### Little Abby Eveson leaves a legacy of hope and perseverance





King's smallest heroine, little Abby Eveson, leaves a legacy of perseverance.

And that legacy will hopefully transform into a lasting physical memorial.

Abby passed away suddenly Oct. 24 and her death has the community reeling.

A Celebration of Abby's Life will be held at the Trisan Centre, 25 Dillane Drive, Schomberg, on Thursday, Nov. 1, starting at 2 p.m. Everyone is encouraged to wear Abby's favorite colours, either pink or purple and a We Believe in Abby t-shirt if you have one. At 3:20 p.m. the ice surface will be available for public skating until 6:50 p.m. From then until 8 p.m. the family invites you to join them in common areas at the Trisan Centre for a time of fellowship and refreshment.

The community came together to support the Eveson family, and the outpouring has been truly remarkable.

Rory MacKinnon, owner of the Schomberg McDonald's, was quick to offer his support. From Oct. 26 to 28, 100% of the sales of their charity cookies will go to the "We Believe in Abby" fund.

"We have come to know Becky Eveson, Craig and their family over the last two years since we opened the Schomberg restaurant," MacKinnon commented. "We are also very strongly invested in the Schomberg community. We are so honoured to be part of this great community that cares so much."

Abby's story is one of hope in the face of almost insurmountable odds. Abby fought like a champion throughout her short life. Abby suffered from a rare congenital heart defect. Born without her main pulmonary artery, Abby had her first surgery 14 hours after birth and has had three open heart surgeries since.

Parents Craig and Becky had gone above and beyond ensuring that Abby had more than enough love and positive energy.

### Manor marks its 25th anniversary

Residents, past and present board members, Schomberg Lions Club members, staff, and family members of both the late Jim Kitchen and Bill Breedon, celebrated the 25th anniversary of the opening of the Kitchen-Breedon Manor in Schomberg recently. Joining the commemoration event was Mayor Steve Pellegrini and Councillor-elect Bill Cober.

Kitchen-Breedon Manor, formally part of the Schomberg Lions Non-profit Housing Corporation, was initialled conceived and spearheaded by Jim Kitchen and Bill Breedon, long-term Schomberg Lions Club members, in the early '90s to provide affordable housing for local seniors who wanted to stay in their community. Sadly, neither lived to see the breaking of ground but they are remembered by having the building named in their honour.

Then Lions President John Bassel persevered and applied his know-how to overcome initial local resistance to the project until the first shovel in ground was made on a very cold, but special, Feb. 9, 1992, with both widows Shirley Kitchen and Anne Breedon doing the honours.

Over the past 25 years, this 32-unit non-profit housing facility in the heart of Schomberg, has been home to seniors from within Schomberg and, recently, people from across the GTA who have come to call Schomberg home.

The Schomberg Lions Club continues to support the operation of the Kitchen-Breedon Manor by volunteering their time on the board of directors. Scott Church, operational services manager, and previously Joe Huson, can be credited with ensuring this facility is one of the most well-managed and immaculate housing facility in York Region. The Schomberg Lions are proud of the Kitchen-Breedon Manor and expect to see it thrive for at least another 25 years.

Editorial The fate of the many, decided by so few

Our democratic system may not be perfect, but it works.

Sometimes, politics and getting out to vote is like leading a horse to water. The fate of the many rests on the shoulders of a few.

That point was made abundantly clear Oct. 22, as only 30% of King voters made the effort to cast a ballot in this municipal election. The old adage that if you don't vote, you can't complain, holds true.

The majority of King voters left the decision up to the 5,802 people who voted.


With numbers that small, every vote does matter. In two races, the winner was decided by only 56 votes. The candidates engaged in those races likely asked a lot of "what ifs."

The municipal election is the most important one for homeowners, but it seems to draw the least attention, or effort. Local councils decide where your property tax dollars are spent, how your garbage gets collected, and what roads are paved. Our council also plans new development, creates infrastructure and builds libraries and rec centres. We enjoy parks and arenas, thanks to the good work of our municipal politicians and staff.

Residents pay a premium to live in King. With that comes an open invitation to take part in the political process.

The five men and two women on council love King and their respective communities. They made a commitment to serve, not just the 30% who voted, but 100% of the population.

The price of admission to the democratic system is free. Too bad more of us didn't take advantage of it.





