We're saying that no matter where you live, you will have access to reliable, high-speed internet to work, learn, start a business, access vital services like health care, and connect with family and friends."

> The new procurement process, led by Infrastructure Ontario, builds on the province's recently announced investment of up to \$14.7 million for 13 new projects under its Improving Connectivity for Ontario (ICON) program. This investment is providing up to 17,000 homes and businesses with access to reliable high-speed internet.



Village Urban Design Guidelines

Public Open Houses

King Township is undertaking a review of its urban design guidelines which apply to its Villages of King City, Nobleton, and Schomberg. The outcome of this review is anticipated to be a new, consolidated set of urban design guidelines that apply to the Villages (outlined on the map on page 2), focusing on three areas: Village Centres, Established Neighbourhoods, and Employment Areas.

Each Village in King Township has unique characteristics, circumstances, and issues that must be considered in developing the Guidelines. All interested persons are invited

to join one or more Virtual Public Open Houses to learn about this project and contribute to our understanding of the unique traits of each Village. The Draft Village Urban Design Guidelines are being prepared in 2021. Additional consultation events will be held as the project progresses.

What are the Village Urban Design Guidelines?

The Village Urban Design Guidelines are a series of statements and images that outline the types of design elements and features that will shape development in King Township. Urban design is informed by a variety of disciplines including architecture, land use planning, landscape architecture, and engineering. Building orientation and siting, streetscape design, built form massing and special locations in King Township can all be addressed through the guidelines.

Why revise King Township's urban design guidelines?

In September 2019, Township Council adopted a new Official Plan titled 'Our King' which supports managed growth in a manner that uses land wisely and elevates the quality of the built and natural environments. 'Our King' recognizes that effective design results in the building of complete and desirable places and contributes to the economic vitality and healthy community. There is a need to review the existing Design Guidelines to ensure that they are up to date and align with the urban design objectives of the new Official Plan.

Kingbridge receives funding for critical care services

The Kingbridge Centre will continue to deliver specialized care, thanks to some additional provincial funding.

The Minister of Health, Hon. Christine Elliott, Minister of Education, Hon. Stephen Lecce, MPPs Michael Parsa and Logan Kanapathi, York Region Chairman Emmerson and King's Ward 5 Councillor Debbie Schaefer were at Kingbridge recently to announce \$13 million in additional provincial funding to help York Region deliver critical services, create longer-term housing solutions and keep vulnerable people safe during the continuation of this pandemic.

The Social Services Relief Fund was set up in March of 2020 to help protect the health and safety of the community's most vulnerable people during the pandem-

The provincial and regional leaders also thanked Kingbridge, York Region Social Services, Salvation Army and others for their dedication and collaboration for the last year and a half to provide shelter services to those most in need during these challenging times.

The unique partnership between the public and private sector working alongside not for profit organizations has been a highly effective model of collaboration in response to rapidly changing conditions and needs.

It also builds on a range of other previously announced provincial initiatives that will connect another 70,000 homes and businesses throughout Southwestern and Northern On-

"Infrastructure Ontario is excited to be launching this innovative new competitive bidding process," said Michael Lindsay, President and CEO of Infrastructure Ontario. "These past 18 months of working, learning and receiving care from home have shown the value and importance of achieving high-speed connectivity for every region in Ontario. This program will help more than 300.000 homes and businesses across the province gain access to this connectivity."

Ontario is now one of the few jurisdictions in Canada with its own comprehensive and proactive plan to achieve 100 per cent connectivity. In the coming months, the government plans to announce the results of the reverse auctions, along with additional details on how it will help ensure every region in Ontario has access to high-speed internet by the end of 2025.

In March, the Ontario government announced nearly \$4 billion to connect every region to high-speed internet by the end of 2025. This is the largest single investment in high-speed internet, in any province, by any government in Canadian history.

Internet service providers interested in bidding on these contracts must register with www.merx.com to download the RFQ. Infrastructure Ontario will

shortlisted will be invited to respond to a Request for Proposals to participate in the reverse auctions.

The reverse auctions allow internet service providers to bid on how much provincial funding they would require to supply the community with highspeed internet access. The winning bid would meet defined coverage and deployment requirements at the most competitive (lowest) price.

As many as 700,000 households in Ontario – making up 1.4 million Ontarians – lack access to high-speed internet or have no internet connection at all.

Up to Speed: Ontario's Broadband and Cellular Action Plan is already providing internet and cellular access to homes and businesses in communities across Ontario.


The Ontario government is also helping to speed up construction of broadband projects by successfully introducing the Supporting Broadband and Infrastructure Expansion Act. 2021 earlier this spring.

Last year, the province launched the Improving Connectivity for Ontario (ICON) program, a multi-year program that aims to support high-speed internet and cellular projects.

The province has invested in initiatives to improve connectivity across Eastern and Southwestern Ontario. It has also invested in high-speed internet projects in rural and Northern communities through other initiatives, such as the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation and the Next Generation Network Program.

Expanding access to high-speed internet is part of Ontario's action plan which includes more than 30 projects.

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

Getting our students back to safer schools

It's September, and here in Vaughan and King Township and across the province of Ontario, students are returning to their classrooms for a more normal school year that includes sports, field trips and extracurricular activities.

In-class learning is critical to their mental and physical health, and overall development. I have been and will remain a passionate advocate for in-person learning.

