King receives \$775,972 in COVID funding

ment of Ontario this year to help offset expenses related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The announcement was made by King-Vaughan MPP and Minister of Education Stephen Lecce on behalf of Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. and Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance and President of the Treasury Board.

The Government of Ontario is providing \$500 million to municipal governments to support municipal operations. This new funding is on top of Safe Restart funding King has received in the past (Phase 1 - \$574,400 in 2020; Phase 2 - \$243,000 in 2021). In 2020, King also received Ontario Community Infrastructure Funds of \$608,548 to make repairs and upgrades to the municipal water system in Schomberg.

"On behalf of King Township council, I'd like to thank Minister Lecce and the Government of Ontario for providing these much-needed funds," said King Township

King Township will receive \$775,972 from the Govern- Mayor Steve Pellegrini. "Council and staff have worked hard during the pandemic to streamline operations and cut costs where possible to offset revenue shortfalls resulting from closed or cancelled community facilities, programs and events."

> The funds will help offset additional expenses in offering different recreational opportunities, maintenance of Township facilities, offset revenue shortfall due to closures and additional costs related to COVID-19.

> "Being able to continue offering new and safe recreational opportunities is a council priority," said Mayor Pellegrini. "It's important that we look for innovative and safe ways for the community to continue being active. We've been able to accomplish this with upcoming programs like King Photo Bingo, Hike to the Sugar Bush and the DIY Earth Hour Lantern Craft

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



Stay off stormwater ponds

Staff and by-law officers are reminding residents found using stormwater ponds for skating that this is prohibited and unsafe due to possible changing conditions. As indicated by the conservation authorities: Stormwater ponds are designed to continuously collect stormwater

from surrounding roads and neighbourhoods No matter how deep into the winter or how thick the ice may appear,

temperature changes and water flowing in/out can cause major variations in ice thickness Air pockets are also easily formed under the surface and contami-

nants like salt weaken the ice

Stormwater ponds are dangerous in winterAll these factors combined, create dangerous and unpredictable conditions that put your safety

Funding brings internet to rural hamlets in King

Close to 500 homes in rural King will soon get access to high-speed internet, thanks to new federal funding.

Through the Rapid Response Stream of the Universal Broadband Fund (UBF), the Government of Canada is taking immediate action to connect King residents to high-speed internet.

King-Vaughan MP Deb Schulte, Minister of Seniors, on behalf of the Honourable Maryam Monsef, Minister for Women and Gender Equality and Rural Economic Development, made the virtual announcement last week. Funding of \$2.27 million will bring high-speed internet to residents in the communities of Pottageville, Nobleton and Lloydtown. With an additional investment of nearly \$1.7 million from Vianet, this project will connect 485 underserved households.

The \$1.75-billion Universal Broadband Fund was launched on Nov. 9, 2020. Projects funded under the UBF, as well as through other public and private investments, will help connect 98% of Canadians to high-speed Internet by 2026 and achieve the national target of 100% connectivity by 2030.

To facilitate applications for projects like this one, the UBF provided additional pathfinder support for all applicants, and in particular small applicants, to build partnerships, find potential sources of funding and navigate the application process.

The pandemic has reinforced residents' need for high-speed internet for work, school, etc. Being cut off, for many in King, has made life during the pandemic more difficult.

"Canadians' access to high-speed internet should not depend on their postal code," Schulte said.

A critical part of the federal government's investment in this area is the Rapid Response Stream, which provides \$150 million to fund shovel-ready projects.

"Canadians' access to high-speed Internet should not depend on their postal code. Since 2015, the Government of Canada has made expanding Canadians' access to high-speed broadband a top priority. We're proud to work with Vianet to bring reliable, affordable high-speed Internet to hundreds of

King families. Through these investments and partnerships, the government is bridging the connectivity gap," Schulte added.

Vianet will oversee the rollout of the program in King, which will be completed by the end of the year.

This local project, Schulte said, is what the Rapid Response Stream is all about - "helping projects receive faster approval, ensuring construction can start early on, and connecting communities as quickly as possible."

Vianet's application, she said, was approved in less than two months.

"Vianet is very pleased with this announcement under the federal government's Universal Broadband Fund to continue the expansion of our fibre-tothe-home network in rural King Township. In 2017, Vianet connected the first rural home to our FTTH network in King Township, and we have been making incremental investments to service additional rural homes each year since then. (This) announcement will accelerate that expansion, servicing more homes that are in desperate need of better, more reliable Internet. We would like to thank Minister Monsef and the federal government for their commitment to bring quality broadband to rural Canadians. We would also like to thank MP Deb Schulte along with King Township for working with us in furthering these builds," said Brian McCullagh, director of business development for Vianet.

McCullagh noted when this project is completed, Vianet will have connected some 1,500 households to the fiber network. They have "permits in hand" and will be breaking ground in the very near future.

He added Vianet tends to service areas that have access to existing cable, and they have to maximize their per-kilometre reach, given there's only so much funding to go around. Vianet is leveraging all available funding, including provincial programs.

