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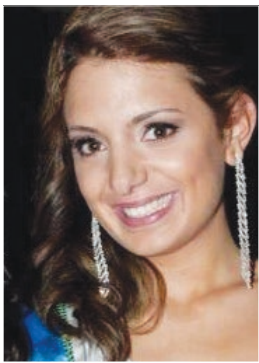

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Temporary speed humps aimed at calming traffic

 Traffic calming measures will be implemented in residential areas in Nobleton and King City.

The engineering and public works department report on the 2013 Traf-

fic Calming Program was presented at the April 22 committee of the whole meeting.

In the report, staff recommend the installation of temporary speed humps on a trial basis in the areas of Hill Farm

Road, Nobleton; Burton Grove, Patricia Drive and Warren Road in King City.

The purpose of the report was to provide council with an update as to the traffic calming petitions received by residents living in the affected neigh-

bourhoods in Nobleton and King City. As a result of the residents' concerns, staff suggested the Township install temporary speed humps in both petition areas on a trial basis. Staff recommended purchasing up to 34 temporary rubber speed humps at a cost of \$40,000. Staff propose that the temporary speed humps remain in place until the end of October and be removed during the winter months to allow for road maintenance, then be re-installed in May of 2014.

Residents from Nobleton came forward at the meeting to voice their concerns that the proposed traffic calming measures will not be enough to slow down drivers who speed through their subdivision every day.

"This is not the outcome we were expecting as a result of our petition," said Anna Marie Burlon. "The speed of the people travelling on the road is a clear indication of the need for permanent speed humps. I don't like speed humps but I would like one in front of my house."

The increase in traffic in the existing subdivision is a result of the new development in the area.

"This does not make for a good situation with the new neighbours," she said.

She pointed out that Hill Farm Road includes a school zone and people need to slow down. She added that cars are even being passed as they are trying to turn into a driveway.

"These incidents are taking place on a frequent basis. It's very dangerous and it's of great concern."

Local resident Claude Brim explained to council that 500 feet east of his house there is a small curve in the road which makes entering and exiting his driveway dangerous.

"The traffic comes so fast that I can't even get out of my driveway," said Brimm.

The new subdivision has caused the traffic on Hill Farm Road to increase significantly, he added. He asked that stop signs be installed as a further traffic calming measure.

Local councillor Peter Grandilli agreed stop signs need to be put installed in the neighbourhood, preferably on Hill Farm Road, at Kaake Road and Lynnwood Crescent. He was also concerned about removing the tem-

porary speed humps in the winter.

"I can see what's going to happen here - the minute we remove these in the winter time, I'm going to get 20 phone calls a day," said Grandilli.

Councillors agreed that something needs to be done before something happens.

"We want to get it done as soon as possible, there is a fair bit of urgency with this," said Councillor Cleve Mortelliti.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini said he would like to see two stop signs installed along Hill Farm Road - one at Lynnwood Crescent and the other at Goodfellow Crescent/Kaake Road. He added he would like the issue to come back before council just before the speed humps are removed.

"I drive that street enough," Pellegrini said. "I'm one of those guys people are flying by when I'm trying to find a driveway."

The temporary speed humps are expected to be installed by the beginning of June. Staff plans monitor the installations to determine the community acceptance of the speed humps, and the effects they have on overall speeds.

King reveals new corporate logo

King council approved the design of the Township's new corporate logo, one that tells King's story.

The new branding and guidelines will be used for the majority of the Township's documents, correspondence, publications and signage. The Township's Crest will continue to be maintained and used for ceremonial/official type documentation (i.e. certificates, plaques).

"I am thrilled with our new logo as it tells our story. It brings the community together and captures the essence of King's past, present and future," said Mayor Steve Pellegrini.

"I am really proud of our new logo and want to thank our staff communications committee for its commitment and hard work over the past year developing the policy and style guide," said CAO Susan Plamondon.

The new King logo was initially established in association with the Township's "Sustainable King" initiative. The logo represents the elements of this modern, but rural municipality and the design and colour scheme are representative of King's natural habitat:

- Green and the leaf motif represents our strong agricultural roots, our natural preservation and pride of our abundant, natural areas, being within the Oak Ridges Moraine and the Greenbelt, green and growing, and the importance of sustainability within our urban and rural communities.

