O'Toole pledges to eliminate animal abuse

A federal Conservative government will curb all forms of animal abuse, according to Erin O'Toole, Leader of Canada's Conservatives.

Using King's renowned Dog Tales Animal Sanctuary and Rescue facility as a backdrop, O'Toole said his government plans to ban puppy mills, end abuse and violence against animals, and protect the humans who care for them.

The admitted dog-lover said during the pandemic, many Canadians opened up their homes to welcome a pet. In fact, over half of Canadian homes now have a pet and 90 per cent of Canadian pet owners see their pet as a family member. However, this trend has brought to light additional issues for animal welfare, including a surge in unethical breeding and animal abuse.

"We also know that there is a link between cruelty to animals and violence towards people," said O'Toole. "Can-

ada's Conservatives will add animal cruelty as an aggravating factor in domestic violence prosecutions to go after abusers who hurt their spouse by hurting their spouse's pet. We will also support pet owners fleeing violence by working with shelters to ensure that there are better options for women to leave abusive homes without having to abandon their pets."

He said Canada's Conservatives will:

- Ban puppy mills and stop imports of animals bred inhumanely.
- Strengthen the Canadian Food Inspection Agency's ability to enforce current regulations and seize animals when imported under poor welfare conditions.
 - · Ban cosmetic testing on animals.
- · Add animal cruelty as an aggravating factor in domestic violence prosecutions to go after abusers who hurt their spouse by hurting their pet.

Province contributes to Schomberg revitalization

Worrying never does anyone any good at all. Take it from a professional!



Any appeal of the decision of Council to the Ontario Land Tribunal ("OLT") is made by filing with the Clerk of the Corporation of the Township of King, no later than 20 days from the date of this notice, a notice of appeal including the reasons for the appeal, together with a certified cheque or money order in the amount as specified on the OLT website (www.olt.gov.on.ca) per appeal, payable to the Minister of Finance to cover the prescribed OLT fee, and a cheque for \$231.00 per appeal, representing the Clerk's Division 2021 administrative processing fee, payable to the Township of King. The last day for filing an appeal is September 21st , 2021.

Should this date fall on a holiday or weekend, you will have until 4:30 p.m. of the next business day to file your appeal. If you wish to appeal to the Ontario Land Tribunal, a copy of an appeal form is available from their website at www.olt.gov.on.ca or from the Clerk of the Township of King. Please note the Tribunal will only accept filing fee payments by certified cheque or money order.

Who Can File an Appeal

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a decision of Council to the Ontario Land Tribunal. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

No corporation or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal of the decision of the Council of the Township of King, including the lapsing provisions or the conditions, unless the corporation or public body, before the decision of the Council of the Township of King, made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the Council of the Corporation of the Township of King, or made a written request to be notified of changes to the conditions or, in the Ontario Land Tribunal's opinion, there are reasonable grounds to add the corporation or public body as a party.

Right of Applicant or Public Body to Appeal Conditions of Draft Plan of Subdivision

The applicant, the Minister of Municipal Affairs, or any public body that has made oral submissions at the public meeting or made written submissions to the Council of the Corporation of the Township of King before the proposed Draft Plans of Subdivisions were approved may, at any time before the approval of the Final Plan of Subdivision, appeal any of the conditions imposed by the Council of the Corporation of the Township of King to the Ontario Land Tribunal by filing a notice of appeal with the Clerk of the Corporation of the Township of King.

How to Receive Notice of Changed Conditions

The conditions of an approval of Draft Plans of Subdivision may be changed at any time before the final approval is given. Further amendments include an increase to the maximum permitted height and a reduction to the minimum front yard requirement.

At such time as a public meeting is scheduled in accordance with the Planning Act, the Township of King will provide further notice specifying the date and time of the meeting. Any person may attend the public meeting (or participate virtually if the meeting is remote due to public health restrictions), and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed official plan amendment or zoning by-law

How coercing people will be a detriment to society

have the flu shot at risk. It doesn't make sense. It's a statement to force people to take the shot.

Now in saving this, there are two ways of looking at this statement. One is the fact that Trudeau has a deal with Pfizer until 2024 for vaccines and booster shots. On the other hand, he genuinely wants the pandemic to end and the vaccine is the way to do it.

