



King Township has started the third contract of the second phase of providing infrastructure for residents to connect to the municipal sewer system in Nobleton.

Phase 2, Contract 3 sanitary sewer and concurrent works in Nobleton will take place in and around the following roadways: Sheardown Drive, Dobson Court, Cain Court, Hazelbury Drive, Chamberlain Court, Russell Snider Drive, Witherspoon Way, Drive, Pobb Drive, and McCutcheon Avenue affecting.

Mactaggart Drive, Holden Drive, Robb Drive and McCutcheon Avenue affecting approximately 200 homes.

Council refuses endorsement, but wants to help Augustinians

King councillors found themselves in a catch-22 with a recent request.

Council jostled with a disdain for a Ministerial Zoning Order, while siding with the idea for a local project.

With few options available to them, the owners of Marylake asked council to endorse an MZO, helping to further their plans for a large-scale seniors complex on their large property north of King City.

MZOs are not the preferred planning tool for local municipalities and King councillors were unanimous in their dislike for this route. However, they were sympathetic to Marylake owners, who have some ambitious plans for needed facilities. Not only will this project fill a huge void, it will save the brotherhood from extinction.

Council decided not to endorse the request for an MZO, but agreed to organize and host a round-table discussion with all stakeholders, in hopes some common ground can be found.

According to staff, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing may issue an MZO at their discretion, without consultation or appeal processes. MZOs may provide zoning approval for any type of development and may be issued (theoretically) without the need to conform to local OPs or policies of upper tier levels.

The request from the Augustinian Fathers (Ontario) Inc. centres around redevelopment and revitalization of their property at 14260 Keele, next to Villanova. AFOI is proposing an "Augustinian Village," a master plan that includes long-term care and seniors living facilities. It would also provide nursing care and even hospice care. The concept is a "Continuum of Care Village" that promotes the aging in place concept.

The whole idea arose out of necessity, to help fund the renovation and expansion of the current landmarks on the property. They include a retreat centre, monastery, renowned Shrine of Our Lady of Grace, convent and historic Henry Pellat barn.

Quinto Annibale, speaking on behalf of the AFOI, said they're at a crucial crossroads in their history and the success of this plan will dictate their future. Their 65-year history on the prop-

erty could come to an end if no help is in sight and they will literally wither

They have resources for perhaps two more years of operation, Annibale said, noting the King Township site is the last remaining Augustinian foothold left in Canada.

They formed a lay board to investigate solutions and sustainability and their current plans, and need for an MZO, are vital to their continued existence.

In total, they require some \$30 million to bring all of the buildings up to standard, including \$10 million to restore the Pellat barn, one of the largest historic barns left in Ontario.

He said they've "turned over every rock" for alternatives, but the restrictive zoning in the Oak Ridges Moraine prohibits any development. This is why the MZO is key to securing their future.

Annibale stressed their objectives are in the public interest and this application won't set any precedents in terms of zoning. Their seniors' village concept is much needed and supported by residents.

The natural beauty is the heart of the property, and their priority is protecting the environment, he said.

They plan to use existing building footprints and make the least invasive changes possible, to respect the ORM. He said the AFOI would welcome a heritage designation on the barn so it's preserved. He said they're not looking for a shortcut, but admitted this seems to be their only route.

Some councillors expressed support for the concept, but all were leary about the MZO and environmental impacts on the ORM.

Councillor Jakob Schneider said the seniors complex is "music to my ears." He cited a personal example of trying to find his grandfather accommodations. The aging in place idea is "fantastic" and this project is "a great step in the right direction."

Councillor Jordan Cescolini, who also shared a family story, agreed in with the idea, and securing much-needed seniors living accommodation.

It would a "dream" to host a village like this in King, he said.

One resident said if the Township endorsed the MZO, it would give the Province carte blanche in terms of planning.

A Nobleton man, who's involved in seniors housing, gave his unequivocal support to the project. The AFOI proposal would provide housing close to home and maintain family connections, providing a "glimmer of hope" to seniors.

Mary Muter, from the Kingscross Ratepayers' Association, said they're concerned this development will disturb nearby wetlands, impacting water quality, plants, wildlife and wells for residents of Kingscross.

Democracy is on the line and council cannot endorse the MZO, she said.