"Access to reliable, affordable highspeed Internet is one of the largest issues we deal with in King Township," said Mayor Steve Pellegrini. "Our residents need to be able to connect with family, friends and workplaces, while our business community needs it to remain competitive, especially during the current pandemic."

Say no to MZOs in the Greenbelt

Recently the province opened an online consultation on changes to the Planning Act regarding Ministerial Zoning Orders (MZOs). https://ero.ontario.ca/index.php/notice/019-3233 The portal is accepting comments until April 4.


Opening up Ontario for business to help our economy recover from COVID doesn't require MZOs. In Ontario over 92% of businesses are small businesses with less than 10 employees. Unlike many small businesses the construction and development industry continued to operate throughout COVID. Ministerial Zoning Orders (MZOs) benefit land developers and the construction industry. If a property is rezoned to industrial warehouse from farmland (\$20,000/acre) it is the landowner/developer who benefits as property values can jump to 1.6 million an acre according to the real estate firm CRBE.

Ministerial zoning orders are a unique tool. In the past MZOs were rarely used as they overstep two important principals of good land use planning, an orderly planning process with checks and balances and opportunities for public participation. Currently the Minister of Municipal Affairs can rezone any property anywhere by using an MZO, making a landowner a millionaire with a swish of a pen.

There are a few places MZOs should never be permitted, on land protected by provincial plans, namely the Oak Ridges Moraine and Greenbelt and Natural heritage areas. The premier has given his word that the Greenbelt will not be opened up for development. If he aims to keep that promise it makes sense for the province to remove current provisions allowing MZOs in the protected countryside. River valleys and wetlands are particularly vulnerable to development as Conservation Authorities are no longer commenting on development applications leaving it up to developers to set their own boundaries.

I urge you to make a comment on the portal to have your say on the use of MZOs.

Gypsy moths

What are they?

Gypsy moths are destructive pests. They get their name from their ability to travel by attaching to various objects. They appear in late July or August.

Gypsy moth caterpillars (larvae) change looks as they grow. Young caterpillars are black or brown and about .6 cm (.24 inch-

es) in length. As they grow, bumps develop along their backs with coarse black hairs. The caterpillar is easily recognizable in the later part of this stage: charcoal grey with a double row of five blue and six red dots on its back. Feeding ends by early July, and mature caterpillars can be as long as 6.35 cm (2.5 inches).

Gypsy moths are a concern because the larvae feed voraciously, mostly on the leaves of deciduous (leafy) trees, but also on some conifers (evergreens). During the larval stage, a single gypsy moth caterpillar can eat an average of one square metre of leaves.

How can I get rid of gypsy moths?

Egg masses

Gypsy moths spread easily, as the young larvae can be carried by wind currents for a distance of up to one kilometre. More commonly, however, they hitch a ride (mainly egg masses) on objects like vehicles, tents, trailers, and lawn chairs to infest new areas. Vacationers, especially campers, should be aware of this and should check their equipment before moving on.

It is important to be thorough when looking for egg masses as they can be difficult to locate. Common hiding places include:

- · the underside of branches
- tree trunks
- · fences
- firewood outdoor furniture
- · swing sets, boats
- trailers
- under the eaves of buildings

When an egg mass is found, it should be scraped off with a knife and dropped into a bucket filled with hot water and household

bleach or ammonia. Remove picnic tables, swing sets, and lawn furniture from around the bases of trees, because these objects provide the insects with protection from the heat of the sun.

There are numerous actions (see links below) that can be taken by homeowners to help protect individual high-value trees, but timing is critical. There is even the potential for aerial spraying with a biological treatment (BTK) for private larger forested areas.



Reservations about LTC announcement for King

The reign of Premier Ford has been the MZO process. characterized by surprises.

The first was the edict that the Toronto Council should be cut in half at the mid-point of the 2018 election campaign. Another big surprise was the speed with which commercial contracts for wind power were torn up despite financial penalties. This was surprising as the Premier branded himself as a successful business person.

A recent surprise was the amendment in Bill 257, purportedly about broadband infrastructure; the amendment requires Conservation Authorities to issue permits enabling destruction of wetlands if a Ministerial Zoning Order (MZO) has been issued.

None of these surprises is as clever as the latest: the approval of a large institutional development on the Oak Ridges Moraine. Without any involvement of King council, Township staff or public consultation. The Ministry of LTC confirmed 140 new LTC beds for King City. Given previous discussions and presentations to council, I am assuming the proposed located for this grand project is the redevelopment of the Marylake Property.

The development of 140 LTC beds, without any recognition of the ORM rigid guidelines for environmentally protected lands, is now a readily accepted solution for the current deficit of community based LTC in King Township. This has all the markings of a MZO, which Minister Clark has often vowed he would never do on the Greenbelt, but without any of the inherit components that traditionally guide Commentary

Two fundamental conditions are identified in the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan that permit the proposed development to occur.

