning of bamboo sticks loud noise makers (now the task of fire crackers) were once thought to frighten away a blood thirsty creature called Nian, whose name is now the Chinese word for year. This 15-day festival filled with merriment, happy family reunions and gift giving begins on the day of the second full moon following the winter solstice (Dec. 21) making it happen sometime between Jan. 20 and Feb. 20.

Of course, Scotland's New Year's is known as Hogmanay, the name coming from Gaelic and probably Norse-Viking roots, and falls on the last day of the year and carries over into the next 2 days. It's the traditional time for Scots to exchange gifts, visit neighbours, family and friends and indulge in a festive meal. First footing is an important part of the Scottish celebration with the hope being the first person to visit hair which is supposed to bring good luck to those living there! This visitor is treated to a piece of famous Scottish shortbread and a wee taste of the guid whiskey!

Now the year as we know it began to evolve with the Romans. They had neither months called January nor a February in their early history. The stretch of time now filled by those months was to them "a monthless winter" and their new year didn't begin until the first day of March. It was their semi-legendary emperor Numa Pompilius (a Sabine not a Roman) who is credited with having Ianuarius (classical Latin had no j) and Februarius created. Around 713 BC the beginning of the new year was switched to the calendae of Ianuarius.

The calendar year remained unchanged until 46 BC when Julius Caesar had it overhauled and the Julian Calendar came into being with the new month of July to honour its designer added. His great nephew and successor Augustus honoured himself with another new month also carved out of the existing ones.

In medieval Europe under the Julian, New Year's Day could fall on any of several dates including March 1 or 25, Easter, Sept. 1 or Christmas, depending on where one lived. This remained in effect until 1582 when Pope Gregory the home on New Year's Days has dark XIII reformed the Julian and the Gre-

gorian Calendar, the one we use today, was born.

With its implementation New Year's went back to its Roman date January 1. But not everyone changed and while in 1600 Scotland now held its Hogmanay

celebration to welcome the new year, England, Ireland and Wales and as a result England's American and Canadian colonies, still held New Year's on March 25, changing only to January 1