I saw it first-hand, having visited several schools in the community and across the GTA, and I can tell you that so many students were excited to be back. Smiling, more confident, and enthused to learn!

Our government consulted with pediatric hospitals including Sick Kids, and worked closely with Ontario's Chief Medical Officer of Health in developing Ontario's back to class plan. Dr. Moore said himself, Ontario's plan is "world-class," noting the comprehensive protocols in place and ventilation investments supporting safer schools. That position was echoed by Dr. Kurji, York Region's Medical Officer of Health who suggested Ontario's plan is, "cautious and sensible."

So what changed, since last summer? Three major differences.

- 1. Vaccines.
- 2. Major ventilation upgrades.
- 3. New testing options.

science – we have over 80% of students aged 12 and up with at least one dose and over 70% double dosed. Over 82% of the general population is fully immunized. That is a critical layer of protection for schools and the community at large, notably helping to "cocoon" or better protect those children under 12 who are currently ineligible for the vaccine.

We have also required all education staff to be fully vaccinated or subjected to twice-weekly rapid testing to keep schools as safe as possible.

Second, we stepped up ventilation upgrades at every school in our community and across the province. Improving air quality in schools is key to keeping kids safe and creating a more normal school experience. Governments are investing \$17,251,000 to the York Region District School Board and \$16,985,000 for the York Catholic District School Board.

Air ventilation investments in King and Vaughan build upon improvements made over the last year. This summer, I was proud to announce \$2,780,000 in provincial funds to improve ventilation upgrades in 13 King-Vaughan schools, including:

action to keep kids safe by investing more than \$600 million this year to improve school ventilation systems across our province. That's in addition to the \$1.4 billion in annual funding we provide to school boards to renew school facilities, including HVAC and windows.

government is instructing Our boards to use the highest-grade filters -MERV-13s, whenever possible, perform more frequent filter changes, operate air systems for longer periods, and calibrate HVAC systems for maximum air flow and fresh air intake.

Improvements to ventilation have been made across all schools and all boards in Ontario, and they are based on the advice of medical and public health experts, including Public Health Ontario, Sick Kids Hospital and Ontario's Science Advisory Table. In total, we have provided over 70,000 standalone HEPA filtration units and other ventilation devices to keep classrooms safe; 1,730 HEPA units are now in York Region schools. We have required a HEPA unit in every kindergarten class and HEPA units in every learning space in schools without mechanical ventilation.

Finally, we have made testing options easier for parents and students by launching take-home tests in highschools, designed to help keep students in class and reduce absenteeism from the class and the curriculum.

In a sentence, our mission is to min-

imize disruption and maximize safety Our government is also taking direct of children, staff, and families. Thanks to the strong collaboration and advice of Sick Kids and the approval by Ontario's Chief Medical Officer of Health, students in Vaughan and King have returned to safer classrooms - with improved ventilation and high vaccine rates within our communities.



First, my apologies to those who would contend that in addition to updating the spellings in this 16th century poem, the wording should also have been edited to make it more inclusive. That is a discussion for another day.

This is a counter view to Robert Belardi's opinion piece in the King Sentinel of Sept. 2, "How coercing people will be a detriment to society," in which he elevates individual freedom over the common good when it comes to vaccination against CoVID-19.

It has been reported that the quoted portion of Donne's sermon was rooted

mans 12: 4-5, the latter passage reading "For as in one body we have many members, and all the members do not have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another (italization added)."

The issue that has arisen in Canada's fight against the CoVID pandemic is that a significant number of individuals feel that they can conduct themselves solely as individuals, ignoring the health of the greater body, while demanding the benefits of remaining part of it.

Mr. Belardi claims that the Prime Minister's statement, "If you don't want to get vaccinated, that's your choice. But don't think you can get on a plane, or a train beside vaccinated people and put them at risk," is an example of bullying, yet the PM's very statement acknowledges "... that's your choice" prioritizing the right of vaccinated passengers to a safe travelling environment over those who would chose to be, in Donne's words, "islands."

Our society, in general, no longer questions smoking bans in enclosed public spaces. The rights of employees and customers pre-empt the rights of smokers to light up. Yet unless that single instance of smoke exposure causes a fatal asthma attack, it is unlikely to result in anyone's death.

Not so with this virus. It can infect even the vaccinated though at much reduced frequency. According to the Public Health Agency of Canada, on Sept. 3, a fully vaccinated Canadian had 1/13th the risk of infection and 1/36th the risk of hospitalization of an unvaccinated Canadian, but why should the vaccinated have to worry about unnecessary exposure and potentially carrying the infection to more vulnerable contacts so that others can ignore societal expectations?

I think back to 1976 when Ontario became the first jurisdiction in Canada to legislate the use of seat belts. Of course civil libertarians protested loudly that it was their right not to strap themselves in and the government had no right interfere. Whether it would stand ethical scrutiny I don't know, but my response at the time was that they were right, and government should not force adults to wear seatbelts, but only if those who chose not to buckle up signed a waiver to eschew the benefits of government medical insurance when and if they were the victims of a collision. Of course that option is not available in the case of smoking or vaccinations where one's decisions have a, potentially fatal, impact on others as well as oneself.