First, there needs to be a legal nonconforming institutional use, as of 2001, that can be expanded to meet realistic future needs and second, that any development would reflect the guidelines for environmentally protected sensitive zones defined by the ORMCP.

With the exception of myself, King council has accepted claims that The Marylake site can be "redeveloped," which was reported by staff at the council meeting held on Feb. 8. This position by staff has provided the Ministry of LTC with the parameters necessary to allocate unrestricted development of 140 new LTC beds to Mariann House, currently not even a King City corporation.

I must acknowledge that there may be adequate evidence about "historic use" but it has been nearly 6 weeks that I, and hundreds of citizens, have been asking for the evidence. Suggesting that a modern 188-bed Long Term Care facility is an extension of what existed before 2001 needs to be vetted and proven by a fully qualified professional adjudicator.

But at time of writing, I have not received any response that this will be implemented in the near future. I am willing to work with skilled and knowledgeable experts who can provide a solid assessment of the potential for LTC on the Marylake site as defined by the guidelines of the ORMCP.

ment regarding the development being "environmentally sensitive." In the report to King Township council Feb. 8 it is reported that TRCA did say that the proposed site was outside natural hazards, key natural heritage features (KNF) and their minimum vegetation and protection zones and buffers. Even though they were given erroneous information by Township staff, which makes these conclusions moot, I agree that numerous studies, 5 at minimum, would be required to demonstrate if this project would have significant impact on the "adjacent wetland features and their hydrologic and ecological features." I am very curious to see the site plan, which is apparently to be located on the footprint of the demolished Monastery, as it sits about 50 meters from the kettle lake, well within the minimum area of influence which is 120 meters as defined by the ORMCP.

Citizens, not just environmentalists, should be outraged.

Yes, long term care capacity is desperately needed but at minimum, let's understand the collateral damage. For the last 30 years citizens have advocated and fought for protection of the Oak Ridges Moraine but now approval for development is being rubber-stamped.

Citizens of King Township have just renewed their desire for the northern urban boundary of King City to be the

I do not make the same acknowledg- 15th Sideroad with the approval of the new Official Plan. This project would set a precedent that could affect the whole of the settlement area of King City.

As part of this growth, the extension of municipal services for the proposed LTC facility will set the stage for more development at Marylake Monastery; we saw a "draft" of this in December when council was requested to endorse a MZO to enable development including a hotel/conference centre, a seniors village and more at the Monastery.

Minister Stephen Lecce has announced that he is fulfilling one of his campaign promises to have a LTC facility in King. Why didn't he come to the council and identify his dream? Why didn't he come to council with those who own hundreds of hectares of greenfield lands in King and have been making applications for residential development. Most importantly, why did Minister Lecce not incorporate the functional building blocks of the ORMCP and the Greenbelt in his campaign promises and in the parameters that define new LTC beds in King City?

Finally, why have my council colleagues been so passive in accepting our staff's assessment of "historic use.?" Respecting the expertise and professionalism of our staff does not mean rubber stamping recommendations. This could have been so different!

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


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

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Artistic, soothing sand tables evoke serenity

When art, form and function come together in perfect harmony, the results can be fantastic.

Creations from American company Sisyphus are laborious, but far from futile. The company's moving sand tables, from motion control artist Bruce Shapiro, go way beyond functional tables. They soothe the soul in mesmerizing fashion.

It's not something you'd typically expect from a "conversation piece."

What elevates Sisyphus sand tables is the meticulous attention to detail, and the impressive craftsmanship. These are masterful wonders, meant to be enjoyed and excite all the senses.

The metal ball rolls around the sand, and creates new images every minute. It's simple and quite hypnotic.

It takes the zen garden experience to a whole new level of sight and sound.

The popular table-top models are available in real wood finishes. It's basically plug-and-play, and this optical wonder has limitless capabilities. They come with a standard list of more than 25 patterns or "tracks." It has no on/off switch and you simply plug it in, and it automatically calibrates itself, loads the default list of tracks, and begins moving.

A mobile app allows you to select favorite tracks, create custom lists, pause or change the speed, and dim the table lighting. You can also download tracks shared by others online, or create your own Sisyphus tracks using popular drawing programs like Adobe Illustrator, and send the saved files to your ta-

This is unlike anything else on the planet. It's simple pleasure, in an otherwise troublesome world.

Watching as incredibly intricate patterns evolve in the sand over many hours, only to be "destroyed" by the next pattern, reminded Shapiro of the famous myth. Punished for his self-aggrandizing craftiness and deceitfulness, Sisyphus, in ancient Greek mythology, was forced to roll an immense boulder up a hill only for it to roll down every time it neared the top, repeating this action for all eternity.

The company prefers Albert Camus's take, in his 1942 Le Mythe de Sisyphe: "The struggle itself toward the heights is enough to fill a man's heart."

The meditative beauty of Sisyphus is at the core of what makes it appealing, according to David Aberman, CGO.

