Installation honours Olympian Rosie MacLennan

To celebrate King City's very own Rosie MacLennan, a two-time Olympic gold-medal trampolinist, Canadian Tire has unveiled one of six cross-Canada Celebration Walls at the corner of King Rd. and Keele St., King City.

The interactive, trampoline-themed installation will be on display as MacLennan competes for Team Canada for the fourth consecutive time at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games. As the sole Canadian to win back-to-back gold medals in the same event at the Summer Olympics, MacLennan has a chance to bring home an unprecedented third consecutive gold medal.

The installation is 10 feet long by 7 feet tall and 3 feet wide. Secondary signage shows Rosie's stats, previous sport accolades and call-to-action for local residents to

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Wall's unveiling July 21.

"It's awesome to see her community come out, support her, and give her that cheer from home," said Snow. "To have that energy coming from King is really cool."

For Canadians, and, particularly, residents of King Township, MacLennan is a household name.

The King City Secondary School alumnus was one of only two Canadian gold medalists at the 2012 London Olympic Games, and the first Canadian gold medal trampolinist ever.

In addition to her impressive Olympic showings, MacLennan has won three gold medals at the World Championships, two gold medals at the Pan Am Games, and over 30 additional championship medals. As the defending Olympic champion, she was Team Canada's Opening Ceremony flag bearer for Rio 2016.

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

King Township Rural Zoning By-law Review **Public Open Houses**

King Township is undertaking a review of its zoning for the rural areas of the Township, which are currently regulated by the Township's Comprehensive Zoning By-law 74-53, as amended and the Oak Ridges Moraine Zoning By-law 2005-23 (applying to lands within the Oak Ridges Moraine Area). A Draft Zoning By-law for the Countryside has now been prepared and released for the rural areas of King Township. The rural area encompasses the Countryside and Hamlet designations, as well as the Nobleton Village Reserve Lands (shown in yellow, on the map, right). The rural area excludes the urban areas of Nobleton, King City and Schomberg.

All interested persons are invited to join a Virtual Public Open House to learn about the proposed Draft Zoning By-law for the Countryside and provide your feedback on the proposed changes.



A Zoning By-law is prepared under the requirements of Section 34 of the Planning Act. The Zoning By-law regulates the types of land uses and the character, height, location, size and massing of buildings for all lands in the community.

The review of zoning for the rural area follows updates to zoning in the Township's urban areas (the Villages), through the Nobleton Urban Area Zoning By-law 2016-71 and the King City and Schomberg Urban Area Zoning By-law 2017-66, respectively.

There is a need to review and update the Zoning By-law 74-53 and 2005-23 primarily to ensure that the zoning conforms to local, Regional, and Provincial policy, and addresses the Township's new Official Plan. We are seeking the community's input and feedback on the proposed Draft Zoning By-law for the Countryside.

Phase 2, Contract 3 sanitary sewer and concurrent works in Nobleton will take place in and around the following roadways: Sheardown Drive, Dobson Court, Cain Court, Hazelbury Drive, Chamberlain Court, Russell Snider Drive, Witherspoon Way, Mactaggart Drive, Holden Drive, Robb Drive and McCutcheon Avenue affecting approximately 200 homes. Weather permitting, work is scheduled to take about 27 months to complete.

York makes excellent vaccine progress

York Region continues to make excellent progress in the distribution of COVID-19 vaccines, with 80.4% of residents age 12+ have received their first dose of a COVID-19 vaccine and 67.8% of residents age 12+ are now fully vaccinated.

To further increase access to vaccinations, York Region is now offering walkins for first and second doses at most York Region-led clinics; for a list of clinics and hours, please visit york.ca/covid19vaccine

Appointments remain available at these clinics for those who prefer to book in advance; both the Pfizer and Moderna mRNA vaccine is available at these loca-

In addition to the many vaccination options already available, York Region is also offering conveniently located, family-friendly school pop-up clinics

These school pop-up clinics will be offering the Pfizer mRNA vaccine; walk-ins will be accepted, however appointments are available for those who prefer to book in advance.

