# York offers 2nd dose for those 80 and over

The Regional Municipality of York continues to deliv- line appointment. er vaccines identified in the Government of Ontario's COVID-19 Vaccine Plan and is advancing second doses to eligible York Region residents 80 years of age and older.

"With more than 70% of eligible York Region adults having received their first dose, we are excited to start administrating second doses of the COVID-19 vaccines," said York Region Chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. "Achieving the 70% coverage milestone is a testament to the dedication and commitment of many residents and partners who continue to work together to reduce the spread of COVID-19 in our communities and will help move Ontario to a gradual and safe reopen."

Residents who already have a second dose appointment booked now have the option to re-book an earlier appointment. New appointments can be booked online or by phone by visiting york.ca/COVID19Vaccine

Eligible residents 80 years of age and older who do not yet have a second dose appointment can also book an on-

Previously booked second-dose appointments will be honoured and will not be cancelled unless a new and earlier appointment is confirmed.

Residents 80 years of age and older who are not able or comfortable booking an online appointment are encouraged to seek out a support person (caregiver, family member or friend) who can assist in booking this appointment on their behalf. Telephone support is also available and is listed under the applicable clinic.

'Getting residents fully vaccinated as soon as possible remains a top priority for York Region Public Health," said Dr. Karim Kurji, York Region's Medical Officer of Health. "By starting to administer the second dose to this priority group two weeks earlier than expected, we anticipate moving to the 70 to 79 age band as early as mid-June."

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



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## Ontario accelerates rollout of second shots for a two-dose summer

in its fight against COVID-19, having achieved its target to administer first doses to 65 per cent of Ontarians aged 18 and over ahead of schedule.

Ontario is also preparing to roll out the eligibility for accelerated second dose appointments starting with individuals aged 80 and over. If there is sufficient vaccine supply, it is anticipated that the majority of Ontario residents who choose to receive the vaccine will be able to be fully vaccinated by the end of summer.

"Team Ontario has shown what we can do when we have a steady and reliable supply of vaccines," said Premier Ford. "Having made so much progress administering first doses, we are now in a position to begin delivering second doses for a two-dose summer. If we receive more vaccines from the federal government, we'll be able to accelerate our rollout further to offer more protection to Ontarians even sooner."

Due to a reliable and increased supply of vaccines throughout May, Ontario has been able to quickly expand eligibility and access at mass vaccinations sites, hospital clinics and pharmacies, with all Ontarians aged 12 and over eligible to book an appointment to receive the vaccine ahead of schedule. With over 8.6 million doses administered, and over 8 million people having received at least one dose, the province reached its target to administer first doses to 65 per cent of Ontarians aged 18 and over.

"Thanks to the efforts of our frontline health care heroes and community partners, our province has reached another exciting milestone of 65 per cent of Ontario adults having received

Second doses will continue to be administered to other eligible individuals as directed by the province.

Individuals who are 12 years of age and older who live, work or go to school in York Region who have not yet received their first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine are encouraged to do so. 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Ontario has reached a key milestone their first dose," said Christine Elliott, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "Accelerating second doses will provide more protection to Ontarians sooner. Every dose administered means we are one step closer to the end of the pandemic, and I encourage all Ontarians to get vaccinated and continue following public health advice."

> With two-thirds of the adult population having received at least one dose, Ontarians have been provided with a strong level of protection against COVID-19.

> Now, Ontario is beginning to accelerate second doses for all Ontarians. While the interval between first and second doses can be up to 16 weeks, Ontario will begin to offer second dose appointments at an earlier interval, based on availability of vaccines. The timing of second dose appointments may vary based on local considerations, vaccine supply and the date of first dose appointment.

> To support this accelerated rollout, the province has developed an anticipated schedule for eligibility to accelerate second doses based on confirmed supply. This will begin with individuals turning 80 and over in 2021, who will be eligible to book their second dose appointment, followed by individuals aged 70 and over scheduled to begin the week of June 14.