"Relaxing kinetic art like this could only be experienced in a museum setting before, but is now something that people can bring into their own space. Not only can they bring Sisyphus into their space, but they can get hands-on with this art through track curation and creation, customizing it for their setting needs – be it winding down after a long day of work, or fascinating clients and co-workers in the office."

He explained the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. Sisyphus owners marvel at the beauty these machines bring, and in many ways make them a central focal point in their households.



Because the company views Sisyphus as an "art instrument," they approach its design and production in the same manner as crafting musical instruments. They echo one of the central themes found in the Sisyphus myth; that of timelessness.

The first Sisyphus was created by Shapiro in 1998 after spending years as a self-taught builder of DIY CNC machines for use in his studio. Using scrapped components from industrial equipment gave him first-hand knowledge of and appreciation for their amazing precision and longevity. This same class of components is used in all of current products.

Aberman explained the Sisyphus mechanism has come a long way since its inception 23 years ago. Shapiro's early focus was on large-scale installations in public spaces. The first was a 3-metre-diameter version at Technorama, in Switzerland in 2003 (where it remains in service today). The desire to share Sisyphus with more people drove the development of smaller, more affordable versions now offered.

"Given its scalability and unlimited design possibilities for its structural furniture, we envision it being a beautiful addition in almost any setting," he said. "While we offer 'standard' versions, we relish the opportunity and challenge to do custom work."

Aberman said they often take on large-scale pieces for custom homes, offices and businesses. There's really no limit on how large and complex the mechanism can be.

King dancer Richardson anxious to get back on stage

Live stage performances have been curtailed during the pandemic, but it hasn't contained the passion and expression for one King dancer.

Stage veteran Hannah Richardson can't wait to share her passion with audiences once again.

It's difficult to go from the pinnacle of live performing, to total withdrawal.

Richardson noted she travelled with her fellow dance mates from Alvin Ailey to Amsterdam to perform at the 2020 Holland Dance Festival. She was a featured dancer in the festival and was honoured to have been chosen to present flowers to HRH Princess Beatrix of Netherlands at the opening ceremonies.

Richardson also had the pleasure to work with Evidence, A Dance Company with Ronald K. Brown as artistic director, on their debut performance of "Mercy." This was performed at the wonderful Fisher Center at Bard. Annandale-on-Hudson, a truly fantastic space. The original music was live and it was "magical," she said.

She also had "the exhilarating plea-

sure" to have performed at the Lincoln Center, the Mecca of the performance stage, not once but three times.

"I will always be excited entering those doorways, hallways, tunnels, aisles, that stage where greatness has danced, sung, performed, and witnessed magic being created. It will always be my honour."

"I truly would take as many tests necessary to be able to come together as dancers, onto the marley floor and create something beautiful."

When the world is "repaired," Richardson hopes to back to rehearsing and performing around the world, sharing her love and joy of dance.

"I enjoy interacting with the audience and alway feel blessed when I get the chance to speak to them during any Q&A sessions or talkbacks. 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

Iran's final report on crash offers little, draws criticism

Iran's final report on the downing of Ukrainian Flight 752 reveals little and offers nothing the way of an explana-

Canadian officials and victims' family members are casting doubt on Iran's investigation into the destruction of Ukrainian Airlines Flight PS752 after it concluded the aircraft was shot down due to human error.

Safety investigators from Iran's civil aviation authority conclude the Boeing 737-800 passenger plane was shot down accidentally in January 2020 after being "misidentified" by an air defence unit as a "hostile target."

All 176 passengers and crew members – including 138 people with ties to Canada – died in the crash.

Marc Garneau, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and the Honourable Omar Alghabra, Minister of Transport, said important critical questions remain.

"The report makes no attempt to answer critical questions about what truly happened," said a joint statement by the ministers. "It appears incomplete and has no hard facts or evidence. Our government, along with the Honourable Ralph Goodale, Special Advisor to the Prime Minister on PS752, has repeatedly called for a comprehensive and transparent investigation according to international standards to answer all the critical outstanding questions. We remain deeply concerned about the lack of convincing information and evidence, despite the publication of this investigation report.

"Their families deserve answers to important questions, including on the series of events that led to these missiles being launched in the first place, and why the airspace was allowed to remain open during a period of heightened hostilities. Upon preliminary review of the investigation report, it is clear we still do not have answers as to why Iran did not put in place the necessary measures, such as a full closure of their airspace, to prevent such a tragedy.

"We reiterate Canada's commitment to seeking answers and justice by holding Iran accountable and by ensuring it takes full responsibility and makes full reparations for the harm caused to the families and loved ones of the victims of Flight PS752."

The Association of Families of Flight PS752 Victims strongly rejects the submissions of Iran in its final technical report on the downing of Flight PS752, "which appear to be mere fabrications and a continuation of a lie. The contents published in this report, as with their previous reports, contain countless inconsistencies and are grossly inadequate to justify Iran's claims about the causes of the downing.

