## Opposition to large complex plan in King City

A revamped proposal for an apartment complex in King City – much bigger than a previous bid – has been met with some trepidation by members of the public and council alike.

A virtual public meeting was held recently, to hear about the plans by 2472498 Ontario Inc. to build a six-storev. 161-apartment building at the corner of Elizabeth Grove and Keele Street. The plan also calls for 281 square metres of ground-floor commercial space. Parking will be provided in three underground levels, along with 12 spots at grade. Access to the site will include two full-turn driveways, one from Clearview Crescent and another from Elizabeth Grove.

The owners first applied in 2016, for a plan that includ-

ed 48 stacked townhouses in two, four-storey buildings.

This meeting was the first time residents had a chance to comment on the newest proposal.

This application presents some challenges, largely because previous amendments to the Official Plan and zoning bylaw were appealed to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal. While this proceeds through the process, the new plan was set in motion through the mandatory public meeting.

The lands are designated "core area" and existing commercial" in the King City Community Plan. This allows for developments of this nature, with a maximum height of three stories. King's new Official Plan, however, does permit a six-storey maximum in certain circumstances.

Also, under the new OP, this area will be designated as "Transit Station Area," which encourages residential development with limited amounts of commercial.



## Proposal for complex has grown substantially

Staff is currently reviewing the plan, and will update council on the LPAT hearing.

While residents like the idea of replacing the existing garage with residential development, this new bid isn't remotely close to the original one.

This new application is treated as any proposal to the Township and will be dealt with separately from the LPAT

Murray Evans, consultant for the applicant, noted the appeal was submitted under the former OMB rules. He noted the application has changed significantly since that appeal was filed.

The applicant purchased more land in the area, and that's why he increased the magnitude of the project. They will include mostly 1- and 2-bedroom units of roughly 500 square feet. Evans pointed out that council did, in fact, approve a 6-storey complex nearby so there is a precedent. Resident Daiana Silvestre said King City is experiencing exponential growth. The grandeur of this particular building doesn't fit in with the surrounding community and it will bring in many more residents, putting more pressing on the village. She questions whether King City can accommodate such new growth. She doesn't feel this building is aligned with the vision for King City.

Resident Dennis Mooney said the first was rejected by council and this new one will be larger than anything existing in King City. It's simply too big and too intrusive.

### More charges laid against physician

A physician practising in King faces even more charges.

Investigators with the York Regional Police Special Victims Unit – Sexual Assault Section, laid additional charges against a 49-year-old doctor after 11 additional victims came forward to report that they had been sexually assaulted at a medical clinic in the Township of King.

The investigation began in August 2020, when two female victims, 49 and 28, came forward to report they had been sexually assaulted by their doctor during visits to their medical clinic. The investigation revealed that from 2008 to 2017, the victims had attended appointments at the Schomberg Medical Centre, located at 17250 Highway 27. During the appointments, they were sexually assaulted.

Investigators released the name and photo of the accused, which helped 11 additional victims to come forward to report. Each of the victims described similar

experiences of being sexually assaulted while they were attending appointments. One of the additional victims was 17 years old at the time she was sexually assaulted.

Investigators believe that this doctor practiced at the Schomberg Medical Centre as well as other clinics in southern Ontario and want to ensure that there are no further victims. Anyone with information is asked to come for-

Wameed Ateyah of Richmond Hill has been charged with Sexual Assault x19, Sexual Exploitation x1.

A sexual assault includes any non-consensual contact of a sexual nature. York Regional Police would like to encourage anyone who feels they may have been a victim of a sexual assault to come forward and report the incident to police. There is no statute of limitations for sexual offences and offenders can be prosecuted well after the date of

### Political speed limit on road

Do you know that the speed limit on some sections of the King-Vaughan Road has been raised to 70 km-h, on that miserable, little road with treacherous, deep ditches, no shoulders and lousy intersections?

