Officials tour vaccine clinic

Stephen Lecce, MPP for King-Vaughan, joined Ontario's Chief Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Kieran Moore, York Region Chief Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Pakes, MPP Logan Kanapathi, and MPP Billy Pang at the Aaniin Community Centre & Library to tour the vaccine clinic set up for all eligible Ontarians ages 5 and up. "We are working with Ontario's Chief Medical Officer of Health to protect schools by increasing vaccination rates of staff and students, on a voluntary basis," said Lecce. "Students need to learn in the classroom. That is why we are setting up school-based vaccine clinics that require parental consent, as well as improving ventilation, providing N95 masks for staff, and distributing millions of rapid tests to schools – to reduce risk and protect in-class learning for students." Conservative MPs anxious to move forward

Conservatives across Canada are regrouping under interim leader Candice Bergen, following the departure of O'Toole as party leader.

The Conservative caucus voted 73-45 to oust O'Toole last week, who then resigned. Conservative MPs named Bergen the interim leader late last Wednesday evening.

"I pledge my support and unwavering loyalty to our next leader and I urge everyone in our party to come together and do the same," O'Toole said.

She wasted little time in setting the Conservative Parliamentary Leadership Team. She named House Leader: John Brassard (Barrie-Innisfil), Deputy House Leader and Co-Chair of Question Period Planning: Tom Kmiec (Calgary Shepard), Chief Opposition Whip: Blaine Calkins (Red Deer-Lacombe) and Deputy Whip and CoChair of Question Period planning: Lianne Rood (Lambton-Kent-Middlesex).

Bergen has been the MP for the Manitoba riding of Portage-Lisgar since 2008. She was previously the Conservatives' deputy leader and has been among the party's most prominent voices in the House of Commons, where she frequently squares off against Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and senior ministers during question period.

King-Vaughan MPP Anna Roberts admitted it was a "sad day" when the party said good-bye to O'Toole. She felt for him and his family. Roberts admitted it's not easy being party leader and "he did his best."

York-Simcoe MP Scot Davidson said with so many important issues gripping our country, it is "paramount that Canada's Conservatives are united and prepared for the next general election, while providing strong, effective, and principled opposition in Parliament."



REMINDERS

King Township residents are being asked to stay off both stormwater ponds and other ponds on public property for a variety of safety reasons.

There are several reasons why skating on stormwater ponds is dangerous.

- Stormwater ponds are designed to continuously collect stormwater from surrounding roads and neighbourhoods.
- No matter how deep into the winter or how thick the ice may appear, temperature changes and water flowing in/ out can cause major variations in ice thickness.
- Air pockets are also easily formed under the surface and contaminants like salt weaken the ice.

"I look forward to working with the new interim leader of the Conservative Party and continuing to stand up for the residents of York-Simcoe, who are looking to move on from this pandemic and get life back to normal.

"I would like to thank Erin O'Toole and his family for his service to our country as Leader of Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition, and I wish him all the best in the future."

Davidson said the caucus has spoken and party faithful remain optimistic in these challenging times. There are a lot of big issues facing this country, he pointed out, noting a change of leadership is the "best way forward."

He noted he worked with Bergen in the past, adding he's always building relationships in Ottawa.

Davidson himself has had a whirl-wind ride, being first elected in a bylaw election in February of 2019. He then participated in the 2019 federal election, and again in 2021. His support remained solid in both elections as he earned just under 25,000 votes each time.

Dufferin-Caledon MP Kyle Seeback noted O'Toole's departure was a question of leadership and the party needed a change. While the Conservatives have had three different leaders in the past six years, Seeback is not pessimistic.

In fact, he said the next leader will be someone who can not only pull things together, but tackle the challenges on behalf of constituents.

The Conservatives, he admitted, have to cement their policies on things like climate change and housing. Affordable housing an important issue facing all Canadians and this one issue needs to be addressed as soon as possible. The federal government, he said, has done

nothing on this issue, despite their election promises. In fact, the Liberal government "can't walk and chew gum at the same time," Seeback observed.

The Liberals, he predicts, will continue to polarize Canadians.

The Conservatives are a "big tent" party and it will take a "special leader" to reunite them.