Galati and those working with him, have recently launched a Notice of Civil Claim against the Province of British Columbia for breaching constitutional rights regarding their vaccine card provisions.

Even in Canadian law, to subject to weekly testing is also against a person's rights. The Genetic Non-Discrimination Act protects employees from constantly revealing their health status to the employer by means to keep a job. Lawyer Jane Scharf from Ottawa, spoke of this on her Facebook page.

What we're also seeing is political issues even while fully vaccinated. Some er from.

"It's in the view of the Constitutional countries do not accept Astra Zeneca. Some companies and countries don't accept a mixture of doses. Doesn't this sound wrong even for those who fully support the shot? Hasn't this simply become political at this point?

Protestors create unsafe space in front of MPP's home

Anti-vax protestors have stepped over the line, converging in front of King-Vaughan MPP Stephen Lecce's home.


He did contact York Regional Police who are keeping an eye on things.

From his observations, he said the majority of the protestors are not from the riding. The anti-vaxers posted his home address online, encouraging people to show up and protest. One man questioned by police didn't even know what he was

"In our democracy, people have the right to protest, but there is a place and time. Minister Lecce's neighbours and their families have no role in government decisions and should never be made to feel unsafe. The same applies to our frontline health care workers, small business owners, and everyday Ontarians rolling up their sleeves to get their shot," said Caitlin Clark from Minister Lecce's office.

"The best way we can protect our kids and our community is to get vaccinated," Lecce stressed.

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Student's winning design will commemorate Korean War

It's a conflict often described as Canada's "forgotten war," but this community's efforts in the Korean Conflict will never be forgotten again thanks to 17-year-old Alex Theaker.

Theaker, who will begin Grade 12 at Aurora High School this fall, is the winner of a design contest held by the Town, in conjunction with the Royal Canadian Legion and the Aurora Museum & Archives, to find a suitable memorial for Korean veterans within the Peace Park at Yonge and Murray Drive.

The Peace Park, which is dominated by a tall, illuminated column paying tribute to the men from Aurora, King Township, and Whitchurch-Stouffville who fell during the First World War, contains monuments to men and women who lost their lives in the Second World War (The Altar of Sacrifice) and the Afghanistan Conflict (a decommissioned light armoured vehicle).

A commemoration of the Korean War has long been a missing piece of the puzzle.

The Town launched a design contest to rectify that oversight this past May following a delegation to Council from local historian Bill Newman, who, backed by the Legion and Museum, made the case for an additional monu-

The subsequent contest was open to all residents from Aurora, King, and Whitchurch-Stouffville with few parameters. Potential entries, they said, could be anything from a simple pencil drawing to something much more elab-

Theaker fell into the latter camp, harnessing his 3D modelling skills to create a simple but striking stone cube designed to be placed atop a pedestal at least one metre tall.

"I had developed skills of 3D modelling over the summer and thought I would put my skills to the test and see how well I could do," says Alex, noting he began to delve deeper into the technology as a Grade 9 student. "I thought this was the perfect moment for me to test my abilities. I looked at other memorials that are currently at the



Peace Park and looked at other memorials around here and I started playing around with different designs."

The winning entry features the Canadian flag and a representation of the Korean Peninsula, the dates of the conflict and the three communities, anforget."

"I really designed it to be modified by the Town as they see fit," Alex explains, noting that although he did not design the memorial for a specific place within the Peace Park, he hopes it can be located either to the left or right of the dominant cenotaph tower.

"When people see this new memorial, my hope is they go and think about if there are people in their lives, their families, who were involved and to just read up about the Korean War and the sacrifices of not only Canadians, but Americans, Koreans and NATO in general. I think it is very important as we never talk about the Korean War in school and kind of stop in the Second World War. I think it is important for people to think about not only the war

in general but the sacrifices local people made for it."

Today, memorials to Canada's contributions to the Korean War can be found at monuments from coast to coast, but Aurora is one of the exceptions. Although no Aurorans are known to have chored by the evocative motto, "Lest we lost their lives in the conflict, Mr. Newman said it is "timely and fitting" to recognize what they did to fend off "yet another threat to the freedom and right of self-determination of the world's peoples.

