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Businesses collaborating to beautify Main Street

Typically, a construction site can be an eyesore. While the site's temporary fence may shield pedestrians from much of the activities behind, the long blank expanse can also feel like a message - you are unwelcome here. Not so on Main Street, Schomberg.

Thanks to the generous support of Main Street businesses Raycor Mechanical and Rona, and the volunteer efforts of Main Street artist and Street Gallery organizer Tom Wray, the 55-foot-long temporary fencing for the construction site at 215 Main Street is being transformed into visual art.

Andrea End is a visual artist whose inspiration is the sunlight – its colours and shapes that are created in the forests and on the lakes of the Canadian scenery. In this case, she has drawn inspiration from her love of forests, but also to complement the theme of sunflowers and monarchs on the new Main Street banners.

It may have seemed a little eerie on May 21, when the image was projected onto the hoarding, and ghostlike, Andrea and her daughter Erica traced the outline of the mural onto the hoarding.

Two weeks later, the mural is taking shape, and is transforming the temporary fencing into something beautiful. The Schomberg Street Gallery organizer couldn't be more pleased.

"While the Schomberg Street Gallery has always been set against a backdrop of heritage buildings and century homes, now it will also be set against a backdrop of art itself," Wray said.

This month-long activity is just one component of the Main Street Revitalization project.

ED says Bill 108 is a 'dream list' from developers

New analysis from Environmental Defence shows that Ontario Bill 108, More Homes, More Choice Act, fulfils most of the demands submitted to government by the Ontario Home Builders Association (OHBA) that roll back protection for the environment and enable

The recommendations include weakening the Endangered Species Act, bringing back the Ontario Municipal Board and expanding urban boundaries at the request of developers. The government's catering to the regressive elements of the development industry ignores the needs, concerns and recommendations of citizens, community groups, municipal leaders and planning experts.

"Catering only to requests from the development industry means a bleak future for Ontarians. Bill 108 will mean less community control over planning their towns and cities, threatened forests, streams and wetlands and more gridlock and sprawl. Ontario appears 'open for business' for only a few friends of the government," said Tim Grav. executive director. Environmental Defence.

Some of the key demands from the development industry that are contained in Bill 108 include:

- Repealing Bill 139 and bringing back the OMB. Bill 108 will restore OMB rules which allow override of planning decisions made by democratically elected municipal governments.
- Urban boundary expansions. Bill 108 removes previous restrictions on urban boundary expansions meaning sprawl will again dominate new devel-
- Recalibrate and cap development charges. Bill 108 proposes to amalgamate and cap development charges, depriving municipalities of needed funds for parks, community centres and li-
- Gutting the Endangered Species Act. Bill 108 includes a new mechanism that will allow developers to pay a fee to avoid protecting the habitat of speciesat-risk, and will allow for reduced protection if the species exists somewhere else in the world.
- Limiting the role of Conservation Authorities. Bill 108 will reduce the scope of Conservation Authority activities and allow the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks to decide areas in watersheds that can be developed, which will enable sprawl development in natural areas.

Make sure your child's bike and helmet are the right size. He or she should be able to straddle the bike with both feet on the ground; a bike that is too big or too small is a safety hazard. Bikes that are equipped with multiple speeds are not a good idea because small hands often cannot make the handbrakes work. Buy a bike with a coaster brake. As a minimum, your child's first bike should be equipped with a bell and reflectors.

When choosing a helmet, your child should try on several helmets carefully. Level the helmet over your child's forehead and adjust the chin strap to fit snugly and comfortably. It should protect the forehead without slipping forward or backward; and it should not move unless the scalp moves. A trained salesperson will help you ensure the fit is right.

For young children, set the following hard and fast rules:

- No playing on the road. No riding on busy streets.
- No riding at night.
- Stop for all stop signs. Ride on the right with traffic.
- Make your own decisions

Common dangers

The majority of bicycle injuries do not involve motor vehicles. Most are falls, collisions with stationary objects, and collisions with other bikes or pedestrians result from the bicyclist losing control, and most occur less than five blocks from home, in familiar surroundings.

