Thanks are also due to the men of the Parish who provided sustenance in the form of the BBQ and beverages.

The damp weather did not dampen spirits, and while registration was down, financial support more than compensated. With record Sponsorship dollars and record donation dollars, the committee is hoping to confirm record proceeds!

Pikangikum is the First Nations village you heard about being evacuated twice this summer for a raging wildfire in the forest nearby. For nearly a decade, there has been a team on the ground to address the lack of clean water.

The complexity of the situation needed federal government involvement, but concerned citizens and the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund wanted to begin to alleviate the intense hardship that polluted water had created. In addition, funds are also allocated to Parish outreach projects that have involved much youth counselling and education.

Recent public consultation on the *Our King* Official Plan took place in the form of public open houses held on May 1, 2019, May 2, 2019, May 8, 2019, and June 27, 2019. A statutory public meeting under the *Planning Act* was held on June 27, 2019. All written comments received are included in comment and response matrices, which are available to the public online at <u>https://speaking.king.ca/</u>.

The Our King Official Plan will be submitted to the Regional Municipality of York for approval. The Regional Municipality of York is the approval authority for the new Official Plan and may approve, modify and approve, or refuse to approve the Official Plan.



King's new Official Plan is a legacy document

"This is a legacy that this council will leave," is how King Mayor Steve Pellegrini referred to the new, and long overdue, Official Plan.

Councillors passed the comprehensive planning document Sept. 23, after a productive discussion and input from several residents. Councillors made some last-minute amendments to the plan, which included zoning changes to the core area in King City, limiting severances and placing a two-acre lot minimum in Kingscross.

King now has a "very good go-forward document," according to Mayor Pellegrini.

In the works since 2014, the Our King Official Plan replaces a 40-year-old strategic plan and marks an important milestone in King's history, according to consultant Bob Gauthier, project manager of WSP who worked on the plan.

He pointed out some key changes were made since the draft plan was introduced in July and the final version replaces all three community plans. It provides a central function for land use planning goals, ambitions and visions set by the Township.

The OP also implements upper tire (York Region, Province) policies which have a direct impact on local planning.

The new plan provides a growth management framework, sets greenfield densities, while maintaining King's small town character. "The OP does this very well," Gauthier said.

There was a need to establish intensification policies as mandated by the Province and the three villages are the focal points for this concentrated growth. The OP protects employment lands and offers source protection policies, and took into account literally hundreds of comments from agencies and the public.

"The Official Plan is a very strong, modern framework for planning in King Township," Gauthier said. "It does a good job balancing everything. It's the start of a new era of planning."


Gauthier stressed there will be many opportunities to continue to refine the document, particularly when York Region updates its own OP.

Several delegations, which included consultants, agents and landowners, asked for site-specific considerations under the plan. Many asked that future plans and uses for their properties be taken into consideration. All vowed to continue to work with Township planning staff on their proposals.

Leslie Whicher, on behalf of the Ratepayers' Associa-Kingscross tion (KRA), made a passionate plea to ban severances in established communities, and she also asked that new lots in Kingscross be a minimum of two acres.





She charged council was "weakening" its protection of communities and was "dismayed" at the lack of attention to this in the OP. She wants the Township to move forward, not backwards and stressed the same rules should be applied to everyone.

Other Kingscross residents echoed those sentiments, arguing stronger wording was needed to stress the matter.

Mayor Pellegrini pointed out King's interim control bylaw did, in fact, prohibit severances in existing subdivisions. He also pointed out Township councillors and staff did support Kingscross residents throughout the process and OMB hearing over a particular lot creation application that caused some tension.



"We have fought the good fight," he said,

Our King OP addresses King's longterm planning requirements through 2031 and equips the Township with a wide range of policies to guide growth, development, land use, environmental preservation and also to facilitate economic development initiatives.

Consultants had to respond quickly to changes in provincial legislation, as the OP was being created. The Province introduced Bills 139, 108 and created the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal (LPAT).

Window of home affordability is closing fast

"God did not say that you should be able to borrow one hundred per cent of the price of a house.'

- Richard Thaler

It's no surprise that house prices in the GTA, and in fact across Ontario and most of Canada, are almost out of reach for average Canadians.

Putting more money back in the pockets of hard-working citizens has been the main theme of current political candidates as we head into a federal election.

While our esteemed politicians may not be living pay cheque to pay cheque, millions of Canadians are. Millions more may have the door slammed in their face as they try to save for and buy their first home.

Sad that it's come to this.

Even though it was a bit of a struggle for my parents, a house was still affordable. And 30-year, 4% mortgages were but simply to afford one! Can you imagcommon back then. The cost of living ine? was reasonable, as were groceries and even the new cars.