> The province will then continue to expand eligibility for second dose appointments based on date of first dose. Ontario will further accelerate the rollout of second doses in the event that the

federal government confirms increased vaccine deliveries.

Ontarians who have had their first dose and are eligible for an accelerated second dose may be able to return to the same site or channel where they received their first dose for their second dose appointment, or may choose to book an appointment at a different site or channel. Second dose appointments can be rebooked through the provincial booking system and through pharma-

For those in public health units who use their own booking system, or who received their doses from the primary care provider or through a pop-up clinic, more information will follow on how and when second dose booking and rebooking will be available. Second dose appointments can also be booked (without a first appointment) in the provincial booking system.

Ontario has already begun offering second doses of the AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine at an accelerated pace with a 10-week interval for individuals who received their first dose between March 10 to 19. Acceleration of AstraZeneca second doses will be provided at a 12-week interval, dependent on vaccine supply, with booking eligibility based on the date of the first dose.

Eligible individuals are encouraged to contact the pharmacy or primary care provider where they received their first dose to book an appointment. They might be redirected to a local pharmacy that is participating in administering second doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine. Primary care settings and pharmacies may also be reaching out to eligible Ontarians.

The province will provide further guidance based on advice expected shortly from the National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) with respect to administering doses of two different vaccine types. This advice will be provided in advance of the 12week interval when most people are needing to receive their second dose.

"As Ontario's vaccine rollout continues, we are expanding our distribution plan in response to medical expertise, evidence and the availability of vaccines," said Solicitor General Sylvia Jones. "Accelerating the scheduling for second doses and providing individuals with the option of also receiving their second dose earlier, will allow a greater number of people to be fully vaccinated sooner."

The government also continues to roll out first doses to Ontarians. Recently the province expanded eligibility to youth aged 12 and over to schedule a COVID-19 vaccine appointment through the provincial booking system and call centre, and public health units that use their own booking systems, as well as at select pharmacies administering the Pfizer vaccine.

To ensure as many youth as possible are fully vaccinated before the start of the school year, the province expects to provide a first dose to all willing youth aged 12 to 17 before the end of June, and a second dose before the end of August

#### THE PROJECT

The Ministry of Transportation (MTO) has retained Morrison Hershfield to complete the Detail Design and Class Environmental Assessment Study for the widening of Highway 400 from north of King Road to south of 16th Sideroad and from north of 16th Sideroad to south of Lloydtown-Aurora Road. The project is located in the Township of King within the Regional Municipality of York, as shown in the key plan.

The project involves the widening of two sections of Highway 400 from six to ten lanes, to accommodate a buffer separated median high occupancy vehicle (HOV) lane and 4 general purpose lanes (GPL) in each direction. The proposed work will bridge the gaps between adjacent widenings previously and currently being constructed along Highway 400. Following completion of construction, the extra HOV lane and GPL/direction will be opened from King Road to Highway 9.

The project also includes improvements to the existing Highway 400 northbound Truck Inspection Station, a new southbound truck layby (south of 18th Sideroad), drainage improvements and stormwater management measures, culvert replacements, partial illumination at each of the HOV access/ egress locations, pavement rehabilitation within the study limits and safety upgrades.

#### THE PROCESS

This environmental assessment will follow the approved planning process for a Group 'B' project as contained in the Class Environmental Assessment for Provincial Transportation Facilities, 2000 (Class EA). This project is building on the Preliminary Design which received Environmental Clearance as part of the 2002 Transportation Environmental Study Report (TESR) - Highway 400 from North of Major Mackenzie Drive to South Canal Bridge and the 2015 TESR Addendum - Highway 400 Widening.

A Design and Construction Report (DCR) will be prepared documenting existing environmental conditions, potential impacts of the undertaking, required mitigation measures, and public consultation. Upon completion of this study in Fall 2021, the DCR will be placed on the public record for a 30-day review period. The release of the DCR for review will be the subject of a future notice. Construction is anticipated to commence in Spring 2022 subject to receipt of funding and environmental approvals.

