

## Mackenzie hospital facilities will be on cutting edge

mount to meet the health care needs of York residents, the new Mackenzie Health facility in Vaughan is on track. In less than 600 days, the new hospital will open its doors, and stand ready to serve King residents.

Altaf Stationwala, president and CEO of Mackenzie Health, provided an update to King councillors recently.

It will be a "pivotal point" when the facility becomes a two-hospital model, which will serve all of King, Vaughan and Richmond Hill with services split between the new Mackenzie Vaughan Hospital and the Mackenzie Richmond Hill Hospital.

Stationwala pointed out Mackenzie Health has the 7th highest emergency department volumes in Ontario, and they continue to see an increase in emergency volumes. Over 2017-18, an estimated 124,000 patients came through the ED urgent care centre. That's equivalent to almost 350 per day. They stand at roughly 103% over capacity.

Officials have come up with a creative interim solution, the Reactivation Care Centre (RCC). Stationwala explained multiple units were opened up in late 2017 in the RCC in Humber River Hospital's former location. It's a collaboration between Central LHIN hospitals to care for patients who no longer need acute care. The RCC ensures that patients being cared for in acute care settings have access to specialized, focused care and attention, aimed at increasing their mobility and independence.

"The model is working incredibly well," Stationwala said. "Patients love it."

The two-hospital "ultimate solu-While the pressure continues to tion" will not only benefit residents, but it will attract the best medical talent. By combining the bed capacities at both Mackenzie Richmond Hill and Mackenzie Vaughan, it creates a "critical mass" and they can create many more sub-specialities, given their volumes.

> The new Mackenzie Vaughan site will be Canada's first "smart hospital," and the Richmond Hill facility will also be enhanced. They're working on digital pathology, lab automation improvements in the diagnostic lab. to make way for new. state-of-theart automated chemistry and hematology systems.

Stationwala stressed with these "smart" innovations in place, patients can get consults from specialists anywhere in the world.

The Vaughan site, located directly across from Wonderland, is 70% complete. They have already secured 60% of the equipment, fixtures and furniture.

Stationwala said they will soon begin the "enormous exercise" of recruiting some 2.000 staff. They will hire 100 new physicians and the facilities will enjoy the help of some 700 volunteers.

The hospital has come to fruition, thanks to many layers of funding. The total cost is pegged at \$1.6 billion and the Province is pitching in \$1.3 billion. York Region has pledged \$50 million and \$250 million will come from Mackenzie's "Exceptional Care Belongs Here" campaign, with \$120 million raised so far. Stationwala pointed out this is the largest fundraising driver ever led by a community hospital in Canada.







# Much to consider in the SNC Lavalin case

So much has been written about SNC Lavalin.

Please do not let the latest events distract you from the true and vitally important principles which arise from the first causes in this matter.

Please do not tire and turn away from what is vital to protect and uphold.

The government of Canada should not be allowed to "turn the page" and "move forward" until it has also returned to our Canadian principles of fairness, justice and the foundational rule of law.

Let:s consider the first causes.

The Director of Public Prosecutions determined that the corruption, bribery and fraud charges (2001-2011) against SNC Lavalin would proceed to criminal trial.

The former Attorney General reviewed and supported the Directors decision to proceed to trial.

The government was advised of the decision.

It should be acknowledged that throughout the progress of any case, prosecutors will evaluate and reassess. They should be free to do so without government pressure, interference or advice.

The Canadian government sought to set aside the decision of the Director of

Public Prosecutions to proceed with an open, criminal court trial to determine the guilt or innocence of SNC Lavalin.

The Canadian government sought to replace a judicial decision with a political decision, in a criminal matter.

It all went wrong when the government made repeated pleas to the former Attorney General and others, to reconsider the Director's decision to proceed to trial and instead use the "DPA tool."

By their efforts, the government has wrongfully impinged on judicial independence.

The Canadian government sought and appears to continue to seek to enter into a "deferred prosecution agreement DPA" (unlikely to be an open process) with SNC Lavalin rather than hearing the evidence and the charges in open court.

The former Attorney General resisted the governments attempts and made clear that the forceful suggestions they were advancing were not appropriate.

These four facts/actions are at the base of the SNC Lavalin issue.

These actions raise many concerns about important, foundational, democratic and legal principles which have not been upheld.

Judicial/Prosecutorial independence - The Canadian government repeatedly sought to set aside/replace the Public Prosecutor's decision.

Independence of the Attorney General - The Canadian government repeatedly sought to pressure the AG to oppose/overturn the Public Prosecutors decision to proceed to trial on the criminal charges.

