

Cohesive approach to large-scale development

An innovative approach to largescale development is taking shape near King City.

King councillors received details of the King City North East Functional Servicing/Development Area Study (FSDAS), a comprehensive plan (template) to bring cohesiveness to a massive tract of land involving six property

Township staff made a presentation. noting this isn't a planning application per se, but rather an encompassing study to streamline the process, and encourage all landowners to cooperate in a joint submission. It's an unprecedented opportunity to plan a community in unison; a sort of "planning without borders."

The King City Community Plan requires an FSDAS to provide the foundation for the integration of development for this new "community area."

Given the magnitude – just over 1,000 units which will be home to more than 3.000 residents – it is like planning a village.

The King City East Landowners Group (KCELG) consists of various property owners in the study area, who have come together.

"The completion of the FSDAS is effectively the first step towards the implementation of the residential development contemplated by OPA 89," Township staff noted. "The FSDAS proposes a range of uses including residential of varying forms and lot sizes, parks, a school, environmental protection lands and stormwater management."

The study area is the northeast quadrant of King City, north of the railway

corridor, south of the 15th Sideroad, west of Dufferin. The KCELG controls roughly 86% of the 239-acre area.

Planner Gaspare Ritacca noted the FSDAS will form the foundation or template for all future applications, and outline how it will fit together. It will include everything from road patterns and walkways, to trails and a cycling path. He noted it's still in the early stages and under view by various agencies.

At this point, staff has some concerns with those properties that back onto Dufferin. They would also like to see the percentage of townhouses increased throughout the area. There are some concerns about the total number of homes and the density proposed.

This area consists of eight properties, six owners, and 113 hectares of developable lands.

At this point, the overall plan consists of 897 detached homes, 47 townhouses and 77 condominiums. It also has a network of open spaces, a community park, two neighbourhood parks, and a site for a future elementary school.

There are plans for a pedestrian and cycling trail and path network.

Staff noted the number of cul-de-sac roads should be minimized to enhance neighbourhood connectivity. There's a need to redesign the development pattern, they said, to reduce double frontage properties.

The owners of a block of land at 13330 Dufferin are not part of the KCELG, but their lands must be included in the FS-

Township staff will continue to encourage cooperation among these landowners.

Joan MacIntvre, representing the owner, said there is a renewed level of cooperation between her clients and the rest of the group, and they hope all issues will be resolved.

Staff reported that in general, the FSDAS provides "a significant amount of connectivity throughout the different sections of the study area. Overall, through a network of sidewalks, trails, and bike/multi use paths, the FSDAS proposes a high level of pedestrian connectivity."

Community loses one of its cornerstones, Paul Olsen

The King community is mourning the loss of one of its biggest supporters. Paul Olsen, volunteer and founder of Brookdale Treeland Nursery, passed away suddenly March 3 at home.

Olsen was hard at work, as usual, at the Nobleton United Church's Pasta Dinner Friday evening. He served as MC and handed out some prizes to guests. He died at home early Saturday morning.

The Nobleton Lions Club said they are "deeply saddened by the loss of one of our own. Lion Paul Olsen has been a great friend and a truly outstanding member of our community."

Mayor Steve Pellegrini said it was "a great loss for our community. You made King a better place!"

In fact, Olsen was named Citizen of the Year in 2015.

Olsen was a strong supporter and 50-year member of the Nobleton Lions Club, and has embraced the annual Purina Walk for Dog Guides fundraiser. He's been involved in the Nobleton United Church and secured a grant to help the church's accessibility. He volunteered for several Township committees and through BTN, has been an annual sponsor of the Schomberg Fair.

Paul's "incredible fundraising efforts" have provided many opportunities for various King Township focused organizations.

Councillor Linda Pabst knew Paul for more than 40 years, and he was the first to encourage her to run for politics

more than 24 years ago.

"He was one of the most amazing mentors," she said. "He was the greatest community supporter of all, and a true friend, who was always just a phone call away."

Paul was chair of the board of Nobleton United Church. He not only conducts meetings of the board, he organized a group of neighbouring United churches to come together to plan special events. The most notable event was held in the old Schomberg Arena with former Moderator Bruce McLeod to celebrate the 85th anniversary of the United Church of Canada (2010).