# Citizens want greater digital accessibility

The pandemic has taught us many

We've grown up, out of necessity, to the point where we're now much more digital savvy. And our appetite for more seems insatiable.

That's a good thing. The more we become well versed in all things digital, the better off our society will be. At least that's the hope.

The demand for digitally accessing government services is higher than ever, and it's here to stay. A survey commissioned by ServiceNow reveals if given the choice, at least two-thirds of Canadians prefer to access services digitally, across federal (69%), provincial (70%) and municipal services

Roughly 74% say the pandemic has made them more open to accessing government services digitally. Delivering great experiences matter, as more than half of Canadians say positive experiences with public services improve their overall perceptions of government (61%) and increase the likelihood they will have future interactions with government agencies (56%).

However, access to public services is a challenge for nearly half (46%) of Canadians who rely on someone else to help them navigate government systems. Among those who rely on someone else to handle public service processes for them, 3 in 10 (28%) need help because the process is too complicated, while another 2 in 10 (18%) say they do not know how to do it or where to go.

# Rethinking fireworks: A new vision in the sky

An unexpected phone call on Monday, May 24 this year brought news and a story that certainly opened my eyes in new ways and sure got me thinking. More about the phone call later.

As a child growing up in the suburbs of Toronto I have fond memories of Victoria Day when neighbours and families would gather in our quiet residential street, each with a contribution of a small box of simple fireworks including the sparklers which always fascinated us kids, as we would swirl them in the dark making an infinite number of shapes, letters and numbers.

Into my adult years I attended some remarkable public fireworks displays including the "Symphony of Fire" at Ontario Place where amazing patterns of light and colour flashed in the night sky over Lake Ontario all to wonderful music often featuring full symphonies.

More recently, I have attended the Canada Day festivities and fireworks in Kettleby. I must admit that while I continued to appreciate the marvellous flashes and patterns of bright colour in the night sky, I found the loud bangs in the sky jarring and hard on my hearing, and I wasn't enjoying the rain of ashes and pieces of the firework cases on my head and all over the Tyrwhit Park field, plus breathing the residual smoke of the exploded fireworks.

Coming back to this year, 2021, and the phone call. Over the three days of the Victoria Day weekend this year I could hear large booms from backyards in my neighbourhood and catch glimpses of the colourful patterns of light in the sky. On Sunday evening, there seemed to be a lot of fireworks that went on for one to two hours. And then the phone call came on Monday from a rural neighbour living adjacent to a large wetland area with 20 nesting pairs of great blue herons with young chicks in the nests.

The story was that on Sunday eve-

ning there were ongoing fireworks happening in a residential subdivision close to the heron colony with the typical jarring loud booms and flashes of light in the sky. The adult herons responded by leaving their nests and flying far away.

My neighbour was very concerned about the young chicks and unsure what to do. I reached out to others, and the advice from birding friends was overall encouraging with suggestions that likely the adult herons would return. This was all a first for me, as I had never considered the impact of today's fireworks on wildlife.

My eyes were opened a lot. I've also learned that family pets and young children are often terrified by the sudden loud bangs in the sky overhead, and also many adults are upset by the sounds.

In addition, I've learned that there are significant toxic emissions released into the air along with all the ash and debris that falls to the ground and into lakes, rivers, wetlands and ponds.

Gratefully I report that adult great blue herons have returned to their nests. However, I'm left reflecting on this whole event.

I began to wonder if there are alternatives to the long held tradition of celebrating with fireworks, and a friend sent a remarkable video to me. It featured the 2021 New Year celebrations from Scotland where 150 drones equipped with coloured lights and programmed by computer created marvellous images and hopeful words in the night sky over the Scottish highlands and the city of Edinburgh. I recommend having a good look at the creative marvel of the celebration in Scotland and in other locations using drones. I imagine we'll be seeing more companies move forward with this new technology.

