Measures needed to address speeding in King

A discussion at King council on stop signs led to a full blown debate on speeding and traffic calming measures across the municipality.

As councillors discussed the need for all-way stop signs in a couple of locations, the bigger picture emerged – something has to be done to curb speeding on streets and roads.

The Township is in the midst of reviewing its transportation policies and a few local hot spots brought the issue to the forefront.

Council approved putting up an all-way stop at the intersection of Elizabeth Grove and Patton Street in King City.

This spot has been notorious for speeding, and Councillor Jordan Cescolini asked staff to looking into the all-way stop. Such measures are at the discretion of the municipality and staff agreed with the move.


Staff said there have been speeding and traffic volume issues in this area, as a result of the expansion of the GO station. The matter was exacerbated after a no-through prohibition on Burton Grove at Keele, back in 2014.


Traffic counter devices were set up on Elizabeth Grove, but results didn't indicate a speeding problem. The data didn't support the warrants required for an all-way stop under Ontario Traffic Manual (OTM) guidelines.

Staff sided with the residents on this one.

"It has been advocated by residents through observation, that an all-way stop condition may be beneficial during peak traffic periods, including providing greater gaps in traffic along Patton Street for safer ingress/egress from local driveways. Additionally, during peak periods it has been alleged by members of the public that Elizabeth Grove eastbound left turns onto Patton substantively cut the northwest corner during the rush, which then forces southbound right turning vehicles on Patton Street to stop well short of the stop sign, creating an unsafe condition," staff noted.



### NOTICE OF INTENTION TO PASS AMENDING **BY-LAW TO REMOVE IN PART HOLDING (H) SYMBOL**

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of King intends to consider an amending by-law under Section 36 of the Planning Act to remove the Holding (H) symbol in part for the lands described below. The earliest Council will consider passage of the by-law is the Council Meeting on November 18, 2019 at 6:00 p.m. at the Township of King Council Chambers located at 2585 King Road, King City, ON.

The proposed amendment to the Zoning By-law submitted by Edgecore Investments Inc. (Fandor Homes) under Planning File Z-2019-12 concerns Phase 1 of the Via Moto subdivision which is to include 35 single detached residential dwellings and eight medium density townhouse dwelling units, together with blocks for stormwater management, open space/environmental, and parkland purposes. The lands are located north of King Road, west of Highway 27 in the Village of Nobleton as shown on the map below.

The subject property is currently zoned Residential - Single Detached - Exception 27 (R1-27), Residential - Single Detached - Exception 28 (R1-28), Residential - Single Detached - Exception 29 (R1-29), Residential - Single Detached - Exception 30 (R1-30), Residential Townhouse - Exception 7 (R3-7), Open Space (O), Environmental Protection (EP). All zones aside from the Open Space and Environmental Protection zones are subject to Holding (H) provisions. The removal of the Holding (H) symbol will permit the construction of the dwelling units within Phase 1 of the Via Moto subdivision. The Holding (H) provision is to remain for Phases 2 and 3 of the subdivision.



ANY PERSON may attend the Council Meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the removal of the Holding (H) symbol. If you wish to be notified of the decision of the approval authority, the Township of King, in respect of the amending by-law, you must make a written request to the Clerk of the Township of King.

# Staff to review several locations for stop signs

Staff also said this area has become an "unofficial bypass" to the core during peak periods. The bottom line is the all-way stop, along with the painted bars, "will help improve safety at the intersection" based on public opinion.

A local resident said the Township needs to be proactive and this area presents terrible dangers for pedestrians. Children's safety should come first, she said.

Some residents also called for speed reductions on the streets. Another called for increased police presence in the community.

Councillor Cescolini said many parents are concerned and the all-way stop is part of the solution.

Councillor Avia Eek encouraged residents to file online complaints with York Regional Police. They will respond and visit the area to clamp down on infractions.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini stressed that speeding is the number one issue throughout the township. "The safety of our kids is paramount," he observed. He even likes the idea of using a decommissioned police cruiser stationed at strategic points as a deterrent. YRP, he noted, is receptive to any form of deterrent. The mayor praised the speed humps on Patricia and Burton Grove

consultative approach and plan across the municipality.

Councillor Bill Cober said resident should know that council and staff are serious about this issue. He said more measures will come in the spring of 2020.