- Blue and the break in the "K" represents the significance of the two watersheds running within King and our relationships with the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority and Toronto and Region Conservation Authority.

- The gradient of the blue, indicating water, its importance to the health and well-being of our existence today and for our future, as well as King being host of the important headwaters for rivers that flow both to the north to Lake Simcoe and to Lake Ontario in the south.

- "KING" and its design, signifies our values (integrity, responsibility, strength) and sense of place, the collective name of our communities, reflecting where we are and who we are, resulting in our modernized branding design.

The Township Crest was designed to represent the historic elements within our rural community, signifying the following:

- Water symbol, representing the abundance of fresh water.
- Sheaf, representing the extensive farmland and rich agricultural history extending far into the past.
- Beaver, representing nature, and national symbol of Canada.
- Crown, also used as a national symbol of Canada, symbolized within crests and flags, honoring the monarchy, and signifying the term "King."

The logo and crest promote civic pride and spirit, while bringing about uniformity of how the corporation is identified by both staff, and the public alike. Use of the new logo does not revoke use of the Township Crest, however, use of both will help strengthen King's identity.

Air quality report shows drop in pollutants

Ontario's annual air quality report shows levels of many air pollutants have dropped across the province and Ontario's air quality continues to improve.

The Ontario government has taken strong action to reduce air pollutants and ensure cleaner air for the people of the province. Today's cleaner air quality comes as the result of:

* Replacing coal-fired generation with cleaner, renewable energy sources.

* Lowering emissions from cars and trucks and investing in public transit.

* Stronger regulations to reduce greenhouse gases and other industrial emissions.

* Working with the federal government and the United States to address transboundary air pollutants that impact Ontario.

* Reducing air pollutants and protecting the environment is part of the government's plan to create a sustainable economy that creates jobs for Ontario families.

Overall, air quality has improved significantly over the past 10 years, especially for nitrogen dioxide (NO₂), carbon monoxide (CO) and sulphur dioxide (SO₂) - pollutants emitted by vehicles and industry - as well as fine particulate matter (PM_{2.5}), which originates from many different industrial and transportation sources as well as natural sources.

In the Newmarket area air quality is continuing to improve and overall, levels of contaminants have decreased over the past 10 years. For example, nitrogen dioxide was down 33 per cent and nitrous oxide was down 35 per cent. For fine particulate matter (including aerosols, smoke, fumes and dust), Newmarket reported a decrease of 28 per cent. And summer ozones were done 13 per cent in the Newmarket area (these numbers reflect 10-year trends).

The 2011 air quality report marks 41 years of long-term reporting on the state of air quality in Ontario. This report summarizes the current state and province-wide trends for key airborne pollutants impacting Ontario's air quality.

Ozone is a secondary pollutant formed when nitrogen oxides (NO_x) and volatile organic compounds (VOCs) chemically react in the presence of sunlight. Ozone annual means have increased by seven per cent from 2002 to 2011.

Transboundary emissions, mainly from the U.S., account for approximately half of Ontario's smog. Emission reductions in Ontario and the U.S. have contributed to decreases in PM_{2.5} and summer ozone levels. Winter and annual ozone levels are increasing due to a global rise in ozone levels.

Emissions of NO_x, CO and SO₂ continue to decrease, due in part to Ontario's air quality initiatives such as the phase-out of coal-fired generating stations, emissions trading regu-

lations, emissions controls at Ontario smelters, and Drive Clean automobile emission limits.

During 2011, the provincial Ambient Air Quality Criteria for NO₂, CO and SO₂ were not exceeded in any regions of Ontario where ambient air monitoring exists.

For a fourth year in a row, the Canada-wide standard for PM_{2.5} was not exceeded in Ontario. The PM_{2.5} Canada-wide standard three-year metrics are trending downwards from 2005 to 2011.

Six of the 21 designated sites met the Canada-wide standard for ozone

in 2011. For the first time, Barrie, London, Mississauga, and Sudbury met the Canada-wide standard for ozone.

There are 40 Air Quality Index (AQI) monitoring stations across the province that provide around-the-clock information on air quality.