## Heat pumps, not furnaces for the health of your home

Today we can save ourselves a lot of money by replacing our old furnaces with the latest in air source heat pumps, called cold-climate heat pumps, (CCHPs).

These have had technological advancements which began about a decade ago. They are now more efficient over the twelve months of the year, retaining efficiency at low outdoor temperatures such as -20 C.

The result of this higher efficiency, is a cost savings on your heating bill. Also, since this cold-climate air source heat pump is a two way heat pump, it will also cool your home, saving you the additional cost of a new A/C if you have one. Older A/C units are not as efficient as these heat pumps.

Basically, a heat pump, moves heat from one place to another. A two-way heat pump can reverse the direction and move heat both in and out of your home or building. These are quieter units and they work steadily to keep the inside air at the right temperature and moisture level as well. Without having to burn fuel for a heat source to heat your home, you will save money because heat pumps allow you to efficiently draw the free heat energy from the outdoor air, even if it is cold outside.

Because our provincial electricity is largely generated without creating air pollution, last year <7% was gas generated, you will also help reduce green house gases (GHGs) that contribute to global warming or climate change. The more we can electrify our energy use, the lower our GHG emissions will become.

The basic first step is to conserve energy by increasing insulation and seal air leaks. Less energy is wasted, so less heating will be required for comfort on cold days, saving money whatever your heat source. Natural Resources Canada, has begun a home retrofit programme which offers up to \$5,000 toward energy conservation, energy efficiency, and renewable generation retrofits.

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



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## Ontario keeping seniors in LTC homes cool this summer

across the province will be able to keep cool this summer due to improved regulations and investments in air conditioning by the Government of Ontario.

Ontario updated regulations under the Long-Term Care Homes Act, 2007, which require designated cooling areas of all homes be served by air conditioning and be maintained at a comfortable level during specified periods and which will enhance the effectiveness of enforcement. These new regulations came into effect May 15, and all 626 long-term care homes in Ontario are in compliance. In comparison, last year nearly 13 per cent of long-term care homes had no air conditioning at all.

"We said that this government would spare no expense in order to protect our most vulnerable. Today's announcement is another example of us delivering on that promise as we continue to correct for the decades of neglect in long-term care that were allowed under previous governments," said Premier Doug Ford. "This investment is in addi-

Residents in long-term care homes tion to the historic \$246 million commitment in our 2021 Budget to improve living conditions in long-term care homes and will ensure that their residents and staff finally enjoy the level of care and comfort they deserve."

In addition to ensuring designated cooling areas in all long-term care homes, homes have made significant progress in exceeding the regulatory requirements by providing cooling throughout their buildings, including in resident rooms.

Currently, 60 per cent of homes are fully air conditioned, including in all resident rooms, compared to 42 per cent last summer. An additional 23 per cent of homes are working toward being fully air conditioned as soon as possible.

"Our government and Ontario's 626 long-term care homes have worked quickly to ensure vulnerable residents, staff and families will be cool, comfortable and safe this summer," said Dr. Merrilee Fullerton, Minister of Long-Term Care. "Every single home is now providing air conditioning in designated cooling areas and at least 83 per cent Ontario. of homes will have full air conditioning by this summer."

The Ontario government has invested \$61.4 million through the Infection Prevention and Control Minor Capital Program to provide air conditioning in long-term care homes, as part of a \$246 million commitment in Budget 2021: Protecting People's Health and Our Economy to improve living conditions in long-term care homes. The government is also providing an additional \$23.9 million through the Long-Term Care Minor Capital Program.

The province has also put other programs in place to ensure that all longterm care homes have air conditioning by the summer. Ontario is providing homes up to \$100 million in joint provincial-federal funding through the COVID-19 Resilience Infrastructure Stream of the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program, to upgrade and improve HVAC (heating, ventilation and air conditioning) and sprinkler systems in long-term care homes across

Ontario long-term care homes without central air conditioning are required to have at least one separate designated cooling area for every 40 residents.