Raising the speed limit above the perceived, safe line by the authorities in charge is the help call for the mid-region's road planning and building pro-

King-Vaughan-Stouffville Road could be an important, straight line transportation link between Highways 400 and 404 and beyond. But King-Vaughan Road does not exist between Yonge and Bathurst Street. To bridge that gap one has to go through residential areas and 6 pollution-raising stops.

A missing link is common to all roads North of Major Mackenzie: Teston, Kirby, King-Vaughan, King, Bloomington, Vandorf, Wellington. Of course, this is a great impediment to east-west traffic in this busy part of the region.

To overcome this problem an extension from the GTA West Corridor to Highway 404 would be a sensible solution.

The proposed Official Plan Amendment and Zoning By-law Amendment applications were submitted by Weston Consulting, on behalf of the owner, Yellow Horizon Homes Ltd. The applications concern a property located on the north side of Dew Street, east of William Street and south of King Boulevard. The subject property measures 0.86 acres and has 30.45 metres of frontage on Dew Street. The property supports a single detached dwelling with driveway access onto Dew Street. The proposal is to develop 5 single detached dwelling on the subject property which is to be serviced by a condominium road.

#### What Are The Proposed Amendments?

The subject property is designated 'Existing Low Density Residential Area' by the King City Community Plan (OPA 540) and is zoned Residential - Single Detached "C" (R1C) by Zoning By-law 2017-66, as amended. Comments received and considered in the preparation of the By-law 2020-043 from the public were summarized and included in the Growth Management Services Recommendation Report (GMS-2020-10). The report is available on the Township's website www.king.ca. Planning staff have responded to all correspondence received in relation to the amendments to maximum lot coverage and minimum pervious surface requirements have been responded to. Planning staff note that the amendments apply only to the lots and development within the residential exception zones identified in By-law 2020-043. New and ongoing development applications will be reviewed independently of these amendments.

The purpose of By-law 2020-043 was to amend the Zoning By-law for the Schomberg and King City Urban Areas (By-law 2017-66) to revise the provisions for maximum permitted lot coverage and minimum pervious surface areas to implement provisions that correspond with the existing conditions for each exception zone. Without the proposed amendments the residential exception zones default to the respective parent zone's requirements for lot coverage and pervious surface requirements. The amendments detailed in By-law 2020-043 revise the provisions of the exception zones to include provisions for maximum lot coverage and minimum pervious surface areas that are specific to each residential exception zone.





## Residents ask, fairness deferred or fairness denied?

The application for a model home on Carmichael Crescent was heard at the September 21st Council meeting. Thanks to council, King City football fans did not have to wait for the start of Monday Night Football to see the first "punt" of the evening.

While the application continues to draw strong opposition from residents, only a representative of the applicant/ developer spoke at the meeting - no resident spoke. Fairness denied?

The representative pointed out to council that the applicant/developer worked diligently with staff on the application but he did not mention that the applicant/developer has not engaged with residents. He, of course, mentioned the report from the planning department, which recommends approval of the application. Among the changes from the original application

to mitigate, but not eliminate residents' concerns are:

A request, rather than a bylaw change, for "temporary use" of the residential lot as a sales office but for only 19 months. Presumably, the applicant/ developer is confident there will be no delays with the new development and sale of the homes - an optimistic but unlikely outcome given we are dealing with a housing development in Canada during a pandemic and a recession.

Restricted hours of operation of and controlled visits to the sales/model home that should mitigate traffic congestion. The applicant/developer also offered to provide security personnel to control traffic for a period of time just in case because such security worked brilliantly during the showing of the was deferred subject to further engage-Princess Margaret lottery homes in the same area in 2017 and 2018 - NOT!

Converting the backyard of the property into a parking lot, yes, a parking lot, accommodating a minimum of 18 spaces, even though apparently only 2 appointments are allowed to occur concurrently at the sales/model home. Plus a new 1.8-metre acoustic fence to be constructed along the easterly lot boundary to mitigate noise from the parking lot area onto abutting yards. After all, no estate lot in King City should be without one!