Over the past decade, levels of fine particulate matter such as nitrogen dioxide, sulphur dioxide, carbon monoxide and summer time ground-level ozone have declined.

Cleaner air lowers the health risks associated with pollution such as asthma and other respiratory diseases.

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Julia Munro, MPP York-Simcoe Power generation woes continue



People in York-Simcoe know very well how the Liberals mismanage our power generation system as they saw the government push through the Holland Marsh gas-fired generating station with no environmental assessment. Yet we also all saw the Liberals cancel gas plants - ones to be located in Liberal ridings - when the political heat got too much for them.

For months, the Ontario PCs have been calling on the McGuinty-Wynne Liberals to tell Ontario taxpayers the truth about the cost of cancelling the Mississauga gas plant. Each time the Liberals insisted that it would only cost \$190 million.

The Auditor General announced that Ontarians are now on the hook for at least \$275 million to cancel the Mississauga gas plant - \$85 million more than the amount originally cited by the McGuinty-Wynne Liberals. These additional costs are an indictment of the Liberals' cover-up and attempt to mislead taxpayers. This is money that cannot be used for the things that Ontarians value most, like health-care and education.

The power plant in the east end of Mississauga was cancelled by the Liberals during the 2011 election to save Liberal MPPs in the surrounding ridings. Since the builders had a contract with the government they were able to extract huge compensation from the government.

It is important to remember that the Ontario Liberal government controlled this process from the very beginning. They set up the Ontario Power Authority in 2004 which said we needed more power generation in the GTA. The Liberals allowed the application to move forward, watched the plant being built, panicked in the middle of the 2011 election, and then cancelled the plant.

Some of the specific costs revealed in the Auditor General's report include:

- \$90 million in penalties and interest to the power company's lender in the U.S., on a \$59 million loan.
- \$41 million in labour costs without seeing copies of payroll documents or T-4s.
- \$4.2 million to the power company for the plant property without gaining title to the property.

Even though we know the cost of the Mississauga gas plant, the investigation is far from over. For months the Liberals claimed that canceling the Oakville gas plant would cost taxpayers only \$40 million, while independent energy experts estimate that it could cost over \$800 million. Taxpayers deserve to know who ordered the cancellations, how much they cost, and most importantly, who is now trying to cover them up.

From shutting down the Legislature, to withholding documents on three occasions, the McGuinty-Wynne Liberals have made coordinated attempts to cover up the truth about their misdeeds.

People in Ontario deserve a government that provides responsible oversight for families and taxpayers. One that makes fair and necessary decisions and a government that we can trust to do their jobs properly and take responsibility for their actions.

No person or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Municipal Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

By-law 2013-39 applies to lands within the rural area of King Township that are also within the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan area.

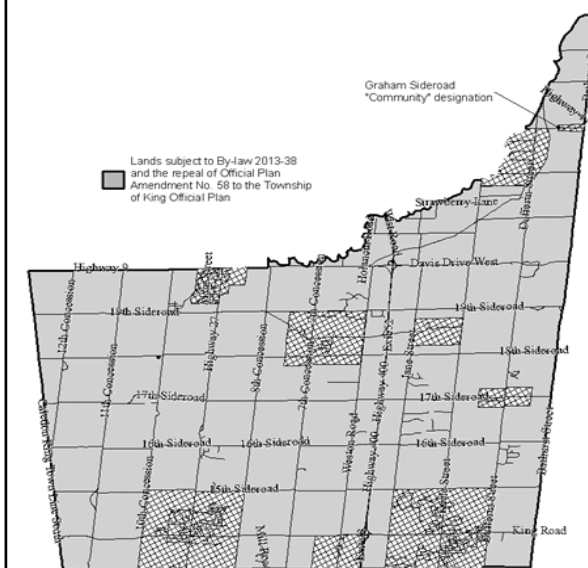

Put a Spring in Your Garden Steps

allow for natural drainage, and won't disrupt plant roots. They're also very affordable. However, chips and stones need annual replenishing and some weeding may be required. Mortared paths and dry-laid pavers need the least amount of mainte-

nance, but are more costly options that will likely require professional help. As well, these types of heavy walkways could cause drainage issues and are prone to cracking and splitting.