Another long-time resident said large-scale projects are an assault on the ORM.

And another man said the impacts on the watercourse will affect thousands of people downstream.

Resident and former councillor Susan Lloyd Swail said the AFOI master plan needs a lot more thought.

The ORM Plan, she said, is clear in its prohibition of development outside urban settlement areas. The scale of the expansion and buildings are "out of line" for what's allowed on the ORM. The property is nowhere near "shovel-ready" and she's concerned that once approvals are given, the AFOI can sell the land to big developers.

Susan Walmer, CEO at the Oak Ridges Moraine Land Trust, said the AFOI is, in fact, looking for a planning shortcut. The development proposed is massive and would definitely impact the "rain barrel of southern Ontario," as the ORM is known. She suggested the AFOI approach developers for the needed funds to help restore the buildings.

King Township, she said, has always been an environmental champion.

A representative of Concerned Citizens of King Township (CCKT) said the Township has had a history of processing applications in a thorough manner. The MZO, she contends, bypasses vital environmental and hydrogeological as-

Another resident said such an MZO is an affront to a proper planning pro-

Councillor Bill Cober said every application, every project, is viewed differently. He's familiar with the property and said he's proud the Augustinians are part of the King community. He said he sees value in both positions and also supports seniors housing opportu-

Councillor Avia Eek said while the arguments for seniors are compelling, King's newest Official Plan puts in place certain zoning restrictions. Projects must conform to the OP, and current provincial policies, like the ORMCP.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer, too, sees a need for seniors accommodation, but as an environmental champion herself, is bound by legislation like the ORMCP.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini said the Township sympathizes with the Augustinians. However, King has always been about full public consultation and input. He admitted the project has merit but they would do citizens a disservice until all aspects are fully investigated.

He suggested the roundtable, adding both MP Deb Schulte (Minister of Seniors) and MPP Stephen Lecce have offered their support.

At this point, not supporting the MZO comes down to upholding the local context of planning, which is of utmost importance, according to Councillor David Boyd.







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Province committed to protecting the environment

The Ontario government is working diligently to strengthen our environ-

The Government of Ontario has released a comprehensive Made-in-Ontario Environment Plan that takes deliberate steps to protect our air, land and water, reduce litter and waste and lower greenhouse gas emissions. A significant focus of the plan is to transition the costs away from taxpayers to big polluters.

Ontario has taken bold steps to reduce emissions. The government has created a made-in-Ontario emissions performance standard that has re-

ceived acceptance from the federal government. This program makes polluters accountable for their greenhouse gas emissions with a system that is tough but fair, cost-effective and flexible to the needs and circumstances of our province. Ontario's EPS covers the very same polluters as the federal system - there are no free passes, and no one is off the hook.

Another crucial initiative the Ontario government has recently implemented to reduce greenhouse gases is requiring renewable content in regular-grade gasoline to increase from 10 per cent to 15 per cent by 2030. This will result in the equivalent of taking 300,000 cars off

the road every year.

Our water resources are also being protected. Ontario is investing \$7.47 million to support projects to improve Great Lakes, with additional support to restore and protect Lake Simcoe. Moreover, new investments are being made to collect plastic waste from marinas using plastic-capture technology.

Additionally, in the province's last budget, \$3.7 billion in green bonds were issued to help finance public transit initiatives, extreme weather resiliency infrastructure, and energy efficiency and conservation projects. Ontario remains the largest issuer of green bonds in all of Canada.

And in this community, I am proud to champion expansions in public transit at all three GO Stations - King City, Maple and Rutherford GO – will receive parking expansion, doubling of the tracks, noise cessation barriers, and upgraded platforms for local commut-

Importantly, to support natural and green spaces, the government is reinvesting in the Ontario Community Environment Fund to support projects that improve the environment, including dedicated funding for tree planting. To build on this, we are also committed to expanding green space in our community by working diligently on the creation of the 500 acre East Humber Headwaters Park, sitting on the pristine Oak Ridges Moraine. A project I will continue to champion and advance with King council and local partners.