An average new car today costs more than my parents paid for their two-storey home in Etobicoke in the 1960s.

Sometimes I find it surprising that Canadians didn't revolt, with or without pitchforks in hand.

A new online piece posted by Penelope Graham on Zoocasa.com is entitled "Where could a median-income household afford real estate in Canada?" It's not a pleasant read by any means.

Hitting in the reader in the face is this example:

In Greater Vancouver: where the benchmark home costs \$993,300, a median-income household earning \$72,662 would qualify for a mortgage of only \$241,994, leaving a shortfall of \$751,306 - a total of 76% of the total purchase put toward annual property taxes. Buyers' ability to purchase a home varies widely from coast to coast. The gap is growing between east and west and the Prairies are seen as more affordable.

In 15 major urban centres studied them.

And, in the remaining seven, a median-income earner wouldn't qualify for a mortgage large enough to fund their home purchase, and would need to supplement it with a hefty down payment. This, in some urban centres, would require a savings timeline that spans decades, assuming they set aside 20% of their total income each year.

But now reflect on the past four years.


1) The ethics and conflict of interest on Trudeau's family visit to the Aga Khan's island.

TOWNSHIP OF KING CLASS ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT COMPREHENSIVE STORMWATER MANAGEMENT MASTER PLAN NOTICE OF STUDY COMMENCEMENT

The Township of King has retained Civica Infrastructure Inc. to prepare a Comprehensive Stormwater Management Master Plan. The Master Plan will describe existing conditions within, and downstream of, proposed development areas as per the Township's Official Plan; evaluate current stormwater practices, and set targets for surface runoff quantity and quality for future developments to adhere to. The study will also investigate potential retrofit opportunities within existing stormwater management facilities to assist in meeting these targets.

The Township of King is situated within watersheds managed by the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority (LSRCA) and the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA). In particular, the Township is within the Holland River (LSRCA), and the Humber River (TRCA). Stormwater management targets from both conservation authorities will be taken into account as part of the study.

The Master Plan will adhere to the process as per the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (EA) in Ontario which requires public consultation at various times during the process. The EA process will include two Public Information Centre (PIC) meetings to allow for public input from residents, landowners, regulatory agencies and other stakeholders. This input will be considered and will assist in the planning process. The PICs are anticipated to be held during January and March of 2020. A specific date, time, and location for each PIC meeting will be posted on the Township of King's website within the 'Stormwater Master Plan' link at <u>www.king.ca</u>.



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York council to optimize existing investment to accommodate a future population of 1.8 million

York Regional council has endorsed the principle that new infrastructure investment be tied to the achievement of population thresholds, as outlined in the recent infrastructure and alignment report.

"Over the last decade York Regional Council made significant investment in transit, water and wastewater infrastructure, taking on growth-related debt to serve our growing population," said York Region chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. "However, population growth has slowed in recent years. Optimizing existing investments in infrastructure before triggering new investment is key to meeting provincial growth targets in a fiscally responsible manner."

In 2014, council adopted a fiscal strategy which provides tools to manage debt and better align capital spending with growth. This strategy has allowed the Region to maintain a state of sustainable financial 'equilibrium' by limiting capital expenditures and reducing debt.

While the Region remains committed to delivering the infrastructure required to support growth to 2041, the existing infrastructure investments in approved urban communities can accommodate a significant amount of population growth without taking on additional debt.

"Directing growth to areas that have servicing capacity has a direct impact on the fiscal health of the Region," said Markham Regional Councillor Jim Jones, chair of Planning and Economic Development. "By staging growth with existing and planned infrastructure, we can better plan for current and future residents."

As part of the provincial growth plan, York Region is undergoing a Municipal Comprehensive Review (MCR) to help us plan well-designed communities that attract residents, jobs and investments and support the population to 2041 and beyond. "Planning staff, together with the consulting team at WSP, are continuously monitoring the ongoing provincial changes and has adapted the Our King Official Plan to address the in-force legislation," staff said.

As well, York Region is undertaking its Municipal Comprehensive Review (MCR) with projections through 2041. King's OP will have to conform to this when it's completed.


King is also in the process of updating its 2015 Transportation Master Plan. When this is completed, it, too, will be incorporated in the new OP.

Several open houses were held to garner public input into the plan and many residents took advantage of these sessions. All of the documents related to the OP, along with the OP itself, are available on the Township's website, at www.king.ca

The OP not only addresses planning issues, but defines goals and sets objectives; establishes a natural heritage system, and provides a framework for sustainable economic development.

Overall, the plan promotes "complete communities that foster and support healthy, active lifestyles, while continuing to protect and enhance the natural environment, agricultural and rural areas that give King its distinctive character."

Maurice Strong died in November 2015.