Ontario's Long-Term Care Home Design Manual requires newly constructed or redeveloped homes to install mechanical cooling designed to ensure that temperatures can be maintained at a comfortable level for residents in all areas of the home.

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# Sharing stories from grandparents through new innovative device

A third of us don't know what our grandparents did for a living, or that they got into all sorts of mischief that would shock their families today

The majority of Brits wish they'd known more about their grandparents before they died, with a third unable to recall what their grandparents did for a living, a UK-wide study has found.

Researchers from non-profit life story organization Augr surveyed 2,000 people in a bid to find out how much the nation knows about their families' past.

The study found that just two in every 10 people know how their grand-parents met, with a third admitting they don't know how their parents met either.

Despite this, 66% of people involved in the study said they would be interested to find out more about their family's history, and almost half wish they'd kept a diary of their own stories to help to bring the past to life for their family in the future.

Thinking about their own lives, three-quarters of participants involved in the research confided that there are stories from their past that their families don't know about, with a third of those aged over 65 believing that their stories will die with them.

From nude photoshoots, to teenage mischief, more than 30% of respondents admitted that some stories from their younger days would be a shock to their families today, and, perhaps unsurprisingly, an additional 30% claimed to have found out things about family members after they died that they did not know when they were alive.

When it comes to remembering loved

ones, the majority of respondents enjoy reliving the past by telling stories with friends and family, while 70% believe it's important to keep loved ones' memories alive after they've passed.

In light in of findings, the boffins behind tech-start-up, Augr, are launching a campaign to encourage people to share their stories, before it's too late.

"For as long as history, ordinary people's life stories have remained untold and unremembered. Only the lives of the rich and famous (and royalty of course) are officially documented," said Justin Hopkins, co-founder of Augr

"It's clear from the results of our study that this remains the case. Only a handful of people are able to confidently recall information about their immediate relatives, never mind their ancestors of old. It's very sad.

"We want to change that. Our mission is to give everyone the opportunity to record and share the story of their life with friends, family and the wider world. We hope the launch of Augr will enable more people to document their stories for future generations to look back on with fondness and pride."

Augr is a not-for profit social history initiative. It has designed an innovative audio biography device, running state-of-the-art AI recording technology. My kids and I will always draw strength from the care and comfort their mom experienced in her last days. My wife Lori was only 44 when she died last fall, leaving me and our two children devastated. Lori and I met at teachers' college in New Brunswick and quickly knew that we wanted to spend our lives together. We had no idea that this would only mean about 22 years.


## Lori was the most amazing person I ever knew.

Lori was a passionate educator and brought such enthusiasm and energy to her classroom. She helped me to be a better teacher; not only with my own grade 8 students, but also with our children: Grant, 14 and Emily, 16.

Lori was diagnosed with cervical cancer in September 2016 following a routine checkup. Her doctors recommended a grueling 28 rounds of radiation followed by 24 rounds of chemotherapy and 4 rounds of brachytherapy. They were confident that this intense treatment would rid her of the cancer cells so that she wouldn't need to worry about this ever again. Lori attacked treatment with the same passion and energy she'd always had. After a full day of painful treatment, she'd be up at the crack of dawn to take Grant to hockey practice or Emily to riding lessons. Family was everything to Lori. Our family of four banded together to support Lori through her tough treatment and we were ecstatic when she received a clean bill of health in November 2017.

Although the doctors said she was cancer-free, Lori continued to experience pain. She knew that something wasn't right. In December 2017, Lori underwent a procedure that showed what she knew all along – the cancer had spread to her major organs. The doctors told us that additional treatment would only mean added time and that her condition was no longer curable.





Our family motto is: We can do hard things.