Additionally, the government continued funding for the Greenbelt Foundation through a \$12-million agreement over three years to protect and restore the Greenbelt's environment and integ-

Our government has been clear that we are committed to preserving the

sheds. That's why we have announced a new \$30 million program to restore and create wetlands across priority areas in Ontario. This new Wetlands Conservation Partner Program, will see our government partner with conservation organizations to achieve our shared goals of protecting and enhancing our watersheds.

In the first year of the five-year program, the province will partner with Ducks Unlimited Canada, an internationally recognized wetlands restoration organization, and provide \$6 million to support wetlands projects in the Lake Ontario and Lake Erie drainage basins. Ducks Unlimited has a suite of over 60 projects that are fully scoped and ready to be implemented immediately, that will work to increase habitats for endangered specifies and increase climate resiliency.

In years two through five, the Province will partner with additional conservation organizations and fund wetland creation and restoration projects in other Great Lakes watersheds and inland waterways. These projects would include using innovative approaches for wetland creation and restoration to support municipal stormwater management.

Through these partnerships, Ontario will continue to fulfill commitments in several agreements and plans, including the Environment Plan, Lake Simcoe Protection Plan, Canada-Ontario Agreement on Great Lakes Water Quality and Ecosystem Health, and the Canada-Ontario Lake Erie Action Plan.

Protecting the natural environment, green space and our watershed is most important as we work to protect it for future generations.

There is more work ahead, and I will continue to advance this societal imperative, however, I know the foundation to Greenbelt and protecting our water- protect our environment is being laid.

Councillor charged with breach of trust

York Regional Police have charged a Richmond Hill councillor with fraud and breach of trust.

Investigators with the York Regional Police Financial Crimes Unit began a fraud investigation back in July, looking into a city councillor's fraudulent use of funds. Police report the investigation revealed that Ward 5 Councillor Karen Cilevitz, 63, hired an additional staff member, then arranged for the new employee to give a portion of their pay to the councillor's spouse.

Police believe more than \$21,000 was paid to the councillor's spouse between August 2019 and May 2020.

Police also charged 59-year-old Derek Christie with fraud over \$5,000 and possession of proceeds of crime.

Mayor Dave Barrow said it's important to allow the legal system to determine e outcome of this case.

"City officials are cooperating with police. Under the Municipal Act, the councillor is permitted to retain her seat at this time.

"I want to reaffirm to residents that City Council is committed to serving the public good and we will continue to stay focused on helping our community emerge strong from the pandemic.

"As this is an ongoing police investigation, the City will be making no further comment at this time."

Cilevitz was first elected in 2014 and re-elected in Ward 5 in 2018.



Two new electric vehicles help King lower its emissions

King Township continues to show leadership when it comes to fighting climate change with the purchase of two fully electric vehicles to add to its vehicle fleet.

Two, white 2021 Hyundai Konas were purchased this year. One will be used by King Township Fire and Emergency Services Fire Inspectors and the other by the Community Services division.

These are the first fully electric vehicles in King's fleet as the Township transitions to a green fleet over the next nine years.

"I'm proud that we are taking concrete actions to lower our emissions, protect our environment, fight climate change and move to a more environmentally sustainable fleet," said King Township Mayor Steve Pellegrini. "We've always prided ourselves on our commitment to protecting the environment, whether it is through our Integrated Community Sustainability Plan, the adoption of our green development standards or our recent declaration of a climate emergency. However, words on paper are never enough, which is why we are greening our fleet with each new purchase."

The vehicles utilize newer Hyundai technology that includes a heat pump within the engine to help winterize the vehicles to prevent additional battery drainage in winter and colder climates. The vehicles have a range of up to 415 kilometres on a single charge.

King is also in the middle of drafting a Climate Action Plan. It's a community-wide plan to best mitigate, adapt and improve resilience to the effects and impacts of climate change on a local level both in the near and far term. This plan aims to provide a framework of future priorities, actions, studies and pilots.

Municipalities welcome second round of funding from Province

The Ontario government is allocating an additional \$695 million to provide financial relief for municipalities and help ensure they do not carry operating deficits into 2021. This investment builds upon the first phase of the federal-provincial Safe Restart Agreement announced this summer and will help municipal partners deliver critical services during COVID-19.

It's welcome by municipalities like King Township.

