### Nobleton project will reflect community's flavour

A new and improved project for downtown Nobleton checks all the boxes. A proposal for commercial and residential blocks, surrounding the historic Hambly House, is heralded as "exciting."

Council okayed staff recommendations for the bylaw amendment, that will give Nobleton Heritage Development Inc. the go-ahead for 33 apartments and 1,877 square metres of commercial space.

Staff pointed out that since the initial plans were presented in November 2017, the applicant made several changes to address concerns raised by staff and the public.

Among the changes are a reduction in both street level and underground parking spaces; increased building setbacks; facade enhancements, and a recess in the mid-point of building number two.

The plans are to move ahead in two phases, with renovation to the Hambly House and building number one taking place in the first phase. The first building will have 5 apartment units and 299 square metres of commercial space, fronting onto King Road.

Recent streetscaping has improved the Nobleton core, and this property received some new sidewalks, light poles and decorative fencing.

The Nobleton Community Plan, staff pointed out, recognizes the village's small town character and does permit a mix or commercial and residential

The apartments represent an alternative form of housing which is needed in the community. The stacking of apartments over commercial ground floor spaces "contributes to the vitality of the core area and introduces a built form and density that is appropriate and desirable."

The units will be one and two bedrooms and will cater to both new couples and seniors.

"The introduction of rental apart-



ments contributes to greater housing choice and improves the range of affordability for housing from what currently exists in the area," staff said.

The regard to historical significance is reflected in the restoration of the Hambly House, which will be preserved and incorporated into this project as a focal point.

The main feature of this project is a pedestrian plaza or courtyard, measuring roughly 600 square metres. It's designed to address multiple issues that are important to the core. It will serve as a "dynamic" public gathering space and will contribute to the beautification and greening of the core.

Mark McConville, of Humphries Planning, noted his client has made several changes to the initial proposal, reducing the size and scale of the project. The plans call for main floor commercial uses and residential spaces above. The Hambly House itself will be renovated and become home to offices.

The residential units have been scaled down to 33, from 45 and the height of the buildings has come down a bit as well. Setbacks have been increased; a planting strip, trees and a fence have all been added to spruce up the property.

Councillor David Boyd was pleased,

nothing there are "so many exciting elements to this proposal."

He pointed out this is the most prominent corner in Nobleton and hopes are it will become a community gathering

There are two mature birch trees in front of the Hambly House but it's uncertain whether they can remain.

Boyd was especially pleased by the use of yellow brick accents on the buildings and facades, that come close to matching the Hambly House.

This current proposal, he said, "comes leaps and bounds from the beginning."

Mayor Steve Pellegini agreed that the new design is "outstanding."

#### **Breeder Schickedanz passes away**

Renowned Canadian horse owner and breeder Gustav "Gus" Schickedanz passed away June 17 at his Schomberg Farm. He was 90.

Earlier this spring, Schickedanz received the coveted E.P. Taylor Award of merit from the Jockey Club of Canada at the Sovereign Awards ceremony.

Schickedanz was inducted into the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame in 2009 as a "builder."

Schickedanz bred and raced multiple winners, including Wando, an 11-time winner from 23 career starts. Wando was the 2003 Canadian Triple Crown winner and Horse of the Year. Wando earned more than \$2.5 million.

King Mayor Steve Pellegrini said Schomberg Farm is an institution in King and "Gus was a true gentleman. He will be deeply missed and I offer sincerest condolences to his family and friends."

Councillor Bill Cober has known Gus since he was a teenager.

"I was fortunate to know him and was always impressed and influenced with his humility and hard working approach. As a teenager delivering lumber to the farm or cottage Gus would always help to unload the truck and take time to talk and offer some words of wisdom. Gus made significant contributions throughout society during his lifetime and will be missed."