York Region Public Health maintains COVID-19 vaccination records for York Region residents who have been immunized outside of Ontario.

Any York Region resident who received their first and/or second COVID-19 vaccine dose outside of Ontario should complete the COVID-19 Immunization Outside of Ontario Form; this form allows residents to provide information on COVID-19 vaccinations received out-of-province and will help maintain up-to-date proof of vaccination.


Many motorists believed the sticker fees were being waived during the pandemic. No reminders were mailed out. No licence renewal notices went through the mail.

Minister provides details on OAS changes

I recently announced that older seniors, born on or before June 30, 1947, who are eligible for Old Age Security (OAS) in June 2021, will receive a onetime payment of \$500 the week of August 16.

This one-time payment will provide immediate support until a permanent 10% increase to the OAS pension for seniors aged 75 and up is implemented in July 2022. That increase will support Canadians with their higher costs later in life. Older seniors often need more support and are more at risk of outliving their savings. As seniors age, their health and home care costs rise, all while they are more likely to be unable to work, have disabilities or be widowed.

The OAS increase builds on the gov-

ernment's work to strengthen retirement income security. We restored the age of eligibility for OAS from 67 to 65, strengthened the Canada Pension Plan for future retirees, increased the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) for single seniors, increased the GIS earning exemption and reduced income taxes for all Canadians. However, there is more work to do. Canadian seniors can always count on us to listen, understand their needs and work hard to deliver for them.

I'll be talking about these issues and more at a live town hall on seniors' issues at facebook.com/SeniorsinCanada on August 11 at 1:30 p.m. (EDT) with the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Seniors, Stéphane Lauzon. We'll be answering your questions in both English and

French. I hope you will be able to join us, ask what's on your mind about seniors and get answers.

In the meantime, here are some details about the \$500 one-time payment. Am I eligible for the one-time payment and when will I receive it?

Seniors eligible for the OAS pension in June 2021 and born on or before June 30, 1947, will receive a one-time payment of \$500 the week of August 16, 2021. Eligible seniors who receive OAS payments by cheque can expect a cheque by mail with a delay based on mail delivery.

How will I receive my payment?

The one-time payment will be separate from regular OAS benefit payments. Eligible seniors can expect to receive the payment by direct deposit or cheque - in the same way they receive their OAS payments.

Do I have to apply for the one-time payment?

No. You do not need to take any action. OAS pensioners will automatically receive the \$500 one-time payment if they meet the eligibility criteria.

Is the one-time payment taxable?

Yes. The one-time payment is taxable. A separate tax slip will be issued to you for this payment.

Will this payment affect my GIS?

No. The one-time payment is exempt from the calculation of income for the GIS.

Yard waste

Yard waste is collected with recycling every second week from April to November. *there are some exceptions due to holidays

There is no limit on the amount of yard waste that can be put out for collection, as long as acceptable containers are used.

Place weeds, plant trimmings and leaves in paper yard bags or any rigid open top container that has handles. Bundle branches with twine only, no rope.

Please note: No grass clippings! These items should not be placed with yard waste: kitchen scraps, rocks, dirt, sod, tree stumps, branches larger than 10cm in diameter, flower pots/trays, painted or treated wood and animal droppings.



In the landfill, grass clippings account for 75% of yard waste; leaving them on the lawn reduces waste.

OAS automatically increased by almost \$100 over the coming year

provides retirement income security for seniors because it maintains its value over time, even as prices increase.

Canada's Minister of Seniors, and King-Vaughan MP Deb Schulte, announced the highest quarterly adjustment to existing OAS payments since July 2014. She also confirmed that the Government of Canada will deliver the \$500 one-time payment to older seniors, announced in Budget 2021, during the week of August 16, 2021.

This summer's one-time payment of \$500 will support older seniors' higher expenses, and will apply to 3.3 million seniors who are eligible for the OAS pension in June 2021 and were

The Old Age Security (OAS) pension born on or before June 30, 1947. No action is required by seniors, who will automatically receive the payment if they are eligible.

