

The proposed Draft Plan of Subdivision, Official Plan Amendment and Zoning By-law Amendment applications were submitted by KLM Planning Partners Inc. on behalf of the owner, Prebrick Systems (Boynton) Inc. The applications concern a property located on the east side of Highway 27 and south of King Road in the Village of Nobleton. The subject property currently supports a sod farm with several agricultural buildings and an existing dwelling on 57.2 hectares. What Are The Proposed Changes

The Planning Applications were submitted together with supporting materials to amend the King "Our King" Official Plan, the Nobleton Urban Area Zoning By-Law 2016-71 and to propose the subdivision of land to facilitate a development consisting of 429 residential lots for the purposes of supporting single detached dwellings at a density of 12.3 units per hectare. The application also proposes several Employment blocks, a Future Development block, several stormwater, park, open space and environmental buffer blocks together with several new public roads. The Development proposes to obtain access from Highway 27 with connection to existing streets, including Crestview Road, Woodhill Avenue, and Hawthorne Valley Road. The Development site is located on the east side of Highway 27 and south of Ellis Avenue/Parkview Drive in the Village of Nobleton.

Is there a heartbeat in our community or a faltering pulse?

Generally, I agree with the editor's views but to imply King City retains a small-town atmosphere, I feel compelled to respond that it seems more like an unpardonable disaster.

The library inside is gorgeous and inviting as are the staff. I highly commend them. Always pleasant, they navigated me through COVID willingly searching for my requests.

When the library was planned residents gave input. I was told that comments were being recorded even though I suggested that this was not apparent. Most suggestions I heard appear to have been ignored especially those referencing landscaping.

As the new build was taking place, I watched confused and unbelieving as it seemed the HVAC was being located on the roof. I kept thinking it would be moved, screened or something would be done to alleviate the eyesore located above the silver King City Seniors Centre and King City Library signs. I still hoped before the grand opening something would be done.

It wasn't. The HVAC is reminiscent of a '60s strip mall where air conditioning was plopped on the roof of buildings not constructed to accommodate it.

Added eyesores are the garbage cans right outside the seniors' area. During the build when I questioned their location workers claimed the huge cans were concrete and impossible to move to the rear of the building. To add colour to their mismatched lids we have a charging station installed right by the seniors's front door, I doubt by architectural design.

After the library's grand opening, I suggested that we add a garbage bin for the refuse that was flying around from everyone's loot bags. This was done adjacent to the gigantic cans, however, my request for a bench for young mothers, children and seniors was ignored. Even more upsetting for taxpayers is the fact that the library's facade is breaking and flaking. The state of the grounds is disgraceful. Our rail fence and bermed cute country garden of the old library are a faint memory and some individuals have commented they wish they had it back.

Further, flowers in planters are dead along King Road and Keele Street and unsustainable flags are hanging in rags from ugly black poles we begged not to have.

In June when I went to vote provincially at the King City Arena I was disgusted and ashamed. To suggest a new community complex in King East will replace it does not excuse its shabby, filthy, deplorable appearance. Interest-

ingly, despite many inquiries during countless conversations casual and formal with suggestions from residents, no one can enlighten us as to what will be done with our arena, the former Seniors' Centre, the King City Lion's Club and barn, the core of our community. Is it an unsolvable mystery, or just a dark secret?

Our new trail west of Keele, off the King Road, is delightful but anyone walking towards it along our nice new sidewalk needs to mask up, first to prevent lung congestion from traffic fumes and second, to subdue the stench of sewage that will greet them before they even get close to the pumping station in advance of the trail.

If you drive in King City your route must be planned and timed, so you don't have to turn dangerously left from the post office or other businesses into bumper-to-bumper traffic. Soon this may not be an issue as when the gargantuan Walmart warehouse opens on Jane Street and the 413 is built it could be faster to walk if we don't expire from further fumes.


The quiet charm the editor muses about may exist in Schomberg, but our main street will never be closed to traffic. It's a thoroughfare. Our town is more sleepless than sleepy as few residents can escape the noise of Highway 400, King Road traffic, nor likely the double track rail lines scheduled to be built here blowing whistles at all hours.

