


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

"Described as a destination craft-brewery, craft cidery, craft distillery, restaurant and retail site, the project is intended to build a state of the art world class facility that will act as a destination spot bringing tourism, employment and a significant positive financial impact to the area," reads the staff report.

The second proposal (Proposal B) is for a longterm care facility including onsite associated services such as medical offices and a pharmacy and community space.

"This proposal involves the redevelopment of the site with a new commercial/community centre building described as an institute for home and community care and the construction of approximately 30 individual living care units focused on the needs of seniors requiring a continuum of care.' stated the staff report.

The third option (Proposal C) proposes a fair and agriplex facility. The year-round facility would host the annual agricultural fair, agricultural/community/equine events, an indoor equestrian centre and potential rental opportunities in the arena, hall or fairgrounds through a business partnership with the municipality.

This option was not selected as a preferred option by staff as it would present a financial risk to the township in that it would require continued financial investment by the township.

Furthermore, the public consultation process revealed that there was minimal support for residential development in that area as many people felt there were enough residential units available in Schomberg.

The next step is to move forward with a Request For Proposal (RFP) process taking into consideration the community's input while making sure the proposal will finance the current Trisan debt requirement. According to staff, Proposal A is the best option for the township, but some members of ouncil were not so sure.

Pellegrini wanted to know why the proposal for the microbrewery, commercial and retail space was selected over the proposal for the long-term care facility.

"Recommendations in this report were discussed by your management team," explained Township CAO Susan Plamondon. "Based on what we understand to be the preferred approach that met the financial requirement, this proposal was the one that was most consistent with the preferred alternative that came out of the public consultation."

She added the Township could issue an RFP that solicits proposals consistent with both Proposal A and B, if council prefers.

"One thing we heard loud and clear is the retention of the building if possible and allowing the Schomberg Agricultural Society to continue the Schomberg Fair," said Plamondon, explaining the long-term care facility option proposes removal of the existing building and redevelopment of the site. "The first proposal is more inline with the preferred alternatives we heard discussed during the community consultation.'

Pellegrini said he wants to see the land retained, not necessarily the build-

"It's our land. You can't buy land like that anymore," said Pellegrini. "Let's try to keep it so that 50 years from now it will still be part of Schomberg. I think the building has passed its useful life. It may be cheaper to tear it down and put a new building. I really think both (options) have incredible merit.'

He added that the proposal for a long-term care facility is innovative and he would like to further explore it to see whether it is feasible or not. He asked

that a senior care centre private businesses." be added to the list of possible uses in the RFP.

Councillor Peter Grandilli did not agree.

"In 2009, council approved the sale of this arena and the proceeds to go to the Trisan Centre. I do not know why we are dragging our feet," said Grandilli. "After four years I think it's time we came to a decision. We should reapprove the sale of the building. I don't think King Township should retain any of this land or the arena. We are not here to partner with

Grandilli said that keeping the arena is costing the taxpayer money and he requested a report to find out exactly how much.

"Overall I am completely disappointed with this report and I expect something better than this," said Grandilli.

Pellegrini responded, stating exploring options for the property has not cost the taxpayers a penny.

Vandals strike at Nobleton Victoria Day

The success of the annual Victoria Day festival in Nobleton was marred by a senseless act of vandalism.

According to Patty Fleetwood, event organizer, vandals sliced the canvas tarp on the rear of the portable stage, rented for the occasion. It is beyond repair. It likely happened during the evening of May 20.

Fleetwood noted this is the first time in some 15 yeas that something like this has happened.

"I was utterly shocked by this," she said.

This could be a matter for the insurance companies, or some of the cost could come out of the event coffers. It will cost upwards of \$1,000.

Fleetwood noted the Nobleton Village Association relies totally on donations to put on this annual community event.

Fleetwood is disturbed that it happened, and would like those responsible to be held accountable. She's considering offering a reward for information on the mat-

On May 22, members of the York Regional Police Auto Cargo Theft Unit, with the assistance of #4 District Criminal Investigation Bureau, #2 District Criminal Investigation Bureau and South Simcoe Police, executed a search warrant on a business located at 20100 Bathurst Street, in the Township of King. The shop was being run out of a rented unit on a barn on

As a result of the search, six stolen vehicles were recovered, two trailers, as well as parts from four other stolen vehicles, for a total value of approximately \$150,000.

Two individuals were located on the property and were arrested and charged with theft over \$5,000, possession of property obtained by crime over \$5,000 and altering a VIN.

The investigation is ongoing and officers are asking anyone with information to come forward.



It extends 160 kilometres, from the Trent River in the east to the Niagara Escarpment in the west. 

ENGINEERING AND PUBLIC WORKS WATER METER REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

Over the next few years King Township will be replacing our old water meters. Notices will be going to affected residents for the work this year. The initial focus will be Nobleton. Your co-operation with our contractor will be greatly appreciated. This program will assist the Township in leak detection and water conservation. Improvements to Township infrastructure are a benefit to all King residents.

