Youth encouraged to get vaccine; myths dispelled

Apprehension and "urban legends" may be hindering younger people from stepping up and getting the COVID-19 vaccination.

York Public Health is encouraging everyone to opt-in to the vaccination campaign.

Some believe the vaccines may cause sterility, but Patrick Casey, Director, Corporate Communications on behalf of York Region Public Health, said there is no evidence the COVID-19 vaccine will affect fertility or pregnancy. People who are trying to become pregnant now or who plan to try in the future may receive the COVID-19 vaccine.

"There is no association between COVID-19 vaccines and fertility problems; the COVID-19 vaccine does not cause infertility," he said

Some object to putting "chemicals" in their bodies and are weary of the substances that make up the vaccines.

None of the vaccines approved by Health Canada contain the live virus that causes COVID-19. The vaccines cannot give you COVID-19. The COVID-19 vaccine will not alter your DNA.

"Those who have been vaccinated cannot shed spike proteins created by the vaccine and infect others," officials said.

The COVID-19 vaccine does not contain controversial substances; all of the vaccine ingredients are readily available from Health Canada online or in the product's documentation, Casey stressed.

Further, none of the COVID-19 vaccines were developed using fetal tissue and they do not contain any material such as implants, microchips or tracking devices!

"We urge people to opt-in to vaccines on a voluntary basis; we have many public health nurses, pharmacies and health care providers who are willing to speak with individuals with questions to ease their anxieties to help decide to take these vaccines voluntarily."



York officials are pleased to hear the Ontario government's recent announcement to make COVID-19 vaccination policies mandatory for high-risk settings. The province had consulted extensively with health units on this approach.

"The health of our community comes first and it's a responsibility we should all share; vaccinations help keep our community safe by stopping the spread of COVID-19 and its variants," Casey said.

Receiving the vaccine can protect others who are vulnerable to infection such as children under 12 years of age who cannot receive the vaccine, people who have severe allergies to the vaccines and people with serious health conditions which can decrease the effectiveness of the vaccine.

York health experts noted no vaccine offers 100% protection against COVID-19 infection. However, those who have received both doses of a COVID-19 vaccine and become infected should experience milder symptoms and are much less likely to become severely ill, require hospitalization or be admitted into the ICU.

"This speaks to the importance of getting vaccinated, not only to protect yourself but those around you and the most vulnerable in our community, like children under 12 years of age who are not currently eligible to receive a vaccine."

While 76% of York's population age 12 and older have received both doses, there are still many who have yet to roll up their sleeves. Those individuals are encouraged to walk into one of the clinics to do so as soon as possible. Clinic times and locations can be found at york.ca/covid19vaccine

For individuals who are still hesitant to receive their vaccine, it's okay to have questions. You can discuss your concerns with your doctor, pharmacist, primary health care provider or one of York Region Public Health's nurses to help you make an informed decision. You can also call the York Region Health Connection line at 1-800-361-5653 and speak with a public health nurse.

"The recent increase in cases is also a good reminder COVID-19 is not going away anytime soon; these next few months will require all of us to continue to remain vigilant; please continue to follow public health measures such as wearing a mask, maintaining a physical distance from others and practicing good hand hygiene, even if you are fully vaccinated."

Clinics are expected to run before a first or second dose and will pro- 12 to17 have received a first dose of the vide accessible and convenient access to vaccines for eligible students and their families, as well as educators and school staff who are returning to school this fall.

While COVID-19 vaccination continues to be voluntary for anyone eligible in Ontario, health experts encourage anyone who is able to get the vaccine as a highly effective tool in the fight against COVID-19 and its variants.

The education sector, and public health units, have played a critical role in getting youth vaccinated, and keeping students and families safe during this historic pandemic. As Ontario continues with its vaccination program and rollout, ensuring all eligible Ontarians who wish to receive the vaccine can get one will ensure schools remain open for in-person learning for the full school year.

"We have made tremendous progress getting students, staff and their families vaccinated – they are critical to protecting schools and keeping our communities safe," said King-Vaughan MPP Stephen Lecce, Minister of Education. "As part of the last mile campaign to reach as many students and staff as possible and to keep schools as safe as possible, we are requiring school boards and public health units to roll out clinics in or close to schools. By making vaccines more accessible, and with a cautious reopening in September following the expert advice of the Chief Medical Officer of Health, we will further bolster our fight against COVID-19 and variants."