Shape and Style

Design your walkway with your garden in mind. Leave space between stones to allow greenery to grow and keep the focus on the natural beauty of your plants. Use flagstones and create a rich mosaic pattern using the different shapes and sizes that look natural in any garden.

If you prefer a more modern look, go for square paving stones with a dark

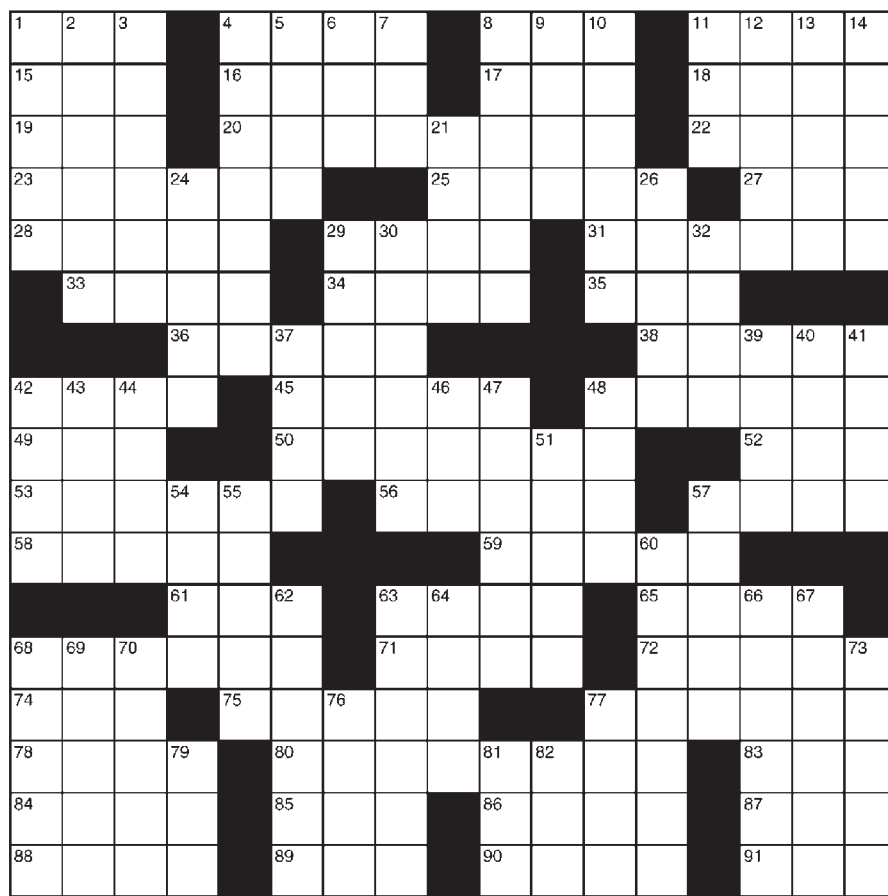
ity of the exhibits delight her she was also pleased by the number of exhibits (67) and exhibitors (9).

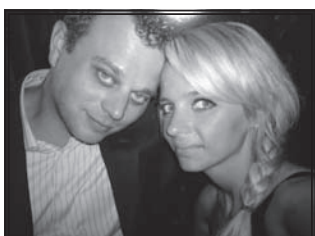

He spent a couple of years in the early '90s selling his product door to door. He put it on hold to deal with family matters and the Grippears, and their mass potential, remained stagnant for roughly 20 years.

Capobianco and Nelson resurrected the idea and spent several months laying the groundwork to kick-start the project once more. They established partnerships and got all the paperwork in order.

With most of the preliminary work already done by Swanek, along with a healthy inventory of product, the two young entrepreneurs had nothing to lose, and everything to gain.

But their motivation wasn't success and affluence. They did it for their



involved a quick pitch to show producers and their three-minute time slot was stretched to 10 as Grippears drew widespread attention. They took their turn in line in March of 2012.

Just weeks later they headed to the Toronto studio to film the episode and hopefully get funding and endorsement by Canada's power brokers.

They were well prepared and confident.