The national council will work with the interim leader, who can't run to replace O'Toole full time. The council hasn't set a date for the next leadership race

Once the Leadership Election Organizing Committee (LEOC) is appointed, they will set the rules and procedure for the leadership selection process.

Retired teacher charged in sexual assaults

York Regional Police have charged a 73-year-old Toronto in connection with historical sexual offences committed against several children.

In June 2021, police began an investigation into a retired school teacher after officers received information regarding a sexual assault.

Through the investigation, officers located four victims who reported incidents from their Grade 4 class in 1977 to 1980 at a public school in Nobleton. Three female victims reported sexual offences and one male victim reported a physical assault.

On Jan. 27, the accused was arrested and has been charged. The accused was a teacher with the York Region District School Board full time for many years and continued working as a supply teacher after his retirement up until 2020.

Investigators believe there may be more victims. Anyone with information is urged to come forward.

A sexual assault includes any non-consensual contact of a sexual nature. York Regional Police would like to encourage anyone who feels they may have been a victim of a sexual assault to come forward and report the incident to police. There is no statute of limitations for sexual offences and offenders can be prosecuted well after the date of the offence. If you are the survivor of sexual assault, you can

- report the incident online if:
 You are not in immediate danger.
 - You are not in immediate danger.The person who assaulted you is not present.
- There is no evidence present that may be collected by police (blood, semen, saliva, etc.). Evidence can be collected for up to 12 days after the sexual assault

has occurred.

• You have access to a private email address, to which the suspect does not.

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

Money not well spent on highways

The Bradford Bypass and Highway 413 are being sold to Ontarians as time-savers, promising to shave 30 minutes off of commuters' trips.

Sounds great. But this doesn't add up. Transportation Minister Caroline Mulroney admitted in a Globe and Mail article that the 30-minute figure comes with a catch. Drivers would save 30 minutes only if they traveled the full length of the highway, which few commuters would actually do. In reality, the average driver would save closer to 10-15 minutes.

Okay 10-15 minutes still isn't bad. But this still doesn't add up because of something called induced demand. This means when something new is built, more people will eventually start to use it (think "if you build it, they will come" from Field of Dreams). So in a few years, and \$6 billion in taxpayer money later, drivers will be right back where they started. Then what? More highways? More sprawl? More money spent to solve the problem? Communities will suffer too - sitting in traffic isn't good for growth or the economy.

These types of projects don't solve the problems they claim to solve and we know it. This is stated in many reports such as Ontario's Greater Golden Horseshoe Growth Plan, and why the plan was developed in the first place: to avoid the mistakes of the past. The report states that to accommodate the 14.8 million people and 7 million jobs coming in the next 25 years, "complete communities" will be required. Complete communities are like a one-stopshop. They are designed with efficiency in mind. Amenities are placed close together to reduce unnecessary car trips.

Then there are the environmental costs, which would be irreversible.

Call on government to deal with climate change!

Let's face it - hearing about climate change can be overwhelming. We're told that so many of the things we rely on – the way we heat and cool our homes, the cars we drive, and the products we buy – are making climate change worse. But as overwhelming as it can be, there is still reason for hope.

Most people are concerned about climate change, but either aren't sure what to do about it, don't like thinking about it, or want to believe that the government will do what's necessary to prevent it from happening. 1) Contact your MP. Contact your local MP (you can find their contact information at https://www.ourcommons. ca/Members/en/search), and tell them that:

 You're a constituent in their riding. • Climate change is an important issue to you.

You want the government to take real action to stop climate change, including:

· Developing a concrete plan for ending fossil fuel production, and supporting a just transition to a green energy grid within this decade.

A just transition is an approach that creates a fair and equitable transition from Canada's current reliance on fossil fuels to a society that is driven by green energy, which ensures that individuals and communities affected by the transition are taken care of (for example, by retraining oil refinery workers to work on solar and wind farms).

2) Sign up for the Environmental Defence e-newsletter. You can sign up by going to https://environmentaldefence.