- Stop at all stop signs regardless of what is happening.
- Scan both directions for traffic. Wait for any cross traffic to clear.
- Proceed when safe.
- Above all, practice what you preach!





Bev Berger, a long-time supporter of the walk, celebrated her 30th year along with her current dog guide, Lotus.



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

King, York support two-tier municipal government

York Regional council passed a resolution supporting the Region's two-tier government structure as the most effective means to deliver critical infrastructure and services to York Region communities and residents.

The move came in response to the Province's ongoing review of regional

"Since 1971, York Regional council has been dedicated to providing responsible, high-quality and cost effective programs and services to the residents of our community," said York Region chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. "In passing this resolution, council endorses York Region's two-tiered municipal government structure as the best model to serve residents now and in the future."

King council, too, voiced their support for the current system.

At their last council meeting, councillors passed a resolution supporting the two-tier system, noting King welcomes all opportunities to improve both regional and local service delivery to achieve greater efficiencies and costs savings. All York municipalities "would receive greater benefit from a review of provincial permitting/approvals and municipal government powers and authority under the Municipal Act.

The current system, King argues, provides for regional services throughout all local municipalities, resulting in "cost-effective, quality services that respond to the needs of the local municipalities and citizens."

accountable services through shared service agreements and partnerships with members of the N6.

On Jan. 15, the Provincial government announced a review of regional governments to ensure they are working efficiently and effectively to provide vital services. The review specifically looks to improve on governance, decision-making and service delivery at the municipal level.

Over the past 48 years, York Regional council has considered the issue of governance on a number of occasions, mostly with respect to council composition and representation by population. Demonstrating a commitment to responsible government, council currently consists of 21 members, increasing by just four members since 1971.

When York was created in 1971, it consolidated 14 former municipalities into nine new municipalities.

King's resolution will be send to all York municipalities as well as AMO, local MPPs and the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing.

At the same time, the Region's population has increased by more than one million people to today's 1.2 million res-

"As York Region's scope of services has expanded, council has demonstrated a relentless commitment to drive efficiencies and remain accountable to residents," added Chairman Emmerson. "By building strong partnerships and working collaboratively with our nine cities and towns and senior levels King has demonstrated its fiscal re- of government, we are able to deliver

sponsibility by delivering direct and our programs and services while finding ways to optimize service delivery and reduce costs."

The Provincial Regional Governance Review included two consultations with elected and appointment council members, municipal and business stakeholders and members of the public who live and work in York Region. The Honourable Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, is

expected to report back to the Provincial Government on consultation findings in fall 2019.

The Regional Municipality of York consists of nine local cities and towns and provides a variety of programs and services to 1.2 million residents and 52,000 businesses with 620,000 employees. More information about the Region's key service areas is available at york.ca/regionalservices

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

NCC wants King residents to report bats

The Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC) is searching for bats. Armed with acoustic devices and echolocation monitors, the national land conservation organization, in partnership with Toronto Zoo's Native Bat Conservation Program, is on a quest to learn more about these furry fliers, and dispel some popular myths at the same time.

Last year, NCC launched an effort, alongside the Toronto Zoo, to monitor bats in King's Happy Valley Forest – one of the key focal areas where the not-for-profit is working to protect important moraine forest habitat. After a successful season of tracking bats using echolocation recorders, the partnership is looking to expand its understanding of the misunderstood nocturnal critters.

This year, NCC is asking residents to keep an eye out and an open mind for the eight species of bats that call Ontario home, most of which face habitat loss, disease and persecution. Throughout the Happy Valley Forest and Pottageville Swamp area, NCC is trying to learn more about Ontario's bats to help us better protect their habitat. And they need residents' help.

Long feared and maligned, bats are actually non-aggressive creatures that are incredibly important to the local ecosystem.

