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

MPP-elect Lecce says relief starts now

"Relief is on the way!"

That was the promise made by King-Vaughan's new MPP Stephen Lecce.

Lecce easily won the riding with a 17,124-vote margin over second-place Liberal Marilyn Iafrate, in the Conservative sweep last week.

Lecce addressed a packed house of enthusiastic supporters at the Premier Hall in Maple on election night, saying the PCs' victory is the "start of a movement" and a change for something positive.

Lecce said he's blessed to have the high caliber of strong and capable Conservative MPPs join him at Queen's Park.

The hall was filled with young PCs and supporters, a testament to the future of politics in Ontario.

Bathurst Street and Davis Drive Intersection Improvements In the Town of Newmarket and the Township of King

The Regional Municipality of York continues to invest in building and enhancing our road infrastructure. York Region is making intersection improvements at Bathurst Street and Davis Drive in the Town of Newmarket and the Township of King and you are receiving this notice because the road construction will be close to your residence or business.

Construction is scheduled to begin in as early as Monday, June 11, 2018 and is expected to be complete by fall 2018. As with all road construction projects, some work may be rescheduled due to weather. York Region will provide advance notice whenever possible.

Intersection Improvements will include:

- Providing an additional left-turn lane from Davis Drive eastbound to Bathurst Street northbound
- Providing an additional left-turn lane from Bathurst Street northbound to Davis Drive westbound
- Enhancing street lighting
- Installing on-street bike lanes
- Constructing sidewalks on behalf of the Town of Newmarket
- Installing enhanced Streetscaping features, such as planter boxes
- Building a new transit stop
- Updating traffic signals

We recognize that construction may be disruptive and York Region's priority throughout this project is to minimize disruption to those living, working and travelling in the area. The intersection will remain open to traffic during construction and access will be maintained, however, temporary lane closures will be in place, between the hours of 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m., to facilitate construction.

Safety is a priority on all Regional construction sites. For everyone's safety, please reduce your speed through the construction area.

Nobleton Streetscaping update

Improvements to the intersection of Highway 27 and King Road are expected to be complete by late fall 2018.

We recognize that construction may be disruptive and York Region is working to minimize disruption to those living, working and travelling in the area. York Region will continue to monitor traffic flow throughout construction and make adjustments to signal timing as required to minimize disruption.

The current traffic configuration is expected to remain in place until mid-July, at which point the current two lanes will be shifted to the west side of Highway 27 until September.

Once completed, enhancements to the intersection will provide more capacity for traffic movement and better travel options for all road users. •Dedicated left-turn lanes in the northbound and southbound directions on Highway 27 will improve traffic flow through the intersection and general traffic flow along Highway 27 and King Road in the area

The Clean Yards By-law sets out minimum standards for properties in the Township including some rules on litter, waste and property maintenance to help ensure that properties are safe, clean and attractive in relation to adjacent properties.

Reminder to Owners and Tenants:

- All properties must be kept free and clear of long grass and weeds.
 All properties are to be free of garbage, litter, yard waste, standing water, storage bins and demolition project material, and construction equipment.
- All properties need to be clear of derelict vehicles, including vehicles that are not currently licensed for operation.

The Clean Yards By-law is the Township's tool for addressing and responding to concerns about property maintenance. By-law Enforcement Officers work with property owners and tenants through education to achieve voluntary compliance, but alternatively orders may be issued to obtain compliance with the by-law standards.

Injuries, fatality in two Schomberg-area collisions

Two serious collisions near Schomberg last week resulted in injuries and one fatality.

A 12-year-old girl was airlifted to a hospital after a two-vehicle collision at the Highway 27 and Highway 9 intersection in Schomberg Thursday evening.

King Fire & Emergency Services responded to the collision with two Engine Companies and one Rescue Company along with a Chief Officer. King Fire and York EMS arrived on location to find a T-bone style of collision with multiple persons trapped in a collision between a pickup truck and mini-van.

Collectively, with the help of York Regional Police, Aurora OPP, York EMS, South Simcoe Paramedics, and ORNGE Air Ambulance, King Fire extricated two occupants from a small passenger van.

"The extrication which was performed by King Fire & Emergency Services went extremely well," said King Fire Chief Jim Wall. "Our counterparts from the paramedic services did a great job in assessing and triaging the patients.'

Once the extrication was complete and the patients were airlifted to the hospital by Air Ambulance 799 and ground ambulances, the scene was turned over to Aurora OPP who were continuing their investigation. Local roads were closed that evening well past 10 p.m.