More than 69 per cent of youth aged

COVID-19 vaccine and 56 per cent have received a second dose. School-focused vaccination clinics will support increased uptake for eligible students, as well as education staff, and a safer return to school in the fall.

"It is great news that our students are returning to school this fall, and that kids and youth will finally be together with their classmates to learn and get back to the activities they love." said Dr. Moore, Chief Medical Officer of Health. "This is crucially important for their mental, physical and social wellbeing. Having vaccination clinics at our schools will make it more convenient for students to receive their vaccine in a familiar and comfortable environment and will help to ensure a safer and sustained reopening of our schools."

With respect to consent at school-focused clinics, COVID-19 vaccines will only be provided if informed consent is received from the individual, including eligible students, and as long as they have the capability to make this decision. Health care providers, the school, and families must respect a young person's decision regarding vaccination. Parents and guardians are encouraged to discuss vaccination with their children prior to attending a school vaccination clinic.

All vaccines delivered as part of Ontario's vaccine rollout provide high levels of effectiveness. During July 2021, unvaccinated individuals were approximately eight times more likely to get infected with COVID-19 compared to those who were fully vaccinated.



Letter to the Editor Wake up to climate change!


I am a construction engineer and an octogenarian. The latter does not mean a helluva lot except I have seen much, experienced much and know a lot.

The proposed Zoning By-law Amendment application and Site Plan Development application were submitted by Townwood Homes on behalf of the owner. The applications concern a property located on the east side of Keele Street, north of King Road in the Village of King City. The subject property is approximately 1006.1 square metres and has frontage on both Keele Street and Dennison Street. The property currently contains one (1) single detached dwelling. 

"I've picked up, delivered, moved, stored, and repaired furnishings that helped allow our families to make their new accommodations into a home. I've helped with transportation, bargain hunting, employment opportunities, recreational activities and plain fun. In all of these endeavours my time was abundantly rewarded by genuine appreciation and thanks. What a joy to be able to be so useful."

Debbie Schaefer, KfR volunteer and a founding director has said that volunteering with KfR was a "chance to meet new people whom I never would have met" and to see "hidden talents of people I did know already." Many people have made lasting friendships because of volunteering with others who share the desire to help refugees.

George Elliot was one of the earliest supporters and a member of the planning team of King for Refugees. Looking back on the first KfR potluck in the March 2016 newsletter, he described his reflections on that evening:

"At the King for Refugees' Potluck dinner held in March to welcome our newcomer family and to mark the official opening of the ESL program in the King City Lions Den, an interesting activity unfolded. After enjoying a delicious array of appetizers, main courses and desserts, everyone present was asked to stand and say where they were born. It was fun to hear where everyone was from. Some had descended from relatives who had immigrated to North America generations ago. However, out of the group of over 60, I would say that forty percent were born outside of Canada. Most had come to Canada after World War II.

"I found this to be quite remarkable. Not only did it show our newcomer family that they were not alone in their journey to Canada, it emphasized for me the reality that Canada is a land of immigrants. Apart from those whose families are indigenous Canadians, every other Canadian's heritage is rooted in the experience of being an immigrant.

"Some of my maternal relatives came from England in the 1740s arriving in what was to become the United States of America. During the war of Independence, they immigrated again, this time to Canada. All of our families have contributed to the building of this land, offering their time, their talents, and their treasures, whether it was 270



"My participation in King for Refugees and in chairing a group of six churches which is sponsoring a Syrian family and a family from Northern Iraq, is in part motivated by our common Canadian heritage. Over 149 years since Confederation, and before that, wave after wave of men, women and children arrived on our shores and have made Canada their home. Their stories of hardship and determination fill the annals of our history.

"I am also motivated by the xenophobia and hatred of others who would offer no welcome to any of the now 65 million people who are refugees in our world today. I am appalled by the violence and prejudice that some of these newly arrived immigrants have encountered because of their religion, their dress, or the perception they are different. This kind of behaviour is not representative of the Canada I know and love. I will do all I can to challenge it, in part through my participation with King for Refugees.