> "We are requesting ... the involvement of the Town and its staff to design and locate a fitting memorial at the Peace Park to our Korean War veterans," he said. "We understand the funding for the memorial may be obtainable through Veterans Affairs Canada's commemorative partnership program for a community war memorial funding. Your favourable consideration of this request would provide overdue recognition to those from our community and surrounding area who served in what is being termed as 'Canada's forgotten war."

Crombie added this would allow non-essential businesses remain open to those fully vaccinated, and such policies are seen in many other jurisdictions. Admittedly it's a sensitive issue, but Crombie is in full support, noting ,the vast majority "have done our part."

She said we can't cater to those who are choosing not to get vaccinated, "putting all of us at risk, putting our economy at risk."

Peel Public Health is supportive of a vaccine certificate and believe it is a necessary step to limit transmission in our community by increasing vaccine rates and protecting individuals who are unvaccinated. Peel Public Health continues to advocate for the implementation of a time-limited vaccination certificate program across Ontario and stand ready to support any solution implemented by our provincial partners.

But Caledon Mayor Allan Thompson is a bit more cautious.

Vaccination certification, he said, needs should be led by the federal/provincial governments.

"I have spoken to a number of Caledon businesses who have said strongly they will not survive another lockdown and many support some type of proof of vaccination," he said.

Thompson will be hosting another COVID Town Hall with Dr. Loh and Minister MPP Sylvia Jones on Sept. 16 at 7 p.m.

He encourages residents to send him their questions via email at to mayor@ caledon.ca

Dr. Karim Kurji, York Region's Medical Officer of Health, said discussions for additional measures, including recommendations for mandating vaccines and vaccine certificates/passports are ongoing.

At this time, eight out of 10 cases of COVID-19 in York Region are in either unvaccinated or partially vaccinated individuals; these individuals have a high likelihood of ending up in hospital and in ICUs.

"We have to protect businesses in our communities; applying a broad brush of capacity restrictions is unfair and likens to reverting to lockdown areas, which would not necessarily be as effective," he said.

Dr. Kurji noted that some health units have been sharing information about vaccine certificates/passport apps with secure features in light of the growing number of businesses, organizations and institutions implementing vaccine mandates.

"I urge the Ontario government to consider a standardized provincial approach to vaccine certificates/passports; having different apps from every health unit will not be a viable option.

"I hope that is the direction to be followed with consultation and in partnership with the business community, government officials and Medical Officers of Health.

"This is both for security and safety of the unvaccinated and vaccinated individuals given the increased transmissibility of the Delta variant."

York makes vaccines mandatory for staff

The Regional Municipality of York has made the decision to extend a mandatory vaccination policy to all staff. The policy will also apply to contractors and

All York Region staff will be required to receive two doses of a Health Canada-approved COVID-19 vaccine to ensure the best protection possible against

All staff will be required to provide proof of a first COVID-19 vaccination dose no later than Oct. 1. Confirmation of both first and second doses is required no later than Nov. 1.

Individuals with valid medical or other human rights-based exemptions will be considered for appropriate accommodation within the policy.

Those who do not have a valid exemption and choose not to receive a complete vaccine series will be required to attend mandatory education on the benefits of vaccination; unvaccinated staff with a valid exemption or awaiting a mandatory education session may be required to complete regular COVID-19 testing.

Once staff have completed a mandatory education session, the expectation for staff is to conform with the mandatory vaccination requirement of the policy; failure to do so may result in further action, up to and including disciplinary ac-

With the Delta variant now targeting the unvaccinated and many who are vulnerable, including children not yet eligible to receive a vaccine, we need to be united in the fight against COVID-19.

With more than 4,900 full and part-time staff, this policy will help protect both staff and communities.

The vaccination policy and related processes are being finalized.

It's never been easier to get your COVID-19 vaccine; walk-ins are available at York Region vaccination clinics until the end of August and York Region Public Health continues to operate smaller vaccine community hubs, mobile and pop-up clinics in convenient locations; for updated clinic information, please visit york. ca/COVID19Vaccine

At this time, staff in York Region's long-term care homes are required to have full vaccination against COVID-19, a medical reason for not being vaccinated against COVID-19 or completion of a COVID-19 vaccination educational session.