The girl was an occupant of the mini-van. There were two other passengers inside the mini-van who also suffered injuries. OPP reported an adult female was also transported to a local hospital with life-threatening injuries and a young male is suffering from minor injuries.

The driver of the mini-van was not injured. The three occupants of the pickup truck involved were taken to the hospital with minor injuries.

A 22-year-old man was killed in a head-on collision between a dump truck and mini-van on Highway 9, between the 11th and 12th Concession last Monday morning (June 4).

The driver of the mini-van was trapped inside the vehicle and emergency crews had to work to extricate him.

Emergency crews from ORNGE tended to the man, but he was pronounced dead on scene. Killed was 22-year-old Joshua D'Archi of Belwood. The driver of the dump truck was taken to hospital with minor injuries.



The two MPPs representing King - Stephen Lecce and Caroline Mulroney will provide strong, capable voices as they enter some very interesting waters in provincial politics.



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

Stay tick smart this summer

York Region Public Health is carrying out its spring tick surveillance and has found blacklegged at the Cold Creek Conservation Area and the Centennial Park Trail, along with several other locations in York Region. Spring tick surveillance is being conducted across additional natural public spaces including municipal parks, conservation areas, Regional forest tracts and ravines.

Keep these tips in mind when visiting wooded or brushy natural areas:

- Wear light-coloured pants and long-sleeved tops to help spot ticks
- Choose closed footwear and tuck your pants into your socks
- Use an insect repellent containing DEET or icaridin
- Search your body for ticks, especially the groin, scalp, back and underarm areas
- Bathe or shower as soon as possible after coming indoors to wash off unattached ticks
- Safely remove attached ticks from your body as quickly as possible

Check your pets for ticks York Region Public Health conducts active tick surveillance in the spring and fall and passive tick surveillance year-round. More information on Lyme disease, personal protection and tick removal is available at york.ca/lymedisease or by contacting York Region Health

NEW for 2018 Election of the Regional Chair The next municipal election will be held on Monday, October 22, 2018. For the first time in York Region, the Regional Chair will be elected by general vote as part of the municipal election. Residents of King Township will have the opportunity to vote for their local Ward Councillor, Mayor, School Board Trustee and Regional Chair.

In Ontario, Regional Chairs are responsible for chairing Council for the province's Regional municipalities. As head of Regional Council, the Regional Chair acts as Chief Executive Officer of the Regional Corporation.

Regional Council in York Region is comprised of 21 members, including the Regional Chair, Mayors from each of the nine local municipalities and eleven Regional Councillors. Role of the Regional Chair

The Regional Chair is responsible for, among other things, presiding over Regional Council meetings, and representing the Region in dealings with other levels of government.

He or she also serves as an ex-officio member of all Regional Committees and acting as a member of the York Regional Police Services Board and Director on the York Region Rapid Transit Board.





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
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PC majority predictable; smaller parties hoped for gains

The massive PC victory in Ontario was not unexpected and some of the other parties would have liked to see more support sent their way.

In King-Vaughan, there were seven candidates who offered an option for voters.

The people of Ontario wanted change and no one should stand in the way of that.

Liberal candidate Marilyn Iafrate said the party "has been reduced to the proverbial ashes but from those ashes will come the rebirth of the party which I think is actually quite exciting.

"I personally am proud to have run a campaign with honesty and integrity and have no regrets.

"In terms of the future, I have made no decisions as this is always a matter that I discuss with my family first given the tremendous workload on them.

"I believe that a pluralism is the essence of a true democracy, and having two parties and eight independents (7+1), is not quite the way to represent 14 million Ontarians."

Evtukh said the fact that the Green Party has won a seat, gives "me a hope that we are on the right track to explore new ideas and hopefully, to free up some space to the new players at Queen's Park."

He congratulated Lecce who will work to win constituents' trust, especially those who voted for a different party.

Libertarian Yan Simkin said he was expecting a bit more votes, but he's extremely thankful to "those 235 voters who cast their votes for me."

From a rookie perspective, this election campaign was an eye-opener and a wonderful experience, he noted.

"I thank fellow candidates, the press and the meetings organizers for being part of this campaign and giving me the opportunity. I congratulate Stephen Lecce and hope he will be a worthy MPP for King-Vaughan and wish him best of luck in representing our riding."

Lecce, Mulroney win ridings easily

Stephen Lecce and Caroline Mulroney will represent King residents at Queen's Park, in the new Conservative government.

