Council's inaugural is set for Dec. 3rd

With regal pride, the 2018-2022 King council will be sworn into office at a special meeting Dec. 3.

The inaugural council meeting begins at 7 p.m. in the new chambers of the municipal office at 2585 King Road.

Councillors and staff will be led into the chambers by piper Rory MacKinnon and the King Fire & Emergency Services Honour Guard.

Adam Miceli and Andrew Chiapetta will lead in the singing of the national anthem, followed by the declarations of office.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini will then be presented with the chain of office. The chain, which the mayor proudly wears at special events, ribbon cuttings, etc. has an interesting history.

The large pendant bears the Township crest, which includes a crown, a wheat sheaf, hills, rivers and a beaver. Medallions on the chain honour the area's pioneers, local villages and King's equestrian heritage.

Rev. Sheilagh Ashworth, of the Anglican Parish of Lloydtown, will offer the prayer of invocation.

The mayor and councillors will make their inaugural addresses, followed by an official ribbon cutting for the municipal centre.

A reception follows in the gymnasium, and entertainment will be provided by "The Brew" from Emily Carr Secondary School.

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



Council votes to purchase iconic statue for municipal centre

The work of a King metal artist will welcome visitors to the new municipal centre.

Councillors voted to withdraw \$40,000 from the pool of funds from the annual mayor's golf tournament to purchase "Steel Gorgeous," a life-size iron horse sculpture created by Kendall McCulloch.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini made the motion, supported by councillors recently. The mayor noted the Township has been interested in the sculpture for several years now, but the original asking price was too high. Negotiations with McCulloch arrived at the \$40,000 price tag.

The mayor loves this one-of-a-kind piece and Councillor Debbie Schaefer said she's delighted it will adorn the new complex.

"Steel Gorgeous" drew international attention when it became the welcoming centrepiece at the Caledon Equestrian Park for the 2015 Pan/Parapan Am Games. McCulloch and his creation have travelled extensively across Ontario ever since.

"It's a good place to have it," McCulloch noted when he heard the news his sculpture has found a new home. While he's sad to see it go, he's happy that others will have a chance to see it on a regular basis.

The steel horse will rust if left to the elements and McCulloch said he's always kept it inside. He hopes it will sit inside the building, but did note that some steel sculptures take on an interesting new look when left outdoors.

McCulloch spent two years creating this showpiece that speaks to King's equine ties.

The self-taught artist took on the challenging task as a personal project.

Thousands of hours and feet of steel rebar (reinforcing bar) went into the life-size horse sculpture, which stands 16.2 hands high – on its stand, it's just under eight feet to the tips of the ears. The majestic beast weighs in at an estimated 3,000 pounds.

Every piece of rebar was formed and bent by hand. Normally, a sculpture of this size would use tin over a skeleton

Impaired driving continues to rise

As we enter the festive season, York Regional Police are concerned about the levels of impaired driving.

The community has experienced far too many tragic incidents as a result of impaired driving and despite the loss of so many lives, drivers still continue to put innocent people at risk

"I find it so frustrating that despite our many efforts to educate drivers on the dangers of impaired driving, in addition to our highly-publicized enforcement efforts, people continue to drive while impaired," said Chief Eric Jolliffe. "Every day and night, innocent lives are put at risk when people who have consumed alcohol or used drugs choose to get behind the wheel of a vehicle. This can no longer be tolerated. We all must take responsibility to prevent the loss of life on our roads due to impaired driving."

The number of impaired-related criminal driving charges continues to rise. So far in 2018, officers have laid more than 1,200 charges. Sadly, five people have lost their lives this year in collisions where alcohol or drug impairment were contributing factors

York Regional Police continues to be concerned that the number of offences where drivers are found to be impaired by cannabis will increase. Impaired driving remains the number one criminal cause of death in Canada and according to MADD Canada, every day, on average, up to four Canadians are killed in alcohol and/or drug-related motor vehicle collisions and hundreds more are injured.