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

### We can do better than than 32% turnout in King

It is well documented that voter turnout for municipal elections is often considerably lower than voter participation in provincial or federal elections. This election was no different in King where only 5,802 of the 18,365 eligible voters actually cast a ballot. This equals a voter turnout under 32%, less than one-third.

Many news articles highlight the fact that there is a general trend in many western nations of decreasing voter participation over the past 20 years. One wonders why, and what can be done to engage citizens more and exercise their right to vote.

For this year's municipal election in King, significant efforts were made to engage voters in several ways. To begin, individual Voter Cards were sent to all registered voters many weeks before the election. In addition, the Township of King website provided basic information about all the candidates who were registered, including contact information and links to websites set up by several candidates. King also organized several Advanced Polls around the township for early voting, plus made proxy forms available.

The King Weekly Sentinel ran a series of informative articles featuring the candidates running in each ward, and provided notices regarding all can-

didates meetings and other election information.

Concerned Citizens of King Township (CCKT) organized two all candidates meetings, and later posted a video of each meeting on the CCKT website. In addition the citizens' group created a questionnaire that was sent to each candidate, and responses were posted on the website for public viewing. Further, CCKT leveraged its significant social media presence using its Facebook Page, YouTube channel and Twitter feed to further broadcast this information to King voters.

And perhaps most significant of all, many candidates participated in active campaigning by knocking on doors of constituents, listening to concerns and sharing platform goals.

In spite of all these efforts, voter turnout remained low. Many ask, "What can be done to have citizens become better engaged and exercise their right to vote?"

On-line voting and telephone voting were used in many municipalities across Ontario this year. Could this be helpful in King? Studies suggest that e-voting can increase voter participation by providing this convenient form of voting in the lives of people with busy work schedules and family commitments.

Many voters wonder if their vote re-

ally matters. Given the close results in Wards 1 and Ward 3, it is clear that each vote does count and can make a difference.

Use of social media, ranked ballots and proportional representation are other ideas being offered to help engage voters more. Ultimately, there is a more poignant question we each must ask ourselves, "Of what value is my vote, and will I participate?"

With all this said, we recognize a new council for King Township has been elected, albeit by a relatively small number of voters, and now citizens have an opportunity to participate and make their voices heard in the matters of community interest and concern. A new Official Plan for King. Preserving and growing the Greenbelt. Creating vibrant, healthy and unique communities in King. Who will participate?

#### Fewer residents are heading to the polls to vote

King may very well be one of the best places to live in the country, but its residents aren't flocking to the polls to vote.

The voter turnout in this year's municipal election was one of the lowest in many years. Only 30.86% of people voted – 5,802 cast their ballots out of a total of 18,803 eligible voters.

It was down from 2014 levels, when 5,496 marked ballots, representing a 32.96% voter turnout.

In Ward 1, roughly 34% turned out. In all, 1,276 votes were cast, out of 3,775 eligible voters.

Ward 2 has the largest population in King, but its numbers were similarly low. In Ward 2, 1,081 voted, out of a total of 4,693.


The turnout in Ward 3 was roughly 28% and 299 people voted for their new councillor. Jakob Schneider won by a mere 56 votes.

Ward 4 had the strongest showing, and one poll recorded a 44.59% turnout. Of that ward's 3,677 eligible voters, 1,454 cast ballots.

Ward 5 averaged a 30% turnout in another 56-vote margin for the winner, Jordan Alexander Cescolini. In a ward with 3,482 voters, only 1,103 came out.

Finally in Ward 6, 384 residents went to the polls, out of 1,274 eligible voters.

By the numbers, it was disappointing that more people didn't take advantage of the democratic system. The mayor's race in the past may have generated more interest, and encouraged more to come out and vote, so Steve Pellegrini's acclamation may have kept some voters away.





**Carbon Monoxide Awareness Week** November 1-7, 2018

Clocks will fall back one hour at 2am on November 4 and King Fire & Emergency Services is recommending residents install new batteries in their smoke and carbon monoxide alarms when they change their clocks.

"In order for smoke and carbon monoxide alarms to do their job, they need to have working batteries," explained Fire Chief Jim Wall. "Once a year, old batteries should be replaced with new batteries. When you change your clocks on November 4, King Fire & Emergency Services wants everyone to take the time to install new batteries in all alarms."