Environmental Defence is a leading Canadian environmental advocacy organization that works with government, industry and individuals to defend clean water, a safe climate and healthy communities. Their e-newsletter includes opportunities for people to show their support on environmental issues that they care about, and it presents these opportunities in a professional, rational, easy-to-understand

While those two actions alone won't stop climate change, they will encourage our government to take the actions that are necessary to stop it and will help keep you informed of other important, straightforward ways that you can take action as the need arises. If enough of us take these two small steps, our governments will have no choice but to hear us and to act.

Some totals up in the last general election

In his report on the 44th General Election tabled in the House of Commons, the Chief Electoral Officer of Canada, Stéphane Perrault, provides an overview of the events that took place during the election period. Later this year the Chief Electoral Officer will provide Parliament with a report on recommended changes to the Canada Elections Act.

"I would like to recognize and thank the more than 195,000 election workers, returning officers, field liaison officers and other stakeholders who worked in particularly difficult circumstances to ensure that their fellow Canadians could safely exercise their democratic rights to vote and run for office in the 44th general election," said Perrault.

Despite the challenges of a pandemic election, 2,010 candidates appeared on ballots in the 44th general election.

17.2 million Canadians, or 62.5 per cent of registered electors, cast a ballot in the 44th general election. Of those, more than 16 million chose to vote in person more than 5.8 million at advance polls and 10.2 million on election day.

The more than 5.8 million electors who voted over the four days of advance polls represent an increase of approximately 21 per cent from the nearly 4.9 million Canadians who voted in advance polls during the previous general election.

The agency received more than 700,000 special ballots by mail, an increase from the roughly 55,000 received in the 43rd general election in October 2019.

Elections Canada mailed more than 27 million Voter Information Cards to individuals whose names appeared on the preliminary lists of electors.

Compared with the 43rd general election, there were 3 per cent fewer advance polling places and 7 per cent fewer election day polling places.

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

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Preliminary work starts on Highway 413 corridor

Preliminary pre-planning has begun on the somewhat controversial Highway 413 transportation corridor.

King councillors received an update from Ministry of Transportation staff recently.

While there's grassroots opposition to the highway, studies will look at all aspects of the project to determine its impact.

Project manager Hosseini Hosseini noted the federal environment minister of climate change designated the 413 under the federal IA Act. This planning and decision-making tool will assess the positive and negative environmental, economic, health and social effects of the corridor.

He noted the corridor will include some 11 municipal interchanges, and connections with Highways 403, 427, 410 and 401/407.

It's very early in the pre-planning phase and much of it is a conformity exercise, summarizing issues and stakeholder submissions.

Mara Bullock, consultant with WSP, noted some key issues include the fact it doesn't conform to the Greenbelt Plan. There will be negative impacts on flora and fauna, along with "environmental costs." TRCA and CVC are active partners in the project's review.

Some of the complaints arise from a lack of public consultation, and a charge the project only benefits developers. There will be health and socio-economic impacts, she said.

At a recent York public information meeting, the issue of connectivity in Vaughan and the impact on local roads was discussed. As well, the new

road could impact the historic Carrying Place Trail which runs through King.

She said WSP will take all the issues and document them in the project de-

Hosseini said the ministry will still accept submissions on the concept.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer noted some 10 municipalities - representing 60% of the GTA population – have voiced their opposition to the project.

Hosseini did admit the agency feels there will be an adverse impact on three federally listed species at risk.

Currently, the process involves submission of the initial project description, followed by conformity and engagement on issues. It's estimated it will take five years before a concrete decision is made.

The presentation did show adverse affects on Greenbelt and agricultural

There will likely be impacts on human health from increased pollution caused by the traffic, and potential impacts on drinking water and wells.

There is a potential the projects will result in the loss of heritage resources and cultural land spaces. MTO noted there has been a deficiency in engagement with the Indigenous community.

While the 413 is intended to be a multi-use transportation corridor. there are questions whether it's the best option.

An Air Quality Impact Assessment. which is part of the Provincial EA, predicts the cumulative concentration of various contaminants and GHGs. A human health impact scoping report will be prepared to assess human health im-

New Catholic elementary school coming to York

The Ontario government is investing \$11.4 million to build a new Queensville Catholic Elementary School to help working families in East Gwillimbury.