"Given all available information, the families of victims cannot accept Iran's claims that Flight PS752 was shot down due to a human error or that it was mistaken for a cruise missile. The available evidence, as well as inconsistencies in Iran's claims, point to the opposite direction: that Flight PS752 was shot down intentionally.

Nobleton's Shahin Moghaddam helped start the association, after he

lost his wife and son in the tragedy. "Over the last several months, the Association has made public a portion of the available factual evidence that exposes the implausibility of the claims of human error and raises questions from Iranian authorities about whether Iran will ever disclose the true facts. That view is shared among many of the officials and experts – including the former Foreign Minister of Canada, François-Philippe Champagne; Deputy Foreign Minister of Ukraine, Yevgheniy Yenin; as well as the Special Rapporteur on extrajudicial, summary, or arbitrary executions appointed by the United Nations Human Rights Council, Agnès Callamard.

Agnès Callamard.

"In the words of Ms. Callamard, writing about information released by Iran at that point, Iran's claims and stories appear 'to be contrived to mislead in one or more ways.' This document then asserts that on the basis of the information released by Iran, 'it is not possible to answer many basic questions and clarify conjectures' that have 'led many to question whether the downing of Flight PS752 was not intentional.' There is nothing in Iran's final report that suggests a different conclusion now."

sion now."

The association is asking for the public's help in pressing the federal government for an independent investigation

into the crash.

"In our campaign to persuade Canadian Government to take the above

request to the UN Security Council, we have registered an e-petition e-3083 with the House of Commons in Ottawa, Canada. The goal of this petition is to get enough support in the parliament to direct Canadian Government to take this matter to the UN Security Council and put pressure on Islamic Regime to cooperate with the investigation. There are evidences that this attack on a civilian airplane was intentionally planed by Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps."

The Iranian report is also being reviewed by the International Coordination and Response Group for the victims of Flight PS752. The group includes ministers representing Afghanistan, Canada, Sweden, Ukraine, and the United Kingdom.

"As we have done since the beginning, the Coordination Group will continue to seek accountability and transparency from the Islamic Republic of Iran for this tragedy and justice for the victims."

The report itself concluded the aircraft was "misidentified as a hostile target by an air defense unit; two missiles were fired at PS752."

The Iranian report said "risk management was not effective due to occurrence of an error, which had not been previously predicted."

The report acknowledges the cause was the air defense's "launching of two surface-to-air missiles at the Flight PS752 ..."

The Iranian report said the crew were still alive after the first missile detonated in proximity to the aircraft and transponders stopped transmitting radio signals. The Iranians said it's not likely the second missile affected the aircraft. They said the aircraft maintained its structural integrity by the time it crashed into the ground and exploded, roughly 3 minutes, 27 seconds after the launch of the first missile.

The report stated that "an unanticipated error in threat identifications ... failed to protect the flight safety against the threats caused by the alertness of defense forces."

Kathy Fox, chair of the Transportation Safety Board of Canada, said a safety investigation is not intended to attribute blame or determine civil or criminal liability.

"Experience has shown that an independent and thorough safety-focused investigation usually offers the best chance of finding out what really happened and why, providing the answers that everyone is asking for, particularly the families who lost so much," she said.

While the TSB had no jurisdiction to conduct a parallel investigation, Iran offered the TSB more access to the investigation activities than we were technically entitled to, but less than what we asked for. For example, 2 TSB investigators spent 6 days in Tehran following the crash, visiting the accident site, examining the wreckage, and meeting with Iranian safety investigators to review information gathered by their team. Later, they also met with Iranian, Ukrainian, and French investigators in Kiev before returning to Canada.

In July of last year, a Canadian expert and a TSB recorder specialist attended the readout of the aircraft's flight recorders in Paris. Throughout the course of the investigation, they were in direct contact with Iran's AAIB and attended many discussions with the other participating countries. However, Fox said in spite of multiple requests, Canada was never formally accorded the higher status of accredited representative and hence were not allowed to listen to the cockpit voice recorders or directly access the flight data recordings.

At Ukraine's request, in early February of this year, TSB was invited to provide them technical assistance, and Ukraine gave us access to the draft safety report for review and comments, something we would not otherwise have been entitled to.

"Throughout this process, we have specifically asked Iran's AAIB to answer 3 important questions:

"What was the sequence of events, including the technical, human and organizational factors, that led to the missiles being fired and ultimately the downing of PS752?

"What was the basis for the decision to keep Iran's airspace open during a period of heightened military alert after Iran had launched missiles into

Nobleton man says Iranian report 'deceives' and 'denies' responsibility

Iran's final report into the downing of Ukrainian Flight 752 is nothing but "lies and misleading information," according to a local man who lost his wife and son in the tragedy.

Shahin Moghaddam says it's up to the governments of the world, including Canada, to seek the truth and push for action.

Moghaddam wants the federal government to take a stronger stance and abandon its "no action policy."

He said the Islamic regime blamed the missile station operator and acquitted all the commanders of the IRGC and Ali Khamenei, as well as the commander-in-chief of the Iranian armed forces, "who were directly responsible for this criminal act."

