"It means so much to us that (the bench and trees) were placed in a playground that our children were so anxious to see and play on." The day included many family-friendly activities for the public to enjoy.

In March, 29-year-old Marco Muzzo pleaded guilty to four counts of impaired driving causing death and two counts of impaired driving causing bodily harm in connection with the crash in Vaughan. This case will hopefully serve as an example to people considering drink <u>driving after leaving a college party</u>, or other similar circumstance. Why? The harsh nature of the sentence, and the guilt to follow. He was sentenced to 10 years in prison, and will be subject to a 12-year-ban on driving following his release.
