Plenty of parking in King's villages, consultants say

Despite what motorists may think, there seems to be abundant parking available in all of King's villages.

Some low-cost methods to promote the fact may be all the Township needs to encourage drivers to find parking.

Nearly six months of work by IBI Group resulted in the King Township Core Areas Parking Study, presented to councillors recently. The study examined existing and future parking in the core areas of King City, Nobleton and Schomberg.

Peter Richards, of IBI Group, said at the busiest times, only 42 per cent of King's total parking spots are occupied. His conclusion is that contrary to popular belief, there's plenty of parking available for King residents.

He added many people have the mind rise in the coming years. set that they must park in front of their destination and are not prepared to walk even short distances. This attitude, he said, has to change. Through signage and education measures, the message has to get across to residents.

Richards did point out that discussions with Metrolinx and York Region, as partners, are critical.

In the IBI report, it was noted that King City has 384 on-street parking spots, 560 off-street spaces and 626 GO Transit parking spots. At peak periods during the week, only 42% is being used in the village, while 100% of the GO spots are taken.

By 2028, the consultants predicted residents will use 71% of the total spots in the village. The GO spaces will have to increase, as demand will continue to

In Nobleton, 37% of the 127 on-street spots and 322 off-street spots are being used during the week. It rises to 38% on Saturdays and predictions indicate the parking is sufficient for years to come.

In Schomberg, only 24% of the spots are being used during peak hours. This is not expected to rise much in the coming years. There are currently 140 onstreet spaces and 235 off-street spots.

While parking is largely adequate,

IBI did make 52 strategic recommendations for the villages, mostly to improve accessible parking and parking management. They recommended shareduse agreements with other property owners; creating an online parking map; improved markings and better signage, including "dynamic signage" at the GO lots indicating the number of spots in use.



According to a report released by UNICEF, upwards of 150 million students worldwide experience peer violence in and around school.

"A significant number of these recommendations address ways to increase the awareness and education of core area parking users and stakeholders and influencing their behavior via providing better and more information on alternative and readily available parking options," staff said. "For example, effective and increased signage and pavement markings should significantly reduce driver confusion, and should elevate the parking experience, while improving the safety and operational performance of the road network."

IBI recommends regular meetings with Metrolinx and York Region and shareduse agreements with landowners. They also suggested that King allows residential permit parking in municipal off-street lots if parking is not available on-street.





King mayor takes the Monarch Pledge

King is known for being committed to preserving its natural beauty and sharing that with its native inhabitants.

Another testament to preserving habitats came in the form of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge, taken by Mayor Steve Pellegrini at council recently.

The pledge is a commitment to restore the monarch butterfly habitat in King, and encourage residents to do the Township staff is currently under-

tiatives to create habitat for the monarch and other pollinators. This builds on King's Bee City Canada Certification, achieved in the fall of 2017, and this involves protecting and

fostering native pollinators. The Township held its first, successful pubic event called "The Buzz." The day-long event at Cold Creek included seminars, workshops and family activities, all celebrating our valuable pollinators.

The goal of the National Wildlife Federation's Mayors' Monarch Pledge is to help restore the butterfly's habitat. The monarch is one of the most recognizable species. Each fall, monarchs set out on an incredible 5,000-kilometre journey to their wintering sites in the mountains of Mexico.

The North American monarch population has declined by more than 90 per cent over the past 20 years and it's been attributed to a degradation and loss of breeding habitat in Canada and the U.S.

The initiative came to light in King, thanks to a student at The Country Day School, doing research on monarchs. They asked Mayor Pellegrini and the Sustainability Advisory Committee (SAC) to take the pledge.

The Township already implements many of the action items, as part of its Bee City certification. The Township has vowed to implement 11 more initia-

King artist butterfly expert Grazyna Tonkiel presented the mayor with a milkweed plant, so he could start his monarch corner in his garden. Tonkiel has also started cooperation with Bee City Canada and she's currently working on webinars and educational programs for schools.







Nouisser brings home tennis gold

At the age of 75, Gisela Nouisser continues to add to her tennis trophy case. The Nobleton resident returned home from the Steve Stevens Senior National Championships in Montreal with both a gold and a silver medal, from the 75+ doubles and singles events respectively. More than 500 players from 40 different categories converged on the city for the event.

Entering the singles event as the third seed following some strong finishes at nationals in the past three years, Nouisser won four straight sets in the round robin to advance to the Saturday final with a perfect record, where a meeting with the tournament's number one seed left her with a silver medal finish.

Paired up with partner Claude Cherniak for the doubles event, Nouisser and Cherniak won Thursday's final match in a marathon, forced to go to a tiebreak in both winning sets to take the gold medal.

Nouisser, who has played with both the Bolton and Nobleton Tennis Clubs since the mid-1970s, took a casual approach to the game until 2015, when she first began to play in sanctioned tournaments.

When the Nobleton club folded years later, she spent her summers honing her craft at the Bolton club and her winters at Veneto in Woodbridge.

It was three years ago when Nouisser decided to rejoin the renewed Nobleton

Tennis Club.