"Above all, I am, as you may know, a person of Christian faith. Major faiths share at least one common thread of be-

lief, the Golden Rule - Love your neighbour as yourself. Throughout my ordained ministry over the past 37 years, I have participated in sponsoring refugee families. I, along with all of us in Canada, have been richly blessed, well beyond the imagination and reality of the majority of people living in other countries. My faith challenges me to find ways in work and in deed to share these blessings with others. What better way than to extend to those in dire need the opportunity to make a fresh start in my community and my country?

"Now, a new chapter in our history is being written by those who have fled the horrors of oppression and terror in their native lands in the Middle East. It is a privilege to offer my support to our families and to help them not only settle in but to witness them become a part of the fabric of our Canadian family."



Doctors call for mandatory shots for people who work in schools for safety

While some groups are calling for mandatory COVID shots, the Province isn't entertaining the idea.

The Ontario Medical Association (OMA) last week called on Queen's Park for mandatory vaccination of those working in schools and mandatory indoor masking to ensure a safe return to school.

"Children are currently ineligible to receive COVID-19 vaccines and are therefore reliant on others to keep them safe," said OMA President Dr. Adam Kassam.

"Schools should be safe places for everyone. That's why we are calling for vaccine requirements for teachers and others who work in schools in addition to mandatory masking indoors and other measures as schools reopen in September." The call for back-to-school safety measures as the province moves toward reopening and the Delta variant spreads follows two earlier recommendations by Ontario's doctors: one for mandatory vaccinations for health-care workers, and one asking the province to create a vaccine certificate that employers and private businesses could rely on to know their customers, employees and colleagues have been fully vaccinated. The government has been clear that the COVID-19 vaccine will not be mandated for Ontarians, but officials do strongly suggest that people embrace the opportunity.

"We are continuing to make significant progress in vaccinating more Ontarians throughout the province. To date we have administered over 20 million vaccines to Ontarians, and over 81% of Ontarians 12 and up have received a first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine," according to staff at Education Minister Stephen Lecce's office.

"We are committed to working with the health care sector to encourage uptake among staff and workers and ensure that the information and tools are available to help Ontarians in their decisions regarding receiving the vaccine."



"Together, the measures recommended by doctors will help us all stay safe," said OMA CEO Allan O'Dette. "By protecting our health, we are also protecting a continued reopening of our economy."

Food Network's Compost Learning Hub celebrates first year

When food waste enters the landfill it creates methane, a greenhouse gas that is 70 times more effective at trapping radiant heat than carbon dioxide. This has significant impacts on our changing climate.

Though big action is critical to truly addressing food waste, York Region Food Network's Compost Learning Hub launched in July 2020, with the goal of inspiring community members to implement waste-free practices in their households. This 12-month pilot project was made possible thanks to a one-year, \$74,500 Seed grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation in mid-2020.

"Over the past year, York Region Food Network has been a driving force for inspiring sustainable and waste-free practices within our community," said Michael Parsa, MPP Aurora-Oak Ridges-Richmond Hill. "I commend the creation of the Compost Learning Hub assisted by the Ontario Trillium Foundation's Seed grant allocation."

Funds from the grant were used to help with staffing, graphic design work, purchasing composters, creating information materials and assisting with some administrative costs.

The Compost Learning Hub is a community-led initiative that provides opportunities for residents to connect with nature and use composting techniques to reduce their impact on the environment.

Due to COVID-19, rather than in-person programming, York Region Food Network has been offering virtual workshops to promote and educate about composting and waste-free living. These workshops help to share tips and practices that people can integrate into their everyday lives.

"This past year, we have held 23 workshops, developed three educa-

tional videos and hosted four events to engage 3,217 people of all ages in composting," said Kate Greavette, executive director of York Region Food Network. "The goal of these engagements has been to get people excited about connecting with the land while demonstrating that everyone, regardless of where they are at, can do something to modify their waste habits."

Globally, six to eight per cent of all human-caused greenhouse gas emissions could be reduced if we stop wasting food. At-home composting is one small action that people can take to positively impact the environment. Composting reduces the creation of greenhouse gases and helps to build healthy soil.

