Crosswalk art comes to life in Schomberg

Dream it. Design it. Do it.

Just weeks after the 50th anniversary of the release of the famous Abbey Road album, Schomberg Main Street is getting its own iconic crosswalks.

Three crosswalk art installations were completed this week, featuring images reflecting the unique nature of Schomberg.

At the corner of Church and Main Street, under the eye of the Schomberg Market Day mural, Schomberg's agricultural heritage was celebrated with 2 crosswalks featuring local crops that would have been sold on Market Day. The first crosswalk features spring crops of strawberries and salad, and the second features the fall harvest of pumpkins and carrots.

These crops were carefully chosen to represent both the Holland Marsh and the highlands of Schomberg's agricultural area.

At the corner of Dr. Kay Drive and Main, a crosswalk featuring cat tails, turtles and lily pads was installed, in honour of the Dufferin Marsh, as well as the prominent use of Dr. Kay Drive by turtles as a crossing point.

It is the intent that in addition to adding visual art to the

intersection, this crosswalks will serve as a reminder to drivers to keep an eye out for turtles, especially in the Spring.

The design of the crosswalks were an outcome of a competition amongst Schomberg residents and businesses that took place in the spring. The winner of the competition was Lisa Grealish, a Main Street resident.

"I like inspiring creativity in my community," she said. "Moving from a large city to a small town, I really appreciate being a part of such an engaged community. I'm delighted to see my designs brought to life."

Ms. Grealish is also known as "The Paint Lady," and is active in the community, including spearheading the 2019 Scarecrow Competition and offering painting workshops in both her studio and local businesses.

Grealish's designs were converted to graphic files by Main Street business Speers Creative. The graphic files were then used to make stencils, which were laid out and painted over according to Cole's design. The Color-Safe® durable pavement marking material used to paint the crosswalks is also used by Toronto Pearson Airport, and is anticipated to remain vibrant for at least 5 years. Because the stencils are reusable, the crosswalks can be refreshed at any time.

What Are The Proposed Changes?

The proposed Zoning By-law Amendment submitted by Thorstone Consulting Services Inc. on behalf of owner, David Dunlap, under Planning File Z-2019-07, concerns a site located on the south side of 19th Sideroad, west of Bathurst Street. 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Federal candidates square off at Chamber event

Candidates vying to be King-Vaughan's next MP all have different party policies. Yet they all agree on several important issues.

Helping taxpayers get ahead; providing support for small business and the environment are on every party's agenda.

That was made clear at the all-candidates meeting held last Thursday at King's municipal centre, sponsored by the King Chamber of Commerce.

The four candidates representing the major parties addressed a packed house of residents and answered questions prepared by Chamber members.

Incumbent Liberal MP Deb Schulte said she's spent the past four years "building relationships" and she lauded residents for making their voices heard. She said she's been able to deliver results for the riding and fight on constituents' behalf. She thanked residents for being a "strong partner."

Conservative candidate Anna Roberts, an active community member, wants to be the voice in Ottawa. She said she's seen, first-hand the hardships facing residents and small businesses, due, in large part, to Liberal policies. She stressed we're all working hard, yet not getting ahead and "we need a change." The federal government, she said, has to listen to our community and the needs of the people.

Green Party candidate Ann Raney said all parties are recognizing that we're facing a climate emergency. She said one of the impediments to progress is that we're still too partisan and influenced too much by corporations. She said the quality of government today isn't what it used to be and we're suffering from shortsightedness. Our "patchwork" system needs to be revamped and the Greens have many forward-thinking policies.

NDP candidate Emilio Bernar-

candidate was asked to respond.

The Chamber wanted to know that policies and support systems each party would implement to help small businesses thrive.

Schulte noted that small business in the economic engine in this county. The government has cut the business tax rate, which is now the lowest of any G7 nation. They also cut red tape and changes to the process to help expedite small business requests. They are helping businesses crack many overseas markets. The Liberals are also removing the swipe fee on credit card transactions, which will save small firms money.