"The club is well organize with a terrific bunch of people managing it," said

Nouisser. "Who support me in every step of my tennis achievements."

tional Tennis Federation-sanctioned tournament in North York early this year, and just recently returned from an ITF Cup event in Montreal with a silver medal in her pocket in June.

Other podium finishes in the past three years include a pair of gold and silver medals at the Easter Nationals in Toronto, as well as a gold and silver win at the provincials at the Boulevard Club in Toronto.

Not bad for someone who only took up sanctioned tournaments three years ago.

"I only started playing OTA, Tennis Canada & ITF tournaments, because I couldn't find enough ladies to play the singles game," said Nouisser, who added she has been "lucky to have won all except Nationals."

Her recent success has also landed Nouisser on a stage she has reached for the first time in her short-yet-illustrious career: she is representing Canada at the Super-Senior World Championships in Croatia. Qualification comes from a successful stint at the handful of sanctioned tournaments held throughout the season.

Yet despite her accomplishments, to Nouisser, she is just "an average tennis player who just happens to love the game."

er to the Provincial Junior Hockey League, spending the 2017-18 season as the starting netminder for the Midland Flyers, where he earned 10 wins in over a thousand minutes played between the pipes.

Off the ice, a memorabilia room brought Cougars fans through the storied history of the club, with ex-Cougars donating their old equipment, jerseys, and other notable items to be displayed for the cause.

The Cougars open the season with a string of home games at the Trisan Centre, playing host to the Stayner Siskins Thursday night in the first of backto-back games with last year's regular season champions. They hit the road for the first time on Sept. 28, when they visit with the Penetang Kings.

Anglican Parish By John Arnott

Many of us associate Nottingham in England with its notorious sheriff in its stark castle and his treacherous dealings with Robin Hood in the days of medieval England's King Richard the Lion-heart. But this English city has a much more positive association with history for its St. Mary the Virgin Anglican Cathedral, the 3rd one built on the same site and dating from the 1300s is home to the first Sunday school in modern times opening in 1751.

In other centuries Alfred the Great, St. Charles Borromeo, Martin Luther and John Knox along with countless monks in countless monasteries in earlier times had a hand in teaching at least a few poor boys basic academics giving us, among many, scholars such as Venerable (St.) Bede and Alcuin Charlemagne's right hand man.

Hannah Ball of High Wycombe Buckinghamshire was another early pioneer of the the modern Sunday school movement opening one in her hometown in 1769. In the 1780s William King, a factory owner, started a Sunday school

in the Tabernacle Church in Dursley Gloucestershire England and encouraged his friend Anglican Robert Raikes, editor of the Gloucester Journal, to start a similar school in his home city, Gloucester which he soon did. And which proved so successful that Raikes is often credited as "father of the Sunday school movement."

Now the idea of Sunday school began to catch on all over Britain so that by 1800 more than a quarter of a million children were attending. In his age that of the Industrial Revolution education neither compulsory nor free and Raikes, in particular, thought it important that poor children of that era who worked long hours 6 days a week have at least some education so they could try to better themselves and not be so easily tempted to turn to crime.

Although religion was taught in these Sunday classes it was secondary to academic studies with the 3 Rs, then called cyphering, taking precedence. Parents who themselves weren't regular church-goers or even went to church at all began to insist their children attend Sunday school. Sunday school prize days, parades, picnics and excursions soon became as much looked forward to as the long established religious holidays. These Sunday schools eventually forced governments to recognize the importance of free compulsory education for all youngsters 5 to 10 years then 5 to 12 years and finally today 5 to 16 years (18 in Ontario, Manitoba and New Brunswick).

The idea of Sunday school crossed the pond near the end of the 1700s and although dates are blurred it is thought the first Sunday school in what is today Canada was established around that time in Halifax in by the Anglicans. We know Rev. Francis Dick a Congregational pastor started a Sunday school in 1801 in Quebec followed by Rev. William Smart a Presbyterian who started a Sunday school in 1811 in Brockville Ontario.

The St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes that today's Sunday schools focus primarily on religious teaching often using arts and crafts as a teaching tool.

The first Sunday school curriculum developed entirely in Canada was the United Church's 1963 "New Curriculum" followed by the Anglican "Parish Education" 3 years later. Both were cause for concern and controversy. Thus when American professor and author Ruth Duck of the United Church

of Christ published her "The Whole People of God" in 2013 it was widely welcomed and became the basis of Sunday school curricula across the Americas into Europe and Australia and New Zealand. Anglican, Coptic, Eastern Orthodox, Lutheran, Protestant and Roman Catholic Sunday schools have adapted it at least in part as a teaching guide.

Today the idea of "Sunday" school has been adopted by Buddhists, Hindus, and Muslims. The Jodo Shinsu Buddhist churches have even included adapted Christian hymns and poetry into their Sunday school services One favourite old children's hymn "Yes Jesus Loves Me" has become "Yes Buddha Loves Me!"

Over the past decade Sunday school attendance drastically dropped in many Christian churches perhaps due to "open Sundays" with many more attractive options open to young people. But encouragingly in the last couple of years there has been somewhat of an upturn in this situation. Hopefully this will continue as new learning strategies such as "The Whole People of God" are forthcoming.