### **Rural stop sign**

Councillor Jakob Schneider pressed council in supporting an all-way stop at the intersection of another trouble spot – 16th Sideroad and 10th Concession. Again, the area did not meet the warrant and stop signs are not recommended for speed control.

However, concern and several near misses at the spot prompted staff and council to approve the all-way stop.

Staff reported that manual traffic counts were done during the week of Aug. 9 and results didn't show volumes were substantive.

"Although the ongoing traffic analysis has not indicated a need for stop signs at the 16th Sideroad (northerly) and 10th Concession, some residents of the area continue to request their installation," staff pointed out.

They suggested the all-way stop be implemented on a trial basis.

Former councillor Linda Pabst pointed out large farm machinery uses these

as being effective and he said we need a roads and speeding is a concern. "We ting up stop signs across the township want to keep our roads safe, and keep the speeds down," she said. Stop signs will prompt motorists to at least slow down. She even asked staff to consider stop signs on the 11th all the way from King Road to Highway 9.

Schneider told councillors he was in a collison n that area while driving farm equipment and he's witnessed several close calls. The need is obvious, he said, pointing out rural areas need the same traffic consideration. "This is still an agricultural community," he observed

Cober agreed the 11th is a commuter route and he wanted staff to monitor traffic on the 8th Concession as well.

Mayor Pellegrini said simply put-

isn't the way to go. Council needs expert advice before making drastic traffic changes. He wants to know whether stop signs are the traffic calming measures best suited to address the issue.

"Let's look at this wholistically," he said.

The mayor has historically criticized local motorists for speeding in their own back yards. He once again pointed to a lack of respect for the rules of the road across King.

"This is your community, slow down," he said.

Schneider asked staff how soon they begin to review and evaluate the trouble spots and staff noted it would take a couple of months.

#### Background


In September of 2016, the Township of King initiated a Schedule 'B' Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) for the reconstruction of 15th Sideroad from Regional Road 27 to Concession Road 8, a distance of approximately 2.1 km, as illustrated in the study map. The municipality hosted a Public information Centre on October 3, 2019 to present the alternative solutions under consideration for the Preferred Solution.

Subsequent to a review of comments received from all stakeholders, the Township of King has selected Alternative 3 as the Preferred Alternative which proposes improvements to the existing cross-section to Township standards, pavement

structure, road surface and overall conditions of the road including improvements to sightlines. Improvements to overall drainage will include the replacement of two large existing road crossing culverts and extra pavement on the north shoulder to allow for active transportation.



This project has followed a Schedule 'B' planning and design process in accordance with the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (Oct. 2000, as amended 1007, 2011 & 2015). A Project File Report has been prepared to document the Class EA process and by this Notice is being placed in the



public record for a 30 day public review and comment period. A digital copy of the Project File Report will be available on the Township of King's website on November 14, 2019 at www.king.ca. A hard copy of the document will also be available for review during regular business hours on or after November 14, 2019 at the following location:




# Letter to the Editor Civil servants should consider the common good

My congratulations to Mark Pavilons, on his well worded article on civil servants and teachers ("Job action, union pressure nothing new," Sentinel, Oct. 31).


I fully agree with him that everyone should be treated fairly and to the contribution we make to the well-being of our country.

### How do I prevent a heating fire?

- Have your heating system and chimneys inspected and cleaned annually by a qualified service technician.
- Ensure all outside heating vents are not blocked.
- Ensure woodstoves, fireplaces and fireplace inserts are installed by a qualified technician according to manufacturer's instructions.
- Always use a fire screen around the fireplace.
- Allow ashes from your woodstove or fireplace to cool before emptying them into a metal container with a tight-fitting lid. Keep the container outside.



All homes with a fuel-burning appliance, fireplace or attached garage must have a working carbon monoxide alarm installed outside all sleeping areas.


I am not the only Green candidate who will continue to work with neighbours to help move us all forward preparing for the future as well as helping to secure a future in which our children can thrive, not just survive.

"The trick is to get people in their comfort zone," he said. Browsing and viewing online advertising should look and feel "natural."


Often, a professional is needed to help customers design and build the platforms that work. A strong brand message is vital to creating a professional impression, he pointed out.