Van Loan says Liberals will increase spending and debt, fail Lake Simcoe

The federal government's budget is all about higher spending and debt that will cost York-Simcoe residents now and for the future, according to MP Peter Van Loan.

The budget includes higher taxes for small enterprises and entrepreneurs. Most businesses in York-Simcoe are small enterprises. These are piled on top of the previous tax increases by the Liberals, that include the elimination of the Children's Fitness Tax Credit, Children's Arts Tax Credit, Education Tax Credit, income splitting, to name a

Van Loan said the Liberals are proposing to increase the national debt beyond anything they promised in the

"In 2015, Justin Trudeau promised that deficits would never be larger \$10 billion. Yet, Budget 2018 continues his pattern of broken promises with a deficit of \$18 billion – three times what the Liberals promised it would be by this point in their term. This will result in higher debt, meaning higher taxes

down the road. Worse, the Government has admitted that under the Liberals. there is no plan to balance the budget for the next 40 years," Van Loan said

"What does higher national debt mean for the typical York-Simcoe family? The Liberal budget increases each family's share of the national debt by a whopping \$1,800.

"This Liberal budget is a continuation of the previous ones - broken promises and the wrong priorities for York-Simcoe," he added.

In addition to higher taxes, and larger national debt, the Liberal Budget failed to re-establish the Lake Simcoe Clean-Up Fund.

"The Lake Simcoe Clean-Up Fund was an important contribution towards saving our Lake. But the work was not finished" said Van Loan. "I will hold the Liberal Government accountable for this decision. It puts our lake environment, and our communities, at risk."

The Lake Simcoe Clean-Up Fund was started in 2008, by the previous Conservative government. With over \$40 million in funding, the Fund saw huge success.

Bill 148 impacts still being felt

The impacts of Bill 148 is a domino effect and the 3 ripples are still being felt. While the minimum wage increase has attracted most of the headlines on this bill, there are several provisions that will all add costs.

Business can either pass the cost on as price increases or find other ways to cut costs.

"It is little wonder some businesses are looking at anything that is not legally required, such as providing a paid break to offset their cost increases. Most small businesses earn a very middle income wage for themselves," according to Jay Rider, a board member with the King Chamber of Commerce. If you check Indeed.com they state entrepreneurs earn 64,000 on average

and that would include a handful of very successful entrepreneurs. So the median average for small businesses would be lower. Therefore, it is harmful for them to absorb the costs personally.


Rider predicts we will see less hiring of the very people the government espouses to be helping.

"It is great if you are the person who retains a minimum wage job at a higher rate; not so great for the kid who never gets hired," he said.

Overall it is cost increases for small business in many forms, all of which will lead to fewer student jobs, fewer entry level jobs, and fewer part time jobs for the semi-retired.

Nobleton Jr. Public School to be demolished

While it's a "hard pill to swallow," King councillors approved the demolition permit for the former Nobleton Junior Public School.

But before the community bids farewell to the historic building, some pieces will be saved and preserved.

The bell tower, bricks and the cornerstone date block will be salvaged. Staff will look into the costs for restoration and perhaps display the tower on municipal property in the future.

The school was listed on the Municipal Heritage Register back in 2015 and that designation will be removed as well

The reality is, the building can't be saved, nor can it be restored to its former glory.

The York Region District School Board deemed the land as surplus in 2016. The Township has always expressed an interest in acquiring the land.

"If the opportunity arises, it would be wonderful to assume stewardship of the land, a vital part of Nobleton's core. We could also explore the possibility of expanding the Nobleton Sports Park. The feasibility of acquiring the land, as well as its long-term strategic value will have to be further examined," said Councillor David Boyd.

Boyd said there's a lot of history in that building, one that resonates with local residents. Saving some of the pieces will at least preserve a little bit of history.

The original Nobleton Public School (formerly S.S. No. 19), was built on the property in 1870, as a two-room, framed building. In 1937, the school board tore





down the original school and built a one-room brick school, the portion that houses the bell tower. In 1956, a room was added to east side and more additions came in the 1960s. Alterations followed in 1983.

