Community mourns loss of editor Bill Rea

The Caledon community was shocked to learn about the sudden passing of veteran journalist, editor and resident Bill Rea.

Rea, 60, passed away early Sunday morning at his home in Caledon, of an apparent heart attack.

Rea spent the bulk of his 30-plusyear journalism career in Caledon, man journalists.' working tirelessly to bring residents the news of the day. He also served the Sentinel for several years and was a familiar face in King Township.


Rea was seen in every corner of Caledon, with notebook in hand and camera around his neck. He was the epitome of community journalism. He was known for his fairness in his reporting.





The York Regional Police Homicide Unit has charged three people with Second Degree Murder and several other offences after a 19-year-old victim of a stabbing succumbed to his injuries. One of the other victims in the incident was a man from King Township.

Police report that on Tuesday, March 27 at approximately 12:30 a.m., York Regional Police responded to a residence in the area of Mount Albert Road and Second Concession for reports that two people had been stabbed.

One of the victims, a 19-year-old man from King, was taken to hospital with minor injuries.

The second victim, Keegan Blyth, 19, of East Gwillimbury, was taken to hospital with injuries that were initially believed to be non-life-threatening. On March 29, he succumbed to his injuries. As a result of this, the homicide unit took over the investigation.

Charged were a 19-year-old man and 22-year-old man from Newmarket, along with a 16-year-old male from Toronto All were charged with second degree murder, assault causing bodily harm, carrying a concealed weapon, unauthorized possession of a prohibited or restricted weapon, and possession for the purpose of trafficking cocaine and cannabis.

The Homicide Unit has taken over the investigation and are appealing for witnesses. Anyone who observed anything suspicious in the area at the time is asked to please come forward.

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

Our jobs demand a lot of our time on nights and weekends. Bill always made an effort to spend time with his wife Beth and I think he learned in recent years the value of this over the next assignment.

The readers of the Caledon Citizen may not fully realize what they've lost. I can tell you Bill was overly dedicated to giving readers the best quality of news and features, without sensationalism, gossip or animosity. He was always fair.

Bill Rea was one of a kind in many ways.

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

Candidates vow to improve high-speed Internet

Access to reliable high-speed internet is an essential requirement of a modern economy and strong quality of life. Having met with countless residents, farmers, students and small business operators in King Township, it is clear that high-speed internet access must be improved.

For the student needing high-speed internet to research an assignment, for the farmers requiring reliable internet service to sell their products and operate on-farm technology, and for the small businesses who need this platform to grow their brands and reach new markets. "We support the objectives enumerated in the Region of York's Broadband strategy, which aims to encourage investments, create an open competitive environment and maximize public and private investment.

"We will work to strengthen King's digital economy and the quality of life of every resident, regardless of where they live. Enhanced high-speed internet: that is our commitment to you."

DON'T LIGHT THAT FIRE!

Township of King Recreational Fire Guidelines By-law 2015-109 requires the following:

 □ Fire must not exceed .75 metres in height and .75 metres in di-
- ameter (approximately 2 feet in diameter and 2 feet in height)

 ☐ A means to extinguish the fire must be in close proximity i.e. garden hose, pail(s) of water, etc.
- Recreational fires must be supervised by a competent person at all times. Leaving the fire unattended is not permitted

 A minimum distance of 3 metres (10 feet) to combustible materials must be maintained at all times
- Outdoor fireplaces must be equipped with a screen on the flue and fuel loading area

The Scheinberg family continues to make inroads in the King community.

Rob Scheinberg and his wife, Danielle Eden, are founders of Dog Tales Rescue and Sanctuary near King City. They recently made a gift to Seneca College that will support equipment upgrades for the Veterinary Technician program, as well as the construction of Magna Hall.

In recognition of their generosity, Seneca will name a space in the building after the Scheinberg family.

Scheinberg said they decided as a family to make this donation, since they all have deep roots locally. Scheinberg himself is a Seneca graduate. The school's equipment was in dire need of upgrading, so he was happy to help.

"There's a synergy there," he said, noting Dog Tales has taken co-op students and volunteers from far and wide. The relationship is mutually beneficial.

Scheinberg stressed that King Mayor Steve Pellegrini helped facilitate the donation and he supports this amazing relationship.

"The donation was really a natural thing," Scheinberg said. "Dog Tales is going to be here for a long time and Seneca will hopefully be here longer."