There was no comment by the representative as to why it is fair to residents for there to be a sales/model home in their residential area for a development in another area, or how doing so benefits residents. Of course, the application does neither, leaving one to speculate that the sole beneficiary of the application is the applicant/developer who would have a competitive advantage over competing developers by having a ready-made sales/model home. Evidently, fairness to residents is not important.

Councillor Cescolini was prepared to fight on behalf of residents. He read several letters from residents stating their opposition to the application, consistent with what residents said last fall to council, and was prepared to present a motion rejecting the application. But in the end, a vote on the application

ment with residents. No other member of council spoke in support of the residents. Fairness deferred?

The mayor and Councillor Cescolini met with a group of residents nine days later. They heard the residents reiterate their strong opposition to the application and the report prepared by the planning division. At best, changes to the application make a "bad idea" less "bad." But "bad" is "bad," right?

The residents also presented the mayor and the councillor with another petition to reject the application - an earlier petition was presented last fall. The only residents contacted that did not sign the petition were (i) 5 households that have business or family relationship with the applicant/developer; (ii) 2 residents (seniors) who understandably did not want to be contacted due to COVID; (iii) 3 who were renters not owners; and (iv) 1 due to language issues.

Can residents be any clearer that they are united in their opposition?

The battle continues for residents. But what else do residents have to worry about these days – only a pandemic and a recession. So yes, by all means, let's continue to fuss over a bad idea.

### York Region approves King Township's new Official Plan

York Regional Council approved the updated King Township Official Plan, 2019 with modifications and deferrals.


The updated Official Plan is required to be consistent with the Provincial Policy Statement and conform with provincial plans which include the Ontario Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe, the Greenbelt Plan, the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan, the Lake Simcoe Protection Plan and the York Region Official Plan.

In partnership with King Township, York Region worked to replace the previous Township Official Plan, 1970 with the purpose of managing growth, land use ensuring environmental conservation and protection, protecting the agricultural land base, facilitating economic development, promoting cultural and heritage values and identifying future infrastructure requirements and

Additional amendments will occur after York Region's Municipal Comprehensive Review and updated Regional Official Plan, scheduled for completion in mid-2021.

Along with expanding the uses on the site, the applicant is asking for a change to the rear buffer planting strip, which abuts neighbouring homeown-

The highway commercial zoning allows for these uses and the current application is being reviewed by staff.

According to planning staff, the Township has received many letters of support for this long-standing and well respected business. There has been opposition, largely from the rear neighbours.

This business has been trying, for at least three years, to grow and conform to the rules. Their previous construction and car wash operation were approved by council. Further, the applicant submitted the required traffic studies and landscape plans.

Representative of Cosmocare, Dan Stone of Thorstone Consulting, said he's "rarely seen this level of rigor ap-

plied to a project of this size." The application has had a lot of review and his client has gone "above and beyond" to work with the Township.

Teresa Oppedisano, wife of owner Cosmo Oppedisano, said they began the family run business on King Road some 40 years ago. Their quality service has led to the grandchildren of their original customers coming back for service.

Over their four decades, they've supported many community events and groups, and hosted many co-op students looking to get into the car repair trade.

They simply outgrew their former location and made the decision to move and expand. But they've been plagued by obstacles and challenges.

When adjacent property owners objected, they made every effort to rectify the situation with extra tree plantings at the rear of their operation. They opted to plant the trees on the neighbour's property to provide better coverage for the two lots. They opted to extend the fence, which is much better aesthetically than the one previously recommend-

They also did what they could to mitigate drainage concerns from the car wash operation.

The widening of the drive-through lanes means they have to reduce the rear planting strip, from 3 metres to less than one metre.

Oppedisano admitted the recent years have led to a lot of emotional and financial stress. But the family is somewhat comforted by their conviction to from the car wash still beam into his "do something good."

They chose to invest in King and they're grateful to their many custom-

house. He has never spoken with the applicants and he said the stacking lane for the car wash simply isn't permitted in the rules.

Councillor Bill Cober said the Township and councillors are always cognizant of the "marriage" of residential and commercial uses in King's villages.