The most notable architectural feature is the bell tower. The original bell, according to staff, is nowhere to be found. Since this is the most defining

element of the building, efforts should be made to preserve and restore it.

Staff also pointed out the school would have educated many local students from Nobleton and surrounding areas.

It's also recommended that a storyboard be erected in Nobleton to commemorate and pay tribute to the school, in a public place.

Federal budget praised by environmental groups

Environmentalists are praising the federal budget for highest contribution to conservation in decades.

"Thank you to the Government of Canada for being a leader in recognizing the importance of land conservation and climate change to our world now and for future generations. and expansion of functional habitats is also critical to supporting Canada's climate change resiliency.'

The budget creates hope that Canada will meet its commitment to protect at least 17 per cent of lands and inland waters by 2020.

Subdivision plan under review by staff

Plans for a 34-home subdivision across from The Country Day School are being review by Township staff.

Owners of the property at 13330 Dufferin Street, hope to develop the lands. They submitted their plans independently of several other property owners, known as the King City East Landowners Group. KCELG, and the lands at 13330 Dufferin, are all being reviewed under the King City North East Functional Servicing/Development Area Study (FSDAS), a comprehensive plan and template to bring cohesiveness to a massive tract of land, stretching north of the railway corridor, south of the 15th Sideroad, west of Dufferin.

These plans were originally received by the Township in 2017, but it was held, pending the FSDAS.

The Dufferin Street lands are currently used for agriculture and has a swatch of environmentally sensitive land running through the middle.

King staff and their consultants want this parcel reviewed along with all others in the KCELG, and not in isolation. Staff noted this proposal is inconsistent with KCELG in terms of the concept, lot fabric and connectivity.

"The FSDAS is required to be approved in advance of the approval of individual subdivision/development applications," staff noted.

Staff has raised concerns that there's a lack of coordination with nearby applications and there needs to be some sort of transition between these lands and the overall plans in the FSDAS.

This project, staff pointed out, "would benefit significantly from cooperation between the landowners within the broader FSDAS process in order to most effectively and efficiently provide for the development with respect to coordination of external services and other matters."

Planning staff will continue to encourage cooperation.

Joan MacIntyre, representing the owner, admitted there are some outstanding issues. They will continue dialogue with others in the KCELG, she said.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini urged them to work together so the plans can move forward more quickly.

sculptures for more than three decades. Despite his expertise and worldly knowledge of the masters, he continues to learn and hone his skills.

The life-size pieces involve a long, complex process. It is creation in its simplest form.

He's fascinated with the bronze casting process, particularly that of the ancient Greeks and Romans. Davis said his knowledge of art history and experience working in foundries, arm him with the techniques he needs to create life from lifelessness. Unlike a stone sculptor who unleashes the art from within, Davis has to start from scatch.

He works from photos or sketches and creates a maquette (small-scale model) out of wax and styrofoam. He then enlarges the piece to life-size proportions; makes molds and sends the pieces out for pouring. When they return, he welds them together and finetunes his piece. The finishing touches include polishing and applying the appropriate patina. Davis said it takes upwards of nine months from conception to finished product.

Brett is meticulous, not unlike Donatello or Rodin. While every piece is unique, born out of love and passion, Davis pays homage to the past, and the renowned works by the greats. The past, and present come together in a unique celebration of form, style and substance.

Davis stresses he's not copying previous works, but rather borrowing tried and true methods and bringing bronze sculpting to a modern level.

He specializes in the design, man-



ufacturing, installation and maintenance of custom and commissioned bronze works designed specifically for interior and exterior environments. Brett has worked with many prominent landscaping firms integrating bronze sculptures and fountains into their unique designs and has won many public art competitions in Ontario.

"The bigger the better," he says with a smile. Perhaps something that rivals The Artemision Zeus (or Poseidon).

Davis doesn't just conjure up classic Greek torsos or busts. He's expanded his repertoire to include architectural and abstract figures. He combines art and architecture in his own style, one that has made him a sought-after artist.