In July 2021, OAS benefits will automatically increase 1.3%, bringing the maximum monthly OAS pension amount to \$626.49, up from \$618.45. Over the coming year, the increase is worth up to \$96.48. The Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) and the Allowances will also be adjusted for inflation.

Budget 2021 also included a permanent increase of 10% to the OAS pension, to be implemented in July 2022 for seniors aged 75 and over. This will provide an additional \$766 to full pensioners over the first year, and will be the first permanent increase to the OAS pension since 1973, other than adjustments due to inflation. It builds on measures to support all seniors, which include restoring the age of eligibility for the OAS pension and the GIS to 65 from 67, strengthening the Canada Pension Plan for future retirees, increasing the GIS for single seniors, raising the GIS earnings exemption and reducing income taxes for all Canadians.

"The government is continuing to improve the financial security of Canadians in retirement after a lifetime of hard work. Increasing Old Age Security for older seniors helps all Canadians with their extra needs later in life. While no single solution can meet every need, step by step our progressive measures are making a real difference in the lives of seniors. Canadian seniors can always count on us to listen, understand their needs and work hard to deliver for them," Schulte said.

"Canada's pension system is designed to provide benefits that reflect changes in the cost of living, with payments only ever increasing or staying the same. They will never go down. This helps seniors enjoy the financially secure and dignified retirement they deserve," added Stéphane Lauzon, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Seniors.

Seniors are the fastest-growing demographic age group in Canada. By 2030, the number of seniors is expected to reach 9.4 million, representing close to one quarter of Canada's population.

In 2020 and 2021, the government is providing \$5.5 billion in additional direct financial support to seniors, through a \$1.3 billion one-time GST credit in April 2020, \$2.5 billion for a one-time OAS/GIS payment in July 2020 and \$1.7 billion for the one-time payment to older seniors in August 2021.

Older seniors face higher costs. As seniors age, their health and home care costs rise, all while they are more likely to have disabilities, be widowed or be unable to work.

Most seniors have low and modest incomes. About 84% of OAS pensioners have individual incomes below \$50,000.

The objective of the Old Age Security program is to ensure a minimum income for seniors and help reduce the incidence of low income among Canada's seniors. The OAS benefits include: the OAS pension; which is paid to all individuals aged 65 and older who meet the residence requirements; the GIS for low-income seniors; and the Allowances for low-income Canadians aged 60 to 64 who are the spouses or common-law partners of GIS recipients, or who are widowed or widowers.

The maximum OAS pension is payable to seniors aged 65 and over who lived in Canada for at least 40 years after age 18. Partial pensions are payable if they lived in Canada for at least 10 years or qualified under International Social Security Agreements.

All OAS benefits (the OAS pension, the GIS and the Allowances) are indexed on a quarterly basis in January, April, July and October so benefits don't lose value over time. Increases to OAS benefits are calculated using the Consumer Price Index, which measures changes in prices paid by Canadian consumers for goods and services, and is the most widely used indicator of price changes in Canada. If the cost of goods and services goes down, OAS benefits do not decrease. OAS payment amounts will only increase or stay the same. Historical values are available on the Open Data portal.


As a result of automatic indexation, the annual value of the monthly OAS pension has increased to \$7,516 per year from \$6,404 per year over the past decade.

Locals participate in new refugee sponsorship program

The Private Sponsorship of Refugees (PSR) program is a pioneering Canadian refugee resettlement program.

The arrival of Vietnamese refugees on Canadian shores – often referred to as the "Boat People" - in the mid 1970s mobilized Canadians to respond. In 1979, the Canadian government pledged to sponsor one refugee for each refugee that the Canadian public would financially and otherwise support privately.

For the first time, ordinary people across the country became involved in assisting refugees to settle in Canada through private sponsorship. This changed forever the way Canadians would view their role in Canada's refugee resettlement programs.

Canada is the first country in the world to have a refugee sponsorship program where private citizens and the community are directly involved in the resettlement of refugees from abroad. It has become a model for other countries around the world.