# *Remember Schomberg' Facebook page offers a glimpse into the town's history*

In the age of the Internet, it's easier than ever to remember what once was forgotten.

A Facebook page based in Schomberg has set out on a mission to do just that, uncovering pictures and memories of what the town once was decades and centuries ago. Created in March of 2018, and run by a resident of Schomberg for over 40 years, "Remember Schomberg" curates photos from years past, resulting in never-before-seen pictures and artifacts being brought to the public for the very first time.

Photos of the Schomberg Fair throughout the past 100 years, a postcard from 1912, local flyers from the 1960s, and personal pictures of residents and events long since passed are just a few of the treasures to be seen on the page, which operates through a submission system. Local residents from the Schomberg area submit photos of events or objects from years past, which are then published alongside an explanation of what that moment represented in the tapestry of local history.

What started as a passion project for the operator of the page has now evolved into a vibrant community of fellow Schomberg history enthusiasts. As it has been operated anonymously since its founding, the group has grown purely through word-of-mouth. Less than two years after its founding, nearly 500 current and former Schombergians follow the page. The operator prefers anonymity, they say, to keep attention on the his-

tory itself.

"When things are gone, they're gone forever," they asserted. "Schomberg has changed. It's so important to remember the way we were. It's not about me, it's about the history."

As for a favourite memory that has been brought to the forefront through the page?

"Wayne Dove. As a little boy" stated the moderator, referencing a friend who since passed, formerly of Dove's Meat Market in Schomberg. "He was a very, very respected member of the community. And to see him there was very emotional for a lot of people". (Submitted by Mary Dove)

The driving purpose for "Remember Schomberg" is to shine the spotlight on those who may not ever appear in the history books and, as the page proclaims, to connect residents who have put down roots in Schomberg with those that have flown the coop.

"I think we should be aware of the people that shaped Schomberg. They created the history. We need to know who these people are."

### Former King physician remembered


A former King City physician has passed away recently.

Dr. James Alexander McPhee, 94, passed away peacefully with family at his side at Royal Victoria Hospital in Barrie on Oct. 8.

Jim grew up in the small rural community of Ophir near Sault Ste. Marie. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in March of 1943. He was shot down over Germany during active duty in November of 1944. He was captured and held as a prisoner of war until his escape in May of 1945.

Jim practiced family medicine in Gravenhurst, King City, and Richmond Hill until his retirement in 1992. Jim continued working until 2009 at the age of 84, assisting in the orthopedic surgical unit at York Central Hospital (now Mackenzie Health). During his career, he was active in the establishment of York Central Hospital, where he also served on the Medical Advisory Committee and for a time as Chief of Staff. He was a past-president of the Ontario College of Family Physicians.

Jim had a lifelong love of music and the outdoors which he shared with his many beloved friends and family.







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

Military historians tend to focus on the great wars of the 20th century.

But some colonial conflicts have had much more far-reaching ramifications on the evolution of North American society.


King historian and author Gavin Watt has combed through the intricacies of a monumental 18th century conflict. In his new book, "No Despicable Enemy, 1779: The Continental Army destroys Indian Territory," Watt delves into the "incredibly complex," worldwide conflict of 1779, which had sprung from America's four-year revolt. In the 440-page book, Watt explains the inability of the Crown's commanders in New York City and Quebec to keep pace with their ever-expanding challenges.

This was the year that the American Congress and General Washington decided to invade and destroy the Six Nations' Indian Territory.

"There is the general view that this invasion was intended to eliminate a particularly noxious foe that had been destroying their army's sources of provisions. While that was certainly the case, investigation also indicates that Washington, who was himself a major land developer, had a view to the war's end and the opening up of Indian Territory to white expansion," Watt notes.

By this stage of the conflict, the French had openly entered the war on the side of the American rebels and were not only supplying vast supplies of military stores, but were also sending volumes of troops to the Continent and setting their sizeable navy to oppose Britain's Royal Navy.

Now that the French had entered the war, they deployed substantial numbers



of large warships that threatened British interests not only in North America, but also in the West Indies, the Mediterranean and across the world.

In 1779, Spain allied with France and the threat became even greater. Britain was only a middling land power and had been compelled to turn the seven German principalities to field troops against the American rebellion. Its navy had formerly been dominant 'round the world, but with the French/ Spanish combination, they no longer ruled the waves. Not only were the West Indies threatened (which many Britons saw as much more important than the American colonies), but even Britain itself.

