

The subject application proposes:

The purpose of the Official Plan Amendment application is to increase the permitted density and height policies identified for the Core Area to provide for a 4 storey mixed use building containing 20 rental apartments and 6 commercial units at grade. The purpose of the Zoning By-law Amendment application is to establish a site specific (CAK-X) zone to permit the height and density to facilitate the development together with some exceptions to the general provisions and parking requirements of the by-law. A Site Plan Development application has also submitted with the detailed design for the project.

#### Hwy. 400 construction updates

## Scheer greeted by wave of enthusiasm

Andrew Scheer's visit to Vaughan last week sparked a massive wave of enthusiasm from Conservative candidates across the GTA.

The Kleinburg-area Jan Paderewski Park was packed with a sea of blue, along with Toronto and national media, to hear the Conservative leader kick off the federal election campaign in Ontario.

His main message is one of optimism, and a vow to put more money back in the pockets of hard-working Canadians.

He said he "can't wait to take our plan across the country" and fight for



Canadian jobs. He's adamant about helping the middle class, acknowledging today's essentials are more expensive for average families. Under the current federal government, he sees even higher taxes to come.

It's not average citizens who get ahead under Justin Trudeau, but rather "Liberal insiders." He noted Canadians have had four years of the Trudeau leadership, which featured fired "whistle blowers" and an RCMP investigation.

"He's (Trudeau) lost the moral ability to govern," he said. Scheer is admittedly an optimist and some say he smiles too much.

"It's hard not to smile when you have amazing candidates like Anna Roberts (King-Vaughan)" and an amazing and diverse group of candidates across the GTA and Canada. "It's hard not to smile when you have the right plan."

He told the enthusiastic crowd numbering well over 500 that it's time "for you to have a government that finally gets it," especially after "four years of being neglected and ignored."

He stressed that citizens are just getting by and they want a break. Middle class Canadians are struggling and doing the best they can. They "deserve a government that will help ... we have a plant to ... put more money back in your pocket."





## The role of a tree bylaw

vital role in contributing to healthy, attractive and resilient communities. A quote from the website of the Ontario Urban Forest Council says it well: "Urban trees do more than just clean our air. They are a vital player from a social & economic perspective as well."

I've always enjoyed and appreciated trees. However, over the past three years of learning about trees and their benefits, I've come to recognize that various initiatives play a significant role in conserving mature healthy trees and expanding the tree canopy education and awareness, community tree-planting events, incentives to plant trees, and well-informed tree by-laws.

I see and applaud those who seek to manage trees responsibly on private property with the goal of conserving healthy trees, replacing trees removed and enriching biodiversity. At the same time, I'm observing many instances of the indiscriminate cutting of trees and forests in King, and I believe we need to find effective ways to address this. A bylaw is one of the tools that can help.

The introduction of a private tree bylaw is often controversial. Toronto is going through growing pains as it seeks to protect its majestic mature trees and grow the tree canopy in the city, however, trees have certainly gained worthwhile attention and many left standing through the Toronto tree bylaw.

In an informative presentation I attended featuring Peter Wynnyczuk, executive director of the Ontario Urban Forest Council, Peter emphasized that

I strongly believe that trees play a the primary goal of a private tree bylaw is to have a "conversation" with property owners. In effect, a permit process for removing trees causes people to pause and think. Could pruning address a concern or issue? Can a project can be redesigned to incorporate mature healthy trees, or require less trees to be removed? We can all benefit from conversations and pausing to consider alternatives.

> In the proposed King Private Tree bylaw, I am supportive of the emphasis on replacement trees being required rather than permit fees when trees are removed. Yes, there are costs involved in planting replacement trees of a moderate size (2 to 3 inch diameter) on either private or municipal lands, however, this is vitally important for future generations and for the long-term health of our communities, a worthwhile investment.

> I think there is some refining and improvements needed in the draft tree bylaw, but it has the clear foundation for an informed, future-oriented bylaw that can lead to the conservation of mature healthy trees and the growing of the tree canopy in King's three main villages - King City, Nobleton and Schomberg.

