
















Council, staff dedicate new municipal building

Bursting with pride, King Township councillors and staff dedicated the new municipal complex Nov. 12.

The spacious, modern building is the epitome of efficiency and a testament to King's pride of ownership.

"It's not every day you get to dedicate a building like this," remarked Mayor Steve Pellegrini. "It's hard to believe that more than two years ago it was nothing more than a set of blueprints and a couple of artist renderings.

"The building itself is a beautiful mix of brick and wood in keeping with the rural nature of King Township.

"Along with the bricks and wood we've also put in many sustainability features, including a geo-thermal loop and electric vehicle charging stations. We've already started to work on landscaping and reforestation of the property to make the environmental footprint even greener than it

"The council chambers are breathtaking, with a high ceiling and plenty of seating to accommodate residents at public meetings."

There is a multi-use gymnasium with a fantastic sprung

wood floor. It will eventually be used by members of the community. Pellegrini noted that combined with the York Regional Police substation, it makes this a community hub instead of just an office building.

"I'd like to congratulate my council colleagues on having the courage and vision to go forward with such a large project. There were a lot of people responsible for getting us from where we were to where we are today, including our CAO, Susan Plamondon, who was the driving force behind the vision for the new centre.

"I'd like to thank our staff. They had been in that old, very tired location for many years and they spent many hours getting ready for this move. I see many smiles around as I walk through the halls of this building.

"Chris Fasciano, our director of Parks, Recreation and Culture, served as the primary liaison between the administration and the project manager, architect and the contractors who eventually built the building. I don't think even Chris could total up the hours he spent taking care of issues small and large, many at the last moment, to ensure the doors opened on time."

"We hope that the community gets many, many years of enjoyment out of this fantastic community hub."



Praise abounds for retiring Ward 3 councillor Linda Pabst

The first meeting in King's brand new council chambers was bitter sweet.

Councillor Linda Pabst, who spent the last quarter-century serving constituents in King, patriciated in her last council meeting. She helped dedicate the new building and colleagues shared kind words on her career, as she's poised to retire.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini noted Pabst ,has served the community as a councillor for 24 years. Over those 24 years a lot has changed but one thing hasn't - "Linda's dedication to making King Township a better place to live.

"She's done that by serving countless hours helping her constituents, sitting at the council table and serving on many committees, such as TRCA, Road Watch, Accessibility and made many fund raising dinners."





The N6 includes King, Georgina, East Gwillimbury, Newmarket, Aurora and Whitchurch-Stouffville. They've teamed up over the past decade to share efficiencies, savings and improve service levels as a cohesive group.

One of the most recent achievements was a new enhanced waste contract with GFL.

"The excellent working relationships between municipalities created an effective team where all directors, CAOs and councils came to an agreement on the final contract and selection of service provider," staff noted. "This eight-year contract with two, one-year optional extensions, should provide the residents of the Northern Six municipalities of York Region with better customer service levels, enhanced solid waste collection and still have flexibility to respond to possible legislative changes in the coming years."

Staff pointed out that the N6 shares training, learning and development opportunities for municipal staff.

The N6 fire departments recently partnered on the preparation of their respective Fire Master Plans. The resulting Collaboration and Innovation Report (CIR) identifies many shared


strategies.

"There are many benefits to the CIR, including expanded opportunities for fire serves expertise given that the N6 is supporting each other's efforts and providing input on practices that are common to all departments to develop the content of the FMPs and ultimately the CIR recommendations," staff said.

With regards to animal control, King and Whitchurch-Stouffville have contracts with Vaughan, which operates an animal shelter.

Future issues that the N6 will tackle include software procurement, emergency management planning, animal control, and climate change planning.

"The CAOs continue to believe that we have developed a positive brand that recognizes the benefit of collaboration and partnership without compromising our individual identities," staff reported. "Collectively we represent a population of 350,000 people. We believe that speaking together on issues of common concern strengthens our individual messages."








One woman's journey after hearing the answer to her prayers

It was 2001 when Carol-Ann Chapman wept at her kitchen sink, dealing with the complications and uncertainties in her life. She was motivated to make a difference in the world, and languished at the thought of wasting her potential.

She'd just enrolled at the University of Waterloo, but her family was shocked by the news that her young daughter was diagnosed with juvenile diabetes.

For Chapman, putting her family first meant putting her academic pursuits on the backburner. She was searching for a sign.

"I was feeling very lost and like there was something more but I didn't know what it was," said Chapman, the minster at the Nobleton United Church. "I always knew there was something more, that I wasn't reaching my potential."

She prayed, "God, what is it you want me to do?"

In a flash, she saw a vision of all the clergy she'd had relationships with, all the ministers in her life.

Growing up an Anglican in Orangeville, with her adoptive parents, the church has always been a part of her life. Even at age 8, Chapman told her mom she'd like to be a nun.

"My mom looked at me and said, you know, they're ordaining women in the Anglican Church," she recalls. "That was the first seed planted that said it was possible."

As a teenager she taught Sunday school, or led youth groups, and provided pastoral care, which inspired her to earn a diploma from Sheridan College in early childhood education.

But when she prayed for an answer,

she was unprepared for the response. She knew what the visions of those ministers meant – "I knew what the message was, but I was terrified," she said

"I didn't think I was good enough, or had what it takes (to become a minister,)" said Chapman. "I sobbed and sobbed and said, 'No, God, you can't mean me! You must have the wrong person.'"

She wasn't ready to accept what was being asked of her. She needed to feel personal affirmation and overcome her doubts.

After her epiphany, her friends and family began unknowingly presenting subtle pushes, guiding her closer to the church, each like a bread crumb, leading her toward realizing her potential.