### Township's strategic plan is on target

King's Corporate Strategic Plan is on track, according to Township staff.

It's 2019-2022 plan is not only under way, but has met almost all of its planned actions for 2019.

Staff indicated there are a total of 37 action items identified in the plan for this four-year period and 95% are progressing as planned. The remaining 5% were not started in 2019.

Community benefits are also "trending in the desired direction."

Staff provided councillors with an update this past spring, showing the progress for 2019. The plan covers the term of council.

Staff use key performance indicators, as well as community benefits, to measure the strategy's success.

The KPIs indicate the quantity of work or services completed in a given year and these can include road work and hard services. Community benefits help demonstrate whether the desired impact is taking place.

These include corporate and community green initiatives; diverting waste from landfill; decreasing energy consumption; building more sidewalks, bridges and roads, and increasing community engagement.

Staff noted the Township has undertaken various measures to reduce water consumption, largely through education and promotion.

The Township, they said, has made "significant progress" in year 1 (2019) of its plan. This is the first in the series of annual progress reports.

### New testing measures implemented by the Province

The Ontario government has tightened public health measures and introduced changes to COVID-19 testing.

In response to the second wave of COVID-19 and in preparation for the cold winter months, the government is taking action to reduce testing turnaround times while prioritizing those who are at the greatest risk.

The announcement was made Friday by Premier Doug Ford, Christine Elliott, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health, Dr. David Williams, Chief Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Dirk Huyer, Coordinator of the Provincial Outbreak Response, and Matthew Anderson, president and CEO of Ontario Health.

"The modeling we released this week demonstrates the absolute necessity to take action now to reverse current trends and protect our hospital capacity," said Premier Ford. "With the weather changing and more people moving indoors, the decision to introduce new restrictions on restaurants, gyms and other businesses was difficult. However, we will do whatever is necessary, acting on the advice of our public health experts, to turn the tide on this second wave and keep everyone safe."

The government is taking additional steps to respond to the second wave of COVID-19 and prevent and stop the spread of the virus, while safely keeping schools and businesses open. These include:

testing at Ontario assessment centres and providing certainty to patients as to when they can receive a test during the cold winter months.

Assessment centres have now discontinued walk-in testing services, so the province's lab network can make significant progress in processing tests, allowing assessment centres the necessary time to reset, deep clean and ensure preparedness for the new appointment-based model.

The Province is also expanding the number of pharmacies where people with no symptoms within provincial testing guidance can get tested.

They're also implementing updated testing guidance for children to help parents determine when it is most appropriate for students, children and their families to seek a test for COVID-19.

Ontario is also taking longer-term actions to increase the province's test processing capacity so people can get their results faster.

That means increasing testing and processing capacity to 50,000 tests per day by mid-October and 68,000 tests per day by mid-November. The government is also introducing new testing methods once they are approved by Health Canada, including point of care testing and antigen testing.

As the number of new cases continues to rise, the province is taking decisive action to prevent and stop the spread of the virus and avoid future lockdowns. These new restrictions were adopted through the amended or-

Transitioning to appointment-based der O. Reg 364/20 (Rules for Areas in individuals, as well as restricting the Stage 3 under the Reopening Ontario [A Flexible Response to COVID-19] Act,

> They include mandating the use of face coverings in all public indoor settings across the province, such as businesses, facilities and workplaces, with limited exemptions, including corrections and developmental services.

> Targeted measures will also be implemented in Ottawa, Peel, and Toronto as a result of their higher than average rates of transmission.

> Indoor capacity limits restrict occupancy at restaurants, bars and other food and drink establishments (including nightclubs) to the number of patrons who can maintain a physical distance of at least two metres from every other patron. This is to a maximum of 100 patrons, permitting no more than six patrons per table. It requires operators to ensure patrons lining up or congregating outside of their establishment maintain physical distancing, and mandating that the name and contact information for each patron be collected;

Restricting group exercise classes at gyms and other fitness settings to 10 limits and rules.

total number of people allowed at these facilities to a maximum of 50.

