bers participated in the celebration at the newly opened Magna Hall, along with the Honourable Merrilee Fullerton, Minister of Training, Colleges and Universities, and Stephen Lecce, MPP for King-Vaughan.

The new 200,000-square-foot facility includes 25 new classrooms, computer labs, specialty labs, a library, and student centre with a multi-purpose athletic and recreation space.

The campus can now accommodate 1,450 additional students, creating a total capacity of 5,000 full-time students, while enhancing the quality of student learning and campus life. The project allows Seneca to expand its range of health, community service and public safety programs.

Magna Hall is named after Magna International, which

Seneca staff, students, donors and community mem-donated \$3 million to the King Campus expansion.

"Until the opening of Magna Hall, academic infrastructure at King Campus has been limited," said Seneca President David Agnew during his opening address. "With the opening of this new facility, students now have the resources they need to find success in their studies, enjoy a vibrant student experience and prepare for their careers."

Construction began in August 2016 and the project was completed in May 2018. At the peak of construction, there were more than 300 workers on site daily. Magna Hall officially opened for student use on the first day of school, Sept. 4. Students are already comfortable in the new space, spending their time hanging out, studying and keeping fit.



Group wants new council chambers named in honour of Jesse Lloyd

A local group wants the name of one of King's earliest statesmen enshrined in the new municipal building.

The Lloydtown Rebellion Association, an admittedly small but dedicated group of residents, wants King council to formally recognize Jesse Lloyd in the new offices. They would like to see the new chambers named the Jesse Lloyd Council Chambers in his honour.

Bill Foran, local historian and member of the LRA, made the request to council recently. They believe Lloyd's contributions to King's early history is so important, it should be recognized for generations to come.

For an cited three main contributions Lloyd made in King. Under Lloyd's leadership, Lloydtown was the largest hamlet in King Township in 1846, with a population of 350. The village was the most important community travelling north from Toronto in those days.


Lloyd was a community minded man. He held the position of "Overseer of Roads" for two terms and he declined any remuneration.

Between 1829 and 1836 Jesse Lloyd held elected office in King in every year but one, serving as overseer of highways, poundkeeper and township commissioner.

Lloyd 1786-1838) was a leader in the Upper Canada Rebellion of 1837. Born in Springfield Township, Pennsylvania, he was the third son of Quakers William Llovd and Susannah Heacock. The Lloyds, who were United Empire Loyalists, immigrated permanently to Upper Canada in 1808. Upon arrival, they migrated north to settle in the 10th Concession of King Township.

In the days of the Family Compact in Upper Canada, agitation grew from year to year. Meetings for reform were held all over the home district and even in some remote parts of the province. Lloyd was a local leader in public affairs in his district.

His role in the Upper Canada Rebellion of 1837 is legendary. He helped to



raise and lead a large contingent from the Lloydtown area, which became known as a hot-bed for rebellious activity. This group was said to be the best trained and most determined of the rebels who gathered at Montgomery's Tavern north of Toronto.

After their defeat, a reward of 500 pounds was put on Lloyd's head. He was forced to flee the country and he went to Indiana, where he lived out the last few months until his death in 1838.

A statue, created by King's own Brett Davis, was dedicated in 1972 and sits proudly on display in Lloydtown.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini said over the years, King has recognized Lloyd in many ways.

A comprehensive history of King Township is currently in the works, led by local author Kelly Mathews. The mayor said he's anxious to see the project completed so everyone can read about the important historical figures in King's past.

While it's a novel idea, Pellegrini said he's not aware of any municipal council chambers bearing anyone's

Singer-songwriter contemplates life

What most of us miss, Jon Brooks exposes.

The accomplished singer-songwriter is more like a modern day standup philosopher, documenting the times. He's a combination of George Carlin and Leonard Cohen.

That combination is perfect when it comes to creating contemporary music. The King City native will return to

his roots, with an upcoming performance Friday, Oct. 19 at Rockford's in King City. Show time is 8 p.m.