### PM needs to take responsibility for his actions

My thanks to MP Deborah Schulte for publicly commenting on the SNC-Lavalin issue (Reference: Lavalin issue fraught with 'heated rhetoric'-KWS June 13, 2019). I first contacted Mrs. Schulte's office two and half months ago, expressing my concerns on this matter since it threatened the independence of our judicial system.

SNC-Lavalin is facing charges that it bribed government officials to obtain business in Libya from 2001 to 2011. In Canada, SNC-Lavalin has also been found guilty of improper political contributions to the Liberal Party and to a lesser extent, the Conservative Party of Canada. Elections Canada quietly agreed to a compliance agreement with SNC-Lavalin to avoid criminal charges for the donation violations.

As for the Deferred Prosecution Agreement (DPA), this "tool" was rushed into law via a clause in a finance omnibus bill. While in opposition, Justin Trudeau said this of omnibus bills: "We will ... bring an end to this undemocratic practice ..." since they prevent parliament from properly reviewing and debating the issues. So why the sudden rush for DPA legislation by Prime Minister Trudeau that he needed to stuff this into his own omnibus bill?

Advocating for jobs is laudable until the political lobbying strays into our independent judicial system. Prime Minister Trudeau, house leader Bardish Chagger and other cabinet ministers repeatedly insist that they respect the independence of parliamentary committees and Canadian institutions. That is, until the independent Director

agree to a DPA for SNC-Lavalin since the company didn't meet the criteria.

Mrs. Schulte says that "... political life is rife with pressure." True, but the Attorney General is not your average politician. She alone is responsible for upholding the rule and independence of the law. Despite denials by the Prime Minister, his former Principal Secretary Gerald Butts and former Privy Council Clerk Michael Wernick, we know that a great deal of relentless pressure was directed at then Attorney General Jody Wilson-Raybould to issue a DPA. In a recorded telephone conversation between Wernick and Wilson-Raybould on December 19th 2018, Wernick stated that he had just spoken to the Prime Minister and "... he (Prime Minister Trudeau) is quite determined ... he wants to know why the DPA route, which Parliament provided for, isn't being used ... he is gonna (sic) find a way to get it done one way or another.'

This shocking conversation to me is akin to phoning a judge and telling him or her how to decide a case because the Prime Minister wants it done a certain way. This is not acceptable behaviour for a government or Prime Minister.

Although Jody Wilson-Raybould testified that no laws were broken by this lobbying, it was only because she resisted this inappropriate assault and paid the price by eventually being removed as Attorney General, possibly allowing for a new attorney general who is more amenable to the Prime Minister's directives.

Committee, ignoring Justin Trudeau's influence while watching the Canadicampaign promise for greater transparency in 2015, suddenly decided to end the parliamentary investigation into the SNC-Lavalin affair against the protests of all opposition party members and without any rational explanation.

Another significant result of the passing of Bill 108 will be the loss of power in


municipalities to combat inappropriate development.



#### Movin' On Summit 2019 Part 2: The Future of Transportation

I expect that our horse and buggy elders thought the same thing when they saw the first car. An end to a way of life, of blacksmith's shops and anvils and harness maker guilds. Just as our First Nations Elders had seen their way of life change forever with the coming of the tall ships and the white sails. Change is a guaranteed constant.

And so comes the new age of transportation. An age of autonomous, decarbonized vehicles. The transport of goods and services along mag lev tracks and via drone air corridors. The evolution from a fossil fool age to a renewables renaissance.

The Movin' On Summit at the beginning of June in Montreal showcased all of those technologies. Accompanied by professional race car drivers, participants got to test drive a variety of cars from the Toyota hydrogen fuel cell Mirai to the all-electric BMW i3 sedan. And if you wanted to feel as if you had just won the lottery, the BMW i8 hybrid roadster was plugged in and ready to

I opted for my test drive in the BMW electric sedan. My driver took me through the streets of Montreal pointing out the electric charging stations we passed on almost every block. "They install them in pairs so multiple cars can charge up." And sure enough, everv city street charging station had vehicles plugged in to the hydro powered Quebec grid.