Through the PSR program, Canadian citizens and permanent residents can engage in the resettlement of refugees from abroad. As members of organizations, associations and groups, citizens and residents can sponsor refugees coming to Canada as a Group of Five, a Community Sponsor or a Sponsorship Agreement Holder.

The PSR program does not rely on public resources, but rather taps the energy and funds of faith communities, ethnic groups, families, and other benevolent associations. These groups and organizations typically raise funds or use their personal income to provide for and support the sponsored individual or family for their first year in Canada.

They initiate the process by submitting a refugee sponsorship application package to Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC). Their commitment lasts until the end of the sponsorship period, typically 12 months from the date of the sponsored person's arrival in Canada.

Since 1979, Canadians have resettled nearly 300,000 refugees through the PSR program.

Seneca awarded \$360,000 for applied agri research

Developing a strong and sustainable business - a challenge for many urban farmers - will be the focus of a new, Seneca-led applied research project, recently awarded \$360,000 by the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada and the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council.

As agriculture plays an important role in providing ecological services in cities, this program will incorporate training, mentorship and microfinancing specifically for urban farmers in communities across Canada.

"One of our goals is to work with the local community of urban growers and help them turn ideas into businesses," said Dr. West Suhanic, a professor at Seneca's School of Accounting & Financial Services. "What makes our project unique is that we'll be bringing science, business and sustainability together in one package."

Dr. Suhanic will be collaborating with Dr. Lesley Campbell, an associate professor at Ryerson University and an expert in urban agriculture, plant evolution and global climate change. They will lead a team of 12 to 15 Seneca student research assistants and work with community partners Greenest City and Toronto Urban Growers.

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Yonge North Subway Extension moving ahead



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

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

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Officers question health enforcement

Increased reports of mental health emergencies, domestic abuse, drug abuse, and suicide are just some of the repercussions the lockdowns have catalyzed. The country-wide shutdown has caused thousands of businesses to permanently close, destroying the livelihoods of countless Canadians in a matter of months.

This begs the question; what can be done when policies put in place to protect the public begin to do more harm than good?

A few Canadian police officers asked themselves this question in December of last year. They saw Canadians arrested and fined for exercising their right to peacefully protest, to practice their religion, or to refuse the use of a face mask for medical reasons. It was clear to these officers that the public health orders they were required to enforce, blatantly opposed the Charter of Rights and Freedoms. They concluded that the mandates and the ones instituting them that it can't be arbitrarily changed. Evmust be called into question.

Slowly but surely, their message gained traction and motivated more critically thinking individuals to speak out and join the movement. The members called their team Police on Guard for Thee, which is now comprised of about 500 people from across the coun-

Within the group are active and retired police officers, military personnel, firefighters, Canadian Borders Service Agents, and Correctional Officers.

One of the group's members, retired Toronto police Inspector, Len Faul, said: "Our Charter of Rights and Freedoms is being ignored at all levels of government."

"Why do we have a charter? We need something to protect the people from federal and provincial governments infringing on our human rights and human responsibilities. It's a very powerful legal tool and that's why it's entrenched in our constitution, meaning

ery single law that is passed, whether it be municipal, provincial, or federal, must meet the standard of the Charter. If there's a suggestion that it doesn't, our courts can strike that law down," he went on to say.

Eighteen brave officers from the group, along with Rocco Galati, a leading constitutional lawyer, brought a court application to the Superior Court of Ontario in order to clarify the constitutionality of the COVID-19 public health measures they are being directed to enforce. This is the first constitutional challenge of its kind in Canadian history. Its effects will set a precedent for future cases and shed light on the importance of upholding the Charter.

Amidst all the noise and confusion, there lies one fundamental truth - Canadians are able to live comfortably in a country full of opportunity, where freedom of speech and choice are encouraged, because our Charter of Rights affords us those privileges.





Ontario's 2019 greenhouse gas emissions have decreased by 21 per cent since 2005, while at the national level, Canada's 2019 emissions went down by only 1.1 per cent since 2005.