York Region Food Network looks forward to welcoming community members to our physical Compost Learning Hub space after COVID-19. In the meantime, you can engage with us virtually through a wide variety of online activities, resources and workshops. Majority of businesses plan to make vaccines mandatory

employees to the workplace, 62 per cent of Canadian small- and medium-sized businesses are making or plan to make COVID-19 vaccinations mandatory for their employees, finds a new poll by KPMG in Canada.

"Businesses are grappling with how to navigate the issue of mandatory vaccination and determine whether or not they are legally permitted to require their employees and, in some cases, their customers, to provide proof of vaccination," said Norm Keith, Partner. Several ways to vote in the federal election

For the federal election now under way, Elections Canada encourages electors to plan early and choose the voting option that best suits them. They can vote:

On election day on Monday, Sept. 20.

At one of the advance polls on Friday, Sept. 10, 11, 12 and 13.

By mail: Electors must apply to vote by mail before Tuesday, Sept. 14, by 6 p.m., local time.

Electors can apply online. If they prefer, they can complete a paper application form. Forms are available at any Elections Canada office. They can also be printed from elections.ca, or sent by mail, upon request, by calling 1-800-463-6868.

Electors voting by mail should plan ahead. They must allow time for their voting kit to reach them and for their marked ballot to be returned to Elections Canada.

Elections Canada must receive the marked ballots by the election day deadline; otherwise, they will not be counted.

You can vote at any Elections Canada office across Canada before Tuesday, Sept. 14 by 6 p.m., local time.

To vote, electors must show proof of identity and address. The list of accepted ID is online.

Voting and identification rules are different for incarcerated electors and Canadian electors who live abroad.

Given the ongoing pandemic, Elections Canada, in consultation with public health authorities, has implemented a range of measures at polling places and Elections Canada offices to protect electors, election workers and political participants. These measures include providing protective equipment for poll workers and office workers and hand sanitizer and masks for electors.

Electors who are self-isolating or experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 should apply to vote by mail or call their local Elections Canada office to find out more about their voting options.

Elections Canada is an independent, non-partisan agency that reports directly to Parliament.



feel that unless mandated by government, it may be too onerous for them to make it a condition of continued employment. Overall, employers need to balance their health and safety legal duties with an employee's privacy interests and human rights law protections."

When implementing a mandatory proof of vaccination policy, a key legal consideration for employers is the actual safety risks in their workplace, particularly where there is close contact with co-workers or vulnerable people. As well, some workplaces are a higher safety risk, such as health care or longterm care for the elderly, education, childcare and emergency services.

proof of vaccination mandatory, others tus. Employers have legal duties and responsibilities and, depending on their specific circumstances, need to exercise reasonableness to avoid constructive dismissal claims. Here are some key considerations for employers:

• Employers have a legal obligation to keep workers safe.

· Recognize and accommodate exemptions based on disability and religious beliefs protected by human rights law and the duty to accommodate.

· Assess whether alternative measures such as rapid testing, social distancing, and minimizing time worked in close proximity to others should be considered.

 Know that workers also have a legal duty to not work in a manner that may endanger others.

• Protect the confidentiality of emplovee vaccination data.

• Be flexible, listen to employee concerns, and enlist workplace joint health and safety committees in developing and implementing policies.

"In general, we recommend that employers receive legal advice when putting in place any COVID-19 safety measures to reduce a wide range of risks. This includes implementation of a vaccination policy that clearly communicates employer commitments and expectations for employee safety."







Canadian physicians will continue virtual care concept

The majority of Canadian physicians plan to continue offering virtual care, long into the future.

Boosted by smart technology, and the new "smart hospital" in Vaughan, patients will still receive a high level of care.

According to a recent survey conducted for Canada Health Infoway (Infoway) and the Canadian Medical Association (CMA), almost all Canadian physicians say they will continue to use virtual care after the pandemic, and 64 per cent say they will maintain or increase their use.

The survey was conducted online in April and May with more than 2,000 physicians – general practitioners (GPs)/family physicians, specialists and residents.

Ninety-four per cent of physicians said they currently use virtual care, with 93 per cent offering telephone visits, 51 per cent offering video visits, 36 per cent offering email/messaging and five per cent offering remote patient/ home health monitoring. More than 70 per cent believe virtual care improves patient access and enables quality care and efficient care for their patients.