I suggest little sense of community remains in King City; it's held together by Hogan's Inn, the Roost Cafe and Kid's Country Children's Boutique, where many of us meet.

True Mr. Editor, a lot is happening in our town, much of which is disappointing. If a community our size can't be maintained how can the needs of a multimillion-dollar recreation complex be met?

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Network needs support in response to growing incidents

The rising incidents of sexual assault are ringing the alarm bells.

Ogho Ikhalo, secretary, board of directors, appeared before King council recently, noting that an estimated one in three women will experience some form of sexual assault in their lifetime. Stats Can data has been showing a steady increase in numbers of incidents, and reports in 2021 were the highest since 1996.

The mayor vowed to help at the regional level.

public facilities. Barry Moir was a long-time King City resident who made significant contribu-







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Concern over students' performance in certain tests

International assessments are showing mixed results for Canadian students.

Despite scoring comparatively well internationally on the recent international PISA tests, results in all three disciplines - reading, math and science have declined across the country, substantially so in some provinces, finds a new study released by the Fraser Institute, an independent, non-partisan, Canadian public policy think-tank.

Conducted every three years, the **Programme for International Student** Assessment (PISA) is the most extensive and widely accepted measure of academic proficiency among lower secondary school students around the world.

"Policy-makers and educators shouldn't let Canada's relatively high international ranking on the PISA tests detract from the worrying fact that scores in every province in all three disciplines are on the decline," said Derek J. Allison, professor emeritus at the University of Western Ontario, a Fraser Institute senior fellow and author of What International Tests (PISA) Tell Us about Education in Canada.

The study finds that in the 2018 PISA assessment – the most recent for which results are available - Canada ranked comparatively high, outperforming all G7 countries in reading, and coming second among G7 countries (after Japan) in math and science.

But crucially, across all three subjects, results have declined. Over the 12 years from 2006 to 2018, Canada's reading score dropped 7 points while all other G7 countries made gains, by as much as 9 points in the UK and 8 points in Italy. In science, Canada dropped 17 points while the USA gained 14 over the same period. In math, Canada lost 15 points over these twelve years while four G7 countries, including the UK and USA, made an average gain of 10 points.

"We should always strive to do better when it comes to education, and the fact is that scores in every Canadian province are heading in the wrong direction," Allison said.

"The PISA tests are an opportunity for policymakers and educators to learn best practices from other more successful jurisdictions and correct course, if necessary, for the benefit of their students."

In Ontario, 15-year-old students continue to trail Quebec students in math in the latest 2018 PISA international test results, while nationwide as well as in Ontario, results are trending down.

Score declines have been less severe in Ontario and Quebec with the Western provinces experiencing the largest score declines. The substantially larger enrolments in Ontario and Quebec, which account for 61 percent of Canadian school enrolment, cushioned the effect of the more severe score declines in other provinces on the national picture.

"Ontario students generally performed well in the latest PISA tests.





Former KCSS students inducted into Case of Distinction

Since its inception in 2003, King City Secondary School Case of Distinction Induction Ceremony finally returned following a two-year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The ceremony, which took place at King City Secondary School Saturday morning, honoured four KCSS alumni, who have gone on to accomplish incredible feats in their professional careers.

President of the KCSS Alumni Association, John Peddle, began the ceremony welcoming all guests into the school's front foyer where all guests gathered.

This year's inductees, were David Wilson (absent), Shawn Burt, Kevin Hastings and Terry Hoover.

Peddle stepped in to introduce Wilson, before family members took the stage to introduce the other inductees.

"I have the pleasure of inducting David Wilson. David is going in under the category of athletics and skate coaching and choreography. I didn't know all of those years watching figure skating, that it was David who was the brains behind all of the performances that I was watching on TV all of those years," Peddle said.

"He fell in love with figure skating at an early age. He attended King City for a short while. He was training at the Toronto Cricket Skating and Curling Club downtown and re-located going to school to finish high school down there."