The Islamic regime report, Shahin Moghaddam said, is "clearly designed to deceive an to deny and to deflect the truth. It is perfectly clear, that what Mr. Zarif said couple of weeks ago was true. He stated that the government of Iran will never be transparent on this and it is time to Canadian government to stand up against those who murdered its citizens. The Islamic Regime's report clearly released to cover up the truth" for the following reasons:

The Iranian report on the shooting down of 752 clearly demonstrates once again that Iran "has no intention of being transparent or accountable for the deaths of our loved ones at the hands of the IRGC. Once again Iran has demonstrated its commitment to denial and deception. It is Canada who needs to change its approach."

Moghaddam said the Islamic regime has shown again and again, since its founding, that it will never change itself. This regime does not respect any international law unless to be forced by international communities.

"The Trudeau government does not rely only on negotiation. It is time for Canada to inset diplomatic pressure in parallel to negotiation in order to force this regime to corporate."

Moghaddam helped launch the Association of Families of Flight PS752 Victims shortly after the tragedy. They are fighting for justice and compensation for the victims' families.

Canada, he said, should consider the seek justice for its citizens. following steps:

• Canada should ban the IRGC in its entirety as a terrorist organization. The IRGC's terrorist credentials are unquestioned. In fact, Prime Minister Trudeau voted to ban the IRGC in a parliamentary resolution in 2018. Why has he not implemented the resolution he voted for?

- Canada should impose Magnitsky sanctions on the most senior Iranian officials responsible for the shooting down of PS752.
- · Canada must ask its alliances to declare Iran's sky as unsafe until Islamic regime cooperate with the investigation and Canada and other countries are able to access to all the information's needed to find the truth about this downing.
- Canada should seek help form its alliances to support a resolution at the UN security council to force Islamic regime to cooperate with investigation by third party.
- Canada should take its complains to the International court of Justice against this barbaric act of shooting by Islamic regime of Iran and seek justice for families and victims.

"Unfortunately, Canadian government with its no action policy put the life of Canadians across the world in danger. The Chinese government can take Canadians as hostages with no consequences. Councillors' remuneration released

Taxpayers are getting good return for the cost of governance in King. Salaries for councillors were released for 2020, and reveal a 9% hike over 2019. In 2019, the Municipal Act removed a 1/3 tax-free allowance for councillors. This caused the increase for 2020.

The total remuneration for local politicians last year was \$388,300.56. This represents less than 1% of the Township's annual budget.

The totals include more than councillors' salaries, and also include payroll benefits, health and dental expenses, all of which receive a dollar amount.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini received a salary of \$78,417.51, along with \$12,147.09 in payroll benefits, \$6,788.38 in health and dental and a \$6,000 car allowance. The mayor also received \$656.23 for municipal expenses or attending events. That brought his total to \$104.009.21.

There's a slight variance in councillors' salaries, but all are in the area of \$36,000. Councillors receive a small stipend when they serve as chair or deputy.

Councillor David Boyd received %36,105.28 and \$5,665.31 in payroll benefits. He had \$7,548.32 in health benefits, for a total payout of \$49,318.91.

Councillor Avia Eek received \$36,205.25 and \$5,681.50 in payroll benefits and another \$6,788.38 in health benefits, for a total of \$48,675.13.

Bill Cober received \$36,117.18, along with \$5,667.23 in payroll and \$6,788.38 in health benefits. His total was \$48,572.79. Jakob Schneider received a salary of \$36,023.61, along with \$5,652.07 in payroll

benefits and \$2,550.30 in health benefits. He also had \$373.55 in expenses, for a total Debbie Schaefer received a salary of \$35,954.14 and \$5,640.82 in payroll benefits,

and another \$6,788.38 in health benefits. She claimed \$610.56 for memberships and education, for a total of \$48,993.90.

Jordan Cescolini received \$35,941.94 in salary, and \$5,638.84 in payroll benefits and another \$2,550.30 in health benefits. His total was \$44,131.91.



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

Fox said since receiving Iran's draft investigation report, the Canadian team has carefully reviewed and analyzed its contents and has now compared it to the final report.

Iran's final report concludes that PS752 was shot down because an air defense unit mistook the B737 aircraft as a threat. This misidentification reportedly occurred because of a misalignment of the missile launcher's radar. Furthermore, the operator did not receive permission to shoot from senior officers, as he should have.

Fox said Iran has provided no evidence to support this scenario, however, it is "a plausible explanation for what happened."

Schomberg resident Andre Milne. of Unicorn Aerospace, was not surprised with Fox's claim that the final report has been deemed as being a "plausible explanation" by the Canadian government.

"It became painfully obvious to me that this entire matter is just another political game on the world stage the second Justin Trudeau blurted out Iran's shooting down PS752 was unintentional," Milne said.

Milne said the Ukrainian Anti Terrorist Prosecutor has requested his help in the PS752 investigation to identify evidence that will bring the IRGC to the International Court of Justice for Crimes Against Humanity.