The Shawcross Doctrine has been referenced with respect to this concern. Justice Rosenberg summarized the principles of Sir Hartley Shawcross as follows:

"First, the Attorney General must take into account all relevant facts, including the effect of a successful or unsuccessful prosecution on public morale and order - we would probably now call this the public interest. Second, the Attorney General is not obliged to consult with cabinet colleagues but is entitled to do so. Third, any assistance from cabinet colleagues is confined to giving advice not directions" (must not consist of telling him/her what the decision ought to be). "Fourth, responsibility for the decision is that of the Attorney General alone; the government is not to put pressure on him or her. Fifth, the Attorney General cannot shift respon-

sibility for the decision to the Cabinet." These principles are long established and followed across Canada.

Many present and former Attorneys General, across Canada have written to express their objection to the unwarranted, improper pressure exerted by the government on the Former Attorney General.

Criminal Code requirements and considerations for "Deferred Prosecution Agreement" (DPAs) (Section 715).

The Canadian government wants SNC Lavalin to be invited to enter into a DPA even though this is a decision to be made by the Director of Public Prosecutions, (not government) and the directors decision to go to trial, was/is supported by the former Attorney General.

Several necessary conditions/ criteria for a DPA, as set forth in section 715 of the Criminal Code, are not met by SNC.

SNC Lavalin petitioned the Federal Court of Canada to review/overturn the Director of Public Prosecutions decision. The Federal Court Justice dismissed SNC Lavalin's request and made reference to a 2002 Supreme Court ruling.

#### What to Teach your Children About Bicycle Safety

Most Canadian children age six to 16 ride bicycles. Children start cycling as play when they are very young. As they grow older and become more experienced, the transition from toy to transportation is made. With increasing independence, parents have less control of where the bicycle is ridden and how it is used. The attitudes you, as a parent, instill in your children from a young age will determine how they will ride for years to come

#### Starting out

Make sure your child's bike and helmet are the right size. He or she should be able to straddle the bike with both feet on the ground; a bike that is too big or too small is a safety hazard. Bikes that are equipped with multiple speeds are not a good idea because small hands often cannot make the handbrakes work. Buy a bike with a coaster brake. As a minimum, your child's first bike should be equipped with a bell and reflectors.

When choosing a helmet, your child should try on several helmets carefully. Level the helmet over your child's forehead and adjust the chin strap to fit snugly and comfortably. It should protect the forehead without slipping forward or backward; and it should not move unless the scalp moves. A trained salesperson will help you ensure the fit is right.

## Waste Collection Safety

Residents should place their waste and recycling (and unwanted items for Curbside Giveaway Days) for collection at the end of their driveway only. Please do not place collection across the road. 

It stated "the quasi-judicial function of the Attorney General can not be subjected to interference from parties who are not as competent to consider various factors involved in making a decision to prosecute. To subject such decisions to political interference, or to judicial supervision, could erode the integrity of our system of prosecution."

Note, the office and Director of Public Prosecutions was created in 2006. This Supreme Court ruling also applies to the Director of Public Prosecutions who has the authority and responsibility to make the decision.


Integrity and an independent, principled application of the rule(s) of law, exercised by those with the required competencies to do so, must be the basis of our country's application of justice.





## Guelph recording studio offers complete services

"I like being in a recording studio. I like watching a song go from the simplicity of the original music."

Grace has a lot of company these days.

Thanks to technology and an amazing crop of talented technicians, almost anyone can create a quality recording in a matter of hours.

The newly opened Royal City Studios in Guelph is a one-stop enclave of art and artistry. Owner Jim Duffield wants it to become a focal point for new and experienced artists, sharing, recording, performing and establishing a



far-reaching network.

Duffield, a musician since his high school days, opted for a professional career and is currently an IT project manager. But music was always in his blood and Royal City Studios is his way of getting back into music and making a meaningful contribution. His current passion is jazz from the 1920s through '50s.

The facility is tailor-made to all musicians and Duffield has made the rental rates affordable. Basically, anyone can come in, rent a studio to rehearse in or to create a quality recording for a song or entire album. Rates are as low as \$5 per hour, per person to rehearse. The building also features a hall for music release parties, receptions and performances. He hopes to hold his first summer camp programs this year in partnership with Kat Studios.

There are seven rehearsal studios in addition to the recording studio, and each one is physically separated from another with double walls, double doors and materials to minimize sound transfer and vibration.

So far, Royal City Studios has welcomed a huge eclectic mix – teachers, individuals and groups. The genres are as varied as the artists themselves and he's seen everything from folk and Celtic to metal and pop.

Duffield said when he put the call out for staff, he was bombarded with resumes from very talented engineers and mixers. He picked the best of the crop. Staff at the studio actually care about the performers and not only offer extremely skilled support, but encouragement, guidance and constructive





solutions.

In one recent studio session, engineer Tobin Stewart guided a high school teen in making his first recording for a college submission. Tobin has an amazing ear for music and he carries out the incredibly meticulous recording work with ease and patience. Each second counts and Tobin says he sometimes has to be a "superhuman" when recording and piecing together sections on the latest computer-assisted audio program.