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Protestors didn't derail Trudeau's stop in Nobleton

"The demonstrators were loud, but they do not reflect the wonderful community of Nobleton in King Township. Many expressed to me after that they were appalled and have shared many kind messages of support."

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Trudeau's visit to Bolton cancelled due to safety

On Friday evening, in Bolton, at the Hampton Inn and Suites by Hilton, there was a large area of the parking lot roped off as a crew worked to prep for the arrival of Liberal Leader Justin Trudeau.

With the federal election set for Sept. 20, Trudeau's Friday was planned around making stops on the campaign trail. After making an announcement that morning in Mississauga, he made quick stops in Richmond Hill and Nobleton before arriving in Bolton.

The roped off area was initially surrounded by Liberal supporters and volunteers, but slowly protestors began to trickle in. One of the first protestors to arrive, just after 4 p.m., was a person decked out in a People's Party of Canada shirt and hat and filming a video denouncing Trudeau's stance on masks and the vaccines – from there, more and more protestors showed up.

Seemingly a large group of them were led by people carrying an explicit sign and a megaphone to lead chants about their displeasures with Trudeau, the COVID-19 vaccine, and Canadians who follow mask mandates. By 5 p.m. – when the event was supposed to begin – there were far more protestors than supporters with many lining a fence that ran parallel to the event.

The security detail got more involved when one of the ropes stopping those in attendance from entering the area Dufferin-Caledon Liberal MP candidate Lisa Post, volunteers, Caledon Mayor Allan Thompson and councillors, local leaders, and media were invited to stand fell down. Police officers and volunteers did their best to keep protestors from inching closer, but the sheer number made it a difficult situation.

At 6:55 p.m., a police officer made an announcement over the PA system that the event would not be going forward due to safety issues as a group of people with the Liberal party, as well as Mayor Allan Thompson and councillors were rushed inside a side door of the Hampton Inn and Suites.

"I'm sorry folks, unfortunately for safety reasons this event will no longer be taking place here today," he announced. "Thank you for your support and everything you're doing, our top priority is always everybody's safety, so please, safely make your way home."

The main topic the protestors were focused on Trudeau's handling of COVID as well as his encouragement for every Canadian to get vaccinated, but at times, the chants from the crowd turned to vulgar and unfounded statements regarding the Liberal leader.

After the event was cancelled, Trudeau made his way to Brampton to comment on the cancellation of the campaign event due to the security con-

"We had a lovely event planned tonight," he said. "Supporters had come out to Dufferin-Caledon from across the northern part of the GTA to see (Dufferin-Caledon Liberal MP candidate) Lisa Post and show our support for the great work that she's going to be doing on the ground as a candidate and hopefully as an MP."

Speaking directly to the people in attendance to support him and the Liberal party, as well as those who were working the event, Trudeau expressed his worries if the event went on as planned.

"Thank you for stepping up – young people in their first political rally, active volunteers who had been going door to door, seniors," he said. "There are political rallies like this across the country with all parties almost every evening, it's an important part of our politics in this country. Unfortunately, tonight we had to cancel because going ahead with the event would have put those people at risk."

On Saturday, Conservative Party Leader Erin O'Toole addressed the situation after multiple Conservative campaign workers were spotted among the protestors in Bolton – the campaign workers are no longer associated with the Conservative Party.

"We're running on a positive campaign for the future of this country," he said. "I strongly condemn any form of harassment and protest the like we've seen. We're a democracy, we should be having a healthy and respectful debate of ideas and we have no time for people who bring in negativity to campaigning"

NDP Leader Jagmeet Singh also made a statement on the situation while campaigning in Sudbury.

"No one should have to cancel their events where we have students, we have young people, we have volunteers, we have organizers, no one should have to POLICE

cancel an event because they're worried about a danger to the safety of people coming out to a political event," he said.

After being acclaimed as the Liberal candidate for Dufferin-Caledon in April, Post was excited to see the campaign event take place in her constituency but looks forward to continuing to focus on the safety of Canadians through the pandemic.