The report, Fox added, does not provide detailed information regarding how the misalignment occurred, nor what steps were taken to ensure it was



properly calibrated, the missile operator's training, experience, or proficiency, nor about how or why the required communications with central command were either not followed or were unsuccessful.

The report frames this action in the context of the heightened military alert given their expectation of retaliation following Iran's earlier launch of missiles against Iraqi air bases housing U.S. military personnel, but does not discuss what supervision or oversight was provided of field operations by Iran's command and control system.

The report also doesn't discuss what steps the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps has taken since then to identify the underlying safety deficiencies that allowed such an error to occur, nor what safety action has been taken to prevent such a mistake from happening again.

"Without this, how can the international civil aviation community be reassured that such a tragic error won't happen again?"

Iran's final report generally explains the risk assessment process and mitigations that its civilian authorities took in coordination with the military, given the uncertainty of a retaliatory strike following their launch of missiles into Iraq. For example, the report says that Iran gradually cleared air traffic from using certain air routes to the west, from which direction they thought a

quired military approval for each aircraft's departure from civil airports such as Tehran's International airport. However, Iran did not completely close its airspace to civilian aircraft.

In spite of being in a state of height-

retaliatory strike might come, and re-

In spite of being in a state of heightened military alert, Iran did not publish any notices to warn aircraft operators of these hazards, as recommended by ICAO, until after PS752 was shot down.

This report, Fox said, only partially explains why the airspace remained open and why operators continued to fly after Iran had launched missiles into Iraq.


"It does not explain any of the underlying factors behind why the missiles were launched at PS752, the stated cause of this tragedy. In short, the report says what happened, but doesn't address the why."

Now that this safety investigation has concluded, the TSB is committed to advocating for a review of the provisions of ICAO Annex 13 to improve the credibility and transparency of such future safety investigations so that families and the public can have confidence in their findings and recommendations.





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

The Aurora Sports Hall of Fame new social media strategy a key factor in promoting the nomination process, President Javed Khan says.

"The reason we're taking this strategy and tactic is to create some buzz and awareness," Khan said.

"You may know someone like this that's done some amazing things in our community as an athlete, a builder or a coach, that you want to recognize as potential to get into the hall of fame."

Recently, the Hall of Fame has recognized previous winners Jim Clark and Ryan Gardner with special video tributes posted on Instagram and Facebook. Links to the nomination process are provided.

This year, Khan hopes patrons will nominate more women.

"We need more females. We only have three females in our hall," Khan

He also says he hopes athletes, coaches or builders in sports other than hockey are promoted. As of now, there are limited Hall of Fame representatives from soccer, baseball, hockey, and rugby.

The requirements to fill out the nomination process are quite simple. Nominees are only expected to check off one of the criteria that is established.

The Nomination Form must be completed and can be downloaded off of the Aurora Sports Hall of Fame website. A 500-word proposal must be written describing the person's achievements in their sport. Documentation, such as newspaper clippings and anything to further support their proposal is also required, along with a letter of endorsement.

Player Assist Program will help families in need

The Ontario Minor Hockey Association introduces a player-assist program for the first-time helping families across Ontario financially impacted due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Basically, mirroring the goalie program, is this player assist program. Now what we would do is provide player kits to the association," Executive Director of the OMHA, Ian Taylor says.

"Players can try the sport and sample the sport without having to put all that investment in all that equipment. The goal for us is eliminating another one of those barriers to entry."

The goalie-assist program, introduced 10 years ago, supplements the cost of goalie equipment for parents by providing rental equipment for children between the ages of five and seven. According to the OMHA's press release, 480 sets of equipment have been rented out since the program's inception.

The same concept will be applied in this player-assist program. Players at or under the age of seven will be given equipment to borrow.

To qualify, minor hockey associations around the province must apply to the OMHA by March 28. If approved that association can provide the equipment at their discretion.

Depending on the demand it is highly unlikely minor hockey associations receive equipment in consecutive sea-

it all depends on the demand and how many applications we get," Taylor said.

"We want to spread the wealth. We want to give as much opportunity across the board."

Taylor recognizes children don't just walk into playing hockey. There are plenty of external factors preventing families from signing up their children that are far beyond registration fees. He hopes this program will have an excellent impact moving forward for families across Ontario. It could be the gateway for children coming into the sport or simply, spending a year trying

The OMHA's press release said over 350 families through 10 minor hockey associations will have costs eliminated.

Assisting the OMHA with this program is their loyal sponsor since 2018, the Egg Farmers of Ontario.

Historically, they have only been a sponsor during the playoffs, but with the post-season having been cancelled, they found another way to help out minor hockey.

"They could have easily stepped away. They just didn't want to do that. They said how else can we make an impact in the community?" Taylor said.

"They stepped up in fact. It will impact kids. It will impact directly and in fact, this might be a more important way to be involved. It's just great."

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Memories wanted ahead of Horse Show centennial

For more than eighty years, the Aurora Horse Show was a staple on Aurora's calendar.