"Bats are important insectivores, meaning that they feed on insects," said Jenna Siu, NCC's coordinator of conservation biology for the Happy Valley Forest. "They help manage the insect population and are in turn food for other species. They are also good indicators of forest health. Without the presence of undisturbed, older-growth forest, bats would disappear."

Locals are being asked to report their bat sightings to NCC by emailing jenna. siu@natureconservancy.ca.

"For too long bats have been shown in a negative light," added Siu. "People fear them because of what pop culture has turned them into something to be feared. But bats are just like any other species. Like the pandas and polar bears we love, bats are just doing what they need to do to survive – finding a safe place to live, feeding and protecting themselves and their young. Who can blame them for that?"

NCC, in partnership with the Regional Municipality of York, is actively looking for potential land acquisitions in the Happy Valley Forest - Pottageville Swamp area. These can be a combination of land donations (which yield significant income tax benefits for donors) and purchases, with a goal to further protect critical habitat for bats and other significant species using this important natural area.

Approximately one in four mammal species in the world is a bat, making them the second largest group of mammals, after rodents.

Contrary to popular belief, bats are not blind and can see quite well. Some spe cies have better vision than we do. Bat (and bird) droppings (guano) generally pose a low risk to human health. If you encounter a large accumulation of droppings, it's best to not disturb it as it could harbour fungi which can be harmful.

Bats are harmless. They avoid human contact at all times and are not aggressive.


Chapple started with a toonie drive at my school, created a fundraising page on their website, and from there she's been doing fundraisers in the community to help raise more money.

"My short-term goal is to raise enough money to be able to build a well in Eswatini, South Africa (formerly Swaziland),



Brothers thank their mother for her unwavering support

Motherhood; no doubt one of the most difficult jobs. Though Mumtaz Syed may agree with that statement. she surely believes motherhood is also one of the most rewarding jobs there is.

Mumtaz came to Canada from India in the 1970s and at the time, never imaged she would be a mother to three sons. Mumtaz and her husband have lived in Schomberg for over 30 vears, raising their children there. The family was quite involved in the community, embracing its tightknit atmosphere. The boys attended Schomberg Public School and worked in the local drug store and the local library. They even volunteered their time at The Manor event venue helping seniors expand their knowledge of computers.

Now, her sons, Dr. Zohair Syed, Dr. Naveed Syed and Dr. Sameer Syed are all working as doctors at Trillium Health Partners.

When asked about her life as a mother, Mumtaz joked: "It's hard work." She went on to say: "I remember some nurse telling me never ask a mother of three boys how she is doing because she is never doing so good, she is always tired."

Doing all she could to ensure her sons had a bright future ahead of them, Mumtaz worked three parttime jobs in childcare while her husband worked as an auto mechanic at the Toronto Transit Commission (TTC). They stressed the importance of education to their children, encouraging them to focus on studying.

"I always said that if they work they're not going to study so we will work, you study," said Mumtaz.

Sameer stated: "When they came to Canada, they came with almost nothing and they built a life here and their whole goal, their whole journey, was for us to make something of ourselves."

"She worked really hard to have us educated and then once we were all in university she went back and did a diploma," Zohair added.

The brothers credit both of their parents for inspiring them to pursue

a career in medicine.

"It wasn't like we made a decision one day we're all going to be doctors," noted Zohair.

Naveed explained: "My mom was in childcare. She did her ECE diploma when she was 56 I think ... She always gave us the angle of trying to care for people and making sure people are happy.

"Our dad was the methodical thinker so he was an auto mechanic he worked for TTC for 33 years. so, I think the combination of the two is actually well suited for medicine ... that caring nature and that analytical nature."

Making their mark on the medical field, two of the Syeds initiated the "primary care hospitalist" model at THP, making them Mississauga's first primary care hospitalists.

"A hospitalist is a physician that is mainly focused on inpatient hospital-based care. In Canada, and even in North American and the rest of the world, it is a relatively new definition of specialty physician," explained Sa-

Hospitalists devote the majority of their time to caring for hospitalized patients instead of splitting their time in an outpatient office setting, allowing for a unique and consistent method of care.