Seven out of 10 were satisfied with telephone/video and about 50 per cent were satisfied with email/messaging and remote monitoring. More than 70 per cent said they have the knowledge and skills needed to use virtual care, are satisfied with time spent with patients, and found it easy to integrate into their work flow.

In addition, 93 per cent of GPs are now using electronic medical records (EMRs), up from 86 per cent in 2019 (Commonwealth Fund Survey).

"It's clear from these findings that virtual care is here to stay in Canada," said Michael Green, president and CEO, Infoway. "Physicians are satisfied with it and they recognize the benefits to their patients and their practice. It's also good to see that almost all GPs are using EMRs, which can really help enable virtual care."

"The use of virtual care has increased greatly since the beginning of the pandemic but work is still required to ensure quality care and equitable access," said Dr. Ann Collins, CMA president. "We still have work to do such as creating national licensure, developing quality standards, addressing interoperability as well as ensuring digital health literacy, education and training. These are crucial elements to the successful integration of virtual care into our health care system and should be part of our post-pandemic roadmap."

The survey also found that physicians believe some patients may need additional support to access virtual care. In particular, they mentioned patients with low levels of technology literacy, disabilities, language barriers, low incomes, chronic conditions, and those who are from remote locations and Indigenous communities.

"We will continue to collaborate with the CMA, governments and other health system stakeholders, including patients, to overcome any barriers associated with virtual care," Green said. "Infoway is developing programs to address digital health literacy and clinician change management and we are enhancing our work on interoperability and standards. Together, we can ensure that virtual care is effectively integrated into the health care system and that all Canadians have equitable access to it.'

Mackenzie Health's smart hospital vision features the use of smart technology across its two hospital sites enabling care teams to spend more time at the patient's bedside delivering safe, quality care.

"Since beginning our smart journey with the introduction of an electronic medical record in 2017, Mackenzie Health has been committed to innovation and enhancing the way we deliver care to patients. We have been leveraging our smart technologies and electronic medical record to enable virtual care visits between physicians and patients since even before facing the challenges associated with the pandemic," according to the hospital.

Once the COVID-19 pandemic hit, many of ambulatory and outpatient programs began to deliver care virtually. In partnership with SE Health, Mackenzie Health's knee replacement patients had virtual visits with their physiotherapists and the Behavioural Supports team provided seamless care virtually to older adults with mental health, dementia, addictions and other neurological and complex health conditions.

Appointments at the Medical Ur- acts as an early warning system for pagent Care Clinic, diabetes education and mental health consultations and sessions, and surgical pre-operative appointments were also conducted virtually. Many of these clinics and programs will continue to operate using a mix of in-person and virtual visits even after the pandemic subsides as it is convenient for patients and allows for physicians to see more patients.

"At the start of the pandemic, we also created a COVID-19 home monitoring program to benefit both patients and care teams. The program empowers patients to monitor their symptoms and oxygen levels safely at home with regular check ins from the care team. This

tients. When their oxygen levels near a certain threshold, they are prompted to come to the hospital for care. By providing medical care, including supplemental oxygen, sooner, patients have a better chance of recovery.'

To date, almost 900 patients have avoided hospital admission as a result of their participation in the COVID-19 home monitoring program.

"We're continuing to explore how we can further expand our supports to patients across our organization in other hospital departments using the virtual tools we have available to us. Virtual care will remain a part of the way we deliver care to our community."

Virtual sessions will help reach more people in need

Some might think not a lot can be accomplished in an hour, but 60 minutes in the right hands could be a life-saver for people in the community struggling with addictions.

Addiction Services for York Region, which provides critical services in both York Region and South Simcoe, launched a new program designed to reach more people and help get clients the help they need over the phone or over a computer - anywhere in Ontario.

Addiction Services of York Region's (ASYR) new virtual single-session counselling services are available for adults and youth aged 12 and up to get faster help for any questions or concerns they might have about substance use and addiction.

After answering a few short registration questions over the phone, anyone in Ontario can book a single-session appointment on Tuesday or Thursday afternoons. A session typically lasts about an hour and is carried out by confidential video link or through a traditional phone line.

During a session, a trained counsellor will provide information and support using "techniques based on motivational interviewing and cognitive behavioural therapy."