Brooks is a deep thinker and likes to totally immerse himself in his art. He recently spent time in the northern Adirondacks learning songs by Van Morrison, Blind Willie Johnson, and Leonard Cohen in a 100-year-old country church he rented for rehearsing/writing new

Brooks is the only person nominated five times for "Songwriter of the Year" at the Canadian Folk Music

His sixth album, "No One Travels Alone," is a journey into life's deep, deep questions. It's as meditative as it is playful. He borrowed from Elizabethan sonneteers to connect songs in No One Travels Alone in corona form, where the last line of the first song becomes the first line of the second song, and so on, until the last line of the album completes the circle and begins the album

"This album takes an ecocentric view of ourselves within the universe. We are all connected, as reflected by the connected songs in the corona form."

In 2010 he won the New Folk Award at The Kerrville (Texas) Folk Festival, one of the largest and most prestigious folk festivals in the U.S. He has toured in every province and most states this side of California.

Brooks's talent emerged early and he said he found he a talent for humour and language in his teens. But, he didn't think he was "wired" for musical talent and the confidence that comes with performing.

Music kept calling and it's been part of who he is. It has nagged him and taunted him at times, forever challenging his preconceptions.

"It's a rare and good day when I feel like I'm in command of my musical 'gifts,'" he said.

Brooks doesn't want to single out particular musical influences, but he's quite fond of artists like Cave, Cohen, Cash, and The Clash. In his case, though, one of his early influences was his dad Jack, who played drums in the 1970s. It seems early childhood memories embed themselves in our hearts. He recalls fondly hearing "Kris Kristofferson and Willie Nelson in the back seat of a Mercury Monarch on our way to hockey games in Nobleton and Schomberg and Beeton and Oro."

Brooks also doesn't want to be pigeon-holed, fitting neatly into one particular genre.

Literary influences abound in his music, which meanders through British pop, California hip hop, Texas blues, near Eastern Sufi, or Americana alt-country. He writes "topical ballads" and plays the acoustic guitar, often performing solo.

"I've always been drawn to songs that are subversive – songs that might challenge people's views, songs that make us think. I've always been drawn into any art form that makes me think."

want to feel transformed by a song, a play, a novel, a movie.

Admittedly "anti-genre," Brooks uncle" living on the fringes.

He's "sonically dynamic, lyrically provocative, and musically iconoclas-


"My songs are morally ambiguous." never black and white. I write songs in the effort to calm those who've looked into their hearts; I also write songs to terrify those who've not. Mine is a hope unmolested by delusion and childish idealism."

Yes, he goes where few venture, into the dark recesses of the human beast. And yet, he's engaging, encouraging his audiences to laugh, be inspired and remain hopeful.

Unlike traditional "protest artists," Brooks doesn't preach, take sides,

or tell anyone how to think or vote. "I prefer to sing the song of the individual – the person sitting next to us."

And like his newest album, Brooks wants people to feel less alone.

Brooks's repertoire is as varied as people on the planet.

In 2007 he released an album of Canadian war stories, "Ours and the Shepherds." In 2009, he released, "Moth Nor Rust," an album of songs about all the positive things that make us human, that neither moth nor rust can touch. "Delicate Cages" in 2012 was a collection of songs all about the paradoxes of freedom and imprisonment. He followed that in 2014 when he took a provocative turn down the "dirt roads of rural Canadian murder bal-Brooks observed that most of us lads." This may have actually been his most folk-like album, but it contains as much humour as it does carnage.

"I'm always looking to write songs said he likens himself your "punk rock" that make others feel the pulse of the soul of the age."

When performing live, Brooks enjoys the power to unite people, to be able to "participate in something so positive in a world stuffed with negatives.

"Unlike any other art form, song has the capacity to move us with the greatest shock, and gentlest consolation. Live music is ancient and magical."

Society is currently dealing with alienation, dislocation, social media and "fake news," further segregating one another.

"Aside from deleting our Facebook and Instagram accounts, the next best thing we can do for each other and our children's children is to continue to support local community and live music," he said.

