Intersection improvements coming to King

York Region is dedicated to building and monitoring its massive transportation network. And King figures prominently in scheduled upgrades.

King councillors were brought up to speed on current and future work across the region.

Salim Alibhai, director of capital planning and delivery for York Region Transit (YRT), noted traffic delays are plaguing motorists across the GTA. York is addressing the issue by investing a record amount in transit solutions.

This year alone, York will deliver more than 100 road improvement projects and continue to create an integrated road network.

Transportation in York is a large undertaking. There are an estimated 35,000 commuters taking transit daily, translating to 22 million annual trips!

More than 600,000 commuters use regional roads daily and York has to maintain more than 4,200 kilometres of roads.

The region oversees some \$4.1 billion in transportation assets and is working on new roads, intersection improvements, rapid transit initiatives, the Yonge Subway extension, and adding cycling lanes.

In King, improvements are coming to the intersection of Weston Road and King Road. Left turn lanes, grading and culverts will all be installed. The work will begin this summer, and be wrapped up by 2020.

In Nobleton, paving is being done in the core and should be completed by the end of June. Streetscaping is almost done as well, resulting in a revamped, pedestrian friendly core area.





WHY HAS A NEW OFFICIAL PLAN BEEN PREPARED?

The Planning Act, requires that municipalities to revise their Official Plans no less frequently than 10 years for a new official plan and every five years for an update to an official plan. King Township's Parent Official Plan (1970) was approved in 1970, and has since been amended over 80 times. A new Official Plan is required to address the Township's long-term planning requirements to the year 2031 and bring the Township into conformity with recent Provincial and upper-tier land-use policy direction. A new Official Plan will also carry forward recent Township initiatives including the Integrated Community Sustainability Plan, Parks Recreation and Culture Master Plan, Economic Development Strategy, Transportation Master Plan, Water/ Wastewater/Stormwater Master Plan.

Reward offered following Kingscross home invasion

A Kingscross man is offering a reward for a sentimental item, following a home invasion and robbery over the weekend.

The resident (who wishes to remain anonymous) said both he and his wife were home asleep when the culprits entered and began ransacking the home, in the early morning hours this past Saturday.

The resident was startled awake when he heard the three young men talking. Without hesitating, he sprung from his bed and gave chase. The culprits were similarly surprised to see him and quickly took off, jumping from landing to landing, and running out the door.

The homeowner called 9-1-1 and submitted the details to police, including surveillance video.

He said they made off with cash, shoes and articles of clothing. In their

hasty retreat they dropped other items of value. The resident is offering a \$500 reward for a special pair of shoes that have sentimental value.

"It was crazy, really terrible," he said. He stressed he wants them caught so they don't try this again, and they escalate their criminal acts.

"I want them caught so they can't do it again," he said.

The incident has shaken the community and Kingscross residents are considering hiring a security firm to patrol the neighbourhood.

The resident noted his home has been under construction for some time, and it's just being finished. The alarm system is due to be installed this week.

YRP launches security camera registry

York Regional Police is asking residents and business owners in our community to partner with police in community safety by signing up for the new Security Camera Registry.

The new Security Camera Registry gives members of the community the option to inform York Regional Police they have installed residential or commercial security cameras, which may assist police if a crime later occurs in that area.

When police investigate a crime, officers often canvass neighbourhoods or plazas for security cameras that may have captured images of suspects or criminal activity. This is a lengthy process requiring exorbitant amounts of time and resources.

The new registry expedites these investigations by helping officers identify and locate cameras before they canvass an area on foot. In an investigation where every second counts, this proactive step could be crucial in helping to solve a case, make an arrest, recover property, or even save a life.

Helpful details for police include camera locations, direction, video retention and the capability of sharing footage.

With just a couple of clicks, you can make your neighbourhood a safer place. Participants can visit and complete the brief online registration form to add their cameras to the registry. Upon completing the form, participants will also be asked to verify their email address in order to complete the registration:

The registry was developed in partnership with members of the Integrated Strategic Community Advisory Council (ISCAC), a civilian advisory group partnering with police to improve community safety and promote partnership between York Regional Police and the region it serves.

"Community members must be active partners alongside their police service to ensure York Region remains the safest place in Canada to live, work and play," said ISCAC Chair Dr. Aubrey Zidenberg.



Lavalin issue fraught with 'heated rhetoric'

Over the past few months, some residents of King-Vaughan have reached out to me to express their views relating to SNC-Lavalin and the treatment of the former Attorney General, Jody Wilson-Raybould. I greatly appreciated these opportunities to connect, share facts and opinions – it helped to broaden my appreciation of the issue. It also demonstrates a level of engagement which I believe is a positive sign for our democracy.