Roberts pointed out the federal carbon tax is killing small business and this alone has hurt job creation. The Conservatives vow to remove the carbon tax and other small business taxes. "We shouldn't penalize small businesses for taking risks," she said.

Raney said the Greens would also eliminate red tape and remove duplication and redundancies in the government. Providing a skilled workforce; encouraging innovation; improving transit options and providing students with post-secondary debt forgiveness all spark the economy and benefit small business.

Empowering workers and consumers and freeing up disposable income all help the economy, according to Bernardo-Ciddio.

The Chamber wanted to know how the parties plan to address the crushing debt and deficit, and how they plan to bring in a balanced budget and control government spending.

Roberts pointed out that Justin Trudeau promised to balance the budget when he was elected, but instead his government has added \$71 billion to the debt, which works out to a burden of \$50,000 per household in Canada. This burdens future generations. The Conservatives will live within their means by finding efficiencies and their planned changes won't adversely effect seniors or health care. decisions. There are times when spending is necessary and the new government will have to implement the costly pharmacare system. The Greens have a plan to balance the budget in their fourth year, by 2024.

Bernardo-Ciddio agreed that spending should be going in the right places and current practices need to be changed.

Schulte said Harper added \$100 billion to the debt in his term and the economy was stalled. The Liberals changed the formula and invested more money in infrastructure and got the economy going again. Today, Canada's economy is one of the best in the G7 and we're transitioning to a greener and healthier future.







During the drives between events they were planning future events, phoning reporters to correct the record (Elizabeth is adamant that what she says is right and what others say about her and the party is fair), phoning radio hosts to do live on-air interviews, and calling print reporters to do interviews. More often than not all three were on one of their 2 phones. Elizabeth seems to know everyone in politics or the media. A couple of times Elizabeth or staff



were alerted to some bad press and they would scramble to understand what was written and why.

The Greens have been at all-time my name came up. Sounded like a fun highs in the polls and that has garnered the ire of the other parties.


> In cynical times it is easy to gripe about politicians (although what other vear in the history of humanity would you rather be alive?) and our public discourse. This day left me feeling elated.



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Proposal for cluster townhomes needs revision

A proposal for a cluster of townhouses in King City needs more work, according to King councillors and staff.

P. Rotundo Enterprises an Official Plan and zoning amendments to permit 12 freehold townhomes, at the corner of King Road and King Boulevard.

The plan is to build two blocks of townhouses with six units each, measuring three storeys high. They also plan to create a private road off of King Blvd, ideally to stretch into a neighbouring project.

The .84 acre property borders the King City Public School and a residential site at 1986 King Road. Just east is the new King City Library, currently being built. The site is across the road from King City Secondary School.

The main concern, from Township planners and residents, is whether this project and its increase in density, is appropriate.

While word has it that the adjacent property at 1986 King Road will host a observed, urging the applicant to come

similar development, nothing concrete has been received by the Township.

Joanna Fast, of Evans Planning, representing the applicant, noted King City's village core will transform significantly in the next few years and this proposal is in keeping with the changes taking place.

The concept drawing presented shows a modern, flat-roof complex with driveway access to the internal private road.

Councillor Jordan Cescolini said this design doesn't seem to fit in with the traditional look of King City. He wanted the proponents to consider another design.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer, too, would like a more "heritage" look to the design. Because it's facing King Road, "it has to be done well," Schaefer pointed out.

She said that collaboration with the adjacent property owner is a good way to proceed. She's also worried that too much is being squeeze into this lot.

"I think we can do better," Cescolin

back to council with something more appropriate.

A King Boulevard resident was concerned with traffic in the area, especially that coming from the public school. This project will compound the already busy area.

An Alex Campbell Crescent resident agreed, noting they can't handle the existing traffic.

Staff noted a transportation study was prepared to evaluate the potential impacts of the proposed project on the local road network. The report noted there shouldn't be any queuing concerns with regards to vehicles traveling too and from the elementary school.