Known for its opulent kennel space, and many social media admirers, Dog

Tales includes 50 acres of green fields, rolling hills and wooded areas. The couple recently purchased 50 more acres of adjacent land for future expansion. Scheinberg said they now have more than 50 employees and are constantly growing and evolving.

After years of being involved in animal rescue, Scheinberg and Eden opened Dog Tales in 2014. Since then, approximately 1,200 dogs have been adopted, with more than 100 dogs on-site at any one time. The dogs are both local owner surrenders and rescues from around the world.

Last year, Dog Tales took in 68 dogs rescued from the Yulin Dog Meat Festival in China.

The couple is originally from Israel and regularly travels back to visit shelters and rescue dogs that are often old, deaf, blind or injured. During a recent trip to a rundown shelter in Israel, Eden decided to buy the shelter, flying 270 dogs back to Canada.

In addition to dogs, Scheinberg and Eden rescue horses from auction by bidding against horse meat buyers. Currently, Dog Tales is home to 75 hors-

The entire facility is run by a team of 55 full-time staff dedicated to animal care, including three full-time veterinary technicians, who are Seneca

Contract awarded for Nobleton park

The Nobleton Sports Park phase 2 moved ahead with the granting of the contract by King council.

Latitude 67 Ltd. will carry out the work, estimated to cost \$446,261.86.

The funds were included in the Township's 2017/18 capital budget. The project includes retrofitting two baseball diamonds, a playground expansion and pathways.

The Township originally tendered the project in the fall of 2017, but the costs submitted by the bidders for the shade structure were just too high. The contract does not include the shade structure but King staff will look at taking on this element themselves. The structure itself is pegged at \$120,000. King staff is also working with the Nobleton Lions Club, who expressed an


interest in donating funds to the project.

The work is slated to start this April, and be completed by 2019.

Councillor David Boyd said he's pleased with the project and the enhancements it will bring to the community.







Textile pick-up in King Township

Did you know that the Township of King has a textile recycling program? King has proudly partnered with Diabetes Canada to form one of Ontario's first municipal textile diversion programs. The good news is that, in the first year, residents have diverted some 35,257 lbs of textiles from the landfill! Well done King!

The other good news is that King is launching its first ever "Textile Door to Door Pick Up" to coincide with Earth Week (April 16-20) and Waste Reduction week in the fall. Help us divert waste from the landfill by cleaning out your closet and donating your old textiles.

Why should we bother to donate used clothing we no longer need? Ontarians generate more than 500,000 tons of textile waste each year and 85% of that ends up in our landfills. Each and every Canadian generates an average of 30-40 kg. (66-88 lbs.) of textile waste and each of us purchases some 62 new textile items plus 7 pairs of shoes annually. For the 32 million of us this adds up to 2.2 billion garments and 252 million pairs of shoes at a cost of nearly \$37 billion! Who knew? Remember the 3Rs – reduce, reuse, recycle.

Countries such as Burundi, Kenya, Rwanda, Tanzania and Uganda are all considering banning the import of second hand clothing and leather products. If these bans go into effect then these clothes are likely to stay here and put more pressure on our waste management system.

Last year, Canadians donated more than 50 million kg. of textiles through the Diabetes collection system of donation boxes and pick-up events. Value Village then resold them and generated more than \$10 million for Diabetes research and programmes. This funding helps the almost 30% of Canadians suffering from type 1 diabetes.

Step 1: Collect your textiles and put them in a garbage bag marked with a D or T. Step 2: During Earth Week (April 16-20) leave your closed textile bags at the end of your driveway on your waste pick up day.

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The Experience You Deserve

LSRCA decision angers environmental group

A decision by the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority has led to a letter-writing campaign by an environmental group.

The LSRCA voted to approved a permit applicator by Maple Lake Estates and Stag Hollow Country Homes, under the condition that abutting lands to the development be transferred to public ownership.

Maple Lake Estates is planning a 1,073-unit recreational residential retirement community on 202 hectares of land in Georgina. The planning process and approvals for this project date back almost 30 years, originally proposed in October of 1984. The Ontario Municipal Board approved the application with modifications back in 1987.

In 2003, the majority of the Maple Lake Estates property were deemed to be provincially significant wetlands by the MNR. But since the project's approval predated the wetland designation, the Province recognized it as legal.

While conservation authorities like LSRCA can create and enforce conservation policies, they have to adhere to provincial and municipal planning requirements.