This model of quality patient care is now being practiced at all three of Trillium's sites thanks to the hard work and dedication of the Syeds.

When describing how it felt to be surrounded by her family Mumtaz admitted "I feel complete."

For the recent Mother's Day, each son expressed a loving sentiment for their mother.

"Mom thanks always for everything you have done for us and for being there when we need you," said

"Happy Mother's Day mom, thanks for always having our backs and always taking care of us and making the best food," said Naveed.

And Sameer added, "Everything I am today is because of you."

These warm statements are no doubt a testament to the power of a mother's loving support.


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


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












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Report finds Caledon could save millions if it separates from Peel

A report produced by Ernst and Young revealed changes to Peel Region could save money for municipalities or increase costs over half a billion dol-

The Financial Impact Analysis of Service Delivery report was commissioned at the request of Region of Peel

The firm looked at municipal services such as roads, transportation, public works, police, and water under three governance scenarios. They are the status quo in support of the current two-tier government, amalgamation of one new entity comprised of the Region of Peel, City of Mississauga, City of Brampton and the Town of Caledon and dissolution thereby transferring regional services and responsibilities to the respective three municipalities.

"To me there are two key take-aways from the EY report," said Caledon Mayor Allan Thompson. "First, what we've got right now works well. Second, taxpayers could be on the hook for hundreds of millions if the province changes the status quo."

Brampton City Council was in favour of the current regime, while Mississauga on the other, with a population of over 700,000 people, continues to fight for their own independence, wanting to dissolve all ties from the Region of Peel.

"We have a 40-plus year history of working well together at the Region," said Thompson. "I respect the position of both Brampton and Mississauga; I recognize and applaud Brampton for using an evidence-based approach and for looking at the greater good."

This follows a report by Deloitte, commissioned by the Region of Peel, where it was suggested that leaving the Region would cost Mississauga billions of dollars. Mississauga council disputed the claim.

A steering committee, composed of Chief Administrative Officers (CAOs) and Chief Financial Officers (CFO) of aforementioned municipalities, governed the Ernst and Young analysis. This was done to reflect a reasonable interpretation of the potential impact of alternative service delivery models.

Roughly 10 steering committee meetings were conducted and interviews with about 100 municipal officials were held. The firm states over 1,500 calculations of financial impact were complet-

"Since the Province of Ontario launched the Regional Government Review, my priority has been to represent the interest of Caledon taxpayers, ensure their voice is heard and continue to ensure we deliver the services they need efficiently and effectively," said Mayor Thompson. "Council's position to maintain the status quo reflects a "why fix what isn't broke" approach. We now look to the provincial advisors and the provincial government to consider the findings of this report and make a decision that's best for Caledon."

The current net cost – status quo – of providing services from 2020 to 2028 is \$26.1 billion.

EY states under an amalgamation, costs range from a decrease of about \$100 million to an increase of upwards of \$500 million, according to the report. Similarly, dissolution costs could remain the same as the status quo or they could increase upwards to \$600 million.

There is a risk that the net cost of providing services to all taxpayers in the three municipalities could increase by \$500 million to \$600 million by 2028.

"It's hard to predict but as the report makes clear the potential costs are enormous," said Thompson. "And if costs go up either taxes go up or services are impacted."

The report states a key driver of dissolution costs is the way Peel Region Police (PRP) would be dissolved, and is assessed under multiple options that on its own has a range of decrease of \$1 million to an increase of \$52 million (2022 in 2018).

It should be noted that PRP only serve Mississauga and Brampton. Caledon has a control with the Ontario Provincial Police who patrol all provincial highways and side roads of large.