While alcohol continues to be the intoxicant in the majority of incidents of impaired driving, since the legalization of cannabis on Oct. 17, there have been 10 charges laid of impaired by drug. York Regional Police continues to be concerned that the number of offenses where drivers are found to be impaired by cannabis will

of sorts. For McCulloch, once he began the meticulous process of laying the rebar, he just kept going, continuing those natural, flowing lines that emerged. The half-inch rebar was laid tight, held together by solid and random welds.


The result is an accurate reproduction of a real animal. McCulloch took thousands of photographs and took measurements of real specimens to get the dimensions just right.

The horse caught the attention of the Town of Caledon, host to equestrian competitions during the Pan Am Games. Their parks and recreation staff fell in love with the piece and Kendall committed to lending it to them for several events prior to the 2015 Games.

He's quite modest and is really pleased that people find his creation beautiful and an accurate depiction of this animal.

This is his baby, something he's grown quite fond of over the years.





This past week the Minister of Finance, Bill Morneau, delivered his Fall Economic Statement. Thanks to the hard work of Canadians, the economy is strong and growing, and middle class Canadian families have more money in their pockets to spend and invest.

In the last three years, Canadians have created more than 550,000 new fulltime jobs, pushing the unemployment rate to a 40-year low, and our economic growth is the strongest of all the G7 nations, at 3%. We are also introducing the new "Accelerated Investment Incentive" to support investment by businesses of all sizes and across all sectors of the economy. These changes will make it more attractive to invest in technologies that will help us achieve our climate goals. drive business growth and secure jobs for middle class Canadians.

To ensure that Canada makes the most of every opportunity to attract global investment and the jobs that come with it, we have announced the creation of a new institution - the Invest in Canada Hub – whose job it will be to go out and sell Canada to the world and attract investment in strategic markets.





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Canadensys awarded government contract for lunar rover

Canadensys Aerospace Corporation has been awarded an \$800,000 contract from the Canadian Space Agency (CSA).

The Bolton-based organization was presented with the funds to develop a new lunar rover concept.

"This follows a sequence of activities and contracts we've done for the federal government in this general area of lunar surface mobility. To put it in context, Canada participates with a number of international partners in space exploration. Most known about that is the International Space Station. We have a very visible role there," said Christian Sallaberger, president and CEO of Canadensys Aerospace Corpo-

"The international partners are looking at what could be the next big international program after the space station and they've come up with something called the deep space Gateway. The Gateway is really kind of a mini space station that will orbit around the moon and we'll have up to four astronauts at a time visiting it."

Canadensys is a space systems and services company with a focus on accessible space. They were founded on heritage and expertise that spans over a number of Canada's space achievements of the last three decades. King resident Jim Middleton is part of the corporate team.

The Gateway will house a power and propulsion bus, habitat module and a small logistics module for rovers and other robots, according to a National Aeronautics and Space Administration


(NASA) news release. The International Space Station partners are USA, Europe, Russia, Japan and Canada. It is possible that other new partners might also join in the Gateway effort.

Canada is considering involvement in this next phase of space exploration. As part of the Gateway preparatory activities, a lunar rover concept is desired that will employ artificial intelligence. It will test technologies needed for a future pressurized rover capable of transporting astronauts on the moon's surface. Sallaberger said the government posted a request for proposals (RFP) in early summer and Canadensys Aerospace responded to it.

"By space program standards this has been a reasonably fast contractor selection period. Often there's a much longer cycle and proposal evaluation process before one gets to an actual binding contract. This one went reasonably fast," said Sallaberger.

"We're involved in a number of technology development efforts, many of them directly applicable to lunar surface systems and vehicles. In this case, this particular contract is to do the early phase studies of a smaller precursor rover that would support eventual human missions.

"This contract is for what we call phase zero activities, which look at mission planning, the objectives, the user needs and the very high-level concept of what that vehicle will be. It also defines if the mission is feasible, what are the options that should be considered, what will the cost be, what will the schedule be, what are the risks associated with it. We develop and provide all this infor-



mation so the government can make an informed decision on what they would like to do."

Sallaberger said an overall program to build a Canadian lunar rover will take about five to 10 years.

"Probably closer to a 10-year program if it was a human rover that will be used by astronauts to move around the lunar surface and maybe a little bit quicker if it was a robotic vehicle," said Sallaberger.