Both won handily over their opponents in last Thursday night's election, that saw the PCs gain a clear majority. Lecce and Mulroney were part of a Conservative sweep that turned York Region blue.

Lecce is the first MPP for King-Vaughan, winning with a huge 29,136 to 12,012 total over Liberal Marilyn Iafrate, a 17,124-vote margin. Lecce garnered 56.62% of the vote.

The NDP's Andrea Beal was a distant third with 7,921 votes.

Green Party candidate Greg Locke was fourth with 1,754 votes, followed by Trillium's Roman Evtukh (252), Libertarian Yan Simkin (235) and Ontario Moderate Party candidate Tatiana Babitch (151).

Mulroney becomes the newest MPP in York-Simcoe in more than 20 years, garnering 26,050 votes, a whopping 57.26% of the vote. She held a 15,395-vote margin over the NDP's Dave Szollosy, who finished second (10,655), ahead of Liberal Loralea Carruthers, who earned only 6,138 votes.

Green candidate Alexandra Zalucky took fourth with 2,195 votes, followed by Libertarian Ioan Silviu Druma-Strugariu (264) and Moderate Party candidate Franco Colavecchia (150).

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

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
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Poulis finds his niche in the film industry

A King City native enjoyed working with some of Hollywood's finest, but his career journey was far from typical.

Jeff Poulis, a graduate of King City Secondary School, has a very shiny memento to show for his hard work.

Poulis and his team won an Academy Award for Production Design and Set Production for The Shape of Water, directed by Guillermo del Toro. It drew international praise as one of Del Toro's most stunningly successful works.

Poulis said he's worked with del Toro on five productions over the past 22 years. The first was the 1997 sci-fi horror "Mimic."

"We were all pretty amazed at his talents back then. He introduced a style of vision and design that was a welcome change to the industry," Poulis said.

"Getting to sculpt on his sets and receive his thoughts and critique is well, a rush. Not everything is rosy and perfect while making a movie, but the journey getting there and the teamwork involved is what drives our crew."

Poulis said a core team has been working together for a number of years now, and he's known most of them for 20-plus years as fellow colleagues.

"Very talented Canucks we are!"

Poulis recently wrapped up working on the latest DC Comics superhero movie "Shazam." He's working for the next five months on another Hollywood sequel.

Poulis has been "entertaining people all my life."

He said he realized at a very early age that he was very good at getting and keeping that attention.

He was a perfect fit for the film industry, but he didn't know it at the time.

He recalled playing a lot of sports growing up, and during his years at KCSS he played hockey, volleyball, basketball, gymnastics and track & field.

After graduating in 1981, he joined the work force, learning retail at Simpson-Sears.

"But something else that had been around me all my life was about to present itself."

His father, William G. Poulis, was a cameraman and film producer, and during the summer growing up, he would occasionally take Jeff to work with him on news stories for the CBC.

In 1984, his world changed drastically. His sister Andrea had followed their father into the industry and through her, Jeff was given an opportunity to join film union IATSE #873.

"In the film industry, I had instant success with directors, producers, actors and cameramen, because I took care of all the details that were going in front of the camera lenses. Now I had their attention. My career as a property master had begun. I was 22 years old."

Poulis admitted he made some mistakes, but he learned a lot in that first year, "and I've never stopped learning to this day."

His first TV show was in 1985, on ABC's Pippi Longstocking. He created props, outfitted actors with accessories and filmed on a pirate ship.

The last three decades have been



very rewarding for him. He had gained the trust of his peers, and was working on Hollywood feature films.

"I developed terrific friendships with members of the film community, and am proud of many of the movies that I've helped create."

Some film highlights included Sea Of Love, The Cutting Edge, The Santa Clause, Fly Away Home, Finding Forrester, Cinderella Man and most recently the Academy Award Winning Best Picture, Spotlight.

He also managed to find himself acting in front of the cameras a few times, notably in Fly Away Home, and in a very special TV film called First Do No Harm.


"Yours truly got to act in a scene with Meryl Streep. Highly recommended."

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




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
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Dalt Hicks portrait finds a home at Township office

A photo of a prominent citizen will be on display at the new King municipal centre.

Karen Merk, founder of Portraits of Giving, presented the framed photo of the late Dalt Hicks to King councillors. Merk was joined by members of the Hicks family.

Merk pointed out that after Hicks passed away, she wanted to find a home for his portrait and story from a few years ago, "so that his legacy of helping his community would be remembered.