"In short, the rebellion had now turned into a World War and there was

much to occupy the British government and its army commanders than simply what the American rebels were up to," he said.

"Of course, the entry of France into the war had a strong effect on Quebec and Governor Frederick Haldimand had worries about what might happen if the French and rebels combined to invade his province. He had so very few troops to defend lower Quebec and the upper posts which reached out west to Detroit and Michilimackinac. The American rebels clearly understood his concerns and cleverly threatened invasions, which he could not ignore. Consequently, his mind was diverted from the flood of intelligence he was receiving about a likely invasion of his native allies' homeland.

Watt pointed out this is a very complex story "and very difficult to deal with, as there are so many undercurrents."

Watt answers the questing why mount a major effort against the Six Nations in particular?

In the northeast, the Six Nations (Iroquois/Haudenosaune) Confederacy was the most powerful, and most influential, of the native groupings. The Confederacy's towns stretched from just west of Schenectady on the Mohawk River to through modern New York State and southwest into Pennsylvania. For many decades, the Mohawks' towns along the river of that name had been surrounded by white settlement. By 1779, the majority of the Fort Hunter, Schoharie and Canajoharie townspeople had been forced away from their homes by the rebels. The Fort Hunters ultimately went to Quebec and set up a temporary settlement at Lachine, whereas the other two townsfolk went west and southwest into Indian Territory.

All the other Iroquois towns were on the far side of the line demarking Indian Territory, however, the Oneidas' towns were close to a rebel fortress at the western terminus of the Mohawk River and came under the rebel influence, bringing with them the Tuscaroras.

Those who remained allied to the British Crown, including the exiled Mohawks, waged a relentless guerilla war along the settled frontiers, destroying mills, farms, houses, running off horses and cattle, and killing rebel farm folk and soldiers.

The primary result of the Continental Armies' destruction of so many towns, emerged three years later when Britain had lost the war. Then, a great many of those Indians sought permanent refuge in Quebec Province, which at that time included Ontario. That's why we have the town of Deseronto, named after a Fort Hunter War Captain named Deserontyon, and the several settlements along the Grand River near Brantford.

This campaign of wholesale destruction had considerable racist overtones.

Watt, who's written extensively on prominent early military campaigns, said this is his last book.

He's dealt with every campaign year of the war, and traced the history of every Loyalist military unit that served in Canada and later settled therein. Also, some medical issues may prevent him from doing the intense research for another book.

Watt has studied Canada's role in the American Revolution for 40 years and has 11 books published on the subject. He pursues a life-long interest in military history and has re-enacted in four historical eras. Gavin is a honourary vice-president of the United Empire Loyalists' Association and often speaks at historical societies' meetings.

# Ontario beating fiscal targets, investing in priorities

Finance Minister Rod Phillips released the 2019 Ontario Economic Outlook and Fiscal Review: A Plan to Build Ontario Together — which maintains the government's commitment to balance the budget by 2023-24 through prudent fiscal management while making strategic investments in critical public services, and strengthening the conditions for job creation.

The government has a balanced plan for every Ontario community, with support for Central Ontario including:

• Helping people across Ontario find a place to live that meets their needs and budget, including those in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA), which is experiencing an affordability challenge, with More Homes, More Choice: Ontario's Housing Supply Action Plan.

• Building and renewing schools, including a new elementary school in North Ajax, which when complete, will include space for 558 students and an EarlyON Child and Family Centre.

• Building more transit options, including the Hurontario LRT, Eglinton Crosstown LRT. Finch West LRT. and York Viva Bus Rapid Transit.

• Improving highways, including expanding an 18-kilometre stretch of Highway 401 from the Credit River Bridge in the City of Mississauga to Regional Road 25 in Town of Milton to ease traffic congestion, and constructing a twin structure for the Garden City Skyway on the Queen Elizabeth Way in the City of St. Catharines.

• Investing up to \$43 million to support the Region of Waterloo's King-Victoria Transit Hub in downtown Kitchener to allow transit commuters to seamlessly connect to LRT lines in Waterloo Region, GO rail and bus services, Via Rail services and local and intercommunity bus services.