The number of people allowed at meeting and event facilities, including banquet halls, is six people per table and 50 people per facility.

"With Ontario's recent alarming growth in the number of COVID-19 cases, our government is taking further action to help stop the spread of the virus and avoid future lockdowns," said Minister Elliott. "These are difficult, but necessary decisions that are being made to keep people safe, especially our seniors and vulnerable citizens. Everyone must follow the public health guidelines if we are going to stop the spread and contain the second wave."

It remains critically important for everyone to continue following public health advice, including everyday actions to prevent the spread of COVID-19, such as practising physical distancing with those outside your household; wearing a face covering when physical distancing is a challenge or where it is mandatory to do so; washing your hands frequently and thoroughly; and following gathering

### York Region increases council with new member from Vaughan

Regional Council enacted a bylaw to change the composition of York Regional Council to include an additional representative from the City of Vaughan.

The Province of Ontario, through the Municipal Act, requires all municipal councils to review their council composition by no later than mid-way through each four-year council term. The deadline to complete this review is December

Regional council first considered this on Feb. 27, 2020 and began the process of obtaining triple majority approval.

- A triple majority is attained when the following three factors are met:
- A majority of Regional Council votes in favor of the bylaw.
- A majority of the nine local municipal councils pass a resolution consenting to the bylaw.
- The total numbers of voters in the local municipalities that have passed resolutions represents a majority of all electors in York Region.

On June 11, council received a report containing resolutions from all nine local municipalities, meeting the requirements for the second two components of the triple majority process.

To complete the triple majority process, a public meeting on the composition of Regional Council was held Sept. 17.

Following this meeting, Regional Council enacted the bylaw to change its composition by adding a fifth member representing the City of Vaughan. This change


are close to her heart including the Jamaican Canadian Association. She has been a part of their community day painting project where she volunteers to paint churches, homes, community centres and more.

## Residents want the opportunity to use space in a local historic home

A group of King residents has banded together, with the hopes of using space in a historic building in King City.

Led by Anne Raney, the group wants to acquire and establish a co-working space and "Community Hub" in the historic 1886 building at 12991 Keele St., King City known as the "MacDonald House" or "Whitten Gallery."

This is a call to serve our local community and take charge of our heritage, she said.

They're asking for support from the community to establish this community hub to be a shared space in King City's core and ensure that this heritage house at the four corners will serve and strengthen the community.

They also want the historical features of the 1886 building to be conserved or restored. Ideally, a community not-



for-profit group will own, manage and maintain the property in perpetuity.

Its interior is quiet and calming and the structure is in excellent condition. but it is at risk.

The group pointed out it can be damaged or destroyed by a future private owner like so many other heritage buildings in King.

"It is not protected and we have seen this too many times before even though there is much public goodwill toward property owners that keep the historic structures and respect the historic streetscapes of our villages."

Work space on the second floor would be for rent. All five of the spacious rooms have large windows. There are potentially two other rooms for rent ly and when needed temporarily rent and one is accessible. The first floor would be common areas for renters and hub members that will include a very large presentation room, a boardroom, a lounge and locker area, a kitchen, and a washroom which will be accessible.

Renters and hub members would have priority use of the common spaces but when available, the community may use them for presentations, workshops, meetings, or even social gather-

The group admitted that the challenge is financing the purchase of the property. Angel investor(s) are needed urgently to help put together an offer and buy it before it is too late.

Once the building has been procured or there is some assurance that it will be, then the sale of "community bonds" can begin. That is, cooperative ownership of the building by many small, or larger, contributions that will help to repay the angel investor more quickly. Income from work space rentals in the heritage building combined with more information.

existing other rental income from the property will go toward monthly loan payments. Various grant funding is available but grant funds will take time.



The federal government's efforts to help Canadian seniors has drawn praise from the leading lobby group.

The Canadian Association of Retired Persons (CARP), on behalf of its over 320,000 members across Canada, commended the government for including seniors in Gov. Gen. Julie Payette's Speech from the Throne. Given the devastating toll the COVID-19 pandemic has taken on older people across the country, it's critical that solutions to support seniors be at the forefront of planning Canada's economic recovery.