There has been a lot of heated rhetoric on this issue, especially during Question Period in the House of Commons, full of conflict and allegations, indignation and condemnation, which often paints the situation as black and white. When considering this issue, it is important to consider the facts.

To start, a Deferred Prosecution Agreement (DPA) is not a "Get-Out-of-Jail-Free" card. Rather, it is a negotiated agreement that holds the offending company accountable while helping to protect innocent parties such as employees and pensioners in the case of a criminal conviction. Whether SNC-Lavalin merited a DPA or not, a DPA by itself is far from untoward. Indeed, DPAs are a valuable new tool in our justice system, which brings us in line with other countries including the United States, the United Kingdom, France, and Australia.

Was it wrong for officials to have conversations with the former Attorney General about the possible impact of a criminal prosecution of SNC-Lavalin on Canadian workers? I think it is the government's job to consider all factors on something that could affect Canadians and their families. I understand that this potentially could have been Canada's very first use of a DPA, and that officials naturally would want to ensure that this option was thoroughly considered. However, this was ultimately the AG's decision alone - something that the Prime Minister conveyed directly to the former AG.

On the question of Jody Wilson-Ray-bould feeling pressure – I've listened to her testimony, and that of the Clerk of the Privy Council's, and others, and it is clear from her testimony that she felt pressured, however, political life is rife with pressure. It is the responsibility of those in public service to receive advice, often under pressure, and then decide what is in the best interests of Canadians.

Why were Ms. Wilson-Raybould and Dr. Philpott removed from the Liberal caucus? While it's natural for members of every political party caucus to have differing opinions on a wide range of issues, trust is essential within any team. Within caucus, we discuss our opinions openly, knowing we can air our disagreements without ramification and without our views leaving the room. Through their actions, however, both Ms. Wilson-Raybould and Dr. Philpott eroded the necessary trust between caucus colleagues. Caucus colleagues no longer felt they could speak freely in caucus and have their confidence respected.

It is clear that mistakes were made, however, at the root of the issue were legitimate differences of opinion based on wanting the best for Canadians and not to undermine the independence of our institutions. The Prime Minister has asked the Hon. Anne McLellan, a former Justice Minister, to review the role of the AG and Justice Minister to see what improvements can be made. The Prime Minister himself has said that he regrets the erosion of trust that occurred and has learned a lot about how we can do better.

While this situation occupied a substantial amount of time in Question Period, and dominated the press for weeks, our government remained focused on continuing to advance a progressive legislative agenda, addressed important issues confronting the country, and worked to make life better for Canadians. This is what the residents of King-Vaughan would expect, and like the government I continue to focus on delivering results for our community.



Transportation also consumes 28% of the regional budget, with the \$314 million being shared between YRT and roads.

YRT operates at total of 677 vehicles on bus routes, TTC routes, Viva and more. Adrian Kawum, transit manager for YRT, said local bus routes will be increased and they're also reviewing the on-demand services. A new branch line on Route 88 will connect to Newmarket, and will be in place next year.

Kawum noted the Region is looking at putting electric buses in service and they hope to have six operating by year's end, or early in the new year. It will be on a pilot basis and their performance and dependability will be evaluated.


He noted York is always looking at strengthening their ties and partnerships with member municipalities.



York resolution supports two-tier government

York Regional council passed a resolution supporting the Region's two-tier government structure as the most effective means to deliver critical infrastructure and services to York Region communities and residents.

The move came in response to the Province's ongoing review of regional government.

"Since 1971, York Regional council has been dedicated to providing responsible, high-quality and cost effective programs and services to the residents of our community," said York Region chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. "In passing this resolution, council endorses York Region's two-tiered municipal government structure as the best model to serve residents now and in the future."

King council, too, voiced their support for the current system.

At their last council meeting, councillors passed a resolution supporting

the two-tier system, noting King welcomes all opportunities to improve both regional and local service delivery to achieve greater efficiencies and costs savings. All York municipalities "would receive greater benefit from a review of provincial permitting/approvals and municipal government powers and authority under the Municipal Act.

The current system, King argues, provides for regional services throughout all local municipalities, resulting in "cost-effective, quality services that respond to the needs of the local municipalities and citizens."

King has demonstrated its fiscal responsibility by delivering direct and accountable services through shared service agreements and partnerships with members of the N6.