"The dissolution scenario has differential local tax impacts that result in a potential shift in tax burden as Regional services are transferred," the report states. "On an annualized basis at 2022, the calculated shift for Brampton ranges up to \$45m (\$2018); calculated shift for Caledon is as low as \$53m savings (\$2018); calculated shift for Mississauga ranges as high as \$84m (\$2018)."

Further, Brampton would gain \$7.4 billion in capital assets and \$749 million in debt, Caledon would gain \$2 billion in capital assets and \$71 million in livery models, both at the regional and debt and Mississauga would gain \$8.8 billion in capital assets and \$1.1 billion

"According to the EY report, if all the municipalities were amalgamated the potential costs could be over half a billion dollars," said Thompson. "And for what? Would we get better service? Would tax dollars be better used? I believe the risks far outweigh the potential benefits. That certainly doesn't mean we, under a two-tiered model, can't change. The report highlights some key areas where we can make improvements to our service delocal level. We should focus on those improvements and not on change for change's sake."

"My focus has and will continue to be on protecting the interests of Caledon and its future sustainability."

EY states more work would need to be conducted if the province does agree to alter the region as part of their plan to evaluate the efficiencies of regional governments across Ontario.

The special advisors are also examining Durham, York, Halton, Niagara, Waterloo, Muskoka District and Simcoe County along with Peel.

Proceeds to fund art display at complex

King council agreed to divert \$70,000 from the mayor's annual golf tournament to outfit the new municipal centre with works of art. Mayor Steve Pellegrini made the recommendation recently, to use the money from the proceeds of the golf tournament, meaning no tax dollars will be spent. The tournament profits have always been dedicated to parks, recreation and culture. The event raises between \$50,000 and \$100,000 annually.

The squad will be hoping that first three-point effort comes Wednesday visiting the struggling Edmonton FC.




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Demolition Derby a huge draw


After the second asking and affirmation in the King James Bible, Yeshua says just "Feed My sheep."

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

Horticulture By John Arnott

What with the scarcity of clear skies this cool grey spring the patch of summery sky blue in my garden here in Tecumseth Pines near Tottenham is especially welcome. These little spring gems, possibly because of inclement weather, are late this year but nonetheless a delight to see.

Known as grape hyacinths but in no way related to either grapes or hyacinths, these spring blooming bulbs are native to southeastern Europe and southwestern Asia.

By the time of recorded history they and spread to lands around the Mediterranean Sea from where they made their way into northern Europe adapting readily to heavier soils and a cooler climate. European colonists introduced them into the temperate regions of the Americas and Australia-New Zealand where they soon escaped over the wall and began naturalizing happily.

Botanists call these easy to grow, easy care spring harbingers muscari from the Greek moschos meaning musk scented.

Their common name comes from the fact these small spring flowering plants that grow under 4 in./10 cm high have single stem growing out of each tiny bulb that carries a cluster/column of flowers much like its much larger hyacinth cousin and each floret on this column is like a tiny grape but with an even tinier opening or mouth that holds the pollen bearing stamens. Most of the 42 species of muscari have small narrow bright to darker green which must be left uncut until they start to yellow as they are needed to feed the bulb for

next spring's growth. M. latifolium, a 2 toned blue, has a wide leaf, hence its botanical name, that wraps around the stem bloodroot style.

The most commonly grown grape hyacinth in our area is m. armeniacum, a bright blue native of the Armenian region in the Caucasus Mts. A cultivar of this species named "China Blue" is powder blue in colour. M. aucheri is white. A cultivar of same named "Pink Sunrise" is certainly a disappointment though as it just barely has a hint of pink that goes mostly unnoticed. The most interesting grape hyacinth to me and I've only seen pictures is m. macrocarpum [Latin for big seeds] a native of Turkey and southern Greece which buds in purple that opens to yellow!

This spring beauty should be planted in the fall 4 in./10 cm deep about 3 in./7cm apart in groups of 10 to 20. They prefer a sandy soil but do well in average garden soil that drains well.

Muscari have recently been moved, even though they grow from bulbs, from their original classification in the lily family to the asparagus family!

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
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