Roughly 38% of the property will be impacted by the development and construction, impacting trees and existing forest stands.

To mitigate the impacts and protect as much land as possible, the LSRCA and DG Group agreed to the transfer of lands that abut the development. These lands contain wetlands, forests and agricultural lands.

Giving Maple Lakes Estates the conditional go-ahead has angered groups like the North Gwillimbury Forest Alliance.

Calling on York-Simcoe MPP Julia Munro, alliance chair Jack Gibbons is asking the Minister of Municipal Affairs Bill Mauro to issue a Zoning Order to prohibit the development.

Unfortunately, ... they (LSRCA) illegally gave the DG Group permission to destroy the wetland, which will split the North Gwillimbury Forest in two. So we now need your strong leadership to save the North Gwillimbury Forest and its provincially significant wetlands."

Georgina council, however, decided to try to protect the Paradise Beach-Island Grove Provincially Significant Wetland and called on LSRCA to reject DG Group's application.

King Councillor Avia Eek, who sits

on the LSRCA, said the Province has essentially walked away from the issue. The MNRF has told LSRCA that tree-cutting can commence on the site.

"We have been trying for two years to obtain a land swap that would see this wetland complex/forest saved in perpetuity, yet still providing the developer with their well-documented development rights," she said.

"The Conservation Authority's role, to approve or deny a section 28 permit, occurs after planning approvals have been received and if the development falls within an area that we are responsible for regulating under the laws in the Conservation Authorities Act," reads a letter issued by the LSRCA.

"When a development is proposed, the planning process includes detailed public consultation. In the case of the Maple Lake Estates development, the planning process and public consultation took place many decades ago. The Section 28 permit process only includes consultation between the applicant and the Conservation Authority. As with all permit applications we receive, the Maple Lake Estates application was evaluated on its own facts and had to meet the criteria set out in the Conservation Authorities Act. This is the same criteria applied to all applications for a permit from the Conservation Authority, without exception.

"In 2015, the Regional Municipality of York, Town of Georgina, Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authori-

ty and DG Group, collectively supported a land swap option. The proposed land swap would have given DG Group the right to develop on their bordering property. In return, DG Group would have transferred the 500 acres of Maple Lake Estates land into public ownership - increasing the Greenbelt in excess of 300 acres and saving the forest and wetland

permanently. approved, this solution would have also required DG Group's new development to be reviewed under all current planning laws and Conservation Authority policies. This option was aligned with Provincial policies and had support from many community members, but despite the substantial benefits, the Province did not approve the proposal. As a result, the Conservation Authority had to review the permit application for the original development.

"Although we didn't obtain our preferred land swap option, we didn't abandon our effort to protect the watershed. A very important fact which can't be ignored – although a permit for the development was approved, it's conditional on DG Group transferring nearly 400 acres of land adjacent to the Maple Lake Estates property into public ownership. This is more than double the lands being developed so that the Conservation Authority and other partners can create future wetland, wildlife habitat and allow that land to naturally regenerate - creating one of the largest protected public tracts of land in northern York Region.

"Throughout this process staff and Board members have remained objective and acted according to our mandate and the laws that govern the Conservation Authority. Throughout our 67-year history, we have made fact based, transparent decisions using fair and balanced principles founded on law. This decision was no different."

Young women should continue to be trailblazers and leaders. Backed by a well rounded experience in Guiding, young women can become the trendsetters of tomorrow.

King's LCol (ret'd) Susan Beharriell provided some words of inspiration to the 1st Bolton Guides, during their year-end banquet recently.

Beharriell is a veteran of the Canadian Forces who served on various NATO and NORAD operations at critical times, including the Cold War and 9/11. The first female intelligence officer in the Air Force, Beharriell faced seemingly insurmountable odds, yet rose to lay the groundwork for all other women

Beharriell is also proud of her Guiding experience, one that took her all over the world.

"Guiding gave me a very good foundation for my road through life," she said. "Think of the things you are learning in Guiding and how they can help you pave your way," she told them. girl, she had the motto nothing

Beharriell wasted no time in making inroads. At 15, she became a museum guide, a position held previously only by boys.

She ran for president of student

council, despite facing opposition. While she was soundly defeated, you have to learn from your setbacks.

"When you make a road, you are going to run into obstacles," she said. "But that does not mean you stop! You move them out of the way, go over them, under them or around them!"

Beharriell broke down barriers, joining the pioneering women who were among the first to join the Canadian military; competing the same basic training as men, and earning the respect of her colleagues.