A noise feasibility study was also submitted, noting mitigation measures will be needed to reduce the noise from King Road traffic and the nearby rail line.

One more commented that King City is going through an "identity crisis" and wanted to know the end vision the Township has in mind for the village.

Another resident said the Township should limit growth and restrict projects, keeping them within established

guidelines.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini stressed King isn't growing out of a control. The Official Plan clearly states that King's population will hit just under 35,000 through 2031. Councillors have long supported a mix of housing types, especially more affordable units for those who wish to stay in the community.

Bruce Craig, on behalf of Concerned Citizens of King Township (CCKT) said they, too, have supported a variety of housing options.

Each of the 12 units will have two parking spaces, one in the garage, and one in the driveway.

Some residents note this isn't enough and the mayor agreed that parking is always a concern throughout King.

Staff believe this site is well suited for a "more intense" form of development. Many local amenities are within walking distance of the complex.

Staff is encouraging the applicant to coordinate efforts with the owners of 1986 King Road, to provide for a better internal road network and perhaps explore more options considering the larger site.

Raney pointed out the Greens are concerned about the future and jobs, not just the environment. Global economies are shifting towards renewable and sustainable systems. It's "late in the game," so the government has to "do everything" to address the climate emergency.

Bernardo-Ciddio said there's no one policy to fix the environment. Improving public transit, education and supporting green energy all improve the economy and the environment.

Schulte defended the carbon tax, noting we have to put a "price on pollution" to reduce emissions. The Liberals have introduced climate action incentives and they're phasing out coal.

Roberts countered that the carbon tax is making life more expensive for average Canadians, without punishing the big polluters. The Conservatives will push for green technology, green tax credits and green innovations.

The Chamber asked candidates to comment on infrastructure spending

and what their parties plan to do.

Bernardo-Ciddio said the NDP fully support increasing access to broadband Internet across the country, especially in rural areas.

Schulte said the feds have made historic investments in infrastructure, including transit, water, waste water systems and, at the same time, strengthening ties with municipalities.

Raney noted infrastructure is critical, but the Liberals "failed us" and delayed major projects. Gridlock is a major problem today and we have to make transit more affordable and accessible, she said. The Greens vow to contribute 1% of HST revenue to municipalities to help offset infrastructure costs.

The Chamber wanted to know whether the parties plan to change taxation in this country.

Schulte reiterated that the Liberals have lowered the small business taxes and have made measures to simplify the tax system. They want the tax system to be fair across the board, and they will also close loopholes.

Roberts pointed out that small busi-

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levels and government imposed regulations that saw increases to CPP and EI. The carbon tax, too, has added another burden.

Raney said the Greens favour removing taxes on everyday essentials and added them to other areas. The party has a fully costed platform and they also favour closing capital gains tax loopholes.

Bernardo-Ciddio said we're already paying too much and we shouldn't be punished by more taxes. Taxing the wealthy and large corporations, he said, isn't punishment.

The organizers opened the floor to questions from the public, which generated a productive discussion.


One man pointed out he moved here from Hamilton and now pays twice as much in rent. He wanted to know what the parties will do to improve affordable housing.

Roberts said she has a financial background and the Conservatives will revamp the stress test for homebuyers, as well as stretch the amortization period to 30 years.

The Greens want more affordable housing and Raney said they encourage converting existing housing to rental units. They also vow to give students a break on their debt payments, which will help them afford apartments.

Bernardo-Ciddio said he feels for young people and the NDP will increase the stock of affordable housing. The key, he said, is also in providing well paid jobs to allow people to afford the cost of living.

The Liberals, Schulte said, are putting measures in place to increase af-



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ness simply can't afford current tax fordable housing. She acknowledged that people are stretched.

A balanced budget is on the minds of residents and one man wanted to know how the parties will address our debt.

Bernardo-Ciddio said we're a wealthy nation and fair taxation will strengthen the economy.