Making their pitch, aided by two females doing backflips wearing Grippears, the product quickly got a reaction from Jim Treliving, owner of Boston Pizza and Mr. Lube. He offered up the requested \$40,000 investment, asking for a 35% share of the company. Treliving has said "simplicity is the key to success" and Grippears obviously appealed to him. This was followed by David Chilton (The Wealthy Barber) who undercut Treliving by asking for 30% ownership. Capobianco and Nelson were then asked to bring Swanek into the studio and his story garnered more support. In the end, Treliving, Chilton and Arlene Dickinson (Venture Communications) joined forces on the investment and equal ownership shares.

While it was somewhat

intimidating trying to impress the panel, their stress faded quickly as they got into the swing of their pitch. It was like the toughest job interview ever.

Capobianco stressed to the panel they really needed their expertise, mentorship and connections and not necessarily the funds.

After the show, they remained in constant contact with Chilton, who was more than willing to offer his advice and guidance. He's still just a phone call away.

As the duo continues to work at the contractual obligations, they've received a lot of positive feedback since the show aired. It's estimated the episode drew more than three million viewers.

The website sales are growing steadily and they've partnered with the CNIB to contribute \$1 per pair of Grippears sold to this worthy national charity. According to the CNIB, a staggering one in seven Canadians will be diagnosed with an eye disease in their lifetime. Every 12 minutes, someone in Canada begins to lose their sight, but many Canadians aren't aware that 75 per cent of vision loss can be prevented or treated.

As well, the duo is trying to join forces with WSIB (Workplace Safety & Insurance Board) to promote the use of Grippears to safety glasses.

They are available in seven different colours and three different sizes, and retail for \$4.99.

The guys are enthusiastic about their rekindled entrepreneurial spirit and seeing this project succeed. Capobianco hopes to return to teaching and Nelson is currently doing sales for a major uniform company. Both believe this experience can only help them in their careers. And what better references can someone have than entrepreneurial icons Treliving, Chilton and Dickinson?

The duo will have a booth set up at the Schomberg Fair so check them out.

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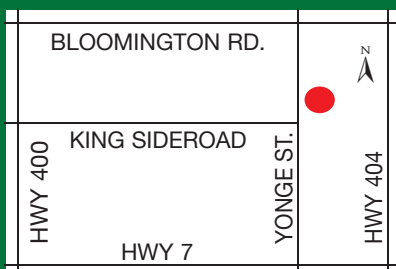
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Holland Marsh District Christian School hosts CALIPER clinic

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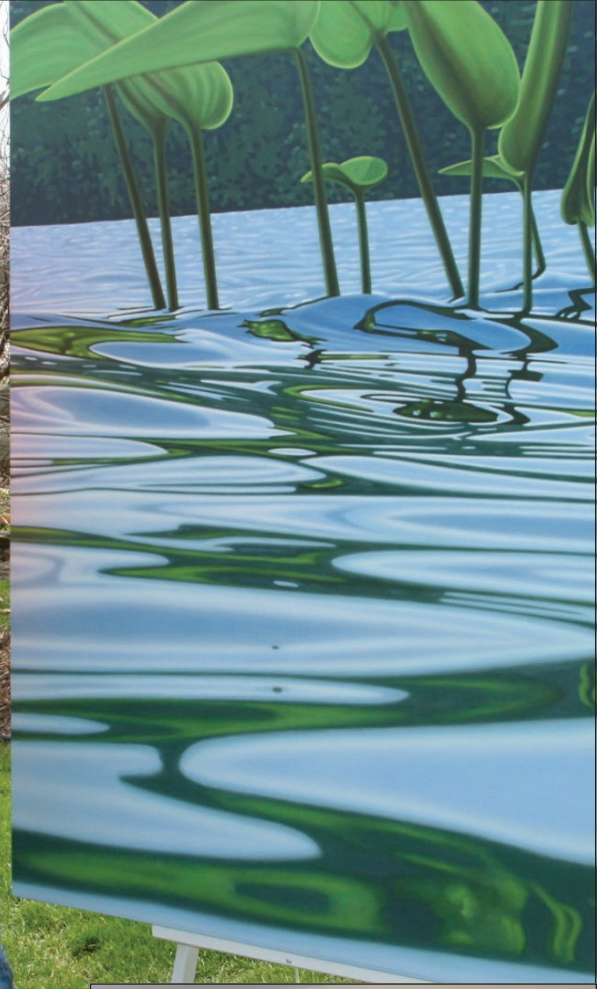