She was continually told she could not do something simply because she was a woman.

"They told me I could not serve as an intelligence officer because it said on page 42 of the manual that only men were allowed. I persisted.

"They told me I could not fly in the back seat of a high-performance jet air-

"One day I had a ride in the back seat of a CF-18 (fighter) jet ... I have over 80 hours in the back seat of various fight-

Beharriell said her military career was always challenging, but fascinating and worthwhile.

"I know I have made a difference."

She noted ever since she was a little tured, nothing gained.

"Try it. You may surprise yourself!" Beharriell now adds "per adua ad astra" (through adversity, to the stars) to her repertoire.

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Happy hiking in King's Happy Valley Forest

One of the largest remaining intact forests on the Oak Ridges Moraine, King's Happy Valley Forest, is a hidden gem home to more than 110 breeding birds, many amphibians and flowering plants.

Since 2001, the Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC) has protected and helped care for almost 800 acres of this important natural area. Their goal is to ensure that in the next 50 to 100 years that Happy Valley will grow into an old-growth forest, continue to be an important carbon storage area, and provide locals with a place they can visit to experience the joy of nature.

To accomplish this, NCC needs a boost. They rely on generous donors, supporters, dedicated volunteers and the help of the community to look after Happy Valley Forest.

With a growing GTA population and an increased interest in nature-based recreation, it's important that this special place is used responsibly so that both wildlife and humans can enjoy the forest for generations to come.

In 2016, NCC embarked on a new project to create a visitor management plan. They hired a consultant to look at how and where the community is using the forest. This information helped them to better understand how to balance recreational use of the area and biodiversity conservation. These findings formed the foundation for NCC's draft visitor management strategy, which will continue to be developed and refined to help them with their land use decisions.

Starting this year, NCC will begin to implement this visitor management plan by creating a formal trail system that takes into consideration both recreation and nature.

Visitors can expect the following changes and improvements:

- Improving trail linkages so that trails avoid trespassing on private land.
- Trail closures for dead end trails and those that lead to neighbouring private lands.
- Better signage to ensure good trail etiquette and appropriate trail use.
- Improved wayfinding, including trail maps and blazes.

These changes will help NCC better manage the trails and ensure visitor safety in Happy Valley Forest.

Some of the work mentioned here will begin shortly and will continue for



the next two to three years.

A friendly reminder that NCC encourages respectful use of the trails. This includes staying on the trail to minimize the spread of invasive species, keeping pets on leashes, not littering, and not collecting any plants, fungi or wildlife whatsoever.

NCC would like to thank the community for its patience and support as they implement the new and improved trail system for Happy Valley Forest.

Christine Elliott confirms her Newmarket-Aurora run

Christine Elliott has thrown her hat in the ring in Newmarket-Aurora.

The former MPP and PC leadership candidate said: "I have never been more convinced of just how much Ontario needs us. I would be privileged to join our slate of candidates.

"To all residents of Newmarket-Aurora, you can count on me to do everything I can to fight for you at Queen's Park," she continued. "I hope I can earn your trust."

Ms. Elliott said her top priority between now and a formal nomination meeting later this month will be to meet the residents of the riding she seeks to represent this June.

"I really need to listen to ... their concerns and issues and make sure I understand them, so that if I am given the honour to be their representative at Queen's Park, I will know what their biggest priorities are and be able to start advocating for them right away," said the former MPP for Whitby-Oshawa.

In explaining her decision to seek the local nomination, Ms. Elliott cites the similarities between the ridings of Newmarket-Aurora and Whitby-Oshawa

"As I said throughout the leadership campaign, I really wanted to run in a riding where (a) I was hoping people would want me there, and (b) I would be able to be a meaningful representative for the community," she said. "I think Newmarket-Aurora has many similar qualities to Whitby-Oshawa, the riding I last represented, in the sense it is a fast-growing area, it has a lot of issues relating to growth with a lot of people commuting downtown and needing GO Train and other options for vehicles travelled, but you also want to make sure that things like health care and educational facilities and so on can keep

"Those are the issues I certainly am familiar with, they seem to be also relevant in Newmarket-Aurora and I look forward to speaking with residents about their concerns and working on them."

Her announcement came with key endorsements, including those from former PC nomination candidate Bill Hogg and former Newmarket-Aurora Member of Parliament – and 2019 federal candidate – Lois Brown.