King Township has awarded the contract for this water meter upgrade program to WAMCO Municipal Products. <u>NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS - DESTROY</u> <u>WEEDS</u>

NOTICE is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with the Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter W.5, Sections 3, 16 and 23 THAT unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the Municipality of the Township of King are destroyed by date of June 15th, 2012 and throughout the season, the Municipality may enter upon the said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging costs against the land, as set out in the Weed Control Act.

(All properties ten (10) acres or less may have noxious weeds destroyed without notice to the owner).

NOTE: Giant Hogweed was added to Ontario's list of 23 Noxious Weeds in 2010. It is a toxic plant that can grow to heights of 15 to 20 feet (4.5 to 6 metres) and it can cause permanent blindness and burn the skin. Extreme care must be used when cutting or destroying this weed.

Municipal Class Environmental Assessment for Nobleton Sanitary Sewer System was originally completed in July 2003. Construction of Nobleton Sanitary Sewer System was started in 2009 and significant progress has been made so far. The detailed design of the Contract 5 of Nobleton Sanitary Sewer Project is proceeding well and is entering into final stages. The original preliminary design prepared for the project envisioned an easement from the east end of Hawman Avenue and a connection on Hwy 27. During detailed design the Township evaluated alternative sewer routing and determined that an easement through 6076 King Road and 47 Hawman Avenue, Nobleton, Ontario would be preferred.

An Addendum has now been completed to the Environmental Study Report which presents a revised preferred outfall for Contract 5.

Please note that only the changes proposed in the Addendum are open for review.

By this Notice the Addendum is being placed on the public record for review in accordance with the requirements of the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment. Subject to comments received as a result of this Notice, the Town intends to proceed with the construction of this project in the summer of 2013.

Crime in York Region is down for 9th year in a row

York Regional Police Chief Eric Jolliffe reported that the overall crime rate decreased for the ninth year in a row, dropping 5.4% in 2012.

The rate for property crimes and assault has decreased. The assault rate has decreased by 4.83% or 160 fewer incidents from 2011, and the property crime rate has decreased by 2% or 426 fewer incidents from 2011.

The number of cases that were cleared in 2012 was 62.1% which is a slight increase from 2011. 9-1-1 calls decreased by 4.2% in 2012.

The number of non-emergency calls also decreased by 2.3% with the total number of calls received decreasing by 3% from 673,186 to 652,793. Reported Hate Crime occurrences in York Region decreased by 10.1% in 2012 compared to the corresponding period in 2011.



"I wanted people to understand that our coming together was for the good of all of us. It was a way for everyone to share stories, accomplishments, sorrows, and triumphs. It made me ecstatic to have individuals email me their take on the day.

"It was just as much of an honor for me as it was for them. I very much look forward to next years event. The date is set as May 3, 2014."

Humphrey noted the event took place on Saturday and he endured his chemo treatment the following Monday.

He continues to keep in touch with his supporters via his Facebook posts.

"Today is chemo Monday, but I am still on an incredible emotional high from Saturday. It matters not that cancer killing poison will be going through me in an hour!

"The life-changing and profound effect you all have had on my life is unprecedented, undeserving, and unexpected! There are few times in my life that even compare to what happened this weekend!"

"I truly believe part of the battle, with anything in life, is mental; whether it be strength, determination, courage, ability to remain calm, reflection, etc, but what they all point to is stress. You need to mitigate and minimalize the stress in your life.

"For me, I feed off of you; your hope; your stories; your strength; your inspiration, and your love. What this weekend did for me, what you all have done for me over my entire journey, especially this last month, is a pure miracle. The fire it instills in my heart, the passion it fuels in my soul and the determination to not let you down and fight to the end are all forever engraved in my psyche."





"This is our opportunity to do what's right for the municipality, to do what's right for the community and to put something we want there instead of what a developer wants there," said Pellegrini. "I don't want to just put up a 'for sale' sign."

Councillor Debbie Schaefer said she didn't have enough information to make a decision between the two different proposals and asked that both be considered as part of the RFP process.

Grandilli requested a recorded vote on the matter.

"Council members voted to sell this arena in 2009 and this arena should be sold," said Grandilli adding so many people complain about the problems with the old building. "Keeping it would only please a few local groups that want to keep the arena at the expense of the taxpayers in King Townhship."

Councillor Cleve Mortelliti said he has no problem justifying the decision to repurpose the arena to his constituents in King City.

"My own constituents ask me why we are doing this," said Mortelliti. "The point is not selling the building, it's recovering the \$1.3 million. Why do we have to sell the building if we can recover the money without selling the property. It will enhance the community. I think we're going down a good path here."

A motion was made for the Township of King to issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) to interested individuals, businesses or organizations for the re-purposing of the site by way of a sale or lease that will result in a mixed commercial/light industrial development including a micro-brewery, retail store, restaurant, community space and/or senior care facility. The proposals will be accepted until Aug. 31, 2013.

A recorded vote was taken on the matter. With six members of council in favour and Councillor Grandilli against, the motion carried.