• Working with six GTA hospitals and their community partners — Humber River Hospital, Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre, Southlake Regional Health Centre, Unity Health Toronto's St. Joseph's Health Centre, William Osler Health System and Trillium Health Partners — to establish a total of 250 tion Care Centre - Church site. This investment will provide patients with rehabilitation care and services as they transition from a hospital to a home, community or long-term care setting.

• Investing \$1.07 million in 2019–20 in the Abilities Centre in Whitby to expand programming and opportunities for people of all ages and abilities.

· Building safer communities by investing \$3.9 billion over 10 years in justice infrastructure, including funding new courthouses in Toronto and Halton Region and replacing aging Ontario Provincial Police detachments across the province, including in Orillia.

• Fighting gun and gang violence with the new Intensive Firearm Bail Team in Peel Region to support bail hearings and proceedings for gun-related offences in the GTA, and through a Gun and Gang Violence Fund to support projects and partnerships in the GTA and Greater Golden Horseshoe area to target organized crime and gang operations.

• Helping people get good quality jobs by transforming Ontario's employment services with a new model that better responds to the needs of the Province's changing economy, which will launch in the Peel Region, Hamilton-Niagara and Muskoka-Kawarthas beginning in December 2019.

• Supporting the 2021 Canada Games by committing to a cost-shared investment of \$29 million for the construction of new sport facilities, which will support athletes and bring new jobs to Niagara Region.

Ontario is proposing to reduce the small business Corporate Income Tax rate to 3.2 per cent from 3.5 per cent starting January 1, 2020.

The government is taking steps to end hallway health care with a \$68 million investment in small- and medium-sized and multi-site hospitals to help maintain critical capacity and respond to increased demand in communities across the province. This is in addition to the \$384 million that was announced in the 2019 Budget.

## Pay the Mortgage or Contribute to an RRSP?

It's a common dilemma for many Canadians – should you pay down your mortgage or contribute to a Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) instead?

Unfortunately, there's no easy or definitive answer. What works for one person may not work for another. It all depends on your particular circumstances, plus factors related to economic conditions and developments in the financial markets.

To help you determine what might be right for you, here are some issues to consider.

*Interest rates* – How much will you save by paying down the mortgage? You might find historically low interest rates to be a factor in favour of investing in an RRSP. That's because paying off a low-rate mortgage doesn't offer the same level of savings as paying off a higher-rate mortgage. But remember that as rates move up, mortgage savings could take on renewed importance. Higher rates mean higher interest costs, which means you'll probably save more by reducing or eliminating your mortgage principal. When it's time to renew at higher rates, you'll have less of an outstanding mortgage.

*Investment returns* – How much can you earn on your investments? Remember, an RRSP boosts returns by allowing your investments to grow within a tax-deferred environment. And don't forget the immediate tax break your annual RRSP contribution provides. You need to determine whether the returns from a lump sum put into your RRSP will be greater than the amount saved by paying down the mortgage. This decision needs to be shaped by a long-term view, looking at both interest rates and investment returns.

*Other debt* – If you have high-interest debt such as credit card balances, it usually makes sense to pay that off before focusing on your mortgage or RRSP.

*Your age* – Remember that contributions to an RRSP at an early age can make a big difference in helping you reach your long-term financial goals. The earlier you get money into a retirement plan, the longer it will have to grow in a tax-deferred manner.

*Other retirement income* – If you have a workplace pension that will help finance retirement, or other sources of future income, it may make more sense to pay down the mortgage. Once the mortgage is paid off, you can concentrate on your RRSP.

*Missed RRSP contributions* – RRSP rules allow you to make up for missed contributions. If you have unused contribution room from past years, that's another consideration to take into account. Again, you'll need to assess whether the returns after making up for those missed contributions will be greater than the amount saved by paying down the mortgage.

Also remember that the mortgage-versus-RRSP decision does not have to be "either-or." The best scenario for many people is contributing to an RRSP as well as paying down the mortgage. For example, you could make your RRSP contribution each year, and then pay down a portion of the mortgage principal using the tax refund generated by your RRSP contribution.

Consult with your financial advisor to help you weigh your options and choose a course of action that makes the most sense for you.














Words to Live by – Luke's Gospel states clearly that those who are worthy "can no longer die" and that " He is not the God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive."