According to Treasurer Peggy Tollett, the Township received \$574,400 The allocation for Phase 2 for the Town-

io's municipalities recover from the impacts of COVID-19 faster, by helping them to enter into 2021 without operating deficits from this year," said Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. "By ensuring our municipal partners are in a sound financial position to begin the new year, they can focus on keeping their capital projects on track while continuing to provide the critical services their residents rely on."

Of the \$695 million announced, \$299 million is being allocated across all 444 municipalities to help provide more financial relief, as 2021 operating budgets are finalized. An additional \$396 million is also being allocated to 48 municipalities that have been hardest hit by COVID-19 and have demonstrated a need for additional assistance in covering their 2020 operating deficits. This is in addition to funding being provided to municipalities to help with local transit pressures.

Ontario issued letters to municipal-

ities about the next stages of transit funding for the Safe Restart Agreement. The province is notionally allocating \$1.3 billion for municipal transit systems. This is in addition to the \$700 million allocation under Phase 1 of the Safe Restart Agreement, which included needs-based top-ups. Further details about this funding will be available in January.

The funding also drew praise from the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO).

"This funding will ensure municipalities in every part of Ontario are in a better position to maintain vital municipal services in 2021 and to proceed with capital investments essential as part of Phase 1 which is for 2020. to Ontario's economic recovery," said Graydon Smith, president of AMO.

The funding will help municipalities "This joint funding will help Ontar- to develop 2021 budgets that reflect the reality of COVID-19 in their communities and give them the confidence they need to proceed with capital projects that will help drive economic growth.

First, \$396 million will be allocated to 48 individual municipalities that have demonstrated the need for additional assistance in covering operating deficits for 2020.

The remaining \$299 million will be allocated across all 444 municipalities to help provide additional financial relief to help support operating budgets

AMO understands that 20% (\$59.8 million) of this allocation will be provided to all municipalities on a per household basis (like Phase 1 SRA fund-

The remaining 80% (\$239.2 million) is to be allocated through a new methodology that proportionally reflects COVID-19 case counts with data provided by Ontario's 34 Public Health Units. More information on this methodology and the associated allocations will be provided by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing.

AMO is pleased that the remaining Safe Restart Agreement funding is being provided to municipal governments at this time.

"This funding will ensure municipalities in every part of Ontario are in a better position to maintain vital municipal services in 2021 and to proceed with capital investments essential to Ontario's economic recovery," said Smith.

This financial relief package and, notably, the early support in 2021 follows AMO's direct advice to create greater certainty around the financial needs of municipal governments. 
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York's hospitals to receive COVID-19 vaccine

Ontario will be distributing additional doses of the Pfizer vaccine to 17 more hospital sites over the next two weeks, including regions with the highest rates of COVID-19 infection.

This is part of the initial phase of the government's three-phase vaccine implementation plan that began on Dec. 14.

Ontario is expecting to receive up to 90,000 Pfizer-BioNTech doses from the federal government before the end of the year to continue vaccinating health care workers and essential caregivers who work in hospitals, long-term care homes, retirement homes and other congregate settings caring for seniors.

Southlake Regional Health Centre and Mackenzie Health are among the

"Following a successful pilot, we are excited to continue onto the next stage of our rollout of the COVID-19 vaccines to Ontarians," said Christine Elliott, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "While we are planning to ensure that everyone who wants a vaccine will receive one, we need to first protect our frontline workers and those providing essential care to our most vulnera-

All of these sites already have the equipment necessary to safely store the Pfizer vaccine at -70 degrees and the required staff are ready to receive and administer vaccines. Since this vaccine cannot be transferred beyond the initial delivery location at this time, vaccinations will continue to be administered to health care workers in highrisk settings first, such as long-term care homes and hospitals.

"Our guiding priority is to ensure frontline health care workers and vulnerable populations receive the vaccine in this initial phase to ensure they are protected," noted Solicitor General Sylvia Jones. "As the supply of available dosages increases and is delivered to Ontario, we will be prepared to provide the vaccine in communities across the province."

As Phase One progresses, Ontario will continue to monitor the logistics of delivery, reconstitution of the vaccine, clinic management, and post-vaccine surveillance to help inform the province's preparedness plan to receive larger vaccine quantities.