Mr. Belardi goes on to state, "To say to someone that an unvaccinated person can put someone who is immunized against the virus at risk ... doesn't make sense." Au contraire, the medical community and the media have gone to some lengths to explain the mechanisms involved, not only in chasing that elusive herd immunity in our own country, but in failing to inoculate the world at large. At the simplest level and as pointed out previously, a fully inoculated person is not "immune" in the fullest sense of the word: their risk of infection from the currently prevalent variant is merely greatly reduced. But pockets of the unvaccinated can be breeding grounds for other variants that may be even more infectious than the B.1.617.2 delta (δ) variant of concern or may even be vaccine-resistant as is a possibility with the B.1.621 mu (µ) variant of interest.

Mr. Belardi acknowledges breakthrough infections and the challenges

in the Bible I Cor.12: 12-31 and/or Ro- in keeping ahead of new variants, but his argument seems to be, peculiarly, that this is a reason for relaxing precautions rather than enhancing them.

Next, Mr. Belardi broaches a Constitutional argument, referring to the Constitutional Rights Centre. In the words of the Department of Justice:

"The Constitution says that the Charter takes priority over all other legislation in Canada because it is part of the "supreme law of Canada ... However, section 1 of the Charter also recognizes that even in a democracy, rights and freedoms are not absolute. ... Parliament or a provincial legislature can limit fundamental rights, but only if it can show that the limit

· Is set out in a law; pursues an important goal which can be justified in a free and democratic society; and

 Pursues that goal in a reasonable and proportionate manner.

The interests of society must always be balanced against the interests of individuals to see if limits on individual rights can be justified" (https://www. justice.gc.ca/eng/rp-pr/cp-pm/just/06. html).

Although some pundits have speculated that employers are treading on dangerous grounds when they impose vaccination mandates, it is also true that groups of law professors have issued public opinions that the current situation is one where societal good trumps individual freedoms, and if I'm not mistaken, lower courts have agreed. To expose employees to non-vaccinated employees would open the floodgates of law suits and Workers' Compensation claims as vaccinated employees or those with legitimate medical vaccine exemptions became ill, not to mention the responsibility to protect customers.

Mr. Belardi appeals to "all citizens to stand up in unity to end the debate amongst one another. Come together and unselfishly set aside what our views are on COVID-19." A noble sounding plea, but his solution is for the significant majority to potentially sacrifice their health and the health and possibly even a life of someone close to them to accommodate a minority who chose not to "follow the science" or, as the case may be, not to fact check the copious misinformation being spread.

Speaking of misinformation, Mr. Belardi refers to Canada's Genetic Non-Discrimination Act (https:// laws-lois.justice.gc.ca/eng/acts/G-2.5/ page-1.html#h-247308) and to Ottawa lawyer Jane Scharf, who claims that polymerase chain reaction (PCR) tests are prohibited by the Act. PCR tests detect genetic material from a specific organism, such as a virus. The Act prohibits any person from requiring "an individual to undergo a genetic test as a condition of (3 bullets)" and defines genetic test as "a test that analyzes DNA, RNA or chromosomes for purposes such as the prediction of disease or vertical transmission risks, or monitoring, diagnosis or prognosis." I'm not a lawyer, but I see a clear distinction between "detection" and "analyzing."

Early in his opinion piece, Mr. Belardi notes that "there are many who worry about long-term effects of these vaccines in the years to come." This is despite assurances from the medical establishment that there is little to no justification for such worry.

One should not permit worries over risks with vanishingly small likelihoods, particularly those with manageable outcomes, take precedence over risks with high likelihood of occurrence and tragic consequences.



Decision on Bill 197 legal challenge reaffirms the right to participate

A court ruling on Minister's Zoning Orders (MZOs) has citizens' groups calling for changes.

The Ontario Divisional Court determined that the Government of Ontario broke the law when it failed to comply with the public consultation requirements of Ontario's Environmental Bill of Rights (EBR). Specifically, in a decision released on Sept. 3, it declared that the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing acted "unreasonably and unlawfully" in failing to consult with the public on changes to the Planning Act regarding Minister's Zoning Orders (MZOs).

"As Environmental Commissioner of Ontario for 15 years, I am heartened to see the Court uphold the rights of people to participate in government decision-making affecting the environment," said Gord Miller, Chair of Earthroots. "The Court's declaration is clear – the Government of Ontario broke the law in violating those rights."

"The Environmental Bill of Rights provides very significant tools for the people of Ontario to know about, and participate in, decisions that affect their environment. Complying with the Ontario EBR is not 'optional," added Theresa McClenaghan, executive director of the Canadian Environmental Law Association (CELA). "In this decision, the Divisional Court has reaffirmed the requirement for the Ontario government to ensure those rights are provided to the public."

In August 2020, after the passage of Ontario's controversial Bill 197, a legal challenge against the legislation was launched by: Earthroots, Ontario Nature, CELA, Cooper Price (a 17-year-old activist) and Michel Koostachin (who was born and raised in Attawapiskat).

"This judgement is a win for the involvement of young people in the political process. Our leaders must start listening to our voices when legislating our future," said Cooper Price.


Represented by Joseph Castrilli, Richard Lindgren and David Estrin of CELA, the parties to the lawsuit alleged that Bill 197 was enacted in a manner that failed to comply with the public notice and comment requirements of the EBR. The court agreed that the Minister should have consulted the public on the MZO amendments, given their potentially significant environmental impact.