On Jan. 15, the Provincial government announced a review of regional governments to ensure they are working efficiently and effectively to provide vital services. The review specifically

looks to improve on governance, decision-making and service delivery at the municipal level.

Over the past 48 years, York Regional council has considered the issue of governance on a number of occasions, mostly with respect to council composition and representation by population. Demonstrating a commitment to responsible government, council currently consists of 21 members, increasing by just four members since 1971.

When York was created in 1971, it consolidated 14 former municipalities into nine new municipalities.

King's resolution will be send to all York municipalities as well as AMO, local MPPs and the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing.

At the same time, the Region's population has increased by more than one million people to today's 1.2 million residents.

"As York Region's scope of services has expanded, council has demonstrated a relentless commitment to drive efficiencies and remain accountable to

residents," added Chairman Emmerson. "By building strong partnerships and working collaboratively with our nine cities and towns and senior levels of government, we are able to deliver our programs and services while finding ways to optimize service delivery and reduce costs."

The Provincial Regional Governance Review included two consultations with elected and appointment council members, municipal and business stakeholders and members of the public who live and work in York Region. The Honourable Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, is expected to report back to the Provincial Government on consultation findings in fall 2019.

The Regional Municipality of York consists of nine local cities and towns and provides a variety of programs and services to 1.2 million residents and 52.000 businesses with 620.000 employees. More information about the Region's key service areas is available at york.ca/regionalservices

Exclusive series on summit coming soon

Every once in a while my editor throws me a gem. The email read: "Would you be interested in this, for a series of articles? In Montreal."

It was an invitation for members of the press to attend the Movin' On Summit 2019, formerly known as the Bibendum Challenge initiated by Michelin 20 years ago. I had never heard of it.

Keep in mind, I have been lecturing, writing, and educating about environmental issues since 1970, about sustainable development since 1983, and about climate change since 1988. However, my research sources were always practicing, published, and peer reviewed scientists and my audiences were usually always involved in education. Corporations were the "bad guys."

This conference changed my world view. While most of us are bemoaning the lack of action taken by our political leaders, and we get all riled up by headlines trumpeting the sins of climate deniers like Trump and Ford, there is quiet significant change happening in powerful corporations all around the world.

Part One of this series will look at the concept of Sustainable Mobility, the theme of the Summit. Part Two focuses on the technologies I saw in action - you realize the future is here when you have driven in an all-electric BMW or their hybrid roadster or a Toyota hydrogen fuel cell sedan. Part Three highlights my conversations with the corporate directors of Michelin, probably the most authentic, articulate, and classy people I have ever interviewed.

Improvements at Rutherford GO

Local speeders in the community irk councillors

"Slow down and be respectful to your neighbours."

That was the message delivered by King Mayor Steve Pellegrini, in response to speeding concerns on local roads.

Councillors recently discussed traffic calming measures and alternatives, in light of continued speeding violations in local communities.

The mayor said he's "fed up" with drivers' behaviours, noting the majority of the offenders are, in fact, residents. "I can't believe people in the community would do this," he said.

He wants staff to look at some "in your face" solutions to mitigate the

"I'm open to any ideas," he said.

The mayor noted some jurisdictions have used, out of service "dummy" or decommissioned police cruisers, parked in strategic locations. Even unmanned and static, they do tend to deter bad driving habits.

One notable example was in neighbouring Caledon, where a Dixie Road resident parked a 1984 Chevrolet Caprice - painted to look like a police car – on his property for roughly 15 years. Even though it He added he can't understand was obviously an antique, it proved to be an effective deterrent.



As a deterrent to speeders, one Caledon resident placed an old dummy cruiser on his front lawn. It worked for more than a decade before it was removed.

Road Watch and community safety

Many of us have noticed an increase in traffic violations in King and now we all can help to address this problem.

Whether there are drivers speeding to take the kids to school or soccer or to get home just a few minutes early from work, outside commuters racing through King with no regard for our neighbourhoods, huge trucks barrelling right through our villages, city drivers paying no attention to farm vehicles or distracted drivers "flaunting" the law, we now all have a simple method of reporting these threats to our safety. In fact, we all have the responsibility to do so.

Have you witnessed someone breaking the law on the roads? Were they speeding, making unsafe lane changes or running red lights or stop signs?

Road Watch is a community-driven program that gives you the opportunity to report dangerous and aggressive drivers to York Regional Police.

You should file a Road Watch complaint online if you can:

• Identify the licence plate of the aggressive driver.

