Work on Laskay Hall progressing

The relocated Laskay Hall will join the King Museum in becoming focal points for the community.

Laskay Hall arrived at its new home at the King Heritage and Cultural Centre last August.

Staff have worked hard to prepare the site, but there have been complications along the way.

The weather, building condition and utility hookups all provided their own unique challenges.

The most significant issue, staff said, was the condition of the structural beams under the hall. As the building was raised off the ground for transport, it was discovered that many of the wooden beams had been decimated by carpenter ants. The ants had also affected some of the walls and doors. This led to a redesign of the supports under the hall, and required additional architectural and engineering support.

This was actually a blessing in disguise, as the issue was dealt with and will actually increase the building's lifespan.

Hydro proved tough, and electricity was connected Feb. 8, even though requests were made last October. The site is still awaiting final approval from Enbridge.

The extreme cold during some parts of the winter delayed some work.

At this point, the structural work is done and most of the basement is finished. Utilities and fixtures are being installed.

The next steps are the reconstruction of the front door and side door. Staff said both deal with structural issues, as well as accessibility. Painting of the interior, washroom and kitchen renovations will follow.

Ramps and railings will be installed in April or May and the final grading and seeding will take place after that.

Staff is working on selling the property of the hall's former home on Weston Road. Some problems with the property arose, including septic system limitations.

Staff suggested increasing the size of the lot by "stop up and closing" the southern portion of Second Street, and having part lots merge onto it. This will resolve the septic issues and will also resolve the outstanding unopened road allowance, which was never intended for practical use.

The property was surveyed and the septic system can be placed with no impact on neighbouring wells.

The Township hopes to sell the land to offset the costs of the hall's relocation, which went over budget by roughly \$125,000.

The total for the move was \$425,000 and the Township set aside \$300,000 in the 2017/18 budget, which included the sale of the property.

Staff is recommending the property be sold to any potential buyer. Hopes are the selling price can offset the \$125,000 shortfall.

If that doesn't happen, staff will report back to council on alternative financing.






In addition to these many volunteering contributions locally Lion Paul also served in a number of capacities to strengthen the Landscape Industry not only in Ontario but across Canada.



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

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360Kids helps students understand youth homelessness

"It must be really bad, but what can I do about it?"

This was the thought that went through Maryam M's mind whenever she saw a homeless person.

The Grade 6 student simply thought there was nothing in her power to make a difference, even a loonie wouldn't have much of an impact.

"I always thought in order for there to be big change, there has to be a big committee towards that topic," she says. "I never thought I could do anything about homeless or homeless youth, and I would walk away like most people do. Boy, was I wrong to think that."

Maryam, and her fellow Grade 6 students at TMS Schools, had an eye opening experience on the Family Day weekend, walking in the shoes of homeless vouth, in association with the 360 Kids Youth Shelter.

Over the past few months, students in Grades 4 through 6 have been immersed in workshops with 360 Kids representatives learning about the needs of youth who use their services and resources, as well as exploring the issues of affordable housing, precarious employment and mental health.

The kids put this knowledge into action by participating in their first 360 Kids sleepover, which was designed to give youth the opportunity to experience the challenges and choices facing youth who aren't as fortunate.

The overnight experience was hoped to not only raise money for 360 Kids, but foster an empathy while simulating a typical night for a homeless youth.

"Our students have been inspired to become engaged citizens and, in the meantime, contribute to this supportive organization in various ways," said teacher Rachel Marks. "They are learning that giving can come in many forms."

When Milad M. saw homeless youth, he says he too felt a sense of sadness and the helplessness of not being able to lend a hand.

new world of possibilities to help people and gave me a different perspective take them in with your family. There

was doing the experience we had to create a shelter with two things: cardboard boxes and a tarp. Some of us didn't have a tarp at all. We only had one cardboard box per person and we could team up with others and this challenge was extremely challenging. Boxes kept falling because of wind and the tarps were flying through the air. Most of us were in teams, so we all thought, imagine doing this alone almost every day fixing a little shelter, uncomfortable as it was, and calling it home.

"There was also the cold wind chilling us up even though we had jackets, snow pants, gloves, hats, and scarves trying to warm us up. We imagined having old clothes unwashed and used, and knowing what I would really need if I find myself homeless helps me know what they need."

The experience was not only an eye opener on the struggles homeless go through each and every day just to make it through the night, but it was also an eye opener that these struggles are being faced by homeless youth not that much older than themselves.

"When I saw that so many kids were homeless, I was very surprised," says Kurtis Ng. "I knew that there were homeless people in York Region but I didn't know that some of them were kids."

Adds Milad: "You don't see the people as they are usually portrayed. Homeless people look just like all of us in the way that they aren't really dirty, their clothes aren't always ripped or torn and they do have an education in public schools. All of the details I mentioned were once what I thought of homeless people and since I didn't see any of that I thought that there probably weren't any homeless people. This is called invisible homelessness and it happens everywhere even when we can't see it."

But, this didn't surprise Maryam. It is an issue many choose to ignore, she says, because people have that "unfortunate" mind set that there is nothing they can do to help.

"I think anyone can do anything to "This experience really opened up a help: you could donate, you could go buy homes for them, buy furniture, on homelessness," he says. "When I are many things we can do to help as

individuals and as a group," she says. kids supported these kinds of people. "After this experience, however, I saw how caring 360 was, and how they took the time to come teach us how it felt and how we could make a change. After seeing this, I was very happy 360

From now on, when I want to help, I would donate lots of money to homeless youth organizations, and if I ever saw a homeless youth, I know where to call: 360 Kids."

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


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






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Carruthers named Liberal candidate

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

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

Juvenile Rebellion heading back to OMHA finals

Spring hockey has become a yearly tradition for King's Juvenile hockey squad.

Raising a banner into the rafters of Schomberg's Trisan Centre every year since 2014, the Juvenile Rebellion will once again vie for the OMHA championship title, after eliminating the New Hamburg Huskies in five games.

The game was put away for good when James Barber knocked one in off a scramble mid-way through the second period, a sizable lead they would hold onto in a 5-1 final.

Back in New Hamburg for game five the following night, King put the series to bed with a 5-3 win.

The 2017-18 championship will mark the fifth year in a row the Juvenile Rebellion/Red Wings have reached the final, having last taken the title in 2014-15.

The Rebellion will be in for a tough match up in the final series, faced with the Amherstburg Avalanche. Sweeping through Woolwich in their respective semi-final, the Avalanche have lost just one game in the post-season, all the way back in early February's quarter-final.

"We really believe in this group of young men," said Matjiwec. "They are easy to coach, and committed to team playing as a team."

Matjiwec and his coaching staff will be leaning, as they have all year, on their young talents to lead them through the provincial tournament, having lost six seniors to graduation last year.

"The team has excellent young leaders, including grade 10 captain Mathew Papais, as well as Anthony Arnone and Cam Kokelj," said Matjiwec. "We were also quite fortunate this year to add to add Scott Thain to our coaching staff."

"Thain has worked hard to develop this young squad."

The OFSAA championships go March 20-24 in Collingwood.

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

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

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
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