The court also noted that prior to the passing of Bill 197, the Auditor General of Ontario had informed the Minister that the public should be consulted on the MZO amendments, because of their environmental significance. But the Minister failed to do so.

"The Government of Ontario chose to break the law and expand its powers to issue MZOs even after a warning from the Auditor General - before Bill 197 passed - that it was required to consult the public first. Such blatant disrespect for the law and our environmental rights should not be taken lightly," stated Dr. Anne Bell, Ontario Nature's Director of Conservation and Education.

"The Court's declaration holds the government publicly accountable. The people of Ontario now know that the Government of Ontario broke the law.

"I hope the Court's decision will help ensure that the government doesn't do so again. But in fact it's already a repeat offender. It broke the law when it scrapped Ontario's cap-and trade program back in 2018. And it broke the law



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tax gas-pump stickers in 2019. This is the third time in as many years.

"The Court's decision doesn't change the Bill 197 amendments with respect to MZOs. They are still in place. These include greater powers to interfere with municipal planning and overrule decisions by municipal councils and planners – and to do so without giving public notice.

"But at least the government's law-breaking is not hidden from Ontarians. We can and must demand better from our political leaders."

Bell said citizens should be concerned about MZOs because they allow developers to "sidestep environmental protections, public consultation and transparent municipal planning processes and decision-making. They deprive the public of the opportunity to participate in critical land use decisions that may affect drinking water, farmland and green spaces in their communities."


Issued by the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, MZOs are used to directly zone land for particular purposes, without public notice or consultation. There is no opportunity for concerned citizens to appeal such orders.

The provincial government has issued dozens of MZOs, many impacting prime farmland and natural areas.

According to King resident Susan Lloyd Swail, the "rampant use of MZOs since 2018 is troubling as it shows a disregard for the rights of people to participate in government decision making. Our land use planning system relies on public participation and people want to have a say in shaping their communities.

"Many MZOs were issued on sensitive lands. If the normal public process were followed studies could have been conducted to minimize the impacts of those developments on the natural environment. With the current climate emergency escalating we need government to do more to reduce the loss of forests, wetlands, rather than fuel the crisis by bypassing environmental regulations.

"If the government thought fast-tracking developments would reduce the cost of housing, it hasn't."

Environmental coalition asks minister to protect property

A property of "extraordinary historical significance" on the east shores of the Holland River in East Gwillimbury is directly in the path of the proposed Bradford Bypass highway, and would essentially be destroyed by its construction, an environmental group says.

Recognizing the rarity of the site and the destruction that would result. the Simcoe County Greenbelt Coalition (SCGC) has formally requested Lisa MacLeod, Minister of Culture, to use her authority under the Ontario Heritage Act to protect the site of the Lower Landing.

"Former ministry staff have described the Lower Landing as being more significant than 95 per cent of the historic and archaeological sites in Canada," said Bill Foster, founder, Forbid Roads Over Green Spaces (FROGS). "We are sacrificing an irreplaceable historical site to build an elevated highway similar to the Gardiner Expressway. There's no way to save this site if the highway goes through. It will be lost forever."

The Lower Landing site on the east shore of the East Branch of the Holland River is identified as part of the route of the province's proposed Bradford Bypass, a 16.2-kilometre long freeway connecting Highway 400 and Highway 404. However, the entire eastern shore of the area is recognized for its cultural heritage significance to Indigenous peoples and for its association with the Euro-Canadian colonial exploration and settling of what became Upper Canada via the historical site of the Lower Landing. SCGC is looking to the

minister to ensure the long term protection of the shoreline.

Margaret Prophet, executive director of SCGC, believes that provincial priorities are not aligned with the needs of Ontarians.

"We know that the site meets the Ontario heritage provincial criteria, but the question is whether this government values anything more than highways and sprawl. We know that the environmental studies are out of date, impacts to Lake Simcoe and climate haven't been studied and that the traffic congestion won't be solved long term. That the province is willing to invest hundreds of millions of taxpayer dollars into an outdated highway while hospitals, schools and long term care homes go underfunded while we're in a pandemic and climate emergency is baffling.

"As we've said before, this isn't just a typically destructive highway project. They are bringing the adverse impacts of a freeway to significant ecological and historical areas. Preserving and protecting these areas while truly solving traffic problems in a way that makes the affected communities healthier is our goal, not paying back developer buddies."

Although this is a seldom used provision of the Ontario Heritage Act to designate the site as a Property of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest of Provincial Significance, the significance of the site is equally rare.

To date, SCGC has not received any correspondence from Minister MacLeod or her office about the request and next steps.

"The province is pushing this highway through without proper study so site," added Foster.

For millennia, Indigenous peoples used this area of the Holland River as a junction to get to and from other places. Arriving here from trails from Lake Ontario, including the river route from the terminus of the Toronto Carrying Place. The Lower Landing, so named as being downstream from other points on the river, was later used by Jesuit missionaries Fathers Jean de Brébeuf and Joseph Chaumonot, and notable French explorer René-Robert Cavelier, Sieur de La Salle. For over 150 years the

time is of the essence to conserve this fur trade, including coureurs de bois, voyageurs, and the North West Company, used this route to the upper Great Lakes and beyond.