A Nobleton native, Wilson helped many figure skaters win medals at Olympic Games. In 2019, he was nominated into the Skate Canada Hall of Fame.

After Peddle, Shawn Burt was introduced to the stand by his wife Jennifer and children Aydan and McKenna.

Burt, who lost his mother after graduating post-secondary school to cancer, sought making a difference and wanted to use his love for sports as a catalyst, to helping cancer research. A graduate of philosophy at Dartmouth College in Hanover, N.H., Burt went on to work with Maple Leaf Sports & entertainment, before becoming the Chief Hockey Officer at The Princess Margaret Cancer Foundation. He used his love for hockey to spearhead Road Hockey to Conquer Cancer, winning two Guinness World Records and raised over \$25-million to-

wards cancer research.

He has gone on to work at McMaster University as Director of Athletics and Recreation. In his speech, he alluded to many things that helped him on his journey. The experience at KCSS, was one of them.

"Each and every one of these individuals (teachers) showed me a passion for life-long learning and a commitment to helping others, which I think is so profound. It has guided me through my Dartmouth career and into my professional career and beyond. I am eternally grateful for the many great lessons I learned from those role models. At that time, I didn't realize it, but you get a little bit older and little bit smarter and wiser. You realize it now. It means the world to me," Burt said in his speech.

Next up to speak was Kevin Hastings, who was inducted into the Athletics category as a Professional Hockey Official.

Hastings, who played in the OHA and in the OHL with the Barrie Colts, graduated from the University of Guelph with a diploma in Horticulture. He went on to play minor-pro hockey in the Central Hockey League, and then became an OHA official.

He officiated four Memorial Cups, two Memorial Cup Finals and 12 OHL Finals. In 2018, he was awarded the Ken Bodendistel Officiating Character Award, named after his great mentor. He has been an official in the AHL since 2003, winning other awards in the process. He currently mentor's other linesman today.

Emotional in his speech, Hastings reflected on his time at KCSS.

"We came here as young kids and we left as adults. Teachers weren't teachers, they were our friends. They helped us build things outside of school. I took a lot of that," Hastings said.

"I say to people wherever I've been around the world with hockey or with school, King City was a special spot. My age group, we had a special group of guys. We get together every year. Those friendships and bonds were built here at King City Secondary. I'm grateful for this award and I just want to thank everybody for helping me along the way."

Last but not least, Terry Hoover, the final inductee took the stand. Hoover, was inducted for Entrepreneurship, Maple Syrup Aficionado. After gradu-



ating from Guelph University in 1977 from the Agricultural programme, Hoover, became a president at the Ontario Maple Syrup Producers Association and also president of Waterloo Wellington local.

He went on to win an award in 2020, as Producer of the Year at the Elmira Maple Syrup Festival. He also made appearances in the past with chef Lynn Crawford on the Food Network multiple times.

In 2020, Hoover was taken by the Corporation of the County of Perth, to be a part of their "Signature experience." Here, he learned more on how to further enhance his business. "Hoover's Maple Experience" was born.

He continuously gives back to the community along with his wife Diane. He hosts residents from nursing homes and community groups and treats them to pancake and sausage meals.

Introduced by his best friend Ron Gillies, in his speech, Hoover had ev-

A SCHOOL for BOYS

At St. Andrew's College, we habitually and deliberately challenge stereotypes and believe that there are a myriad of ways in which boys can achieve the fullest expression of their most human selves. To best serve boys, educators must understand that boys' behaviour is often a reflection of the backdrop of societal perceptions of masculinity.

To that end, we are able to tap into a rich, longstanding culture in which boys are able to explore, in safety, the breadth of the human condition, and their unique place within it. In this school culture, artistry and creativity are not labelled as 'feminine;' but rather as human.

Eloquence, both written and spoken, is expected. Self-reflection and the quest for meaning is built into the fabric of the daily routine, whether through Chapel or our Advisory program.