Here is the Preamble of the Earth Charter:

"We stand at a critical moment in Earth's history, a time when humanity must choose its future. As the world becomes increasingly interdependent and fragile, the future at once holds great peril and great promise. To move forward we must recognize that in the midst of a magnificent diversity of cultures and life forms we are one human family and one Earth community with a common destiny. We must join together to bring forth a sustainable global society founded on respect for nature, universal human rights, economic justice, and a culture of peace. Towards this end, it is imperative that we, the peoples of Earth, declare our responsibility to one another, to the greater community of life, and to future generations."

Green Party of Canada leader Elizabeth May was on of many who contributed to the writing of the Earth Charter.

The Green Party's 2019 Platform and Costing are available online at greenparty.ca. The more detailed costing will be made available online soon. In Ms May's message at the beginning, she states,

"One of the most important things you can do is vote for the kind of unwavering leadership that the climate emergency requires. Now is the time to elect a parliament that is not going to back down, compromise or waffle. We are offering you the slate of candidates and the platform that will get us where we need to go.

"We must do better and make sure that their voices are heard, yes, but we must act, and now. There isn't time for political strategies and game playing. There isn't time to succumb to partisanship and corporate influences. It is time for cooperation and quality leadership everywhere.

"It is an election. Global warming is a non-partisan issue. Bold climate action is bigger than politics so let's respect the science and the scientists who are the world's experts. They are very worried and have been for decades as we have carried on haplessly making things worse. Leaders must lead us, not ponder what the polls say and try to come up with plans to please everyone most of the time. Canada needs leaders who have the necessary vision for Canada

"Canada needs to act and to be world leaders again."

Raney pointed out only the Green Party plan will help to avert disaster and has concrete steps laid out as to how we do it.

When asked about the two parties who have governed and done nothing in the last 30 years and which have pledged not to do enough again, Ms. May has said that for Canadians the choice is not the lessor of two evils, but "the evil of two lessors."

"We need to elect Greens to parliament to make sure that there will be no more shortterm thinking, no more games or political strategies, no more disrespect for democracy and truth, but a government that knows what to do to avert climate catastrophe and how to pay for it."

Progress has been made on several issues affecting King residents, and the current MP wants to continue the work.

Deb Schulte, MP for King-Vaughan, is knee-deep in the election campaign, which will culminate Oct. 21.

She's truly enjoyed building new relationships and friendships in King Township.

The most consistent issue here is broadband and limited cell access. "Unfortunately it will take more than four years to solve the broadband/cell issue, but progress has been made and our Liberal government has committed to connect 95% of Canadians with 50/10 Mbps by 2026, and 100% by 2030. I will be dedicated to ensuring we have this issue solved in King Township in my next term."

Despite the challenges, she's found her first term to be "rewarding."

"Overall it has been a privilege to work on local priorities while also working to solve the larger issues facing Canada."

Schulte stressed the 2015 platform fo-

cused on improving the lives of middle income Canadians and those working hard to join them.

"We made it a central theme that helped to direct decision making throughout our four years. Many of our initiatives have been to try and make life more affordable for middle income Canadians and to rework the social safety net to provide better support and to reduce poverty. 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of the work she did as chair of the Standing Committee on the Environment and Sustainable Development that resulted in significant progress toward expanding our protected spaces in Canada and a \$1.3 billion investment to achieve our targets of 10% marine and coastal areas, and 17% terrestrial and freshwater, including our very own Maple Cross Nature Reserve near Pottageville. She also chaired the Liberal Seniors Caucus and was instrumental in getting improvements and the appointment of a Senior's Minister.

She admitted there is still so much more to do.

"We need to continue to build and transition our economy, especially as we move to a lower carbon future; we need to better address affordability, especially housing; we need to continue er carbon future."

to invest in infrastructure, including the changes necessary as a result of climate change. We need to make our communities safer and more livable, especially for our seniors. We need to do so much more to help build a more stable world. I am excited by all the work that is required to be done to ensure we are the best country in the world to live and raise a family."

The riding is diverse and affluent, but Schulte pointed out that more than 10% of our children are living in poverty.

"We are a large riding with rural landscapes and farms to the north, villages scattered throughout King and a semi-urban landscape to the south. I feel many of the issues facing the country are felt in our riding, so it has kept me very busy on many caucuses to make sure our community's voice is at the table as we work through the problems and bring forward solutions."

She vows to focus on getting broadband and cell service to all residents in King Township and north Vaughan.

"I will work to get the government to implement a modernized Canadian Environmental Protection Act and legislation to improve the protection of our air and water, and better manage toxins in the environment. I will continue to advocate for more affordable housing and increased economic opportunities in our riding, and for policies that will help residents with the high cost of living. I will also advocate for more action on climate change and moving to a low-




Turtle scarecrow went missing