The first definitive record of the Lower Landing's use is that by Lieutenant Governor John Graves Simcoe and his party on Oct. 11, 1793 on their return from Georgian Bay while seeking a northern military route.

In April 1825, renowned explorer Sir John Franklin leading the Mackenzie River Expedition is recorded as arranging passage across Lake Simcoe from the Lower Landing.

You may be entitled to Money in a Class Action Settlement

You are entitled to make a claim for damages if all of the items on the following list apply to you:

- You were placed alone in a designated room or area at any one of more of the following Youth Justice Facilities: Bluewater Youth Centre; Brookside Youth Centre; Cecil Facer Youth Centre; Donald Doucet Youth Centre; Invictus Youth Centre; Justice Ronald Lester Youth Centre; Roy McMurtry Youth Centre; Sprucedale Youth Centre; Toronto Youth Assessment Centre;
- 2. Your placement alone in the designated room or area lasted at least 6 consecutive hours;
- 3. You were not released at the earliest possible time;
- 4. Your placement alone in the designated room or area took place when you were 17 years old or younger; and
- Your placement alone in the designated room or area took place sometime between April 1, 2004 and December 17, 2018.

You could be entitled to between \$1,000 and \$40,000 per placement, depending on the length of time and the circumstances surrounding your placement.

Please note that the following placement or placements alone in a designated room or area do not count towards the class definition and do not make you a Class Member:

- 1. Segregation by reason of a lock-down at a Youth Justice Facility; and
- 2. The routine locking in your room overnight at a Youth Justice Facility.

The Ontario Superior Court of Justice will decide whether to approve the settlement on October 14, 2021. It will be heard on Zoom. The link for the hearing will be posted on www.youthsegregationclassaction.ca when available. You may file an objection or a statement in support of the settlement.

Councillors table motions to reduce phosphorous runoff

The Town of Bradford West Gwillimbury Council unanimously passed Councillor Jonathan Scott's motion to reduce phosphorous pollution in the Holland River and Lake Simcoe. It calls on York Region to expedite planning and construction of the proposed Holland Marsh Phosphorous Recycling Facility.

The motion also called on the provincial government to help fund the project.

"I'm thrilled our council showed our

commitment to environmental sustainability by passing this motion unanimously," said Councillor Scott. "This facility is vital to protecting the health of our watershed, and improving the Lake's habitat, which is critical to sustaining our tourism and recreational industries, as well as reaching our commitments under the Lake Simcoe Protection Plan."

An identical copy of the motion will be debated on Sept. 17 in Georgina, sponsored by Councillor Dave Neeson.

"On behalf of the Holland Marsh Growers' Association, we wish to express our strong support for Council-

the proposed Holland Marsh Polder Phosphorous Recycling Facility. Our members have done their part for many years to reduce phosphorous runoff from agricultural activities, and we were one of the first groups to call for this facility. This facility is a vital project to protect the Holland River sub-watershed and the Lake Simcoe watershed. It will reduce phosphorous runoff by an estimated 2.5 tonnes per year, equating to reducing nearly 85% of the phosphorous runoff per year from the Holland Marsh. Reducing phosphorous loads in the River and Lake is critical to the overall health of our watershed. As such, our association strongly supports this motion and echoes the call for all levels of government to work together to fund, design and build this important facility," said Jody Mott, executive director, Holland Marsh Growers' Asso-

"Building this phosphorus recycling plant has got to be the easiest way ... to make good on those promises to protect the lake while actually taking a bite out of the lake's phosphorus loads ... There have been many promises waiting to be fulfilled for Lake Simcoe ... The promised plant would remove 90% of the (phosphorous) ... This is the largest diversion of phosphorus ever proposed for Lake Simcoe; we have to do it. The Lake Simcoe Protection Plan's phosphorus reduction target is 44 tonnes of phosphorus going into the lake every year. The latest 10-year average (2007-2017) is approximately 90 tonnes (per) year. In 2017 the load was 131 tonnes per year. This will not be the only solution for phosphorus reduction, but it would be very helpful," added Clare Malcolmson, executive director, Rescue Lake Simcoe Coalition.

"We need this Holland Marsh pollution reduction project to proceed," said Jack Gibbons, chair of Lake Simcoe Watch.

"I want to applaud Councillor Jonathan Scott and Councillor Dave Neeson for bringing forward a motion calling on all levels of government to work collaboratively to design, fund and build the much-needed Holland Marsh Phosphorous Recycling Facility. Reducing phosphorous levels in the Holland River and Lake Simcoe is a vital project to protecting this important watershed.

lor Jonathan Scott's motion related to the proposed Holland Marsh Polder Phosphorous Recycling Facility. Our members have done their part for many years to reduce phosphorous runoff from agricultural activities, and we were one of the first groups to call for I'm proud to see my friend Jonathan Scott leading the way in his region to promote sustainability and environmental protection measures like this one," stressed Glen Murray, former Ontario Minister of the Environment and Climate Change.

Lake Simcoe Watch has come out against York's process. According to Gibbons, it appears the Region is holding the vital Holland Marsh pollution reduction project "hostage" as it tries to get its "big pipe" sewage project approved by the province. The two projects are at loggerheads, with one reducing phosphorous pollution reaching Lake Simcoe and the other increasing it

He added it also means the region is essentially snubbing funding provided by the federal government for pollution reduction.