"We felt that the Township of King would be an appropriate place and hope there will be a nice spot in the new town Hall for it. It was an honour to present his portrait to council with Dalt's family and hope his story will continue to inspire others in the future to keep giving back to their community."

Mayor Steve Pellegrini observed that the entire Hicks family has been a tremendous asset to King.

"His (Dalt's) legacy will live on," he said.

Hicks was among the recipients of the Portrait of Giving in 2015.

"You get a gut feeling about helping. Giving and receiving is the most important thing."

Dalt Hicks was born in January 1928. As a boy, he collected and sold stray golf balls from the golf course next-door to their dairy farm before progressing to caddy and starting to play golf. He started out in business with only \$400 in his bank account with which he bought a tractor. He was in the gravel business for 34 years, but his dream was to build a golf course, and in 1984 he bought land on Davis Drive West where his four golf courses and the Cardinal Golf Club house are situated.

Who was the man behind the Cardinal golf brand known for his volunteerism and generous fund-raising efforts for Mackenzie Health since 1975, and the Southlake Regional Health Centre? He was a man who gave back in quiet and private ways.

When Dalt married his wife, Shirley in 1953, there was a polio epidemic that affected his sister. Dalt's friend Harry Cook, a carpenter from Thornhill, was paralyzed from the neck down as a result of the disease. It was around Christmas time when he saw his friend lying in bed, immobile but for his head, watching a little black and white television. Dalt promptly went out to Firestone Tire company which sold appliances in those days and bought a colour TV.

"That was the best gift I had ever given anybody," Dalt said. "When I saw

feeling. That wasn't a big thing, but back in those days it was a lot of money. I think it meant a lot to him. Laying there all day long looking at a black and white TV was a treat, but to get it in colour was even better. That story never left me."

His start in terms of charity work was when he volunteered to drive a boy who had polio downtown to Sick Kids every week for physiotherapy. Dalt started the Richmond Hill Kinsmen in 1954 with his wife and at Christmas they took hampers around to families in need. Friendships are important to Dalt, his employees called him by his first name.

"My door is always open," Dalt said. "Money is not the big objective, it's not the answer to everything. It is nice to be profitable and have success, but it's what you do with it; you give and that is a good feeling in life."

Dalt was moved by the health needs of others and wanted to see the most advanced equipment available to patients. He served as chairman of the board at Mackenzie Health for 15 years. Another cause he supported is Belinda's Place, a shelter for women in need on Yonge Street in Newmarket. Dalt saw the Cardinal Golf course business as a stepping stone for young people out of school where they have to learn to work with others and do business, as well as seniors who need something to do. "Some marriages have been made too," he once said.

His legacy lives on to this day. He set up a family trust to disperse funds to

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him lying there, it gave me a real gut different requests.

King signs agreement with Caledon

After years of informally sharing responsibility for the Caledon-King Townline, the two municipalities will have a formal agreement.

King and Caledon will finalize the agreement for road.

King will provide routine maintenance and repair responsibility for the Townline North, from the 19th Sideroad north to Highway 9, a distance of 2 kilometres.

Caledon will handle the road from the Mount Pleasant north to the 17th Sideroad (3.5 kilometers); from the Albion-Vaughan Road north to King Road (2 kilometres) and from King Road north to Mount Pleasant.

Staff noted that for years, King has had informal agreements with neighbouring municipalities regarding boundary road maintenance. They exchanged maintenance if it made sense from an operational standpoint

"This has been a suitable arrangement, however, it is becoming increasingly difficult to maintain the 'understanding' due to changing staff and increasing litigation," staff noted. "Liability associated with accidents are becoming more common and having a formal agreement with agreed upon responsibilities between the Township and neighbouring municipalities will form a better understanding of responsibilities and accountability for standard maintenance."



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

Ride for Styles raises more than \$20,000 in honour of slain officer

When cyclists from across York Region descended on the York Regional Police's Community Safety Village on Sunday for the annual Ride for Styles, some were sporting tops reading "life is a beautiful ride."

Unfortunately for Constable Garrett Styles, his was cut tragically short, though his legacy lives on through the charity cycle in his name.

Styles, a seven-year veteran with the force, was struck down by a minivan being driven by an underage driver in the early hours of the morning on June 28, 2011.

This year's ride raised just over \$20,000 for the Canadian Tire JumpStart program, Victim Services of York Region, and the Aga Khan Foundation Canada, a non-profit that supports social development programs in Asia and Africa.

A donation was also made to the Canadian Police Memorial Ride to Remember.

With the motto "heroes in life, not death," the Ride to Remember will take place in September to remember those like Styles who have fallen in the line of duty.