In order to survive a fire, you need to be provided with an early warning and know what to do when the smoke alarms sound. Working smoke alarms are required on every storey of the home and outside all sleeping areas. For added protection, it is recommended to also install smoke alarms inside all bedrooms.

Carbon monoxide alarms must be installed outside all sleeping areas if your home has a fuel-burning appliance, fireplace or attached garage.

Tampering with or removing the batteries from your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms is against the law. Failure to comply with the Fire Code can result in a ticket for \$360 or a fine of up to \$50,000.

Condolences flooded social media and Facebook the day Abby passed.

In his post, Craig said he's "absolutely gutted. I have no way to express what a hole in my life this morning has left. Nothing is going to be able to replace the way she looked at me. The last 5 years have been the most emotionally difficult times I will ever face, but they are nothing compared to the joy my sweet little girl gave me every time I saw her. I have been reading the kind words that have been posted and texted to us today and I know I was not alone. She truly was one of a kind and I wouldn't trade one second of her extraordinary life. She has made me a better person and the luckiest dad in the world. Daddy loves you so very much my sweet sweet little girl, I will miss you today, tomorrow, and every day, and for the rest of time."

Mom Becky poured her heart out on her Facebook post.

"I never thought I would ever be writing this especially when Abby has been doing so well. Attempting to walk more, eat more, and in general just looking better then ever. This morning has rocked our world as I sit in the ER holding my baby girl for the last time. She had a cardiac arrest this morning and wasn't able to fight anymore.

"I said it last week after the Wiggles concert. This girl had a twinkle in her eye and a love for life. She had that special gift of making everyone around her fall in love with her. She gave everyone so much hope. She was a miracle. We made sure that she had the opportunity to live life as we knew we never had any guarantees.

"How do we move on without her smile, her laughter, her love.

"She is my sunshine. In my heart of hearts I honestly thought she had beat this."

Mayor Steve Pellegrini extended his condolences to the Eveson family, noting Abby was an inspiration to us all.

"For a little girl, she had such a big impact on the lives of everyone in King," he said. "She was always smiling. For all of the difficulties she endured, people can learn a few things



about having a positive outlook. She was an inspiring little example of courage."

Abby has touched the community forever according to Councillor-elect Bill Cober.

"Abby has been an inspiration throughout her life journey. Abby, her family and many community volunteers have worked to support many others through the 'We Believe in Abby Campaign.' Our entire community sends our thoughts and prayers to the Eveson family at this time. Our community is a family and we are all grieving but are blessed that Abby touched our lives and will always remain a part of our community."

Ward 2 Councillor-elect David Boyd, who serves with Craig on King Fire and Emergency Services, said he's deeply saddened and praying for the Evesons, their extended family and for everyone who was fortunate enough to have known Abby.

"Abby's light shone bright. The impact she had in the community will never be forgotten," he said.





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The School of Drama sashays into Nobleton plaza

Future stars of King, unite.

The School of Drama officially opened its doors in Nobleton, holding a ribbon-cutting ceremony recently at its new location in the Highway 27 plaza.

Artistic directors David and Stefanie Farro's new workspace brings together decades of experience in both the classroom and studio settings, promising their students the best in the biz with a carefully selected team of expert teachers.

Despite the name, the School of Drama is a multi-faceted facility: classes ae available in everything from drama, to visual art, to dance, to musical theatre, and even photography.

"We are exciting to have you here, and to have an opportunity like this in King," said Mayor Pellegrini when presenting the Farros with a commemorative plaque. "Here's to many long and successful years here in Nobleton."

A high school drama teacher for 17 years, David has produced over 20 musicals and plays in his career, and has been the recipient of awards like the Premier's Award for Teaching Excellence.

As a member of the curriculum-writing team during the re-development of the Ontario Arts curriculum, he is well versed in strategies and expectations required to deliver arts education. For the past decade, he has worked as an instructor for York University's Continuing Education Program, where he teaches other educators how to teach drama.

Stefanie has a BFA with an honours specialist in dance, where she trained in classical genres. Growing up, she studied under Brian and Fay Foley's ADAPT syllabus. She has taught dance in the Regional Arts program in both the elementary and secondary school panels, where she was also a member of their admissions team.

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

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