During this phase, Ontario is expecting to receive doses of the Moderna vaccine once approved by Health Canada, which will allow vaccines to be administered onsite at long-term care homes in lockdown areas, followed by retirement homes, other congregate care settings for seniors, and remote Indigenous communities.

In early 2021, additional hospital sites across the province will be administering the Pfizer vaccine to health care workers, as well as essential caregivers, and long-term care home and retirement home residents.

fantastic news and allows us to continue to test and refine our vaccination rollout plan," said General Rick Hillier. "This is the next important step that gets us ready for all of Ontario in 2021."

As the province is rolling out its phased vaccination program and heading into holiday season, it remains critically important that all Ontarians continue following public health advice to protect our communities and most vulnerable populations, and to stop the spread of COVID-19.

The province's decision to identify key populations to receive the vaccine first is based on the advice of medical experts and ethicists, and recommended by the COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution Task Force and aligned with the National Advisory Committee on Immunization's recommendations.

On Dec. 9, Health Canada authorized the first COVID-19 vaccine in Canada, manufactured by Pfizer-BioNTech.

"This expanded distribution list is Health Canada authorized the vaccine after an independent and thorough scientific review for safety, effectiveness and quality. Health Canada will continue to monitor the safety and effectiveness of the vaccine.

> The province will shift to Phase Two of its vaccination implementation plan, which is expected to begin later in the winter of 2021, when more vaccines become available to Ontario. During Phase Two, vaccinations will be administered to health care workers, as well as to residents in long-term care homes, retirement homes, home care patients with chronic conditions and additional First Nation communities and urban Indigenous populations, including Métis and Inuit individuals.

> Ontario will enter Phase Three when vaccines are more widely available for everyone who wishes to be immunized. While vaccines will not be mandated, people will be strongly encouraged to get vaccinated during this phase.

Cost of vaccines tops \$1 billion

A diverse portfolio of vaccines, and a mandate to deliver them to Canadians, will cost the federal government more than \$1.3 billion.

So far. Canada has invested over \$1 billion in vaccine agreements and secured a domestic supply of up to 429 million doses of seven promising COVID-19 vaccine candidates. Canada has secured the most diverse portfolio of any country. All Canadians can rest assured that a safe and effective vaccine will be available at no cost to them.

Additionally, since May, in preparation for vaccine roll-out, the government has invested a total of \$284.2 million to improve our capacity to distribute COVID-19 vaccines to Canadians. This investment includes \$125 million in 2020-21 for the shipping and storage of COVID-19 vaccines and \$159.2 million, starting in 2020-21, to procure supplies needed to vaccinate Canadians (e.g. needles, alcohol swabs) and increase vaccine deployment capacity through improved infrastructure, promotion and national guidelines for the delivery of vaccines.

The money includes up-front payments that companies require to support vaccine development, testing, and at-risk manufacturing. Subsequent payments are contingent on vaccines passing clinical trials and obtaining regulatory approval.

These investments guarantee Canada's earliest possible access to the production of an approved COVID-19 vaccine.

Agreements have been signed with the following suppliers:

AstraZeneca, 20 million doses; Johnson & Johnson, up to 38 million doses; Medicago, up to 76 million doses; Moderna, up to 56 million doses; Novavax, up to 76 million doses; Pfizer, up to 76 million doses; Sanofi and GlaxoSmithKline, up to 72

All of the vaccine candidates for which Canada has agreements are a 2-dose vaccine, with the exception of the Johnson & Johnson candidate, which is a 1-dose vaccine.



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Helping youth may be key to addressing mental health

It's quintessential to look at the facts before anything else.

Before the pandemic began, even well before, you wouldn't be at fault to surmise that mental health, particularly in youth, had been at risk. Adults, too, continue to face challenges as well in their lives.

Mental health is one of the most prevalent discussions to date. It's truly staggering to look at it and it could even have vou in disbelief.

And it might be because of the infectious globe we live in. Competition, money, success are all compounds to distress.

I can tell you first hand, as a 26-year-old man, it's taken a toll on me at times. It's taken a toll on my family members. Going to school. Earning an education. Paying off debt and somewhere affording a decent home in this barbaric real estate market. These are some that grind my gears.

No wonder pre-pandemic vouth minds were practically at self-civilwars with themselves and we've never known it. The Centre of Addiction and Mental Health knew it.