In particular, CARP appreciated the government's commitment to help people age safely at home and to establish national standards for long-term care in collaboration with provincial/territorial governments. Better support for front line care workers, and acknowledgement of their essential service in caring for vulnerable seniors, was also mentioned, a step CARP has been advocating for in the wake of the recent deaths in care homes. The speech also promised an accelerated plan to national universal pharmacare. However, details around all issues including the promised increases to OAS and the CPP Survivor's Benefit were frustratingly vague and repeated the message we've been receiving for months.

"The impact of COVID-19 on our older population has been immeasurable," said Bill VanGorder, CARP's chief policy officer. "Seniors in every corner of our society are at significant risk in many ways – poor mental health from social isolation, financial insecurity and the obvious threats to their health are at the top of the list of urgent issues the government needs to act on now as we plan our path forward as a nation. We're relieved to see some of these concerns reflected in today's speech."

King-Vaughan MP and Minister for

Seniors Deb Schulte said the speech is building on the work the federal government has done in combatting the pandemic.

The speech reiterated the federal government's commitment to seniors, by hiking old age security and introducing disability benefits. The government also plans to accelerate the national pharmacare program.

Over the course of the pandemic, CARP has been consistently lobbying for urgent action on priority issues affecting older adults, including:

- · A substantive investment in home and community care to keep vulnerable seniors safe at home and promote healthy aging in place.
- The promised increase to Old Age Security by 10% for people 75 and older and Canada Pension Plan Survivor Benefit by 25% for people 65 and older.
- Greater protections from insolvency for defined-benefit pension plans.
- · Increased financial support for unpaid family caregivers, making the Canada Caregiver Tax Credit refundable or a rebate and a drop-out provision of the Canada Pension Plan (CPP) for full-time caregivers who have had to leave work.
- Strategy.
- A fully-funded vaccine program for all seniors, including the best, most effective vaccinations for influenza, shingles and pneumonia.
- · Universal, comprehensive and evidence-based pharmacare.

"These are the things that matter most to our members," added Van-Gorder. "Real issues affecting real people in every part of Canada. A true commitment to protecting our aging population means taking real steps to address these concerns, and it needs to start at the top with the federal gov-

### Aurora's Goodrow celebrates Stanley Cup victory

The San Jose Sharks went to Tampa Bay for a date with the Lightning last December. Sharks forward, Barclay Goodrow was out with his parents walking after dinner and professed his endearment of Tampa Bay's arena and location. He loved how the hockey arena is right off the water and how warm the weather is.

"He said, 'you know if I was ever traded, I can come here," Goodrow's mother, Janice, recalled.

Little did Barclay know he planted an unintentional seed in the wishing dirt. It was only a thoughtful and speculative conversation of course.

In February, Janice and her husband John spent the weekend in New York for the Sharks' road trip. They always do that. Barclay, departed with the team to head to Philadelphia while his parents grabbed a flight back home.

While driving back home to Aurora, Janice and John received a phone call from Barclay. He had been traded to the Tampa Bay Lightning.

"We were shocked because we had had; nobody really, had any indication that he was going to be traded. It was literally 20 minutes before the dead-

Tampa Bay general manager, Julien BriseBois sought after Barclay; almost desperately in fact. He dealt Anthony Greco and a first-round pick for Barclay Goodrow and a third-rounder. He needed a big centre and after scoring the game-winner in the first round of the playoffs against the Vegas Golden Knights last season, Sharks general manager Doug Wilson was persuaded to offload his centre to Florida.

Little did Goodrow know, the unwanted wish he planted, blossomed into reality. Goodrow was the second significant move in eight days before the deadline. On February 16th, the Lightning acquired New Jersey Devils forward Blake Coleman.

Following an arduous move from California to Florida, from one lifestyle to another, both Janice and John wanted to check in on Barclay and his girlfriend Madison.