Schulte said the Liberals have put more money in the pockets of middle income earners and that stimulates the economy. They're making key investments and always keeping an eye on reducing the deficit.

Roberts said taxing corporations will only reduce jobs and politicians have to be accountable and live within our means. The Conservatives will find efficiencies to reduce the debt.

Raney said the Green platform will see a surplus by 2022-23.

One resident wanted to know what happened to electoral reform, a promise broken by the Trudeau Liberals.

Schulte said they held consultation sessions across the country and the consensus from the public was to keep the status quo.

Roberts pointed out in private corporations if you make promises to the shareholders, you have to keep them. Politicians have to be accountable.


Ranev said the Greens have long felt there's too much power in the Prime Minister's Office and they would allow MPs to vote without toeing the party line. The Greens "won't whip the vote," she said, adding they will change what they see as undemocratic process-

Bernardo-Ciddio said you can't have electoral reform when there's a 39% voter turnout for elections. The key is better education and an emphasis on encouraging the public to participate much more. We can't focus on democracy when "we're focussed on paying bills and fighting to survive."

A question of ethics and conduct had the candidates agree that politicians have to be held to higher standards.

Roberts said some of the prime minster's conduct has been unacceptable. The Conservatives vow to implement the No More Cover Up Act, which brings back accountability and transparency.

The Greens place a great deal of importance on the integrity of their MPs and leader.





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York students outperform peers

Students in York Region schools are taking their homework seriously. Results released by the Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) show that York students continue to outperform provincial averages in the province-wide testing.

At the high school level of the York Region District School, of the 8,783 Grade 10 students who wrote the 2019 Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) for the first time, 89% were successful, compared with an average success rate of 80% among all school districts across Ontario.

For the Grade 9 mathematics assessment, 90% of York Region public secondary students in the "Academic" stream and 45% of students in the "Applied" stream achieved the provincial standard. This compares with a provincial average of 84% of "Academic" stream students and 44% of "Applied" stream students who achieved the standard.

"We are pleased to see our students continue to perform above the provincial average. Through our new Multi-Year Strategic Plan, our board of trustees demonstrate our commitment to student success," said Corrie McBain, chair of the York Region District School Board. "YRDSB continues to focus on student achievement and well-being."

"Along with other classroom assessment and student demographic data collected from our Every Student Counts Survey, we will use EQAO data to help us better meet the needs of our underserved and underperforming students," said Louise Sirisko, director of education, York Region District School Board.

The OSSLT has been administered each year since 2002 by the EQAO. Passing the test or alternatively, the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Course, is a requirement for high school graduation.

The trend is also evident among York Catholic school students.

The OSSLT showed these students outpace their provincial peers in all areas of testing.

"We are very proud of our students and staff for the high level of achievement they consistently demonstrate throughout the school year," said Ab Falconi, YCDSB director of education. "We also recognize the role that EQAO scores play in the overall assessment of our students; providing additional data to assist York Catholic in achieving its commitment to continuous improvement of student achievement, as outlined in our Multi-Year Strategic Plan."

Writing continues to be a strong area of achievement at YCDSB, especially in Grade 6, with 91 per cent of Grade 6 students meeting or exceeding the provincial standard, compared to 82 per cent provincially. Grade 9 applied math increased 6 per cent over the previous year and Grade 9 academic math made a modest gain to end up 4 per cent ahead of the provincial average.

"EQAO assessments provide a snap shot of all of the wonderful work that takes place in our schools every day," noted Dominic Mazzotta, board chair. "Thank you to our educators, students and parents for taking a faith-filled and values-driven approach to their ongoing commitment to improving student achievement."

Grade 3, 6 and 9 EQAO results reflect the average of all students who met or exceeded provincial expectations, including those students who provided no data due to absence, medical reasons, etc.

In 2019, 97 per cent of 3,490 Grade 3 students, and 98 per cent of 3,898 Grade 6 students participated in the EQAO assessment.