"When we broaden it to moderate and serious psychological distress we see really high numbers as well. For example, over half of girls report moderate to serious psychological distress. That's 56 per cent," said Tara Elton-Marshall, an independent scientist, for the Institute for Mental Health Policy Research at Centre For Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH).

"What is also concerning that maybe isn't there in the total figure is, the fact that we're seeing boys; who tend to indicate less psychological distress but we're seeing a significant increase among boys. We've seen a doubling of moderate and serious psychological distress since 2013. It went from 15 per cent to 31 per cent."

Every two years since 1977, CAMH has conducted a survey for students in Ontario, monitoring their stress levels.

The numbers from the 2018/2019 year, before COVID-19, displayed gut-wrenching figures such as these

The latest report for Ontario, saw 15 per cent of students have purposely harmed themselves, 20 per cent of students report the use of prescription opioid use and 16 per cent have thought about suicide.

Not to mention one-quarter of studidn't know where to turn.

The causes of these issues, can be speculated everything aforementioned before and social media use, time in front of screens, sleep and exercise. Although it isn't confirmed these are all of the triggers, these most certainly are some.

You can also imagine the impediments of the pandemic and what the numbers might look like due to COVID-19. For youth it hasn't been confirmed, but for adults, on CAMH's COVID-19 survey, it has.

Between the ages of 18-39, 31.2 per cent of Canadians have been experi-

encing severe levels of anxiety while 27.1 per cent of Canadians aged 40-59 reported moderate to severe anxiety.

In the binge drinking category, 29.8 per cent of Canadians between the ages of 18-39 have indulged in binge drinking and 26.8 per cent have done it between the ages of 40-59.

More statistics can be found directly on the CAMH website for more information.

But the light at the end of the tunnel isn't simply to have the youth shut out and the adults, left to ponder upon numerous hypotheses to fix these issues.

Senior Scientist in the Child, Youth and Emerging Adult Program at CAMH and Associate Professor in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Toronto, Joanna Henderson says the resilience from the youth has been remarkable.

"When we look around the world and we look at who is driving change, we see youth leaders. We look at some of the things happening around indigenous rights, rights for black and other racialized people. We see youth leading," Henderson said.

She is studying on how the youth can co-create an existential solution that would show how services are being delivered and if there are more prominent solutions to deliver positive messages of change.

How do we increase awareness? How do we indicate to someone to recognize when their mood swings shift because of the content that they are sub-consciously processing? When do we simply take a break?

For some that live in the web of media, there's no way to work around it. Elton-Marshall says youth who are exposed to high levels of social media suffer from psychological distress.

Most of the services even used for school revolve around social media. But, limiting some of the content may work without falling back into with-

But reducing it would be an option. Tune out some of the noise. Be aware when platforms study your algorithms. When a website that you would normally never visit before shows up on your feed, be aware of that promotion and how it affects you.

For as long as the pandemic looms, for adults the numbers say it all. For youth, pre-pandemic numbers might influence your opinion to be around the same neighbourhood of what has been seen before; maybe worse.

But to create a bona fide society; one dents have visited a health care pro- that may have despondent thoughts, fessional (260,900) and 35 per cent it's time to research how we all can benefit from the education on mental health and preach its findings and concerns to others.

> That first starts with a conversation. Then it turns to action. It's much easier said than done but when you study and craft a method for improvement much like CAMH has, it can become an open conversation.

> And when we as a society, are unabashed to speak about these issues, that's how it gets better. To know it's okav. Because it is okav to feel what you feel and it is possible to improve it. To some degree, we've all been there.

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CMHA moves forward on urgent mental health care centre

The Canadian Mental Health Association of York Region and South Simcoe is moving forward with a new mental health hub for the community, following an "incredible" commitment from the Province of Ontario.

The Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA) welcomed an investment from the Ministry of Health of up to \$200,000 to make their long-held vision of the York Region Mental Health & Addictions Crisis Centre a reality.

Once borne to fruition, the hub will serve as a resource for people experiencing metal health or addiction crises 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and will serve as an alternative to hospital emergency departments.