Then he took me to their test strip. "Sit back," he smiled, "This little i3 has some kick." He stepped on the accelerator and I was pressed back into my seat as the full torque of the electric engine hit me. When we arrived back at the Summit, the little i3 got plugged in for a recharge. I suddenly had a vision of the intersection of Keele and King ten years from now as a fleet of quiet, clean electric vehicles dropped off their passengers at the high speed mag lev GO train station ... ah, perchance to dream.

On a more practical note, and more befitting of my budget, I went to the test track inside the Summit grounds to try out the electric bikes and scooters. One of the vendors rents out fleets of the electric assist bikes to corporations who make them available to employees working on large sites. The model I test-

ed was on a very sturdy frame with substantial saddlebags over the rear wheel. As soon as you began to work the pedals, the electric motor kicked in silently to ease the journey. Just what I need for that grind up the four corners valley along Queen Street in Bolton.

The younger set flocked to the electric scooters which they had zooming gracefully and silently around the test track. In the middle of the test track oval sat a huge hybrid-electric truck cab – the large scale version of a clean vehicle to show us how the big trailers could sustainably move our goods across the country.

The all-electric Navva bus is what I pictured moving citizens around our towns. Eight passenger, fully accessible seating, and comfortable. The Navya is French technology currently being produced in Detroit. The current short range is perfect for in-Town transit, but battery capacity is increasing by leaps and bounds every day, so the Navya's range will extend accordingly.

My other personal favourite was the Wello – a tricycle vehicle with electric solar assist. Two wheels in the front and one in the rear, with a weather sealed back cab for gear (or children or pets), an ergonomic seat in the front that makes pedalling a pleasure, and a cabin hood that extends into an aerodynamic windshield to protect the driver. Cycling has never felt so good. Being a guy who now walks and cycles everywhere, this one really appealed to me.


The Wello was designed for warmer climes, but the developers agreed to bring one to Canada with fat tires for a winter test drive. And I get to be the test driver. Elon Musk, eat your heart out.

The Summit presented a host of vehicles for all types of drivers, from farm pick-ups to tractor trailer units to electric scooters. From luxury roadsters to solar assisted e-buses and e-bikes. All clean, quiet, green, and waiting for us to make the move.

The inspiration provided by the physical evidence of these machines and the people behind them was proof that this talk of sustainable mobility is not a pipe dream. Even more inspirational was the discovery that the driving force behind the dream came from a large multinational corporation with a vision that is moving them from Ambition to Action.

The Ontario government vows to make life easier for commuters by resuming the Environmental Assessment (EA) for the Greater Toronto Area West corridor. The new route is hoped to improve Ontario's highway network, reduce travel times and help alleviate traffic congestion across the GTA.

Former Transportation Minister Jeff Yurek said the government is resuming the EA at the point it left off in 2015. This comes after a motion was passed in the legislature on June 4, calling on the government to immediately resume the EA.

"Ontario is open for business and our government will continue to invest and build new, efficient infrastructure to move people and goods faster," said Yurek. "Resuming the EA for the GTA West Corridor will ensure we can build more transportation infrastructure in the future that meets the needs of the people as our economy grows."

A public information centre this fall will give the public an opportunity to review and comment on the preferred route. The EA is anticipated to be completed by the end of 2022.

West EA, the Ministry of Transportation and the Independent Electricity System Operator (IESO) will no longer proceed with the Northwest GTA Corridor Identification Study.

Opponents charged the initial route cut through prime environmental

King officials expressed concerns about the route impacts, back in 2015.

One of the proposed routes comes a little too close for comfort as far as King residents are concerned.

Councillors approved a staff report in 2015, outlining King's position on the corridor, strongly opposing proposed route 7F, which runs just south of Nobleton. Further, councillor David Boyd wanted it noted that methods to mitigate any increased traffic through Nobleton because of the corridor be examined and discussed. Councillors also made it clear they will not support extending the 7th Concession to Pine Valley Drive.