"I'm proud to live in a democracy where civil discourse is not only permitted, it's encouraged," Post said. "But what we saw on Friday night was not civil discourse – it was violent and aggressive and threatened the safety of my family, my volunteers and those of my candidate colleagues from Mississauga and Brampton.

"The RCMP absolutely made the right decision to cancel the event and keep all of us safe. The last 18 months have been incredibly hard for people on many levels, and I understand the frustration and anger that many are feeling. I am running to be your next Member of Parliament because I believe that

the people in our community deserve every opportunity to be safe, included and thrive."

Mayor Thompson has no issue with those opposing any specific Party peacefully, but it was the way the protestors went about it that left a bad taste in his mouth.

"I share the deep concerns of all party leaders in the federal election on the protest in Bolton on Friday night," said Thompson. "While I respect the right to peaceful protest and to exercise democratic freedoms, I do not condone the actions of the protestors on Friday."






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Rebellion experts celebrate unique donation

searchers met recently at the King Heritage & Cultural Centre (KHCC) to celebrate a unique donation.

A prisoner box, made by Jesse Cleaver of Lloydtown, is one of 152 known to have been made by prisoners jailed after the failure of the Rebellion of 1837 – and it has now come home to King.

Rebellion expert Chris Raible, with assistance from historians Dr. John Carter and Darryl Withrow and genealogist Linda Corupe, has made the research of these unique boxes his life's work.

In 2009, From Hands Now Striving to be Free: Boxes Crafted by 1837 Rebellion Prisoners was published by the York Pioneer & Historical Society. Believing he may have found box-crafters had access to special-

Mr. Raible's research now focuses on the lives and backgrounds of the box makers. He believes that numerous boxes may have been lost or destroyed over the years, but that we are nearing the end of new discoveries. An updated inventory, including nearly 60 more boxes, new research and photos, is in the works.

Historian Darryl Withrow uses his knowledge of wood-crafting to interpret how the boxes were made. While most of the boxes are made of oak with lighter wood insets, they vary stylistically. It is likely that the boxes were made by a select number of woodworkers on behalf of other prisoners.

Withrow believes that the

A small group of like-minded re- nearly all the boxes that survived, ized carving tools and that the process was organized. He suggests that prisoners may have used the boxes to barter for other goods that they required.

> The new donation at the KHCC is a simple rectangular box with insets of lighter wood and a sliding lid. It is one of four boxes attributed to Lloydtown resident Jesse H. Cleaver (1802-1869) who was arrested in March 1838. Cleaver was released from jail in August 1838 but was banished from Upper Canada; he moved with his family to the United States and never returned to Lloydtown.

Individuals who do not provide proof of full vaccination against COVID-19 will be required to undertake regular antigen testing. These settings will be required to track and report on the implementation of their policies to the provincial government. The timing of this cash infusion was "perfect" as they ready this twoprong approach, says BBBSY's Suzanne Boucher, while tackling at the same time an expansive wait list of kids looking for mentorship.

"Our team has put together multiple new virtual mentoring programs as well as our original community foundation programs," said Ms. Boucher of programs that have served the community for more than 51 years. "This is almost the absolute perfect timing when we're able to get more volunteers to help provide these programs. Usually every year we serve anywhere between 450 and 550 children on average; this year, by July, we had already served over 560 kids. We're probably going to hit close to double that this year. That is what our program is expecting, especially once the school year starts again.

"This funding came at such an incredible time. Our wait list has been growing and we just want to keep the momentum going."

Through various shutdowns, lockdowns, and redevelopment of Ontario's reopening plans, it has been more important than ever for BBBSY to ensure existing mentorships between adults and youth are maintained when meeting up face-to-face has been more difficult than ever.

In Step 3, whether they proceed to face-to-face interaction again or maintain that virtual connection is up to the mentorship partners, but BBBSY encourages virtual interaction right now.

"In this digital day and age, our kids are thriving through the virtual mentoring programs because they have the opportunity to talk in the chat room where they are a lot more open," says Boucher. "A lot of our in-person mentoring programs, some of them are a little bit shier, don't really speak up as much, but we're noticing a trend online where kids are a lot more talkative and they communicate a lot more easily. If they are not having a good day, they will

(BBBSY) was recently announced as keep their cameras off where they feel a lot more comfortable.