At the secondary level, 99 per cent of the 3,571 students enrolled in academic math courses who were eligible to take the Grade 9 EQAO Math Test participated, and 98 per cent of the 739 students enrolled in applied math courses who were eligible to take the test participated.

For the Grade 10 Literacy Test, 98 per cent of the 4,083 students who were eligible to take the test for the first time fully participated in the assessment. Successful completion of the OSSLT (or the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Course) is one of the 32 requirements students must meet to graduate and obtain a high school diploma.

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
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
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
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Crucifix restored at church

With great anticipation and excitement, the pastor and church community celebrated the unveiling on Sunday Sept. 21, during all the masses.



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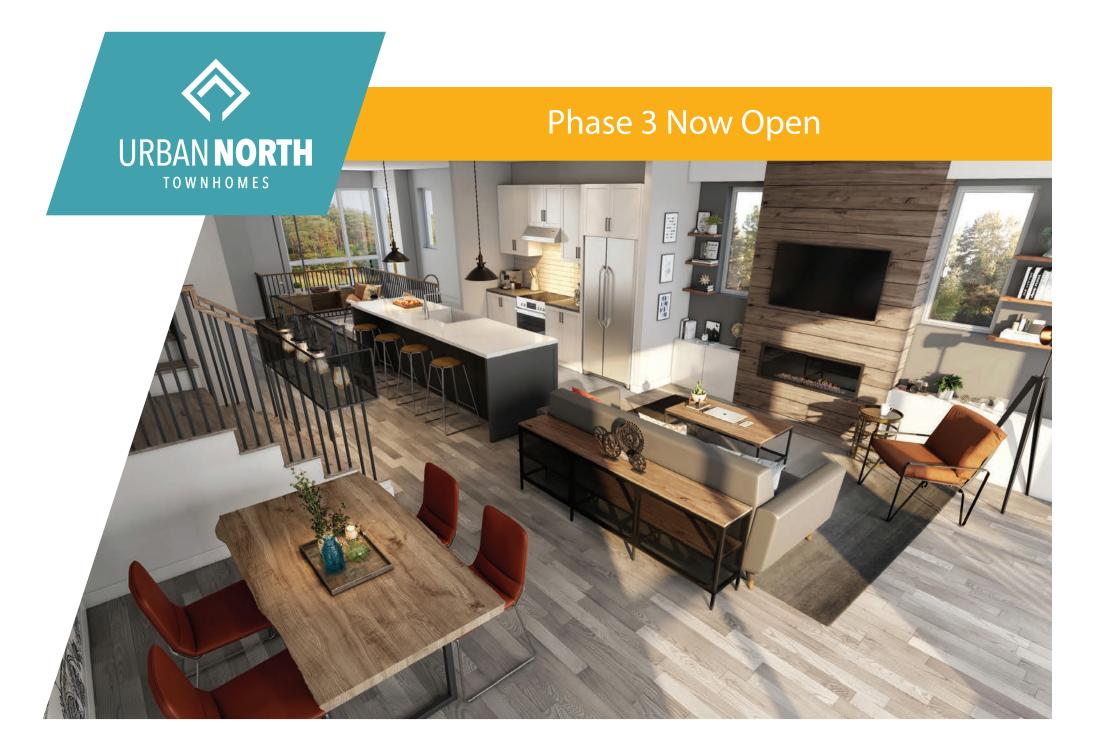


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

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
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
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Cougars beat up on Siskins for second straight win

The roller coaster rolls on for the Schomberg Cougars, who broke a fourgame losing streak over the weekend with a pair of lopsided victories.

The Junior C club picked up four points over the Orillia Terriers and the Stayner Siskins to move to a .500 record, early on in the Provincial Junior Hockey League season.

Six different Schomberg players got on the board on Thursday at the Trisan Centre, in a 6-3 win over Orillia. Brandon Cohen put Schomberg up early on the power play in the second minute, before Harris Goan and Matthew Wadge put the game fairly out of reach before the end of the first period.