Despite its shortcomings, the digital and global age has given us more great music than we could possibly absorb.

And that's a good thing for those looking for a bit more from their contemporary music.

Brooks isn't quite sure what the universe has in store for him in the future. Whatever that is, you can bet he'll have something to say about it!







The youngest player in franchise history is looking to become a staple this season on the Ottawa Senators' wing.

King City's Alex Formenton took to the ice for the Senators' preseason development camp this week, one year removed from a second round pick in the 2017 NHL Entry Draft, and a breakout point-per-game season with the OHL's London Knights.

"It's been an easier transition with one year's camp already under my belt," said Formenton. "You know your role, and it doesn't really change. You want to come in, and develop, and just show what you have to give."

Making the 2017 draft class by just a few days, there has been plenty of speculation around the hockey world as to where Formenton would have landed had he been born into the 2018 class, after a breakout season in 2016-17.

A strong development camp in September of 2017 almost had the ex-Aurora Tiger on the opening night roster for the Senators, a rarity for a second-round pick in his first eligible year. He got in one game at the NHL level, on Oct. 7 against the Detroit Red Wings, cementing his place as the youngest ever to debut in a Senators uniform.

"I've been giving it my all, all summer, and I feel good heading in, so we'll see how it goes."



Who in Hell is Lucifer? With the report Pope Francis I in an interview with a leading Italian journalist suggested that the traditional hell of eternal fire and brimstone of the abrahamic religions (Judaism, Christianity, Islam) doesn't really exist. What about Lucifer, who for millennia has been seen as the supreme evil spirit and resident in

The St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes that evil first appeared on Earth shortly after its creation when in the guise of a serpent it successfully tempts Eve with the "apple" in the Garden of Eden leaving us to believe if God created everything he must have created evil, too. Or were there two competing pre-creation cosmic forces – one for good, God, and the other equally strong opposing him, Evil, who placed the serpent in Eden?

Now the Fourth Lateran Council (1215 AD) of the Western Christian Church (Rome) issued a communique

stating "Diabolus enim et alli daemones a Dio quidem natura creati sunt boni sed ipsi per a facti sunt mali" – "The devil (Lucifer) and other demons were created by God good in their nature but they by themselves have made themselves evil."

So it seems Lucifer, the angel whose name means son or bringer of light, was so impressed by his own beauty and intelligence that he believed he could manipulate the force of good (God) to his own ends. He gathered a like group of angels to challenge God, but was himself challenged by Michael the Archangel and defeated. The result was he was banished along with his misguided followers from heaven. At this point he lost his heavenly name becoming "Satan," the Hebrew word for adversary. According to the author of St John's Book of Revelations, the battle for the supremacy of good over evil, or vice versa, will take place again at the time of the final Judgement and in a hard fought contest Lucifer will be the loser fatally falling to Michael's sword.

The names Michael (he who is like God), Gabriel (my strength is God), Raphael (God heals), Uriel (my light is God), all contain "el" as do the three remaining archangels, which in ancient Hebrew means God, but Lucifer doesn't, indicating he was not an archangel as some have said!

The morning star (planet Venus), sometimes referred to as Lucifer, said to be its god was thought by the some ancient people of the Middle East to try each day to climb to the highest point in the sky to out do the sun, but was overcome by the sun's brightness (God's reflected light) and forced to daily descend unseen to its original place. Centuries later this belief had given way gave to the story in ancient Canaan (modern Israel) of Helal, the great warrior king, who conquered a large part of Syria founding the Canaanite kingdom and who now wanted to ascend higher than all the star gods but failed and then descended to the depths. This led to another Canaanite myth that Helel, a minor god, tried to dethrone the supreme god El but failed and he too was banished to Earth. By the time the Israelites took over Canaan more centuries had passed and these myths had been blended into the story of Attar, the shining one, and his attempt to replace Ba'al, the chief Canaanite god of the day with himself, but failing he descended to become ruler of the underworld.