"We definitely want to keep this virtual mentoring program alive. Even when we get back to the new normal and get our in-person mentoring programs back to where they were, we definitely want to still build on this virtual aspect because this is a way that we can connect some of our young people [in different] geographical areas where we have volunteers. We want to keep this going and build off of it to help mend our waiting lists so they're not just on there for months and months. Even when we're back to the new normal [we wantl to at least have some connection until we do find somebody within their area to have an in-person mentoring relationship."

Helping to foster both the continuation of mentorship programs and the easing of the wait lists will be a return for Golf for Kids' Sake, one of BBBSY's signature community fundraisers, on Aug. 26. It is their first in-person fundraising event since COVID-19 put a halt to their Bowl For Kids' Sake events which kicked off in February of 2020 and were slated to take place in the community through March of the same

Not only will this be an opportunity to raise much-needed funds for the organization, but it is also one that is aimed to raise awareness of the fact BBBSY is much more than just mentoring programs.

"This is our 51st year in York Region and I do find there is a misconception with BBBSY in general and within York Region: a lot of people do know us from the one-to-one community match, they meet once a week, but we want to bring awareness to the fact we have programs thriving within the community, especially our group programs. Our group programs are the number one services we do provide, whether it is Go Girls, Game On, or in-school mentoring.

"They are thriving in schools and community centres and that is really where we need a lot of volunteers as well. We're really excited to open up to more minds that we're not just the community one-to-one anymore.'



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
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

incredibly special. Along with, creating an environment that is built for everyone.



Aurora native Barclay Goodrow brought the Stanley Cup to Machell Park last Thursday that brought together hundreds of spectators.

In what was a very hot afternoon, Goodrow arrived with Lord Stanley on his Jeep and brought it right out in front of a stage set up in the park.

Mayor Tom Mrkas introduced Barclay Goodrow to the crowd and provided a brief timeline up until he was traded from the San Jose Sharks to the Tampa Bay Lightning on February 24

Goodrow comes off back-to-back Stanley Cup victories with the Lightning defeating the Dallas Stars and the Montreal Canadiens, before being traded by the Lightning to the New York Rangers this offseason.

Mrkas pegged this conversation as a "Between The Pipes" interview. He alluded to questions regarding Goodrow's early life and once he finished his personal questions, children who registered prior to the event were permitted to come up to the microphone and take a picture with their local hockey icon. Other fans lined up to take pictures with the Stanley Cup in the process.

When Goodrow began playing hockey he recalled it was extremely important to play other sports in a calendar year.

"I played a lot of soccer every summer. I wasn't into playing hockey 12 months round back then. My parents instilled in me it's good to build your athleticism in playing other sports. It's good to take a break from hockey every offseason," Goodrow recalled.

"I played soccer pretty seriously until I was probably 14, or 15. Right before the OHL draft. I think the year before I stopped playing soccer to focus my time on to hockey. Other than that, I played rugby, basketball. Pretty much any sport in school that was going on at that time. I feel like it really built me into the athlete I am today."

Throughout his time growing up in Aurora, Goodrow recalled he spent a lot of time at Aurora Community Centre. He won multiple OMHA championships with a lot of his buddies. He said most of his friends all live in different places but when they all come back home to Aurora, it jogs a lot of memories. And his favourite place to eat in Aurora was the purple pig.

"I used to get Dad's Root Beer that came in a bottle, thinking I'm a beauty drinking the beer out of a bottle. That was my favourite part. I didn't even like the food I just liked the drink."

Goodrow was drafted into the OHL in 2009 by the Brampton Battalion. He spent four season with Brampton before moving to the North Bay Battalion for one season.

In 2014, Barclay Goodrow entered the NHL undrafted, signing with the San Jose Sharks.

Growing up Goodrow also loved the Toronto Maple Leafs and his favourite player was former Leafs captain Mats Sundin.

One child asked Goodrow why he never played for Toronto and Goodrow chuckled. He laughed back while replying, saying the Leafs didn't trade for him or draft him.

Goodrow will now be heading over to New York to play in the Big Apple this upcoming season.





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

In the winter time, AMYA helps shelter the homeless while providing those less fortunate clothing and food to keep them safe.



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
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