"We've raised a lot of money, but we always need more," said Garry Styles, Garrett's father and a retired member of the force, who called his son "a good man."

"It keeps my son's legacy alive, and it's something my son would have supported." $\ensuremath{\mathsf{e}}\xspace$

With humble beginnings in October of 2011 as a group of eight YRP cyclists, this year's event featured both a 50km and 75km ride starting from Bruce's Mill Conservation Area in Stouffville.

Now in its eighth year, around 150 cyclists came out in support of the event, many sporting the new 'Sockcess' YRP-themed socks, aiding in making this year's ride the most successful to date.

"I think it should be supported for a long time," said Mr. Styles. "There's no doubt it's helping a lot of people."

YRP detective and event chief organizer Ken Bardai called the continued support for the ride "proof of Garrett's impact on both his peers and the community."

Since its inception, the Ride 4 Styles has raised over \$100,000 for charity.



Butterfly season is officially open

When I saw a Red Admiral butterfly flying around my garden, like a messenger announcing spring, I knew that butterfly season had started.

According to the Entomology Department of the Royal Ontario Museum, there are approximately 160 registered butterfly species, living in our province. Start looking for them, and if you are really lucky you may discover no more than 10, in any one place in the Township. Let me explain why this is the case.

The presence of butterflies is dependent on larval host plants, or simply put caterpillar food. For example, I have gorgeous Red Admirals in my garden due to the abundance of Stinging Nettles that I grow. The plant is not only the staple food for Red Admiral caterpillars, but also a fantastic source of vitamins and nutrients. What is good for the butterflies is also good for me. I use Stinging Nettles for my summer juicing.

Monarch Butterflies are a great example of the link between the presence of caterpillar host plants and the wellbeing of the species. The moment we wiped out Milk Weed in Canada, we destroyed the food source for their caterpillars. A tragic drop in the number of Monarchs followed.

When, in 1975, prominent butterfly specialists Fred Urquhard and his wife Norah, confirmed their theory of Monarch migration to Mexico, we had 1 billion butterflies completing this journey each year. At present, the population dropped to 40 million; 960 million Monarchs are gone. Despite all the efforts to preserve the Monarch population, to which I tirelessly contribute, we are not making sufficient progress, and each year we are getting closer and closer to the heartbreaking extinction.

Migrating Monarchs were part of the North America ecosystem for thousands of years, and yet they got decimated during the course of one generation of homo sapiens.

At least in King, things may be changing. We should be energized and proud since our Township has decided to be butterfly friendly, and we all have a role to play.

You can make a difference by simply planting larval host plants in your garden. Plant some Asters and Sunflowers if you want to invite Checkerspot and Crescent Butterflies. Grow Rue and Giant Swallowtail Butterflies will fly above your head. They are so big, that it feels like you have a neighbor's drone spying on you. They are also territorial so you may have one living in your garden at the same place, for the whole



them with Sweet Clover, which I reseed each year on my lawn. As a matter of fact, they are flying around me at this very moment, as I write this Butterfly report.

Large Marble, Mustard White, Cabbage White and Checkered White, the four species of White Butterflies, all depend on Mustard family plants. The good news is that you do not need to plant red or white cabbage, broccoli or cauliflower in order to have them in your backyard. It is enough to incorporate some ornamental cabbage in your flower beds. The plant will look very attractive until fall and you will make a lot of our friends, very happy indeed.

They are many Ontario butterflies that depend on trees for survival. If you are surrounded by Willows, Aspen, Poplar and Birches, you may observe the Red Spotted Purple, White Admiral, Weidemeyer's Admiral and Viceryoy (which mimics Monarchs in appearance).

Right now is the perfect time to make butterfly friendly changes. Grow larval host plants and your chances of having Female butterflies visiting you will increase dramatically. Their purpose in life is to mate, lay eggs and find food for their future babies. Help them find what they need in your backyard.

Do it. Do it now, plant some Curly Parsley, Ornamental Cabbages, keep Queen Anne Lace (False Parsley), don't treat it as a weed but as a welcome sign for the butterflies.

For feeding Imagos, this is how we call adult butterflies, keep a lot of Daisies, Dianthus, Sunflowers, and Asters. Plant a perennial butterfly collection: Butterfly Bushes, Columbines, Elke Geranium, Blazing Stars, Echinacea, Milk Weeds and Asters.

Wishing everyone a great butterfly season. Let's make the King Township a true butterfly sanctuary.