In a joint report prepared by then Planning Director Stephen Kitchen and former Public Works Director Andrew Drzewiecki, it was stressed that while King recognizes the importance of identifying and protecting the corridor, With the resumption of the GTA it has concerns. They're asking that


the ministry consults with King on the pass, to alleviate traffic on King Road. evaluation of corridor alternatives, interchange locations and the design and selection of the preferred alignment.

Staff noted all of the alignments are south of the King-Vaughan border, but some of the interchanges are closer to

While the exact location of the route and interchanges raise concerns, King does admit the corridor will act as a by-

In order to accomplish this, however, a suitable regional road system at the end of the corridor is necessary.

Nobleton councillor David Boyd said gridlock and heavy trucks using our villages for the movement of goods are top concerns. He's pleased to see the Ontario government recognizes these issues and moves ahead with the process for the corridor.





#### Fly our national flag properly!

Canada Day, the 152nd anniversary of Confederation, will soon be upon us. As I drive the roads of King, I smile as I see so many Canadian flags proudly flown by my neighbours.

However, an alarming number of us evidently are not aware of the dishonour we are showing. We apparently do not know the basic rules for how to fly and care for our National Flag.

For example, the flag must never be flown if it has faded to a pale or orangey colour rather than its original bright red. It must be replaced if it becomes ripped or tattered at all.

Yes, high quality flags are expensive, but there are many inexpensive flags that can be easily be replaced.

The flag must never touch the ground and never get tangled in nearby branches. Recently, I had to trim the fast growing bush that "captured" my small driveway flag.

So what do you do with a Canadian flag that is "past its prime?" In the past, the Boy Scouts would take it to burn in a respectful manner. Now, most flags are made of nylon/polyester so this is no longer a good idea. According to Canadian Heritage Services, the proper way to dispose of an old flag is to simply cut out the two colours and then cut them into strips and dispose of them. The goal is to eliminate the image of the maple leaf and bars and not reuse the material.



On that early spring morning as he walked ahead of his followers up the path through the groves of gnarled and already ancient olive trees on the Har ha-Zeitim some 40 days after his death and resurrection. Tiny warmer water droplets in the air came in close contact with the cooler ground and began creating mist that at first swirled around his feet then more of his body giving him the appearance of rising as he climbed higher. Now turning and looking down on his disciples he blessed them just as the enveloping mist completely hid him from view. Minutes later the mist had all but dissipated leaving only an empty damp trail as Yeshua continued on unseen on this Mount of Olives to fulfil his future destiny.

The St. Alban's Anglican community

in Nobleton notes that the boundary between life and death to people who lived in biblical times wasn't thought to be an unbreachable wall but rather a river, some called the Styx, that at times could be crossed in both directions. Back then belief in contact with the dead was not uncommon with many people believing they had seen even talked to loved ones who had passed.

These ghosts or shades existed in grey shadowy underworld known as the Shades (Sheol in Hebrew) hoping to be of the few selected to enter the heavenly realm.

Thus, as New Testament writers tell us, the 11 disciples after their initial and frightening shock at seeing Yeshua's shade though still in his crucified body they accepted him and feeling safe in his presence accompanied him to the Mount of Olives well away from their safe house in Jerusalem.

The ancient Sumerians of Mesopotamia (modern Iraq) ancient Egyptians as well as the Greeks Romans and Celts all had stories we call myths telling about their gods or messengers from them coming to Earth on missions and once these missions were completed they experienced ascensions back up to their various heavens.

Some biblical scholars see Yeshua's ascension patterned on these myths and that proves the Christ man's ascension actually ever happened. But rather it was invented by some now unknown 1st century AD biblical author, who wasn't Church, Kettleby starting at 10:30 a.m.

an eye witness nor knew anyone who was, to get the Yeshua from Earth to claim there isn't one shred of evidence heaven with one last miraculous touch.