"The York Region Mental Health and Addictions Crisis Hub will make a significant difference for our community in York Region by targeting specific gaps in mental health and addiction services," said Christine Elliott, Ontario's Minister of Health, in a statement. "Supporting innovative projects like this is part of our government's plan to build a comprehensive and connected mental health and addictions system

high-quality care, when and where they need it."

From the perspective of Rebecca Shields, executive director of the CMHA York Region and South Simcoe, it is an "incredible commitment" that will lead to a "best-in-class" facility for the community.

"People are now going to have a 24/7 dedicated specialized facility where they can walk into a place that is welcoming, provides care for them or their loved ones who might be in crisis, (and) it is going to help individuals twelve and up," says Shields. "We know lots of times mental health starts in their youth, so this will have specialized care for youth and will be able to help people.

"The other part of this is for crisis." (People are) coming in through paramedics and police now and they can come to this facility, which means they are not in the general hospital, but come into a truly welcoming [environment that supports their recovery and gets them connected immediately to community services because we're all going to be right there on site to make sure people get what they need."

The investment of up to \$200,000 from

that offers Ontarians better access to Ontario's Ministry of Health means that the CMHA can begin moving forward on planning, including retaining architects and engineers to get the job done. Coupled with finding a location and developing their suite of clinical expertise, they hope to have the 20-bed facility opened in the next two years.

> "We're now going to move as quickly as we can because now we have the support to know that we can start to build and draft the plan," said Shields. "We will be consulting with the community partners and people with lived experience all along the way to make sure that we're building something that truly meets the needs of residents."

> This mental health and addictions hub was first envisioned by the CMHA more than two years ago, long before a new global pandemic was ever a thought. From the outset, among their concepts for the facility were individualized rooms with private bathrooms. That was a must to give people in crisis the respect and privacy they need to heal. Now, with new health protocols

ever-present, they are now somewhat ahead of the game.

"What we're aware of, since the pandemic, is we realized the volumes are going to be much higher because we're seeing [the pandemic take its toll] on mental health," says Shields. "For people in our community, we want to make sure when people need care, they can walk in and get it right away. The one other thing that has changed [due to the pandemic] is we will be re-looking at what the needs are in the community.

"We will be working with all our community partners and we're excited to open up a conversation with our community around this to make sure it is going to meet the needs of our community members and their families to reflect the diversity of our region. We just hope for everyone's support and everyone believes mental health is health, and we really do need to make sure that nobody is suffering. We're so privileged to work on behalf of our community to help build this much-needed service."

Schomberg community rallies to help local single mother

A single mother who migrated to Canada a few years ago found herself in dire circumstances this season, with no money to feed her 4-year-old son or to heat the Schomberg home they were living in at the time. Fortunately, she happened to disclose her situation to her son's school bus driver, Gillian Tibbits, who immediately sought the help of Susan Heslop, who runs the Schomberg Community Group on Face-

"Within a couple days, we had three truckloads of items for the family, as well as \$2,000 in cash. The community came together immediately and we were overwhelmed with requests to help,' said Helsop, who created the group four years ago. "I always verify the information given to me before I post a call for

help. In this case, we knew a family that were in a neighbouring home and they confirmed that the family was indeed struggling to make ends meet."

From offers to buy toys and clothes for the boy and his mother, to arranging a load of firewood, the community reached out in big ways and small. Groceries were dropped off, as well as offers to drive her to the grocery store so she could purchase what she needed.

"The mother lived in an area of town where she couldn't access public transportation so was unable to work. She has since found a subsidized apartment, and because the situation was brought to light, it helped get the attention of social services as well."

Gillian Tibbits, who regularly asks for donations at Christmas to support seniors, isn't surprised at this outpouring of support.

"I feel what our community has done is not surprising. We are fortunate to live in a great community that regularly helps others in need. I know there are lots of people in our town willing to help out those who may need a hand up," said Tibbits, adding, "I think she was at the end of her rope and I just happened to be the first person she saw that day. We had never spoken much other than general chatter as I picked up her son to drive him to school."

The lady and her son, are extremely grateful that the town came to their rescue when they needed it the most. (Their names are being withheld in order to protect their identities.) Even a simple box of chocolates lit up the little boy's eyes, according to Helsop, who delivered the goods to their home.

After all, it is these small acts of kindness that make the magic of the holiday season come alive.