It was March 12 and no more than 30 minutes upon arrival in Tampa Bay. Janice and John saw the NHL had decided to shut down. Goodrow's parents flew home early and that was the last time they would see their son for six months.

From what seemed to be a lost season, was swiftly recovered by the NHL. The bubble was introduced. The playoffs were back. Finally, there was hockey. At a cost. Players sacrificed their time with family as a move away meant they wouldn't be able to see their loved

From their home in Aurora, the Goodrow family watched as the Country Day School alumni helped his team secure second spot in the round-robin.

Their first-round match-up was a familiar foe; the Columbus Blue Jackets. The Lightning opened up the series with a victory in game one that saw both teams go head-to-head for five

After fighting off last-seasons demons, the Lightning went through the Boston Bruins. Then went through the New York Islanders. For years, pundits criticized the Lightning's inability to win the cup with the squad they've had and boiled Jon Cooper's name in

hot water for not finding success.

Well they had the chance, against a Cinderella story that emerged out of the western conference. The Lightning had a date with the Dallas Stars.

Originally, the NHLPA permitted spouses and girlfriends into the bubble, but with many of them in the United States and those who worked would have to book off more than a month of time due to quarantine protocols, a maximum of four family members were allowed to fly over to Edmonton.

"We quarantined for two weeks. We quarantined from the fourth of September to the 19th, when we went out. Because it was a moving target date we didn't know when we were going," Janice explained.

flight to pick up parents in other areas and it was only parents on the flight to Edmonton.

On the plane, Janice and John got to know a man named Craig Campbell. He said to the couple: "you want to see me at the end," Janice said.

He is one of the Cup Keepers, who carries out the illustrious Stanley Cup trophy to the winning team.

Janice and John had to quarantine upon arrival for five days. Four negative COVID-19 tests were the ticket to roam within the bubble, that cordoned off hotels and the Rogers Place from the rest of Edmonton.

They watched the first two games of

the finals on television. Then, it was finally time to see their son, whose joyous reaction said it all. The family got together with an NHL camera-crew to take part in a life in the bubble series the league was recording before game three. At night, the long-awaited moment came to watch a game live for the first time in a long time. In a box high up in the arena with food and beverages available.

The Lightning led the series 3-2 heading into game six. Five years ago, in 2015 against the Chicago Blackhawks, the Lightning lost the Stanley Cup finals 2-0 in game six handing the Blackhawks their third championship in five years.

Here, the Lightning reversed his-

tory. They defeated the Stars in game six, 2-0. The franchise, brought home their second Stanley Cup.

Time to see Craig Campbell again. Time for the Goodrows to celebrate with their son Barclay, who becomes the second Aurora native in subsequent years to win it all (Robert Thomas last year with the St. Louis Blues).

"On the ice, after they won the cup (because we were allowed to go on the ice with them), and then into the dressing room that was an experience, Coop said to us, 'we got this cup because of those trades we made," Janice said.

"He said, 'I gave Barclay his job and he did it.' He was so thrilled and so excited."

The last time the Lightning were She and her husband had to be crowned champions was back in 2004, eady. The NHLPA, sent a charter when the team defeated the Calgary Flames in seven games for their first ever Stanley Cup victory.

> Traditionally, players could bring the cup back to their home towns. However, this year, Janice Goodrow says that isn't going to happen. There is a rumour it may happen next year, coinciding with next year's winners to allow players to celebrate with friends, family and the community.

But for this year, Aurora and potentially Country Day School, won't have the gracious presence of the 89.54-centimetre trophy.

Hopefully next year, but for the Goodrow family, it's a moment they'll never forget in one of the most unique competitions the NHL has ever seen.

Janice and John were thankful for the chance to go to the bubble to see their son and watch his Stanley Cup triumph with the Tampa Bay Lightning unfold.

The family commended the concerted efforts from the NHL to plan a bubble to ensure the season is finished and a champion is crowned. She admired the valiant efforts from all players and their families.

On the Lightning's YouTube you can see how happy families were to see their loved ones returning and that image wide-spreads to every team without a video of that nature. It was a tough tournament to be a part of and it's finally done.