Frank Jannetta, who provides mixing and mastering, takes something "dirty" and makes it sparkle, like that proverbial diamond in the rough. He tweaks the music so it's "perfect."

You quickly feel at ease, and put your full faith in these miracle workers. The end result? Smiles all around, not just from the musicians, but the staff, too.

The in-house engineers work on a CityStudios.ca

contract basis, so musicians and groups can choose who they want to work with. This improves consistency and everyone's comfort level.

At Royal City Studios, there's space to enjoy coffee and just hang out with other musicians. Spare parts and supplies are also available on-site so it doesn't put a hold on recording.

"I want to enable the music community," Duffield said. He wants Royal City Studios to become part of the community and bring music-lovers together. It's about building relationships and sharing in the industry. It's also about hard work.

Duffield's goal is to expand concept of Royal City Studios across southern Ontario, and would entertain any ideas from potential investors.

**Councillor Debbie Schaefer supports** the group's efforts, noting they'd like to focus on programming.

Council decided to provide the group with \$1,000 in funding this year and will offer some guidance in applying for other grants in the future.

Schaefer, a strong supporter of Community & Home Assistance to Seniors (CHATS), asked that the group receive the full amount they asked for. With little hesitation, the mayor recommended group receive \$2,000 this year.

Some groups were denied funding and staff pointed out the panel believed other options exist for these groups.



## York9 FC falls to Hamilton in CPL home opener

The newly-stated fans of York9 FC will have to wait a little longer for their team's first Canadian Premier League win.

The York Region squad hosted a touch over 4,000 spectators on Saturday at York Lions Stadium for their first CPL match at their home club, falling 2-0 to Hamilton's Forge FC after a lengthy weather delay.

"It's our home opener, but it's funny that it's coming so many weeks down from the beginning of the season," said head coach Jim Brennan. "We found it difficult as well, being on the road – Forge, we had their home opener, then Cavalry, we had their home opener, and it's been difficult for us. But we grinded through it, had a couple draws on the road, which is fine

A massive 22 shots combined by the two squads failed to find the back of the net in the opening half, before Hamilton buried twice in the second half to take back-to-back wins over the York side.

"We felt, just before that delay, we had them on the ropes, had plenty of chances, lots of opportunities, we felt it was coming," said Brennan following the match. "That delay took the wind out of our sails. The second half, our momentum kept on taking us forward, had some good possession, plenty of shots today -20-something shots -justwe couldn't find the back of the net.

"They break on the counter and they score on us. That's the way the game goes. So we're frustrated, the way it came about. We felt we were the better team today."

After a quick counter attack put the home team down by one at the 70th minute, it was just eight minutes later that Hamilton was able to put the game away for good.

"You keep learning as you go along," said Brennan. "If we take away the two goals, we look at our performance overall, we think: we're alright, we're on the right track here."

The club issued a statement on Monday about the weather delay, offering tickets to a future home game and stating "our fans, supporters and partners are of the utmost importance to us and we will continue to strive to offer the best match-day experience at our next home game."

Yet the most diehard supporters have already received a glimpse of a successful future for the squad: the team's first-ever win actually came last Wednesday in non-CPL competition, where they defeated AS Blainsville out of Quebec 1-0 to advance to the next round of the Canadian Championship.

#### Horticulture **By John Arnott**

Among the earliest and easiest spring flowering perennials are scilla, a genus made up of some 70 species of small bulb rooted plants, mostly blue but with some pink or white members all native to much of Eurasia and most of which bloom in early spring - wild English bluebells which I grow here in my Tecumseth Pines-Tottenham garden are probably the best known.

While I love these bluebells my favourite is scilla are the tiny up to 3 in./8 cm high scilla are really native to southwest Russia into Turkey and not Siberia at all! Like all scilla they are members of the asparagus family and the wider lily family.

These little spring bulbs have tiny sapphire blue cup like flowers each consisting of 6 petals that enclose 6 pollen bearing stamens that top either singularly or in pairs slim delicate looking single stem of each plant. Their slender short sword shaped rich green leaves like all bulb leaves must be left uncut until they die back as they restock the bulb with nutrients necessary for the following year's growth. The plants spread by the seeds and bulblets produced each growing season.

If left, "Siberian" scilla will form carpets of blue - great for the natural garden. They are ideal for planting in lawns as they bloom early and leaves die down by the time the grass needs cutting. My scilla, late this year because of the cold spring weather are at their best as I write.

Scilla like shade but will tolerate some sun (especially very early blooming scilla bifolia-two leaves). Although they are not soil fussy and will do well planted about 3 to 4 in./8 to 10 cm deep in average garden soil their preference is sandy loam.

European colonists introduced scilla sibirica into Canada the U.S.A. Australia-New Zealand and South Africa where they soon escaped over garden walls and have since naturalized happily.