"As an agency, we're trying our best to be as creative as possible with the funding we receive from the government to respond to the needs of the communities we serve," says Penny Marrett, executive director of the AYSR. "We recognize that not everyone can come to in-person services. Sometimes it might have to do with where you work and where the service is being offered. It might be about how your work or school schedule is. Being able to offer the personal services just adds another vehicle for us to be able to offer services."

Offering these virtual services is a pivot that might have come from the global pandemic, but it is also a pivot that will have ongoing benefits long after the pandemic is behind us.

ASYR clients, according to Susan McGrail, clinical director for the organization, have come to like the virtual options offered over the last year-anda-half as it has provided options for parents who might not be able to find

appointment, might worry about transportation or transit into a clinic, or find it difficult to make that first step face to face.

"They like that confidentiality and that ease of access to a professional counsellor because our main tool as counsellors is conversation," said McGrail. "We're pretty excited about working that way and clinicians and clients are saying they quite like that.

"Our clients like to feel safe too from the pandemic and the worry of encountering others in a waiting room or going to an in-person service."

With that said, however, there are some challenges.

Not everyone who seeks out assistance from the ASYR have a private and confidential spot to sit down and speak to a professional worker about their substance use issues and concerns.

"That is a challenge for people having that technology and having that privacy to be able to do that," she continues. "For me, one of the challenges is when I am meeting somebody new, I really like to maybe show them their chair, maybe hold it, maybe give them some Kleenex or offer them a coffee and bring it to them myself to make them at ease --- just those tiny things. If someone, say, has been mandated to come and see you by an employer, you can put them a lot at ease with things like that. On virtual, you have your words and you have your smile."

But having these options available to them now is putting smiles not just on the faces of counsellors and professionals who work with the ASYR, but clients themselves.

On the first day of their launch Aug. 3, they had immediate uptake. The first client was simply someone "looking for more information to help them figure out what's better for them in their own journey," but the reasons a potential client might reach out are almost limitless.

"We think there might be a lot of people who just aren't sure of things and have some questions," says McGrail. "Mom might have found some drug paraphernalia in her son's bedroom and just wants to call in real quick and ask how concerned she should be, how might she approach this and what she should do. That coaching that you might give someone at the time just

a babysitter to get out for an in-person might give her the tools to address the vices they're looking for we provide, we issue and then, if someone wants to come back as a couple or to a parent education group, those things can all be explored with them. If we are not 100 per cent the right fit, someone calls in and says they need supports for their son who is on the autism spectrum, we could also steer them in the right direction."

> Adds Merritt: "In the end, what we want to do is provide the support for the individual who is in the session to make a decision about how best they feel they want to move forward. We will totally respect that decision, whatever the decision is. If the decision is to want to have more services and the ser

will then move that forward. If they decide they want to stay where they are, they have some additional information and have had a chance to talk to someone. They can then make that decision, but they know their decision is being respected.

"I think that is really the important theme. We're not there to convince them to make a chance that they're not ready for. We're there to provide them with information and support so they can make the decision that is the best for them at that time."

Burns admitted his players have been technically practicing while playing games at 110 per cent. It's been challenging for all teams and of course managing a competitive match and a practice are two different things.

He commended the effort from his players season for how strong his team has been mentally. The boys support each other and are very positive while on the pitch. The team is supported by excellent parents who are loving every minute of it. "All the kids are leaders in their own way. That really helps maintain a positive attitude and they drive each other. As a coach, there's only so much motivating you can do at some point it has to come internally. They are a motivated group," Burns exclaimed.

The Indigenous Sport and Wellness Ontario created virtual pilot programs to keep people active throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.

Using Facebook as their go-to platform, Wellness in Sport Assistant Isabelle Bailey said over 800 total members participated.

"Our very first pilot program we did was the boot camp at home challenge. We had our fitness instructor Maria, to make a boot camp program that participants could follow for sex weeks. We had 852 total members and it was very successful," said Bailey said.

Other programs that encouraged others to remain active throughout the pandemic were Virtual Fishing Derby, Take a Hike Challenge, Healthy Eating and Active Living, Virtual walks from 2km up to 10km, an NHL 21 tournament, a Wellness Warrior challenged and a few others.