Lori continued to live her life to the fullest. For the following year, Lori continued to create memories at every turn as she managed her health. Things seemed to be going okay until March 2020 when she developed multiple infections and her kidneys started to fail. It was at that time that we started to talk about hospice.

Lori heard about Margaret Bahen Hospice from her support group and we learned about their bright, warm and welcoming environment. It's not the dark and dreary place we thought a hospice would be. We saw that this is a place where we would be treated like family.

We moved in on a Monday in August. Once she was settled into her room, Lori looked at me and said "This is it. This is the place where I feel comfortable and in my gut; I know that this is the right place for us". She was right. They made us feel at 'home'. On our second night, the staff hosted an ice cream party and came around to make sure Grant and Emily got their sundaes. Everything from the freshly baked goods from the kitchen to the warm blankets from the dryer to the beautiful outdoor gardens; made us feel at ease during one of the most difficult times of our lives.

As hard as it is to watch your wife slipping away from you, I took comfort in knowing that she was never alone.

The staff at Margaret Bahen Hospice made us feel like family and knew just how to make a difficult situation more comfortable for our kids, whether it meant encouraging us to bring our dog for a visit or having a staff member sit with Lori while I took a shower. Nothing was ever a bother. The staff made us feel 'at home' and through their kindness showed us that good memories can be made, even during end-of-life care.

Today, Grant, Emily and I do our best to take care of each other. They have Lori's caring and curious personality. I see so much of her in them already and I'm thankful for that.

As hard as it is to talk about Lori's death, which is still so fresh in my heart, I'm sharing our story with you because I know that Lori would want to continue helping others. # Maple girl is urgently seeking stem cell donor

A Maple family is urgently seeking the public's help to find a stem cell donor for their young daughter.

Three-year-old Leia Luna Fallico was diagnosed with Dyskeratosis Congentia, a rare genetic blood disorder that causes bone marrow failure, in Febru-

The only cure to Dyskeratosis Congentia is a stem cell transplant. Without this, nearly 80% of patients will develop bone marrow failure, the condition's leading cause of mortality. Leia's blood levels continue to drop, hastening the need to find her a match.

Because of Leia's mixed ethnicity, finding a donor has been extremely difficult. Only 3.5% of Canadian Blood Services' Stem Cell Registry is made up of people of mixed descent.

Leia's mother, Shonna Fallico, is of Middle Eastern and Irish descent. Her father, Marco Fallico, is Italian. As such, Leia's best chance for a bone marrow match will be someone of European and/or Persian descent.

The family urges anyone between the ages of 17-35 to join the stem cell registry online at blood.ca/match4leia. You will be mailed a free and simple self-swabbing kit for your cheek, which can then be shipped back.

Over 800 Canadians just like Leia are currently waiting for their lifesaving match.

"We're trying to reach the person that can help her," said Lidia Fallico, Leia's aunt. "We're also trying to create helping someone."

awareness of the issue. For someone of a mixed ethnicity, it's hard to get the treatment that's available to other people."

Despite her condition, which has caused some developmental delays, Leia remains "happy and full of life". She enjoys dancing, swimming, and being outdoors with her family and friends, and has remained "funny and feisty" throughout years of pre-and-post-diagnosis hospitalization, genetic testing, and therapy.

To cover the costs associated with swab kits, therapy sessions for Leia, and, hopefully soon, her transplant surgery, the Fallico family has set up a GoFundMe (www.gofundme.com/f/ journey-with-leia).

Excess funds will be donated to Sick Kids Hospital, where Dr. Yigal Dror, Leia's doctor and head of the Bone Marrow Failure and Myelodysplasia Program, will use them to fund two key clinical trial studies related to treating and curing Dyskeratosis Congentia.

"With Leia, we went from some balance issues, to a genetic condition, to boom, she needs a bone marrow transplant," said Fallico. "It's all very new. We had never even heard of Dvskeratosis Congentia before."