But there is more to it than that. Boys carry a natural wariness for things that are not genuine, and become bored easily when the activity at hand does little to forward their own sense of meaning. To that end, our teachers create an authentic curriculum; help boys find purpose in life; train them to care for themselves and others; and endow them with a sense of personal commitment and integrity. These goals become more realizable in a culture that presupposes one can be much more than what can be offered by the limiting stereotypes of masculinity. «

ing, the female part of the flower. Many flowers have more than one of these minute leaflike growths and they are fused together. This fusion is called the pistil from pistillium the Latin name for pestle a small handheld kitchen tool for grinding. Carpel or pistil this growth holds the reproduction organs of the plant. Those being the style or stalk where pollen lands and the stigma on the outside of the style. This is where incoming pollen is held and checked out to see if it's the right pollen to fertilize the plant. If so it's then the flower's close by ovary holding the plants tiny eggs takes it in so as to fertilize these eggs. Perhaps the second most noticeable part of a flower after its petals is its male part called stamens, from the Latin staminis for thread. Each stamen on its thready but strong stem is topped by a featherlike growth called an anther from anthos Greek for flower that makes and holds the plant's own pollen which is then carried away by visiting insects such as bees in their search for the sweet sugar rich liquid called nectar that plants produce to attract them.

He just wanted someone to see him and throw him some crumbs. In the story, both men die, and Lazarus is carried by angels to be with Abraham, while the rich man ends up in Hades. The rich man calls out to Abraham to send Lazarus to him with something to quench his thirst. He was told no, and told that the chasm separating Lazarus from the rich man was fixed and no one can cross it.

"It's a grim story. The parable is about wealth and Jesus had much to say about wealth, and it wasn't that wealth in itself is bad, but wealth that steals our attention from our neighbours is. The pursuit of material comforts, or power blinds us to human need, human suffer-

"In life, that rich man didn't ever really SEE Lazarus the way Jesus calls us to. Jesus calls us to see each other and build relationships, to see in each other human beings worthy of dignity, love, and respect.

"We are called to a radical way of seeing. It is the kind of bold courageous, and sacrificial seeing that scares us to death - precisely because it asks so much of us.

"Even after death, the rich man refused to see Lazarus. Abraham told him that the chasm between them was too big to cross.

"What chasms have we built, that stop us from really seeing the people of this world who are in need, who are struggling, who need our help. I What will it take for us to see others the way Jesus has called us to see. To see the truth that hurts, to see that we have sometimes feasted when others have starved, to see that we have lived in ways that have harmed our planet, to see the plight of refugees and those subjected to racialized violence, to see our 2SLGBTQ+ siblings and their desire to be safe and included.

'The good news is that Jesus is always helping us cross over the chasm. It is his way of love, the way of sacrifice, the way of losing our lives in order to gain them.

"I pray that we will go from here and focus our eyes on those in our community who are vulnerable, in pain, and in need. I pray that we see them, hear them, know them and respond to them. I pray that we will be committed to not only making this a safe place for all people, but also a place where we're nourished and resourced to care for others and uphold their dignity and value. May we always be blessed to see as Jesus sees."

I am trying not to make this note sound like botany 101 yet give novice gardeners some help in understanding botanical terms they may come across in reading horticultural articles. So here I go. Angiosperm (from the Greek angeion + sperma) is a word that often appears in such articles and just translates to plant that produces flowers and seeds.

Looking inside a flower are several words that can baffle the reader - they certainly did me! In the centre of the flower is the carpel or carpels from the Greek karpos for fruit seed and cover-



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Easier payment options to access transit in GTA

ing it easier and more convenient to take transit across the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area (GTHA) by giving riders more ways to pay. Since August, customers have tapped on more than 100,000 times using credit cards on GO, MiWay, Brampton and Oakville Transit.

"Improving the PRESTO fare payment system by allowing riders to simply tap on with their credit cards is yet another example of how our government is bettering the transit experience, respecting taxpayers' money and helping people get to where they need to go," said Stan Cho, Associate Minister of Transportation. 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

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