Canadensys is involved in a variety of activities such as developing robotic lunar rovers for commercial customers and a lunar telescope observatory that will be placed at the south pole of the moon for an international customer.

"As a company, we're quite involved in space exploration, and in particular one of our strengths is the area of lunar exploration. The moon presents a tricky environment because it has many of the dangerous aspects of space such as a high radiation environment, and remoteness, but it is also very challenging because the moon has very dramatic temperature swings," said Sallaberger.

"From day time temperatures, it can drop down to extremely cold temperatures at night – to minus 200 degrees Celsius temperatures or even colder. The systems we design for the moon, if they're to survive a lunar night, have to be able to get really cold and warm up again and have everything continue to work. That's important for the electronics and computers and the brains of the system but also the mechanical pieces because when things get really cold, they shrink and then they expand when they warm up. If they are not carefully designed, things can come apart in that

After designing and building space-

flight hardware, Canadensys performs a variety of tests at their Caledon facility. It houses several test facilities, including a cryogenic thermal chamber that can test space equipment down to extremely cold temperatures. They can do vacuum testing and accelerated lunar lifetime testing there. They also make use of advanced test facilities across Canada and have an agreement with NASA to do some testing of Canadensys spaceflight hardware

"We have certainly had a long history in space and that has continued through programs such as our involvement with the space shuttle in partnership with the U.S., and our involvement as a partner in the International Space Station, said Sallaberger.

"I think in terms of importance for our country, space exploration is one of those areas where we have internationally recognized expertise. There are some great spin offs from the Canadian space program in the area of terrestrial technology applications that are improving the lives of all Canadians and indeed of humanity in general. Our space program is a source of national pride and international prestige. Not only is it an economic powerhouse, but it inspires our youth, and fulfills our human need to explore and understand our place in the universe.

"The Government of Canada and the Canadian Space Agency are now doing the studies and technology development, so they can make an informed decision on what role Canada should play in space exploration going forward. Certainty as a company we believe it's the right thing that Canada should be doing and we're very supportive of it."

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Nobleton students help restore habitat at BORC

Grade 4 students of Nobleton Public School participated in habitat restoration at the Burrlington Outdoor Resource Centre (BORC) of York Region District School Board in partnership with the Toronto Region Conservation Authority (TRCA).

TRCA staff also engaged the students as citizen scientists to collect data for their Young Tree and Shrub Monitoring and Maintenance Program. Students worked in teams to take standard measurements of the trees they had planted and recorded the information for a database.

Karen Fullbrook and Rachel Knight, outdoor educators at BORC, plan to continue working with TRCA staff to monitor the success of the trees and involve other student visitors in the future. They also appreciated the cooperation of the staff at Nobleton PS to help organize this special learning opportunity.

The habitat restoration work was carried out in response to disturbance



caused by the 2016-17 construction of a natural gas pipeline through the property and surrounding area. By planting native trees and shrubs, the habitat is improved and will provide food and shelter for local wildlife when it matures.

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


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Borcsok wins at Royal Winter Fair



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A SCHOOL for BOYS

Gender identity is constructed from societal perceptions of what it means to be a boy or girl, and these stereotypes manifest themselves in the daily behaviour of children. To best serve boys, educators must understand their common behaviour as a reflection of the backdrop of societal perceptions of masculinity. It also works to combat these stereotypes so that boys can be the full expression of themselves.

To that end, we are able to tap into a rich, longstanding culture in which boys are able to explore, in safety, the breadth of the human condition, and their unique place within it. In this school culture, artistry and creativity are not labelled as 'feminine;' but rather as human.

Eloquence, both written and spoken, is expected. Self-reflection and the quest for meaning is built into the fabric of the daily routine, whether through Chapel or our Advisory program.

But there is more to it than that. Boys carry a natural wariness for things that are not genuine, and become bored easily when the activity at hand does little to forward their own sense of meaning. To that end, our teachers create an authentic curriculum; help boys find purpose in life; train them to care for themselves and others; and endow them with a sense of personal commitment and integrity. These goals become more realizable in a culture that presupposes one can be much more than what can be offered by the limiting stereotypes of masculinity. <

Thomas Foulds also found the back of the net for the Cougars.