Davis is putting the finishing touch-

es on a life-size soldier, a private commission that pays tribute to a family member. Davis has a great deal of responsibility to ensure the result is not only pleasing, but accurate and detailed, down to the insignia and buttons on his uniform.

His renowned Roy Bonisteel sculpture presented many challenges. Bonisteel was a Canadian journalist and host of the CBC Television program Man Alive, from 1967 to 1989. Bonisteel's family asked Davis to create a seated Roy with an open book. Davis had to work from photos and videos, and the family wanted a version of Roy in his 60s. He died at age 83 in 2013.





A committee was formed that was headed by Angela Smylie and included Roy's daughter Lesley to create the statue and tribute garden that was realized through donations.

Davis met with Lesley to pick up some family traits to incorporate into the work. The sculpture now sits on a bench, at the memorial garden at Trent Port Marina, overlooking the shoreline of the Bay of Quinte. Thousands of visitors annually sit next to Roy, perhaps pondering the meaning of life.

In Lloydtown, Davis's rebel soldier stands as a reminder of the infamous Lloydtown Rebellion of 1837.

Davis is passionate about art and history. He's intrigued by the past and the knowledge ancient craftsmen possessed. He learns from the best, and had the opportunity to examine historic pieces to see how they did things thousands of years ago.

Speaking to him, he freely offers up insights and details you can uncover in no other way. He's a fountain of information, a lexicon of knowledge.

He urges all art-lovers to speak to the artists themselves if they get a chance. The art will take on a whole new meaning after even a brief conversation with the creator.

In work such as his, Davis pointed out he has to really believe in himself and exude confidence. A mistake, or a slight deviation off course, can be costly at any stage of the process. For him, he feels every bend, every curve. He sees deep into the soul of the sculpture.

Brett is a patina specialist and uses various techniques to accentuate the forms and create a sense of age. Age of Bronze specializes in the research and development of patinas, formulat-

ed for historical and contemporary patina restoration of sculptures and architectural features, as well as general patina services for sculptors, art foundries, galleries and art institutions.

Brett's job isn't done when the piece is finished and installed onsite.

He's also a specialist in metal conservation. The pieces need maintenance and care, or they deteriorate and take on that weathered, greenish tinge. Brett regularly revisits pieces to add a little TLC to keep them intact.

Davis is also contracted to restore historic bronzes. He's travelled the world and studied corrosion and ways to combat it. He's worked on historical public bronze



monuments, sculptures and architectural features in Toronto, Hamilton, Ottawa, and Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. In 2017 he revitalized two pieces at Queen's Park that are more than 100 years old.

Davis loves the challenges each new piece brings. Every project is a new beginning.

King skater speeds to podium at the Ontario Winter Games

Yet to even reach high school, Tyler Yue is going to have to get a larger trophy

Fresh off a silver medal performance at the Provincial A Short Track Championships in Newmarket, the King City native qualified for last weekend's prestigious Ontario Winter Games representing the Newmarket Jets Skating Club.

Among a field of dozens of the top young skaters in the province, Yue managed to reach every level of the podium in skating to a gold medal in the 3,000-metre relay, a silver in the 1,500-m, and a bronze in the 400-m.

The season is not yet over though for the talented Grade 8 student – his performance at the Provincial Championships also earned him a spot on Team Ontario for the upcoming Canada East Short Track Championships in Quebec City from March 31 to April 1.

It's business as usual in Yue's quest for glory at the Canadian games, continuing to work with his longtime Jets coach Paula McConvey, who won Ontario Coach of the Year in the 2015-16 season.

A complex training plan consisting of interval and endurance drills, technical work, and relay practice should help Yue prepare for his biggest stage yet.

"Tyler says he wants to work especially on his acceleration for fast starts," said Cortese.

"To accept roles that contribute to team success before personal achievements," said Mehmeti, now in his second season in the position. "Roles such as being able to shut down other teams top lines, penalty killing instead of power play. It's been the ability to buy in."

It was a tough start for the Express in the round robin championship that consisted of the Express, Gryphons, Oakville Rangers, Barrie Jr. Colts, and the Quinte Red Devils. York-Simcoe dropped the first game of the tournament to Barrie before rattling off three straight wins, earning first place in the pool and a trip to the gold medal match.