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
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We Believe in Abby Day is this Saturday in Schomberg

York seeks additional revenue-raising powers

The Regional Municipality of York is forecasted to grow to 1.8 million residents and 900,000 jobs over the next 25 years. Despite these numbers, the Region has similar revenue-raising powers as a smaller municipality.

In order to continue on the path of strong financial sustainability, York Regional Council continues to advocate for revenue-raising powers similar or the same as the City of Toronto Act, 2006.

"York Region is a growing municipality with one of the largest capital budgets in the Greater Toronto Area," said York Region chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. "As we continue to welcome new residents and businesses to our communities, we must ensure infrastructure is in place to accommodate current and future needs. New revenue sources are essential to addressing costs associated with building new, and maintaining current, infrastructure."

York Region has more than \$220 million per year in infrastructure needs that cannot be addressed by the current limit of a three per cent property tax increase. To address this, regional council again requests the Province of Ontario extend York Region similar or the same revenue-raising options afforded to the City of Toronto, under the City of Toronto Act, 2006. This would include a municipal land transfer tax and vehicle registration tax.


"Regional council has achieved success in meeting three key objectives: keeping annual tax levy increase below three per cent, reducing reliance on debt and saving for asset management needs," said Richmond Hill Mayor David Barrow, chair of the finance and administration committee. "Should the Province of Ontario grant City of Toronto Act, 2006 powers to York Region, we will be in an even stronger financial position to address the needs of our communities."



Horticulture

My small tree form front garden covers, the place where weeds didn't even grow well because, as I discovered, a lot of rubble from when the house was being built got buried there. Although I removed as much as I could there's still quite a bit deep down. And even though I dug compost including composted cattle manure into the sandy soil it's difficult to get plants to grow here, where they get the hot afternoon sun late spring and all summer long and must compete with the near surface roots of a large tree close by.

But I've found three plants that in our area are sold as annuals, which flourish there – thus diascia, nemesia, and felicia now top my "must have" list.

Twinspurs is a low growing, easily grown annual for containers, rock gardens and along walkways and it is better known by its botanical name diascia - from di Greek for two and askos for sac, bag or pouch but not referring to the pair of spurs that protrude from the back of each flower - but rather for the two sacs found in the upper part of the flower of the wild species. It is thought that these sacs help guide bees to find the best position inside the flower when gathering oil from inside the spurs. As well it is thought these oil gathering bees co-evolved with the plants and developed unusually long forelegs to more easily access the oil in the process. These oil producing sacs or

glands often make the flowers appear bi-coloured.

Most diascias do well planted in full sun in sandy fast draining soil that has had humus such as compost and/or composted cattle manure added to it.

There are some 70 species of this plant, mostly annuals but some are perennials and all are native to southern Africa. While perennial plants grow up to 4 ft./120 cm tall the annual diascias that I grow never get higher than 8 in./20 cm and each plant grows about 1 ft./30 cm wide. Each slim but sturdy stem with its tinv oval leaves terminates in a cluster of four or five small five lobed flowers with the bottom lobe being the largest.

The annual diascias have undergone much hybridization and from one or two colours they now come in a variety of colours including brick red, white, pink, mauve and two shades of orange. The original wild perennials and today's perennial garden cultivars come mainly in shades of rose and lavender but while the annual variety is becoming very more popular, I have never seen perennial diascias, which of course won't winter, for sale in local garden centres even as annuals.

Diascias look deceivingly fragile but they are tough cookies. When I was first introduced to this plant a few years ago, I had a half dozen pots of them bought in early June that had never got planted with the rest and although they got watered once in awhile they were badly neglected until I finally put them in my front problem garden in mid July. They made themselves right at home and bloomed beautifully right into mid-fall. However, I certainly don't recommend

you follow my example to test their hardiness!

Now this past winter I had a few plants stay quite green into February but they finally succumbed to the bitterly cold weather and lack of snow that followed.

Nemesias, named after the Greek goddess of justice, Nemesis, is another native of southern Africa and one of my mother's favourite annuals. They have been around a lot longer than diascias to whom they are closely related. They grow 1 ft. to 18 in./30 to 45 cm high (mine are mostly shorter) and each stem with its cover of tiny finely toothed arrowhead shaped leaves is topped by a cluster of small snapdragon like flowers that come in a wide colour range from scarlet and orange through mahogany, yellow, burgundy to blue, lavender and white.

Most nemesias grow well in the same conditions as diascias but they tolerate some light shade and prefer cool nights. I have found them easy to grow in the front garden.