"I feel that it offers phenomenal value and there are a larger proportion of young talents that would be realistic targets for us in both the 1st and 2nd divisions than in other competitions in South America," McNab said in York United's press release last week.

The club announced their first signing under the new brand. Midfielder Sebastian Gutierrez arrives from Llaneros in Primera B; Colombia's second division of soccer.

Colombia, much like its South American neighbours, have predicated their system on attacking football. Players such as Radamel Falcao, James Rodriguez and Duvan Zapata are forwards from the nation with a

keen eye for goal.

York also signed Lisandro Cabrera not too long ago. The Argentine, spent some time in Colombia and Argentina before securing a move to York United.

The 23-year-old Gutierrez, Cabrera, Brazilian William Wallace and Argentine Mateo Hernandez, will provide the attacking element the club is looking for.

In the Island Games last year, York struggled to finish clinical chances. Out of their eight goals scored in the competition only two goals were from open play.

Thankfully, fans have the opportunity to see video of how Gutierrez plays. Being from a second division in a country like Colombia, it is quite difficult for soccer fans to truly know what kind of player you are getting.

Head to YouTube and type in "Sebastian Gutierrez Futbol Pro" to see his highlight reel.

You'll see his tenacity in the midfield. The ability to use his offensive prowess to burst through midfielders and defenders to create a chance that the naked eye wouldn't see.

He has an exquisite touch from free kicks and vision that can open up the game.

McNab never completely classified what the York United values were. But if some moves have made any indication. These South American acquisitions can develop a strong argument this is the influence he might want to draw in the roster along with a one German player, one Spanish player and the rest of the group straight from Canada.

All foreign acquisitions comple-

ment a dominant Canadian roster.

Gutierrez, said in the release he is excited to join York United and intends to be a fundamental part of the new era of the club moving forward.

The contract is a deal through 2021 with an option to extend for two more seasons.

The team would like to encourage everyone to take some time to reflect and be grateful for the little things throughout this holiday season.

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

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Start the year off on a Mediterranean foot

Peppers play a significant role in the Mediterranean diet, providing nutrients such as vitamin C and potassium while also giving meals a fresh boost of flavor. Those who want a meal with a little Mediterranean flare can try the following recipe for "Mediterranean Beef Ragoût" from Judith Finlayson's "The Healthy Slow Cooker (Second Edition)" (Robert

Mediterranean Beef Ragoût

Makes 8 servings

- pounds trimmed stewing beef, cut into 1-inch cubes and patted dry
 - tablespoons olive oil, divided
- onions, chopped
- cloves garlic, minced
- tablespoons ground cumin (see note 2 below)
- teaspoon dried thyme
- teaspoon grated lemon zest (optional) 1/2
- teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon cracked black peppercorns cup beef stock
 - cup dry red wine
- 1/2
- 14-ounce can no-salt-added diced tomatoes, including juice
- bay leaves
- roasted red bell peppers, thinly sliced, then cut into
- 1-inch pieces 1/2
- cup sliced pitted green olives 1/2
- cup finely chopped parsley leaves

1. In a skillet, heat 1 tablespoon of the olive oil over medium-high heat. Add beef, in batches, and cook, stirring, adding more oil as necessary, until browned, about 4 minutes per batch. Transfer to slow cooker stoneware as completed.

2. Reduce heat to medium. Add onions and garlic to pan and cook, stirring, until onions are softened, about 3 minutes. Add cumin, thyme, lemon zest, if using, salt, and peppercorns and

cook, stirring, for 1 minute. Add beef stock, wine, tomatoes with juice, and bay leaves and bring to a boil. Add to slow cooker and stir well. 3. Cover and cook on low for 6 hours or on high for 3 hours, until mixture is bubbly and beef is tender. Stir in roasted pep-

pers, olives and parsley. Cover and cook on high for 15 minutes, until peppers are heated through. Discard bay leaves. Note 1: This dish can be partially prepared before it is cooked. Heat oil and complete step 2. Refrigerate overnight for up to 2 days. When you're ready to cook, complete steps 1 and 3. Note 2: For the best flavor, toast and ground cumin seeds yourself. Place seeds in a dry skillet over medium heat and cook,

stirring, until fragrant, about 3 minutes. Immediately transfer to a spice grinder or mortar and grind.