## LSRCA launches new online complaints form

In response to a tripling of complaints so far this year over last year, Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority has implemented an online enforcement complaint form (see link further down). The new online form makes it easier for residents to register a complaint if they think activities are being carried out in areas regulated by the Authority, without approvals.

"The dramatic increase in complaints over last year (90 received so far this year compared to 30 at the same time last year) required us to find a better way to manage the complaints," explained Ashlea Brown, director of enforcement and Regulations for the Authority. "The new form reduces the amount of time it usually takes our staff to collect information, giving them more time to evaluate and investigate. The form also provides another avenue for residents to submit their complaint."

Residents who think that activities are being carried out in a regulated area without approvals can submit their complaint online – day or night. Information about who made the submission is kept strictly confidential and not shared with anyone outside the investigation team.

Just as the Authority protects the privacy of citizens who submit the complaints, they also do not provide investigation updates.

"Basically, once a complaint is submitted, there's no further need to reach out

to us," says Ashlea. If we need to, we'll follow up with the complainants." Ashlea reminds residents that resolution times can vary widely.

"Most of the time, we find that people are willing to work with us, especially once they realize the potential negative impacts of their actions. Of course, there are always exceptions. In cases where we may have to issue violation notices, the process can take much longer."

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# York food bank receives 4th program extension

(FBYR) Emergency Covid-19 Home Delivery Program has been re-funded. This will be the fourth time that the program has been extended to help meet the needs of York Region residents that are experiencing hunger due to the state of emergency declared by the Ontario government.

"We're very thankful for the available funding that's been allocated to our program to keep it running. There's been a significant increase in food insecurity among York Region residents, and we're here to help." explains Alex Bilotta, Founder and CEO of the Food Bank of York Region. "Our doors remain open to volunteers and our delivery and warehouse staff are diligently working to keep up with the demand for food support'

"I have to say with these hard times this organization has been with my family every step of the way. After being laid off since April and finally receiving my permanent lay off notice due to covid it has been extremely rough for my family. I do not know what I would do without you guys, honestly. I was in tears after today's delivery and know I will be able to feed my family for

promise when we are back on our feet, we will pay it forward a 1000%. Thank you so much from my family." shares Kimberly F., a home delivery program

Since 2020, the FBYR's Covid-19 home delivery program has made food deliveries to 4,755 unique individuals, and 1,506 households, with over \$1.2M in food donations. The FBYR makes between 200-240 home deliveries per week across York Region, and has hired one full time driver, and two part time drivers to keep up with the increasing demand. Even with the added drivers, there are still about 100-200 applicants in the queue every week going without a delivery.

"I would like to first thank you and the entire FBYR team for supporting the community and wanted to let you guys know that the support stretches further than food. Dining together as family was something, we all took for granted; that was until food was starting to become an issue. Through the food stability the FBYR provides, we are once again able to enjoy hot meals together without the fear of not knowing where the next meal will come

Once an application is received it will be processed within 4-10 business days on a first come, first serve basis. Applicants are encouraged to apply once every two weeks, starting from the day they received their last home

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# Men's emergency shelter eyed for south Aurora

For more than 40 years, Porter Place in East Gwillimbury has been York Region's emergency shelter for men. But now that the building is nearing the end of its practical life, the Region is looking to lay the foundations of a purpose-built shelter in Aurora's south end.

The Region is eyeing 14452 Yonge Street, located on the west side of the road just south of the railway bridge, as a possible location for the shelter, one which would be built in conjunction with a new regional pumping sta-

Officials made their pitch to Aurora Council recently, stating that the facility, if realized to its full vision, will not only be a shelter for men in need but also a resource to help them get back on their feet.

"With the current facility, there is limited opportunity for expansion and program enhancements," said Monica Bryce, Acting General Manager of Social Services for the Region of York. "Transit is also limited at the current location and so to get to work or training, many choose to walk along Highway 11 towards Green Lane. Since early 2012, we have been shifting our model in the Region away from the traditional shelter model to a more holistic model that includes a wider range of programming to meet a wider variety of needs, including transitional housing. It is not just about emergency shelter; it is about helping people settle into housing.