• Identify a specific offence committed by the aggressive driver.

You should not file a Road Watch complaint if:

· You see an impaired driver, street racing or other behaviour that is an immediate danger to public safety. This is an emergency, or a crime in progress, and you should dial 9-1-1 immediately.

If you would like to report an area in which you have seen poor driving behaviour, rather than a specific instance, you should report a Community Concern online. Perhaps some dirt bikers were creating stampedes of livestock by illegally racing up and down a rural road. Perhaps mailboxes are being used for batting practice.

Nobleton's Bertola medals in national gymnastics

A whirlwind start to the 2019 schedule has seen one of King's most agile athletes reaching multiple podiums.

Long-time gymnast Pietro Bertola came home late last month from Carleton University in Ottawa with a silver medal in both pommel horse and rings at the Canadian Championships in Artistic Gymnastics, posting scores of 11.650 and 12.700 respectively.

The pair of podium finishes came shortly after Bertola helped Team Ontario to a group bronze medal, totaling his points for a fourth overall score between pommel horse, rings, floor, vault, parallel bars, and high bars.

It was quite a return to form for the young athlete. Adversity struck in November of 2018 when Bertola fractured two metacarpal bones in his hand during training, putting him out of training for 11 weeks.

Needing to compete in one of three qualifier events for a chance to reach the provincial championship, he was cleared just one week before the second qualifier, where he competed in the vault competition in January to earn his spot.

Yet he says it is pommel and rings, his bread and butter at the national

tournament, that he favours most.

"Pietro never seemed to be able to keep his feet on the ground," said his father Ed. "He climbed anything and everything he could."

It was for this reason his parents enrolled him in a gymnastics program at a young age, where he jumped directly into the competitive program, and has flourished since.

Next season will see Bertola make the move into the senior men's division, while he completes his final year of high school, before he entertains the idea of competing in the NCAA.

As for now, Bertola said he is feeling "very good about these events."

"My routines have a good flow to them and they feel smooth. It's a great feeling and I have a lot of fun on these events ... I'm look forward to working on increasing their difficulty."

The 17-year-old from Silverthorne Collegiate in Toronto earned his spot on Team Ontario by way of a massive effort at April's Men's Artistic Gymnastics Ontario Championships, where a first overall score at the Windsor event helped him cruise to the national tournament.

Leon looking for gold in Women's World Cup

Four years after a disappointing finish on home turf in the largest women's tournament in the world, King's Adriana Leon has high hopes for this month's Canadian squad at the FIFA World Cup in France.

One of a handful of returning players from the 2015 tournament that saw Canada fall early in Toronto, Leon sees potential in the team that now ranks fifth in the world.

"We're ranked fifth in the world, we are a good team and we're excited to step on the field on Monday," said Leon over the weekend, shortly before Canada bested Cameroon 1-0 in their opening match. "We feel pretty comfortable when people say this is the best Canadian team there has ever been.

"To have the World Cup in Canada, we had a lot of pressure on our team, so now we feel like we can deal with anything."

Those words certainly ring true: Leon herself was one of the most impactful players in World Cup qualifying, leading the team with six goals, while a pairing with the legendary captain Christine Sinclair should prove to be a lethal combi-

"I think we're probably a little bit both anxious and excited, with a little bit of nerves, but good nerves," Leon said following a training session in Laverune, a suburb of Montpellier in southern France. "We were in Spain training hard for a couple of weeks and we were a little bit isolated away from here."

Growing up in Maple, Ontario, Leon's parents moved the family to King City when she was 16 years old in 2008. She was still attending classes at The Country Day School the first time she was called up to represent her country internationally, playing in the U-20 World Cup a year later.

Since then, her career has taken her to all corners of the globe, from Cyprus, to Japan, to Germany, and Brazil.

It was in 2012 that she joined the senior squad and got the opportunity to play alongside her childhood idol, Sinclair. She scored the only goal in a 1-0 win over China PR, and has now found the back of the net fourteen times since joining the senior team, including a six-goal performance at October's tournament, where Canada finished runners-up to the United States.

Leon was a player on both the rugby and volleyball programs at The Country

Day School as well.







Swiftly while he was attending a military event the assassins struck, killing Romulus, the legendary founder and first king of Rome. At that very moment the bright sunny day was plunged into darkness. When moments later light returned his body had disappeared!