"The environmental choices we make today will have a profound impact on our children's future, which is why they deserve a seat at the table. Providing youth with the opportunity to express their concerns and ideas directly to the Minister and get a better understanding of the inner workings of government and how decisions are made is a powerful experience and wonderful opportunity. I look forward to seeing what the outcomes of the new Ontario Youth Environment Council will be," said Tovah Barocas, president, Earth Rangers.






Hortons Camp Day success



Amongst other types of services, Southlake's inpatient mental health program provides short-term assessment and stabilization for people who are 18 years of age or older with severe and acute mental health disorders. This expansion will enable the hospital to care for more than 400 additional patients each year. The newly renovated space will include private rooms, more windows with natural light, and common areas to support recovery, ensuring that individuals who need emergency mental health support receive the care they need.

While work is under way to expand the unit, the inpatient program will continue to offer services and supports at Southlake Regional Health Centre. The new Adult Inpatient Unit is expected to be completed in late 2022.

"Since the release of Roadmap to Wellness last year, our government's top priority has been to continue making critical investments that will fill urgent gaps in mental health and addictions care, reduce waiting lists and address extensive wait times," said Michael Tibollo, Associate Minister of Mental Health and Addictions. "Through the expansion of Southlake's Adult Inpatient Mental Health Unit, clients will have better access to the high-quality mental health supports that meets their unique needs, in a specialized setting where they are cared for and fully supported."

The expansion of Southlake's Inpatient Unit is part of Ontario's capital plan, which will invest \$30.2 billion in hospital infrastructure over the next 10 years, including an additional \$3 billion announced in the 2021 Budget, Ontario's Action Plan: Protecting People's Health and Our Economy. These investments will improve and increase space in hospitals and include grants to support new facilities, including the renewal of existing hospitals and community health centres.

The government is investing more than \$21 billion in capital grants over the next 10 years for hospital projects across Ontario that will lead to \$30 billion in hospital infrastructure.

Ontario's Action Plan: Protecting People's Health and Our Economy, brings total investments to \$16.3 billion to protect people's health and \$23.3 billion to protect our economy. Ontario's COVID-19 action plan supports now total \$51 billion.

Ontario is investing \$3.8 billion over 10 years to fill urgent gaps in mental health and addictions care, create new services and expand programs through Roadmap to Wellness. To support Roadmap, Ontario has invested \$525 million to create a connected, comprehensive and integrated mental health and addictions system since 2019 including an additional \$175 million in 2021-22.

In response to the COVID-19 outbreak, the province invested up to \$194 million in one-time emergency funding for mental health and addictions services, enabling Ontarians to access the services they need during these difficult times, including more than 67,000 Ontarians accessing provincial virtual

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
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Local gym owner reaches competition finals


The next time the competition is held, he intends to re-enter in the hope of reaching the top spot.

"Let's turn to the crowds that want to make him a king, Jesus flees to the mountain. The clue here is 'take him by force' (Jn 6.15). Force is the currency of the economy of power and politics. Jesus certainly knew how much force belongs to kings like Herod, who murdered his cousin John the Baptist. By escaping the crowd and then retreating to a mountain, Jesus is again signalling that he's not going to be drawn into human affairs.

"Instead, Jesus comes to us on his own terms, walking mysteriously on the water, or as he does when he feeds the crowds. John tells us that Jesus "distributed (the loaves) to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as

they wanted" (Jn 6.11). Both these episodes tell us the same thing – that Jesus will come to us, feed us, as in the eucharist, entirely on his own terms, terms that we call "grace."

Grace is underserved goodness. This is the God who knows exactly who we are, how broken and fallen we can be, Jesus, 'to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden.'

"These last many months, as our lives put on hold, we've probably all felt that this pandemic was one long storm. During Covid the news often reports that we're in 'uncharted waters.' But it was never about having a good boat. It was always about Jesus, who always watched over us, caring, not about what we deserve, but what we need. Jesus comes to us again today, giving himself for us, feeding us, caring for us, saving





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