In November 2020, the federal Minister of Infrastructure, Catherine McKenna, announced that the Government of Canada will invest \$16 million in the Holland Marsh pollution reduction facility.

From the moment York Region publicly initiated the UYSS EA in 2009, it has faithfully followed the required process laid out in the Environmental Assessment Act. The Region proposed infrastructure almost 30 years ago to service growth forecast for the area to be serviced by the UYSS EA in York Region's first Official Plan in 1994, an Official Plan that was also approved by the Province of Ontario. This growth has also been forecast in provincial policy through the Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe and incorporated into the Official Plans of our local municipalities.

York Region staff pointed out that the Region originally focused on a sewage solution in the UYSS EA to be connected to Lake Ontario. After being directed by the Minister of the Environment, they considered innovative and novel wastewater treatment solutions such as wastewater purification systems and water recycling facilities located within York Region.

"We diligently followed the publicly transparent and comprehensive regulatory environmental evaluation and assessment process to review reasonable servicing alternatives."

This determined the proposed innovative Water Reclamation Centre solution in the northern end of the Region was superior to a sewage solution connected to Lake Ontario," staff said.

The proposed Water Reclamation Centre, which would employ advanced membrane and reverse osmosis treatment technology, is a world-class facility that would be a first in Canada, replacing 1960s-era sewage lagoons and demonstrating a strong commitment to environmental sustainability. If the project's EA decision were based on the scientific and technical merits of the proposed facility, including its net phosphorus reduction to Lake Simcoe, it should have been approved long ago.

Nearly \$100 million has been spent on the UYSS EA project to date, including land acquisition and design advancement. This includes more than \$25 million on the Environmental Assessment alone – including a year-long pilot treatment facility that successfully demonstrated the efficacy of the advanced treatment technology in a Canadian climate. This is the most expensive EA in York Region's history, reflecting the significant level of commitment, technical and environmental work and consultation undertaken.

The findings of the EA remain as valid today as the day the EA was submitted for approval. The advanced

membrane microfiltration and reverse osmosis treatment technologies proposed for the treating wastewater at the Water Reclamation Centre are the same technologies that remain accepted and widely used throughout the world for treating drinking water, resulting in a superior level of treatment. No other plant on Lake Simcoe is using or proposing to use the level of treatment proposed in the UYSS EA. Contrary to your message, the state of the art treatment facility has never been referred to as a "Big Pipe" nor has it ever proposed "dumping sewage" into Lake Simcoe.

"The Region has always been motivated to provide the best environmental solutions for the Lake Simcoe Watershed. In 2018, four years after submitting the UYSS EA, the Region was made aware of a phosphorus removal opportunity in the Holland Marsh. The Region and the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority (LSRCA) submitted an expression of interest to the Federal Government for a potential treatment facility on the Holland River designed to remove phosphorus generated in the Holland Marsh," according

The principle of the submission was it would potentially serve as an alternative to the stormwater retrofits proposed in the UYSS EA, achieve a higher level of phosphorus removal and leverage DMAF and UYSS project funding to build the facility. With federal funding of \$16 million, the resulting treatment facility would cost approximately the same as the proposed stormwater retrofits for the UYSS project (\$24 million) but would remove up to 5,000 kilograms per year of phosphorus compared to a projected 500 kilograms per year. Using Federal funding provides a significant benefit to Lake Simcoe, the Region and the UYSS project.

Without the UYSS project, the Region does not have an approved funding source to advance its portion of the project. The Holland Marsh is not under York Region's jurisdiction and the Region does not have a means to justify the use of public funds for this expenditure.

"To be clear, the Region is not holding the Holland Marsh Project 'hostage' but only identified that it had a viable funding source to contribute to the effort through the UYSS EA. Since the start of the DMAF application process, the proposal for a Holland River phosphorus treatment facility has always been contingent on funding from the UYSS project."

During the spring of 2020, the Fed-

eral Government contacted the Region and requested submission of a full application for the Holland Marsh treatment facility in conjunction with a further funding round as part of the broader COVID-19 response and potential economic stimulus. The Region and LSRCA submitted a full application with the stipulation the Region could not fund its portion of the project without approval of the UYSS EA and the approved change from stormwater retrofits to the Holland Marsh treatment facility as part of the proposed phosphorus off-set program. The Federal Government informed York Region and subsequently publicly announced in November 2020 the DMAF submission was approved in principle. Further discussions would need to ensue on the balance of the funding.

"The Regional Municipality of York is extremely confident the preferred solution recommended in the UYSS EA is the superior alternative to service this area and will provide a lasting benefit to Lake Simcoe and the Lake Simcoe watershed."

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

The Canadian Speech and Debate Academy will finally be launching their classes virtually since the business was founded a year ago.

King City native and 2016 World Debating and Public Speaking Champion Natalie Ganzhorn co-founded the business with British Columbia's Top Speak in 2016, Jay McCauley.

McCauley and Ganzhorn have known each other since meeting through public speaking. Having been friends for eight years since the Junior National Championships, McCauley is a senior coach and Ganzhorn is the head coach at the academy.

While pursuing a competitive speaking career, the 23-year-old has also been a well-known actress, most notably for her role in Scary Stories To Tell In the Dark, produced by Guillermo Del Tor-

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Artistic outreach coordinator will help centre address diversity, inclusion

Racism is something Glenn Marais says he has lived with his whole life.