The pair of points in Friday's victory was a welcomed turn of events for the Cougars, as Huntsville had bested Schomberg in their two previous meetings this season.

The event drew more than 300 collegiate runners from across the country. It was great to mingle and get to know some of the runners from different


"Although we are all unique we had the common of being united by the run," said Seneca competitor Aidan D'Souza.


Statistics Canada issues a challenge for cannabis data

How long will health professionals, law enforcement agencies, policy makers, researchers, the media and Canadians have to wait to get accurate and timely information on the effects of this change?

That's up to Canadians, says Statistics Canada. The national statistical agency is issuing a challenge. If enough Canadians report their purchases on the StatsCannabis website, Canadians will be able to track in real time the changes in social and economic behaviour related to the legalization of cannabis.

If enough data is submitted, Statistics Canada will be able to measure such things as the difference between the illegal and legal price, the reason why some people choose to purchase illegal cannabis and the number of new consumers. Statistics Canada has created the StatsCannabis crowdsourcing platform for people to post their information.

Since the government tabled legislation in April to legalize cannabis, Statistics Canada has been updating the national statistical infrastructure to capture and record the economic and social activities associated with the production and use of cannabis.



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> **Armistice Footnote** By John Arnott

Annie Butler-Smith, in her long

sleeved white blouse and ankle-length black skirt, was at her usual place that Sunday morning in North Sydney on Cape Breton Island in Nova Scotia when the telegraph began giving out a secret coded message coming straight out of the War Office in London England. Expertly using her well worn key she could hardly believe the message it was tapping out – the war in distant Europe was over. A high ranking German delegation would sign surrender documents the next day in a rail coach dining car turned into an office for Marshal Ferdinand Foch the Supreme Commander of Allied Forces on his private train stationed deep in the historic Compiegne Forest in Picardy about 40 miles/60 km north east of Paris.

In 1913, the office Western Union had established in North Sydney was the busiest of all its 600 offices worldwide dealing with some 30,000 messages a day. In December the following year with war now raging in Europe the agency opened a new building on nearby Court St., employing between 325 and 375 people and saw the messages double then triple as from Europe and all Western Union telegraphs coming to North America came first through the office in the Nova Scotia town from where they were forwarded on.

Now there had never been a known leak from that office until this day but such good news wasn't to remain secret for long. It soon spread through the office then spilled out into the street. And before long the town was in celebration mode.

Some 300 U.S. personnel were stationed nearby and they, joined by Canadian personnel, staged an impromptu victory parade through the downtown streets to the ringing of church bells. much cheering, flag waving and applause. Bars normally closed on a Sunday opened but had to close early because ale and spirits fast ran out. Bonfires and street dancing carried on well into the night. "So by the time the rest of North America learned about the Armistice" as Richard Rose, chair of the 2018 100th anniversary commemoration committee put it, "North Sydney was nursing a giant hangover."

This past Nov. 10, the town, with Rose and his committee having done much of the research, planning and detail including authentic period dress marked the exact time 100 years ago, this historic Morse code message was received giving North Sydney its unique place in World War 1 history.

The very key used by telegrapher Annie Butler-Smith to receive that message and on permanent display in the North Sydney Historical Museum was used to receive a replica of this same message exactly a century later.

Unfortunately wet windy weather forced much of celebration re-enactment to be held indoors. But watched and appreciated by an enthusiastic turn out of townspeople and visitors.

I am indebted to CBC's Cape Breton reporter Yvonne Le Blanc-Smith for much of the information in this article.

While the First World War may have seemed a great distance away to North Sydney residents the horror of the Second World War struck close to home when on the evening of Oct. 13, 1942 the passenger ferry SS Caribou left North Sydney harbour bound for nearby Port aux Basques, Newfoundland with 237 people on board and at 3:40 a.m. the next morning was torpedoed and sunk by a Nazi U-boat lurking in the Gulf of St. Lawrence with the loss of 136 lives.



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