## Goals, strategies set stage for King budget

Setting their sights on the 2020 budget, King Township councillors and staff have some very defined goals and strategies to achieve them.

The biggest push is to limit tax increases, and through 2022, the Township is keeping the increase at no more than 2.9%

Their perennial emphasis is to maintain existing programs at current service levels. This coming year, staff will identify the incremental operating costs directly associated with growth in population and/or municipal service requirements. They hope to keep user fees in check, too, limiting hikes to 2.5%

Water and wastewater rate increases are tied to York Region's multi-year financial sustainability plan, as well as Township operating/capital requirements.

Last year's budget marked the first iteration of a multi-year budget format, that included expense forecasts through 2022. These projected hikes were pegged at between 2.6% and 2.75%.

King did approve tackling climate change through efficiencies and targets at the municipal level. While this may result in fiscal pressure into the coming budget cycle, there's no provision at this point to dedicate funds.

This year's budget also continues key priorities that include a comprehensive road improvement program.

Staff plan to present draft budgets and business plans in early December, with

final adoption slated for January 2020. Keeping the increase at under 3% will be a bit of a challenge. Some of the more significant strains will be salary increases of the collective bargaining agreement; winter road maintenance; tending to existing infrastructure and contributing to reserves. However, lessening the impact will be assessment growth and available grant money from senior levels of government.

"... the 2020-2022 budges and business plans will establish commitment-based expenditures and associated sources of funding in support of the provision to provide municipal services in 2020 and beyond," staff noted. "Staff continue to utilize the ISCP (Integrated Community Sustainability Plan) to ensure financial sustainability is a key consideration in decision-making processes that can directly impact the future fiscal state of the Township.'





While Priestly wants the show to highlight the industry, they're extremely busy and didn't do it for the publicity. They simply love what they do and they among the best at it.

In the series debut, Ted and Justin travelled to Market Village Mall in Markham, where they are tasked with carefully unlocking mysterious vault doors while the demolition team begins

the tear down. The salvage team needs to move fast if they want to discover what is hiding inside the locked vaults.

Priestly Demolition is a family-run company in King that specializes in the tearing down buildings. But part and parcel of their work is salvage, giving their crew a chance to go inside and recover some valuable treasures left behind.

Throughout the series, the team discovers century-old safes, collectible toys, a 19th century log cabin and a 1927 Austrian C. Reichert Microscope. #### All Saints Anglican Church By Patrick Gossage

Last Sunday, in recognition of the Toronto Diocese's four-week Season of Creation we offered a special prayer for our planet: "Generous God. You created us and placed us here to care for all creation. Forgive us for turning away from you and for neglecting the earth. Raise us up and make us again stewards of your creation that we may see your presence in all that surrounds us: through Christ we pray. Amen."

Words to live by – Rev. Dr. Elizabeth again built her sermon around our responsibility for the wellbeing of God's creation. The gospel from Luke 15 was the parable of the lost sheep. She said we have seen and been cautioned by disastrous recent climate events and feel desperation, sadness and worry, especially for our grandchildren. How do we think God feels about this situation? The passage read Wednesday from Jeremiah suggests God showed "fierce anger" when he saw the earth was "waste and void," a consequence of human disobedience. But God is a God of mercy beyond what we have a right

to expect. "Each of us is a lost sheep," she said. "We don't know what to do in face of climate crisis ... We know how God will feel if we do the right thing and are found – the shepherd rejoices and God will too. As the Gospel states 'there will be more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents than over 99 righteous persons who do not need to repent.' When we find ourselves in tune with God he rejoices. God is creation, the air the water, the land – all of it."

She reminded us of the wonderful passage in John 1: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it," she said.

We are created for a purpose. Even the little things we do to fight climate change bring us a step closer to God.

"We either add to darkness or light a candle to see God and be guided by God in the way we live."