The musician, artist and educator who grew up in Aurora, says although he has "a lot of affection" for his hometown, he also has a very "clear perspective" on what he went through – and it is this perspective he brings to the Aurora Cultural Centre in Marias' new appointment as the organization's Education Outreach Coordinator.

The Aurora Cultural Centre announced Marais' appointment to the role, stating the creation of the position is part of the Centre's plan to "address diversity and inclusion in the workplace and the community."

"Selected members of the (Centre's) team worked together over this past spring with a newly-formed Diversity & Inclusion Collaborative Working Group," said the Centre. "Comprised of community-based social activists and artists who identify in under-represented communities, this volunteer group provides valuable feedback and guidance as we move forward with intention and action to create increased artistic opportunities for our entire community.

"This role will expand the Centre's commitment to grow and learn how to serve all communities. We act intentionally to create opportunities for artists from vulnerable or marginalized groups who have faced systemic barriers that have limited their ability to participate in the arts. The Centre looks forward to working with Glenn on this dynamic and exciting new direction."

The Juno-nominated performing artist, in turn, is also looking forward to helping the Centre execute this vision.

A long-time proponent of equity and inclusion, principles which are found not only in his own artistic output but in programs he brings into local schools, Marais says the drive to increase the Centre's artistic roster to ensure the LGBTQ2S+ community, BIPOC (Black, Indigenous and other People of Colour) persons and persons with disabilities are represented was of great interest to him.

"I felt a strong connection to what this was trying to achieve, having lived it," he says. "This is an idea that I not only embrace but my work in the school system with music and the arts, even with my band and music to a degree, is based on social justice work in terms of Black History, Anti-Racism, LGBTQ2+, I have supported York Pride for years and have always advocated for the equitable treatment based on people's gender and also people's identity, recognizing and supporting that.

"That thread has always wound its way through the work that I do, so I think I can take this position and I am looking to expand it in a way of really being creative with it and finding exciting, innovative projects with the Centre, also focusing on education because I think there is a lot of learning to be done, particularly in York Region and not just Aurora. Globally, we have made a lot of strides in equity across all these sectors, but we have seen some things happen in the last year that have shown us that racism is still very strong. It might be below the surface a little bit, but it doesn't take much to bring it to the service."

But, in this role, Marais says he would rather not focus on "issues of historical contention"; rather he would like to look at "where we're moving forward to."



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"I want to build (the Centre) a really strong and diverse roster," he says. "I have already started reaching out to artists, people who work in important sectors in the community, that work in anti-racism, that work in York Pride to have a strong contact list of different artists. Alongside of that ... I really want to send a message about being open to learning and open to engaging in positive discourse, to learn. We're in this state right now with all this news around Indigenous people, where Canadians need to learn and to ask how we can help and how we can be good allies. The concept of this is sometimes foreign to certain demographics - 'I'm Canadian, I'm not racist' - and I want to remove walls by being open and trying to engage people in good, creative conversations. I am open to talking about anything as long as it has a positive direction.

"We're open for ideas. If someone has an idea for persons with disabilities, how can we make things more accessible? How can we use the arts and music to educate the public, for these people to have access, and for people to be represented in a way that is respectful of them? If we can come in with solutions and ideas, we need to stop and ask questions and listen – and that is the philosophy I hope people will embrace around Culture."

KCSS vaccine clinic Sept. 21

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
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Vaccines still recommended for those who had COVID

Vaccines are still the preferred route, to reach targets and lessen the impacts of COVID-19.

York Region health officials noted that if a person has contracted COVID, it is still recommended to receive both doses of the COVID-19 vaccine.

A recovered individual would have some antibodies against COVID-19, but this can vary from person to person, and they may not be able to protect against reinfection.

York staff said there is no readily available test that can confirm a protective level of antibodies. Many studies have shown that people who have had a mild or asymptomatic COVID-19 infection often form very low levels of antibodies.

The COVID-19 vaccines are clinically proven to stimulate a strong immune response that protects against COVID-19, including the currently circulating Delta variant.

"The vaccine is the best way to strengthen your immune system and achieve the best protection against COVID-19."

Many myths and "conspiracy theories" surround the make-up of current vaccines.

One is that it contains graphene oxide, a toxic substance.

According to Dr. Ariyana Love in her Aug. 9 post, a former Pfizer employee and current analyst for pharmaceutical industries, came forward with "indisputable documentation proving that graphene oxide nanoparticles is the key ingredient in Biotech's COVID-19 serums. This means that an unapproved industrial poison is being dishonestly marketed as 'vaccines' and injected ..."


However, York staff said there is no "reputable evidence" that shows COVID-19 vaccines contain graphene oxide. The complete list of ingredients for all approved vaccines can be found on Health Canada's website (e.g., Pfizer-BioNTech, Moderna). The ingredients of COVID-19 vaccines have also been confirmed by numerous independent sources; graphene oxide is not present in any currently approved COVID-19 vaccines.

Over 5.5 billion COVID-19 vaccine doses have been administered around the world.

In York Region, 84% of eligible residents have received at least one dose, and nearly 79% of eligible residents are fully vaccinated. However, COVID-19 continues to circulate in the community, primarily in unvaccinated individuals and those under 12 years of age who are ineligible to receive a vaccine.