Friends and family made passing comments about her becoming an ordained minster, but she'd never said a word about it.

She felt God was trying to tell her something, and she realized God works through other people, and often those you'd never expect.

Chapman discovered that her proficiency as a jack of all trades gave her the ideal tool kit for speaking with, and relating to many different types of people.

In 2010 Chapman returned to school, resuming the degree she began nine years earlier, earning a social development studies degree from Waterloo and social work and child abuse studies diploma from Renison University College.

Her degree was a necessary precursor to achieving a Master in Divinity if she was to pursue the call she felt to ministry, but there was still something

missing. As a member of the Anglican Church, she felt some strong differences between the Anglican practice and her core beliefs.

One of those issues was gay marriage.

"At the time, the Anglican Church was not marrying lesbian and gay couples. I witnessed one couple hurt badly when they were turned away and I never want to turn anyone away," she said.

It was a failed interview for a job in Youth Ministry in a United Church that led her to change church denominations.

"I didn't get the job, but I got something better, I found a denomination that is at the forefront of the inclusion of LGBT people in the church, that is rooted in a belief in God, the life and teachings of Jesus, the work of the Spirit and our calling to 'love, serve others and to seek justice.'"

Rev. Carol-Ann Chapman began ministering at Nobleton United in February 2017, where they consider themselves the little church with a big heart, and pride themselves on practising with "inclusive faith."

"This is the kind of church I'm supposed to be in," noted Chapman. "It's a small, family-orientated church."

"I think Nobleton has a lot to offer, and a lot of potential, and the church has changed a lot," she says. "When this church chose to put inclusive on their logo, I think that said a lot."

But above all, Chapman's ministry at Nobleton United embraces inclusion, and reinforces that everyone is loved. "There are a lot of people out there who don't know that, but if I have one goal, that's it."

Rev. Chapman began serving the Schomberg United Church in February 2017, as well.

Armistice

And French Marshall Ferdinand

Foch, the supreme commander of the Allies during World War I, died in 1929, 11 years after he signed the peace agreement with defeated Germans in the Compiegne Forest in a former dining rail coach turned into an office and attached to his private train. Two years before his passing he'd seen this coach, after having briefly returned to a dining car once again. moved from Paris where refurbished and holding its original November 1918 furniture it had been on public display in the courtyard of the Hotel des Invalides now taken back deep into the historic beech and oak Compiegne Forest in north eastern France to the place it been at the time of the signing. This site chosen to keep the media of the day at a distance and also prevent local citizens from causing any harm to the German delegation.

A happy ending for this iconic rail coach! Not so as 13 years later on June 22, 1940 Adolf Hitler, leader of Nazi Germany, would humiliate the defeated French by forcing their leaders to come to him in this very place and sign documents in this very coach surrendering France to Nazi control.

A short time later Hitler had the coach shipped to Germany and put on public display on the grounds of the

Berlin cathedral. When World War II began to turn against the Nazis and the cathedral was damaged in Allied bombing raids the coach was moved to Crawinkel a 11th AD century a town in Thuringia, a heavily forested state, in central Germany. From there it's said to have been moved to nearby Ohrdruf, an 8th century AD Thuringian town, site of a concentration camp in both world wars and associated with composer Johann Sebastian Bach. Here, according to some veterans of the notorious Protection Squadron (Schutzstaffel commonly called the SS) and some locals, it was destroyed in an Allied bombing raid. But more recent findings have proved it was actually destroyed by dynamite and fire, then remains buried by the SS outside Crawinkel possibly to prevent it from being used again as a peace signing venue with the defeat of the Nazis in 1945. A few fragments of this iconic coach have been discovered and returned to France. These are now on display in a detailed replica coach standing in the Compiegne Forest near the original site of the peace signing on that grey dreary wet dawn of Nov. 11,





took her sermon from the Mark's Gospel which makes dire warning of the destruction of the temple and warns: "When you hear of wars and rumors of wars, do not be alarmed. These things must happen, but the end is still to come. Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be earthquakes in various places, as well as famines ..."

She reminded us that Mark wrote this after the actual destruction of the temple in the Jewish wars in 70AD – so it was written in grieving for the loss of the epicenter of the Jewish faith. Jesus said this was "just the beginning" of the end times, the apocalypse which some still believe predict. "There is suffering. War and tragedy are normal." she said. "But we must not be complacent. We cannot write it off. There will always be catastrophes. But we are never off the hook to care for the needs of others."

Plantains may seem plain but they have, one might claim, a fancy history. Origins of these perennials long familiar to prehistorics are lost in the mists of time. Most likely they are native to the grasslands of central Asia where the harsh climate bred hardiness into them. From here they spread through much of Europe and were probably the first Old World plants to arrive in the Americas brought by European colonists on purpose for medicinal and culinary reasons or accidentally as stowaways in sacks of grain seed. Plantains reached Australia-New Zealand and South Africa similarly. First Nations people called the most common plantain "white man's footprint" because of how well these foreign plants survived being constantly trampled under foot around early European settlements. This led 18th century botanists to award them the botanical name plantago.

There are some 200 species of plantain but broadleaf or greater plantain is the most common in our area. From its whorl/circle of ground level large (compared to the plant's size) spoon shaped ribbed glossy green leaves grow smooth stems that are generally under 6 in./15 cm tall but can reach 16 in./45 cm in height where it must compete with taller plants. The top half of each stem is covered in inconspicuous more tiny green than yellow wind pollinated flowers with barely visible purple stamens. Each flower will produce tiny seeds, a multiple stemmed large plant may have as many as 20,000 seeds. These seeds may be pounded into flour for baking, a long tedious process to produce enough flour to be of any use.