This investment in York Catholic District School Board, announced by Caroline Mulroney, MPP for York -Simcoe, will support the creation of 409 student spaces as part of the Ford Government's commitment to building modern, accessible, and technologically connected schools for Ontario youth.

The project is part of a province-wide investment of more than \$600 million to support new school and childcare spaces that were recently announced by Stephen Lecce, Minister of Education. The overall investment will support 78 school and childcare related projects. As part of this investment, the province dedicated more than \$565 million to create more than 19,700 new student spaces and 1,500 childcare spaces at schools across the province.

"In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, we have made safer schools a priority, which is why we continue to invest in modern and accessible learning spaces with improved ventilation," said Minister Lecce. "This investment is part of our multi-year plan to build, expand, and update schools and childcare spaces across our province. It will leave a legacy that benefits working families for years to come."

The investment is part of the Ontario government's commitment to provide \$14 billion to support school construction over 10 years. There are currently more than 300 childcare and education building-related projects in development across Ontario with more than 100 actively under construction.

"The new Queensville Catholic Elementary School is great news for our community," said Mulroney. "This investment will provide choice and flexibility for families and new opportunities for the children of East Gwillimbury."



"This is an exciting day for the York Catholic District School Board," said Elizabeth Crowe, chair of the Board of Trustees. "This investment will enable us to take an important step forward in making our dream for publicly-funded Catholic education in Queensville a reality."

Ontario's investment in new and updated schools will create the foundation for a modern learning environment for hundreds of students across the prov-

Highlights of the project include:

- 409 elementary student spaces. • 49 new licensed childcare spaces.

• 3 new childcare rooms.

Since 2018, the Ontario government has invested over \$1.5 billion in capital projects in education, including 76 new schools, 75 additions and renovations to existing facilities and 4.908 new licensed childcare places.

For 2021-22, the province is also providing school boards with \$1.4 billion in funding to renew and maintain existing schools.

The governments of Canada and Ontario are providing \$656.5 million in funding for critical infrastructure projects to protect students and staff from COVID-19 in the province's schools through the COVID-19 Resilience stream of the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program.

The federal government provides 2.5 per cent of the total cost support for early learning and childcare operating expenses in Ontario, with Ontario families, the provincial and municipal governments providing the remainder.

Ontario has provided emergency childcare for the school-aged children of frontline workers, including public safety and health care workers, as well as those working with vulnerable populations, at no out-of-pocket cost. In 2021, at its peak, this program provided over 12,000 children with high-quality childcare each day across 717 sites province-wide.

Ontario is providing a 20 per cent enhancement of the Childcare Access and Relief from Expenses (CARE) tax credit for 2021. This will increase support from \$1,250 to \$1,500 per family, on average, providing about \$75 million in additional support for the 2021 childcare expenses of over 300,000 families.

Simone Miller, who stars in both "Detention Adventure" and "Run the Burbs," has released her second music single, title "Older."



Miller said she's interested both acting and music. She admitted she's still "getting started" and is already looking at future projects.





If you have a collection of houseplants now is a good time to do a thorough inspection.

- 1. All plants need a gentle dusting with a damp cloth to keep their pores
- 2. At this time check for any pests such as spider mites (red), mealy bugs and scale. Take appropriate action if you find any with a product such as Safer's Soap.
- 3. Aerate the soil gently, check to see if you need to top up the pot with fresh
- 4. If the plant appears to be root bound, check it out by putting your hand over the damp plant with the stem between your first and second fingers, gently tap the bottom and loosen the plant out of the pot, if the roots are wrapped tightly around the soil it's time to repot. You need to put the plant in a pot one size larger and use new

potting soil, tamp down the soil firmly, water lightly and top up the soil when

5. March will be a good time to start giving some nutrients back into the soil with a water soluble fertilizer for house plants, very diluted at first, this will wake the plants up from their winter slumber, as the days get longer and brighter.

Fr. Michael's sermon last Sunday used the Gospel story of the huge haul of fish from Luke 5: "But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus's knees, saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!"

"If, like Peter, you've ever had thoughts of inadequacy, then you're not alone and there's even a term for it, the Impostor Syndrome. Many people feel, despite their accomplishments, their diplomas, and their previous successes, that they are totally unqualified to do something, that they are impostors.