"We encourage everyone born in 2009 or earlier who had not yet received a vaccine to visit york.ca/COVID19Vaccine and get vaccinated as soon as possible."

"I also hope that by reading this book, and hopefully future books in this series, all kids will have a better understanding of the people and the wider world around them."



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Canadian Team takes home top honours at BMO Cup

Tottenham native Erynn Ballard along with Tiffany Foster, Eric Lamaze and Amy Millar were the heart and soul as together, they led Canada to the BMO Nations' Cup at Spruce Meadows 'Masters.'

The show-jumping team took home a \$600,000 purse on Sept. 11 in Calgary, marking their third time in history.

Canada trumped Ireland, Mexico and the United States en-route to claiming top prize.

Due to COVID-19 travel restrictions, only these teams were permitted to compete however every nation was allowed to bring out a second team with

"We felt we could put together two competitive teams, so we jumped at the opportunity. It's hard to get invitations to jump in a Nations' Cup, even at the three-star level. We showed we do have depth as our second team was one fault away from being second," chef d'equipe of the Canadian Show Jumping Team Mark Laskin said in the press release.

"Nations' Cups are hard. It has to be your day, but it also has to not be the other teams' day. I was quite confident, but you just never know. So much has come together. When it works, there is no sweeter feeling. And it's the most fun to win at Spruce Meadows. It's home."

Canada 2, who finished just shy of the first team, consisted of Mario Deslauriers, local Calgary native Brian Morton, BC native Samantha Buirs-Darvill and the other local Calgary native Ben Asselin riding anchor.

Canada earned their victory with eight faults in two rounds of play. In second came the United States with 15 faults and Canada 2 team finished with 16 faults. Mexico finished with 32 faults for fourth spot and Ireland came in fifth with 44 faults.

Ballard, 40, exuded skill and confi-Kattenheye, an 11-year-old Belgian home.

Warmblood gelding (Diabeau x Canadian River) owned by Lindemann Barnett Sporthorses, Ballard overcame a dramatic moment at the open water in the opening round to deliver for her country. Ballard was also a member of the Canadian Team riding Robin Van Roosendael when Canada won its first BMO Nations' Cup title in 2006.

Last to go for Canada, Lamaze, 53, of Wellington, FL, delivered a textbook clear performance with his 2016 Rio Olympic bronze medal partner Fine Lady 5, an 18-year-old Hanoverian mare (Forsyth x Drosselklang II) owned by Artisan Farms LLC and Torrey Pines Stable. That left the Canada 1 team with only one time fault to count in the opening round. With seven faults added in the second round by Foster and Millar, Canada's score of eight faults had already secured the win, giving Lamaze no reason to return.

"How fitting that she was able to put in a good performance in her final gallop around this fine arena," said Lamaze, who has indicated that Fine Lady 5 will soon be retired from international competition. "The girls did a great job today; they all rode wonderful and allowed me to not have to jump my 18-year-old mare in the second round. It was a little emotional for me leaving the ring today; there are a lot of memories of a lot of great wins with her here."

Having claimed victory in the richest Nations' Cup team event held in North America in 2006 and 2014, Canada can now add a third win in the event that's been held since 1977 to its record.

"It's a simple formula; you get good riders, good horses, and good people," smiled Mark Laskin, chef d'equipe of the Canadian Show Jumping Team. "Nations' Cups are hard. 

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

How to prepare your family for fire emergencies

(NC) Fire can spread rapidly through your home, and the National Fire Protection Association predicts you may only have as little as one or two minutes to escape safely once smoke alarms sound.

"We encourage everyone to evaluate their level of preparedness against potential dangers," says Ashley Gocken of First Alert, a leading fire safety brand. "It's imperative that people develop and practice a fire escape plan and install, maintain and regularly test smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. These are life-saving practices that can make a real difference."

To ensure you and your family are prepared and protected, follow these steps:

CHECK YOUR ALARMS.

Early detection is critical to preventing tragedies. Install smoke and carbon monoxide alarms in every bedroom and on every level of your house, including the basement. Test them regularly and change the batteries every six months. To eliminate battery replacements for a decade, upgrade to 10-year battery alarms.

MAP YOUR HOME.

Involve everyone in your household when developing escape routes. Walk through your home and inspect all possible exits. Identify two ways out of each room, including windows and doors. Make sure everyone in the home understands the plan.

PRACTICE YOUR PLAN.

Conduct fire drills at least twice a year during the day and night, making it as realistic as possible. Allow children to master the fire escape routes beforehand. The objective is to practice, not to frighten, so telling children there will be a drill before they go to bed can be as effective as a surprise drill.

HAVE A MEETING LOCATION OUTSIDE.

Choose a designated outside meeting place a safe distance from your home. Once you're out, stay out. Under no circumstances should you ever go back into a burning building. If someone is missing, inform the fire department dispatcher when you call. Firefighters have the skills and equipment to perform rescues.

Buyers Push for Aurora Homes

he year-to-date push to invest in Aurora real estate before September rose by 59 percent for Buyers taking action compared to 2020.

Of the 1053 homes sold so far in 2021, many homes sold in 14 days for about 105 percent of the Sellers asking price. While in the month of August, home sales across Aurora were a little quieter than in July, with only 107 homes sold in this month.