"Homelessness is a reality for only a very small portion of York Region residents and there is no single contributing factor to homelessness."

Canadian citizen, roughly middle age, who has experienced either a housing breakdown, an illness, job loss, or has been impacted by the rising housing costs in York Region," she said.

The majority of clients have a onetime stay and are able to connect with resources during their time there that can help ease their housing stability.

The new Aurora facility would be designed on three key pillars: preventing homelessness before it starts, providing inclusive, client-centred programs to support recovery, and ending homelessness.

"The intention is not to move Porter Place ... a new facility will be intentionally-designed to help men find and keep housing, address the reason for their homelessness, find stability in their lives, and maintain that stability by continuing to provide support, even once they have left the emergency housing facility."

This approach, she added, is similar to that carried out by Belinda's Place, the Newmarket-based shelter for women - and will be operated by a third party as well.

"By finding an operator who can support the men who come to the new facility, we can have the same success as we have seen at Belinda's Place. Safety and security are important features of the design and to make sure the physical space lets people feel secure both inside and outside the facilitv: we will engage a safety and security specialist to perform a comprehensive security assessment of both the physical location and surrounding community, and provide recommendations to promote safety for all.

"It is our goal always not just to

A "typical" Porter Place client is "a be a good neighbour but to be an excellent one and all the concerns from the community are always considered when we go into the planning of our services."

> To that end, public engagement will be carried out over the next 12 months.

"One of the key factors we bring to Housing York Region (HYR)'s model is we have a functional design," said Josh Scholten, Director of Housing Development and Asset Strategy. "From a building perspective, we want to make sure it works for the folks who will live there and it also work for the community as well. That means something that is appropriate scale too, right-sized for the community."

The Region has been looking at options to replace Porter Place since 2018.

Some \$15 million has been set aside by the Region of York for the project.

The property in question was purchased in 2019 to build the Henderson Pumping Station, but it became clear there was an option to co-locate both the station and the shelter on the same site.

"We do have confidence we can fit it there," said Mr. Scholten. "It is centrally located site with access to transit. It is sufficient to fit the facility here and, from a public perspective too, we have services at the site, which is a good use for public funds for purchasing the site."

Responding to the Region's proposal, Councillor Wendy Gaertner said co-locating both facilities on the property might work, but said zoning issues needed to be worked through. Councillor Rachel Gilliland said it was also important to consider "connectivity" and ensure active transportation is part of the plan.

"Hearing feedback from residents, I think this is a good opportunity for Aurora to play a role in helping to support those who need it and look forward to continuing this journey with you and seeing the outcome."

The Region hopes to have building approvals complete by the end of July 2022, the pumping station by the spring of 2023, and the potential shelter by the end of 2024.

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
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

"Playing for a national team has always been my dream. My coach in Mississauga recommended to get my paper work started and see where it takes me. We chose Jamaica because that's my heritage. Both of my parents are born there." Gordon said.

Unfortunately, she couldn't pursue the opportunity. COVID-19 shut down the world and Gordon never had the chance to join Jamaica.

"I really want to get to the national level. Whether that is Canada or Jamaica. I feel that when I do go to England, more opportunities will come and I will be able to pursue that. I've been playing competitively since I was nine vears old."

Gordon, chuckled when asked if she had to choose to represent Canada or Jamaica in the future. If it came down to that, she speculates she would choose Canada in that situation.

Up until now, having received 12 FC didn't come easy. She made her choice over Bluefield State College in person every day.

Former Villanova Knight (now the Brampton Admirals) in the OJHL Mason Baptista took home the Southern Professional Hockey League MVP.


Baptista says this is a great award, however, winning the final game of the season would have been nice to go along with it.

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

In the meantime, we still welcome prospective new members. You may join us as a guest via Zoom at an upcoming meeting by contacting our Club president.



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
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