Oakville defeated Barrie 5-3 in the consolation to take home the bronze

medal.

"There's no reason we shouldn't be able to compete with the favourites in the OHL Cup," said Mehmeti. "If we are able to maintain our play of the past month, we should be able to have success."

The Express last won the OHL title in thew 2015-16 season. This one kicks off March 13 at Scotiabank Pond and Mattamy Athletic Centre in Toronto.



Anglican Parish By John Arnott

In spite of it being Lent when flowers are not usually found in Anglican churches leeks and daffodils - sometimes known as "Lent lilies" – graced the base of the altar this past Sunday as St. Mary Magdalene's in Schomberg marked St. David's Day (March 1). St. David is the Patron Saint of Wales and the leek and daffodil, both members of the lily family, are national emblems of the tiny Principality of Wales, part of Britain.

The Holy Communion service was taken by Rev. Father Colin Bowler from Barrie as guest celebrant and speaker.

During service in many churches a hymn called the Gradual Hymn, from the Latin gradus meaning step or stair, is sung as the priest comes down the steps or stairs from the chancel and

sanctuary area into the nave or main part of the church, preceded by the crucifer carrying the processional cross, to read the Gospel. The first verses of the Gradual are sung before the Gospel is read with the final verses being sung as the priest goes back up the stairs, led again by the crucifer, into the chancel. If the hymn chosen is a short one the whole hymn is sung before the Gospel and repeated after.

During Lent this year in the Anglican Parish of Lloydtown the Gradual Hymn is "In Solus Christus – In Christ Alone," a contemporary hymn by American composer. Natalie Grant.

All year long the Parish of Lloydtown is celebrating the 175th anniversary of its founding (1843 to 2018).

Holy Communion services in the parish today are held Sunday mornings at 9:30 a.m. in Christ Church, Kettleby (in the hall adjacent to the church in cold weather) on Kettleby Rd. mid-way between Keele and Jane Sts. with a tea/ coffee hour with home baked treats following the service for those wishing to stay. 

Horticulture By John Arnott

They're logging once again in the conservation bush (county forest) adjacent to Tecumseth Pines on Hwy. 9, the seniors' community where I live. Driving along Hwy. 9 near the Tottenham Rd. if you glance to the north you'll see that almost all the huge pines are now gone leaving mainly deciduous trees mostly maple with some beech and popular mixed in.

The big, slow moving logging machines with their huge thick deep treaded wheels have chewed up much of the centre trail leaving ruts easily a foot/30 cm or more deep making walking really difficult (impossible when it turns to mud). But most side trails and the top half half of the centre trail have just been widened with cut or broken branches cleared off to the sides. I fear, however, that the trilliums, jacks in the pulpit, yellow violets, uvularias (bell worts) and wild columbine that grew along the edge of these trails are now history. I'm hoping that the patch of clintonia (blue bead or corn lily-the seed capsules are blue but the flower is corn yellow), the only patch I've

ever found in this bush, were back far enough to be left unharmed.

I was very concerned the huge cutting and stripping machines after pines would destroy the young oaks, beech and birch that just taking hold in this forest but other than a couple of 10 ft/3 m beech that were badly damaged they all seemed to have survived along with the 2 main stands of cedar. And it's possible being a hardwood the damaged beech will regrow from the still intact

The one wild flower I did mange to save is some wild lobelia that last fall I found growing right near the edge of the trail that takes me and my little Boston terrier (he's 13 this week) down into the heart of the bush on our daily walks. This little wild flower that grows about 1 ft./30 cm high has tiny light blue to light purple tube like flowers that flare open at the mouth. The hood over this mouth shows darker tiny blue/purple stripes. Small round bright green leaves grow up the slender stem getting smaller as they reach the cluster of flowers at the top. Each bloom produces tiny a ball like seed capsule containing numerous tiny seeds Named after Belgian botanist Matthias de Lobel there are some 415 species of this flowering plant including the red cardinal flower also found growing wild here in Ontario. Some are annuals and some perennials. I'm hoping those I saved are perennials but I'll have to wait to find out.