"I have every confidence that Christine Elliott is the right candidate to lead Newmarket-Aurora into the next election," said Ms. Brown. "She has a proven track record of fighting for local communities at Queen's Park, and I look forward to working with her."

Shortly after Ms. Elliott's announcement, a further endorsement came out – this time from Charity McGrath who was, until March 15, the confirmed PC candidate for the riding

Controversy dogged Ms. McGrath since securing the nomination last April over Mr. Hogg and Newmarket Councillor Tom Vegh. Citing "irregularities" in the votes, members of the Newmarket-Aurora PC riding association launched a number of appeals against the close results to top party brass, each of which was turned down under the leadership of Patrick Brown.

Shortly after Mr. Brown was replaced by Doug Ford as the party's permanent leader, Newmarket-Aurora was one of three ridings which had their nominations overturned and Ms. McGrath was barred from running again. Although she, in turn, appealed this move, her appeal was turned down just recently.

"After working countless hours over the past year as the PC Candidate in Newmarket-Aurora, I have decided to step aside and work with a wonderful person," said Ms. McGrath in an email. "Today I am proud to stand with an extraordinary Conservative, Christine Elliott. We are excited knowing that she has served this province in an exemplary way and will continue that legacy of work for our riding.

"We will continue to see unity strengthened through the support of Bill Ballantyne, president of the Newmarket-Aurora Riding Association. I personally believe that unity needs to be a top priority. I appreciate Christine's desire to work closely with myself and honour the time and work I have put in alongside the volunteers who have invested time in the riding. I look forward to us working closely for the betterment of the riding and community."

Keeping these issues in mind, Ms. Elliott said she is committed to welcoming anyone who wants to lend a hand with an aim of securing victory this June.

"I think the most important thing for everyone at the end of the day is to win," she noted. "I think it is fair to say that across the province people want change. We all know that we need to work together in order to make that happen. What I plan to do is welcome anyone who wants to come and help on the campaign. I see this as the start of a new day and we all have an opportunity to be a part of this going forward, and I am looking forward to working with anyone who wants to come forward to do that."

Once confirmed, Ms. Elliott will face off against incumbent Liberal MPP Chris Ballard, who currently serves as Minister of the Environment and Climate Change, and NDP and Green candidates yet to be determined.

They will vie for votes in Newmarket-Aurora, which encompasses the Town of Newmarket as well as parts of Aurora on the north side of Wellington Street.

Voters on the south side of Wellington will vote in the newly-created Provincial riding of Aurora-Oak Ridges-Richmond Hill. There, the Ontario Liberal banner will be carried by Naheed Yaqubian while the PCs will be represented by Michael Parsa, who endorsed Ms. Elliott's leadership bid.



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

The York-Simcoe Express moniker was on the lips of many of the general managers at Saturday's OHL priority selection draft, where for the first time ever two members of the AAA organization went back-to-back in the first two selections.

pressive off the ice as he is on it. We are very happy and excited that he will be in the lineup and part of our community this upcoming season."

A hockey town through and through, Sudbury hosted Byfield and his family one day prior to the draft, leaving no surprise as to who they would choose with the prized pick.

"It was a great experience, I met a lot of people there, it's a great fan base," said Byfield. "Overall, I think it's going to be a great fit for me."

He called walking around the Wolves Sudbury Community Arena "a surreal feeling."

"It's an old barn, there are a lot of great memories there ... it's going to be a great place."

The 15-year-old St. Max Kolbe student added 12 points in the Express' playoff run, cementing his position atop the OHL's most wanted list.

"There were a lot of ups and downs," said Byfield, reflecting on the Minor Midget season. "But we finished strong, won a few tournaments ... all in all I think it was a great season."

King's Carcillo joins concussion lawsuit

With a nickname like "Car Bomb," it's hard not to be associated with a hard-headed, tough guy persona.

Yet it is that style of play that has plagued King City native Dan Carcillo since the end of his playing days in 2015, continuing to deal with post-concussion syndrome and mental health issues.

In an open letter for the Players Tribune, Carcillo stated upon his retirement: "My mission is to help guys who are dealing with anxiety, depression, and uncertainty about their future. Not down the line, not next week, but right now."

Creating a non-profit organization called "Chapter 5" dedicated to his longtime friend and teammate Steve Montador who had died just a few months prior, Carcillo is now taking it one step further by joining the landmark concussion lawsuit

Notoriously outspoken against concussions and head injuries, it was just a matter of time before Carcillo joined the campaign, one four years in the making and recently beginning to pick up steam.