Words to live by - Aileen van Ginkel, one of our lay readers, officiated at morning prayer last Sunday and delivered a thoughtful sermon based on discussions at a recent Bible study on Sunday's difficult story in Luke 8 in which Jesus heals a man called "legion" because he was possessed by many demons. There was a herd of pigs nearby and "The demons begged Jesus to let them go into the pigs, and he gave them permission. When the demons came out of the man, they went into the pigs, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned."

Aileen talked of how the study group engaged God's word and first established that Jesus was among gentiles in Gerasenes. Then the group decided that being possessed by demons perhaps meant he had a multiple personality disorder, and was mentally ill. Then a member of the group suggested that according to a French philosopher, people like that man could have been scapegoats, carrying the sins of the whole community. The demons knew Jesus and that he had authority over them. When the demons had gone out of the man he returned to normal. The people were afraid maybe thinking the demons would return to their scapegoat. "This is a story of hope," she said. "Jesus refused to let the man accompany him since he could become an agent of hope. Perhaps he was the first missionary to the gentiles."

She said the takeaway for the group was that we were all affected by weaknesses and needed healing. She ended by talking about the bible study's joy in engaging and probing the meaning of scripture, and inviting anyone to join when sessions begin again Mondays in the fall.

More words - The Gospel the Sunday previous from John 16 told of Jesus telling his disciples about the holy spirit coming to them: "... when the Spirit of truth, comes, he will guide you into all the truth. He will glorify me because it is from me that he will receive what he will make known to you." The reading from Romans 5 speaks of "boasting in our sufferings" knowing that "suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit ..."

Rev. Dr. Elizabeth said this was not an automatic response to suffering, remembering those who like she had lost their fathers on this father's day. She spoke of the mystery of the Trinity and asked how we celebrate this aspect of God "rooted in his nature" especially the Holy Spirit which we don't really understand.

Christ was an advocate as in John's Gospel of the Holy Spirit of truth. Christ departed the world but the Holy Spirit came to "make right all wrongs." The truth is that God is love and out of death comes life. The Trinity can be seen as creator God, created Jesus and

presence – the Holy Spirit. God is a God of relations. We want to figure it all out but if it wasn't a mystery we would not need religion.

All the multiple ways we are and who we are is also a mystery. "But God is in us through the Holy Spirit of truth. If we take the journey inward, we arrive to God in us, the place of our wholeness. We are people of sacrament, outward signs of inward and spiritual grace. We are the love of God in action."

#### Horticulture By John Arnott

Driving in and around King and New Tecumseth at this time of year it's hard not to notice the splashes of purple and white lighting up fields, ditches and roadsides as "wild phlox" claims its yearly 15+ days of fame. This showy late spring into early summer biennial but sometimes short lived perennial flaunts its brief stay with us in white, at least 3 shades of purple and for the keened eyed a rare delicate pink.

Its popular name "wild phlox" is a misnomer since this field flower is not related to phlox at all but rather is a member of the mustard family and as such a kissing cousin of cabbage.

Sweet rocket, as my family calls it, grows a ground level mound of foliage in its first year and produces stems from this mound in its second year that can grow over 3 ft./100 cm high. The arrow or lance shaped leaves covered in tiny hairs grow alternately up the stems - some have toothed edges while some are smooth edged. The large bottom leaves can be 15 in./12 cm long. The stem tops, often branched, hold clusters of cross shaped 4 petaled flowers held by the sepals that were bud covers and now form tiny tubes often the same colour as the petals. Six pollen bearing stamens are found in the centre of each flower. Plants love damp loam in full sun or partial shade but do well in average garden soil.

While sweet rocket is an attractive, colourful, easy to grow, easy care plant it is a prolific seeder and it soon can take over large stretches of ground to the detriment of other garden or wild flowers.