Sometime later Proculus, a nobleman and the king's good friend, having sworn an oath announced, in the Forum in the city centre that as he was travelling on the road he saw coming towards him the murdered king. He asked him why he'd left as he did, making the senators targets of murderous accusations. Romulus replied that it had been the plan of the Olympic gods for him to remain on Earth only a short time to found a power that would eventually rule the world before he would leave to reside in heaven as a god. Then Romulus, enveloped by a whirlwind, was taken up into heaven. This is how Plutarch, the 1st century AD Greek philosopher and contemporary of St. Luke, relates the ancient myth.

Now skeptics and some sympathetic biblical scholars see threads of this story re-emerging and weaving through pre-Christian accounts of Yeshua's resurrection and the time following it, particularly in Luke's well known gospel account of Yeshua meeting up with of 2 of his grief stricken followers on the road to Emmaus that first Easter Sun-

Christians believe Luke, a physician

never actually saw Yeshua and only became Christian after his meetings with Paul. As a historian he would be well aware of fact and fiction surrounding Rome's humble beginnings.

The St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes Luke's gospel tells that later on the day of his resurrection an incognito Yeshua, now fully clothed as his wounds would have been a dead give away, walked with a disciple called Cleopas and another unnamed disciple, possibly his wife, as they were returning home to Emmaus a village about the same distance from Jerusalem as Schomberg is from Nobleton. And only when he broke bread after being invited to eat and stay over with them did they recognize him at which point he vanished.

Then without waiting, they hurried back to Jerusalem to tell the 11 who would soon be called apostles what they'd experienced. But they weren't believed until Yeshua suddenly was standing in their midst. He ate with them and gave them last minute instructions as to what he wanted them to do. Then he went with them as far as Bethany another village about a mile/2.5 km from Jerusalem where after blessing them he was taken up into heaven.

Unanswered questions arise as to whether or not Yeshua, being still in his abused crucified body, would have been able to walk on badly wounded feet on a rough, dirty, dusty road keeping up with two healthy people? Would Cleopas and companion have risked walking back to Jerusalem as it was getting dark? If the 11 were in hiding how could they be found especially at night? Would Yeshua have led his pre-apostles out to Bethany to witness his ascension in the dark? Were the two Emmauans witnesses as well or did they remain at the hideout?

Even Emmaus, long completely destroyed, comes into question as its location is a still matter of dispute although Christian churches stand on the 2 sites some miles apart that claim to hold the ruins of Cleopas's house! And there are possible locations.

Skeptics claim along with some biblical scholars, the whole Emmaus incident never actually happened but was borrowed from the Roman fiction, somewhat changed and added by the now unknown author of or collaborator on St. Luke's gospel for dramatic affect.



Horticulture By John Arnott

For the past couple of weeks or so drifts of sky blue forget-me-nots have greeted me each day as I walk out through the conservation bush near my home in Tecumseth Pines (Tottenham). These mid-spring wild flowers are native to Eurasia with native cousins found in New Zealand, where they're now endangered, and Australia.

Claims have been made that there are some 500 species of forget-me -nots worldwide but most botanists today credit only 74 species. Forget-me-nots. (a name not used much heard outside North America) being prolific seeders once established in the damp loam in the light shade to full sun they prefer will grow and bloom year after year for a lifetime that makes telling if you

have annuals or perennials difficult. The 2 species common to our area are m. sylvatica and m. alpestries. Easy to care for and control forget-me-nots can be quietly and gently invasive!

Mostly each plant produces a number of leaf covered stems rising from ground level to a height of six in./ 15 cm., but where they must compete with other plants for space and light the stems can be a foot/ 30 cm. high and held upright by neighbouring plants. However there are species that will grow 2 ft./60 cm. naturally.

Each stem in nearly all species terminates in a cluster of flowers. Each flower making up this cluster holds 5 tiny wide pointed oval shaped petals cupped by 5 tinier sepals around a bright vellow centre that contains the

Thursday, June 13, 2019 - THE WEEKLY SENTINEL - 25 pollen bearing stamens. Bees of all sizes love these flowers and are certainly busy all through the drifts I pass.

Cheery blue is by far the colour of most forget-me-nots, but here and there some clusters bloom white or pink. And I've read there are some forget-me-not species that have vellow flowers. In mid May I found a single clump about 5 in./12.5 cm. high of deep almost sapphire blue ones growing in my garden!

My walk through the drifts of Tecumseth forget-me-nots this year is tinged with sadness as Victory, my little Boston terrier, and constant walking companion of the past 13 years passed away (heart failure) on the trail just after we started out through the woods a vear ago. May 25. Now these blue forgetme-nots remind me I'll not forget him.