York9 FC fail to solve Forge in match

Bragging rights will remain with Hamilton as kings of the 905.

The most recent iteration of the bitter rivalry between the York9 FC and Hamilton's Forge FC squads, come to be known as "the 905 Derby," saw Forge walk away with a 1-0 clean sheet in front of a home crowd at Tim Hortons Field on Sunday.

It was enough to secure Forge's spot at the top of the Canadian Premier League rankings in their third straight win, while York picked up their first loss since mid-September.

"I thought my guys did a good job today," said York9 head coach Jim Brennan after the match. "Every day we've got to keep building. Getting stronger and better. And I think we're on the right track. We've been playing some good football, the guys are working harder, but obviously we're disappointed today."

It wasn't until the 70th minute when the game's only goal found the back of the net, following a controversial penalty call on York's Diyaeddine Abzi. Abzi's forearm made contact with the ball on a blocked shot in the box, prompting Forge's Tristan Borges to take the penalty kick, where he beat keeper Nathan Ingham on an incorrect guess.

Brennan said his team "definitely had (their) chances."

Perhaps the best came in injury time in the second half, when York9 was given a penalty chance of their own after Rodrigo Gattas was hauled down in the box on a free kick. Gattas stepped up to the line for his team's last chance, though he sent the ball wide before the final whistle was blown.

While Forge has been able to make a name for themselves in the CPL's inaugural season, keeping their spot at the top of the table while moving to a 3-0-1 record against the York squad, York9's debut has been nothing short of a roller coaster: stints at both the top and bottom of the standings ladder have averaged out to a record of 5-8-2, good enough for fourth spot in the seven team fall competition.

Heading into the final week of the CPL schedule, York will have three more chances to send their record to the .500 level, beginning with a hosting of Forge at York Lions Stadium this Saturday at 3:30 p.m.


"Going into this game, we expected a battle, considering we lost the last two contests to them," said Frustaglio, adding that St. Ignatius has developed their fair share of NCAA Division I players throughout the years.

"We had nothing to lose, and it happened so fast you really don't have much time to think , and the football gods were on our side and we tied it up. For me, kicking the game-winning point was just like kicking any other point, you put your head down, keep your eye on the ball, hope that the snapper and the ball holder do their job, and just kick...even though I could hear the crowd of the home team."

Knocking off the fourth-ranked team in the state, winners of 11 state championships, and 28th-ranked team in the entire nation, Frustaglio said was "the greatest feeling ever."

On the other side of the ball for Football North was fellow King native Adrian Facciponte, who posted eight tackles in a stellar performance on defense. Both Frustaglio and Facciponte spent three years with the Vaughan Rebels, before joining the Football North program two years ago.

"Adrian is a fierce competitor, a true leader, and captain of our defensive line," said Frustaglio. "(He) motivates you and pushed you every day to be the best you can be."

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
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al significance.

Local man charged in illegal grow-op

A local man is among several charged in an illegal cannabis grow-op in King Township.

Investigators with the York Regional Police Organized Crime Bureau – Guns, Gangs and Drug Enforcement Unit, have charged three people and seized more than \$4.7 million dollars in illegal cannabis in connection with a grow operation operated by organized crime.

In July 2019, officers began an investigation into a suspected illegal outdoor marihuana grow operation located on Highway 11, in King. Through the investigation, officers learned that there was a licence through Health Canada, which allowed 475 outdoor plants and 124 indoor plants at one time. Officers discovered that there were well over 2,000 plants being grown at the location.

On Sept. 27, a Cannabis Act Warrant was executed and three people who were located at the location were arrested and have been charged.

Officers seized a total of 2,360 plants and approximately 10 pounds of dried ready-for-packaging marihuana. The total street value of the drugs seized is more than \$4.7 million. A 31-year-old King man, along with a 56-year-old Oshawa man and a 44-year-old Markham were all charged with Producing Cannabis, Possession of Cannabis for the Purpose of Distribution.

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
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