Although it came to an end in 2006, the memories endure for generations of residents.

And that's where the Aurora Museum & Archives comes in.

Ahead of the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Aurora Horse Show in 1922, the local museum is asking residents to contribute their photos, artefacts and, perhaps most importantly, their memories to make the anniversary one for the books.

A publication is just one of the many initiatives the Museum has planned to mark the occasion, but there are some gaps that those who attended in years past will be instrumental in filling.

Aurora," says Shawna White, Curator of the Aurora Museum and Archives, of the event which has its roots as a privately-run event in 1922.

It wasn't until the following year, however, that the Horse Show began taking shape as an attraction for all Aurorans, first at Town Park and, come the 1970s, the more spacious Machell Park.

"You look at Town Park now and can't believe there was a horse show and a midway," says Ms. White. "It is part of the memory of everybody who grew up in Aurora. It was something you looked forward to. It was fabulous. What better way to celebrate it than doing a publication – a nice book with lots of photographs, the whole history of it? What we're wanting now is to reach out to the community members who have memories of it. Maybe they were in-

"The Horse Show was a big deal in volved in it, maybe they can tell us that Aurorans as they are living it, says Ms. story before it is gone. As we get further afield and more generations come in, it will be gone."

> The Aurora Museum and Archives is brimming over with artefacts and photos from Horse Show events from the 1940s and 50s, but tangible mementos and memories are scarce in later decades. In fact, there is little to nothing to serve as a legacy for events from the 1970s through to its demise in the first decade of the new millennium.

> "It is one of those things where everybody went to it, everybody knows about it, but nobody bothers to save it," says Ms. White. "We need programs, we need posters, we need photographs. If anyone took home movies there or did anything like that, we would love to see that just so we can tell the story. There are these amazing things that happened in Town Park, but who were the people and what did they do? Where else did they compete? We know the famous ones, but we don't have these individual ones and the memory of what the show meant to the community."

> Beyond the centenary of the Horse Show next year, part of the Museum's strategy is collecting the history of today, the things that people will want to see 100 years from now. They want to bring together the lived experiences of

White, and that includes the mementos you might be squirreling away in boxes to look at another day – even if it is 50 years from now.

One such initiative the Museum has begun preserving for generations to come is the Solidarity March which took place in Aurora last spring in conjunction with the murder of George Floyd and the Black Lives Matter movement.

"We reached out to organizers to get some of those things to put in the Archives because they can tell that story," says Ms. White. "We're asking people to tell us these stories so we're not putting words in their mouth. They will tell us how they felt about it, how it came about, so people 50 to 100 years from now aren't making assumptions and drawing conclusions. We are very much trying to capture things as they happen and being able to talk to people who are doing it to get their thoughts about things that are happening.

"We also have the ongoing Documenting the Pandemic project asking people, whether they are making a diary or pictures, we want that content."

YRDSB launches pilot Black Student Success Network

York Region District School Board has launched the pilot Black Student Success Network (BSSN). One small step back to normal – All Saints Easter worship. If the weather

cop-operates, we will hold an outdoor Eucharist service from the front steps of the Church on Easter Sunday, April 6 at 10:30. We will sing with masks on and keep our distance. It should be a happy and memorable occasion.

Words to Live by – Fr. Peterson gave his sermon on a text from Hebrews 5: "Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; 9and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him."

"Most of us have issues with the word 'obey." While we want to obey the law when we have to, while driving, or while preparing our tax return, I suspect that we bridle at the idea of being told to obey. We don't want to be told what to do. And yet here is the author of Hebrews, telling us that if we want salvation, we have to obey Jesus.

To put it plainly, if we choose to follow Jesus, then I think we have to obey

him as best we can. It helps that Jesus, models obedience for us. Now as we approach Holy Week, the cross draws near. He knows the cost, and still, he goes. Hebrews does not say, if you want to obey Jesus, you must suffer like he does. What I think Hebrews does say that we should follow someone who knows what our lives our like, and who knows our suffering and our imperfections.

It's pretty clear we need to learn how to be obedient followers of Jesus. If that idea seems daunting to you, take comfort in knowing how fully Jesus understands your situation. He's been in our place, fully and completely. Hebrews seems to refer to the story of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane when it talks about how Jesus "offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who as able to save him

from death" (Heb 5.). In John's gospel, Jesus himself seems to anticipate the same moment when he says "Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say – 'Father, save me from this hour?' (Jn 12). As we approach Good Friday, we should realize that the man who set his face towards the cross and death was as human as we are.

"What happens on the cross is highly meaningful because Jesus goes to the cross as one of us, to share a human death. Jesus saves us because he did not abandon his humanity. He lives out what Hebrews calls 'the days of flesh', fully and completely. He takes all we are and perfects them."

As we approach Holy Week, let's not just see Jesus as a sacrificial lamb. Let's also see him as a friend who wants to walk alongside us, share our burdens, and see us safely home.