Words to live by – last Sunday's Gospel from Matthew 21: Jesus said "Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the Kingdom."

Fr. Michael's sermon: "Today's gospel asks us to think about our accountability to Jesus. Jesus is inviting us to think about what we owe to God. What does God expect from us? The owner of the vineyard seems to stand for God. Jesus's original audience would have easily made this connection because of the many images in the Hebrew scriptures comparing Israel to a vineyard planted by God for the benefit of God's people.

All that we are and all that we have is a reflection of what God has given us. Think of our own lives as vineyards that God has given us to tend. God expects that we will be spiritually fruitful.

St. Paul uses this imagery in Galatians, when he describes the Christian virtues as: "love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control" (Gal 5.22-23).


Our accountability to God can seem like some spiritual quota that we have to achieve. We can dispel this fear when we realize how badly God wants us to succeed and flourish. We should realize that the son comes to us as the gardener who wants us to thrive and bear good fruit. We only bear good fruit because of Jesus. We couldn't do it without him.

Traditionally the church saw fruitfulness as being expressed in acts of charity and piety. A fruitful life was expressed in acts of love and kindness to the poor and in acts of devotion and worship to God. These definitions remain valid and worthy but today we

might add to them – we can also see intended. fruitfulness as the absence of racism and hatred, as healthy community, and as a care for the environment and the earth as part of God's creation.

Jesus deeply wants us to be fruitful, to live our best life, to flourish as God

My prayer is that we can be a fruitful vineyard, whose wines are as varied as our personalities and talents, all of us deeply rooted in Jesus, all of us a good vintage that will be pleasing to God and to others."







- Have a professional roofing company inspect the roof to ensure that shingles, flashing and chimney caps are all in place and properly sealed.
- Clean and test all your exhaust fans, including dryer vents, stove vents and furnace vents. Clean or replace your furnace filter and consider having your furnace serviced to prepare it for winter.
- Inspect your gas or wood-burning fireplace and chimney dampers, and have them serviced or cleaned if necessary.
- Test all smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors to make sure they are in good working order.



# Allured to Aurora Living

eptember's Aurora housing market unofficial numbers are in and home sales outpaced September of 2019 in a big way.

There were 123 Freehold homes of all descriptions sold across Aurora's ten neighbourhoods, a fifty percent increase in comparison to last year. The average pricing was 19 percent stronger at \$1,253,685. If we remove the highest and lowest sales for the month to find the median price across Aurora the numbers are 20 percent stronger at \$1,075,000. ### Stay safe from electrical fraudsters

(NC) Now more than ever, it's important for you to be aware of the fraudulent services that could put you and your family at risk – physically and financially.

Last year, the Electrical Safety Authority received more than 350 anonymous tips of unlicensed contractors performing electrical work in Ontario. These fraudulent workers put homeowners and their families at risk of electrical shock, fire, and even death.

To help keep you and your family safe, follow these tips:

#### HIRE A PROFESSIONAL

You wouldn't think twice about hiring a lawyer, accountant or mechanic, and you would never trust an uncertified doctor to perform a surgery - so why would you trust an unlicensed contractor to do electrical work in your home? In Ontario, only a Licensed Electrical Contractor can legally do electrical work for hire, and they will file the

necessary notification of work (permit) and provide a Certificate when work is complete.

#### DO YOUR HOMEWORK

When looking to hire a Licensed Electrical Contractor be sure to do your research. This includes asking for their ECRA/ ESA licence number and verifying it. This number should be on their work vehicle, business card, and any paper and estimates related to the job. Unlicensed contractors often can be identified by the use of unbranded vehicles with no licence number visible or may falsely use the licence number of another contractor.


#### LOOK FOR RED FLAGS

You may know someone who can do the work cheaply, but consider the real cost if something goes wrong. If a contractor asks you to file a notification of work in your name, offers a discount if you pay them in cash or won't provide a receipt, they may not be licenced to perform electrical work.