"I'm not a bitter guy looking to hurt the NHL," Carcillo told TSN's Rick Westhead. "I'm not out for money."

"I'll donate anything I get to research. I just want to put pressure on the NHL

and educate and advocate for guys." A list consisting of just 10 names of former NHLers in its infancy, the players

involved in the lawsuit has now grown to over one-hundred, most playing the

type of enforcing game that was employed by Carcillo. A point-a-game player in his junior

He earned 100 points in just over 400 games played in the NHL, while racking up a whopping 1,233 penalty





King City hockey success recalls its nostalgic past

Success in sport always has a penchant to bring up the past.

With this year's King City Lions varsity boys hockey team taking home the silver at the OFSAA championships, the most decorated season the program has ever seen, those long-time King residents and KCSS alumni may fondly remember the spring of 1981, when the Lions first put the King high school hockey on the map by reaching the provincial championship.

A team consisting of Glen Mullings, Steve Nolan, Peter McNamara, John Marshall, Paul Saunders, Drew Morning, Wayne Hislop, Glen Manson, John Campbell, Kent Atkins, Jeff Poulis, James Cummings, Graham Jones, Dave McQuarrie, Gerry Boccia, Steve Kucopy, Chris Spick, Ron Van Noort, and Peter Bredehoeft made up the roster in that 1981 season, years before the creation of the York Region Athletic Association's hockey branch.

"There was no York Region hockey league in the Dark Ages," recalls Tom Ellison jokingly, the coach of the 1981 team and a teacher at KCSS for 40 years.

With little competition in the area, the King team instead ran a program with a school in Philadelphia called Council Rock, playing a four game series at each of the school's home

"Our OFSAA experience was not nearly as dramatic as (the game against St. Andrew's)," said Ellison.

"We lost two straight and came home realizing that we weren't as good as we thought we were, although the kids had stayed up late and celebrated their being there and were better than a lot of teams in Peterborough," he said, jokingly adding that maybe the coach should have been "more of a disciplinarian."

Ellison notes that a handful of players from that team still live in the area, and while the OFSAA championship may have been the pinnacle of most of the team's hockey careers, a championship of his own: as a set dresser for the Oscar-winning team on "The Shape of Water."

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



Anglican Parish By John Arnott

This past Sunday, April 8 "Rursus (gratias tibi quia crucem), "Once Again (thank you for the Cross)," was sung as the Easter gradual hymn accompanied by organist Elly Hollander, that brought parish priest Sheilagh Ashford down the chancel stairs (gradus) behind the crucifer carrying the processional cross into the nave. She shared the Gospel with the congregation and took them back up these stairs into the chancel and sanctuary area after the reading. This upbeat hymn that encourages hand clapping written by English Anglican Matt Redman, author of many contemporary religious songs, will serve as the gradual hymn throughout the Easter season which in the church year runs funtil May 19.

White symbolizing purity, peace and love the liturgical colour for all the church's major celebrations will be much in evidence and reflected in the church hangings, the covers for the Communion vessels and the priest's robe especially the stole (the long knee length scarf like vestment worn around the neck during this time).

The whole parish of Lloydtown (St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton, Christ Church. Kettleby and St. Mary Magdalene's, Schomberg) is looking forward to celebrations planned to mark our 175th anniversary (1843-2018).

Established in mid-1800s the parish was centred on Lloydtown where the original 1843 St. Mary Magdalene's stood but by the late 1800s the Anglican communities in Nobleton and the Pottageville-Kettleby areas and grown to the

extent that holding services in private homes or barns was no longer feasible. Thus under the guidance of the young enthusiastic Father Ebenezer Sibbald, 2 new churches were built – St. Alban's (now closed) in Nobleton in 1889 and Christ Church, Kettleby in 1891.

Today Holy Communion services are held every Sunday morning in Christ Church, Kettleby on Kettleby Rd. mid way between Jane and Keele Sts. in 1891. at 9:30 am and in St. Mary Magdalene's now at 116 Church St. Schomberg at 11:15 am.

On April 14 and 15, a group of parishioners will attend a "Revive Retreat" at the Convent of the Sisters of St John the Divine on Cummer Ave. Toronto (Newtonbrook-North York). This retreat will be continued and shared with others on 6 following Tuesday nights at St. Mary Magdalene's starting at 7 p.m.