"Of course, the problem with all of our doubts and self-doubting is that we forget about God and we never think that God may have more confidence in us that we have in ourselves. Why would God call us as disciples if God didn't believe in us?" Which brings us to Luke 5:1-11.

"I've read this passage many times. The story of Jesus calling the fishermen and telling them from now on they will be catching people instead of fish. At first, when Jesus tells the fishermen to go out into deep water, Peter's response 'Master' seems politely respectful. Peter agrees to the odd request, even if he grumbles first: 'we have worked all night but have caught nothing.' After the amazing haul of fish, the grumbling

turns to wonder. Peter looks at himself and sees his own inadequacies, recognizing that he is a 'sinful man.'

"Peter judges himself unworthy to be in God's presence, and here he may remind us of people that we know who avoid church or faith because they don't think they're good enough for God.

"Jesus says "Do not be afraid," which are words that we often hear when heaven touches earth, but he never revokes the job offer because Peter thinks that he is unqualified. In fact, Jesus acts as if Peter has accepted the offer, for his next words, 'From now on you will be caching people' are spoken as if this is Day One of the new job. Peter is now a disciple.

"I think this story is helpful for those of us in our faith lives who think that we have some spiritual deficiency. If that is you, think about Jesus and Peter. Jesus sees the worth in Peter and calls him to this new life of attracting others to God.


"I would encourage you to think of how God knows you far, far better than you know yourself, that God loves you and believes in you, and that God has a use for you.

"So the good news for us today is that God's already signed us up, we're in the crew. We may say, 'But Jesus, we're not good enough for you, we're sinners,' and his answer is 'Yes, of course you are, come on let's go.'

"From now on you will be catching people.' A final thought – what's more attractive than quiet self confidence? What's more attractive than a confident church? Confidence that we are loved by a God who sees our value and potential. I submit to you that a church imbued with this quiet confidence, the opposite of the spiritual impostor syndrome, will be attractive to others, which is where evangelism starts."

It was a buyer's market in 2017-2019 where supply exceeded demand, and we are now seeing a very strong trend towards a seller's market once again. Properties that are priced right, well maintained, and are

located in good neighbourhoods, are selling at strong prices regardless of when the home is listed. Comparing December 2020 to 2021, the average home sale price grew by 17.7% and there were 28% more homes sold. These numbers should be encouraging to you! Additionally, it seems that this year will also be another big year. Home prices are expected to soar by another whopping 11% across the GTA. 

When Canada's housing bubble pops, what will happen next!

The price of Canadian homes has increased faster than those of any other member of the OECD. Rising interest rates now threaten to bring the market down.

According to a recent report, between January and August of last year investors were responsible for a quarter of house purchases in the province.

These speculative investments are, of course, driving up prices. They are also creating major problems for the economy as a whole because the rising cost of housing has increased the amount of private debt held by individuals. While interest rates have remained low this debt has been sustainable. The possibility of hikes now threatens to bring Canada's housing market crashing down.

The Bank of Canada is warning that a "frenzy of real estate investment," combined with impossibly high levels of household debt, "could destabilize the economy as rates start to rise." The central bank's deputy governor Paul Beaudry suggests that a reckoning is fast approaching because the Bank of Canada now plans to increase interest rates.

A key concern here is that financially stretched households have little breathing room to absorb any disruption to their income. A job loss could force many to drastically cut their spending to keep servicing their debt.

The cause of this instability is the commodification of housing, and unimpeded it will lead to further indebtedness on the part of private buyers and threaten millions with economic dislocation. It also drives up rents, forces precarious housing on many. It's clear that only a real challenge to the commodification of housing can make a meaningful difference in this situation. In the wake of the dislocations and hardships that were triggered by the pandemic, many politicians have paid lip service to the need for a "just recovery."

"With the housing supply issues facing the country having only gotten worse to start 2022, take any decline in sales early in the year with a grain of salt because the demand hasn't gone away, there just won't be much to buy until a little later in this spring, But when those listings eventually start to show up, the spring market this year will almost certainly be another headline grabber. 

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