Amidst all of the programs both Bailey and Deidre Debassigne recorded statistics to prove how successful these initiatives were for the indigenous community. Truly, the numbers speak for themselves.

The Couch to 5k Program saw over 2,000 comments on the Facebook page and over 5,000 reactions. Many who participated, reported their activities in the evening just after the dinner hour.

In the Summer Kickoff Bootcamp Program ran by Maria Jocko and Danielle Johnson, majority of the participants exercised on Wednesday and the most popular age group that took part was between 35-44.

Interestingly enough, the majority of the participants were women coming in around 92 per cent.

In the wake of the news that surfaced surrounding the unmarked graves of the lives lost from the residential school system, Bailey said in the community were hurt especially Bailey, who is the descendant of a residential school survivor. She said there needs to be a lot of time and healing.

Initially brought on as a part-timer, Bailey works with a team that continues to bring positivity to the community. She even came up with her own step-counter program that was also successful and she hopes to be a part of this every year.

"Myself, I have younger siblings so I encourage them to do with me. Even though I created the program I participate. Even though I work with ISWO, I do all their programs and I'm in it 100 per cent. I love it."

The 20-year-old, who is originally from Pikwakanagan First Nation, Ontario, said the people who did participate were from all over Canada and a few from the United States as well.

With free programs and activities set for the future here, the ISWO also confirmed Team Ontario's participation at the 2023 North American Indigenous Games.

"I participated in the 2017 games. It will be super exciting on the back end of ti and being a volunteer and doing a lot of stuff with ISWO now," Bailey said.

"I did Team Ontario badminton. I participated in singles, doubles and women's doubles."

Now full time with ISWO, Bailey, attended Algonquin College at the Ottawa campus and finished her first year with Indigenous studies. She hopes to finish her second year and change over to a more sportsbased degree as she continues to work with ISWO.

You also may follow the group at ISWO's Well Nation on Facebook if you wish to participate in any further programs that become available. His club will be taking on Juventus Academy in the semi-final, who are playing through Glen Shields FC.

In the other quarter finals, the U17 girls' side defeated Bolton 7-0 en route to the semis.

Goals came from Bella Mazzaferro (3), Angelina Kristin (2), Sarah Lopez and Jessica Tavares. Goalkeeper Katie Furlong, saved a penalty throughout the match as well.

This week, Caledon will be taking on Dixie Soccer Club not just in the semifinals of the Ontario cup, but also in the league. Taking this team on twice in the same week will be a mental challenge. The last time these two took each other on, Dixie Soccer Club won 3-1.



"Today's gospel reading is the closing scene in a chapter that centres on the theme of who Jesus is and how people respond to him.

"The chapter begins with the feeding of the five thousand. Jesus returns to Capernaum. Many are waiting and have great difficulty with what he says: 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty ... whoever believes has eternal life.'

"They know who his parents are, they say – how can he claim to have come down from heaven? Jesus continues his teaching about who he is but many who had been following him won't accept it.

In today's gospel reading Jesus states: 'Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them ... This is the bread that came down from heaven ... But the one who eats this bread will live for ever.'

The word, "abide," stuck out for me. The idea that those who eat Jesus' flesh and drink his blood abide in him is repeated in a different when Jesus encourages his followers in John 15 to abide in him just as he abides in the Father. 'I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing.'

Being branches of the vine in whom

the life of the Father flows is like eating and drinking life in Jesus. 'Eternal life' is that which makes us live abundantly, to the full, here and now and not just in the by and by Jesus' disciples found the teaching difficult. Jesus asked, 'Does this offend you? It is the spirit that gives life; the flesh is useless. The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life.' Jesus makes it clear that no one can accept his teaching within their own limited understanding; 'the flesh is useless,' he says, or using the New Living Translation, 'Human effort accomplishes nothing.'

"Jesus's disciples realize that they're now at the moment of choice: "Because of this many of his no longer went with him." So Jesus asked the twelve disciples, 'Do you also wish to go away?' Simon Peter answered him, 'Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God.' The choices of whom to identify with get narrowed down.

We're either with those who say, I can't do this, it's too hard for me or we're with Simon Peter who can't imagine eating/drinking/abiding in the words of life anywhere else. "Lord, to whom else can we go?" we might ask along with him. Accompanying Jesus' disciples ... what a journey we're on!"
